Dallas, Texas, Aug. 30 .- (AP) -Dan Moody, youthful Attorney General, today was heralded as governor-elect of Texas.

The unofficial returns from Saturday's run-off primary balloting in the Democratic gubernatorial contest gave Moody a lead of almost two to one over Governor Miram A. Fergudon. These returns gave Moody 469,182, Ferguson 247,100.

Statements were forthcoming from the camps of both candidates yesterday, although Governor Ferguson remained silent and permitted her husband, former Governor J. E. Ferguson to speak for C. Parkerson, of this city.


