ROTARIANS BEGIN ANNUAL MEETING AT DENVER, COL.

Score of Resolutions Presented at Opening Session This Morning

Denver, June 16.—(AP)—With nearly a score of resolutions already presented, the seventeenth annual convention of the Rotary International today considered important matters of policy.

Although politics is taboo in Rotary circles there was a mild undercurrent of discussion this morning concerning the next president of the organization.

Arthur H. Sapp, of Huntington, Ind., Harry H. Rogers, of San Antonio, Tex., and Tom J. Davis, of Butte, Montana, are among those prominently mentioned here. With the 1927 convention to be held in Belgium there was also discussion of proposing a European man for the presidency. The election of the officers will take place Thursday.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS STIRRED BY ACTION OF UNITED STATES

American Ambassador Congratulates Brazil's Attitude and Is Criticized

Geneva, June 16.—(AP)—League of Nations circles were stirred today by a dispatch from Rio de Janeiro saying the American Ambassador had congratulated President Bernardes upon Brazil's attitude toward the League of Nations.

The dispatch has revived and given strength to reports here that the United States Government has been influencing Brazil to adopt a strong policy for attainment of a permanent seat in the League council. These reports were circulating in Geneva during the March session of the League assembly when Brazil threatened to veto the election of Germany.

Crop Conditions Considered Good

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—The Department of Agriculture in its review of conditions in southern states for the week ended yesterday said moderately warm and mostly fair weather prevailed and predicted fair conditions in cotton in practically all portions except northern Georgia and the Carolinas, where the weather is too dry. Potato planting is practically completed and the conditions of the crops is mostly fair to good. Tobacco needs rain badly in the Carolinas. For North Carolina the report said there was some improvement in the cotton and better stands where rain occurred, but general condition poor. The crop is very late and irregular. Tobacco, peanuts, corn, peanuts, sweet potatoes benefited where rains occurred but they are needing rain badly.

INDICT MRS. MORTON FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Greensboro, June 15.—The Guilford Superior court grand jury today returned a true bill in the case of Mrs. Frank Morton, prominent here, charging manslaughter in connection with the death of William Hattaway, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Hattaway who was fatally injured on May 9 when struck by an automobile in which Mrs. Morton was coasting down hill backward. The grand jury also returned a true bill against Robert Jester, High Point man, charged with shooting Nathan Lankford, another High Point man, on April 9, in a quarrel over their children.

NEGRO DRAWS SIX MONTHS ON COUNTY ROADS

Three Other Cases Given Hearing In Yesterday's Session of County Court

The regular weekly session of the Pitt county court, Judge W. A. Darden, presiding, was held yesterday. The following cases were disposed of:

Kelly Tankard, colored, charged with escaping from the county convict camp, was sentenced to six months on the roads. This sentence will become effective as soon as the sentence he was serving at the time of escape, is completed.

J. H. Boyd, white, charged with aiding and abetting in the manufacture of whiskey, was found not guilty.

Judgment was continued in the case of Mark Patrick, colored, charged with assault with deadly weapon.

G. R. Baker, charged with giving worthless checks, was fined \$50 and costs. Attorneys filed notice of appeal to Superior court.

A Costly Defeat.

It appears that the defeat of Senator Pepper in the Pennsylvania primaries cost him and his friends at least \$1,300,000, about five times the amount spent on the election of Senator Newberry that caused so much excitement.

One million three hundred thousand dollars is a good deal to spend for defeat. How much would it have cost to carry Pennsylvania, now that wages are high and two-dollar bills only small change?

The money-spending scandal in the Pennsylvania election calls forth this: "let us return to the old convention, managed by bosses that select and name party candidates, amid wild enthusiasm."

That would be cheap certainly, the boss would take a fixed sum, deliver the goods and save money for millionaires, quarreling as to who shall own the senator or governor.

Senator Borah, who possesses the rare faculty of taking important things, including himself, seriously, will start a speech making tour from coast to coast, "the beginning of a two-year drive for the presidency."

Presidential candidates are coming out of the political fog, vice-president Dawes and Governor Lowden, both of Illinois, expect the support of the farmers, both have tried to do so.

