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UNION SERVICES GET UNDER WAY AT COURT HOUSE

Rev. H. Frederick Jones Spoke at the Opening Service Last Night

Speaking on the subject, "Jordan is a Hard Road to Travel," Rev. H. Frederick Jones, pastor of the Memorial Baptist Church of Greenville, opened the regular summer series of union services on the north side of the court house last night. The services were attended by large crowds from the Teachers college and various churches of the city, and the campaign got under way to a good start.

The union services will continue for a period of seven weeks which embrace the months of July and August. The idea of combining the services of all churches at the court house had its inception last summer. It met with such great success that the churchmen of the city were of the unanimous opinion that the plan should be continued.

In the absence of J. H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, song services last night were conducted by Rev. L. R. O'Brien, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church.

Mr. Jones used as his subject "Evangelism." He used only one phrase of the subject, however, bringing it under the sub-heading of "Jordan is a Hard Road to Travel."

The text was taken from the parable of the Good Samaritan. He read from the Bible the parable told in the wonderful language of the Saviour of mankind. Then he related in his own language the story of the young man who left the city of Jerusalem looking for Jerico. His course lay along the Jordan road. It is a road infested with thieves, cut-throats and robbers today, even as it was in the days when the parable was written. The young man had proceeded only a short way, when he was attacked by thieves. He was severely wounded, and left on the side of the highway to die.

At this part of the story, a priest from one of the temples in the city of Jerusalem, passed by. Instead of ministering to the wounded youth, he passed along his journey as if nothing had happened.

A short while later a Levite came along. A Levite had greater powers in the church than the priest. Where the priest served only one church, he served many. But, like the priest, he passed by the youth and continued his journey along the road to Jerico. The next to come along the road was the Good Samaritan. He did not travel by the Jordan road. He came along the Syria road, which intersects the Jordan nearby where the wounded youth lay.

The Samaritan did not pass by. He administered to the young Jew's needs, and helped him get a new lease on life.

All through the story, Mr. Jones added bits of geographical information. He visited the Old World some time ago, and his remarks were highly enlightening. In developing his theme, he classed Jerusalem as the "City of God." He called Jerico the "City of vice, sin and corruption." Jordan, leading out from the city of God, was a broad boulevard, dotted by enchanting wonders of nature. The road became steep, narrow and dangerous as it proceeded on its course toward the "City of Vice." Added to these manifold dangers were the ravages of the robbers and thieves. Those who went the downward way represented the world, or those who had strayed away from the influences of the "City of God."

"Every church member has his cross in these days and times," Mr. Jones declared. "Their creed distinguishes them. It marks them men of the world, or men of the church. Men of vice and sin, or men of virtue and piety."

The characters of the parable had their creeds, even as those of today. The youth, starting life on the beautiful boulevard of Jordan, believed that what was his belonged to him, and to him

GOVERNOR CALLS OFF SURVEY OF STATE WOMEN

Matter May Be Carried Before General Assembly at Their Next Session

Raleigh, July 19.—(AP)—The proposed survey of women in industry today was in the discard and those favoring such a proposition had before them Governor McLean's suggestion that the General Assembly would meet in five months and they might carry the matter to that body for decision.

The Governor called off the survey Saturday night after Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, Dr. George M. Cooper, and A. T. Allen, the three members of the child welfare commission had failed to agree on persons to make the survey. Dr. Cooper and Mr. Allen were of the opinion that E. F. Carter, executive secretary of the commission should be in charge of the actual survey. To this Mrs. Johnson was opposed, and after several meetings, Saturday night she asked the Governor to relieve her of all duties in connection with the survey. Dr. Cooper and Mr. Allen at the same time advised the Governor that under existing conditions they doubted if the survey was reasonable, but at the same time they were willing to go ahead if he desired. Mr. McLean thereupon cancelled plans for the survey.

In making his decision the Governor stated that the three members of the commission had agreed with him when he first laid the matter before them that Mr. Carter should direct the survey. Mrs. Johnson on the other hand said there had been no such agreement. If this she was backed up by the committee representing the women's organization of the state which first requested the survey. In a telegram to the Governor yesterday they stated that from the first they had opposed Mr. Carter being connected with the survey and this opposition had been voiced in conference with the Governor. They requested the Governor in their telegram go ahead with the survey after appointing persons to conduct it who would be agreeable to Mrs. Johnson.

N. Y. STATE PUBLIC CAMPS IN ADIRONDACKS BREAK ALL RECORDS IN PRESENT YEAR

Albany, N. Y., July 19.—(INS)—All records are being broken this summer in the use of the state's public camp sites in the Adirondacks, the Conservation Commission announced today.

These public camps have been established for six years but never before have men, women and children flocked to them as they have in the last few weeks. The new camp site at the Lake George battleground, which has barely been completed, accommodated more than 100 campers over a recent week-end.

At the Scandaga camp site, just below Wills, 114 camps were counted over one week-end and it is estimated that 1,600 people were there for several days.

District Ranger Cunningham, writing to the Conservation Commission from North Creek in the southeastern Adirondacks estimated that 30,000 people camped in the region of Indian Lake, Blue Mountain Lake, Long Lake, Newcomb and Minerva, and that there were 20,000 campers in other parts of his district over the Fourth of July.

