

GOOD BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION URGED BY CARR

Commissioner Also Dwells at Length on Tax Burden Morehead City Meeting

Morehead City, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Practical business administrations of the “great investment which the state and local governments have made” was urged today by J. O. Carr, of Wilmington, in a speech here before the convention of the State Association of County Commissioners.

Mr. Carr declared that only through operations of sound business principles would the future stability of the state and its subdivisions be assured.

The speaker touched on the rapidly increasing tax burden and asserted that at the present time it was so great that city dwellers were preferring to rent to escape taxes, while rural dwellers were renting farms rather than owning them and thus farm tenancy was on the increase and home ownership in the cities on the decline.

Mr. Carr emphasized that if the people desired the road program, the school program, the public health program, and the other progressive steps of the state to continue that they must be prepared for high taxes, and must also face squarely the situation that these taxes can not be shifted but in the end will be paid by the masses. He warned that to go fast with any program would be as harmful as not doing anything and when the burden of taxes “becomes greater than the carrier can bear, whether he be man or the ship or the ferry,” then “there can be no further progress.”

MILITARY BOYS ON FIRING LINE AT FORT BRAGG

Correspondence From Local Unit Says Men Are Going Through Strenuous Practice

The Reflector today received another letter from members of the local unit of North Carolina National Guardsmen in annual encampment at Fort Bragg.

The boys went on the firing line yesterday and got their guns set for real action Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

The final drilling period will be held Friday, the message stated. Each day sees an improvement in the physical condition of the forty odd members from this county. They all look and act like real soldiers, and will make an impression upon their return home.

Captain Lester Jones says he feels sure Battery E will rank with the best of them on the range. Every man is determined to do his share—and is going to do it.

The soldiers will break camp next Monday morning and en-train for home. And every one of them will be convinced that the National Guard is no joke.

“We are putting in two weeks of real soldiering,” the message concluded, “and are glad we are National Guardsmen from Greenville and Pitt county.”

FRENCH PREMIER HAS COMPLETED GREAT PROGRAM

Poincare Speeds Up Work on Rehabilitation of His Country

Paris, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Premier Poincare has completed with rapidity rarely if ever equaled in the annals of the third republic, his financial program for the rehabilitation of the franc, as far as it was politically possible under the existing circumstances.

The National Assembly at Versailles, at a vote of 477 to 144, passed the bill placing the provision for a sinking fund in the constitution for the purpose of amortizing the country's floating debt and generally relieving the tangled financial situation.

It was not without scenes of much disorder brought about by the opposition of the socialist and communist that the measure was enacted by members of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate in joint session. Thrice the Assembly had to be suspended because of the tactics of the opposition. Fists fights between members of the extreme right and extreme left occurred during one phase of the procession. The communists banged desks and also sang the Internationale. One Deputy was expelled from the Chamber because of his conduct.

Premier Poincare, it is generally understood, would have preferred to have the Franco-American-British debt agreements ratified and put out of the way during the session of the National Assembly. He might even have succeeded in forcing them through by the authority he enjoys, owing to public support.

He, however, is said to have felt it would be wise for him to content himself with what was accomplished and not jeopardize his whole program for the sake of a part of it, however important.

Boston Boys Want Baseball Diamonds

Boston, Aug. 10.—(INS)—The spirit of '76 has been reborn in the youth of this city.

With the same determination that carried the coasters of Boston Common fearlessly into the presence of General Gage to demand their rights, baseball players of the Common and their friends are demanding justice from the Boston City Council.

Over the same path that the coasters trod in bygone days, modern youth, in greater numbers, stormed the city hall.

They carried a petition asking that the baseball diamonds along Charles street mall be put into some sort of decent playing condition. The boys back up their demands with claims that neglect has already been responsible for one death and the injury of many players.

Scores of youths circulated the petitions among the aristocratic voters of Boston, obtaining signatures for presentation to the council.

Hawaiian Pineapple Pack

Honolulu, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The 1926 Hawaiian pineapple pack will have a value between \$34,000,000 and \$35,000,000. This figure has been taken as basis for fixing the 1926 opening prices. Last year's pack was valued at \$35,000,000.

It is suggested that nineteen old churches in London, threatened with demolition, some designed by Sir Christopher Wren, be removed and set up in the United States.

