STATE DOCTORS WILL GATHER AT WRIGHTSVILLE

Ninth Annual Session of Hospital Association to Convene To- morrow

Raleigh, June 10.—(AP)—The Hospital Association of North Carolina will convene in its ninth annual session at Wrightsville Beach tomorrow, the program, made public here today, shows. The meeting will continue through Saturday.

The doctors will gather and register and inspect the hospital supplies and equipment at the exposition of hospital supplies and equipment, which will be a part of the gathering, tomorrow afternoon. In the evening, the conference will be called to order by Newton Fisher, chairman of the committee on arrangements and Dr. Thomas M. Jordan, president of the organization will take charge. The invocation will be pronounced by Rev. A. D. P. Gilmour.

George E. Kidder, mayor of Wrightsville Beach, and Dr. J. Buren Sidbury, representing the hospitals and medical society of New Hanover county, will welcome the delegates. Dr. Iven Proctor, of Raleigh, will respond.

Others who appear on the program for the first evening's session include President Jordan, who will deliver the president's address; Miss Adda Eldridge, R.N., of Madison, Wisconsin, president of the American Nursing Association, and Miss Frances Vaughn Andrews, superintendent of the Asheville Mission Hospital. A round table discussion and addresses will feature the sessions on Friday morning and afternoon, and on Friday evening an administrative session will be held.

The "Workman's Compensation Session" on Saturday morning, under the auspices of the legislative committee, will be the feature of the morning meeting on Saturday.

Saturday afternoon, Dr. W. S. Rankin, director of the Duke Endowment, will discuss: "What the Duke Foundation Means to the Hospitals in North and South Carolina," and the discussion following will be led by Drs. J. (Howell) Way, Waynesville, Ga., Chas. O'H. Laughinghouse, Greenville, N. C., J. F. Highsmith, Columbia, S. C., and by W. M. Whitesides, of Columbia, S. C. The report of committees, election of officers, and choosing of the time and place of the next meeting will occur just before adjournment on Saturday afternoon.

Child Dies of Broken Neck

Sterling, the 14-months' old child of W. H. Garrett, colored, who resides four miles west of Greenville, died yesterday afternoon of a broken neck which was sustained while playing with his 3-year old brother.

The accident occurred in the absence of the parents. The children were playing in the house. In some unknown way the larger boy stepped on his brother's neck, inflicting injuries which resulted in death a short time later.

Marx Defends Von Hindenberg

Berlin, June 10.—(AP)—Bedlam broke loose in the Reichstag today when Chancellor Marx defended President Von Hindenberg against Socialist attacks for his recent pronouncement against confiscation of the former ruler's property. Fist fights threatened between the deputies of the right and left parties. The Socialist criticism was voiced by former Chancellor Mueller, who charged the President had violated the constitution in abandoning the non-partisan attitude prescribed for the Chief Executive.

BRYAN FORCES FIGHTING FOR NEW ELECTION

Charge of Irregularities in Nomination of William Sears in the Fourth District

Jacksonville, June 10.—(AP)—A possibility was seen today of an election contest in the Fourth Congressional District where Congressman William J. Sears on incomplete returns, led Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of the late William J. Bryan, for a Congressional nomination. Charging irregularities in several counties, particularly in Monroe county, James M. Carson, of Mrs. Owen's campaign committee, declared that a contest would be made over the returns if they did not show that Mrs. Owen was nominated. Mrs. Owen was about 300 votes behind today with 30 small precincts missing.

While the Owen forces were talking about the possibility of the contest, political observers raised the question as to when it might not be possible that a Republican would be seated from the district should Mrs. Owen win over Sears.

They predicted their speculations on the fact that the question had been raised regarding Mrs. Owen's illegibility to the office due to the fact that she temporarily lost her citizenship through marriage to Major Reginald Owen, a British army officer.

HOUSE AFFIRMS RECENT ORDER OF COOLIDGE

Order to Permit Em- ployment of State Officers As Prohibi- tion Upheld

Washington, June 10.—(AP)—By a vote of eight to seven the House Judiciary Committee today affirmed the right of President Coolidge to issue his recent order to permit voluntary employment of state, county and municipal officers as federal prohibition agents.