SUNBURNED INITIALS ON SHAPELY THINGS ARE PAID ON BEACHES AT BOSTON

Boston, July 19.—(INS)—Sunburning the initials on shapely tanned thighs has become this summer's popular sport on the many beaches around Boston.

It's a simple process. Girls desiring the unique initialing sticks strips of adhesive tape on the thighs in the form of the letters wanted. The tape stays on until the sun tans the skin surrounding the strips.

The tape then is removed and the unburned parts, formed into the desired initials, stand out conspicuously on the thigh.

J. R. DAVENPORT PASSES AWAY AT PACTOLUS HOME

Well-Known Citizen Laid to Rest at Pactolus This Afternoon

J. R. Davenport, one of the oldest and best known citizens of Pitt county, died at his home in Pactolus Sunday afternoon at one o'clock, following an illness of several weeks duration.

Funeral services will be conducted from his late home this afternoon by Elder Ben Cowan. Interment will take place in the family burying ground at Pactolus.

Mr. Davenport was 82 years of age. He was a lifelong resident of Pitt county. He was one of the largest planters in this part of the state. He was also engaged in the mercantile business.

Mr. Davenport had been a member of Greenville Lodge 284, A. F. and A. M., which body will take part in the funeral services this afternoon. He was a Confederate veteran. He rendered distinguished service in the War Between the States as a member of Co. B, 33rd Regiment, Lane's Brigade, during which time he was wounded six times. Mr. Davenport was recognized as one of the county's most progressive citizens. He was instrumental in the steady growth and progress of the section. He sacrificed himself in behalf of humanity.

Besides his wife, he is survived by four sons and two daughters; J. F. Davenport, Greenville, T. E. of Washington; J. Paul, of Pactolus; Dr. Arthur L. of Baltimore; and Misses Sidney N. and Mattie Davenport of Pactolus.

War On Religion.
To Conquer Lightning.
Blue for Bees—Not Flies.
Only \$20,000,000.

Protestant missionaries plan to leave Mexico July 31, when new religious laws go into effect. They say their usefulness will end. Universal Graphic reports that every Catholic Church in Mexico will be closed. The Government denies it, saying no school or church will be molested that obeys the law.

All church property is to be confiscated, on the ground that such property has been held by the churches unlawfully for the last fifty years. No religious instruction will be permitted in schools and religious publications may not mention or comment on news of national political affairs.

The law is evidently aimed especially at the Catholic Church, the national church of Mexico.

A statement issued by the Mexican Government says: "Regulations apply to all religions, but the Catholic Church is most affected, because it is the purpose of the Mexican Government to keep the Catholic Church outside of politics."

The rest of the world will watch with interest this revival of an old quarrel between church and state.

When the Arsenal at Lake Denmark blew up, it was asked here whether the Government had seriously studied protection from lightning. That lightning flash at Lake Denmark cost this country \$100,000,000 and many lives. Everything had been done to protect against lightning, said the Government.

Now Professor Pupin, teacher of electro-mechanics at Columbia University, says the disaster was due to ignorance.

NINE KILLED IN TERRIFIC STORM DURING SUNDAY

\$250,000 Damages Mark Wake of Storm From Ohio to the State of Maine

New York, July 19.—(AP)—Nine deaths and property damage estimated at \$250,000 marked a path of Sunday electrical rains and wind storms from Ohio to Maine. In addition three boys who set out in a canoe from Sandy Hook, N. J., were missing.

Four deaths were caused in New England by lightning while four others were killed by falling trees or drowned during the storm. Lightning struck near the destroyed naval arsenal at Lake Denmark, N. J., frightening thousands of sightseers but doing no damage. The railroad station at Brocton, Mass., was struck by lightning and partially burned.

A portion of the grandstand in Boston, the home of the Boston Red Sox, was demolished by the wind, while the 90 foot steeple of the Ashbury Methodist Church in Springfield, Mass., crashed to the ground.

Two apartment houses were unroofed in Springfield, a boat house blown into the water. Numerous farm buildings in New England were destroyed and crops were damaged by wind and hail in Maine in New Hampshire.

In central Pennsylvania six were injured when communication was crippled, highways were blocked and much damage caused by hail. At York Beach, Maine, the keeper of the Boone Island Light, six miles off the coast said he collected several bucket, full of hail stones, some as big as golf balls and used them to fill two ice cream freezers. Afterwards he churned the cream and served it to his family.

DR. CHAPPELL FACES TRIAL IN STATESVILLE N. C.

Officers and Church Members Firm in Belief of Minister's Innocence

Statesville, July 19.—(AP)—The church trial of Dr. Ashley Chappell, pastor of the Central Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of Asheville, promises to be quietly and expeditiously conducted, according to indications here today prior to the convening of the court of thirteen ministers tomorrow.

None of the men concerned in the trial of the immorality charge reside in Statesville. The proceedings will be held in the community house of the Broad Street church, and Dr. F. J. Prittyman, of Gastonia, will preside over the trial.