Wise politicians believe, assuming that prosperity continues, that the 1928 campaign will be a struggle "between Al and Cal."

At Smith leading the Democrats, under a wet banner, Calvin Coolidge leading the dry Republicans.

The most rapidly growing of New York's five boroughs celebrated Bronx Day yesterday, and the New York Evening Journal opened a Bronx newspaper plant, at 149th Street and Mot Avenue installing a half million dollars worth of presses.

THREE MURDERERS TO PAY PENALTY IN MISSISSIPPI

Will Be Jerked Into Oblivion July 16 Unless Hand of Fate Intervenes

Jackson, Miss., June 16.—(INS)—Unless the hand of Fate intervenes, three convicted Mississippi murderers will be jerked into oblivion at three different parts of the State on Friday, July 16.

The three men who will pay the death penalty are Jeff Wallace, Marion county, convicted of flogging his wife to death in a "fit of insanity;" Jack Elmore, Sharkey county, convicted of slaying his father-in-law with an axe while he was asleep; and Pink Rufus, convicted of the murder of Henry Reed.

All three of the doomed men saw what was apparently their last hope fade away when the Mississippi Supreme Court denied the trio a new trial; and set the day for their executions, which are to take place in Tunica, Sharkey and Marion counties.

CAROLINA CITIES SPEND BIG SUMS FOR RECREATION

Movement Making Great Headway and Cities Spend Around \$383,313.26

Raleigh, June 16.—(AP)—The recreation movement is making rapid headway in North Carolina. This is shown by figures compiled and published recently in the Year Book of the Playground and Recreation Association of America.

North Carolina cities spent \$383,313.26 for public recreation last year, a gain of more than \$20,000 over their report for 1924. It is shown. The number of public play areas under leadership, reported at 68 in 1924, had grown to 119 in 1925. Ten years before, recreation provision in the state was in its infancy, only three cities reporting playgrounds, totalling nine in number, and involving an expenditure of \$3,600.

From a children's movement, public recreation in the state has expanded to include citizens of all ages. Among the facilities for adult recreation reported were 61 tennis courts, 16 quail courts, 34 community recreation centers, and in Asheville, a municipal golf course.

Community music has been organized by eight cities, community drama by nine. Last season, 16 amateur baseball leagues played the national game in eight cities.

Twenty recreation leaders were employed the year round in North Carolina last year. In five cities, classes for training in recreation leadership were conducted and had a total registration of 233 in four cities.

The 13 cities which sent reports of directed recreation to the Year Book were Asheville, Burlington, Charlotte, Durham, Erwin, Gas ton, Goldsboro, Greensboro, Hainlet, Lexington, Raleigh, Salisbury and Winston-Salem.

Prince Adolphus at Yale to Find Ericsson Tablet

New Haven, Conn., June 16.—(AP)—Crown Prince Augustus Adolphus of Sweden will find a bond of friendship between this city and his country of years standing when he arrives here to receive an honorary degree from Yale University.

The Crown Prince's visit recalls the early work of Captain John Ericsson, Swedish patriot who invented the historic Monitor of Civil War fame. New Haven recognized the inventor's achievements an tablettaetainu achievements several years ago with a monument and tablet extolling his contributions to America.

EDITOR GOES ON TRIAL IN ALBUQUERQUE

Twenty-One Witnesses Ready to Take Stand in Case of Carl Magee

East Las Vegas, N. M., June 16.—(AP)—With an interpreter translating every word of the testimony into Spanish for the benefit of ten members of the jury the trial of Carl C. Magee, Albuquerque editor, who is charged with the slaying of John B. Lassiter here last August, proceeded in District Court today.

Twenty-one witnesses were ready to take the stand for the prosecution. The jury was selected in slightly less than three hours. Two members of the jury speak and understand English, while the other ten must have every part of the proceedings translated by the official court interpreter.

