FRENCH CABINET HAS COLLAPSED; MINISTER OF FINANCE RESIGNS

Premier Briand's Refusal to Enlarge the Ministry and Make It National Union Cabinet Also Given As Cause of Dissatisfaction

Paris, June 15.—(AP)—Aristide Briand's ninth cabinet has ended. The Ministry's resignation was placed in the hands of President Doumergue at seven o'clock this evening.

A communique was issued stating that the cabinet was unanimous in its decision. The Ministers, after examining the situation brought about by the resignation of Finance Minister Peret this morning, decided it was best to give President Doumergue full liberty of action.

Paris, June 15.—(AP)—Finance Minister Peret, resigned today.

The reasons for M. Peret's resignation is considered in authoritative circles to be two-fold.

Firstly, the violent opposition against a project attributed to Peret which is regarded as disguised inflation. The project would recommend that all short term bonds and the existing circulation be declared to form a whole—meaning that holders of the short term bonds asking reimbursement would be paid in fresh issues of paper money.

Secondly, Premier Briand's refusal to enlarge the Ministry and make it a "National Union Cabinet" representing all parties, along the lines of the War Cabinet.

The Cabinet will meet again this evening to consider the situation. Unless M. Briand is able within 48 hours to find a Minister who can bring to the support of the Government some of the moderate elements in the Chamber that supported Peret, the whole cabinet is expected to resign.

The Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 309 to 195 today acceded to Premier Briand's request for postponement of debate on the interpellations regarding the financial situation and finance minister Peret's resignation until Thursday.

Press Shrine Planned in Saint John's Cathedral

New York, June 15.—(AP)—A National shrine will be dedicated to the Press in the new Cathedral of St. John the Divine, now under construction here.

Framed between two mighty pillars, the Press Bay, one of a series of fourteen chapels opening from the sides of the great nave, will be built by men and women of the profession as their contribution to the arts and professions of the world. The Bay will rise 115 feet from floor to vaulted roof. Two stained glass windows will light the interior and the chapel window will record some of the activities of the Press and its part in the progress of civilization.

The cost of erecting and equipping the chapel will be approximately \$200,000.

YOUTH KILLED IN AUTO WRECK AT SWANNANOA

Car Crashes Against Tree and Then Goes Over Steep Embankment

Asheville, June 15.—(AP)—Fred Branks, 16 year old Swannanoa youth, was killed almost instantly today when the automobile which he was driving between Swannanoa and Black Mountain, left the road, crashed against a tree, and went over a steep embankment.

The young man had his chest crushed and was otherwise badly mangled, and died a few minutes after being pulled from beneath the wreckage. The accident is believed to have been caused by defective steering apparatus.

Soviet Circles See New Plans in British Note

Moscow, June 15.—(AP)—High Soviet circles see a new and far reaching plan for an anti-Soviet campaign behind the British note protesting against the special permit given by the Finance Commissariat for remission of funds to aid the British strikers. A resolution recently introduced by the London Chamber of Commerce, noted either that Russia immediately recognize her debt to England or that the Anglo-Russian Treaty be abrogated is cited as part of the alleged campaign as well as an editorial offensive, which has been going on in the British conservative press on the subject of Soviet Oil.

Great Religious Parade. Retire Early. Danger in Cowardice.

In Paris on Saturday the French Minister of Fine Arts and many distinguished private individuals and public officials attended the unveiling of a statue to Sarah Bernhardt in the Place Malesherbes.

The great actress is shown in the role of Pheobe, as she appeared, long ago, at the Theatre Francaise.

The French honor themselves in erecting this statue to a really great genius among women. And they honor the Jewish race, which produced Bernhardt.

When will men honor the greatest of women, those that create the men that do the world's work? Do you know of any statue to Nancy Hanks? Lincoln is to her what Saint Peter is to Rome is to Michelangelo.

