Bloody Williamson  
Builds Tabernacle  
To Replace Pistols

Cambria, Ill., Aug. 3.—(INS)—"More Gospel, less pistols for Williamson county."

This is the slogan of local men who are constructing a \$7,000 tabernacle, about a mile north of this place, near Herrin, scene of many a bloody battle, which have earned this county the unenviable title of "Bloody Williamson."

The Holiness Association, composed of ministers and laymen of various denominations in the county, is establishing a permanent camp meeting ground, where the tabernacle, a dormitory for visiting evangelists and church workers will be the principal buildings. The camp meeting grounds are to comprise 20 acres of land and from the evangelistic camp as a center, the churchmen expect to extend a greater portion of the southern section of the state.

Rev. Ben Baggett, pastor of the M. E. church, south, has just completed a tour to points as far north as Michigan, and as far south as Florida, raising funds for the enterprise.

It is the purpose of this enterprise to continue the work of evangelism in Williamson county, which was launched by Evangelist Howard S. Williams, the man who was given credit for the restoration of quiet in Herrin last summer following Klan and Anti-Klan rioting.

THREE PERSONS  
FOUND DEAD IN  
MICHIGAN HOMEMystery Surrounds  
Death Of John Bogart,  
His Daughter  
And Her Child.

Blissfield, Mich., Aug. 3.—(AP)—A number of leads today confronted officials attempting to unravel the mystery centered about the death of John Bogart, 50, his daughter, Agnes, 25, and the latter's five year old daughter, Amelia, whose bodies were found in their farm home near here yesterday.

Bogart's body was found hanging by the neck by a rope in the kitchen, and that of the woman and child in a bed room. The child had been poisoned. There were marks on the woman's body indicating that she had been beaten. She also had been poisoned.

The theory that the woman and her father had entered into a suicide pact and had administered poison to the child was investigated following the finding of notes apparently in Bogart's handwriting to the effect that his daughter had committed suicide and that he had decided to end his life in the same manner. The mother had poisoned the child, the note said, but failed to reveal a motive.

An examination of the woman's body, which was marked as though she had been beaten, together with the absence of a motive, tended to refute this theory, the officials said.

Another lead followed was that Bogart may have killed his daughter and granddaughter and then committed suicide. Bogart and the daughter had been at odds because she had refused to break with her fiancé, Joe Smika, to whom he objected, neighbors told the police. Smika and the woman had planned to marry shortly, policemen learned, and Bogart had become enraged when he heard of their plan Friday, threatened to kill his daughter rather than have her become Smika's wife. Smika visited the Bogart home Friday in company with three other men and was ejected by the father.

The incident of his visit is also being looked into by the police. Neighbors said shortly after the arrival of Smika and his companions there were sounds of a violent quarrel. Neither the woman nor the child were seen alive after this. A neighbor of the Bogarts found a note on his doorstep yesterday morning signed with Bogart's name asking him to come to the latter's home at once, "or it will be too late."

The neighbor, Frank Androvick, went to the farm house and discovered Bogart's body. He summoned police, who found the other bodies. A coroner's inquest is scheduled for tomorrow.

Ship's Passengers  
Transferred Today

Vineyard, Haven, Mass., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Fifty passengers and seven stowaways today were taken off the shipping board steamer Governor John Link in the harbor here, and transferred to the New Bedford. The steamer en route to Boston from Santo Domingo, with a cargo of sugar, ran up Hedge Sence Shoal, in a fog yesterday, but was refloated last night. Her fuel was exhausted, however, and she will be forced to remain here until fresh supplies of oil arrive from Boston.

Houston, Texas, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Hearing on the habeas corpus application on Charles Ponzi, wanted by the state of Massachusetts to serve the seven to nine year term as a common to notorious thief was postponed until tomorrow morning when called in district court here today, following Governor Ferguson's order for Ponzi's extradition yesterday, attorneys for the Boston financial wizard pleaded that they wanted time in which to revise their plans.

COOLIDGE BEGINS  
HIS FOURTH YEAR  
OF PRESIDENCYChief Executive Refuses  
To Comment  
On Anniversary At  
Mountain Camp.

Paul Smith, N. Y., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Calvin Coolidge today began his fourth year as president of the United States. The anniversary found him enjoying his long vacation at White Pine Camp, a luxuriously appointed Adirondack estate that contrasts sharply with the simple country farm house in Plymouth, Vermont, where four years ago he took the oath of office.

The president finished his third year as chief executive without commenting on the anniversary. He remained quietly in camp, received two luncheon guests and enjoyed a fishing trip in Osgood lake in the afternoon.