Better spend the money for a monument to Wren, one of the world's great men. He was a great architect, great mathematician and a great astronomer.

Last words of great men are piously collected. Frederick the Great told D'Arance, Pitts, My Country, how I love thee, or How I leave thee; Gothe, More light.

A young policeman Frank Murphy, killed by bandits in the line of duty, said to his captain who consoled with him, as he lay dying. That's all right, cap, it's all in the job. Those last words are as good as any.

News comes from Denmark of uprisings in Russia, stories of Trotsky leading military revolts.

The Russian government has power, first of all the power of revolution, which is great. It enabled French revolutionists to conquer and terrorize European countries.

The revolution in Russia possesses the power that comes of giving land to people working on it.

Bolshevism took gigantic estates from which revenues were spent by worthless Grand Dukes and divided the land among Russian peasants.

Those peasants support Bolshevism despite its defect fearing to lose their land if Sovietism should fail.

Trouble will come, presumably as it always does, from quarrels among leaders. In the French revolution, Robespierre cut off Danton's head, after he had presided as high priest at the festival of the Supreme Being. Then the convention declared Robespierre an outlaw, and, with his jaw broken, he was dragged to the guillotine and his head chopped off.

Marat had his day of power, but Charlotte Corday murdered him. The French got tired of revolution, and Napoleon took charge of them, dragged them all over Europe and gave them something to make them really tired.

Something like that probably will come in Russia for history really does repeat itself.

Mexico is said to now be comparatively quiet. During the past week, from fifty to sixty have been killed, two hundred hurt. A boycott on all merchandise from Mexico is suggested, in Spain, but that would be a boycott on Mexican Catholics earning a living. Practically all workers in Mexico are Catholics.

Here a religious-political fight starts two years ahead of time. Bishop Adna W. Leonard, general superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Church in New York attacking Governor Al Smith, says No governor, he be nullificationist or not, can kiss a papal ring and ever get within gun shot of the White House.

Bishop Leonard wants Immigration laws enforced against Latin races that would flock to this country. The Bishop shouted, I am 100 per cent Anglo-Saxon. America is a Protestant nation and always will remain so.

The Bishop might remember that if Christopher Columbus who was not 100 per cent Anglo-Saxon, had not come to America the earnest Bishop might not be here.

Also nobody can say, with certainty, I am 10 per cent Anglo-Saxon. Many things happened on those foggy British Islands, when the Basques came from Spain and left their broadheads there, when Caesar brought his troop of the Latin races taking possession of Saxon lands and Saxon ladies, when William the Conqueror brought his Frenchman, also of the Latin races, with his half brother, the tall Catholic Bishop riding beside him. The Methodist Bishop might have some of his blood.

N. C. AND GEORGIA WETTEST SPOTS IN THE FIFTH DISTRICT

Rum Fraternity in N. C. Alone Sur-rendered 238,999 Gallons of Booze

Charlotte, Aug. 11.—(INS)—Western North Carolina and Northern Georgia were ranked as the “wettest spots” in the eighth federal prohibition district in a report issued from headquarters for the month of July, which has just been released.

The eighth district proved to be a fertile field last month, combined activities in three states yielding a total of 6,652 gallons of whiskey, 241,410 gallons of beer, \$134,459 in property seized and 237 arrests. Forty-nine warrants, have been issued for the arrest of alleged bootleggers.

The value of the property destroyed by raiders during the month totaled \$116,529. Automobiles valued at \$17,880 were seized from the rum runners and rated as property not destroyed. Arrests by federal men in the three states, included 188, thirty-five more being effected through combined activities of state and federal officers. Prosecutions recommended in federal courts were 244, and in state courts, 35.

The rum fraternity in North Carolina surrendered 128,990 gallons of beer, 1,696 gallons of the spirits and 47 gallons of wine during the month running a close second to that of Georgia and swamping South Carolina.

“MA” FERGUSON IN RACE WITH ALL HER HEART

Declares Moody Has Forfeited Right to Gubernatorial Honors of Texas

Austin, Texas, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today declared she was in the race for Governor of Texas “with all her heart.”

In a 2,000 word statement she declared that Attorney General Dan Moody, her chief opponent, never had accepted her offer to resign.

