FLYING FIELD AT SEA

FOR OCEAN TRAVELERS Philadelphia, July 20 .- (INS) -Ocean travel may be entirely revolutionized within the near future, according to Edward R. Armstrong, mechanical engineer who has invented a floating flying field.

According to those who have seen Armstrong's model on his state, at Holly Oak, Del., where demonstration will be made short'y, a 34 hour trip by airplane across the Atlantic Ocean could be made. Eight of these floating and anchored land fields, equipped with hotels, furl stations machine shops and weather station could be placed at regular intervals across the ocean, according to Armstrong's plan, where the airships could land.

The "seadrome" as the invention is called, will have a dire placement of many thousands of tons, 97 per cent of which will be below the line of wave disturbance, it is said.

According to the tentative plan, it provides for a terminus at Atlantic City, and one at Plymouth, England. The planes carrying 25 passengers each will fly in both directions each day and at no time will they be more than 150 miles to the near st seadrome which are planned to be less than 1400 miles apart.



Washington, July 19,-(INS)-Preparation of regulations governing nearly 40 amendments to the world war veteran act, enacted during the closing hours of the last session of Congress, is practically completed and Gen. Frank T. Hines, director of the bureau, said the field forces of

While most of the amendments age of the new law was welcomed are calculated to confer benefits upon individual veterans, the passby the eterans Bureau, as it is believed several of the changes will simplify procedure and in that manner cut much of the red tape against which former service men have protested so persistently cince the inauguration of relief

Until the claims are filed it is impossible to definitely estimate the number of men who will be aided by the latest amendments, but bureau officials expressed the belief that tens of thousands of men will in one way or another

A summary of the important changes as provided in the new act, prepared especially for International News Service by the Disabled American eterans, is as fel-

The director is authorized to hospitalize women veterans outside of government institutions. The director is authorized to limit the number of wards to any single guardian in the District of

The director is authorized to appear in court and make proper presentation where it appears that any guardian is not properly executing his duties.

Authority is granted for expenses of court proceedings in connection with appoint or removal of guardian.

The eterans' Bureau is authorized to reimburse those who have lost or may lose personal property from fire when the property was stored in designated places in eterans' Bureau Hospitals.

Women who served in U. S Base Hospitals Overseas are made eligible for the benefits of the World War Veterans' Act.

Provides for a permanent and total disability for the organic loss of speech.




