WHITEHURST LEADS TUCKER FOR SHERIFF

D. M. Clark and Jesse Davis Lead For Solicitorship

ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT E. C. TEACHERS COLLEGE NOW IN PROGRESS HERE

The curtain dropped on the last scene of the seventeenth year's work of East Carolina Teachers College last Friday with the closing of examinations. The college is graduating 184 young women at its annual commencement. One hundred sixty-six of these are graduating from the two-year teacher training course while 18 are graduating from the four-year college course.

President Wright, in his parting talk to the students last Friday morning, expressed his appreciation of their loyalty and their efforts in helping to make the closing year the best and most satisfactory the college has enjoyed. Amid the criticism of youth heard on every hand he expressed his faith in the young women of the college to go out into the world and make good under the college's motto, "To Serve."

"It has been a wonderful year," said President Wright, "to me, it has been the very best college year I have ever spent, and I suspect that it is true with you, because we have had such a wonderful spirit in the student body. We have had such a wonderful attitude toward our work that I just feel like I want each one of you to know that you somehow have made me love every one of you."

"I want you girls to carry back into the life that you are going to live all of the good things out of your experiences in college. I saw some figures the other day that were so interesting to me, I think I will give them to you—Just one per cent of the entire population of the United States is composed of college men and women. Seventy-two per cent of all the leaders of America are college men and women. Twenty-eight per cent of the leaders in America come out of the 79 per cent who did not go to college, and seventy-two per cent of America's leaders come out of the one per cent of college men and women."

"Now, that means, young women, that you have a much better chance to make good in life than the young woman who hasn't had the opportunity to go to college. It carries with it a much greater responsibility. The world is torn up today perhaps more than it has ever been before. All of our social order is broken down. The whole plane of a gen-

eration ago is undergoing considerable change.

"The world is not looking to men and women with half the color of mine to solve its problems. The world is looking to day to the young men and women. There is a great responsibility that is coming to you, as college women, to reach out and take hold of the opportunities that the world is offering you to help pilot it at this adjusting period, to the place it should go. We are living in a generation with new ideals and new standards. But I am glad to say young women, I believe you are making your adjustments. I have absolute faith in this generation of college men and women. You show that you have right ideals and you show that you have right standards."

"If we use these changes as college men and women should, we are going to have the greatest world to live in that we have ever had. The world is before you, and, I say it reverently, thank God, your eyes are on the future and you are building in religion and in government the kind of spirit life and the kind of temporal government that people ought to have."

Funeral Services Held This Afternoon Followed by Interment in Ayden Cemetery

Mrs. A. L. Sumrell, 52, died at her home on Pitt street at 11:30 o'clock Sunday morning following an illness of several months. Funeral services were conducted from her late home at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon by Rev. L. B. Jones, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, of which she was a member, after which the body was taken to Ayden for interment in the cemetery there.

Mrs. Sumrell is survived by her husband, a daughter, Mrs. T. R. Pruette, of this city; two sons, Messrs. Lester D. Sumrell, of Washington, D. C., and Cleo Sumrell, of this city; three brothers, Messrs. Frank, Joe and Donald Barnhill, and three sisters, Miss Mabel Barnhill, Mrs. C. F. Willis and Mrs. N. B. Tucker.

Poll Holder Drops Dead In Warren County

Henderson, June 7.—(AP)—John Cole, a poll holder in a Warren County precinct near the Virginia state line, dropped dead while serving as an election official in his precinct Saturday afternoon. It was learned here late last night.

Cole left his seat at the ballot box to go to a well a few yards away for water, and collapsed, dying almost instantly. No other details of his death were available here today.

Electrocuted While Repairing Electric Cable Near Bailey

Wilson, June 7.—(AP)—Frank Curry, of Staunton, Virginia, was electrocuted at Bailey in Nash county, yesterday while repairing a wire, it was learned here today. He was a lineman for the Carolina Power and Light Company. Reports were to the effect that Curry was working on a large cable which the company is at present running into Rocky Mount for the benefit of the railroad shop there. He accidentally touched the exposed wire and was killed instantly, his body being later removed from the pole.

STAGE FIST FIGHT NATIONAL CAPITOL DURING MORNING

Ink Well and Water Glass Come Into Play During Judiciary Committee Investigation

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—An exchange of blows, the throwing of an ink well and a glass of water, took place at the capital today in a fight between Representative Rankin, Democrat of Mississippi, and Commissioner Frederick A. Fenning, of the District of Columbia, and his attorney F. J. Hogan.

The encounter was staged before the House Judiciary Committee on the investigation of Mr. Fenning's administration under way.

