FREE WILL CHURCH FAILS TO SUPPORT ACTION OF PASTOR

Decline Resolutions Prohibiting Indulgence in Questionable Amusements

The Greenville Free Will Baptist Church in special session last evening declined to receive at this time the resolution presented by the pastor recently to the official board, after a lengthy discussion. The resolution would have subjected to suspension members of the church who engage in gambling, attend places classed as "places of questionable amusement," or visited swimming resorts or engaged in secular work, except of necessity on the Lord's Day. The resolution would have also demanded attendance of members annually at the church conferences and financial support for good standing, but the fight centered around the clauses referring to amusements.

The pastor of the church, Rev. L. E. Ballard, appealed in the defense of the passage of the resolution while the leader of the floor of the opposition was E. D. Griffin, a member of the official board and teacher in the Sunday School. The chief contention of the opposition was that the resolution tended to use coercion in religion, while the defense maintained that the resolution was just a simplified statement of the requirements of the New Testament, and was to serve as a standard for members of the church; the defense contending that the resolution was in keeping with examples set by the Free Will Baptist denomination in the past. The opposition contended that the resolution would tend to cripple the strength of the church in members, while the defense argued that the moral and spiritual strength gained would offset the loss.

The final action of the church was to table until after the beginning of the next conference year and then indefinitely take action on the resolution. This was carried by a large majority of the membership.

When questioned as to his future attitude regarding the matter, Mr. Ballard stated that the action of the church ties up the question until the next conference year begins, Oct. 1, but that he intends appearing before the church as a member at the first conference thereafter, and offer the resolution a second time. "I shall pray and fight to the last for that resolution, or at least for that part setting a moral standard for members of the church," and meet defeat with a clear conscience, if it comes.

The pastor issued the following statement this morning for distribution among members of the church:

However the fight is ended, I proudly greet the victor comes, with fluttering flag or prancing bag.

Or echoing roll of drums: Still Truth proclaims this motto, In letters of living light: No question is ever settled, Until it is settled right.

The above is the only comment I have to offer upon the action of our church last evening. Nor shall I attempt to defend myself from the personal attacks made during the discussion. All thinking people know that the spirit of Christ does not lend Christians to evade an issue by resorting to public personal abuse, and I leave the defense of my character in the hands of God. I am saying only that in my heart there is no ill will toward anyone, and I am urging as I ever have my church to prayer, unselfish prayer, at the altar of God. There is the best place to win victories after all. I am urging that all who love the Lord and the cause of this church at tend the service Sunday morning.

SAY, BOYS!

Wild, Happy Day. She Honors the U. S. A. 3 Years of Coolidge. Typical, But Useful. By ARTHUR BRISBANE

A wild stock market yesterday, very pleasing to the bulls, nearly 3,000,000 shares sold. General Motors climbed up twelve points, scoring a new high price for all time, \$213.50.

United States steel climbed 53-8 points, establishing a new high price at \$152.50.

At intervals for the last three months, readers of this column have been warned against selling short, and told that there would not be any summer slump in the American securities.

But don't GAMBLE; you cannot win at it. Those that make money in Wall Street are on the inside, and know what is going to happen.

Miss Clara Belle Barrett, public school teacher of New Rochelle, N. Y., honors her country. She didn't swim the English Channel, but she did keep on swimming for twenty-one hours, covering forty miles, falling in her attempt by only two miles. She swam through fog and swam on after the boat accompanying her got lost in the fog.

Try to imagine twenty-one hours' swimming against a heavy current, waves breaking in your face constantly, fog bewildering you. The guiding boat lost sight. But for the fog Miss Barrett undoubtedly would have been the first woman to swim the English Channel.

Calvin Coolidge has just finished his third year as President of the United States. If conditions continue as they have been during his three years in the White House, and if prosperity continues as it is, what chance is there of beating Calvin Coolidge in 1928?

Wages are up, taxes are down, government receipts are up, the cost of living is down. The President doesn't claim the credit. He says: "No government can make prosperity."

One thing is certain. President Coolidge has not prevented rising prosperity from RISING, and that is something in these days.

Lady Astor, brilliant Virginia girl, who showed British women the way into Parliament, is here, spreading views and advice, as she should. She despises 'typical' people, by which presumably, she means the average. Very brilliant, no more 'typical' than Olympus, mother of Alexander. Lady Astor does not realize that 'typical' people are the solid substance of which the human race is made, and a substance necessary.