New York witnesses a religious ceremonial yesterday, such as had not been seen, outside of Italy or Spain, for a century.

A great procession of Catholic dignitaries proceeded up Fifth Avenue to St. Patrick's Cathedral, where Cardinal Bonzano, sent by the Pope to Chicago's Eucharistic Congress, was solemnly welcomed.

There were nine cardinals leading the procession of churchmen, eight of them from foreign countries. Ten archbishops, thirty bishops, dozens of monsignori, priests and lesser lights of the Roman Catholic Church were included in the march to the cathedral, made solemn and impressive by incense abundantly used along the route.

The procession encircled Saint Patrick's Cathedral, then entered the building, where a throne had been erected for the Pope's special envoy. A similar throne awaited Cardinal Bonzano in Chicago.

Other organizations, religious and others, rise and fall. Many have appeared and disappeared during the long centuries of Christianity. But the Roman Catholic Church goes on its way stronger today in this new country than in any country of Europe. There is no more ably managed organization.

Sir Oliver Lodge, a great scientist, says men should retire early—from hard work—and live longer. He retired at about seventy, and calls that "early." It is early for men that have lived sanely.

The aged scientist has actually not retired at all. He works daily in his laboratory and continues his study of the mysterious "imponderable ether," absolutely necessary to science as we understand it, necessary to the working of gravitation, yet never proved to be more than a working hypothesis.

Lodge is criticized by the thoughtless for his excursions into the realm of spiritualism. But that often happens to men as they get old, and one that has contrived great things to real science has a right to play with foolish ideas for a rest.

Darwin read fairy stories in the evening, and even the great Newton wrote such stuff concerning the Apocalypse as makes you feel sorry for him.

Kepler pretended to tell the emperor's fortune by the stars, and Tycho Brahe listened devoutly to the mouthings of a poor idiot that lay at his feet, at table, taking scraps of food from his hand. "Kein berg ohne thal," says the German proverb. "No mountain without a valley." No great intellect without its shallow spots.

The bootle-after-the-war crime wave teaches that cowardice is more dangerous than courage in a bandit.

On two occasions recent typhoid bandits, their nerve failing at the critical moment, have shot wildly, killing several aimlessly, and leaving without the money they hoped to get.

Road criminals, well armed, of the old train robber type, went about their business coldly and rarely committed murder.

The modern nervous, undersized criminal, fed on bootleg whiskey and drugs, does his work in terror and kills in fear, like a biting rat.

DECLARES INFIDELITY TO DUTY AND CORRUPTION ARE DESTROYING FAITH

CAPTAIN GAIR WILL INSTRUCT LOCAL BATTERY

Army Officer Gives Series of Schools Before Encampment of Organization

Captain A. V. Gair, of the United States Army, reached this city today. He comes here for the purpose of conducting a series of schools for officers and non-commissioned officers of Battery E, 117 Field Artillery, North Carolina National Guards. The organization will leave Greenville Monday, August 2, for a fifteen-day training period at Fort Bragg.

Battery E is composed of 67 enlisted men and four officers. The total membership is expected to reach 75 before encampment. The officers are: Lester Jones, Captain, Commanding Battery; H. L. Macklin, 1st Lieut.; Arthur Corey, 2nd Lieut.; H. D. Laughinghouse, 2nd Lieut.

The unit has four 155 mm. Howitzers, French type, which are drawn by caterpillar tractors. This will be seen on the streets of Greenville for the first time within the next week. Members of the organization will receive uniforms during the week. They will make their public appearance when these arrive.

Battery E made Greenville headquarters March 31st, and was federally recognized April 27th. Since that time the men have been drilling from one to two nights weekly. They are in splendid condition for encampment, and will more than likely make a fine showing.

Colonel Mebane Dies N. Y. City

Danville, Va., June 15.—(AP)—Colonel B. F. Mebane, wealthy capitalist of Smyth, N. C., and founder of the "extile" community bearing his name, died today in New York after an illness of several days, the Bee learned this afternoon.