Asheville, July 19.—(AP)—Firm in his belief that Dr. Ashley Chappell, pastor of the Central Methodist church, is guiltless of charges preferred against him, officers of the church, members of the congregation and numerous friends of the pastor prepared today to exert their utmost efforts in his behalf to show their faith in him and to prove their contention that he is an innocent man.

Members of the Board of Steward and other influential members of the church arranged for a prayer service to be held this afternoon at the church. Prayers will be offered, it is said, asking Divine guidance in establishing the fact that the accused man is innocent. Dr. Chappell and his wife are expected to attend the service. After the prayer service, it was learned, a delegation of about 70 persons will leave in automobiles for Statesville where Dr. Chappell goes on trial tomorrow at nine o'clock on a trial of immoral conduct before a tribunal composed of 13 ministers of the

COUNSEL BEGINS ARGUING CASE OF NELLIE FREEMAN

McNinch Urges Jury to Set Aside Sentimentality and Render Sound Judgment

Charlotte, July 19.—(AP)—Argument of counsel began this morning in the trial of Mrs. Nellie Freeman, admitted slayer of her young taxicab-driver husband, Frank R. McNinch, the first to speak for the State, opened his address. He urged the jury to set aside sentimentality, and render judgment.

"Is she crazy?" he asked. And then answered his own question. "No more than I." The lawyer declared that the defendant was an actress, a tigress, and a sane woman.

"You can't wash the blood from Nellie's hands," he said. "Like a tigress under cover of love and affection, she caressed her husband and killed him. People are getting tired of flimsy excuses for murder. She has sealed his lips by death and then damned his character, in court that she may go free."

He insisted that a verdict of first degree murder might well have been asked for by the State and told the jury that it could not fail to render one of second degree murder. He also ridiculed the testimony of Dr. Hall, of Richmond, who testified that the defendant was "fit of normal mentality."

Charlotte, July 19.—(AP)—The case of Nellie Freeman, on trial for slaying her husband on the night of May 22, will be in the hands of the jury late today. Arguments of F. R. McNinch for the State, and J. F. Newell, of the defense counsel, were completed shortly after noon.

Mr. Newell's speech required one hour and forty minutes. He devoted a great part of his time in reviewing the testimony of alienists who had declared the girl was below normal mentality. Mr. McNinch argued that every act of the woman showed clearly she was sane and that the killing had been performed under the shield of love. He argued for a second degree murder verdict.

Heroit Forms New Cabinet

Paris, July 18.—(AP)—M. Heroit, leader of the radicals, has succeeded in forming a cabinet to replace that of M. Briand which fell Saturday. He announced this afternoon that the final line-up of the ministry is to be given out tonight.

**Road Builder Avows
He Saw Former
"Boss" Kick Boy to
the Ground**

Albermarle, July 19.—(AP)—The State resumed its case today against Nevin C. Cranford, former Stanley county convict superintendent, with three additional witnesses to be introduced before resting its side. Indications were that it would be Friday before the jury got the case. Cranford is on trial for the alleged slaying of James Terry and James Howell, two negro convicts.

E. T. Hally, of Albermarle, was the first witness. He said that he was a county road builder for seven years and testified to seeing Cranford strike a white boy called "Spectacle" because he said he was exhausted. Cranford grabbed the boy around the neck and kicked him to the ground, the witness testified. Frequent objections by defense were generally sustained by Judge T. B. Finley, presiding.

Deputy A. D. Caudle testified that Hally's reputation was "good" except for "drinking."

Albermarle, July 19.—(AP)—A sixth death in the Stanley county prison system was attributed to Nevin C. Cranford, in his trial for murder in Superior court here today. Two witnesses, Mr. and Mrs. Dave Teter, testified that Carl Meadows, a white prisoner, came to their home several years ago suffering from wounds he said were caused by Cranford. Mr. Teter said that Meadows was in a bruised and beaten condition. He said that one of the man's hands was broken. On cross examination Teter stated he had not seen Meadows for some time before he came to his house, although he had known the prisoner.

Will Vanderburg, of Albermarle, former prisoner under Cranford, testified that he was practically deaf because of a blow on the head. He said that Cranford struck the blow with his fist.

BLAME HEAT FOR DEATH BOSTON ZOO POLAR BEAR

Boston, July 19.—(INS)—The kiddies who visit Franklin Park Zoo have lost another pet. Pasha, the polar bear, one of the pioneer settlers at the zoo, is dead.

The body of the old male bear was found by Curator Harkins in the swimming pool. Death was caused by heart disease, due to the excessive heat. The animal was 18 years old.

HAPPY MARRIED WOMEN MAY BECOME TEACHERS IN JUGO-SLAV SCHOOLS

Belgrade, July 19.—(INS)—Jugo-Slavian educational authorities have adopted novel solution to the universal problem of allowing married women to hold positions as teachers.

Domestic tranquility is the deciding factor. If the married teacher can prove that she lives in perfect harmony with her mate, the authorities will allow her to teach, but the permit will be withdrawn when and if the pacific conjugal relationship is disrupted.

No women teachers will be allowed to marry without permission of the authorities.

