FAMOUS GEORGIA JURIST DIES AT FLAT ROCK HOME

Judge Alexander Campbell King Succumbs to Illness of Several Months

Flat Rock, July 26.—(AP)—Judge Alexander Campbell King, 70, former solicitor general of the United States and one of Georgia's leading jurists, died at his summer home here yesterday after an illness extending over several months.

Judge King was a member of the law firm, King, Balding, MacDougal and Silbey, a partnership founded in 1885.

Mr. King was appointed to the office of Solicitor General in 1919 by President Wilson to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of John W. Davis as minister to Great Britain.

In 1920 he was appointed as United States Judge for the Atlanta circuit and held the position until 1925 when ill health caused him to retire.

This will cause argument. Miss Martha Bates, an old-fashioned Kentucky mountain girl, with modern bobbed hair, walked up to the pulpit of Rev. Arlie Brown, old-fashioned Kentucky Baptist preacher, and slapped his face.

Chapter two opens with Martha Bates sentenced by an old-fashioned Kentucky jury to forty days in jail for slapping a preacher. She served fifteen days, the Kentucky's old-fashioned Governor William J. Fields, investigated. Last Friday he gave Martha Bates a full pardon and denounced what he called 'pulpit cowardice.'

Perhaps he has not noticed that the Bible also is interested in that subject. Women must have their head covered, and hold their peace, in church. Isaiah would not have them walking and mincing, as they go. You learn in the last chapter of Proverbs that the virtuous woman's clothing is 'silk and purple' and that 'she maketh herself coverings of tapestry.'

Female dress and manners are important. They indicate character, or lack of it, and what women are in this generation the next generation will be.

Hunting for an issue, some reason why 7,000,000 Coolidge pluralists should change to a Democratic plurality. Democrats chose the tariff.

They pick an issue that would increase the Republican vote. Even the much injured farmers are not anxious to throw American markets open to competition with European labor, and European currency at ten cents on the dollar.

Capper's Weekly says the farmers must make the government do something for farmers, set up some machinery that will help farmers to deal profitably with their surplus.

Democrats should PROMISE to do all that and more, if they want the wheat farm vote—and even then they would not get it. Their only real issue is prohibition, and with women voting that might not be much of a winner—unless for a candidate like Governor Smith, for whom millions of women would vote, on any platform.

COLORED PEOPLE GIVE FINE SING AT COURT HOUSE

Affair Largely Attended Yesterday Afternoon; Contributions Liberal

Colored people of Greenville gave a sing on the court house lawn yesterday afternoon at three o'clock. It was held for the purpose of raising funds for completing construction work on the Baptist and Methodist churches.

The sing was attended by a fairly large crowd, and everybody enjoyed it. If there is anything in the world Greenville colored people can do, it is sing. And they did their best yesterday, because they were singing in a great cause.

In the minds of Pitt county colored people there is nothing that can take the place of the church. They believe in the Bible as implicitly as it is possible for mortals to believe. And they believe that it is only through the church that the teaching of the Bible can find proper expression and consideration.

It was this fact that caused them to sing so earnestly and vigorously in the program arranged at the court house. It was not held to show how they could sing, but to raise funds that they might more fully carry out the work of the giver of song.

Charlie Peyton and Rev. J. S. Shaw today issued an expression of thanks to the people of Greenville for the liberal contribution.

SEVERAL KILLED IN COLLAPSE OF BRIDGE IN W. VA.

Hundred Persons Attending Carnival Precipitated in River When Bridge Breaks

Charleston, W. Va., July 26.—(AP)—The death toll into collapse of Coal River of a foot bridge at Whitesville, 40 miles from here, remained at six today, but officials said further search of the river bed might reveal additional victims.

An investigation ordered by Governor Howard M. Gore shortly after the collapse of the bridge Saturday, indicated a turn buckle had given away before the combined weight of more than 100 persons packed on the bridge to witness a water carnival, precipitating them into the shallow waters of the river 20 feet below. More than 65 were injured, five of them seriously.

FRANKLE HELD ON CHARGE OF IMMORALITY

Aaron Frankel, 24, white man of Greenville, was jailed Saturday afternoon on a charge of immorality. He was released a short time later under bond of \$500. He will be given hearing before Judge W. A. Darden in Tuesday's session of county court.