Hertford Man Dies After Auto Crash; Two Girls Injured

Elizabeth City, June 9.—Hurled from his car as it left the road and turned turtle, Julian Nixon, 25, of Hertford, was fatally hurt early tonight on the state highway about four miles east of Hertford. His two companions, Miss Ruth Mason, of Charlottesville, Va., and Miss Anne Oakley, of Salem, Va., were pitched from the car also. Miss Mason sustained a severe gash on the forehead and probably internal injuries. Miss Oakley suffered various cuts and bruises, but apparently was not hurt seriously. Both were brought to the Elizabeth City Hospital, and are under treatment there. Nixon died from internal injuries two hours after the accident.

The tragedy occurred on the evening of the wedding day of Nixon's sister, Miss Majorie Nixon, to Miss Oakley's brother, Walter Oakley, and the three were on their way to a wedding supper at the Nixon's country home. The accident occurred on a straight road, and apparently was due to Nixon losing control of his car after passing another, while driving at high speed. The Nixon family is one of the most prominent in this part of the state.

Ed. Note.—Mr. Nixon was held in highest esteem by numbers of local young men who attended school at the University the same time he did.

PYTHIANS CLOSE CONVENTION AT GOLDSBROO, N. C.

Select Charlotte as the Next Meeting Place; Recommend- ations Received

Goldboro, June 10.—(AP)—The state Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias closed their convention here today after selecting Charlotte as their next convention city.

The State of the Order Committee presented a favorable report at today's session on the recommendation of the Grand Chancellor that a committee be appointed by the incoming Grand Chancellor to consider the establishment of permanent headquarters for the Grand Lodge.

The committee also recommended consideration by the Supreme Representative of the Leprosy proposition.

Resolutions were adopted approving holding central meetings of the district. Under this plan several districts would combine at least four times a year for a general discussion on matters concerning the Orders. The assemblage stood for a moment in silent prayer just before closing today in tribute to the late Thomas S. Franklin, of Charlotte, past Supreme Representative. A loving cup was awarded today by the Grand Vice-Chancellor Chas. W. Coghill, to Mount Airy Lodge No. 242 for receiving the greatest number of applicants during the past October, which was the Grand Chancellor month. A vote of thanks was adopted for the welcome and entertainment afforded by the Goldboro Lodge and citizens.

Mrs. Highsmith to Conduct Survey of Women Labor

Raleigh, June 10.—(AP)—Mrs. J. H. Highsmith today announced her acceptance of the task of conducting the survey of women in industry in North Carolina under the Child Welfare Commission.

The survey was ordered sometime ago by the governor and is expected to get underway early in July. The task was first offered to Miss Elizabeth Kelly, but she declined the proposition. Mrs. Highsmith is the wife of the State Supervisor of High School and is public relations chairman for the Federation of Women's Clubs.

The death of John D. Speckles is a loss to California and to good citizenship everywhere. He worked hard to build up industry and prosperity along old lines and new lines. He was successful in shipping, manufacturing, newspaper, publishing, banking and real estate. He was a builder, ready to take up the new ideas.

Mr. "Bugs" Baer, suggests that "now demand some assistance."

The Iowa election will make republicans realize that they need farmers, more than the farmers need the republican party. Yesterday it was suggested here that Iowa's election would be influenced in Brookhart's favor by the low price of corn. Brookhart is elected in a landslide, which is a bad defeat for the administration.

Germany Ratifies New Amity Treaty

Berlin, June 10.—(AP)—The Reichstag today ratified almost unanimously the Russo-German Amity Treaty, which recently was signed. The vote was taken after an address by Chancellor Marx, in which he emphasized Germany's desire to maintain friendly relations both with the East and with the West.

MELLON FAILS TO SUPPORT ANY FARM PROGRAM

Secretary Finds Fall- cies in the Economic Principle of Equal- ization Fee

Washington, June 10.—(AP)—The attempt to enlist Secretary Mellon in the campaign for a farm relief program based on the equalization fee apparently has failed.

Appealed to by House supporters of the rejected Haugen plan, the treasury head has found what he regards as fallacies in the economic principle of the equalization fee. The secretary does not relish being brought into the controversy raging about this question at the capital and still has under consideration what he ought to do about the request of House farm leaders to render an opinion. He fears he will not be able to outline any constructive program at present time.

Mr. Mellon has discussed equalization fee with Sir Josiah Stamp, the English Economist, who with Vice President Dawes, has endorsed the proposition. He indicated, however, that he could not agree with the vice president and Sir Josiah.