Pitt county board of commissioners sitting in special session here this morning, elected S. A. Whitehurst to fill the vacancy in the office of sheriff created last Saturday by the removal of Amos L. Jackson. Whitehurst was nominated as sheriff in a second Democratic primary held here several weeks ago. He will be officially inducted into office by Clerk of Superior Court J. F. Harrington, as soon as preliminary arrangements can be made for taking over the office.

In his duties as temporary sheriff, Whitehurst will confine his efforts to law enforcement only. Financial affairs of the county will be in charge of the Fidelity and Deposit Co., until arrangements can be made between them and the county commissioners for the handling of same.

Following action of the commissioners in removing Jackson last Saturday, Coroner S. G. Wilkerson automatically became sheriff until the commissioners could appoint an executive. All law enforcement officers of the department of sheriff were sworn in again Saturday morning.

Temporary department chief Whitehurst will consist of D. M. Sellers, Mrs. R. R. Tyson and G. P. Pierce, who are already in office.

No news has been received today regarding the whereabouts of Amos L. Jackson, whose failure to report specific sums of money to the commissioners, resulted in his removal. The order of removal was signed by Judge R. A. Nunn at New Bern, in compliance with a petition filed Saturday.

The petition, filed under section 3,208 Consolidated Statutes, charged failure to turn over considerable sums of the county's money for long periods of time after collection. The items listed include \$9,727.00 collected from the Norfolk-Southern Railroad Company on January 30 and turned over on June 19, failure to pay over on account for \$8,273.81 that had been collected, failure to account for \$18,307.80 drainage tax and failure to account for \$2,776.36 bill, of cost. The petition also charges conduct unbecoming a public official, namely, the drinking of intoxicating liquors.

At a recent meeting the board of commissioners had adopted a resolution requesting sheriff Jackson to appear before it Friday for explanation and settlement, but at the appointed time he failed to appear and efforts to get in touch with him were unsuccessful. In filing the petition the members of the board are seeking temporary removal of sheriff Jackson from office, pending the hearing of the case in court.

COMPLETE R. I. TOWN BOUGHT BY ONE MAN

Mapleville, R. I., July 19.—(INS)—Every inch of this town has been sold.

Henry L. Bicy, of Danielson, Conn., made the purchase. The price was \$200,000.

Ther uchman is said to represent the Stillwater Worsted Mill of Harrisville, R. I.

The sale included every building in the town, 60 dwellings, two general stores, two boarding houses, two large mills, and a number of smaller dwellings.

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LINE OF DEMARCATION BETWEEN WORLD AND CHURCH

"A line of demarcation
must be drawn between the
world and the church."

These words were ut-
tered last night by Rev. H.
Frederick Jones, pastor of
the Memorial Baptist
church of Greenville.

And he spoke a great
truth. It is a truth the
God-loving, God-fearing, peo-
ple of the world must re-
cognize if civilization is to
maintain its equilibrium in
the future as it has in the
past.

Mr. Jones is not only one
of the most convincing and
and forceful speakers in
Greenville. He is one of
the best in the state. When
he speaks, he speaks with
conviction. His is not a
vapid dribble of words. He
understands life. He under-
stands theology. And when
he combines the two in one
of his great sermons, he puts
people to thinking. And
when you put them to a pro-
cess of thinking, good re-
sults more than likely will
materialize.

All of us know that the
church and the world have
never been able to mix.
America is trying harder
to mix them today than
ever before. But it cannot
be done. Those who conse-
crate their lives to the world
cannot hope to do the same
to the church. In serving
one, they neglect the other.

We cannot serve two mas-
ters. We may attempt to
do so for awhile, but even-
tually we learn in the hard
school of experience that the
field of personal service in
the church is far too broad
to permit of the narrow, big-
oted views of the world.

Someone has said that the
law of the harvest is to reap
more than we sow. Sow
and act and you reap a hab-
it. Sow a habit and you
reap a character. Sow a
character and you reap a
destiny. Those who have
tested out the truth of this
saying know how true it is.
They know that sowing to
the world means nothing
more than unequivocal sur-
render to the ways of the
world.

And the ways of the
world are not the ways of
the church. When we draw
in our own minds a line of
demarcation, the difference
is easily discernible. The
sooner the American people
get back to the truth of the
Bible as presented by Christ
the sooner they may hope
to see a great spiritual re-
vival. And with that re-
vival will come freedom of
minds, hearts and bodies.

LIGHTNING NEVER HITS TWICE IN THE SAME PLACE

Up in New Jersey the other
day, a bolt of lightning
came along and struck a
magazine of powder in the
national arsenal.

All of us know of the
death and destruction of life
and property that followed.
It was terrible. It seemed
like a useless waste of life
and property.

But who could help it?
Who was responsible? The
answers at once are evident.
It was not negligence on
the part of any government
official. It cannot be laid
at the door of the presi-
dent's economy program, as
some would like to claim.

It was none of these. It
was simply one of those un-
expected assaults of the ele-
ments. It was one of these
assaults which have been
occurring from time to time
since pre-historic days. It
was one of those things
which will continue as long
as the earth stands, regard-
less of who is president and
despite anything we may
do.