Chief among the state witnesses will be former Judge David J. Leahy, political enemy of Magee, and at whom Magee fired the shot that struck Lassiter. Another shot fired by Magee struck Leahy in the arm. Leahy was the trial index in two other appearances of Magee in New Mexico court. Once Magee was found guilty of libel and the second time Judge Leahy found him guilty of contempt of court. In both instances Magee was pardoned by the Governor. Defense counsel asked of the juryman whether they would acquit the defendant if it could be shown that the shot that killed Lassiter was fired in self-defense and struck Lassiter by accident. All replied in the affirmative. Because of the necessity of having the proceedings in two languages, the trial of the case is expected to take at least a week.

Mackey Faces Examination Before Reed

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—Harry A. Mackey, of Philadelphia, who organized the successful campaign for Representative Vane, for the Republican Senatorial nomination in Pennsylvania and it proud of it, today, faced cross examination at the hands of Chairman Reed, of the Senate Investigating Committee.

Giving his direct testimony yesterday he told the committee which thus far has heard the campaign cost Representative Vane, Governor Pinchot, and the organization supporting their tickets nearly \$2,000,000, he said that "the debauchery of votes is unknown in Pennsylvania" and "there is no such thing as buying votes."

Further inquiry into the wet and dry phase of the campaign which has been touched upon only briefly thus far during the investigation is contemplated by the committee.

Instead of supporting Vane, the wet candidates, as charged by the anti-saloon league, "the liquor interests," Mackey said, were lined up behind Pepper because the bootleggers and brewers were "thriving under the Volstead Act."

High School Are Center Wins Wide Recognition

Springville, Utah, June 16.—(AP)—An art center with annual exhibits attracting as many as 70,000 persons, is the achievement of Springville High School, situated in a town of less than 4,000 persons. The school's gallery, now valued at approximately \$100,000 was founded about twenty years ago by John Hafen, painter, and Dr. George L. Smart but its development has been purely a student activity built up and financed by the students themselves.

Each year the students purchase the prize winning picture and at least one other from the canvases entered in the exhibit which they promote. In this manner the school's gallery has grown to two hundred pictures. It also included several pieces of statuary. At the last exhibit inquiries were received from Paris and London.

TWELVE HELD IN \$1,000,000 SWINDLE CASE

Postoffice Inspectors Unearth Big Merchandise Swindle in Many Parts State

Charlotte, June 16.—(INS)—Twelve persons have been arrested as a result of an investigation into an alleged \$1,000,000 merchandise swindle in North Carolina.

The twelfth arrest came when postoffice inspectors charged J. S. Samie, owner of two stores at New Bern, N. C., with using the mails to defraud.

After a probe dating back to February, postoffice inspectors said they uncovered evidence to prove that wholesalers and jobbers in the North and East have been swindled of a million dollars worth of merchandise by a ring that set up stores all over Eastern North Carolina, taking names so similar to reputable merchants that they succeeded in having all sorts of merchandise shipped to them on credit.

Shoe companies in Lynchburg, Va., and wholesale dry goods houses in Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York are said to have been victims of the ring of swindlers.

Plans are being made for the trials of the alleged swindlers at Wilson, Stantonsburg, Washington, New Bern, Wilmington and Fayetteville.

BRIAND SEEKS FORMATION OF UNION FORCES

French Premier Finding the Task More Difficult Than Anticipated

Paris, June 16.—(AP)—Premier Briand is seeking to form a "National Union" cabinet to replace the ministry which resigned yesterday, but he is finding the task more difficult than he anticipated.

The Premier was given the mandate by President Doumergue this morning after most of those called into consultation had urged the need of such a cabinet. The ministry would include groups as far to the right as Union Republicans or the old "Bloc National" headed by Louis Marin, and as far left as the groups whose leaders are willing to participate.

M. Herriot, the radical leader, is understood to have refused to enter a National Union Ministry and it is expected his party will formally decide against entering. The Socialists have excluded themselves also from such a combination.

Former Premier Poincare has indicated he prefers to remain out but is willing to waive his personal preferences to form a "Sacred Union" such as was maintained during the war. M. Berenger, Ambassador to the United States, approached with the suggestion that he might accept the finance ministry in the new government; replied, "I will not accept any post other than I hold now until the debt settlement with the United States is settled. I propose to concentrate all my efforts to that end."