Alumnae Sponsors Excellent Concert

On Monday evening, June 7, the Alumnae sponsored, as their part of the commencement, a concert given by Mr. William Clegg Monroe, baritone, of Greensboro, and Mr. Eugene Craft, pianist.

The program consisted of six groups, the second and fourth being piano solos rendered by Mr. Craft, and the other were rendered by Mr. Monroe with Mr. Craft accompanying him.

In the first number, "Heavenly Winds and Waves" (from Scipio) by Handel, the audience was given an introduction to Mr. Monroe's deep, rich voice, and from the beginning it was assured of an evening of valuable entertainment.

Mr. Monroe's second group consisted of three numbers: "The Moon Drops Low," by Cadman, "Morning Hymn," by Henshel, and "I Am Fate" by Hambley. He related to the audience, the Indian story connected with this song, thus helping his hearers to enjoy the song more. The third number especially confirmed the belief that he was an excellent singer. "Mother of Mine" which was given as an encore to the third number was probably the most beautiful. At least, it seemed to hold the audience spellbound.

The group of negro spirituals was especially well rendered and received a generous applause. It consisted of "Joshua Fit de Battle of Jericho," which many people heard for the first time. "Crucifixion," and "Goin' to 'Shout," "Water Boy," by Avery was given as an encore. The varied tones produced by Mr. Monroe and the variety of emotions felt by the audience made this group probably the best.

The last group was "Inter Members" by MacFadden, "Tell Me Not of a Lonely Lass" by Forsythe, and "For You Alone" by Geel.

An excellent proof that the concert was a success is that it was received so well by an audience made up of children, college students, parents and grandparents. The Alumnae Association is due a great deal of thanks for bringing this concert to the college.

Brazil Declines Re-election As A Non Partisan

Geneva, June 10.—(AP)—Brazil has decided to decline re-election as a non-permanent member of the League of Nations Council. Dr. Mello Franco told the Council this afternoon. As to the ultimate attitude of his country toward the League, he was vague in saying he would wait the final report of the Council's reorganization committee.

LEADING TRADE PUBLICATION TO FEATURE N. C.

Editor and Publisher to Issue Supplement Portraying Advan- tages Tar Heel State

Gastonia, June 10.—(AP)—Editor and Publisher, leading trade publication for members of the "fourth estate" in the United States, will issue, at an early date, a special supplement devoted entirely to the State of North Carolina. It was announced here today by Jas. W. Atkins, president of the North Carolina Press Association.

The press organization in this state is fostering the edition.

With a single exception, this will be the first time this publication has devoted an entire supplement to any Southern state. The exception was in the case of Florida. Some months ago such a supplement was issued on that state.

The North Carolina supplement will consist of perhaps 50 pages, half or more of which will be devoted to specially written articles covering this state's industries and its agricultural, educational and civic development.

Arthur T. Robb, Jr., managing editor of Editor and Publisher, will arrive in North Carolina on June 27 and will spend a fortnight or more assembling data for these articles. A representative of the advertising department of the publication will also visit the state in the interest of the supplement.

The exact date on which the supplement will come from the press has not been announced, but present plans call for its issuance on Saturday, July 17, just prior to the convening of the press association in its annual session at Hickory, July 21.

This journal, said Mr. Atkins, goes into practically every newspaper office in America and many foreign countries, as well as into the offices of all the leading advertising agencies and schools of journalism. It will give North Carolina wide publicity, Mr. Atkins believes.

Police Determine Pigeon Ownership

Trenton, N. J., June 10.—(AP)—Ownership of the pigeon found exhausted at Bren Athyn, Pa., with a penciled note of distress on its leg band purported to come from Walter S. Ward, missing New York millionaire, has been traced to a firm of fanciers at College Point, Long Island.

Investigation by the state police developed that the pigeon was released with a flock of birds at Danville, Va., last Sunday for a trial flight back to New York, and failed to return with the flock. Police believe the pigeon dropped to the ground and was used to perpetrate a hoax that sent troops of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey state police on a vain hunt for Ward.

BENNETT DOTY HEARING FIXED FOR JUNE 10TH

Charges Brought By France Are for "Abandoning Post Before Armed Rebels

Damascus, Syria, June 10.—(AP)—The trial of Bennett J. Doty, of Memphis Tennessee, for desertion from the French Foreign Legion in Syria, has been definitely fixed for June 16.