All of us admit that the
world is governed by cer-
tain fixed laws of nature.
These laws are as inexor-
able as fate itself. They are
made effective despite all
we can do. They realize our
frailty. We realize the
vastness of their power.
But back of these laws there
must be a lawmaker. No
laws ever became really and
truly applicable without the
aid of the maker. So it is in
the case of nature.

The furious onslaughts of
the elements result from
several inexplicable and
changeless laws of nature.
In cases of the loss of prop-
erty and human life, some-
times the maker of nature's
laws so desired it. We are
not capable of saying wheth-
er they are right in this con-
clusion.

But we do know, despite
anything that may be said
and done about the case in
New Jersey, that nothing
we can say or do will have
the slightest effect upon the
elements. So long as God
sees fit to let the old world
make its daily revolutions,
so long we may expect to be
subservient to this will.
That is one of those in-
escapable laws to which all
of us must bow. It is a law
to which all of us will con-
tinue to bow. And the
quicker we realize it, the
better off things will be.

DES MOINES WATCHES THE DANCE HALLS

Des Moines, Ia., July 15.—(INS)—
With the country dance halls and
roadhouses attracting girls of six-
teen years of age and less out of
the city, plans are being made
here to lower the city dance hall
age permit in order that these
girls may be induced to stay with-
in the city limits where city offi-
cers may supervise them.

Girls from twelve to sixteen
years old may be found at the
dance halls in the country, accord-
ing to those backing the plan to
lower the city age limit. While in
the city where there are ordin-
ances regulating the conduct of
dance halls, there are no such
regulatory rules for the country.
Deputy sheriffs are stationed at
the dance halls and roadhouses,
but aside from seeing that there
is no open violation of the law,
they are not authorized to take
any action.

According to Dr. Carrie M. Dic-
key, dance hall commissioner, the
general public has been lax in its
efforts to provide supervised en-
tertainment for the girl today, who
while she has not reached her ma-
jority is as much a part of the
public world as her older sister of
former years.

A lowering of the age limit with-
in the city, it is said, would be of
actual benefit to the girls and
their parents.

OPEN FORUM

60 Rue Lafayette, Paris
June 6, 1926

Dear Greenville Folks:—
We had excellent weather com-
ing over, so that I did not feed
the fish, although they did me.
There was only one night that it
was too rough to dance, but we
did not lack for entertainment,
since we had many talented peo-
ple on board. Constance Tal-
madge favored us with her pres-
ence and thus added glamor to
the occasion. She is a charming
lady in real life as well as in the
movies. Like all celebrities, she
came in late, thus creating a stir
and enthusiasm in the audience.
We landed at Cherbourg June
30. Here we got a good lunch
for 35c. The lack of automobile
traffic was quite noticeable. I
enjoyed the ride from Cherbourg
to Paris, which is about 150
miles. The first 50 miles was in
dairy country and the rest
was beautiful farms, the fields of
which were dotted with poppies
and corn flowers. This mingling
of red, blue and green looked
like a veritable flower garden.
The country looks prosperous.
Men, women and children were
tolling side by side.

Paris is still "gay Paree" Ev-
eryone enjoyed it. All the mus-
ical plays favored us with an
American song. The Dolly sis-
ters are at the Casino d Paris.
Many Americans were in evi-
dence at all the theatres. We
saw Romeo and Juliet at the
Grand Opera house. Although I
scarcely understood a word of
it, I greatly enjoyed the acting
and the artistic settings. Their
voices were superb.

They are cracking jokes
around me so I'll tell you one.
A lady was talking about her Eu-
ropean trip. Someone interrupted,
"Did you see the Dardanel-
les?" She replied "Oh, yes, I
took tea with them."

V-sailles is disappointing to
most tourists. It is like a vaca-
tion house in which we find a lit-
tle furniture left behind. But
the gardens, which were Louis
XIV play grounds, still possess
all their charm and beauty. The
villas in it are enchanting. It
certainly was and still is an ideal
retreat.

On the Fourth of July we went
to the battlefields. The devasta-
ted areas look like a garden of
Eden. People have and still are
working hard. Many were work-
ing on Sunday. Most of the
buildings have been rebuilt, and
thus it gives a prosperous ap-
pearance. However, we still saw
some buildings that were entirely
demolished, and many which were
riddled with bullets. At Berry-
au-Bac we saw hill 108, where
the Germans and French under-
mined and blew up many into
sternity. Not far from there are
German dug-outs made of heavy
concrete walls with thick con-
crete doors. The French and
German trenches were close to-
gether here. As I stood in the
Oise-Aisne, and Aisne-Marne
American cemeteries I felt a lump
enter my throat, for there were
buried some of my college friends.
Those thousands of white crosses
have a peculiar effect on one.
Quentin Roosevelt is buried some
distance from the Oise-Aisne cem-
etery, on the spot where he fell.
The Germans buried him there
and placed a marked over him.

We found Reims practically
rebuilt. The cathedral is under
reconstruction. The main walls
are intact. Our guide told us
that the Germans made no spe-
cial effort to destroy the cathed-
ral, for they could easily have
done so. Reims was shelled as
a whole so as to make it un-
inhabitable for the French army,
since it was an important rail-
road station. Only 200 houses
missed being hit. Soldiers were
on parade celebrating French
and American flags were flying.

