SIX MILLION POUNDS TOBACCO SOLD HERE SINCE OPENING DAY

3,228,164 Pounds Sold This Week at Average of \$26.54. Season Average \$26.08 Per Hundred.

The Greenville Tobacco Market for the week ending last night, sold 3,228,164 pounds of tobacco \$26.54 per hundred pounds. This week's sales, added to those of the four selling days opening week bring the season's total sales to 6,000,660 pounds with an average price of \$26.08, bringing a total of \$1,565,556.27.

Sales for the same period last season were 4,566,482 pounds, a gain of approximately a million and a half pounds in favor of the present season, while the average price this season is about \$11.00 per hundred above that of the same period last season.

This big gain made by the local market in the face of reports of a short crop is evidence that the market is drawing attention of the entire section and is serving a wider territory than ever before.

While most of the offerings on the market since the opening have been the lower grades, there have been some of the better grades of tobacco on the floors during the past week and these grades showed more strength as the week came to an end. The four sets of buyers on the local market this season have made it possible for the market to stay caught up despite the large increase in the sales over former seasons.

J. W. Godwin Died Late Yesterday From Pneumonia

John William Godwin, died at his home on Ward street at five o'clock yesterday afternoon. Death was the result of pneumonia and came after only a week's confinement. Funeral services will be conducted at the residence at 7:30 tomorrow morning, by Rev. L. E. Ballard, pastor of the Free Will Baptist church, of which the deceased was a member. The body will then be carried by motorhearse to Columbia, N. C., where interment will take place in the family burying ground at one o'clock in the afternoon.

Mr. Godwin, the son of F. W. Godwin, had been a resident of this city for the past five years and was in the employ of the Texas Oil Company. He came to this city from Columbia. He was a member of the local Free Will Baptist church and an active member of the local fire department. Members of the fire company will accompany the body to Columbia tomorrow and will act as pallbearers at the funeral.

Dissolves Injunction Against Charlotte Police Commission

Charlotte, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Judge A. M. Stack today dissolved the temporary injunction restraining police interference with the services of Bishop C. M. Grace, "with heal r." The action came at a hearing in Mecklenburg Superior court at which city commissioners here were called to show cause why the injunction should not be made permanent.

The commission last Saturday had placed a ban on further meetings by the Bishop. The ban was ordered by the city when charges declared "unethical" for a minister were heard from pastors of the city. It was alleged at the time that Grace was planning to baptize 600 negroes last Sunday, at \$3.00 each. The baptism was held following the temporary restraining order against officials, but the preacher denied that a charge of \$3.00 was placed on each of those baptized.

FLORIDA COAST IN THROES HEAVY TROPICAL STORM

Heavy Property Damage Reported as Result of Raging Sea And High Winds.

Miami, Fla., Sept. 18.—(AP)—Shipwrecked to cover early today before the first force of the tropical hurricane which entered yesterday at Nassau, capital city of the Bahamas Islands.

A slowly dropping barometer and steady rising of the wind and sea forecast the approach of the storm, which was reported from Havana, Cuba, last night as having a wind velocity of 100 miles an hour.

At Miami Beach, a heavy surf was pounding 20 feet or more above the usual high water line, and his waves at Biscayne Bay endangered the cause way connecting Miami Beach with the mainland. Automobiles, stalled on the causeway, while in Miami street car and power lines were down. High waves already beginning to attack along the water front at Palm Beach and Ocean Boulevard, which was washed away in a number of places by the July storm, was being enforced by rock and heavy timber. Yachts hastily moved to safety in inland canals. Lack of communication with Nassau handicapped by the dismantling of radio stations, made news of possible destruction in the Bahamas impossible to receive.

The last radio message from Nassau was received at seven o'clock last night.

FLOOD WATERS DO MUCH DAMAGE TO CROPS IN MIDWEST

Acres of Grain Flooded as Levees Give Way Before Swollen Streams.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The middle west mounted guard today over its grain field treasury which was further menaced by flood swollen rivers because of new rains.