The charges against the American is "abandoning his post before armed rebels." The French authorities are receiving hundreds of messages from the United States asking for clemency.

Damascus, Syria, June 10.—(AP)—Bennett Doty's father, Lemuel Doty, of Biloxi, Mississippi, need have no fear that his son will be summarily executed for his desertion from the French Foreign Legion, high ranking officers told a staff correspondent of the Associated Press today. The officials connected with the French General Staff said the ywere surprised at the publicity given the case abroad.

Slayer to Pay Death Sentence

Baltimore, June 10.—(AP)—Richard Whittemore, "million dollar crime trust" leader and slayer of a Maryland Penitentiary guard, today was sentenced to die on the gallows. He killed Robert H. Holton in escaping from the penitentiary in February 1925.

Sentence was pronounced by Judge Eugene O'Dunne behind closed court room doors. Under the Maryland law the jury's unqualified first degree murder verdict was punishable only by one of two sentences—death or life imprisonment. Date of execution will be set by Governor Ritchie, but will automatically be postponed by an appeal.

Baltimore, Md., June 10.—(AP)—Whittemore apparently was not at all surprised by the death sentence and received it calmly. His wife, Mrs. Margaret Whittemore, who had stood steadfastly by him since his arrest in New York last March, lapsed into unconsciousness twice. She started to enter the court room prior to the imposition of the sentence but while a detective was hunting a seat for her she fied to an office below where she fainted. When she heard from the lips of spectators that sentence of death had been pronounced she again fainted.

The sentence is the culmination of a career of crime that started when Whittemore was a lad.

He was first arrested in New York as the leader of the "Crime Trust" and taken to Buffalo for trial where he was convicted and sentenced to serve for life. In the meantime he had been indicted in Baltimore for the murder of the prison guard and was extradited to this city with the boast on his lips that he never would be convicted.

His trial and subsequent conviction followed speedily and last week when the verdict was returned it was announced by Judge O'Dunne that he would pass sentence this week.

Spain Refuses New Amity Treaty

Geneva, June 10.—(AP)—Spain is unable to accept classification in the composition of the League of Nations Council, which places her in the secondary rank of powers. Senator Querol declared before the council this afternoon. The attitude of his government, he stated, had not undergone any change.

Pirate Leader Suspended Today

New York, June 10.—(AP)—Bill McKeechie, manager of the World Champion Pittsburgh Pirates, today was indefinitely suspended by President J. A. Heydler, of the National League, for using offensive language to umpire Klem at Philadelphia.

Countess, American Writer, Most Talked of Woman in Paris

Paris, June 9.—(INS)—The woman of the day in Paris happens to be a well-known American, the Countess de Chambrun, formerly Clara Eleanor Longworth and a sister of the present speaker of the House of Representatives, Nicholas Longworth.

Madame de Chambrun has just published a long and interesting "Life of Shakespeare" and at the same time is holding a Shakespearean Exposition in the Office Central de Librairie et de Bibliothèque, where one may see many fine editions, original documents, the works and the principal interpreters of the great Englishman's dramas.

No one, according to English and French critics, is better qualified to write all the interesting facts of this great life and present it in an intelligible and charming manner. For twenty-five years, Countess de Chambrun has been a diligent student of the work of Shakespeare and the conditions of his time. The results of this research she has embodied in numerous articles for the leading French reviews. Not long ago she made an astonishing study of "Shakespeare and Morocco" for the "Revue de Paris."

In 1821, the Countess treated her favorite subject, the epoch of the Renaissance, especially about Shakespeare's time, in a study so comprehensive and penetrating that when she presented it at the University of Paris she was awarded a doctor's degree. Another story which appeared both in French and English, "Playing With Souls," also shows the author's great interest in Shakespeare, for it is an amplification of an interesting situation suggested in one of his little-known comedies.

In her newest work, the author does not explain how the young Will, aged 18, happened to fall in love with twenty-five year old Anne Hathaway, but she believes herself qualified to say that the wife tenderly loved her poet-husband, the proof being that she expressed the desire to be buried beside him. Several French critics hardly think this proof enough, for this would not be the first time that an uncongenial couple might believe they would care more for each other in another, and perhaps, better world. Madame de Chambrun has spent much of her time in northern Africa since her husband was appointed Governor-General of Morocco. She is President of the Red Cross and in fact, spends as much of her time there as in Paris.

