AUGUST TERM OF CRIMINAL COURT BEGAN TODAY

More Than Fifty
Cases Are Slated for
Hearing Before
Judge N. A. Sinclair

The August term of Superior Court, for the trial of criminal cases, opened here today with Judge N. A. Sinclair presiding.

This term is faced by one of the heaviest dockets of late and the court room was crowded to capacity by witnesses and spectators, when court was called to order.

In a strong charge to the Grand Jury, Judge Sinclair impressed upon the jurors their duty as citizens and as members of the county's highest body and urged that they perform their duty without hesitation. He also stressed the important part a Grand Jury plays in the affairs of a county and urged that Pitt county follow the lead of other counties in the state by adopting the system of appointment of a grand jury for the year instead of each term as is now the custom.

Practically the entire morning session was taken up with the Judge's charge and the setting of the calendar for the week. Only two cases were called before the lunch hour adjournment.

C. R. Townsend, charged with slandering, was called and failed to appear. Attorneys informed the court that he was enroute to this city and upon his arrival, the case will again be called. W. C. Baker, charged with the charge of assault with deadly weapon and upon recommendation of the solicitor, judgment was suspended upon payment of costs.

The case of J. M. Mitchell on a charge of bigamy, has been set for 2:30 Tuesday afternoon. On Wednesday's calendar are three murder cases, one for arson, and a rape case as follows: Major Adams, murder; P. O. Baker, murder; John Vines, rape; Albert Evans and Francis Johnson, murder; and Jess A. Wingate, arson. On Thursday the case against Elmer McLawhorn for murder will be heard.

TWO KILLED, MANY INJURED IN HEAD ON TRAIN CRASH

Engineer and Fire-
man Killed and
Passengers Prob-
ably Fatally Injured

Chicago, Aug. 30.—(AP)—An engineer and his fireman were killed and several passengers and train employees injured, two possibly fatally, early today when the locomotive of a Pennsylvania Railroad freight train crashed into the engine of a Rock Island passenger train near the Beverly Hill station of the Rock Island.

The passengers, for the most part were severely shaken and injured by flying glass.

S. T. Hooker Has the Proof That He Is a Fisherman

When it comes to being a fisherman, Mr. S. T. Hooker, of this city, ranks among the best, not only in home waters but in big company as well. This fact is evidenced by several of Mr. Hooker's prize fish which he has been exhibiting to his friends here during the past few days.

The cast including a sail fish, a dolphin and a tuna fish, was made in September, 1925, in the gulf stream off the coast of Florida. The fish have been attractively mounted and make an interesting sight.

The sail fish measures six feet six inches in length, weighs more than 62 pounds, when caught and the upper fin, known as the sail, as about two and a half feet high, while the dolphin and tuna fish are not as large as the sail fish, they are specimens never before shown here.

Mr. Hooker has been requested to place these fish on exhibit at the Pitt county fair and has consented to do so. Few people in this county have ever seen such fish and the exhibit will attract no little attention.

MOODY DEFEATS "MA" FERGUSON

Attorney General De-
feats Mrs. Ferguson
for Governor by
Two to One Vote

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Dan Moody, youthful Attorney General, today was heralded as governor-elect of Texas.

The unofficial returns from Saturday's run-off primary balloting in the Democratic gubernatorial contest gave Moody a lead of almost two to one over Governor Miran A. Ferguson. These returns gave Moody 489,182, Ferguson 247,100.

Statements were forthcoming from the camps of both candidates yesterday, although Governor Ferguson remained silent and permitted her husband, former Governor J. E. Ferguson to speak for her.

"My wife is a good sport," was Ferguson's description of how his wife was taking her defeat. He also remarked that "within the next six months Moody, beset by the hungry boys with tongues hanging out for favors, will realize that being governor is not one continued round of pleasure."