All through the surging course of the Skunk River in Southwest Iowa, bundles of green cornstalks were pressed into service at places on the levees, sacrificed to save the high yield of the bumper crop as yet untouched by the waters. Patrols manned the embankment where the corn was weighted down with sand bags, on the look-out for first signs of such a cap as that through which water flowed to submerge 6,000 acres south of Burlington three to four feet deep.

Across the Illinois line men who have labored ceaselessly since Wednesday, patrolled a thin wall of sanding between Beardstown and the Illinois River, which is swollen by torrents from the tributaries. Much of the city of 7,000 persons is under water and workers said a break in the dikes would probably make futile all efforts to restrain the stream.

Residents of both the Skunk and Illinois valleys scanned clearing skies today however, and it was thought the streams were past crest stage.

Northwestern Iowa bore the brunt of the latest deluge in the middle west, the length and breadth of which has been swept four times within the last two weeks by torrential rainfall.

Lions Complain. Here's a Real Trust. A Good Constitution. A Greater Jewish Race. By ARTHUR BRISBANE

George Eastman, for whom the tens of millions profitably press the button, while he does the rest, arrives from the African jungles, saving seven lions, one rhinoceros and one buffalo with good cause for complaint. They did not dream that a 72-year-old philanthropist would come all the way from Rochester, N. Y., to shoot the life out of them.

Killing lions is useful, say Mr. Eastman has work on hand ten times as much as the usual work of a lion hunter, namely the development of education through moving pictures. Destroying time and intelligence to that work he will render service to all living children and to billions unborn.

The European steel trust is now in shape, and old fashioned trusts look small compared with the modern industrial-financial dinosaur of Europe. The steel industries of Germany, France, Luxembourg, and Belgium are all in one company, organized to fight the rest of the world.

Luckily we have a tariff, useful in fighting. But we need the biggest possible business units to compete with modern methods.

This is the one hundred and thirty-ninth birthday of the United States Constitution. It has worn well. The fathers that built it with long struggling seeking to protect the rights of separate states would be surprised if they could read the new and fancy trills attached to their document. What would surprise them most, not one of them so far as known being a total abstainer, would be the 18th amendment with its bootleg and crime by-products.

Those ancients having got rid of a king, determined that no kingly power should ever arise in America.

It never occurred to them that power MUST BE SOMEWHERE. They could not foresee that taxation without representation far greater than that of King George would soon be located in Wall Street, and elsewhere in the offices of great corporations.

Rothstein is 105 years old; lives in the home of the daughters of Jacob, and observes a rigid fast beginning today which is Yom Kippur. Adherence to Moses laws accounts in part for long life among Jewish people. Moses might have written different dietary laws if his people had had refrigerators run by electricity, but many of those laws are still sound.

PRESIDENT QUILTS FOUR SUSPECTS SUMMER HOME IN NEW YORK STATE WELCOME TRIAL

Presidential Party Left White Pine Camp For Washington This Morning.

Gabriels, N. Y., Sept. 18.—(AP)—President and Mrs. Coolidge left here today by special train at 7:40 A. M. Eastern Standard Time, on their return to Washington from their vacation in the Adirondacks.

Motoring six miles from White Pine Camp, which was for over ten weeks the Summer White House, Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge found natives and summer residents out in full force to bid farewell at the train.

The ride will take them out of the mountains and down the Mohawk and Hudson River valleys, over the New York Central railroad to the vicinity of New York City, and then to Philadelphia and Washington.

The weather was fair and cool for the trip.

Holders Preferred Stock Will Get No Extra Dividend

Richmond, Va., Sept. 18.—(AP)—The right of preferred stockholders of the Southern Railway Company to participate equally with common stockholders in dividends in excess of five per cent annually, was denied by Judge Beverly T. Crump in law and equity court here today.

TOURISTS INTERFERE WITH CHEESE WORKERS

Alkmaar, Holland, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Cheese carriers here recently protest to the master of the cheese market that American tourists who flock to the weekly Friday market are impeding their work.