He left here recently intending to sail for Europe tomorrow to join his wife now touring there. Mrs. Mebane was reached by cable and will return today. The body will arrive at Spray tomorrow morning and interment will be at Mebane Thursday.

FINAL ACTION IN COLE CASE OCCURS TODAY

Judge Barnhill Intimated That He Would Consider the Case This Afternoon

Raleigh, June 15.—(AP)—Final action in the \$150,000 damage suit brought by the Rev. A. L. Ormond against W. B. Cole, alleging the wrongful killing of Ormond's son, W. W. Ormond, was scheduled to take place in Wake county Superior Court this afternoon at two-thirty o'clock.

Judge Barnhill presiding, indicated that he would at that time consider the case and it was intimated that the entire action would be thrown out on the basis of an agreement made yesterday. The terms of the agreement, it was intimated, stated in court circles, were that all papers in the case be destroyed, including the actual court records of the proceedings and that Cole pay to the Reverend Mr. Ormond the sum of \$15,000.

Senator Robison, Democratic Leader in the Senate, Speaks Before Ninth Congressional District Democratic Convention

Bristol, Va., June 15.—(AP)—Infidelity to duty and corruption are the two factors which are destroying public confidence in the agencies of Governmental administrations, Senator Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, Democratic Senate leader, declared in an address before the ninth Congressional District Democratic convention here today.

"The Democratic party in this campaign," Senator Robinson said, "has an issue of fundamental and far reaching importance. If properly presented it will result in restoring the democrats to the control of both branches of Congress. The foremost question to be answered by the electors next November is shall the National Government be dominated by rapacious big business?"

"The outstanding political policy of the Harding and Coolidge administrations have demonstrated a moral breakdown in the administration of public affairs. The correction and reversal of the present conditions becomes less important when the high personal character of the late lamented President Harding and his successor are admitted."

"If the electors are fully and accurately informed they will not choose as their representatives in Congress the nominees of the party that has systematically subordinated the public interest both in the enactment and enforcement of the laws to the aims of big business."

Senator Robinson pointed out to the Senate tariff law as "a glaring instance of unjust and unnecessary taxation" and declared that it "works gross injustice to the American farmer" for whose troubles he said "the logical and natural remedy was to reduce the tariff."

Bishop Asks Reservations To Be Abolished

Souix Falls, S. D., June 15.—(AP)—The white man known simply as "bishop" to the Sioux Indian, believes that the sooner the reservation is abolished and the red and white races are amalgamated, the better it will be for the Indian.

The Rt. Rev. Hugh Latimer Burleson, missionary bishop of South Dakota, of the Episcopal church, speaks from a background of thirty years' residence and work among the Indians.

"I do not mean amalgamation through inter-marriage, but the absorption of the Indian population in the cities, towns and country of the white man's world," the bishop explained.

In predicting that thirty years would bring the absorption of the Indian by civilization, Bishop Burleson said he spoke only for the Sioux Indians. Different conditions, he said, may exist among the Indians of other states.

Few Few Indians today, according to native customs, he added. Bishop Burleson does not believe that they should have a college education for they do not need it.

"Vocational schools serve the purpose well," said the missionary, explaining that most of the Indians turn to farming or stock raising.

Concerning recent criticism of the governmental conduct of Indian affairs, Bishop Burleson asserted that "if the government would take a little more counsel from people who know the Indians and less from politicians, we would come out better."

NORTH CAROLINA FARMERS NOT BY THEMSELVES

Late and Dry Season the Country Over With Exception of Pacific Coast

Raleigh, June 15.—(AP)—North Carolina farmers need not feel that they are the only ones handicapped by a late and dry spring, declares Frank Parker, crop statistician of the State Federal crop reporting service, in his June 1 crop report made public here by him.