Frankel's arrest resulted from information furnished Chief of Police Lester Jones and K. T. Futrell, county welfare officer, by Alice Williams, 21, who resides on Cotanch street.

It is alleged that the girl admitted that she and Frankel had been intimate for some time. She is said to have told the two officers that they had registered as man and wife at hotels in various parts of the state.

When advised of the charge, Frankel was non-committal.

SENATE BEGINS INVESTIGATIONS AT CHICAGO, ILL.

Senatorial Contest to Be Given Airing Before Special Committee Today

Chicago, July 26.—(AP)—With seven witnesses summoned, a score of others in reserve, the special Senate campaign committee set out today upon investigation of the Illinois senatorial primary. Members of the committee were prepared to inquire particularly into charges that expenditures on behalf of the two candidates in the Republican primary, exceeded the \$3,000,000 shown to have been expended in the Pennsylvania primary.

They had summoned the principals in this contest as well as their campaign managers and a number of others who were reported to have handled campaign funds. Senator McKinley was unable to respond to a subpoena owing to illness, but Frank L. Smith, who defeated him for the Senatorial nomination, was one of those whom the committee plans to examine this week.

Chairman Reed plans also to call as witnesses officials of the anti-saloon league of Illinois, and officers of other organizations which have contributed money in the Senatorial contest.

PINCHOT SPEAKS BEFORE SESSION OF GOVERNORS

Says United States Is Faced by Three Outstanding Problems Today

Cheyenne, Wyoming, July 26.—(AP)—The United States is faced with three outstanding problems, law enforcement, conservation of natural resources and control of nationwide corporate monopolies, Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, told the twelfth annual conference of Governors in an address today.

He classed law enforcement as the 'moral problem of the nation' and the conservation of natural resources as the greatest economic problem in the United States.

'In dealing with law enforcement there must be no twilight zone between state and federal authorities where the enemies of society might hide themselves and escape punishment,' he said. 'Neither can we suffer the statewide nullification of our national constitution, whether under the guise of a state referendum or by the failure of the state to exercise powers.'

Although the Governor was scheduled to speak particularly on the subject of state finances, he centered his dealings largely on other questions. He attacked Secretary of the Treasury Mellon as 'example of the failure of the federal government to cooperate with the state in allowing the state police of Pennsylvania to inspect breweries under federal permit only during the day time and not at night, when crimes are always committed.'

NEW CINCINNATI CHARTER CHANGES ITS GOVERNMENT

Cincinnati, O., July 26.—(INS)—The city of Cincinnati is revising its charter. Confined that the first charter under which the city launched the commission-manager form of government was not adequate to meet the need, the commission has authorized a re-draft.

Henry Bentley, Robert N. Goran and Robert A. Taft are members of the council making the revision. The new charter will contain sixteen sections embodying changes in the alignment of various departments of the city government.

TRAFFIC EXACTS HEAVY TOLL OF LIFE IN SOUTH

Over 157 Killed and 1,031 Injured in 11 of Southern States Heard From

Traffic exacted a toll of 157 lives and injured 1,031 persons in 11 southern states during the period of June 28 to July 25, inclusive, it was revealed yesterday in a survey conducted over 11 southern states by the Associated Press.

Despite the fact that the peak of the summer period was reached during the period covered and when the automobile driving public was seeking the open for relief from the heat of cities. The total fatalities with the exception of June, was the smallest of any month this year. The June traffic toll was 149 persons killed and 1,140 injured.

More persons were killed and injured during the week ending yesterday than in any week in the month. The total for the past seven days being 46 killed and 258 injured.

CRAWFORD TRIAL CONTINUED TODAY AT ALBEMARLE

Opening Gets Away to Slow Start Because of Heavy Rainfall Last Night

Albemarle, July 26.—(AP)—Delayed in opening because of a heavy rain, the trial of Nevin C. Crawford, charged with the murder of two negro convicts began its third week at eleven o'clock this morning.

J. A. Little, clerk of court, resumed his testimony for the defense where he left off at adjournment Friday. He read from the record of Stanley County Superior Court proceedings showing that the case of Grady Sides was transferred to Rowan County from Stanley in April 1925.