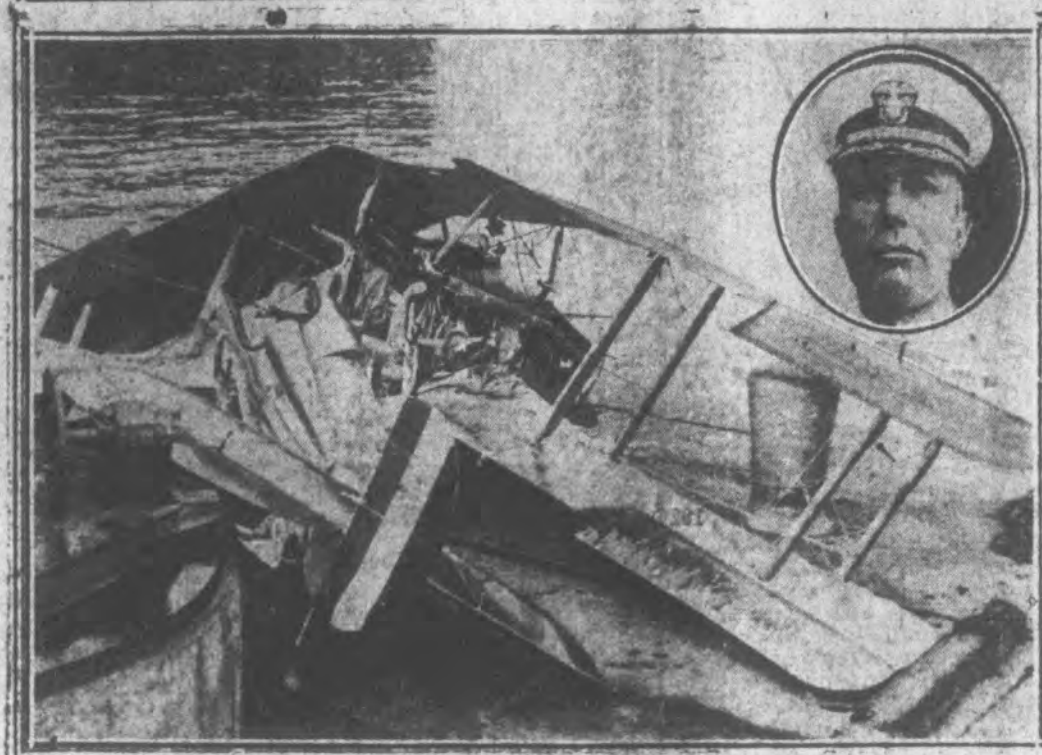
Moody's statement following the primary declared the result definitely ended the political career of James E. Ferguson, and the end of "Fergusonism" in Texas.

FOREIGNERS ARE ARRESTED FOR DRINKING IN VIENNA

Vienna, Aug. 30.—(INS)—Foreigners are almost the only people arrested for drunkenness in Vienna. Comparatively the native population are capable of containing their liquor for the 5,070 persons arrested for over-drinking, four-fifths were of other than Austrian citizenship.

Mostly they were visitors or refugees from Balkan countries which live in great numbers here. For this period, the first six months of 1926, five Americans were listed among the offenders.

15 CONVICTS ARE STILL AT LARGE

Posses Continue Their
Search for Remain-
der of Those Escap-
ed from Reforma-
tory

Ionia, Mich., Aug. 30.—(AP)—With 15 convicts who escaped from the Michigan State Reformatory here still at large, posesses today intensified their search in the belief that most of them are hiding in wooded sections within a radius of 10 miles of the reformatory. Officials are of the opinion that the general alarm sent out shortly after their escape, stopped many of them in their flight from this section.

After fleeing hundreds of miles in stolen automobiles and finding their outlet cut off in all directions, five convicts yesterday were intercepted by a posse near Albion. One was captured at the time and the others surrounded in a nearby swamp. Two of the men were captured last night and a third was shot and seriously wounded and surrendered. A fourth convict was captured near Kalamazoo, Michigan, yesterday, and six were captured Saturday.

Funeral Services for Miss Merle Edwards Tuesday

The body of Miss Merle Irene Edwards, who committed suicide in Richmond yesterday will be brought to this city late today and funeral services will take place at Reg. Banks Church tomorrow afternoon, followed by interment beside her mother in the Red Banks Cemetery. The services will be conducted by Rev. L. E. Ballard, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church here.

The deceased was raised near Vanceloro and was a niece of C. C. Parkinson, of this city. "Richmond, Va., Aug. 29.—Miss Merle Irene Edwards, 20, pupil nurse at the Memorial Hospital, this city, from Wilmington, N. C., died this afternoon of poison which she took in her room last night while out duty. She was found unconscious at 7 o'clock this morning, remaining in that condition until death came. She was a daughter of J. F. Edwards, a pilot, 411 Church street, Wilmington. A note addressed to him was found in her room. It read:

"Dear Daddy: I am all out of sorts but will explain later. I am coming home soon. Your baby, MERLE."