"This seems to be a dominant factor from the farmers' standpoint over the country at large, says Mr. Parker. The season is late and dry except on the Pacific Coast. The work of planting crops has been expensive and annoying.

"The dry weather extends through the wheat belt up into the northwest, while the southwest is too wet. Pastures were the poorest in May for many years. Corn was late in getting planted and in coming up. Fair stands are now general. Cotton, however, is looking decidedly spotted. At late spring, however, does not necessarily mean

an unproductive season. "The present winter wheat crop of 549,000 bushels is \$150,000, 000 bushels more than last year, yet the stocks from previous crops are low. The hog market last month reached the highest point in six years. The May price advance was the greatest for the past 25 years, exclusive of certain war-time fluctuations. Pork in storage is quite low as compared with last year. Pork shows a very sure position at the present time and will probably continue so during the next five or six months. The hog-corn ratio is almost the highest on record.

"Now is the time for the farmer to bear in mind the violent decline in prices that usually follows the over-expansion of hog production under similar price relationships. As a usual thing, the time to breed hogs is when the price is down and to hold off when the price is up, as this catches the high price in the cycle of production.

"Now is the particular time for stocks and storage to be studied, as they are significant at this time of the year in relation to this year's production. Cotton stocks are the heaviest since 1921. Stocks of butter in cold storage are four times what they were a year ago. There are a million less cases of eggs than a year ago."

Barges of Fresh Tulips Float to the Sea and Sink

Haarlem, Holland, June 15.—(AP) Great barges piled high with fresh tulips, mauve, yellow

white, red and some black ones, pass through the canal these days going seaward to sing their cargoes. Enough blossoms to decorate a million homes are thus destroyed every day.

Try to buy a bunch of tulips picked from a scarlet heap on the bank four or five feet high and fifty feet long. You will be refused. "Take two or three for your lady," the gardener will say, kindly refusing to take your pocketbook in exchange. It is a thing not done. The guild does not permit it.

The agreement among the tulip growers observed with the utmost rigor is to sell bulbs only. Florists who buy the bulbs whether in Holland, England, Japan, or America may see the tulips but not the bulb raisers, of Haarlem. Their fortunes come from the bulbs. They sold \$10,000,000 worth to the United States last year, and as much more to the rest of the world.

The choice tulip lands comprise about 3000 acres. Each bulb grows three flowers and at the right hour the flowers are cut. The producer keeps one for the next season and exports two. One wonders why the flowers and their stems are not left in the field as fertilizer, but it appears that they rather injure the soil than improve it. Besides, other plants and vegetables are grown between the tulip rows.

HONOR TO THE FLAG

Yesterday was Flag Day. The American flag was dancing gaily in the breeze in the front of our office. It was the only flag in evidence along Main street. A loyal-hearted citizen came along, stood at attention a moment and saluted.

We became interested in knowing why he had stopped. We inquired of him the reason for the ceremony. Here's what he said:

"I am always profoundly impressed by the flag of our country. Not because it represents the greatest and mightiest nation on earth; not because it is the emblem of a great people, but because it is an outward expression of a great ideal—the realization of a great dream. Our flag is an expression of truth, freedom and liberty. It offers peace and personal freedom to anyone willing to obey the constitution it represents, the laws it so faithfully upholds, and the promise of peace it holds out to all the world."

We had always liked the speaker; we liked him all the more. He expressed in a few words a depth of feeling which should dominate every American heart. He realized the debt he owed the flag. He recognized the honor it is due from all its citizens, and he was not too busy or too preoccupied to stop for a moment and give public expression of his emotion.

The realization of an ideal, the striving after perfection, is one of the finest attributes of the human heart. It comprehends all the highest emotions. It differentiates man from animal; the Bible from evolution, and inspires mortal man to rise to higher and nobler grounds. The lives of all illustrious Americans are interesting studies of human nature. All of them had their ideals. And all of those ideals were in keeping with the sacred memories of romances of the American flag—a romance of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, as enunciated by that truthful, noble soul, our faithful and sainted Lincoln.