Mr. Hogan received a slight injury above the left temple while the others were unhurt. Representative Rankin admitted throwing the inkwell, Hogan throwing the glass of water and Fenning said he did all in his power to reach Rankin but was unsuccessful. The fight was precipitated when Rankin became angered over the interruption by Hogan during the examination of Fenning's.

Pass Bill To Prevent Abuse Fed. Patronage

Washington, June 7.—(AP)—A bill by Representative Stevenson, Democrat of South Carolina, designed to prevent abuse of Federal patronage, was passed today by the House.

Second Primary Is Necessary in Constable Race

In Saturday's primary in Greenville township for constable, H. W. Martin and J. Gus Stokes led in a field of four candidates. Martin receiving five more votes than Stokes. The vote was as follows: H. W. Martin 635, J. Gus Stokes 287. It was indicated this morning that there will be a second primary between Martin and Stokes.

EMANUEL GIBSON DIED HERE TODAY

Suffered Heart Attack Shortly After Ten O'clock and Died About Two Hours Later

Mr. Emanuel Gibson, 49, died at his home here at 12:45 o'clock this afternoon after an illness of about two hours. Angina Pectoris was given by physicians as the cause of his death. Definite announcement of funeral arrangements had not been made this afternoon.

"Shorty," as Mr. Gibson was known by all his friends, suffered a heart attack shortly after ten o'clock this morning while at work at the factory of Person-Garrett Co., and was carried to his home and a physician summoned.

Mr. Gibson, a native of Philadelphia, had been a resident of this city for the past thirteen years and at the time of his death was engaged in the machine shop business. He received his education at Harvard and was a charter member of one of the oldest college fraternities. On December 31, 1922, he married Miss Lucy Whitehurst, of this city, who survives him. He is also survived by a sister, Miss Alice Gibson, of Philadelphia, and two brothers, Messrs. William Gibson, of Philadelphia, and Harry Gibson, of St. Louis.

Cranford Case Not to Be Heard Present Term

Albermarle, N. C., June 7.—(AP)—Indication were today with the convening of Stanley county Superior court that the trial of N. C. Cranford, former convict ward, charged with murder, would not be held at this term of court.

While the state has not asked for a continuance, yet Solicitor Don Phillips has indicated he probably would do so. Cranford is charged with whipping and mistreating three negroes with the result that they all died. The case was called several months ago and continued upon the state's request.

New York and other parts of the country have shivered during the past week. New York wore heavy overcoats on the coldest June 4th on record. Not many, probably asked what would happen, if it got fifty degrees colder.

It is suggested that the ice age was due to constant, heavy clouds keeping out the sun's heat. Animals and men were driven from their homes toward the equator. The human race is probably the better for the great "survival of the fittest" test. Men able to endure cold being presumably better than the softer sort.

Strange weather makes us realize our complete dependence on the sun, and question our conceited idea that it was put in the sky merely to light us by day, especially since the Bible says the sun was made after light had been created.

And God said, let there be light and there was light, and the evening and morning were the first day.

It was not until the fourth day that God made two great lights, to rule the day, and the lesser light to rule the night; He made the stars also.

Lee S. Overman Overwhelms Robert Reynolds in Race for the United States Senate

LARGEST VOTE IN HISTORY COUNTY CAST ON SATURDAY

Returns Indicate Only One Second Primary for County Offices; Brown for Judge and Clark for Solicitor Receive Big Majorities in County

With the largest vote ever cast in Pitt County, Democrats on Saturday nominated its candidates for the November election with the exception of the office of sheriff in which a second primary between S. A. Whitehurst and Wyatt C. Tucker will be necessary for nomination unless one of these candidates should withdraw from the race.

While Pitt County gave Julius a two to one vote over R. A. Nunn, of New Bern, for District Judge, and D. M. Clark a majority over a field of five candidates for District Solicitor, complete returns from over the district have not been received and the exact status of these candidates cannot be determined. Incomplete returns, however, indicate that Nunn is maintaining a lead over Brown for the judgeship and that a second primary between Clark and Jesse Davis will be necessary to determine the solicitorship. Clark's lead, according to tabulations, was about 1500 votes.

A Thurman Moore, present County Treasurer led the ticket with a vote of 4,633 against 1,004 polled by his opponent, D. A. Windham. For the United States Senate, Lee S. Overman's vote in Pitt county was 3,108, while his opponent, Robert Reynolds, received 2,178. Reports from over the state indicate that Overman was nominated by an overwhelming majority.