The lectures delivered by de-
puties, a minister of finance and
a scientist were very interesting
and enlightening. Most of them
spoke English, while two spoke
French. Their spirit was fine.
They spoke of German in kind
terms. Now they realize that
Germany and France must co-
operate instead of fighting each
other. The German finance ex-
pert is on his way to Paris to
help them out of their financial
difficulty. One thousand German
youths are coming to France in
August for a conference on
peace and good-will. Europe
seems to be moving toward a bet-
ter understanding. One of the
deputies went so far as to urge
a United States of Europe. Count
Fleury said that we should not
believe all the bad things we
read about the French in the
newspapers. He and others said
that French family life is better
now than it has ever been. In
fact, the French family life is
much closer than in America.
They have more family life.
The stores in Paris close for 2 hours
lunch, so that most people can
go home for lunch instead of eat-
ing at restaurants. This keeps

the family closer to gether. They
take more time to eat than we
do. Before anyone of the fam-
ily enters into a business en-
gagement he consults all the
family.

The French are having a hard
time financially because the gov-
ernment, instead of taxing the
people in order to meet its obli-
gations, has been printing paper
money with which to pay. Thus
the franc has depreciated in val-
ue.

France did not tax her people
heavily after the war because she
expected Germany to pay for the
war. They see now that they
were deluded. Prof. Gaston
Jeze, of the law faculty in the
University of Paris, said that
France now knows that Germany
cannot pay all that was expected.
He was one of the committee of
financial experts that just gave
its report to the government. I
also believe that France must
help herself first. However, he
thinks that the world will assist
her as it did Germany.

The deputies have refused to
vote higher taxes because they
feared they would not be re-
elected. One thought that a
Mussolini in France might get
them out of the difficulty. How-
ever, he did not want us to quote
him. Democracy should permit
the experts to handle questions
that only experts can solve. When
they interfere then democracy
becomes inefficient.

I must finish this epistle as we
are nearing the port Dieppe,
where we take a boat for Eng-
land.

We pay for water as well as
for wine in France. I enjoyed
their meals. Paris makes one
feel at home. At the Casino de
Paris they even mentioned Car-
olina. So you see I felt quite at
home. If you want to have a
good time go to Paris. I shall
write later about London, etc.

I hope you are having a pleas-
ant summer. The weather was
fine in Paris. No hot weather.
One can buy a suit for \$10.00.
Lying costs are \$3.00 per day
at good hotels.

Boris Favors An American Woman for Queen, Says

Sofia, Bulgaria, July 16.—(AP)—
An American woman has a
chance to become Queen of Bul-
garia if she possesses beauty,
gentle birth, a sympathetic na-
ture and moderate means.
These are the qualities de-
manded in a wife by King Boris
the only bachelor-sovereign in the
world. His friends say he has
given up hope of finding a com-
panion for his throne among the
Royalties of Europe, and that his
eyes are now focused on an
American girl.

Of intensely democratic and
simple nature, the 32-year-old
ruler has always held Americans
in very high regard, and it under-
stood to have confided in his ad-
visers more than once that he
would have no objection to shar-
ing his crown and happiness with
a fair heart from across the At-
lantic.

He virtually has no means of
his own, his country is poor and
therefore, he must seek a wife
who possesses a competence of
her own.
His own civil list or salary from
the government is \$22,500 a year.
In addition to this, however, he
is allowed about \$100,000 a year
for the upkeep of his various pal-
aces, of which he has three, two
in Sofia and one at Varna on the
Black Sea.

While this sum is quite ade-
quate for the maintenance of his
palaces and the salaries of many
court functions, it is scarcely
enough to allow the king to en-
tertain on anything like a liberal
scale.

Contrary to the belief of many,
Boris is not of Slav origin, but
is of noble German birth. His
mother was Princess Marie Lou-
ise of Bourbon-Parma and his
father was Duke (later King)
Ferdinand of Saxe.

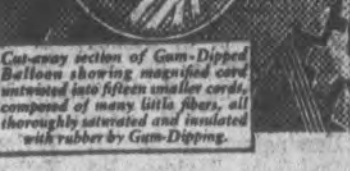

CLAIMS NEW WAY TO CURE CANCERS

London, July 13.—(INS)—Defective respiration as the primary cause of cancer is the theory put forward by Dr. Octavio Felix Pedrosa, a Brazilian doctor associated with the famous London Hospital.

Working on this theory, Dr. Pedrosa has patented an apparatus which, he claims, will restore the normal power of contracting and expanding the lungs, enabling Nature to speed up the circulation and remove any foreign substance which should not be in the system, including cancer.

The claims of the Brazilian, if substantiated, would revolutionize the present treatment of cancer and other dread diseases. He calls his apparatus the "Vitameter," and has sent a model of it to the British Ministry of Health for official tests by the British Government.

"My apparatus," said Dr. Pedrosa in an interview with International News Service, "tests the contracting and expanding power of the lungs, and shows the defects in the power of respiration. This enables me to see whether there is any predisposition to cancer or other diseases. By predisposition I mean whether the ground is prepared for cancer or not."

