

JAPAN'S TRADE WITH U. S. TAKES FOURTH PLACE

The Island Kingdom Spent \$250,000,000 With America Last Year

Washington, Sept. 14.—(INS)—An encouraging factor in the Far East, as it reacts toward a very important section of America's foreign trade, comes from Commercial Attache C. E. Herring, at Tokyo, who has informed Secretary of Commerce Hoover of a more optimistic view of business conditions in Japan.

The Island Kingdom stood fourth in the list of America's customers during the year ending July 1, with a total buying of about \$250,000,000 and any prospect noted in that country will mean, in all probability, dollars and cents in the pockets of exporters in the United States.

Herring said that the favorable viewpoint of the Japanese commercial situation comes as a result of continued excellent crop conditions. He added:

"The continued advance in exchange, however, is adversely affecting exports, particularly raw silk and cotton yarns. On the other hand, a few lines of import merchandise which were unobtainable at low exchange are now being marketed."

Herring pointed out that the steel market is improving with prices upward, chiefly on account of the strike in Osaka galvanizing plants and temporary cessation of imports from Great Britain as a result of the coal strike. Rails, black and galvanized plates and tin plate were reported as fairly active.

Prospects for building construction were good to the end of August. Considerable building activity was noted in Tokyo and Osaka but the business is going to Japanese plants, except where immediate delivery is an important factor.

Further increases in the tariff on steel products are under consideration, according to Herring. In August for the first time during the year, exports showed a slight excess over imports, an exceedingly favorable sign for domestic business.

"It is possible that the silk exportation law, which is scheduled to go into effect January 1, may be postponed as a result of pressure from the raw silk interests," Herring said. "The government, however, is apparently opposed to postponement."

A revision of the Japanese banking law is being studied. The plan of the ministry of finance for a revision of the banking system includes regulations for minimum capitalizations of 1,000,000 yen for commercial banks, the restriction of loans to one individual or firm to 10 per cent of the paid up capital and the compulsory addition of 10 per cent of profits to the reserve fund, against the five per cent required under the present law.

This reform is to be introduced in a bill at the next session of the diet, according to Herring.

"The Tokyo stock market is raggled with a decline in prices," Herring said. "Current quotations, however, average approximately the same as immediately prior to the heavy slump in New York last March and are not far below the average for this year. The money market is firm with rates tightening."

FEAR KEEPS FAMOUS WRITERS FROM SCREEN

New York, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The moving picture industry can get more 'big names' of fiction and play writing to do stories for the screen if the fear of most dramatists that the films are a foreign field can be broken down.

Such is the opinion of Owen Davis, eminent playwright and chairman of the Authors League of America, who wrote the play 'Forever After,' and recently aided in its screen production by the First National Company.

"The movies seem to be a bugaboo to many well-known writers today, whose works would be a great contribution to the screen,"

he said. "They feel that the cinema is an absolutely different medium of expression than the stage. It isn't."

KANSAS PARTIES IN NEW PRECEDENTS

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 10.—(INS)—The Republican and Democratic parties in Kansas are on record as establishing precedents. For the first time the Democrats have thrown by the wayside their former pronounced aversion to high protective tariffs and have enthusiastically endorsed the McNary-Haugen bill under the leadership of former Governor Jonathan M. Davis, their nominee. The Republicans, through Kansas has been honored for the first time in recent years in the selection of W. M. Jardine, of Manhattan, as a cabinet member—secretary of agriculture—have made no mention of the cabinet officer. His policies or extend him an invitation to participate in the biennial pow wows of his party.

The Democratic and Republican state conventions, just recently were held concurrently here at the capital.

Political observers claim there is much significance in the action of both parties. Some foresee dropping of the present doctrine by the Democrats all over the nation and a clamor for tariff protection.

Jardine's opposition to the McNary and Haugen bill was ascribed by many Republicans, privately, as the reason for obscuring the name of the former agricultural college president.