Marvin K. Blount was nominated for State Senate over S. J. Everett, present incumbent, while Dr. B. T. Cox and E. G. Flanagan were nominated for the House of Representatives in a field of four candidates. For County Solicitor, Sam T. Carson was victorious over J. B. Eure by a vote of 3,447 to 2,123. Out of a field of eight candidates J. Paul Davenport, W. J. Smith, Sam T. White, Ivey Smith and R. W. Smith were nominated for County Commissioners.

Raleigh, June 7.—(AP)—Lee S. Overman had increased his lead for the Democratic Senatorial nomination over Robert R. Reynolds at one o'clock today as additional reports were received. At that hour, the standing in Saturday's primary was, Overman 89,468; Reynolds, 58,233. This represented 962 precincts out of 1,717 in the state. The vote reported came from 70 of the state's 100 counties. The 30 counties to be heard from are scattered over the state, large numbers being in the extreme eastern and extreme western.

Twenty-two counties had reported their complete unofficial vote and of these Reynolds carried eight as follows: Buncombe, Jackson, Henderson, Hertford, McDowell, Polk, Vance and Perquimans.

In the early stages of the returns Senator Overman maintained a lead of two to one over his opponent but as Mr. Reynolds' strength was reported from the western counties this lead was cut down, though at no stage of the race did Overman lose the lead.

Today it appeared there was slight chance for Reynolds to overtake Overman, though a number of western counties in which Reynolds was expected to show strength, had not reported. These, however, were for the most part not densely populated and the vote from practically all the counties with large cities had been reported. In 1924 in the Democratic primary a total of 234,771 votes were cast so that using this figure as a guide it appeared today the major portion of the vote had been reported.

In the two contests for Congressional nomination, on the Democratic ticket the incumbents had what appeared to be a large majority. In the 9th district with 117 out of 223 precincts reported, A. L. Bulwinkle polled 17,082 against 826 for J. A. Dimmette. In the 10th district Zebulon Weaver had 17,670 with 169 out of 220 precincts reported.

Romulus A. Nunn maintained a two to one majority over Julius A. Brown for the nomination as Judge of the Superior Court in the 5th district. With 46 out of 95 precincts reported, Nunn had 7,180 and Brown 3,377. In the 7th district race for Judge, a second primary will be necessary. With all precincts reported, W. C. Harris led with 6,795 while the incumbent T. H. Calvert polled 6,368. Willie M. Person trailed with 2,496 votes.

In the 13th district Judge A. M. Stack with 44 out of 104 precincts reported had 5,154 to 2,885 for his opponent H. B. Redwin. The 20th district, the four-cornered race, stood as follows, with 38 out of 105 precincts: Moore, 2,678; Hannah, 1,735; Mallonbee, 1,483; and Jonston, 382.

Fifth district, 29 out of the 95 precincts, D. M. Clark, 2,654; George A. Barden, 1,950; J. H. Davis, 1,823; M. L. Davis, 683; and J. H. Taylor, 666.

Asheville, June 7.—(AP)—Robert R. Reynolds, Asheville attorney and candidate for the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate against Lee S. Overman, of Salisbury, said at noon today he was receiving reports from throughout the state showing gains for himself and he therefore "refused to concede the nomination to Overman at that time."

Eighty Miners Rescued Alive

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AUSTRALIAN BALLOT NEEDED

In addition to the selection of candidates for the November election Saturday's primary here clearly set forth two things:

First, that the citizens of our county, including the women, are taking more interest in the selection of our officers and, second, that some other method of balloting than that now used must be put into effect. We do not blame candidates for working to secure the most possible votes nor their friends for helping them but before the voters go to the polls is the proper time that this should be done and not at the ballot boxes. The day of wholesale ticket marking and ganging around the ballot boxes should be driven out of existence in order that the voters might be given opportunity to go to the polls and vote their convictions without having to push their way through a crowd of campaigners who endeavor to mark all the tickets or instruct everyone how to vote.

This was one of the conditions that existed at the local voting place Saturday. It was gratifying, however, to note the lack of drunkenness around the court house during the voting hours which probably accounts for there being no disorder despite the large crowd.

It does appear, however, that the Australian Ballot or a similar plan whereby the citizens might vote unhampered must be put into effect if we expect the good women of our community to continue to visit the polls on election day.

IOWA VOTERS GO TO POLLS

Five Republicans and Four Democrats Are Seeking Two Seats in United States Senate

Des Moines, Iowa, June 7.—(AP)—A battle of two political personalities dominated Iowa's electorate today as it polled its choice for the two United States Senatorial nominations from the field of five Republicans and four Democratic candidates.