PRINCIPLES ARE ETERNAL

Costa Rica withdrew from the League of Nations some time ago. Brazil has now done the same. It is intimated that consternation has been created by action of the latter country. We have not yet been able to determine why the powers involved should permit themselves to become so wrought

up. It cannot possibly be any concern of theirs. They knew long ago that the smaller powers would expect the same privileges and honors enjoyed by other powers. They were bound to realize differences of opinion, occasioned by difference of nationality, temperament and sentiment, and that these idiosyncrasies eventually would result in disruption.

The American government has done well to remain merely an observer of the League's activities. It has done well to play hands off. Its statesmen have done well to remain calm and undisturbed in the face of scathing denunciation. They have shown the world that the policy enunciated by George Washington is as applicable today as it was in the days of her infancy.

If the world is to continue to develop as it has done in the past, it is necessary for each nation to avoid foreign alliances. We do not mean that the intercourse between the nations should not continue along amicable lines. We simply mean to infer that it is the inalienable right of every nation to conduct its own affairs without the interference or advice of any other nation.

League and World Court supporters mean well. Every great enterprise or movement has had behind it a certain number of earnest, well-meaning men and women. But this does not mean they are always right. Men and women live today; tomorrow they are gone. Principles are eternal. They exist forever. And it is the duty of every nation, as well as every individual, to search for the truth in every great movement. It is in this way that we are able to preserve the good and true. It is in this way that this nation of ours has become such a mighty force in world affairs.