BERLIN COPS KEEP COOL IN NEW STRAW HELMETS

Berlin, June 9.—(INS)—Berlin cops will have a pleasant summer without much sweating. The Police President ordered straw shakos to be supplied to the en-

tire police force. While the new shakos—a sort of leather helmet, which was worn by the German chasseur in peace time—have exactly the same appearance as the old ones they will weigh 180 grams instead of 380 grams and are perforated to give access to sufficient fresh air.

Labor to Offer Further Revolt In Great Britain

London, June 9.—(INS)—Hints of a bigger demonstration which will make the last general strike look like a "dress rehearsal" are beginning to emanate from the Left Wing of the trade union movement.

"We must keep the Red Flag flying," is the rallying cry of George Lansbury, Socialist member of Parliament from the pages of his "Labor Weekly," while Ellen Wilkinson, the fiery leader of the woman Socialists, declares that "May, 1926, will prove the dress rehearsal of next time" as did Russia's 1905, and that England's trade unionists have now been trained "to fight as a class."

Lansbury thinks it is idle to reproach the General Council of the Trade Union Congress for calling off the first strike, taking the view that it was not their plan in the first place to carry out a "successful revolution."

"The T. U. C.," said Lansbury, "hoped to carry through a strike for a limit aim within the framework of capitalism. This hope was clearly vain as soon as the Government had decided to use all the forces of the capitalist state to crush it. The strike which the General Council had in mind could only have succeeded if the Government had lost its nerve. But the Government struck back, and in the fright and flurry at the end, the Council failed to secure even the 'fair deal' which they had tried to obtain for the miners."

"In the face of this, any cry of 'Now for Peace and Pulling Together' must ring cruelly false to the workers. They know that there is no peace so long as capitalism endures."

"The Government is already overhauling its strike-breaking machinery. Our job is to overhaul our own machine, to make certain that when we march out again, as before long we shall, there will be no failure of courage, or organization, or leadership to deny to the workers the Socialist Commonwealth whose achievement alone will be peace."

"Chief of all, we must keep the Red Flag flying—the blood-red banner still streams afar and the call still is, 'Who follows in its train' This flag is symbolic of our creed, one blood, one race, one human brotherhood—the world over."

Amsterdam Makes Generous Plans for Olympic Crowds

Amsterdam, June 10.—(INS)—The Dutch Olympic Games Committee is determined that the 1928 Olympic Games—to be decided this time in Amsterdam—will be a success, at least from the point of view of the accommodation arrangements.

Plans for the new Olympic Games Stadium at Amsterdam, which have just been approved by the "Commission for Architectural Beauty," show that this building will be able to answer its purpose in any possible respects.

Staircases twelve feet in width and more will lead to the various amphitheatres, and particular care is being taken to show that a good view can be obtained from every part of the arena.

Main entrances and exits will be arranged so that thousands of vehicles can pass without congestion. The municipal street-car service will extend one of its services in order to bring visitors right to the main gate.

The leading principle of the architects seems that of space, and the avoidance of all cramming. The "Tribune of Honor" for example will have several large smoking and coffee-rooms. Press arrangements have been given special attention. The Press Balcony will contain 600 seats, with specially fitted rooms for allowing newspapermen to write, telephone, or telegraph their reports.

The decorative work of the edifice has been designed with a view to showing the thousands of visitors to the games how well Dutch architecture and Dutch decorative are collaborative.

Meanwhile enthusiasm over the forthcoming games is reaching fever-heat among Holland's sporting public. Subscriptions in all of the games are reaching the Olympic Committee daily, and although the government refused financial support of the enterprise there is little doubt that the necessary funds will be obtained from these voluntary subscriptions, many of which are coming from America.

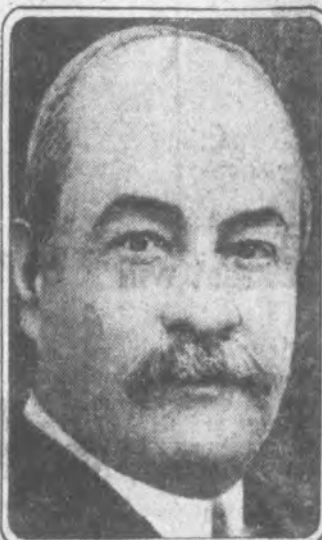

British Adopt Chinese Plan

Peking, June 10.—(INS)—The American precedent in the distribution of the \$55,000,000 reparation British Boxer indemnity will be followed of the recommendation of the Commission, which has completed its investigations, is accepted.