Mellon's Opinion Brings Sharp Reply

Washington, June 16.—(AP)—Secretary Mellon's opinion on the equalization fee plan of farm relief now pending before the Senate in the McNary Bill, brought a sharp retort today from Representative Dickinson, Republican, of Iowa.

"At least the administration is out in the open," he said in a statement given to the Associated Press. "When the statement of Secretary Mellon is stripped of all specious pretexts it means that the interests for whom I speak are willing that the protective system shall mean anything for the American farmer."

The secretary's opinion that the proposition is economically unsound and unworkable would provide no permanent benefit to American farmers, would "subsidize American-foreign competition, and would increase the cost of farm products to American consumers, was written at the request of Representative Dickinson, Representative Anthony, Republican of Kansas, and Chairman Haugen, of the House Agriculture Committee."

Conservable importance has been attached to Mr. Mellon's declaration in the capital where the economic principle he proposes has been defeated in the House and is approaching a vote in the Senate.

New York, June 16.—(AP)—Fame and wealth as an artist is an alluring picture that attracts hundreds of young men and women to New York. But only a few achieve their ambitions.

Some fail because the pathway is filled with heavy obstacles. Others are lacking in talent. The small number that succeed know what it means to go through long and lean years.

Realizing the necessity of the bridging of the gap between the time the teacher pronounces a young artist ready for the public platform and the period when he becomes established and self-supporting, the National Music League was organized. It is headed by Mrs. Otto H. Kahn, and directed by Harold Vincent Milligan.

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A "CYCLONE" FOR GOD

"Cyclone" McLendon is coming to Greenville again. This news will be received with interest in all parts of the country. He made quite an impression during his evangelistic campaign here a few years ago, and people will throng the Memorial Baptist church Sunday morning and the court house lawn Sunday evening to hear him, even as they thronged his mammoth tent during his initial appearance here.

Mr. McLendon is one of the South's most aggressive supporters of the truth of the Bible as presented by the lowly Nazarene as he stood upon the shores of Galilee. He talks straight. He does not beat around the bush as many evangelists do. He knows what he wants to say, and says it fearlessly and without reservation. Tokio, June 16.—(INS)—Japan's national debt has doubled since 1918, according to statements of the Finance Department, and now totals 5,026,124,000 yen. The per capita debt of the country is now \$4.91 yen.

SWIFT FOOTED INDIANS WILL STAGE A SIX MILE MARATHON IN COLORADO

Colorado Springs, Colo., June 16.—(INS)—Fleet-footed Indians from the Hopi, Jemez, Taos and other tribes will participate in modified marathon races during the coming summer over a six-mile course on the Broadmoor-Cheyenne Mountain motorway, south of this city.

The first foot derby to be run by the Indians, who are capable of great speed and endurance, will be staged on June 20, when the new highway is formally opened to the public. The road was built at a cost of approximately \$500,000 and will form one of the scenic features for tourists.

Los Angeles, June 16.—(INS)—That interesting vegetable growth known as "cauliflower ears" is more prevalent among wrestlers than fighters. Lou Daro, former wrestler and now wrestling promoter at the big Olympic auditorium here, declared today.

"About 95 per cent of the professional wrestlers carry cauliflower ears," Daro added, "and it's easier to get a swollen ear by having it rubbed against the canvas than it is by having it struck with a glove."

Among the wrestlers mentioned by Daro as the proud possessors of amplified auditory appendages are Stanislaus Zyzsko and Wladek, his brother; Jim Londos, Greek heavyweight; Ivan Poddubny, the Russian Graeco-Roman champion; George Kotsenaros, Montana heavyweight, and many others.

Joe Stecher and John Pesek, however, the former claimant of the world's heavyweight title, and the latter a leading contender, have thus far escaped. Nick Lutze, the Notre Dame football star, who has won a strong following on the coast, is also unsuited to date.

American women seem to have a certain audacity in carrying off startling creations which are never in contradiction to good taste. They have exquisite figures and it is the greatest pleasure for me when I am commissioned to make the costumes for an American screen artist."