A man seeking for gold despises ordinary rocks and soil. But gold would be worth nothing if ordinary rock and soil were lacking. Lady Astor should thank the dull background that heightens her radiance.

The Reverend Mr. Moss, evangelist, preaching near Borsanown, Kentucky, toppled over and died in his pulpit. And Mrs. Robertson, sitting in the front row of a choir, was shot, and died in an hour. The bullets were fired through a window. One report suggests jealousy. Another attributes the killing to bootleggers annoyed by the Evangelist's hostile attitude. They say the killing of the woman was accidental.

The other day in Texas a clergyman who had attacked the city government shot and killed a man who called upon him to renounce. New York and New Jersey discuss an extraordinary murder case, revived after four years of silence. That of the Rev. Mr. Hall, Episcopal clergyman, found shot to death under an old crab-apple tree, with Mrs. Mills, a member of his choir, murdered beside him.

In connection with the last case, Senator Simpson, special prosecutor, says 'shameful negligence' was shown in the case originally, and the case was treated in a way that ought to satisfy any murderer.

The general attitude of the law toward criminals in this country seems to be of a kind that 'ought to satisfy any criminal.'

PONZI WILL BE TURNED OVER TO MASSACHUSETTS

Judge Ashe Refuses Application for Habeas Corpus Proceedings

Houston, Texas, Aug. 5.—(AP)—District Judge Charles Ashe today refused application of Charles Ponzi, of Boston, for a writ of habeas corpus. Ponzi was ordered turned over to the Massachusetts authorities.

Ponzi's attorney however, gave immediate appeal to the court of criminal appeal, which is to meet in Austin next October.

Ponzi faces a seven to nine year prison term in Massachusetts for fraud. The effect of the appeal, if prosecuted, will be to keep Ponzi in Houston until the higher court renders an opinion. In the face of the appeal Massachusetts authorities are powerless to remove him from the state.

MRS. THIGPEN DIES AT SPEED

Mrs. T. A. Thigpen, 76, native and former resident of Pitt county, died last night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. B. F. Shelton, at Speed.

The funeral services will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock at the home of her son, A. L. Thigpen, near Penny Hill. Interment will be at the family cemetery there.

The deceased is survived by one daughter and six sons; Mrs. B. F. Shelton; L. B. Thigpen, Boston; A. L. Thigpen, Concord; Latham, Richmond; Thad, Mount Oliv.; Julius, Rocky Mount; J. F., Williamston. She is also survived by several grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

Mrs. Thigpen, before her marriage, was Miss Pat Parker, daughter of the late Hardy Parker, of this county, and lived at the home place near Penny Hill until the death of her husband, several years ago. She was widely known in this county as a Christian woman who did much good and lived a righteous life.

CATHOLIC PRIEST TODAY SUSPENDED FROM PRIESTHOOD

Father Anguiano, Priest of Vera Cruz, Says He Did Not Intend to Rebel

Mexico City, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Father Disas Anguiano, the Catholic priest of the State of Vera Cruz, who accepted President Calles' government religious regulation, has been excommunicated and suspended from the priesthood.

The Manifesto issued in connection with the excommunication, urges the clergy and Catholics generally to pray for father Anguiano's conversion saying he is 70 years old and that he probably has not many years to live. Dispatches from Vera Cruz say that Father Anguiano asserts that he did not intend to rebel against the church, that he merely desires to point out his belief that the Holy See had been misinformed regarding the religious situation because the government regulations did not attack the church.

Simpson Boy Badly Hurt By Mule Kick

Leo Tucker, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Tucker, of Simpson, was brought to the offices of Drs. Skinner and Smith this morning suffering from a concussion of the brain believed to have resulted from being kicked by a mule.

The little fellow was found lying by the roadside near the home of his parents in an unconscious condition, with an ugly wound slightly above the temple. He had been driving an unruly mule, hitched to a tobacco truck. It is presumed that the mule kicked him.

MANY CHILDREN TRANSPORTED TO SCHOOLS IN N. C.

State Ranked Fourth in Number Children Transported Past Session

Raleigh, Aug. 5.—(AP)—North Carolina ranked fourth in the country in the number of children being transported to schools at the end of the last school year points out a current issue of School Facts. This state afforded transportation for 69,295 pupils. Only Indiana, Ohio and Mississippi surpassed.