The next witness was Haywood Parker, of Ellerbe Springs, a former guard. He said that he came to testify without summon and told the jury that charges of cruelty to Carl Meadows, a white prisoner, were untrue.

State witnesses testified that Meadows died as the result of cruelty inflicted by Crawford. The reference to Sides was in refutation.

FLORIDA REPUBLICANS TRY TO BREAK IN SOLID SOUTH

Tallahassee, Fla., July 26.—(INS)—Active Republicans are trying to drive a wedge into the political surface of Florida—the southernmost tip of the old 'solid south.'

Party meetings have been held, committees have been formed and arrangements are being made for a Republican meeting in Ocala at which an state-wide program of activity is expected to be worked out and placed under direction of a centralized organization.

Under surface rumblings have been heard from the party during the last two or three years when so many northerners have flocked to this state, but only this summer have the growing murmurs been crystallized into definite action along prepared lines.

NINETEEN LOCKJAW CASES REPORTED IN NEW YORK

Albany, N. Y., July 26.—(INS)—Nineteen cases of lockjaw have been reported in New York State for the first six months of 1926, the State Health Department announced today. This lacks only one of being as many as the total number of cases reported during the entire year of 1925.

MOODY LEADING MA FERGUSON IN TEXAS PRIMARY

Attorney General Leads in Gubernatorial Race by Margin of 109,000 Votes

Dan Moody, Attorney General, maintained a majority of 1,145 over the field in the Democratic gubernatorial race when returns from 238 of the 252 counties in this state, including 56 complete, had been tabulated by the Texas election bureau this morning. The vote then stood Moody 341,091, Ferguson 231,060, Davidson 101,226, Wilman 3,688, Zimmerman 2,109, Johnson 1,863.

Dallas, Texas, July 26.—(AP)—Attorney General Dan Moody, today was leading Governor Miriam A. Ferguson by 109,000 votes and had a majority of 237 in the five contested primary races for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. These figures were based on returns from 238 of 252 counties with 56 complete. Moody must maintain his majority to win the nomination as Texas law provides a run-off primary shall be held if no candidate receives a clear majority in the first primary.

Lynch Davidson, Houston business man, running third, at less than a third of Moody's total and less than half of Governor Ferguson.

Moody's brightened prospects for unopposed nominations stimulated renewed conjecture today as to whether Mrs. Ferguson will execute her promise to resign if Moody leads her by one vote in the primary. Her offer was contingent on Moody's agreement to resign as attorney general if she should lead him by 25,000 votes as she accepted.

Of the 677,327 votes already counted Moody has 338,957, Mrs. Ferguson 230,065, Davidson 100,806, Mrs. Kate M. Johnson 1,861, Mrs. Edith Williams 3,685, and Rev. O. S. Zimmerman 2,983.

Former Governor James E. Ferguson, husband of the governor in a statement Sunday, counseled their supporters not to give up hope, not to concede anything. He said he had been informed of 'irregularities' and that 'the law has been violated' in the polling.

Moody said 'There is no doubt of the success of our cause' and disclaimed 'any delusion that the result is a personal victory.'

'It is,' he asserted, 'the triumph of the principles of free government and democracy in which the people of Texas believe.'

If politicians of the country did not have something to wrangle about, wonder what in the world would happen?

They are talking tariff now.

Cordell Hull, of Tennessee, is doing the talking at the present time. And as he talks, he flays members of the Republican party. He charges them with being directly responsible for high tariff rates. He charges them with the sad plight of the farmer in the west, and enrichment of the manufacturer in the east.

There is always a little bit of truth in every little thing. While this question may assume mountain-like importance to Mr. Hull, it is of little significance to

people in other parts of the world.

The Republican party is supported by many of the richest men in the world of manufacture and industry. It is natural to suppose that when the party is in power its members will enjoy fruits of the victory.