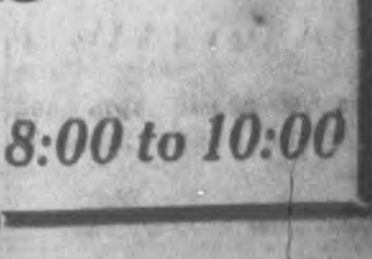
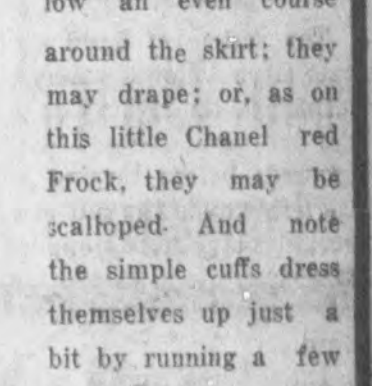
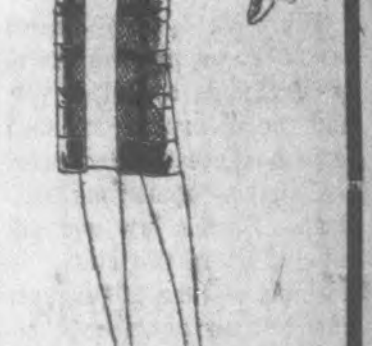
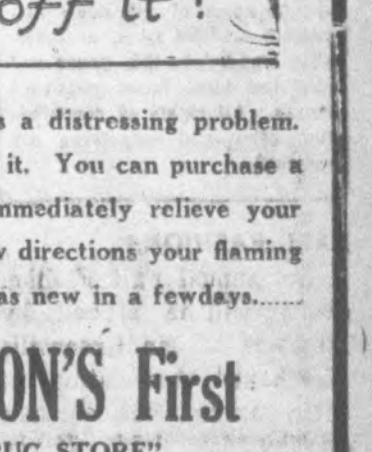
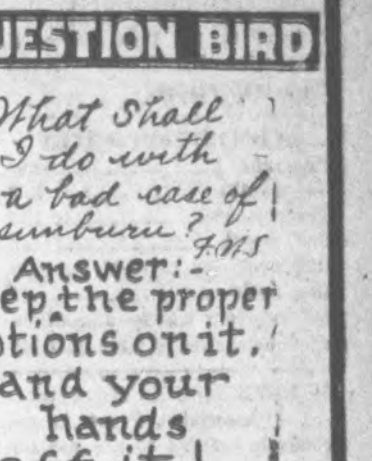
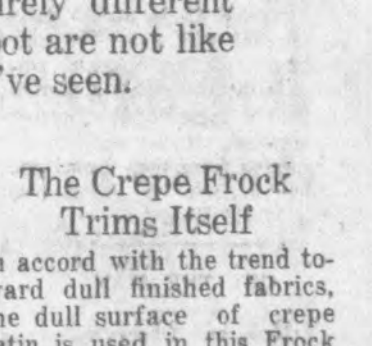
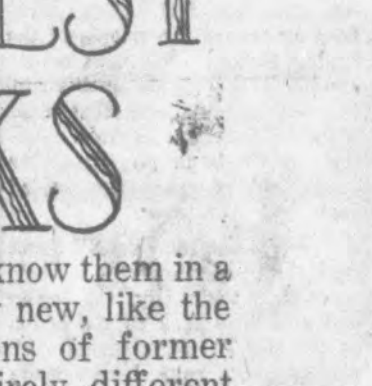
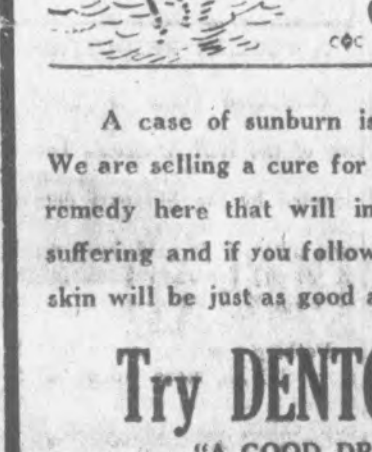
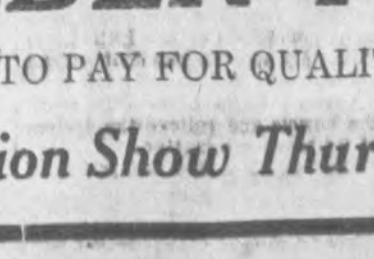