Monsieur Poiret does not believe in the "garconne" style. "I am the firm opponent of any movement to masculinize 'la femme.' I repudiate bobbed hair and abhor that monstrosity, the dinner jacket. Woman is most charming when she is most woman."

Fortunately the Bible depends on inspiration, not on the intelligence of the reader.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Los Angeles, June 16.—(INS)—The prodigality of the movies when exact detail is required has again been demonstrated in the filming of "Old Ironsides" off the island of Santa Catalina, Cal.

When the theme of the picture was first conceived, it was the plan of the Famous Players-Lasky corporation to haul the original battle-scarred old sea warrior from the Boston Navy Yards to the Pacific Coast for use in the production. It was discovered, however, that the famous old vessel would be unable to weather the voyage.

Engineers were then dispatched to Washington and spent much time poring over the musty archives and plans in the Navy Department. They then carefully measured the Constitution—"Old Ironsides"—in the Boston Navy Yard and, returning to the Pacific Coast, spared neither expense nor pain in constructing an exact replica of the ship.

Mr. Llewellyn J. Morse, a majestic three-master schooner of 1,500 cargo tons and the possessor of a romantic past as a corpra trading vessel plying between San Francisco and the South Sea Islands, was converted into the frigate Constitution. Five thousand feet of mahogany for the yard-arms and blocks were imported from Mexico, logs 100 feet in length to be used as masts, were brought from Washington, and 100,000 pounds of rope—all that was available along the Pacific coast—was purchased for the rigging.

The original story is coming into its own as a movie theme, Hector Turnbull, associate Paramount producer, declared today.

The custom in the past has been to take the work of a well-known novelist and adapt it to the screen. In a few years, however, Turnbull believes, the literary process will be reversed.

Writers will first write their stories for the screen, with a distinct screen treatment, and the novel or the legitimate play will be adapted afterward.

Col. T. J. McCoy, one of the most colorful characters in early Western history, has joined the movies.

Colonel McCoy, an expert in Indian sign languages an d tribal lore, has been signed by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios and will appear in Western dramas in which the true story of the American Indian will be told.

**Movie Parts Are
Made Fit Publi's
View of the Star**

New York, June 16.—(AP)—Motion picture audiences want to see their favorites in good stories, but they are far more interested in the stars' characters than in their vehicles.

This is the consensus of William Le Baron, associate producer at Paramount's Long Island studio, and his staff of scenario writers and supervisors.

The opinion holds, however, only in the preparation of scenarios for stars whose names have greater drawing power than the title or theme of any story or author. The alternative classification is that of special productions which are chosen primarily for the strength of the story and are cast with characters, rather than players, chiefly in mind.

"In selecting a vehicle for one of the stars, such as Thomas Meighan, Richard Dix, Bebe Daniels, Adolphe Menjou and others, we look for stories that will fit into the public's pre-conceived idea of the star's characters," Le Baron said.

"We then adapt the story or stage play for the screen so that each part of it will tend to develop this idea and at the same time tell a story that will interest and entertain audiences."

Marietta, Ga., June 16.—(INS)—Shadowy lines of blue and gray—Lee's men and Grant's men—a mere handful of the 150,000 musketeers who engaged in mortal combat sixty-two years ago under the rugged silhouette of Kennesaw Mountain—this month will rub shoulders on the same battlefield in commemorative reunion.

From all corners of the nation they will come on June 26 to this little Georgia hamlet, an annual mecca for Memorial Day pilgrimages from all parts of the country. For at the foot of Kennesaw Mountain is the national cemetery where 11,000 Union soldiers who fell on the famous battlefield are buried.

President Coolidge, Vice-President Dawes and other Government officials have been invited to attend the celebration. Governor Clifford Walker of Georgia will send official invitations to every Governor in the United States, and it is expected that many of them will attend.

Judge Kennesaw Mountain Landis, "clash of American baseball," is expected to be guest of honor on the ephemeral occasion. The arbiter of big league ball, who was born while his father, a Union officer, was fighting at Kennesaw Mountain, was christened for the encounter.