The cheese carriers guild, which last year celebrated its three hundredth anniversary in the ancient weigh house of Alkmaar in the presence of Queen Wilhelmina, has no objection, it says, to tourists witnessing the spectacle of the sale and weighing of the cheeses, but the carriers object to being halted in their work by Americans who purposely get in their way in order to photograph them.

A pair of these carriers move from 10 to 30 tons of cheese in a day.

Prosecution Indicates Some of Witnesses To Face Grand Jury On Perjury Charge.

Somerville, N. J., Sept. 18.—(AP)—Four persons charged with the murder of Dr. E. Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, today were on record as welcoming a trial as an opportunity to prove their innocence, although the state is looking forward to new and startling revelations against them. The state has abandoned or postponed efforts to indict for perjury three of four witnesses against the slain doctor's widow and three of her male relatives.

Special prosecutor Simpson, indicated, however, that one of the witnesses concerned, Ralph V. Gorsline, might be called before the September 19 Grand Jury. Mr. Simpson declared he had evidence that Gorsline did not tell the jury that indicted the four defendants, all he saw when he and Miss Catherine Restall were in a car parked near the murder scene.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Hall, her eyes in and two brothers indicted with her, are preparing to oppose the summoning from another county a jury to try them, although they say they will welcome trial.

The four defendants were arraigned late yesterday and all pleaded not guilty. Mrs. Hall's bail of \$15,000 was raised to \$40,000 and the other three were held in jail without bail.

GEORGIA JUDGE WOULD GIVE AUTOMOBILE THIEVES CHAIN GANG SENTENCES

Atlanta, Sept. 18.—(INS)—Longer terms on Georgia chain gangs were urged by Superior Court Judge John T. Humphries in denouncing the practice of giving suspended sentences to youths, convicted of stealing automobiles. Judge Humphries made the recommendation in charging the county grand jury.

Pointing out that 1,308 cars were stolen in Atlanta in the space of one year, Judge Humphries declared automobile thieves will never be curbed unless stiffer sentences are imposed.

Judge Humphries also hit the practice of discriminating in favor of youths who came from good families.

"Before I would discriminate in favor of boys with good families against the boys who have never had the chances of life they enjoyed, I would rather resign my judgeship," he declared.

MEXICAN TROOPS KILL THIRTEEN OF BANDIT FORCES

Mexican Authorities Give Assurance They Will Punish Bandits Who Slew American.

Mexico City, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Thirteen men have been killed by Mexican troops pursuing bandits who stabbed Jacob Rosenthal of Woodmere, N. Y., to death. Six of those killed were regarded by troops as guilty bandits and the others were suspects.

Three known bandits were killed when soldiers disguised as civilians went to their lair ostensibly to pay them the \$10,000 ransom which had been demanded. Seven suspects were killed yesterday in fighting with federal troops. The other seven men who had been identified by Joseph Ruff, Mr. Rosenthal's son-in-law, as having been with the bandit party which last Sunday robbed the members of Mr. Rosenthal's automobile party and took him away into the mountains, were shot last night when an attempt to rescue them was made, it was announced.

These three had confessed. They were being taken under military escort from Mexico City to be examined at the scene of the kidnapping. A statement issued by the police, says "a party of men supposedly friends of the bandits, attempted to rescue them and in the fight they were killed."

Mexican troops are searching the region where the crime was committed and Mexican authorities have given assurance they will do everything possible to punish the bandits.

JACKSON'S BONDSMEN MADE SETTLEMENT WITH COUNTY TODAY

NEWSPAPERS WILL BROADCAST ABOUT DEMPSEY-TUNNEY

Head of Sesqui-Centennial Declares Rickard Not be Allowed To Prohibit Broadcasting.

Philadelphia, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The newspapers of the country will not be shut out from broadcasting the details of the Dempsey-Tunney fight they receive over the wires from the ringside.

W. L. Austin, director general of the Sesqui-Centennial, was the authority for the statement. Mr. Austin said he saw no possible way in which Rickard could prevent broadcasting and added that if the promoter attempted to do so the Sesqui-Centennial officials would not permit it.