Her trunk was packed as if she was ready to make the trip. The hospital authorities were at a loss to account for her act. She was admitted to training last March and had made an excellent pupil in every way, they said. There was no evidence, they said, that she had a love affair of any kind. Her father arrived late this afternoon by automobile from Wilmington accompanied by a 37 year old son. He was summoned by phone this morning soon after his daughter was found unconscious.

CONCORD WOMAN KILLED IN WRECK

Mrs. A. H. Jarrett In-
stantly Killed and
Her Chauffeur Dies
Shortly Afterward

Hickory, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Mrs. A. H. Jarrett, of Concord, was instantly killed shortly after 12 o'clock this afternoon when her car was in collision with a coupe driven by Ellis L. Jackson, of Newton. The cars met on a sharp curve one mile below Newton. Mrs. Jarrett's negro chauffeur whose name could not be learned, is not expected to live. Three others were not seriously hurt, who were in the car with Mrs. Jarrett. The extent of the injuries received by Mr. Jackson were not fully determined, but physicians expressed doubt concerning his condition.

Mrs. Jarrett is the wife of the superintendent of city schools of Concord and was on her way to Montreal for a few days' rest.

Concord, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Nathan White, negro chauffeur of Mrs. A. H. Jarrett, who was killed in an automobile accident near Newton, also is dead, advices received here this afternoon stated.

Latest Secret Order Putting Fear Into Hearts of Soviets

London, Aug. 30.—(INS)—A secret order calling itself "The Brothers of the Black Star" is reported to be operating in Russia striking terror into the Soviet leaders, according to advices received here from Riga.

Branches of the order are stated to exist in Moscow, Petrograd, Kharkov, Kiev and Odessa. The aim of the order is said to be the removal of the present Soviet leaders and the overthrow of the regime.

Soviet Government offices are said to be honeycombed with members of the order, some of whom hold high confidential posts in close contact with Kallinin, Stalin, and Trotsky.

Recently the body was found in a Moscow street of a Soviet official named Martynovsky, who had been strangled with a black rope with a star on it. In his pocket was found a letter threatening him with death and bearing the same symbol.

It is rumored that Djerpinski's death too was the work of the order, threatening letters bearing the black star being found in his cabinet after death.

MANY IMPORTANT MATTERS BEFORE LEAGUE NATIONS

Fourteen Countries
Will Petition League
to Make Conscrip-
tion Illegal

Geneva, Aug. 30.—(AP)—With the gathering of statesmen from throughout the world one week from today, for the assembly of the League of Nations, many great problems of importance in addition to election of Germany for membership, seemed likely to arise.

The demand of Spain for sovereignty over the International Community of Tangier in Morocco threatened to bring complication into a settlement of the crisis over the claims of both Spain and Holland for seats in the League council.

It appears not improbable that the financial problems of Europe also may be brought into the discussions, they having taken on new vigor since the visit to Europe of Andrew W. Mellon, Secretary of the U. S. Treasury, who has talked with various men high in European financial circles, but on what subject it is not known.

It is reported there is a tendency to consider France's attitude toward ratification of the accord reached between M. Berenger, the French Ambassador to the United States, and Mr. Mellon, in regard to France's debt to the United States as amelioration of the general debt situation.

As the League official are preparing for the opening of the session there comes report of much gross stepping by monarchists in Bavaria. A demonstration yesterday was a counter move by the Nationalists against the Republican celebration held in Nuremberg some time ago. The participants are opposed to the Penubile and to the entry of Germany into the League of Nations. From London comes news of an entirely different character. Men and women of 14 countries of the world in a manifesto, are requesting the League to declare conscription illegal as the first step toward world disarmament. The manifesto asserts that President Wilson in the first draft of the covenant of the League, proposed to make conscription illegal.

Mrs. W. A. Nichols, age 49, died Saturday afternoon at 6:20 o'clock, at her home near Greenville. She is survived by her husband and a number of children, and a half-brother, Mr. Bill Sutton. Funeral services were conducted in the Sutton burying ground, near Arthur Sunday afternoon at three o'clock. Rev. L. E. Ballard of the Free Will Baptist church, conducted the services.

GERMAN CONSUL RETURNS TO CLEVELAND DISTRICT

Cleveland, O., Aug. 28.—(INS)—The first German consulate in the Ohio district since the world war has just been established here. Dr. Hans Borchers, former German Deputy Consul-General at New York, a veteran with 18 years of service in the German consular ranks, is the consul here.

Dr. Borchers will serve Ohio, Michigan, West Virginia, and Indiana.