Headed by Lord Willingdon, this mixed British-Chinese Commission has for several months traveled around China considering the hundreds of schemes proposed. As the Commission left for England, it was intimated that the proposal of Dr. Hu Shih, a graduate of Columbia University, one of the members of the Commission, would in all likelihood be accepted for the final report to the British Government.

It was Dr. Hu Shih's plan that a Board of Trustees should be formed with a preponderance of Chinese over British members, which should report both to the British and Chinese governments on its work of distributing the fund, which will amount to approximately \$3,000,000 yearly. It was of outstanding interest that in appointing the Commission, the British government named two American-educated Chinese. The other Chinese member was a British-trained student.

German Farmers Stage Demonstration Vs. Taxation Policy

Berlin, June 10.—(INS)—For the first time since the revolution approximately 60,000 Brandenburg farmers, otherwise credited with being conservative, calm, and considerate, demonstrated in smaller country towns around Berlin to protest against the Government's taxation policy and to show the townsfolk that they are in a desperate plight. The demonstrations are interpreted as storm signals.

The bulk of the farmers is over-loaded with debts. More than one billion gold marks have to be paid back this fall and the farmers simply do not know how to do it. They were granted credits at murderous rates of interest and are being taxed too heavily, according to their own opinion. Their chief complaint is that the Government never found the time to consider their wishes, but was too much tied up with politics to investigate the troubles of calm, never-complaining farmers.

This time is gone now. Farmers, during the demonstrations, were on the point of storming or looting the Revenue Offices, when their own leaders intervened and succeeded in restoring discipline.

THE MODERN MARKET PLACE

Declaring that the newspaper has from its beginning been the "Power Behind Progress" and that now more than at any former time this is true and that the present day newspaper is indeed "the market place of the community," the Bank of Manhattan in a booklet entitled "News and Progress," in part, says:

"When a carrier leaves a paper on a doorstep, it may not occur to him that he is playing a part in the economic life of his town, but so it is, for each individual subscriber he is really delivering THE MARKET PLACE OF THE COMMUNITY. How many carriers, how many readers, even, would recognize their familiar newspaper under such a title? Yet such it literally is.

"The newspaper as a market place is but the culmination of a long development. Generations ago, the market place for the hardy families of the frontier was the traveling peddler. He it was with his pack or wagon who supplied things which could not be produced at home. In time this traveling store was replaced by the general store which carried much larger stocks of goods than could be transported from door to door. This was a second step in the evolutionary process.

Population continued to grow; so did the number and variety of personal needs and of the products designed to supply these needs. Instead of a few staple articles there were thousands. Diversities in styles, material, grade and price multiplied and multiplied. With new conditions came a new method. Once more the merchants returned directly to his customer. No longer did he drag his stock about for inspection; instead he delivered to the customer the news of his offerings—in the advertising columns of the newspaper. At once he became an intimate and welcome visitor, finding himself on the INSIDE of countless homes and offices, telling about selections that he himself deemed the most attractive.

"Perhaps few people have stopped to think how completely the newspaper has become the market place of the community, bringing to all a knowledge of available goods and services. In fair and stormy weather this market place comes to the buyer in the form of news—news of what to buy and why, where to buy and

when, and how much to pay.

There is another important aspect of the newspaper as the market place of the community which is often overlooked; that it, the saving of time? Instead of trudging from store to store in search of clothing, shoes or any of the numerous other articles of modern commerce, the consumer turns instinctively to the advertising columns of the newspaper for information to guide him by the most direct route to the desired product. Thus wasted time is eliminated. It is not possible to estimate accurately how much of the time of American buyers is saved by consulting the advertising columns of newspapers, but there are 24,000,000 homes in the United States and each home represents at least one buyer. For each of these millions, the buying guide is the local newspaper. If the advertising columns of the papers save even a little time of these "shoppers," the total volume and value of such saving amounts to enormous figures.