"Mr. Austin said his statement was made because it had been given out by Tex Rickard, promoter of the bout, in the Sesqui-Centennial stadium next Thursday night, that the broadcasting rights would be leased and that newspapers broadcasted the fight from their own sources it would constitute an infringement."

VICTIM OF CAFE FIRE WILMINGTON DIES IN HOSPITAL

Wilmington Woman On Death Bed Tells Of Heroic Struggle To Save Husband's Life.

Wilmington, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Details of a heroic struggle to save her husband from death were released last night by Mrs. W. H. Vredenburg, just before she died in a local hospital from burns received Sept. 4 in a cafe fire.

Mr. Vredenburg, the cafe proprietor, died in the flames.

According to the dying woman's statement, she and her husband were awakened by the flames licking up around their bed. Her husband was suffering from heart trouble and was unable to handle himself in the smoke filled room, so she was forced to drag and carry him to a window, but he died before she could raise it.

A few moments later Mrs. Vredenburg was rescued by firemen and taken to a hospital where she succumbed last night from her injuries.

MANUNA LOA RISING BODILY INTO AIR

Honolulu, Sept. 18.—(INS)—The great floor of Kilauea crater and much of the mountain side of Manuna Loa in the vicinity of the volcano is rising bodily into the air, according to scientists taking observations at the place and this evidence of tremendous pressure within the mountain points to another eruption.

These men are convinced that Kilauea will erupt "sooner or later," but they decline to hazard a guess as to the approximate time this will occur. Very decided tilting of the crater floor during the month of July indicated that an eruption might occur this summer, but this tilting subsided temporarily and has only lately begun again. Persons in close touch with the scientific observance of the volcano will naturally occur at the old crater, this being the point of least resistance on the mountain side. There is therefore no cause for alarm among persons living at the Volcano House three or four miles distant.

TOLSTOI'S GRAND-DAUGHTER LOSES CUSTODY OF CHILD BY PRAGUE COURT DECREE

Prague, Sept. 18.—(INS)—The domestic affairs of Vera Tolstai move from the mold the next Bakovsky are causing as much public interest as those of her more famous grandfather, Count Leo Tolstai.

The court here has had to settle the question of the disposition of her child as the result of her claims and those of her divorced husband to custody of their offspring. The father kidnapped the child from Deauville and brought it to Prague, where he put it under the care of a German woman.

The mother brought suit to have the child returned to her because she did not want it to grow up under German influence. The court decided in favor of the mother, but when she went to take the child it cried and refused to go without the father.

Pay \$26,352.18 to cover Shortage of A. C. Jackson Who Was Removed From Sheriff's Office.

Former Judge Albion Dunn, representing the Fidelity and Deposit Company, of Maryland, this morning turned over to Mr. J. B. James, attorney for Pitt county, a check for \$26,352.18, to cover money due the county for former Sheriff A. C. Jackson, as disclosed by the company's audit of the county's books. In addition to the money paid over the company in the settlement agreement with the County Commissioner's assumed liability for any other unaccounted for amounts that may be discovered later. The settlement agreement was reached at an adjourned meeting of the County Commissioners held here Thursday night and the papers were drawn and executed and the settlement made today.

The settlement brings to within sixty days, the case of the county against A. C. Jackson, who was removed from the office of sheriff during July by court order on petition of the county commissioners alleging irregularity in handling of public funds. Upon finding records of collected money that had not been turned over to the county, the commissioners immediately set a date upon which settlement must be made and when on that date Jackson was found to be absent from the county, the commissioners petitioned the court for his removal.

The bonding company was immediately notified and auditors came to this city to take charge of the books. Since that time there have been several conferences between the commissioners and representatives of the bonding company and the settlement was reached Thursday night as a result of these conferences. The tax books were turned back over to the county and the sheriff will proceed with the collection of the balance of the 1925 taxes.