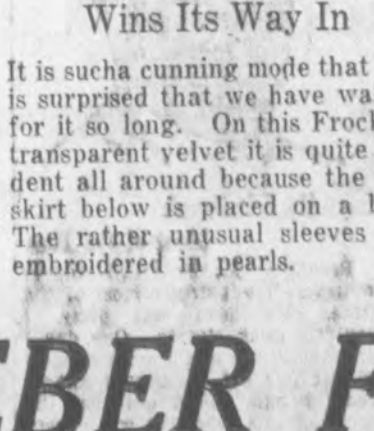
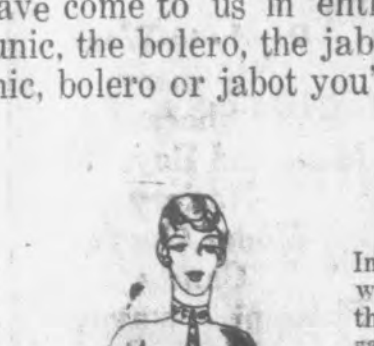
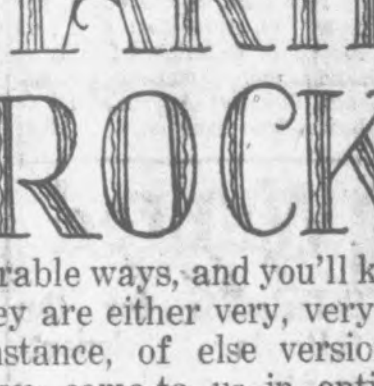
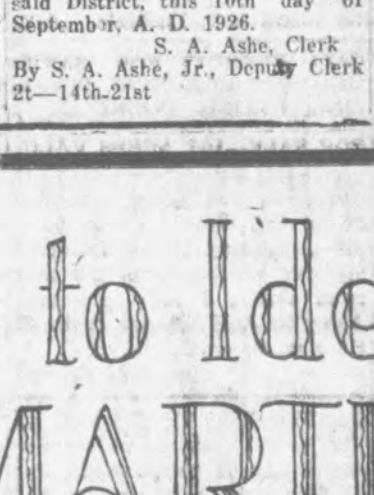
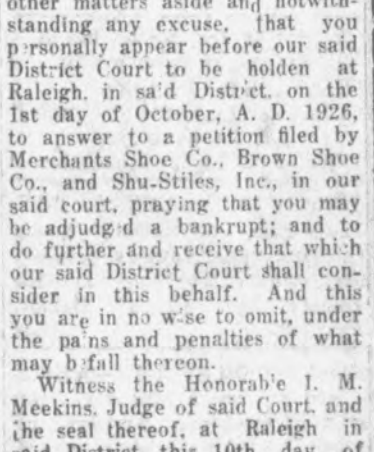
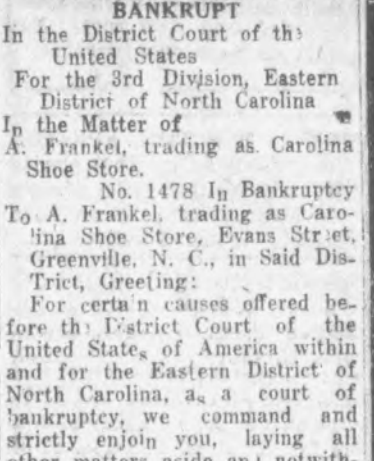
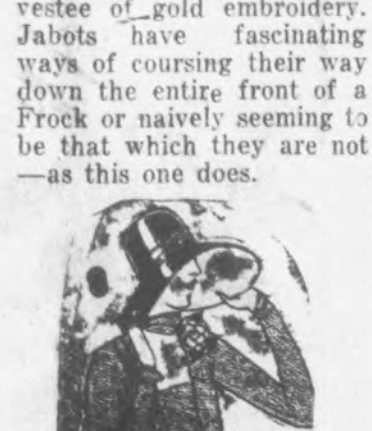
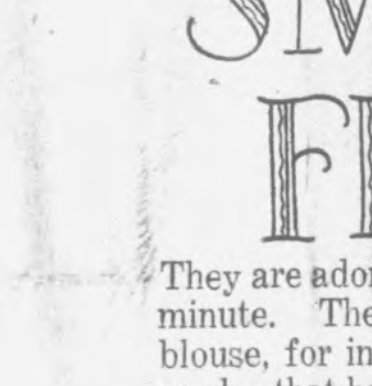