Reports from school officials of Indiana showed that state in the lead, operating 3,790 buses and transporting 122,926 children. The vehicles averaged 52,000 miles, daily and operated at a cost during 1924-25 of \$3,790,181.57.

Ohio used 3,942 vehicles for public transportation, 1,547 of which were horse-drawn, and transported 109,280 children during 1924-25. The cost for the year was \$2,482,901.

North Carolina, ranking fourth operated 1,909 buses, transporting 69,295 children at an annual cost of \$14,92 each.

Other states transporting children to schools are Georgia, Iowa, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Alabama, Michigan, Nebraska, Tennessee and Texas.

MILLION DOLLAR GARAGE PLANNED FOR MEMPHIS

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 4.—(AP)—A million dollar garage will be constructed at Front street and Court avenue in the near future. This building will be one of the largest garages in the city and will be owned by the National Garage Company, of Detroit.

CALLES SAYS HE IS DETERMINED TO ENFORCE LAW

Mexican President Reiterates Intention to Stand by the Government

Mexico City, Aug. 5.—(AP)—President Calles again has reiterated the intention of his government to "enforce without fearing interdicts of supernatural punishment," the Mexican constitutional provision regarding religion.

President Calles replied to this effect in a telegram from Augusto B. Leguia, President of Peru, requesting re-establishment of harmony between the Mexican government and the Catholic church.

The Mexican executive said he would consider Leguia's telegram a personal expression and as not employing intervention by a foreign power in Mexico's purely domestic affairs.

"Evidently," the message to the Peruvian President added, "your Excellency has not received truthful reports of the Mexican government's attitude regarding the Catholic clergy, as otherwise your opinion would be unhesitatingly favorable to the Mexican government viewpoint."

The clergy, in accordance with its traditional conduct which throughout history has unchained so many serious calamities in Mexico, both social and political, "If God is the supreme manifestation of good, both in individual and nations, I do not believe in this instance he has sided with those who for more than a century have been responsible in Mexico for internal calamities, international invasions and intrigue as well as unrest in the conscience of the people."

CARP SAYS DEMPSEY WILL BEAT TUNNEY

Los Angeles, Aug. 5.—(INS)—Jack Dempsey should successfully defend his heavyweight title against Gen. Tunney, leading white contender, Georges Carpentier, former world's light heavyweight champion, declared today. Carpentier is touring Southern California on a vaudeville circuit preparatory to starting training for his Labor Day scrap with Eddie Hoffman at Tijuana.

Carpenter is entitled to a selection, at least, since both Jack and Tunney have socked him on the chin.

"Of course," Carpenter explained, "I am thinking of the Dempsey I met in 1921 and the Tunney I fought two years ago. I do not believe that Dempsey is in poor physical condition. When I saw him at Colorado Springs recently he looked as supber as he did when I met him in Jersey City. Of course, the long lay-off may reasonably be expected to have dimmed his fighting judgment, but I still think he's good enough to beat Tunney."

Dempsey will miss Jack Kearns his former manager, when the times comes for the championship bout with Tunney, Carpenter declared.

WETS ARE VICTORIOUS IN MISSOURI PRIMARY; KU KLUX KLAN LOSES

ISSUE WARRANTS FOR TWO ARRESTS IN HALL MURDER

Nellie Russell, Negress, and Man to Be Held for Complicity in Case

Somerville, N. J., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Warrants for two more arrests in connection with the murder four years ago of Rev. E. W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, were today in the hands of Assistant Attorney General Simpson, following what he described as an amazing story by a new witness.

One warrant charges a man frequently mentioned in the case with being an accessory to the murder. Mr. Simpson said he would recommend this man be held without bail when arrested. The other named Nellie I. Russell, a negress, as a material witness, informed of the warrant, she waited most of last night on her front porch about three quarters of a mile from the crab apple tree under which the bodies were found to be arrested. Her husband spent most of the night playing cards with newspaper men on the ground under the headlights of half a dozen automobiles.

Newspaper men also watched the home of the man named in the warrant. The Russell woman's testimony in the previous investigation did much to discredit that of Mrs. Jane Gibson, who swore that she saw Mrs. Hall bending over the two bodies. The woman, after a conversation with attorneys for the slain man's widow, now on bail, charged with the murder, made affidavit that at the time in question, Mrs. Gibson was at the Russell home discussing a stray dog.