HONOLULU PLANTATION HAS RECORD CROP OF SUGAR

Honolulu, Sept. 18.—(INS)—More than 6,000 persons, 2,000 of whom were employees of Ewa plantation, this island, celebrated the end of the successful harvest of a record crop of 52,811 tons of sugar. This is the second "harvest home" at Ewa plantation and one of the few such celebrations ever held on the islands.

Last year Ewa had a crop of 50,800, which was itself a record. On "harvest home" day, every worker on the plantation is given a holiday and paid a full day's wages besides. Japanese, Filipinos, Chinese, Porto Ricans, Koreans and Portuguese make up the laboring class of the plantation.

KANSAS VOTING MAY BE MIXED IN HARD FIGHT

"Safe and Sound" Election May Become Battleground in National Struggle; Cabinet Member Goes Home to Take Part in Dispute Over Farm Relief

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 17.—(INS)—Kansas cherished "safe and sound" election in November may be torn with strife and bitter antagonism, and may become the battleground of the national fight over farm relief, despite efforts of Republican leaders throughout the state to put on a bold face and put the matter in the background. Such is the opinion in party circles throughout the state as the result of the contest which has been waged hotly between Ralph Snyder, president of the Kansas Farm Bureau, and W. M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture.

Secretary Jardine, fighting the McNary-Haugen form of relief legislation, has made his home state the front line trenches in his support of the co-operative marketing plan. Characterizing the McNary-Haugen bill as radical and economically unsound and pernicious, Secretary Jardine for the first time dissected the measure, pointing out the administration contention that the tariff is a dangerous method of approach, and that what amount to gifts to the farmers is not a sound principle.

Snyder has engaged in a campaign of speaking tours throughout the state to counteract the speeches made by Jardine. The secretary has been so little in favor of his party, due to his attitude on the McNary-Haugen measure that the recent meeting of the state convention failed to mention an endorsement of him for a cabinet position, although he is Kansas' only native son candidate.

Unofficial advisers from leaders of the administration forces have stated that the visit of Jardine, although catalogued by himself as "purely personal" has the endorsement of the administration, and that it is the plan of the farm relief fight.

Although the Kansas delegation backed the so-called "subsidy measure," state leaders state that there is a strong possibility of sentiment in Kansas swinging in favor of the co-operative plan, thus counteracting the activity of the Iowa corn belt group, and the farmers committees, backing the

McNary-Haugen measure.

The fate of the administration attempts in the state will probably depend on the result of the meeting in Southeast Kansas October 15. Secretary Jardine has expressed his intention of being present at that meeting to present the administration view, and Snyder already busy in that district, in opposition.

HOLLYWOOD STYLE HINTS

Los Angeles, Sept. 17.—(INS)—Blanche Sweet believes it is practical to select a certain color for a season and to have everything in tone.

"My screen work makes it hard for me to use only one color," she said, "because I am compelled to have a great assortment of wardrobe, both in type and color, but before I engaged in film work I selected one color for each season. I still prefer that way of planning a wardrobe."

"One winter everything was blue, in varied shades. Another year I selected brown and wore many shades of it from light tans to deepest brown."

"Still another time I chose green; and perhaps the most attractive of all was a black wardrobe. Black is one of my most becoming colors."

The "color wardrobe" will help one effect a considerable saving in clothing costs, Miss Sweet declared, as various hats, shoes and gowns can thus be worked together, giving a greater variety than if one attempted to use a range of colors.