The reunion of survivors of the battle is a forerunner, it is believed, of the creation of a national military memorial park, which will include Kennesaw and its environs.

**Race Marriages
On the Increase**

Honolulu, June 16.—(INS)—Inter-racial marriages are becoming more and more common in Hawaii, according to Dr. Romanzo Adams, professor of economics at the University of Hawaii, and strangely enough, the Japanese people, believed up to a few years ago to be strongly opposed to marrying outside of their own race, are among the races which are dropping the bars most rapidly.

Dr. Adams made his statements to the annual meeting of the Hawaiian Academy of Science. There is adequate evidence, he said, to warrant the prediction that inter-racial marriage will become more common and that those races that now contribute but little to inter-racial mixture will, in the near future, make much larger contributions.

Increasing inter-marriage on the part of the Japanese people was shown by Dr. Adams, who revealed that, although in the period from 1912 to 1917 the Japanese were 99.2 per cent pure; in 1924-1925 they were but 94.9 per cent pure.

The professor explained that races that have been longest in contact inter-marry most; they tend to acquire a common language and common customs and manner. Adherents of a common religion inter-marry more rapidly, he added.

**COAST LINE GUIDE BOOK
GIVES INTERESTING FACTS**

The official Railway guide for June 1926 just published contains the interesting information during April of this year on the seven through trains operated by the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad between New York and Florida. These trains made 202 of their 220 trips on an average of 96 per

cent on time. In this connection it is also stated by officials of the road that during the month of May, 1926, the average schedule performance of all trains of the A. C. L. including both local and through express trains was 93.2 per cent.

This means that this percentage of all passenger trains operated by this road either were on time from beginning to end of their trips or arrived at their destination no later than they left their initial station. This is a most creditable showing, considering the fact that local passenger trains make many stops and making up time on local schedule feat. The statement referred to also includes information that several of the through Florida-New York trains, north-bound, made a record of 100 per cent during the month covered by the report.

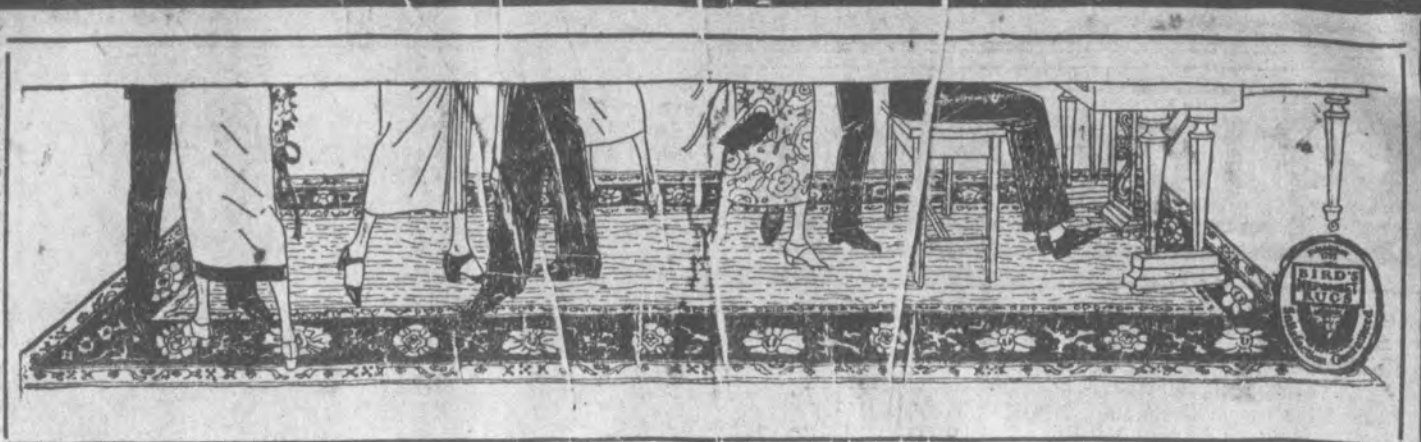