This has always been the case. It will always be the case. The parties are supposed to represent principles. Just what these principles are we do not know, and we don't believe anyone else does. We vote for them because grandfather voted for them, and we will continue to vote for them as long as we continue to have grandfathers and grandmothers to mould policies for us. The tariff may be

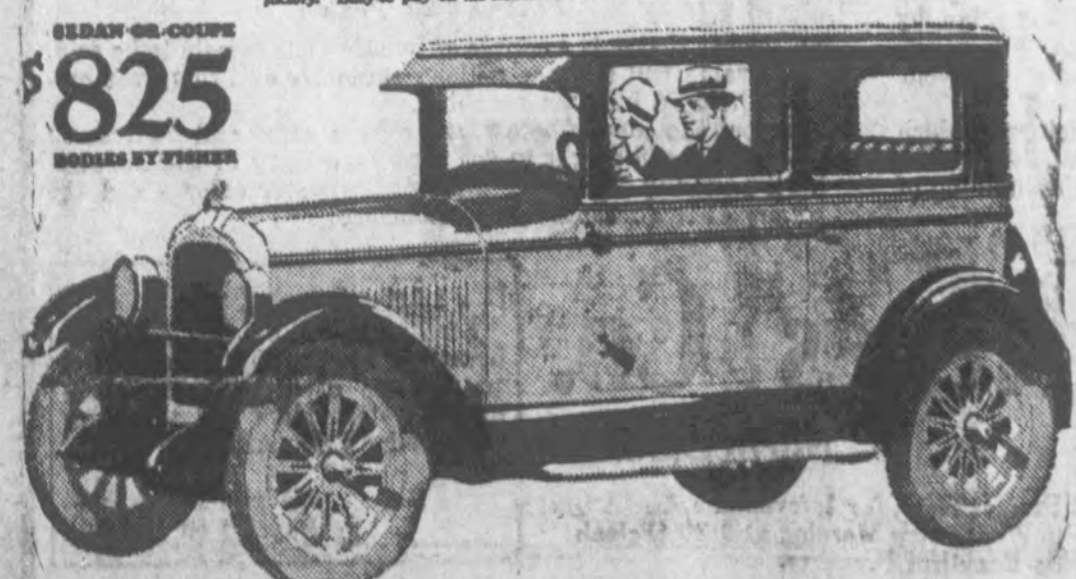

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Berlin, July 26.—(INS)—An International Union of Actors was founded here at the conclusion of the session of the International Actors' Congress after several days' stormy debate on the subject. The new Union includes members of all countries of the world with the exception of Soviet Russia. The Russians insisted on the class-war character of the Union and wanted stage managers not to be admitted to the League. While their viewpoint was backed up by representatives of Austria, Holland and the Czechoslovakian Republic, the majority of the actors rejected the Soviet idea and passed a resolution that the League should be non-partisan and non-political.

An executive committee was elected for two years and charged with the task of calling another congress within two years and collecting a fund for this purpose. About ten cents will be collected from every member of the League. Thus about 3,000 dollars will be collected.

Two American representatives are on the executive committee. 'Dancing girls need not be pretty, at least not those who go in for classical dancing, but they must be personalities,' said Franz Terpis, solo dancer and chief of the Berlin State Opera Choreographic School in an interview with a Berlin paper.

'I have seen many women dancers coming and going but I must say that their beauty has not been the essential ingredient of their art. It's personality that counts. They must be able to dance to a simple major or minor scale.'

Dwelling on the tremendous popularity of dancing in Germany Terpis emphasized that the 'selection of the fittest' is sometimes hard. 'Hopeful mothers bring their four year old babies to me and are convinced that they will become great dancers. You cannot pass a safe judgment on those youngsters. The critical age is fourteen. The candidates have to improve dances according to their own intuition. First they are shy but gradually they get rid of their reservedness and dance, if the 'stuff' is in them at all.

'I want to acquire the finishing touch in boxing, that's why I go to the States. I am not optimistic about getting fights, for I am determined to 'cut from the bottom,' said Franz Diener, heavy-weight champion of Germany, who will sail for America accompanied by his manager and trainer, the Turk Sabri Mahir, in an interview with a Berlin paper.

Diener is 24 years old and the youngest among fourteen sons and girls of a humble Thuringian worker. He won his title on points after a terrific fight against Paul Samson-Koerner, a 42-years-old veteran boxer, who was considered unbeatable for many years. Even after the recent fight for the championship boxing critics disagreed as to who deserved the title.

There is every indication that Germany after the restoration of pre-war hotel accommodations and travelling facilities has resumed her old place as a popular tourist country.