JOHN BROWNE KILLS HIMSELF PHILADELPHIA

Philadelphia, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A man who had registered as "John Browne, of Boston, Mass.," which name is believed by the police to have been fictitious, committed suicide today by jumping from the sixth floor of the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. He was killed instantly.

Before making the leap, the man had removed all means of identification from his clothing, police said.

WOMAN LAWYER TAKES CASE OF A CONVICT MURDERER TO S. COURT

Tallahassee, Fla., Aug. 5.—(INS)—An appeal to the state supreme court, from a verdict of guilty and a sentence of life imprisonment in a second degree murder case, was argued before the justices of Florida's highest tribunal by a woman—the first feminine attorney ever to make formal appearance before the court.

She is Miss Effie Knowles, a member of the Miami bar, young, pretty, modestly dressed, wearing bobbed hair and a self-made lawyer. She is the sixth attorney to take the case of the convicted man in charge, five masculine lawyers previously having counseled her client only to drop the case or be dropped by the client.

The appeal is based on half-splitting technicalities of jurisprudence. Miss Knowles alleged that her client, T. E. Fuller, never was formally arraigned on the murder charge as far as the court records show. There is a notice of arraignment written on the back of the indictment returned against him by a grand jury, but anyone might have written that there, the woman told the supreme court.

Another point stressed by the woman attorney was that a former co-defendant with Fuller never was prosecuted.

Reports From Six States Shows Wet Factions Claiming Lead; Four Republicans and One Democrat Renominated in West Virginia

Kansas City, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Victory for the wets in Missouri and apparently crushing defeat of Ku Klux Klan supporters in Kansas, appeared today as the outstanding result of Tuesday's primary election in six states.

In Oklahoma, where the Klan was considered an open issue in one major state contest, the order's reputed candidate led, while the wet faction claimed the edge in Montana.

With Congressional elections holding interest in two southern states, West Virginia returns indicated the renomination of five of the state's fixed representatives to Congress, four of whom were Republicans and one a Democrat. Representative Woodard, Republican of the fourth district was not a candidate. Returns indicated the nomination of Representative James A. Hughes for Woodard's place. Representative Joseph T. D. Democrat of Virginia, had a substantial lead in the one Congressional contest, nine incumbents being unopposed.

Renomination of three Republican Senators was contested when they assumed commanding pluralities, with returns nearly complete. Senator George H. Williams, of Missouri, raced his avowed dry opponents by large margins for the long and short term nomination. Senator W. J. Harrell easily led in the Oklahoma balloting and Senator Charles Curtin, Republican floor leader, had little opposition in Kansas.

Former Congressman Harry B. Hawes, St. Louis wet Democrat increased his lead in late returns to oppose Senator Williams in November. Late Oklahoma returns widened the gap in the Democratic Senatorial race in which Jack C. Walton, deposed Governor, trailed Congressman Elmer Thomas by more than 11,000 votes. In Kansas, Charles Stephens, of Columbus led two opponents for this nomination by a narrow margin.

SEMPLE CASE DUE AIRING

Los Angeles, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The views of both the Los Angeles county grand jury and District Attorney Keyes, on the Alvin Sempé, McPherson disappearance mystery, were due for an airing when the inquisitorial body reconvenes here today.

Foreman William H. Carter announced that the grand jury had reduced its findings to writing and that an open letter would be transmitted to the prosecutor. Keyes has drafted a statement covering the entire case which he is expected to release today.

COUE'S DEATH ENDS CULT ACTIVITIES IN AUSTRIA

Vienna, Aug. 5.—(INS)—The death of M. Emil Coue, the great exponent of auto-suggestion, has been the death of his cult in Austria. The French psychologist had hardly been dead a week when the two Coue societies of the capital decided that the death of the Master as sixty-three was too heavy a blow for the cult and its disbanding. Not, however, before urging members to new-life modified Coueism within the home, especially among children, but to send for the doctor when needed.

Coueism became popular in Austria four years ago and at one time the societies had almost 20,000 members. Lately it had dropped to half.

