PRICES RANGE FROM 10 TO 66 TOBACCO

Satisfaction Prevails All Through the Belt and Farmers Celebrate: Quality Considered Poor; Mullins Reports the Largest Opening in History

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 10 .-(AP)-Tobacco markets in South Carolina opened today with good prices and prospects for a successful season, according to reports received here.

At Manning, approximately 100,000 pounds were on the floors of the two warehouses at opening hour. Prices ranged from 12 to 50 cents, with an average of about 25 cents. Merchants looked for a good season.

Satisfaction prevailed at Florence with both warehouses will patronized at the opening and prices ranged from 8 to 43 cents. at least one-third higher than were expected. About 200 tobacco farmers had brought their product to market.



Tremendous Development of Coming Years to See Need for Fliers; Services to Ask Schools to Provide Material for Manning

Washington, Aug. 10,-(INS)-The army and navy are going to American colleges to supply the pilots for the vast fleet of airplanes that will be available under the five-year building program authorized by Congress.

The services will get approximately 3,500 first class, fighting planes. The Navy also is planning to build two dirigibles, each about three times the size of the wrecked Shenandoah.

With the rapid development of commercial aviation, the need for pilots during the next few years will be tremendous. Present facilities are far inadequate for training pilots. In addition, there will be a growing demand for aviation engineers, designers and construc-

Anticipating this need, the army and navy are going to the colleges for future officers. The present work is handicapped by lack of funds. Each succeeding year starting at the session in December, will find army and navy heads asking Congress for more money to train college men and reser vists. These men will form the backbone of the air force. Wes Point and Annapolis cannot fill the

Military officials declare that there is a fertile field ahead for vonths who will turn to aviation as a profession. The opportunities are as great as civil and mechanicial engineering offered to the college man of the last century, when railroad building and construction were in full swing.

Aviation is still a pioneer sci ence. Some aeronautical engineers are not at all convinced that the present type of airplane will fill the need of the future. They say a way must be found to take plane vertically as well as horizontally. Until this is done the airplane cannot become as universally used in transportation as the automobile, the truck or the rail road. Then there's the question of size, load, safety, etc. The rewards will be rich for the aero nautical leaders, military men say

In a rather minor way, the army and navy already are developing the college field. There are six army air corps ROTC units in the colleges throughout the country These have developed a number of men who have qualified as pilots and engineers.

One of the army's prize units is located at the University of Illinois. Last fall, 493 students registered in the course but failure to pass physical examinations and other losses dropped the number to 233 at the end of the year. Ma. jor Haxwell Kirby, air service, is the only officer on duty with the unit. He repors that thus far ten students have applied to take the examination for a commission in the regular army.

Major Kirby recommended to the War Department that special attention be paid this year to developing a larger air corps ROTC, The air service has approved the idea and will seek money to carry out

If King Approves Bill Sites Will Be Developed for Commercial Purposes; Discussin in Parliament Revealed Inner City is Over Churched

London, Aug. 10 .- (INS)-Nineteen churches in the square mile of the City of London may be razed to the ground and their sites developed for commercial purposes if a bill which has just passed the Lords and Commons received the Assent of King George.

grounds has been forthcoming from many quarters against the destruction of the churches, which, although of no great historical value, include five built by Sir Christopher Wren, the famous architect of Saint Paul's Cathedr-

The sites on which the nineteer churches stand are said to be worth about ten million dollars and this sum will be used by the church for the furtherance of work in other parts of London. The bill was supported by many influential churchmen in the House

Speeches during the discussion of the bill in the House of Lords elicited the fact that the main purpose of destroying the churches is to eliminate the unnecessary places of worship and give the City number of churches commen surate wth its population.

Although something like two mil lion people work in the City itself during weekdays, on Sundays there is only a resident population of 13,000 people, with the result that many of the thirty churches at present situated in the city are very sparsely attended, and in some instances the only worshippers have been the minister and

It is proposed that the remainng twenty odd churches in the city shall be divided up into fours, with a minister and four attendants over every four, in order to avoid unnecessary expense. Saint Paul's Cathedral itself is within easy walkin gdistance of any part of the city proper, yet even this fin church finds it hard to gather ongregation sufficient to fill the pews immediately facing the altar although it has an organ among the finest in the world and furn ishes some of the foremost preach ers in London for its services.

The remains of prominent London citizens buried in the churchto establish air units in various yards will be disinterred and removed to other consecrated ground before the churches are destroy-

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
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