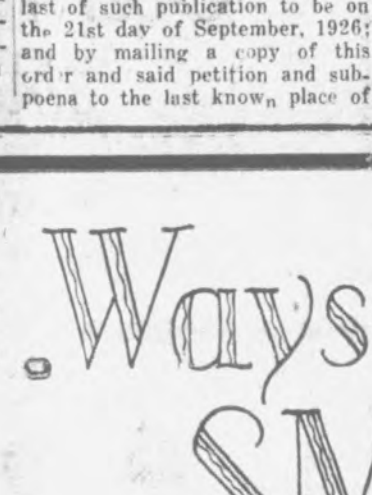
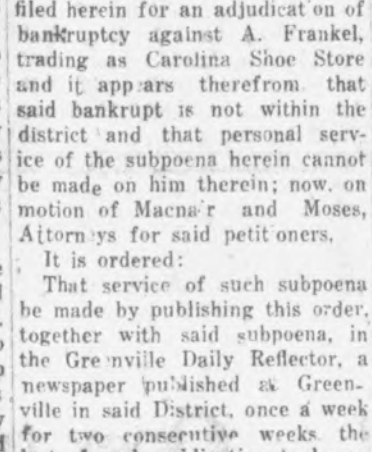
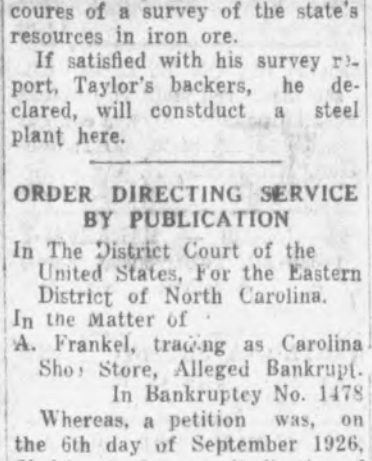
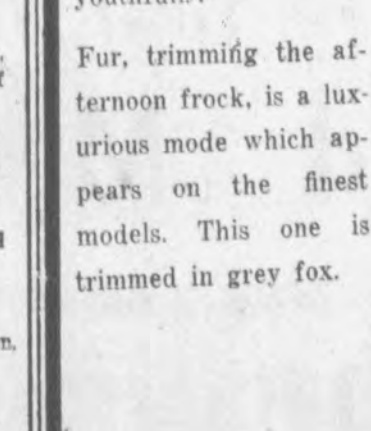
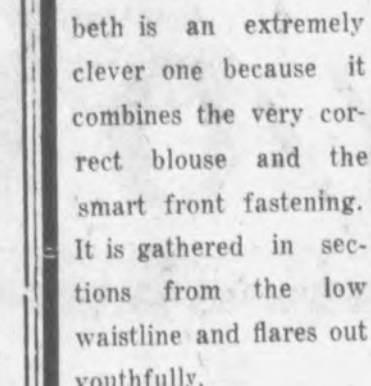
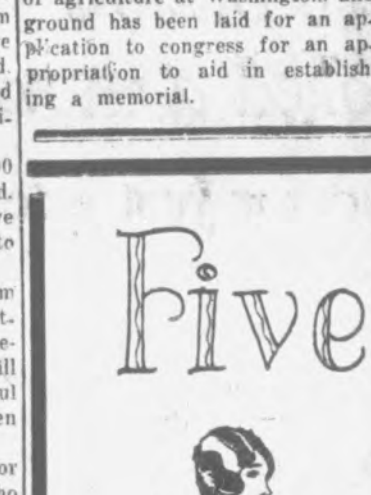
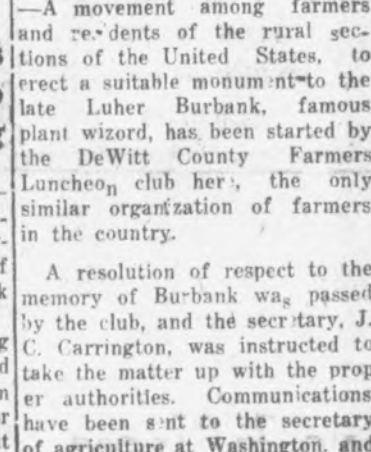
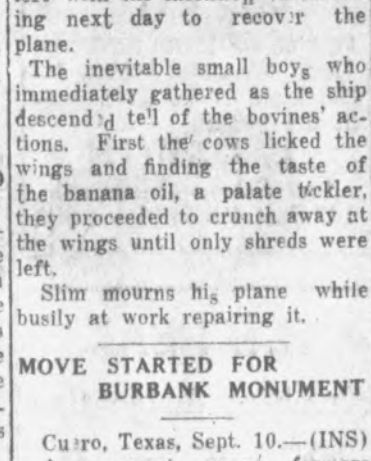
The Jabot Flutters at Random