ASTORS RECEIVE  
GLOOMY WELCOME  
ON MAINE COASTSteamer Camden Conveying Party Makes  
Voyage In Midst Of  
Fog and Rain.

Rockland, Me., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Lady Astor and her children had a gloomy welcome to the coast of Maine today so far as the weather was concerned. Soon after leaving Boston the steamer Camden, on which they made the voyage, ran into a fog bank and drizzling rain and grew worse as soon as they neared Maine. The first woman of the British parliament traveled as democratically as any of the other members. Her party remained in their stateroom most of the journey but it was doubtful whether they were able to sleep because the fog siren blew continuously as the steamer nosed its way up the coast.

Landing at Camden they were conveyed by automobile to the Camden Yacht club from where they embarked on a speed boat for the summer home of Lady Astor's sister, Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, at Islesboro.

BARON GARRETT  
MAY BE FORCIBLY  
FED BY DOCTORSHospital Authorities  
Declare Russian  
Nobleman Will Not  
Be Permitted To  
Starve.

Miami, Fla., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Baron Michael Royce - Garrett, whose wife, Vera, leaped to her death from the 18th floor of the Everglade hotel here last Friday night, may be forcibly fed if he persists in his refusal to accept food, hospital authorities said today. Following a coroner's inquest yesterday, at which the baron was exonerated of all responsibility for the death of his wife, the former Russian nobleman was committed to jail for two days at his own request. He declined to explain his reason for requesting confinement and while he has refused to admit he is on a hunger strike, he remained firm in his refusal to accept food.

Police believe the two day confinement will allow him to regain sufficient will power to avert another attempt at suicide. He was found Saturday by police authorities in a tangled thicket north of Miami attempting to hang himself. His inability to climb trees, due to the loss of a leg in the world war frustrated his plans.

The baron told police he and his wife had entered into a suicide pact several years ago under which they were to die together, as they had lived together, should the time come when they were unable to earn a livelihood. Poverty is thought to have been the motive of the suicide of the baroness and the subsequent attempt of the baron to kill himself.

J. L. Jones Dies  
At Home Here

J. L. Jones, 64, employee of the Greenville cotton mill, died yesterday afternoon at 5:30 following a short illness.

Funeral services will be conducted from his late home this afternoon at 6:30 by Rev. L. B. Jones, pastor of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. Interment will follow in Cherry Hill cemetery.

The deceased is survived by a wife and eight children: Mrs. Perry, of Williamston; Mrs. J. L. Jones, of Williamston; Mrs. Alice Harrell, Edenton; Cornelia, May, Martha and Minnie Lee, Greenville.

Mr. Jones had been living in Greenville only two weeks. He was a native of Martin county.

R. F. JENKINS  
PASSES AWAY AT  
HOME IN GRIFTONWell Known Business  
Man To Be Buried  
At Grifton This Afternoon.

R. F. Jenkins, one of the best known business men of Grifton, died yesterday afternoon following a stroke of paralysis. He had been in ill health for some time, but his death came as a distinct shock to the community.

Funeral services will be conducted from his late home this afternoon by the pastor of the Christian church of Grifton, of which the deceased was a member. Interment will be made in the Grifton cemetery.

Bob Jenkins, as he was affectionately known by hundreds of friends throughout the county, was born at Ridge Springs, a short distance from Grifton. At an early age his people moved to the little town situated along the banks of Moccasin river. It was there Bob Jenkins was reared.

And it was from there he went a few years later to graduate from the University of North Carolina, and to become head of the department of mathematics of that institution. He later returned to Grifton and entered the general merchandise business.

The deceased is survived by a wife and one child. He was a member of the Masonic order, and will be buried with all honors of the organization. He was a devoted member of the Christian church, which he attended regularly, until illness prevented him from doing so.

JOURNEY OF HOLY CARPET  
FROM CAIRO TO MEDINA  
ABANDONED THIS YEAR

Cairo, Aug. 3.—(INS)—This year's journey of the Holy Carpet from Cairo to Medina has been abandoned because of the rioting which the appearance of the carpet has caused along the way.

After much ceremony the carpet was started on its long and slow journey under strong escort. Its appearance at almost every town was the signal for fighting among the rival religiousists and several people were killed.

When nearing Arafat the carpet escort was itself attacked by a party of Bedouins. Several soldiers and pilgrims were killed and some were wounded which resulted in the government at Cairo ordering the carpet to be brought back to Cairo and this year's pilgrimage abandoned.

The Bedouins attacked the carpet because they objected to the slow and mournful music played by the bands accompanying it.

Welcome the Air Flivver.  
A New Fatima.  
Mexico's Crisis.  
Wrecking As a Habit.