"But that is not all. As the market place of the community the newspaper not only saves the time of the buying public, but, paradoxical as it may seem it makes it possible for the merchant to lower the selling price of his goods and at the same time increase his own profits. As was demonstrated during the newspaper strike in New York, when the newspaper market place fails, the volume of buying rapidly decreases. But the merchant's expenses for overhead, such as rent, interest, salaries and other fixed charges continues whether the volume of sales is large or small. In the latter event what is known as the "turn-over" is slowed up, which means that the merchant's stock of goods is sold more slowly. The inevitable result is either loss of profits to the merchant or increased prices for the customer.

"Who, then, pays for the advertising? In a sense, nobody, for advertising pays for itself. It should not be measured in terms of costs, but in terms of time saved and of new wealth created through increased production. In this its magic consists."

Wet or Dry is the Issue In Illinois Voting

Springfield, Ill., June 10.—(INS)—Wet or dry? This question is expected to be uppermost in the minds of Illinois voters when they march to the polls next November to cast their ballots for United States Senator.

Carrying a dripping-wet banner, George E. Brennan heads the Democrats, carrying a wet flat form.

Col. Frank L. Smith, Dwight, Ill., who defeated U. S. Senator William B. McKinley for the Republican nomination at the primaries, heads his party. Smith based his primary fight on the World Court, voicing bitter position to it and carrying Illinois by a substantial majority.

What the vote will show in Illinois is "problematical." For Brennan and his men look for little support in the down-state and hope that the larger cities, with Chicago at their head, will register their opposition to prohibition by giving him a substantial lead over his opponent.

Colonel Smith plans to carry his fight to the people, as he did in the primary, visiting every county tell his views.

Mexico to Open Big Irrigation Projects Soon

Navojia, Sonora, Mexico June 10.—(INS)—Gen. Alvaro Obregon's dream of years that his home valley would one day be thoroughly irrigated and its fertile acres reclaimed for agriculture, will begin to become a reality in October, when construction is to start on the great dam in the Mayo River at Los Mochales.

Information to the effect that a San Francisco contracting corporation will build the dam and irrigation canals was given by Louis J. Leon, Secretary of Agriculture in the Calles cabinet, who spent several days here with former President Obregon when he returned here from Mexico City.

The cost of the Mochales dam and canals system will be 20,000,000 pesos, Sr. Leon said. Louis C. Hill, reclamation engineer, of Los Angeles, formerly in charge of operations at the building of the Elephant Butte and Roosevelt dams, will probably direct the construction of the Mayo project.

500,000 Acres Irrigated

Sr. Leon said that the acreage to be brought under irrigation below the dam in the Mayo valley will be five times greater than the present watered area, which is 100,000 acres. Two canal an several large lateral will be opened.

At its base the Mochales dam will be 750 feet thick. It will be 180 feet high and 3,000 feet in length. Five years will be required for the construction.

In addition to watering thousands of acres of land devoted to chick peas (garbanzos), the big crop of the Mayo Valley, exported to Spain and Cuba, the reservoir will provide water for tomatoes and melon



planters on a scale greater than in the Simola valley, now exporting to United States markets some 3,000 carloads annually.

Secretary Leon said that as soon as arrangements are completed for the beginning of work on the Mayo project, the Mexican government will take hold of irrigation proposals near Guaymas and Hermosillo in Sonora. The newly-formed federal farm loan bank will assist in financing these projects, Secretary Leon said in conjunction with the national irrigation commission.

Max Kaufman has been accused of the assassination of several Swiss domestics after taking away their savings by promise of marriage. He kept many souvenirs of his victims, bits of jewelry lace from their clothes, or a slipper-buckle of greater interest perhaps is a blue note-book in which he noted down the initials of his sweethearts the dates of their meetings and other signs which have not yet been interpreted. He has admitted that he spent several years in the French capital and lived only two doors away from the mystery-man who made twelve women and their savings completely disappear.

Belgium gets the Brown T-shirt as its longest title ever written. It belongs to the work of the Belgian writer, Charles de Grave, published in 1800. More than 150 words make up this title, which is a veritable resume of the entire book, which deals with the Champs Elysees of the Ancient world and finishes up by proving that the poets Homer and Hesiod were of Belgian origin.

Short titles are to be found among the literature of several bards. "K" was followed by "E" by Julius Hunckley and "Q" by Catalina Newell Burt. In 1901 an anonymous author entitled a large novel "K" and John Drinkwater published one under "K-O" "47 equals 28" is by the French author, Pierre Wolff, and another French writer used a simple pue-

tion mark for his work. Jorge Anquetil published one of his best without any title whatsoever.