Senator Albert B. Cummins, 71 years old, seeks on the Republican ballot to retain the Senate seat he has held since 1908. Smith W. Brookhart asks on the same ballot nomination in vengeance upon those who unseated him two months ago in the Senate decision. He was ousted in favor of Daniel F. Steack, his Democratic opponent in the 1924 election after the contest had been before the Senate for a number of months.

Although Cummins and Brookhart

shared the major interests in third candidate for the Republican nomination, Howard Clark, attorney of Des Moines, was regarded as formidable. He based his contention for nomination of the claim that he is the only candidate with any chance of success in the November election as he has preserved party harmony and is a compromise between conservative and the progressive swings of the party. There were two other candidates in the race also.

Two Killed in Crossing Crash

Dunn, June 7.—(AP)—Tom Mingo and Viola Bullard, negroes were killed, and Bessie Manning, also colored, was critically injured when the automobile in which they were riding was in collision with an Atlantic Coast Line train at a crossing near Dunn early today.

Mingo was instantly killed and the Bullard woman died enroute to the A. C. L. hospital at Rocky Mount. The other woman is in the hospital seriously injured.

Dr. A. E. Corey of Kingston, preached the baccalaureate sermon Sunday morning at eleven o'clock. The music was furnished by the department of public school music under the direction of Miss Kuykendall. It consisted of a procession by the students, "Lead On, O King Eternal," two anthems, "God Is Love" and "O, Lord Most Holy," by the college glee club and a soprano solo, "Come Ye Blessed," by Miss Catherine Grantham.

The leading churches of the city of Greenville did not hold their regular Sunday morning services, but worshipped at the college. Dr. Cory preached a masterful sermon, taking as his text, "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus." From this text he developed the different attitudes that the scholar of the present should assume. He pointed out the complexity of modern life and the many relations that must be established by the person of today who would live a life of service and usefulness, and that one's ability to serve will depend upon the mental attitude one assumes toward certain fundamental relations in life.

"There is one aristocracy in the world," said the speaker, "and that is the aristocracy of the mind." He cited examples in history to show how the aristocracies of power and wealth had crumbled and how the works of the constructive thinkers of the world still live. "Mind distinguishes and marks the achievements of the human mind that can imagine, mind that can achieve. It protects us when we go into the jungles of the forest and it directs amid the complexities of human relationships."

"Young ladies," he said, "Many ideals will be held out to you in the future. This complex world of ours, and it has always been complex in every generation. Raymond Fosdick, in addressing the graduating class at Wellesley College, quoted the man who delivered the baccalaureate sermon at Harvard in 1823, in which he said at that time, 'You live in the most complex civilization that the world has ever known,' and yet as we look back to 1823, how simple it seems! They didn't know a telephone, they didn't know a flying machine, they did not know an automobile, they did not even know a bath tub in 1823. And so, my friends, we think today that we have the most complex and the most highly organized civilization of all time. And we think that certain things mark aristocracy, but I am going to say to you, young people, there is only one aristocracy in the world, and that is the aristocracy of the mind."

He urged the students to study and use the wonderful minds of past, but not to copy them. "The past is a heritage we cannot ignore. We must not worship it. We must use it. Jesus Christ took all of the past and built upon it and surpassed it, saying, 'I came not to destroy, but to fulfill.' It is this attitude toward life I wish to bring to you today."

He next developed the different attitudes of the Master toward self-development, toward His relationship with His fellow men, which He expressed in the commandment, "Love thy neighbor as thyself," and third, the Master's attitude toward knowledge and wisdom.

Dr. Corey urged the graduating class to go out in life with a proper attitude toward both the physical and spiritual things of life and be able to live a rich, well rounded life in both the physical and spiritual world.

Men have struggled along here for at least 500,000 years, and the lower animals for millions of years before man arrived. That

we know, and we may safely depend on kind providence to keep us going.

Plato should have witnessed the inauguration of Professor Ignatz Moscicki, as new president of Poland's republic.
In his "republic" Plato says there will be no perfect government, until philosophers become kings, or kings philosophers. When Dionysus, tyrant of Syracuse heard that, he and Plato quarreled.

Moscicki is a philosopher, professor of chemistry of high rank, and Lenin who replaced the Czar was a philosopher, by profession, at least, his kind of philosophy does not suit our gold-collecting best minds? On the other hand, Aristotle, called by Dante "master of those who know," utterly despised the makers of money. In his plan of government, merchants and financiers were classed among slaves. Now they are the government.