She declared Moody had forfeited his rights to a place on the run-off and general election ticket because of his alleged acceptance of contributions from Representative Satterthwaite and Bob Bobbitt, candidate for the Legislature. The primary law prohibits campaign contributions from one candidate to another candidate.

Referring to her challenge to Moody to resign, she said not only did he not accept my proposition, but he left himself in a position whence he would not be found in case I should have led by 25,000 votes in the primary. Here are his very words: “I accept this challenge issued by Jim in his wife's name.” In many other statements in newspapers he called my proposition “Jim's bluff” and not to this hour has he ever said he accepted my proposition.

I submit to all fair minded people that the acceptance of the challenge by Jim is not the acceptance of the challenge issued by Miriam. If the vote had been in my favor, Mr. Moody had carefully worded his reply so he would not have been bound and he would have immediately said that he was only bluffing Jim.

The challenge to resign, to which Mrs. Ferguson refers, was made by her in her first campaign speech in the recent primary. She offered to resign her position if Moody led her by one vote, provided he would resign as Attorney General if she led him 25,000 votes.

FOUR STATES IN MIDST OF BITTER PRIMARIES TODAY

Ku Klux Klan Repudiation in Alabama Seen in Returns Compiled in That State

Chicago, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The battle of ballots waged today in the states of Ohio, Alabama, Arkansas and Nebraska, the aftermath of yesterday's primary election. From columns of mounting figures, tabulators sought to name the nominees for offices, ranging from United States Senators and Governors, down to county officials.

In Ohio, Miss Florence E. Allen State Supreme Court Justice, and first Ohio woman to seek a Senatorial seat, was lagging behind former United States Senator Atlee Pomeroy, for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator.

Senator F. B. Willis showed his heels to his seven opponents and his nomination for the Republican Senatorship was assured.

After leading through almost half the counts, Thad Brown, Secretary of State, seeking Republican gubernatorial nomination, forged into first position among the twelve persons including a negro and a woman who sought the honor. Governor A. V. Donohy walked away from three Democrat opponents who sought to succeed him. Donohy is seeking a third successive term.

Repudiation of the national Ku Klux Klan organization by the Alabama organization was seen by some political observers in Alabama's Democratic primary.

Huro L. Black, candidate for the United States Senate, endorsed by the Alabama Klan, was leading a field of five, including L. B. Mugrove, who is backed by the national organization. In the gubernatorial race, Bili Graves was leading a field of four candidates.

In the Arkansas race, J. E. Martin held a fairly substantial lead over Governor T. T. Terrell, for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. Governor Terrell's strength, however, was demonstrated as the rural districts began to report and he was cutting into Martin's lead today.

Senator T. H. Caraway was nominated without opposition while Nebraska Republicans nominated Adam McMullen, to succeed himself as Governor, over two opponents who lagged far behind.

Charles Bryan, former Governor and Democratic Vice Presidential candidate in 1924, was unopposed for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

COMETS, HER ROMANCE

London, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Mary Proctor, daughter of Richard A. Proctor, the late noted astronomer, found her romance in comets. She has put it in book form and will lecture in America.

I hope to arouse interest in the total eclipse of the sun which occurs June 29, next, the track of shadow lying across England, from Anglesea to Hartlepool, then Norway and Sweden. It is our first for 200 years. I shall try to get a party of Americans to come back with me to observe the eclipse, she declared.

TURKISH BATHS GROW IN POPULAR ESTEEM

New York, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The Turkish bath to a certain extent has replaced the cocktail as refreshment after a busy day. If the increased numbers of these establishments here is a criterion, swimming is a close second.

Turkish, Russian and other vapour baths have increased in popularity until at least one hotel includes them with the room, and others are equipped for this service.

That these new facilities have not endangered the general business is evidenced by the new and larger building erected on Forty-second street by the largest Turkish baths in the city.

Large numbers of women patronize the places, special hours being reserved for them in the daytime. The evenings and nights are reserved universally for men.

HERO OF WOODS NOW RECOVERING

Pine Bluff, Ark., Aug. 11.—(INS)—Abraham Harding, Kelse, Ark., recovering in a local hospital from injuries received when he saved the life of the younger brother at a lumber camp near here last week.