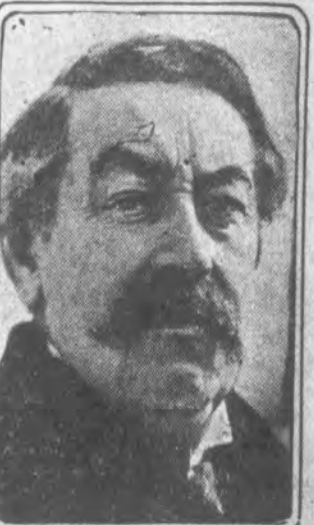

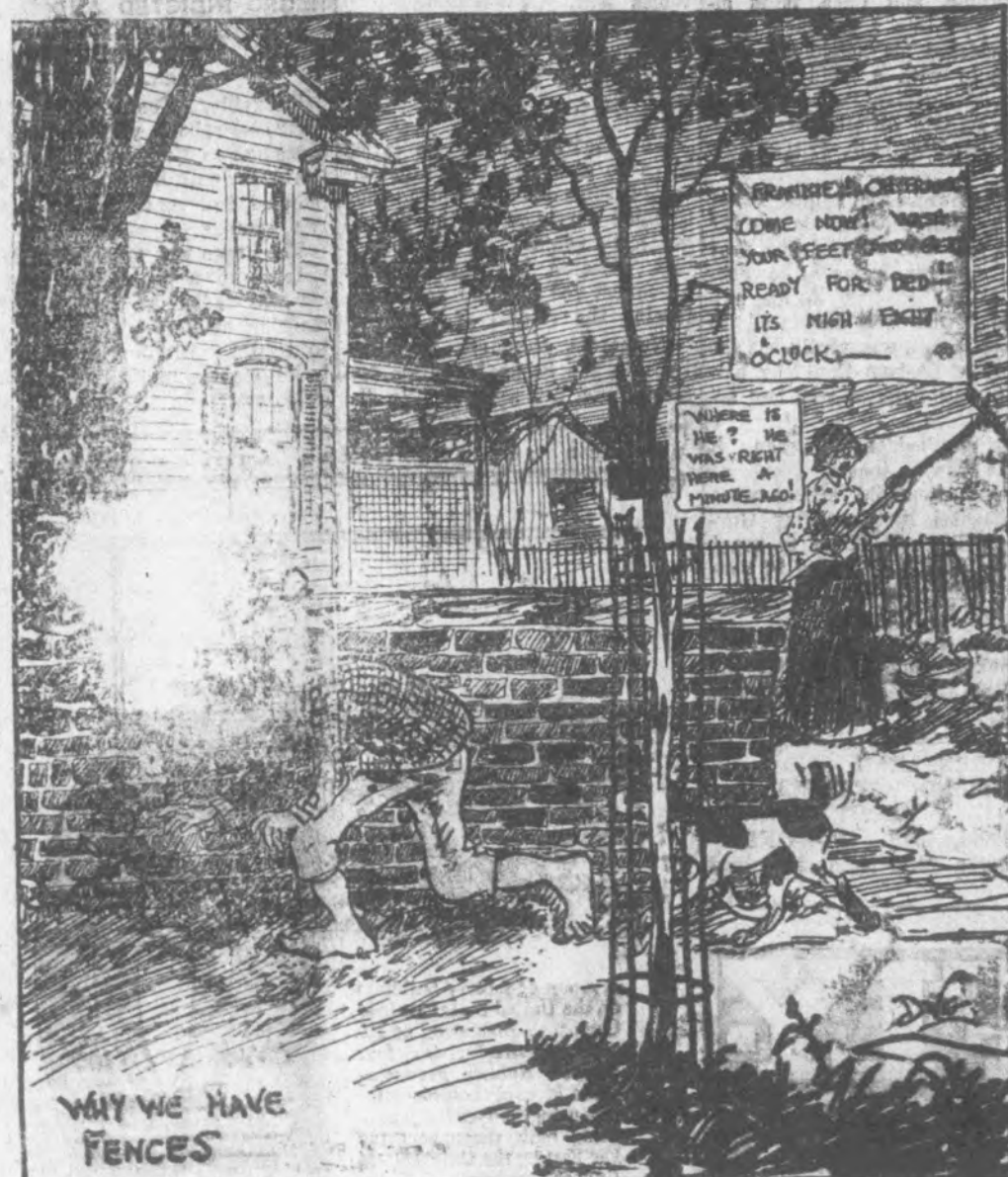

'AS OTHERS SEE US'

(By Margaret Story)
"As Others See Us" is the title of the talk which Margaret Story gives at Chautauqua. Mrs. Story is the author of "How to Dress Well," "Intelligent Dressing," etc. It is a study of the fundamentals of good taste in dress, or rather, a fine sense of the fitness of things. It is a lecture-demonstration which is prepared especially for women.

This lecture is illustrated by living models which help to visualize the principles emphasized. The lecture is not propaganda for a dress reform movement, but rather gives constructive principles of art that are applicable at all times and to all people.

Frankfort, Ky., June 15.—(AP)—Mrs. Emma Guy Cromwell, Kentucky's woman secretary of state, has compiled "proof" that women are progressing in every field of action, not only in America but in foreign countries.

She finds more than 100 women in the national parliaments of the world.

Eight women in the British Parliament. Russia appointed a woman ambassador to Norway; Bulgaria sent a woman as its representative to this country.

Eighty women serving in the lower houses of state legislatures; eight women state senators. Three women in Congress. A woman assistant attorney general and a woman collector of internal revenue.

Ohio elected the first woman non-supreme Bench of a State, Judge Jean H. Morris of New York was the first woman to preside over a criminal court.

The field of education has seven women superintendents of public instruction, many women school boards, regents of universities and county superintendents of schools.

Three women rulers, Netherlands, Luxembourg and Yugoslavia.

Two American women governors.

Many secretaries of state in Kentucky, New Mexico and New York.