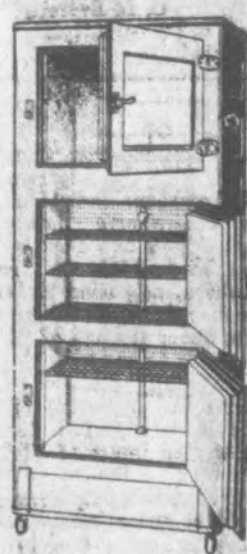

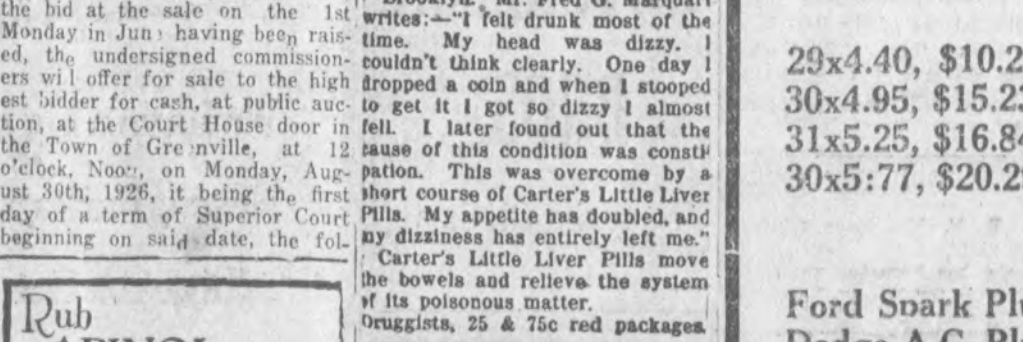

LAWYERS PLAN FINAL MOVE TO SAVE R. SCOTT

Every Effort Being Made to Save Canadian Financier From the Gallows; Additional Funds Are Expected to Pour in As Result of Robert Scott's Confession That He Did the Killing

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 5.—(INS)—The next move of attorneys on the checkboard of legal procedure to save Russell Scott, sentenced to die on the gallows October 15 at Chicago for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a drug clerk, is being awaited with great interest by those interested in criminal procedure.

William Scott Stewart is Scott's attorney and is making every effort to save the former Canadian financier from the gallows.

Additional funds are expected to pour into the Scott defense fund as a result of the confession of Robert Scott, Russell's brother, that he fired the shot killing Maurer.

Another appeal to the state supreme court is the expected maneuver from Stewart. The supreme court already has had the case before it on three different occasions. It has passed on Scott's trial and conviction and affirmed the jury's verdict against him. When the case comes up again it will be for a review of the jury finding that Scott had recovered from mental trouble for which he was sent to Chester penitentiary hospital, staying off a sentence of hanging.

The hearing of this case was before Judge Morris Kavanagh at Chicago, and probably will be based on the fact that Scott was denied a change of venue when the hearing was held. If the supreme court sustains this finding, Scott's only hope is in a direct appeal for clemency to Governor Len Small.

The pardon board heard Scott's plea prior to denial of clemency by the governor before Russell was found insane and there is nothing new to be offered to it. It was asserted at that hearing that Robert Scott had fired the fatal shot, but at that time he had not been located. His confession, therefore, offers nothing new to the board.

Robert Scott's confession, of course, will have no bearing on the appeal in the insanity hearing. If taken to the supreme court, had this confession been made at an earlier date it might have been offered to the court as newly discovered evidence in asking a new trial for Robert Scott.

Robert Scott has been sentenced to a life term for his part in the murder of Maurer.

AUSTRIA MAKES PROFIT ON TOBACCO MONOPOLY

Vienna, Aug. 5.—(INS)—The Austrian government last year credited its exchequer with 167,093,757 shillings (\$23,870,536) as the profit of the state monopoly on tobacco. For a country in the throes of trade depression and unemployment the figure is remarkable. It represents a profit of almost four dollars for every man, woman and child in the country.

As a tobacco manufacturer government is eminently successful belying the common conception of governmental control. The industry is by far the most flourishing in the country, employing factories and licensing more than 15,000 shops.

The profits for last year are about ten per cent greater than the year before. About seventy-eight per cent is represented by the profit on cigarettes.

THE POWER BEHIND PROGRESS

IN the Fall of 1923 an odd form of calamity befell New York City. It was not an "Act of God." Fire, flood or famine did not threaten. There was neither rumor of war nor suggestion of riot. The weather was friendly, the public health good, transportation was uninterrupted and business moved smoothly—yet into this peaceful picture there suddenly descended a kind of community paralysis that filled multitudes with dismay. Had it not passed as swiftly as it came, it would be hard to calculate its consequences, but even its few days of duration cost millions of dollars. More than this, it revealed in a somewhat startling way the degree to which all the activities of a great city were dependent on a commodity which most people had taken unthinkingly, as a matter of course.