"I have treated a case of hemorrhage of the kidneys produced by cancer with my apparatus. In three days the hemorrhage ceased, and the tumor disappeared in three and a half months. The patient is not quite well. I have also treated a case of cancer in the intestines, which was producing neuralgia pains in the back. After use of that Vitameter the pains disappeared within three weeks, while the tumor itself began to disappear in two weeks. This was entirely and solely the result of correct breathing."

"I first constructed an apparatus by which I could maintain alive about five litres of blood," Dr. Pedrosa said in describing the theory of his apparatus. "I set by altering the chemical composition of the nourishing fluids of the blood its vitality could either be increased or decreased."

"When I found I could modify the vitality of the blood my attention was drawn to the possibility of altering the vitality of the cancer cells by the same process. By placing the cancerous tissues in the same apparatus and by reducing the chemical composition of the nourishing fluids, the cancer cells would be restored to normal cells. That led me to find in my researches which chemical it was responsible for increasing the vitality of the cancerous cell, and by a series of experiments I found it was potassium."

"Then came the question, how did potassium produce cancer in the living person? I found that carbonic acid caused more potassium to accumulate in the muscle. That led me to deal with the removal of carbonic acid through the breath. The result of the experiments explained by chronic irritation is supposed to be one of the causes of cancer, because when the tissues are injured there is a great formation of carbonic acid in those particular regions."

"And in view of the fact that carbonic acid is largely present in

the injured tissues, that is responsible for a great accumulation of potassium. In consequence of this the cells which have been saturated with carbonic acid acquire a greater cancerous vitality than the other cells of the body. If the respiration becomes worse, then it is almost certain that any kind of swelling will lead to cancer."

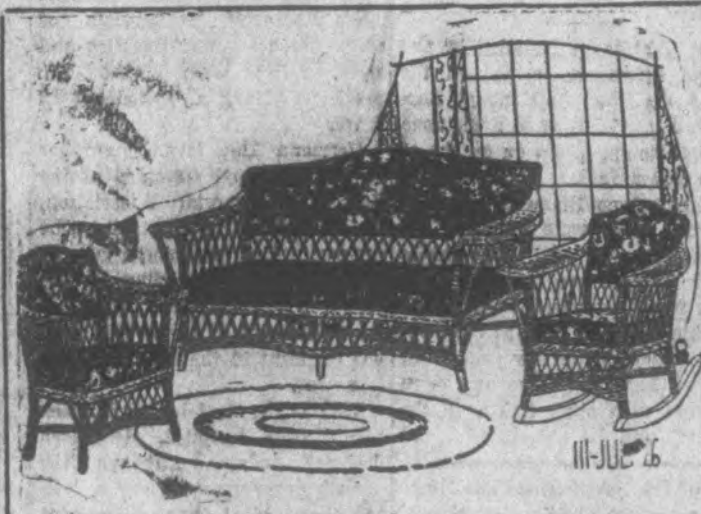
"The three features of an ideal respiratory system should be increased concentration of carbon dioxide, insufficiency of oxygen, and thirdly, pressure. You get in the Vitameter the concentration of the carbon dioxide by the increased number of breaths taken without fresh air. Through the same method you get the want of oxygen, and pressure is obtained by lifting the liquid in the apparatus."

Dr. Pedrosa hopes to be able to establish a special clinic in the East Side district of London for the treatment of the poor. Meanwhile medical circles here are awaiting the report of the Ministry of Health tests of the doctor's claims before advancing any opinion of the merits or demerits of the system.

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Honolulu, July 19.—(INS)—With automobile congestion increasing month by month on the famous "Pali road" highway engineers in this city are investigating the practicability and cost of boring a tunnel through the Koolau mountains and thus uniting the windward and leeward sides of the island of Oahu.

Interest in the windward side of the island, especially the beach place at Waimanalo and Kailua, as residential districts, has been the chief cause for this sudden increase in travel over the single

mountain pass known as the Pali. During the last year, automobile travel over this mountain road has increased two or three hundred per cent. The drive to the Pali from Honolulu is over a wide boulevard that engineering skill has made almost free from curves, but once pass the gap and descending the precipitous windward side, the road becomes a narrow ribbon of concrete with just room for two cars to pass, and sharp turns follow one another in amazing rapidity.

Owing to the steep sides of the mountain ridge in the vicinity of Maunaloa valley, it is estimated that a tunnel of comparatively short length would be possible at this point and the cost should not be too great to make it a subject of practical consideration.

Local fishermen are puzzled at the appearance in the vicinity of Kaena Point, this island, of a large sea lion, said to be the first of its kind ever seen here. H. L. Kelly,

executive officer of the territorial fish and game commission, has voiced the opinion that the lion may be a bull exiled from a herd in some northern waters. Local waters, while warmer than those usually chosen by these animals, are not too warm for them to exist here, Kelly says.

Hawaii National Park will have a model, low-priced public camp, similar to those in operation in other national parks, according to the terms of the lease which the Interior Department has granted to the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company. The present lease by this company expires in the middle of next year and the execution of a new lease has just been authorized by the Interior Department. One of the terms of the agreement requires the Inter-Island to establish a recreation camp with facilities for vacationists at a moderate rate.