Some are old at twenty-five, some at seventy, some NEVER. Henry Ford, young at 63, celebrated his birthday on Friday by exhibiting a small "air-flivver," which he hopes to produce in quantities, at a price as low as his own Ford car or lower.

The midget flying machine dart planned for 85 miles an hour, weighs 350 pounds, has a wing spread of 22 feet, and a 15 foot fuselage.

It is a single seater, and five million young Americans will eagerly await the chance to get it. Ford hopes to cut the weight from 350 to 310 pounds by substituting a Ford-made two cylinder engine for the three cylinder French engine used experimentally.

You can now buy one of the big flying machines, each with three engines and developing six hundred horsepower for about \$30,000. An intelligent young man could make a good living with one of those machines. Not run by a "stunt" performer, they would be as safe as an old rockaway family.

President Coolidge expresses great confidence in the development of commercial aviation in the United States. But what about the government, and what about fast fighting planes in case we have a war?

Mr. Ford is rich but neither Mr. Coolidge nor the people of the United States want to depend upon him entirely to defend this country in case of trouble. Uncle Sam isn't exactly a pauper and he isn't supposed to be a poor idiot, without initiative.

When you see the name Fatima, you think of some Oriental lady with wide hips, large rolling eyes, well blackened at the edges, low forehead, and a generally heavy build, draped in loose clothing, spread out on a divan, or languidly beating tom-tom to attract your attention and your time.

Kemal Pasha has changed that. Fatima in this days' Turkish news, has bobbed hair, wears men's clothes, two revolvers and two daggers, and directed a band of men terrorizing villages in the Taurus mountains. It's a long step from the harem and the archaic chief enuch to female bob-haired banditry.

Calles, the Mexican President, evidently believes he has enough Mexicans with him to put through his anti-Catholic legislation. He cannot have a majority, since an overwhelming majority of Mexicans are Catholics. Possibly, he thinks there is enough fighting power in his minority, which includes organized labor, to carry through his plans.

To criticism from Rome and elsewhere Calles replies by deporting the Pope's envoy as an "inconvenient."

Pope Plus, still refrains from placing Mexico under an interdict, although that step is urged to concentrate attention on the Mexican situation. Monsignor Crespi, the Pope's envoy, just deported, Italian by birth, an American citizen, will come to New Jersey.

Washington reports that this government will make no representations to Mexico in connection with laws forbidding religious teaching in schools and confiscating church property. No property of American citizens being involved, it is said there is no cause for intervention by the United States.

Protestant denominations take differing views of Mexico's fight on the Catholic church. A weekly newspaper published by Protestant Episcopal authorities denounce Calles as an enemy of religion. And asks Episcopalians to pray with Roman Catholics against the Mexican church laws.

On the other hand Bishop Geo. A. Miller, resident bishop of the Methodist Church in Mexico in a statement issued through the Board of Methodist Missions describes President Calles and his laws against the Catholic Church as "heroically facing a difficult situation." According to the Methodist Bishop, Calles is fighting a century of effort by the Catholic church to gain political control of Mexico.

The London Times wonders why Mexico can gain by stifling religion. "The overwhelming majority of Mexicans being illiterate, deriving their only ideas of morality and religion from the Catholic Church," the Times wonders that Mexico should deprive these people of their one controlling influence.

CALLES REFUSES  
TO GRANT TRUCE  
TO CATHOLICSMexican President  
Declares Govern-  
ment Will Enforce  
Laws of Country.

Mexico City, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The proposal of the Catholic Archbishop for a truce in the religious situation has been declined by President Calles, but peace maneuvers continue behind the scenes. Considerable hope exists that they will result in some progress toward ending the great deadlock now existing between the government and the Catholic church in Mexico.

President Calles in rejecting the proposal of the Archbishop declared "The Federal government will only limit itself to act with the required energy to enforce the laws of this country."

Added strength to the hand of President Calles in enforcing the new religious regulations was seen in the statement given to the Associated Press in Nogales, Arizona, by Forman President Obregon, a potential presidential candidate, in the 1928 election, declared it was evident that the dignitaries of the Catholic church has provoked conflict when the mouth of their exalted representative, the Archbishop of Mexico, at first made public declarations with an evident rebellious spirit with the fundamental laws in force.

What is considered here a virtual protest by United States Consul General Wetzel, has been deposited with the department of state. It concerns the taking over by the Mexican government of the Episcopal church of San Jose, Del Gracia, last Saturday night. A Mexican, rector acting under jurisdiction of Bishop Frank W. Creighton, had been in charge of the church which has been owned by the Episcopal church since 1807. It is officially indicated both in Mexican and American quarters that the situation probably will be amicably adjusted without having recourse in diplomatic exchanges.