A FOOLISH RESOLUTION

(Richmond Times Dispatch) A resolution opposing the holding of the 1927 American Legion convention in Paris has been adopted by the Missouri department of the legion. The action was taken, it is said, as a result of recent demonstrations in the country of France against visitors from this country.

Nothing could be more foolish, more childish, more calculated to create a disturbance where none now exists, than the thing Missouri ex-service men have done. Authoritative information from France does not bear out the contention in some quarters that there is in the breast of Frenchmen any real animosity toward Americans.

GET THE MAN

(News and Observer) The Commissioners of Robeson county moved in the right direction when they diverted the rewards, customarily allowed officers for the seizure of whiskey stills from the capture of the stills to the arrest of the man. Instead of receiving \$20 for every still, officers will bring in, provided at the same time they get the still.

The type of distilleries in vogue now is such that the loss of a complete outfit is not much of a handicap to the operator. It is not a serious financial loss. Many of the stills brought to the court house by officers, or torn up on the spot are manufactured of the simplest materials. A couple of metal washtubs, a coil of copper pipe such as might be secured from a discarded water heater, are the principal parts. They may be replaced so easily and with such small expense that the loss of a still merely means a temporary interruption for the blockader.

It's the man that counts, and the Robeson commissioners putting the emphasis on this phase of enforcement, may expect to get results. There is a suspicion, occasionally, that some deputies are not over-anxious to get the operator. They locate the still and are highly pleased when they can destroy the beer, beat up the still and carry the cap and worm back to the court house for the collection of prize money.

Under the policy of the Robeson commissioners, they will not be too hasty in the destruction of the still. They will spot the equipment and then wait for the operators.

A similar policy throughout the state would increase the effectiveness of prohibition enforcement a hundred per cent.