Mrs. Cromwell, who has national ranking as a parliamentarian, is secretary of the national association of secretaries of state. She believes women's club life has progressed incalculably since its beginning 600 years B. C., when Sappho, the Greek flapper, not to be outdone by the great philosophers, organized a club in literature; since the time when Athens followed Greece with a club in Alexandria which became so popular that the men begged entrance and were finally admitted, and since Anna Hutchinson, in 1824, organized her American club to discuss sermons.

Bullet Ridden Horse Is Only Custer Survivor

Denver, June 15.—Few military engagements in the history of the United States ever brought forward so many claimants to being the "sole survivor" as the Battle of the Little Big Horn, June 25, 1876, the semi-centennial of which will be observed this month at Custer Battlefield.

While the disaster that befell the five companies of the Seventh Cavalry was in no sense a massacre—every trooper fighting to the last ditch—it was an annihilation from which not one man escaped to tell the story of the battle.

Yet there was a "sole survivor." It was "Comanche," the claybank gelding mount of Capt. Miles W. Keogh.

When he was five years old, the government purchased Comanche and assigned him to Company I of the Seventh Cavalry, then stationed at Ellis, Kansas. Capt. Keogh, acting inspector general on Gen. Sully's staff when an expedition was organized against southern Indians at Fort Dodge in 1868, chose

Amite, La., June 15.—(INS)—A battered hat smeared with

pieces of the victim's skull will be exhibited as evidence against Tony Caco, a farmer living near Independence, when he faces trial for the slaying of Baspana Lacinsa, his neighbor.

An old enmity over a fence line dispute is blamed for the killing. Lacinsa, it is said, attempted to pull up posts that Caco had just put down. A quarrel ensued, and Caco, it is alleged, flew into a maniacal rage and battered his neighbor's head into pulp with a hand hammer.

GIRL SLAPS MINISTER DRAWS JAIL SENTENCE

Whitesburg, Ky., June 15.—(INS)—Miss Martha Bates, the young girl who slapped the face of a minister because he condemned bobby hair in his pulpit, and who was sentenced to 40 days in jail, apparently has the support of Eastern Kentucky barbers in her fight to win her acquittal.

This was evidenced when it became known that a group of Kentucky tonsorial artists were instrumental in persuading Governor William J. Fields to grant Miss Bates a 90-day stay of sentence. She is now at liberty under bond.

Barbers in a number of towns are making donations to buy the Thornton Creek girl a new automobile.

CHILDREN LEAD BLIND VETERANS ABOUT ATLANTA

Atlanta, June 15.—(INS)—"And a little child shall lead

them." This Scriptural prediction will come true literally here Tuesday when 36 little girls of Atlanta, dressed in white, lead 36 totally blind veterans of the World War through Atlanta's streets in a parade which will be one of the big features of the sixth annual national convention of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

All blind veterans in the detachment will come from the same chapter in a city in New York state.

The Georgia capital is laying plans to make the week's gathering of some 5,000 wounded, and disabled survivors of the world's greatest conflict a memorable one. Atlanta has responded to a request for \$35,000 for entertaining the vets.

Numerous banquets, barbecues, trips to the Stone Mountain Memorial site, are scheduled on the

week's card of activity.

Special trains will be run from every important railroad center in the nation to bring delegates, aternate, and visitors to the convention. Among the distinguished visitors who have definitely promised to attend is Gen. John R. McQuigg, commander of the American Legion.

NEGRO INDICTED AND SENTENCED WITHIN A TWO-HOUR PERIOD

Knoxville, Tenn., June 15.—(INS)—Probably establishing a precedent in Knoxville for speedy trials, Darnall Dobbs, negro, was indicted and sentenced all within two hours.

The negro was arrested in Morristown on a prohibition charge. He was indicted the following morning at 9:15 o'clock, ordered to trial at 10:30 and sentenced to 11 months and 29 days at 11 o'clock.

Who Is Wyatt C. Tucker

For the past seven years, Mr. Tucker has been active as one of Pitt County's farmers, on the Alfred Moore place, which is a mile and a half from Farmville, on the Greenville road.