Philosopher Lenin's government is still going, stronger than ever. What Philosopher Moscicki can do with Poland, we shall see.

Human psychology, especially mob psychology involves problems to puzzle any chemist philosophers.

John D. Rockefeller, who will be 87 years old next month recently made nine holes of golf in 44 strokes, which proves that he retains his great powers of concentration. If you ask him how he keeps so well, he answers: "I don't let anything bother me."

Happy Mr. Rockefeller. He has a son to carry the burden for him, and a nest egg for a rainy day.

In these high cost days, telling the average man with a big ambitious family not to let anything bother him, is like giving that advice to Prometheus, when the vulture was eating his liver.

However, while you cannot prevent things bothering you, you can try not to let them worry you. Worry sours the blood and wears the nerves, and shortens life. Read Epictetus, even if it bores you. That wonderful slave remained calm, when his master twisted his leg, just for amusement, until the bone broke.

This country and Canada worry about Niagara. The cliff is wearing away, the falls, moving up stream, will eventually "commit suicide," and there will be no more great cataract, what's more serious, brethren, there will be no more dividends on Niagara's electric power.

Why not arrange to use all the water of Niagara, for power, at night, storing up the surplus for peak load hours. That would stop the rock wearing during the night hours, and postpone that "suicide."

During the nights, with no falling water to hinder, the surface of the rocks could be completely covered and protected with a shield of nickel chrome steel, or whatever the hardest steel may be. Thereafter Niagara's rocky cliff might stand like the rock of ages, turning the big turbines for a million years, or until harnessing tides and sun, shall make cataract power as old fashioned as a dog in a tread mill, churning.

Yesterday five thousand pigeons entered in the Grand National Homing Race, started on a 428 mile flight from Danville to New York City. Once a carrier pigeon's speed was important to human welfare. Today, during the first second's flapping of a pigeon's wings man could send a message several times around the earth. And radio could carry the noise of the wings to Australia, before the bird had gone half a yard. That is progress.

If we developed intelligence as rapidly as we develop science, we should get somewhere.

William A. Rockefeller, an ambitious young man, anxious "to do something" is off to the Subarctic regions accompanied by scientists to collect Eskimo relics and rare specimens of bird and animal life.

It is a useful trip, and should add to the treasures of the Natural History Museum. But how much more interesting would be a thoughtful exploring expedition among human beings here at home. Each Prince of Wales, in his turn goes to the jungles of India, to shoot animals. Not one goes exploring in the jungles of London's White Chapel.

Alley, of Cashiers Valley, a brother of Felix Alley, of Waynesville, candidate for Congress from the 10th district in Saturday's primary, is dead as a result of an automobile accident yesterday in Jackson County. He was carrying election returns on the race, which his brother was a candidate, when a collision occurred with a truck.

AYDEN WINS FIRST PLACE STATE HIGH SCHOOL MATH TEST

Paper Submitted By Ralph Collins Awarded First Place Among Fifty - Six Contestants

Chapel Hill, June 7.—The Ayden high school, with the paper submitted by Ralph Collins, has won first place in the first annual high school mathematics contest for North Carolina high schools, it was announced today by E. R. Rankin, who has acted as secretary of the mathematics contest.

The Richard J. Reynolds high school, with the paper submitted by Sam Rose, was declared winner of second place in the contest. The number of high schools which participated in the mathematics contest on May 6 was 56. In these 56 high schools, a total of 1,919 students stood the stand and examination which had been prepared by the mathematics department of the University. Each high school submitted its best paper to the mathematics department of the University. From the mathematics department, a committee, consisting of Dr. Archibald Henderson, chairman, Dr. A. W. Hobbs, and Dr. J. W. Lasley, Jr., served as the examining committee and committee on award.

The mathematics contest was conducted under the joint auspices of the University Extension Division and the Department of

Mathematics of the University of North Carolina. A trophy cup, signifying the State prize, will be awarded by the University Extension Division to the Ayden high school. The first annual mathematics contest, as gauged by the interest shown in it by the high schools and as gauged by the papers sent in to the University from the competing high schools, was regarded as very successful.

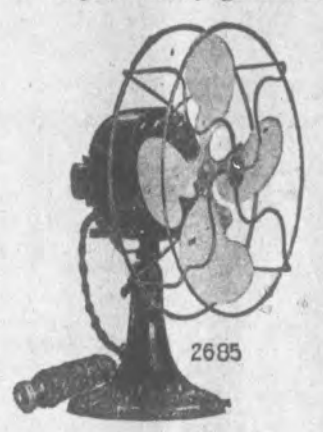