Austria to Open Sport Center, Rival to Monte Carlo

Vinenna, June 10.—(INS)—Monte Carlo is to have a rival in Central Europe in Semmering, the nearby favorite resort of the Viennese. Plans for building a gambling and sport center that will surpass in magnificence, if not in popularity, the Mediterranean principality, have been placed before the Austrian government by a group of German financiers. The government has tentatively approved the plans and is expected to issue a permit shortly.

The German capitalists will at once invest ten million gold marks which will build a Casino and a hotel now and within three years new roads, bathing facilities, a golf course, tennis grounds and an open air theatre will be constructed where the now small summer resort is situated up in the mountains.

The site is one of the most beautiful in picturesque Austria and has always been a favorite health resort. It is only a few hours from Vienna.

The interest of the state in the project is centered about the offer of the capitalists to give 50 per cent of the receipts to the government and to employ only Austrians in the construction and operation of the new Monte Carlo.

TURKISH WOMEN OBJECT TO FEMALE JUDICIARY

Constantinople, June 10.—(INS)—The jump from Mohammed to the judicial bench is too much for Turkish women to accomplish even in this century. A new former Society Against the

Aggression of Women declares in opposing the appointment of women judges. The society wants the Turkish women to go back to the veil and other customs which they have abandoned under the new nationalism, and which, it is claimed, was never intended for them by the Prophet.

The appointment of three women to minor judiciary positions will lead to places on the bench aroused this section of male population, who find it particularly galling to have to appear before a woman to answer charges against the law.

Boulder Canyon Power Project Is Only Delayed

Washington, June 10.—INS—Democratic control of congress, which is conceded to be one of the possibilities of the November election, will not sound the knell of the giant Boulder Canyon water and power project, it was declared today.

Although Democrats on the House Irrigation and Reclamation Committee voted solidly to table the Swing bill until the next session, effectively blocking all possibilities for action in the present Congress, a variety of factions, many of them not antagonistic to the Colorado River project motivated committee members in supporting the motion to delay action.

Want Definite Policy Failure of the Administration to lay down a definite policy on Federal power projects was declared by many Democrats to have been back of their vote for further delay on Boulder Dam.

The Administration has no policy for the disposition of hydro-electric power, said Representative Whittington. (D) Miss, a member of the agricultural Committee. "I voted to table the Swing bill because of the fact. I am opposed to spending \$125,000,000

of Federal funds for the development of another Muscle Shoals when the Government's \$150,000,000 expenditure on the Tennessee River is still the subject of an uncertain policy.

Whittington declared he was entirely open-minded on the Colorado project. "While we have no Federal power policy," he said, "I am in favor of temporarily ignoring that phase of the Colorado River project and rushing through legislation for the protection of the Imperial Valley from the flood menace and providing steady water supplies for Northwestern farmers generally."

BEANTOWN CUPIL LAZY; SEE FEW JUNE WEDDINGS

Boston, June 10.—INS—Little cupid is slipping badly in Boston. Only sixty-four couples filed intentions at City Hall on the first day of June. A year ago on June 1 would be brides and grooms filed seventy-seven intentions and the June 1 before that eighty-eight intentions.

The total number of intentions filed this year is about forty less than for the corresponding period of 1925.

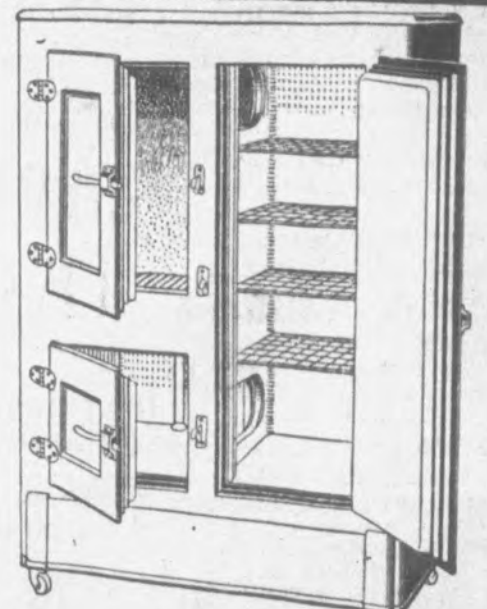