According to reports from German consulates in the United States the number of visas granted to American citizens has increased by about twenty-five percent, as an average, and as compared to 1925 figures. In several instances the percentage is considerably higher, and Boston holds the record with an increase of about sixty percent.

Various summer resorts in Germany also report a large increase in the number of American guests over 1925. The most frequented places are Baden-Baden, Bad Nauheim, and Wiesbaden.

As a rule, Americans do not stay at one and the same place for weeks or so, but the majority of American tourists pay just a 'flying visit' to each individual European country.

Without food, farmers control the real 'necessity of life,' and could operate the greatest monopoly, if they knew how. But that demands organization.

A solemn Republican statesman warns the nation against blocs in the Senate and House. 'First thing you know,' says the warning, 'your Congress will be like the French Chamber of Deputies, cut up into so many parties, sections or blocs that any definite government action will become impossible.'

Many feel that the good old Wall Street bloc should be the only one of any size, and be, in fact, the real Senate—with perhaps some 'radical, law class' opposition. Just enough to make the nation appreciate the smooth work of the big bloc.

CZECH ARMY SUICIDES INCREASED SINCE WAR

Prague, July 26.—(INS)—Suicides among soldiers and officers of the Czech army have known a slight increase in the last four years according to a report of the Minister of War. In the year 1922 the percentage was 6.7 for each 10,000 soldiers in the army of about 75,000 men. Next year it reached 8.04 and in 1924 it was 7.32. Last year it was 8.91 which is unaccountable since the army has been inactive. The suicides in the army are thirty percent greater than for the civil population. Officers represented about twenty percent of the suicides although they are proportionately only about three percent of the army.

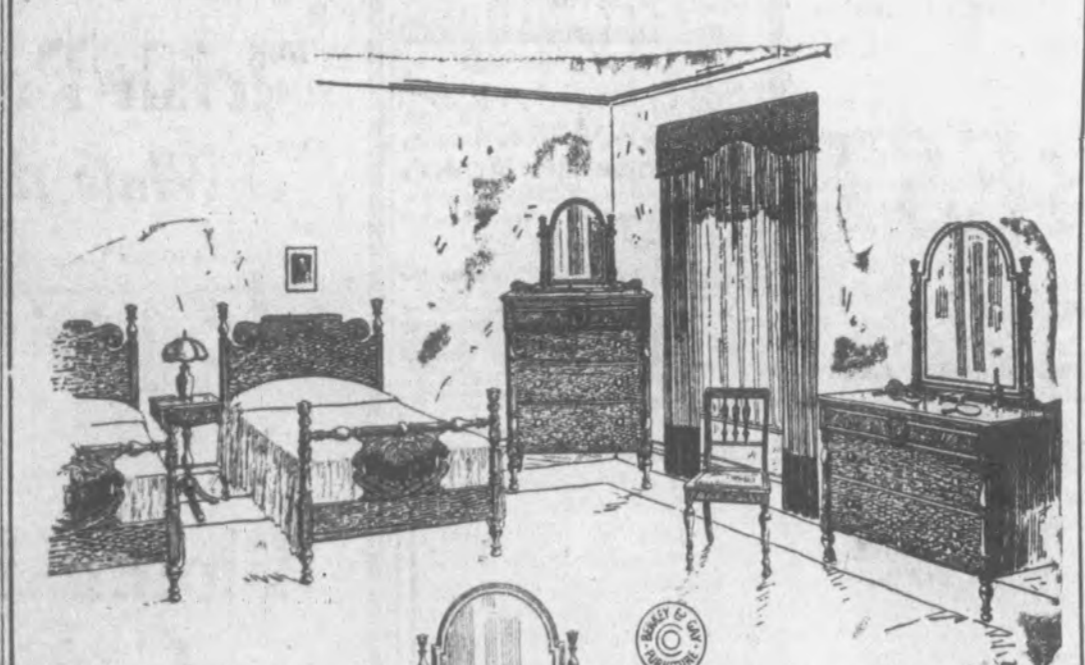

state, at every crossroad and in every nation on earth. Comparison of their earnings with farm earnings in the one state of Kansas may not mean much. Also, if farmers were organized industrially with modern machinery, financially and politically, as well as Standard Oil, their sorrows would diminish. People could, if necessary, do without gasoline. They cannot do