Harding was helping saw down a tree when he saw another tree falling and his younger brother standing in the tree's path. Showing his brother aside to safety, Harding stopped the force of the tree with his own body, being seriously injured.

STATE SHERIFFS BEGIN SESSIONS AT OXFORD, N. C.

Officials From 100 Counties Get Down to Business After Mayor's Welcome

Oxford, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Sheriffs from the 100 counties of North Carolina were gathering here today for their annual convention which will open this afternoon. The members will gather informally this afternoon and register at the court house, but the program will not get underway until tonight.

At eight o'clock, the convention will be welcomed to Oxford by Mayor T. J. Stem, mayor of the city. The night program will be concluded with an address by Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt on “Law Enforcement.”

A business session will occupy the members early tomorrow morning, while an address will be delivered by A. A. Hicks at eleven o'clock. The convention will come to a close at noon with a barbecue and Brunswick stew dinner.

THREE KILLED BY BOOTLEGGERS IN FIVE DAYS

Encounters Between Whiskey Element and Federal Agents Also Result in Injuries

Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Three known dead, two reported killed, two men critically wounded and one reported missing, is the toll of two encounters between rum runners, hi-jackers, bootleggers, coast guardsmen and federal agents in Florida in the past five days.

Three alleged liquor law violators were killed in a pitched battle with seven federal prohibition agents on a lonely overgrown road, near Homestead, when they pursued and opened fire on the government agents who were returning to Miami after a series of raids on hidden stills in the everglades.

Two of the men killed were former police officers of Homestead county, recently moved from office by Governor Martin and the Dade county grand jury.

PRIZE SNAKE STORY COMES FROM BELMONT

Gastonia, Aug. 11.—(INS)—The latest prize snake story comes from Belmont, the eastern metropolis of Gaston county, enjoying a reputation for honesty and industry.

George Howe, 7 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Howe, was playing in his main street front yard when a stranger, called out to him suddenly. “Run, boy, there's a snake after you.”

The boy looked around and saw a big snake behind him with its mouth open. It is needless to say the lad ran for the house and closed the front door behind him with a bang.

Meantime, some men who had seen the snake come into the yard, killed it. They cut the creature open and found inside her body no less than fifty baby snakes.

RANKS OF CONFEDERATES THINNING IN TENNESSEE

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 11.—(INS)—With 52 deaths in the ranks of Tennessee Confederate pension list of veterans and 50 pensioned widows dead during the last year only seven new names have been added to the pensioned list of Veterans.

This was the summary of John P. Hickman, secretary, in his annual report recently of the state Confederate pension board.

This was the largest number of deaths among ranks of Veterans since the establishment of the bureau in one year, according to Mr. Hickman.

Starting from Cape Griz Nez at ten o'clock last night they swam until, four o'clock this morning, when heavy seas and rain squalls compelled them to abandon their attempt to get across to Dover.

BAPTISTS OF KENTUCKY TO CAMP AT CLEAR CREEK

Pineville, Ky., Aug. 10.—(INS)—Annual summer encampment of the Baptist church of this state is under way at Clear Creek Mountain Springs near here.

Leaders in the Baptist church from all over the state and speakers of that faith from all over the country are in attendance at the camp.

With practically all cottage space taken during the first few days of the camp, tenting parties are now pitching their tents on camping grounds.

RAILROAD ONCE HAD \$35.45

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Ranking well among the leaders today in the railroad field, the Louisville and Nashville Railroad when founded did not contain enough money in its treasury to pay for a month's tax bill, as now consumed on any one of its leading Pullman trains.

The road's treasury at the time of its foundation contained but \$35.45 in actual cash. Today its monthly payroll alone approximates \$6,500,000.

POLICE HEADS SUSPENDED AT HENDERSON, N. C.

City Council Approves Action of the Mayor in Laying Off Chief and Assistant

Henderson, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Chief of police J. C. Champion and assistant chief J. H. Langston, today stood suspended from the Henderson police force. The city council last night approved the action of Mayor S. R. Chevasson in suspending the two officers.

Champion will remain on the suspended list until September 1, while Langston will be suspended for the remainder of this week. Mayor Chevasson took action against Langston last Saturday because the officer left the city without permission of the Mayor. He went to Norfolk to accompany two sailors who were absent without leave from the Presidential yacht Mayflower.