The new consul is 40 years old, was born in Germany and is a graduate of Heidelberg University.

SPRITED BIDDING MAKES DEAUVILLE YEARLING SALE NET 15 MILLION FRANCS

Deauville, Aug. 30.—(INS)—The spirited bidding of international millionaires brought the total volume of sales at the annual auction of yearlings up to 15,000,000 francs.

As each day's lot was disposed of the top price was successively paid by an American, an Argentine, a Frenchman until finally the offer of the Canadian tobacco king, Sir Mortimer Davis of 440,000 francs for King's Lyn, the son of Fuchs and Kipton Belle made a record.

BROADWAY PAYS LAST FAREWELL TO VALENTINO

Thousands Line
Broadway to Pay
Final Tribute to Late
"Shiek of Movies"

New York, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Broadway, where Rudolph Valentino once worked as a dishwasher today paid faraway tribute to the man who died at the height of his career as shiek of the movies.

The famous thoroughfare was lined with many thousands as the funeral cortege moved from the undertaking establishment to St. Malachi's church. Members of the police bomb squad and 263 regular policemen patrolled the funeral route and stood guard outside the funeral parlor and the church.

Pola Negri, the Polish actress, who announced before Valentino's death that she was engaged to marry him, and Jean Acker, the dead actor's first wife, who had said that she was reconciled to him just before his death, followed the body into the church. Miss Negri, dressed in mourning and sobbing audibly, was immediately behind the casket. Behind her came Miss Acker, and bringing up the rear were representatives of Miss Winifred Hudnut, the second wife. Mary Pickford also attended the funeral.

The sobbs of Miss Negri could be heard above the voices of the singing and the service. Father Edward Leonard officiated and conducted the mass. Then following the service the casket was borne to Campbell's funeral church where it will await the arrival of Valentino's brother, who is to decide the final burial place.

Wright Appointed to Health Board

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Dr. John B. Wright, of Raleigh, today was named by Governor McLean to fill the vacancy on the State Board of Health caused by the death of Dr. R. H. Lewis.

Dr. Wright came to Raleigh 12 years ago from Sampson county and was associated in Raleigh with Dr. Lewis in eye, ear, nose and throat practice. He originated the idea of eye, ear, nose and throat clinic now being conducted by the State Board of Health, and he held the first of these clinics at Lenoir in 1919.

GERMAN SWIMMER VICTORIOUS OVER ENGLISH CHANNEL

Otto Vierkoetten
Swims Channel in 12
Hours 40 Minutes
Breaking All Records

Dover, Eng., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Otto Vierkoetten, of Germany, today swam the English Channel. He landed at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon at Langdon Stairs, half way between Dover and St. Marguerite Bay. He entered the water at Cape Griz Nez, France, at 1:35 A. M.

The elapsed time of the swim according to figures, is 12 hours and 40 minutes, or nearly two hours, better than the record time of 14 hours, 31 minutes set up by Gertrude Ederle on August 8.

Vierkoetten's landing was witnessed by only a few soldiers from Langdon Battery, near the beach.

future airplane route between Europe and the United States. Dr. Danmeyer and a Dr. Georgi, professors at Hamburg University, conducted the experiments.

The proposed air route would start at Hamburg and pass via Scapa Flow, to Faroe Islands, Reykjavik and Cape Farewell, Greenland, and would have New York as its ultimate destination, the department declared. It is planned to send a large scientific expedition to Iceland next year for the purpose of investigating in detail all conditions which would be likely to affect the operation of airplanes over the contemplated route.

Persons in Germany, interested in the project, state that under favorable circumstances the projected line may be opened by the beginning of 1928, continued the statement.

U. S. Fliers Watch British 'Autogiro'

Washington, Aug. 30.—(INS)—America aviation, once the leader of the world in flying, is now watching with keen interest a series of experiments at Hamble Aerodrome, England, with an "autogiro" airplane, according to an announcement of the Department of Commerce.

While aviation has progressed by leaps and bounds since the Wright brothers flew their plane into the Potomac river, within

sight of Washington Monument, the department pointed out, all aerial authorities have dreamed of the perfect plane—one that will rise vertically and land literally on top of a postage stamp. The English autogiro is an experiment along this line.