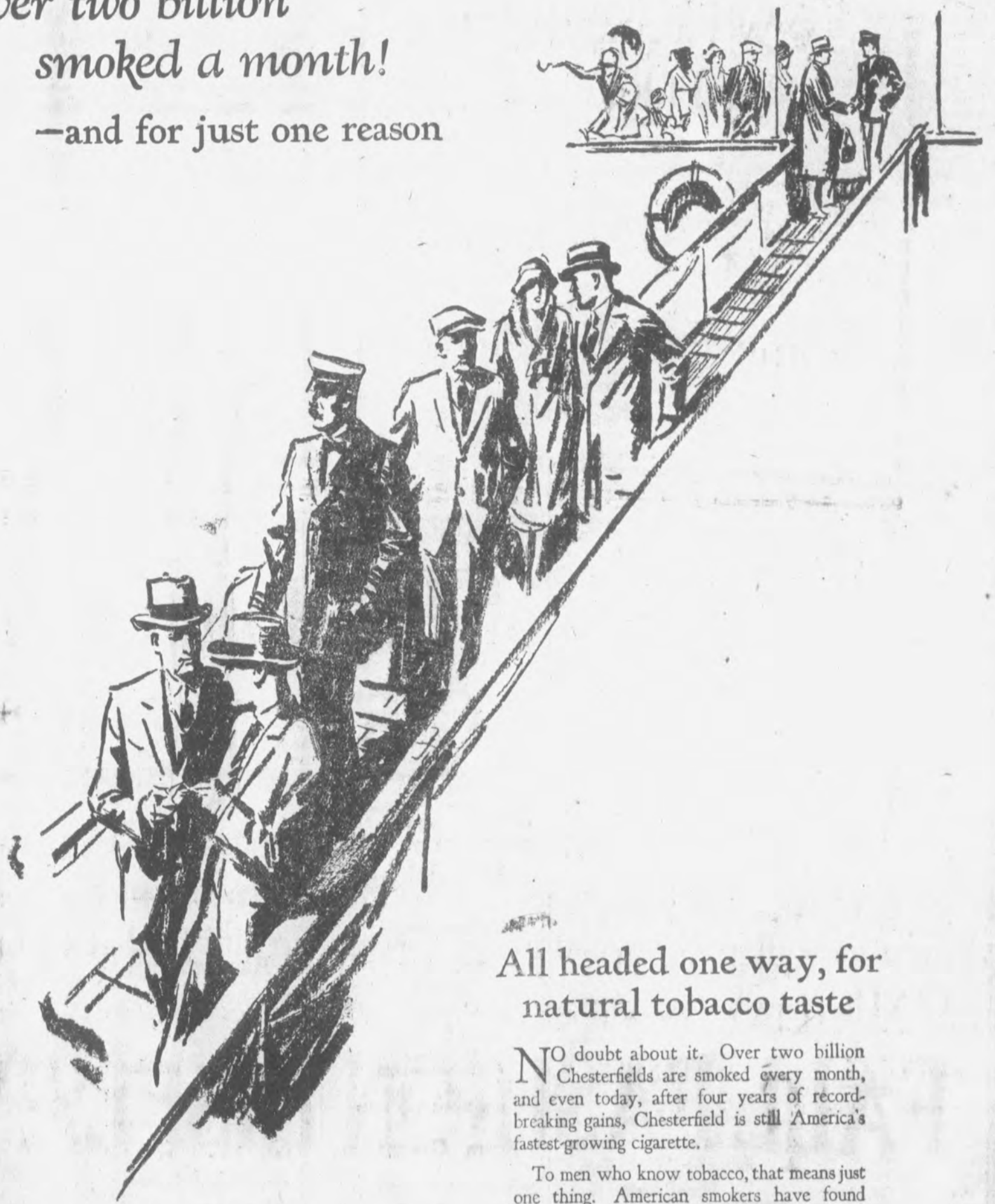

LONGER MULES IS NEED OF ARMY, IN PANAMA NOW

San Francisco, Sept. 13.—(INS)—The United States army today faces a serious dilemma, according to artillery officers at the San Francisco Presidio, famous Western army post.

The army either has to get a supply of mules with a chassis design like that of a German descendant or it will have to change the length of its cannon.

The problem arose in the Canal Zone where transportation of the standard 37 mm. gun is a problem because of lack of roads and impenetrable jungles.

Transporting the 37 mm. guns on wheels is out of the question in Panama.