Dr. Baker Urges  
World Meeting To  
Study Coal Uses

Pittsburgh, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Dr. Thomas Baker, president of the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, is now in Europe endeavoring to secure the co-operation of British, French and German scientists in his plan for an international effort to determine the best uses of coal. Dr. Baker has invited the European scientists to attend a conference at Pittsburgh in November when means of utilizing coal to the best advantage will be discussed.

Conversations with German scientists have impressed Dr. Baker with the progress being made there in investigating the possibilities of coal.

"I am interested particularly," he said in an interview, "in the questions of power, low temperature carbonization, the complete gasification and liquefaction of coal, and in special chemical development."

The efforts of Professor Fischer and Dr. Bergius in Germany are sensationally striking. Proceeding from two different methods, they are able to produce a substitute for gasoline from coal. It is impossible to forecast at the moment what their results will lead to, but the prospects are distinctly hopeful.

"Both Great Britain and the United States have much to gain from the campaign to obtain a hundred per cent of what coal will yield. In America there is an over-production of bituminous coal. It is so cheap there that the premium on economy is not high. That is all the more reason why new uses should be discovered and coal made more valuable than it is now."

The campaign of the Carnegie Institute is one of public enlightenment. The aim is to render a service to humanity in general and to industry in particular.

WOMAN FAILS  
IN ATTEMPT TO  
SWIM CHANNELBelle Barrett Taken  
Out of Water of Eng-  
lish Channel In Ex-  
hausted Condition.

Dover, England, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Miss Clara Belle Barrett, of New Rochelle, N. Y., failed in her attempt to swim the English channel. She got within two miles of Cape Griz Nez, France, when she had to be taken out of the water. She was in an exhausted condition. Miss Barrett started her swim from here Monday morning at 8 o'clock. It was 5:35 o'clock this morning when she was forced to give up the swim that no woman has ever yet made. She was in the water for 21 hours and 36 minutes. Shortly after she had been taken from the water into the conveying launch, Miss Barrett said: "I am sorry I have failed like this."

Big Hooch Plant  
Taken in Chicod  
Section Monday

A steam distilling outfit, fifteen gallons of hooch and five thousand gallons of beer, were captured by county officials in Chicod township yesterday afternoon. The plant was one of the largest and most complete captured in this section in quite a while.

The raiding party consisted of Sheriff Whitehurst and Deputies Sellers and Pierce. Operators were at the still shortly before the officers arrived. They made their escape after being warned by outposts.

Mansel Thanks  
N. C. Governor

Raleigh, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Governor McLean and Commissioner of Pardons Sink, received a joint letter today from Obie Mansel, father of Alvin Mansel, whom the Governor saved from the electric chair last month. The father thanked the officials for what had been done for the son and expressed the hope that some day more would be done for the young negro. He expressed faith in God that everything would come out all right and for the best.

Industrial Struggle  
In Britain Widens  
Cleavage In Labor

London, Aug. 3.—(INS)—The increased intensity of the industrial struggle in Great Britain during the past few months, in addition to revealing clearly the gulf between the communist party and the labor party, has widened within the labor party itself the cleavage which has always existed between the moderates and the extremists.

As the leader of the moderates and the official head of the party, J. Ramsay MacDonald, as the chief spokesman for His Majesty's opposition in the house of commons, has had reasonable success since he ceased to be prime minister in enforcing party discipline and in keeping his laborites from breaking up into a number of separate groups, according to their individual theories of politics and economics.

To do that has been the accomplishment of a trained and expert political manager, and if MacDonald is not a clever politician he is nothing. Out of a membership of 615 in the house, the labor party has a representation of 152, drawn from nearly every class of society, and including a strong and vociferous delegation of socialists, who, if not fully sympathetic with the socialism of Russia are impatient with Great Britain's slow movement toward the promised socialist millennium under the leadership of MacDonald.

They would like, therefore, to throw MacDonald out and to put in his place a representative of the Left Wing to make the labor party more aggressive, more socialistic and more expressive of the extremist element of the trade unions.

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**THIS BUSINESS OF BEING OURSELVES**

How many people are there in these days and times who try to be themselves?

How many of them are able to do away with ordinary deceptions and artificialities of modern life and be simply what God and nature meant them to be?

Dr. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Greenville, speaking at the union services here Sunday night, said there is not enough individuality expressed by men and women of today. He said we are inclined to follow the crowd and do what they do.

He spoke a truth which has become more evident with each succeeding day.