The English air ministry conducted the Hamble experiments, which were only partly successful. The autogiro is said to be similar to the ordinary airplane, the department explained, except that most of the wings have been replaced by a windmill canopy to act over the pilot. When the machine is in flight the canopy device revolves at a speed of approximately 135 revolutions a minute. It is said that the machine can come steadily to earth at an angle of 45 degrees or more, then flatten out and stop within a few yards of the point where it touched the ground.

The machine tested at the Hamble Aerodrome, was built to the order of the British Air Ministry, for whom four others are in course of construction. It is hoped in England that similar planes may be built and operated for commercial use.

ECONOMIC SIGNIFICANCE AND SERVICE OF THE AMERICAN NEWSPAPER AND NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING—From latest volume in Manhattan Library of Popular Economics, republished in serial form through courtesy of Bank of the Manhattan Company, New York.

HOW ADVERTISING CREATES NEWS

VERY successful newspaper editor possesses the faculty of being able to sense the existence of an interest on the part of his readers in any subject, and the degree of his success is measured largely by the manner and extent of his response to that interest through the news and editorial columns of his publication.

But why mention a fact that is so obvious and commonplace? What has it to do with the purely economic functions and influences of the newspaper? What relation has it to such things as production and distribution, merchandising and newspaper advertising?

The answers may be found by glancing through the columns of any modern newspaper and comparing them with the newspapers of a generation ago when advertising was an arm of merchandising and an educational force was still a sprawling infant in swaddling clothes. The answers may also be found in those numerous departmental sections of the newspaper which are now devoted to such subjects as real estate, finance, automobiles, books, theatres and moving pictures and many others. They demonstrate in a striking way the fact that newspaper advertising not only is news but that it makes news; that through arousing a widespread interest in any given subject a public desire is created for more news which the editor is quick to sense and to satisfy through the news and editorial columns of his paper. Likewise news produces advertising, for the modern merchandiser of goods or services is, like the editor, eager to respond to the desire or demand which follows close upon the heels of an awakened public interest.

For example, only a few years ago, the newspapers began to print references to interesting experiments by certain scientists in radio phenomena. These notices were brief, for the most part, and seemed as remote from practical affairs as archaeological research in Egypt or Yucatan. Less than a decade later in almost any issue of any newspaper, could be found a regular radio section giving the programs of a number of stations, and often a good deal of additional news and general information. Various papers, indeed, issue weekly radio supplements. Since it is the newspaper's business to study and meet the requirements of its readers, this demonstrates the existence of a large interest in the subject of radio on the part of the public.

The swift rise of this interest is an interesting illustration of how the advertising and news columns of the newspaper have each reacted upon the other. The attention of manufacturers first was attracted by the published accounts of these radio experiments. They succeeded in producing sets that could be used by the layman, and then undertook to create a market for their sale. This led them into the newspaper advertising columns, where they

Administration Plan State Health Board To Be Re-organized

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A sweeping plan of reorganization of the administration of the State Board of Health, a change formulated at a recent conference of the executive committee and the bureau heads, is to be put into effect as soon as Dr. Charles O'H. Laughlinhouse takes charge on October 1. The change is one of plan rather than of staff, board officials say.

Under the proposed system the staff will be divided into four districts with a district deputy health officer in charge and directly responsible for the work of each section. It will mean, officials say, the elimination of at least three bureaus and the probability of the change of title of a half dozen or more of the present health officials. The district plan, the idea of Dr. W. S. Rankin, former health officer and now a member of the board; and the executive committee, was expounded on Oct. 1, 1923, but because of Dr. Rankin's absence it was abated.

All bureaus except those of sanitary engineering, education, vital statistics, and partially the bureau of maternity and infancy, will be abolished, and estimating in the new plan it has been figured by the board that the budget for the biennium next July will be approximately \$412,000 a year, about \$8,000 a year less than the present allotment. However, several thousand dollars over the allotment were spent during the past year.

FACIAL PANTOMIME TO BE TAUGHT STAGE ASPIRANTS

New York, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A school of facial expression will soon join the scores of other training activities for the stage.

A little theatre will be established for Emil Boreo, a Russian comedian, and he plans to have the school in connection with his experimental stage.

The Chauve Souris first brought the actor here and he since has appeared in other productions. He believes that American actors rely too much upon the spoken word and gestures, sublimating the facial expression.

A dramatic artist on the Continent, he heard that comedy was the most lucrative branch of the profession in America and he developed himself accordingly, stressing facial expression and unusual sounds to gain effects.