The army has decided that the well-known mule shall be the means of going hither, thither and yon for the cannon.

Upon experimentation it was found that the trail of the gun was too long when packed on the present governmental issue of mule.

When packing this gun on muleback, the packer is faced with the problem of either tickling the mule's ears or his rump, two admittedly sensitive centers.

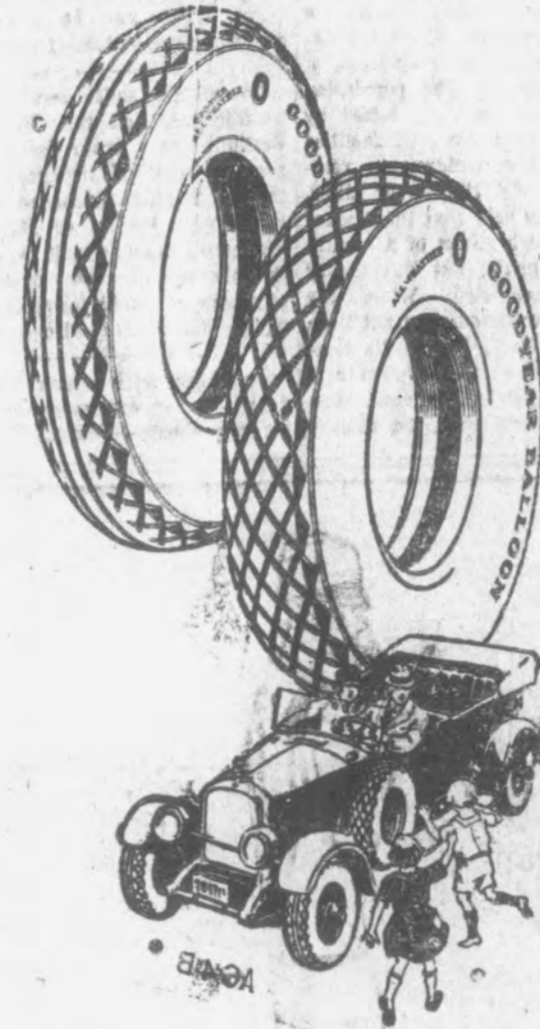

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Berlin, Sept. 14.—(INS)—Representatives of the United States and of the Soviet Union will sit at the same conference table during the International Police Congress, which promises to become a spectacular event and which will be held from September 25th until October 3rd.

The international character of the Congress is amply demonstrated by the fact that the Governments of 28 countries, European and other, will send delegates. The list of the countries represented which is subject to revision and amplification, includes Argentina, Bolivia, Bulgaria, Denmark, Free State of Danzig, Ecuador, Egypt, Estonia, Finland, Italy, Japan, Lithuania, Holland, Dutch Indies, Norway, Austria,

Peru, Poland, Sweden, Switzerland, Jugo-Slavia, Spain, Techeoslovakia, Hungary, United States of America, Venezuela, Greece and the Soviet Union. The United States representatives are Morgan A. Collins police superintendent, of Chicago; James W. Higgins, chief of Buffalo police, also the police president of Atlantic City, and the multi-millionaire John Harris, which presented Berlin with the first traffic tower modelled after a New York tower.

Great Britain will be represented by the chief of the British Women Police, Mary S. Allen.

About a dozen children from three to twelve years old died in the border district of East Prussia as a result of an epidemic of spinal paralysis. The population of these districts were seized by a panic and hundreds of families fled with their children to relatives in nearby villages or cities. Some experts held that the disease spread through stings of a certain species of gnats, but this theory has been contested. While the cause of the disease has not been ascertained Prof. Dr. Mortiz Katzenstein head of the surgical division of a Berlin Municipal Hospital announced that the disease

can be cured by an operation, but this operation can be only performed after certain orthopedic exercises or electrical massages have failed. Katzenstein replaces part of the paralyzed muscles by parts of unaffected muscles. Katzenstein asserts that he applied his method with good results.