What had happened? Merely that for the first time in two centuries New York found itself without its usual newspapers. A press room strike had halted their publication.

While most people had been aware of a controversy between publishers and employees, it had generally been regarded in the casual way with which one is apt to view the affairs of others until, on a certain day, it became suddenly and distressingly personal. On that day there was no paper on the doorstep. The news-stands were unnaturally bare. Commuters were driven to watching familiar landscapes as their trains rushed city-ward instead of renewing their contacts with the happenings of the four continents. The world seemed strangely out of joint.

Store sales sagged abruptly, for only the show windows remained to tell the daily bargains. Finance, always dependent on the latest news, was thrown back upon the thin stream of information that came trickling through the tape. What was happening in Washington, in Chicago, in London? The world of business was hesitant, uncertain, because it was poorly informed. Even for the humblest tradesman this sudden stoppage of news was an inconvenience; for many others it was fraught with the gravest possibilities.

Why was this experience so disconcerting? Because it produced a feeling of isolation; it cut off the city from the outside world—not physically, but mentally; it even cut off the residents of the city from knowledge of each other, because people have come to rely almost entirely on the papers for their local news. One may be in a room with a number of others, but if the lights are suddenly turned out, one feels

Better Hospitals for Mental Cases War Veterans

Washington, Aug. 5.—(INS)—The acute problem today before the Veterans Bureau is stronger protection and better hospitalization for the mentally ill soldiers who came out of the world war. Brig. Gen. John V. Clinnon, of Chicago, national commander of the Disabled American Veterans, declared here today.

Clinnon said that while there is a steady decrease in the active tuberculosis and general medical and surgical cases, the curve on mental ailments is rising.

We are pressing the government to meet this situation by a permanent plan, he said. I have gone over this whole matter with General Hines, director of the Veterans Bureau, and he agrees to our proposal that the permanent hospitalization program be completed at emergency speed, stressing the necessity for providing more facilities for providing those nerves and mind were affected by the rigors of military service abroad.

Many of our mentally disabled comrades are housed in State and county institutions to which paupers are usually sent and our present campaign is to remedy this condition to the end that all honorably discharged former soldier boys be treated in modern federally operated hospitals.

Clinnon said that while the Veterans Bureau could not be said to be functioning satisfactorily, he realized that Gen. Hines had gone far in reclaiming that office from the chaos in which he found it when he assumed the directorship.

Budapest, Aug. 5.—(INS)—Nadosy, the Hungarian police chief, sentenced with Count Windisch-Gratz to four years in prison for the notorious Hungarian frame forgery, has entered suit in the courts to divorce his wife. The convicted officer claims that his wife deserted him when it became publicly known that he was connected with the case.

Nadosy, further has announced that when the divorce has been granted, that he will marry Mrs. Vuk, also divorced and the owner of several rich Hungarian estates. She is the daughter of Arthur Egyedy, a rich landowner, whose murder by his son-in-law, Ernest Froreich, created a sensation here some years ago.

During the past three months a total of 4,059 wives have made applications for warrants at his office to find erring husbands. This number is an increase of 200 per cent over the same three months of last year, which is none too reassuring for the wives who are none too sure of their husbands.

NEW OXYGEN HELMET TO AID FRENCH AVIATORS KEEP ALTITUDE RECORD

Paris, Aug. 5.—(INS)—French aviators are likely to retain their laurels as holders of the world's record for altitude thanks to a recent invention of an oxygen helmet by Doctor Garsaux, doctor in charge of the aerial port of Paris, Le Bourget.

Rarity of the atmosphere at high altitudes has been the principal obstacle to high flying. The helmet of Doctor Garsaux utilizes a liquid supply of oxygen which can be turned on at twenty thousand feet and which it is expected will enable flights to be made at thirty thousand feet. Greater speed can be made at this height as the air offers less resistance.

YEARS AT ANVIL WITHOUT VACATION. HE PLANS NEW RECORD

Topeka, Kansas, Aug. 5.—(INS)—Descendants of the Civil War veterans in Kansas are leading in the organization of a new patriotic society. It is the purpose of the new organization to keep alive the memories of the Civil war by including in this new organization all descendants—sons and daughters and grandchildren of soldiers who served in the struggle for national Union.