CALIFORNIA PASTOR ENDS 33RD YEAR WITH CHURCH

Sallinas, Calif., Aug. 26.—(INS)—Rev. George McCormick, pastor of the United Presbyterian Church here, recently completed his thirty-third year of preaching from the same pulpit, one of the longest records of any pastor in California.

RUSSIAN SCIENTISTS TEST NEW TELEVISION MACHINE

Leningrad, Aug. 27.—(INS)—A group of the most prominent Russian scientists has attested the workability of an apparatus just invented here in the Physical Röntgenological Institute for the projection of scenes by radio in the same manner as the familiar radio transmission of sound.

Library Commission Would Help Farmer

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—For the enlightenment of farm, thru-out the state, the State Library Commission has prepared itself to supply material on a series of reading courses called "Reading for a Purpose," compiled by the American Library Association.

The reading list not only includes preparations of crops, soil, poultry raising, dairying, farming machinery, home-making, rug weaving, canning, dress making, and other agricultural subjects, but also includes popular publications on travel, sociology, science, history, and the like.

In the past the state has aided persons living outside the service limits of city libraries to obtain books free, except for postage, through the library commission, which has been supplying books free to citizens of the state. The commission last year reached more than 200,000 rural people, through school libraries, traveling libraries, and through individual loans.

Any farmer is privileged to draw books from the commission upon application, on any subject.

The number reached last year indicates that they have been availing themselves of the opportunity.

LONDON COMPANY HUNTS SHARKS IN SOUTH SEAS

London, Aug. 27.—(INS)—A company has been formed here to capture sharks in the Southern sea and turn them into commercial products in the form of leather, oil, glue, fertilizer and food.

Ships have been built equipped as factories where the sharks can be made ready for export within forty-eight hours after their capture.

One of the chief products are to be the fins, which are highly prized as a table delicacy in some parts of the world.

Moscow, Aug. 30.—(INS)—Beards are precious articles in Russia still. The spirit of the thousands of bushy faced martyrs who allowed themselves to be burned at the stake rather than give up their whiskers has not yet died completely out.

Down in the city of Erivan in Southern Armenia excitement has not yet subsided over the outrage which the recently deposed mayor of the city committed upon the newly elected town council.

Irritated at his defeat in the last city election, Mayor Galst Tzatzikyan determined to get even with the victors. Before the new council was inducted into office, the mayor called them to him and declared he had just received orders from the district authorities that all municipal officers from the date of the last election must be clean shaven.

Saddened, but loyal to their new offices, the neophyte councilors submitted to the barber and appeared for the inauguration with faces as bare as a baby's arm.

Mayor Tzatzikyan made the mistake of laughing as he handed over

the keys of office. The new councilors looked up the records, discovered the deception, and hailed the ex-mayor before their own court.

Can't you take a joke? asked the ex-mayor of his barefaced judge.

Yes, said his honor, but this one is on you. Two months for malicious mischief.

The ex-mayor stroked his whiskers defiantly as the bailiff led him out.

Beards from a major point of dissension between the two largest sects in the Russian Orthodox Church. In the ranks of the so-called Tikhonites, or adherents of the old church, beards and long hair are obligatory for the priests. The theory is that God made man in his own image, and to alter same is sacrilege.

The members of the priesthood in the new churches, such as the so-called Synodical or Renewed Church, on the other hand, dismisse this creed as nonsense. They bob their hair in a boyish bob and do with or without beards as suits their style of beauty. For this heresy the Tikhonites authorities have branded the new priests as sinners and declared they will suffer in flames hereafter.

Russians are nothing if not good actors. The theatres of Moscow are the one feature of the city which, by common consent, out-rank their counterparts in Western Europe. Nicholas Ribakoff, assistant superintendent of the Commercial Trust of Tver, has acquired this commonplace bit of information at the cost of wounds which almost proved fatal.

Nicholas, like many Russian business men, was a bit short in his accounts. He fell back on the time-worn dodge of submitting to a fake robbery.

He hired two men to set upon him as he came from work, inflict a few light injuries and steal his portfolio, in which were ostensibly 450 roubles. He cautioned his accomplices to "beat me up so they won't suspect me."

Police found him two hours after the attack, lying unconscious, with a fractured skull, and bruised from head to foot. He remained unconscious twenty-four hours, then woke up in a delirium and gave the whole story away. He faces trial when he is released from the hospital.

Most of the victims were stricken during the night and included most of the staff. Hundreds of the inmates unable to relieve the pain attempted to escape from the building, the interior of which was wrecked by their attempts.

No deaths resulted although many are still ill.