Artistically designed 'congrats' telegram forms of hand-made paper are the latest innovation of German Postal Authorities. Special care will be taken in writing the messages in ink and the message will be delivered in special envelopes. An extra charge of ten cents is raised for these messages, which can be sent from any telegraph station of the Reich.

Commercial radio service will be introduced on the Hamburg-Berlin express train for passengers desirous of listening in to the latest stock exchange quotations from Berlin, or Hamburg. Interested persons will be able to make use of these quotations by means of radio telephone with which this train is also equipped.

The Erie railroad says motor omnibuses have cut its receipts by more than \$1,000,000 a year.

That's sad, but the Erie's intelligent president knows that railroads killed the stage coaches entirely, and crying did not help the stage coach owners.

The people own their highways, they want motor buses and will have them, just as they will have flying routes that will eventually kill all long-distance passenger traffic on railroads.

Railroad men must use their brains in this emergency. Political tools, usually relied on, will not meet the situation.

You cannot legislate motor buses and flying machines out of existence now, any more than you could kill the railroad 125 years ago. British aristocracy tried that, calling in the clergy to prove that snorting locomotives were wicked and disrespectful to God. But the locomotives continued snorting.

Four nuns, including one mother superior of Franciscan Convent in Massachusetts, are arrested, accused of smuggling into this country from Canada \$5,000 worth of fine laces, carried in hidden pockets.

This will be exploited by those that specialize in hostility to the Catholic church.

The incident has no more to do with the Catholic church than the Reverend Doctor Hall's career and murder have to do with the Episcopal, or any other Protestant church.

In addition, should the charge against the nuns be sustained, it will be remembered that the laces would have been sold by them for charity. They have no money of their own.

Evading customs house regulations, as everyone knows, is not considered a crime even by prosperous women, of whom thousands smuggle in finery for their own use.

"Baby Garages" Now Popular in Some Towns

New York, Sept. 13.—(INS)—'Park Your Baby Here — Lowest Rates — Best Service.' Mothers must shop. Children need attention. Nurse girls are expensive. Solution—'Baby Garages.' In New York, the health depart-

ment provides stations in congested districts where children are looked after for the small sum of twenty cents a day.

Chicago is, however, making the first real step in the 'Baby Garage' field. A building large enough to accommodate 2,000 youngsters will soon be thrown open for business.

In some of the larger cities of the country, department stores are trying to solve the problem, if it may be called such, by providing nurseries where women may safely 'check' their youngsters before attacking the bargain counters.

But this method of handling the situation has been found unsatisfactory. Your female shopper is a peculiar creature. She requires untrammelled freedom. To deposit her child or children in the nursery of one store restricts from going around to others and making necessary comparisons. Then again, the big bargain of the day may be located in a store providing no nursery facilities.

The field for the new industry seems fertile enough. With the added stimulus of some enterprising business men, the 'Baby Garage' idea may become a fact in all the large cities of the country.

NASHVILLE PEOPLE BUY MONTGOMERY POULTRY JOURNAL

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 13.—Purchase of The Southern Poultry Journal, published at Montgomery, Ala., by The Dixie Dairy and Poultry Journal, of Nashville Tenn., was announced today by G. G. Sanderson, business manager of the latter publication.

The equipment of the Montgomery publication will be moved to Nashville immediately, and the October issue will be that of the combined journals, which will carry the name of The Dixie Dairy and Poultry Journal.

mal Husbandry at Peabody College, Nashville. The Dixie Dairy and Poultry Journal has become recognized as an authority in the poultry and dairy field throughout the South.

The report shows that there are 182 public schools and 63 private schools in the territory with enrollments of 58,860 and 9,651 respectively.

British telegraph system is so slow that it is quicker to send a message from London to Liverpool, 200 miles, via New York, a round trip of 6,000 miles, than to send it direct.

It is stated that the Postoffice telegraph system has lost \$5,000,000 annually for many years and that the investigation now under way is designed to check this loss, as well as to improve the service.