The light to be installed by the federal lighthouse service on the new Aloha tower in Honolulu harbor will be visible from a distance of 19 miles out at sea on an arc of 180 degrees facing the sea and spreading from Diamond Head on one side to Barber's Point on the other. It will be 550 candle power with a two second flash every three seconds. With its installation, the old light at Sand Island, which, with the growth of the city has been more and more confused with other lights in the vicinity, will be abandoned and the keeper will be transferred to the powerful station near the leper settlement on Molokai Island.

Robert P. Lewis, a member of an old Hawaiian family, recently left here for Russia, where he hopes to locate the beautiful Hawaiian feather cloaks which were presented by Kamehameha I and other chiefs to various Russian visitors to Hawaii. He will also investigate those said to be in the Berlin museum, the gift of Kamehameha III to King William of Prussia about 1820.

The famous stamp collection of the late William Wolters of this territory, which was left by the Wolters will to the city of Bremen, Germany, and was rejected by that municipality, will be sold at public auction in New York City next October. In his will others devised his collection to the Bremen museum and set aside a bequest of \$5,000 income of which was to be used for the care of

the collection. The museum authorities state in declining the gift that the amount thus allowed for the care of the collection is entirely inadequate. After the collection has been officially rejected, the territorial supreme court issued an order directing that it be sold by the administrators.

Heavy summer travel to the Hawaiian Islands is indicated by reports from mainland travel agencies received by the Hawaii Tourist Bureau. An advertising campaign carried on by the bureau during the past two years is apparently responsible for the large increase in summer visitors.

Los Angeles, July 19.—(INS)—The first film biography in the world, assembled after years of search, is now proving of invaluable aid to Hollywood motion picture producers.

The biography is that of Theodore Roosevelt. It consists of scraps of news reel weeklies and short subjects taken of the late president during a period of 22 years.

Hermann Hagedorn, biographer of Roosevelt and secretary of the Roosevelt Memorial Association, has assembled the biography. The composite film is being used by Paramount in the filming of The Rough Riders, an epic story of the adventures of Roosevelt's famous regiment in the Spanish-American war.

This is the first biographic film record ever compiled, Hagedorn declared today. Although the French government is now collecting biographical films of the great war heroes—Joffre, Foch, Clemenceau and Pétain. In the future, with the widespread use of commercial motion pictures as well as amateur movie cameras, it may be possible to compile biographical films of our great men from the time they are in swaddling clothes to their last public appearance.

It would have been the ruin of Germany if the recent plebiscite on the confiscation of the property of the former German rulers had approved confiscation, Alfred Weinkrantz, director of the Dresdner Bank of Danzig, Germany, the second largest financial institution in the republic, declared here today.

The precedent for confiscation thus established, Weinkrantz declared, would have been the start of general confiscation of property by communists and socialists. The property involved in the recent plebiscite was valued at approximately one billion dollars, the banker estimated.

Secretary-birds from British East Africa was the remedy proposed today by Herbert Knight of Nairobi for the problem of rattlesnake control in Southern California.

There are too many snakes in the desert this year, Mr. Knight declared. The heavy rains this summer drove them out early. I'm going to send back home for several pairs of secretary-birds and start raising them here to kill snakes.

The secretary-birds, Mr. Knight explained, eat snakes almost exclusively.

smuggling by Confederates, of arms from Canada and battled raiders. More than once the ship, which would not be worthy of notice of naval forces now, caused friction between Great Britain and the United States, because of charges that her presence on the Great Lakes was in contravention of the Rush-Bagot treaty in 1817.

Built in sections in Pittsburgh, the fabricated parts of the Wolverine were transported on barges through the Erie canal to the city of Erie, where she was assembled and launched.

As the first iron vessel, the fifth steam-propelled man-of-war built capable of speed of ten knots an hour, the Wolverine was the most powerful fighting unit of the Great Lakes for half a century.

Because the engines of the ship are the only ones remaining of the early steam navy of the United States, much interest is expected to be aroused when she is exhibited in the future at Erie. The first steam engine built for the Navy was designed and built by Robert Fulton in 1815 and the ship in which they were installed was destroyed in a magazine explosion in the Brooklyn Navy Yard in 1820. The Fulton II was captured by Confederates in the Civil War and destroyed and steam engines built in 1842 for the naval ships Missouri and Mississippi also lost in fire and battle.

When the Wolverine was launched as the Michigan, Great Britain became alarmed over her announced tonnage of 408 tons and her batteries of two 8-inch guns and four 32-pound carronades. It was charged the ship violated the treaty, which was denied by the United States.

When the Civil War broke out this protest by Great Britain was renewed, and while a violation of treaty rights was denied by Acting Secretary of State Seward, he offered to withdraw the ship if Great Britain insisted. The protest was dropped.

Once during the Civil War the Wolverine broke up a Confederate raiding party, which planned to release prisoners held on Johnson's Island and also to capture the Wolverine. Confederate ships were sunk and the principals in the raid arrested.

For many years the ship has served as a training ship for the naval militia of Pennsylvania, and has carried reservists of other states.