Champion was suspended by the Mayor for disputing the authority of the Mayor in the matter, using language “unbecoming a gentleman,” and for threatening the Mayor with violence.

At the session, Champion admitted he had contended the Mayor or had no authority over the assistant chief, that he refused to surrender his badge and pistol and other property of the city on the Mayor's demand, and that he had sent word to the officer that he would “kill him” if any further orders were sent him by the Mayor. He denied insubordination.

The Mayor continued in full authority to suspend the officers. The city council debated in executive session a half hour before upholding the Mayor in his contention, and approving the suspension.

RATE HEARINGS DEFERRED UNTIL SEPTEMBER 7TH

Commercial Agencies to Be Given Chance of Offering Rebuttal Testimony

Raleigh, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Further hearings before the Corporation Commission on the proposed toll rate increase asked by the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies this morning was deferred until September 7, at which time opportunity will be given commercial agencies opposed to the increase to offer testimony provided their investigation of the assertion made by the companies indicates to them that the increased rate is not needed.

Final hearing this morning was marked by the plea of James H. Poul, Raleigh lawyer, for permission to increase this Postal's rates. He declared that the Postal Telegraph and Cable Company was the only business operating at this time on 1916 prices, pointing out that the Postal rate had not been raised since that time, although prices of materials, labor and operating expenses had more than doubled. He pointed out that the Postal will not expand in North Carolina until it is allowed a living rate.

The Western Union this morning submitted further evidence showing that it is operating at a loss on intra-state business. The proposed new rate will mean increased revenue for the Western Union of approximately 13 per cent and a 20 per cent increase, it is said, in the Postal Telegraph and Cable Company's rate.

MEXICO'S LAW ON RELIGION

The policy adopted by the Mexican government in dealing with ministers of religion and religious organizations is attracting world-wide attention on account of the novel and drastic details of the law issued by President Calles under date of June 14. While the Catholic church is most vitally affected, this is merely because the Mexican membership of that church is larger than that of all other denominations combined. All religious organizations, including religious orders, are affected by the law, as well as all ministers of the gospel and all church property.

The law issued by President Calles purports to be in pursuance of the constitution, and in many sections the constitution is clearly obeyed. Other sections, however, seem to be in direct conflict with the constitution of Mexico.

The purpose of the law is stated to be the elimination of religious influence in national political affairs and the complete separation of church and state. If this were the only purpose, and if the law accomplished no more and no less than this, it would command the respect of those who are convinced that church and state must be kept separate in a republic. But the new law attempts much more than this. It confiscates church property, denies the right of the clergy of any denomination to hold services or administer sacraments elsewhere than in churches under governmental scrutiny, denies the liberty of the press strips all religious persons of distinctive garb, prohibits all religious organizations from acquiring real estate, and confiscates seminaries, colleges and asylums as well as churches, bishoprics, parish houses, etc.

The law conforms to the Mexican constitution by requiring that no person not of Mexican birth shall exercise the ministry of any cult.

Rigorous penalties are prescribed for violations of the law and for failure on the part of any official authority to enforce the law.

The right of the Mexican nation to deal with religion as it sees fit can not be questioned by any other nation, so long as other nation's citizens are injured. Any injury to foreigners resulting from the execution of Mexico's new law would be properly the subject of inquiry by the government affected, notwithstanding the declaration that the law is a purely domestic measure.

Without raising the question of President Calles' authority to issue a law which in important particulars seems to transgress the constitution of Mexico, it can not be doubted that the Mexican nation is deeply injured by this reactionary and intolerant action. Even if the law were well within the bounds of the constitution, it strikes a blow at re-

ligious freedom and freedom of speech and of the press. The fact that the law is enthusiastically approved and supported by the communistic elements of Mexico leads the outside world to suspect that communism has a firm hold upon the Mexican government and has led it into the folly of intimating the Russian soviet in attempting to destroy religion. Nothing but disorder, misfortune and ultimate disaster can come from such a course in a free country in the twentieth century. Mexicans, with all their misgovernment, are free men, having the right of free speech, freedom of the press, freedom of assembly, freedom of worship and the power to set up their own government. The destruction of religion and freedom of speech and the press in Mexico is impossible and only communists or other madmen would attempt to destroy the rights of a free people—Washington Post.