We live in an era when men and women are doing everything possible to fashion their lives along the same lines of some celebrity. It matters not to what realm the celebrity may soar, there are those who would endeavor to copy his way of doing things.

And right here, now, is where they lose their individuality. Right here is where they forget that they have talents of their own—talents, which if properly developed, would distinguish them as much from the crowd as the celebrity is distinguished from the masses.

Ralph Waldo Emerson, in his great essay on "Self-Reliance," says, "To believe that what is true for you in your own private heart, is true for all men—that is genius. Speak your latent conviction and it shall become the universal sense. For the inmost in due time becomes the outmost, and our first thought is rendered back to us by the trumpets of the last judgment."

This great writer had a deep insight into life. He had watched the developments of public thought in all walks of life. And when he wrote, he spoke from a mass of information gathered from contact with men and women of the wonderful era in which he lived. He knew that all human achievement resulted from the man or woman who broke away from the beliefs and superstitions of the time in which they lived, and gave fearless expression to the things they believed to be right and proper.

The lives of all great men remind us of what may be accomplished through a desire to serve humanity. No great good can ever be realized by anyone unless they are armed in the cause of

righteousness. There is no cause as righteous as the cause of humanity. And the man or woman armed in this cause will find the way opened to greater possibilities.

**NORTH CAROLINA LEADS—EVEN IN TRAFFIC FATALITIES**

North Carolina led eleven other southern states in traffic fatalities the last two weeks.

While this is to be deplored, it is not so bad after all.

When we consider that North Carolina has a system of roads comparing favorably with any other state in the south, it is short of remarkable that accidents are not more numerous and more destructive to life and property. It must also be considered that this state is becoming one of the most prominent of summer and winter resorts. Thousands of people not acquainted with our traffic laws visit the state during both seasons of the year. Therefore, it is easy to believe that a large number of accidents result from lack of familiarity with traffic regulations and general road conditions.

We are not trying to extenuate the situation, however. We are not adverse to the imperfect traffic regulations existing in numbers of our largest towns and cities. We are perfectly willing to admit our shortcomings in this direction, and have expressed hope from time to time that improvements would soon be made.

The majority of hard surfaced roads throughout the state are carefully patrolled by officers. Signs have been erected to guide the traveler not familiar with various routings. But, with all of these, there is plenty room for bettering the situation.

The public must be impressed with the necessity of obeying the regulations provided by the cities and states. With the best of systems no good results could be obtained without the co-operation of the public. And there is no way of making the public obey except by strictly enforcing the laws in the communities they affect.

When the reckless driver of automobiles realizes that he will be punished according to the extent of the crime then and then alone will he be ready to stop speeding and infringing upon the rights of the public. When he is convinced the law is no respecter of persons, he will be ready to carry out to the last letter the various laws regarding traffic.

North Carolina is leading the country in many things. But this business of leading in death by traffic accidents is not to be favorably considered. It is to be hoped officials of the various towns will rigidly enforce the law, and do away with death by accident if possible.

**BRITISH CENSUS FIGURES SHOW SURPLUS OF WOMEN**

London, Aug. 3.—(INS)—Complete census statistics for the year 1924 shows that there were still nearly two million surplus women in England and Wales at that time.

In June, 1924, the population of England and Wales was estimated at 38,746,000 persons, 18,545,000 being males and 20,201,000 females.

The marriage rate was 15.3 per thousand, a slight increase over previous years.

Florida Finances  
In Good Condition

Tallahassee, Fla., Aug. 3.—(INS)  
—The state government of Florida  
is in an exceptionally strong po-  
sition financially, fiscal year sta-  
tistics just compiled reveal.

The assessed valuation of Flori-  
da property to be taxed this year  
is approximately \$778,000,000 as  
compared with a total of \$620,000,  
000 last year.

The tax rate applicable on this  
year's valuation is 7 1-2 mills, com-  
pared with 10 1-2 mills last year.  
The 20 per cent reduction was an-  
nounced by Governor John W.  
Martin after conferences with the  
state comptroller, treasurer and  
tax equalizer.

The balance in the state treas-  
ury on June 30, 1926, when the last  
fiscal year ended, was \$17,065,-  
317.32. This represents an in-  
crease of about two million dol-  
lars during the last month of the  
fiscal year.

The state has no bonded debt,  
except \$901,507 of per cent re-  
funding bonds held by the public  
education funds.

The state road department alone  
has a balance in the treasury of  
more than six million dollars, with  
a highway construction program  
under way costing approximately  
\$16,250,000.

There is a treasury balance of  
\$2,222,493.18 in the general govern-  
mental expense fund.