SKYSCRAPERS PUNCTURE SAN FRANCISCO SKYLINE

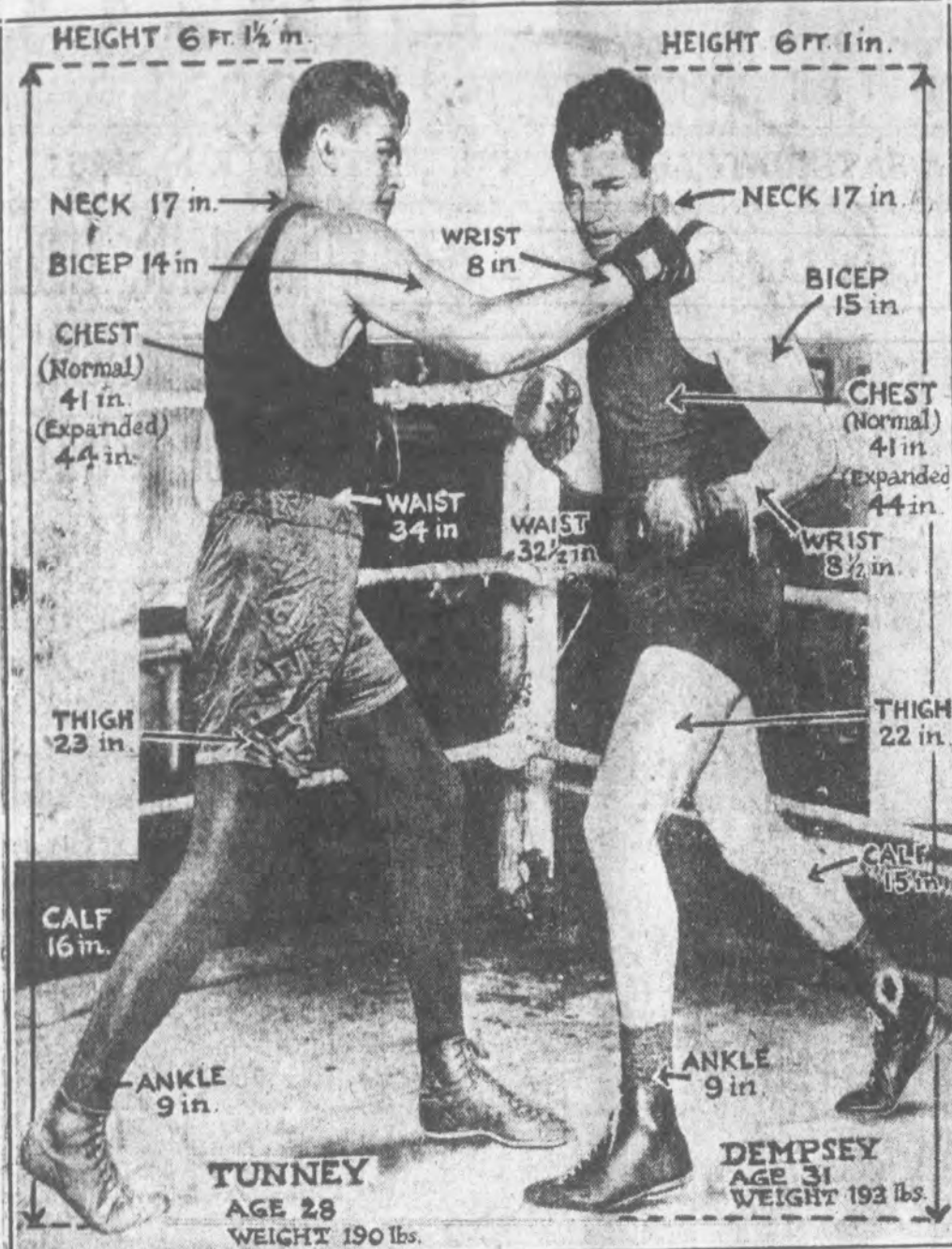
San Francisco, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Puncturing a sthetic opposition and thrusting aside fear of damage from seismic disturbances, the sky scraper definitely has triumphed on the Pacific Coast.

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"THE HOPE OF ISRAEL"

S. Luke 24:21:—"But we trusted that it had been He which should have redeemed Israel."

These words form part of the reported conversation between the two disciples on their walk from Jerusalem to Emmaus, eight miles away, and the Stranger who had joined them on their journey.

Which one was speaking we do not know. Indeed, one of the speakers is entirely unknown; and of the other, all we know is his name, Cleopas. The Stranger we know. He has made Himself known to our hearts, and it is of Him we sing:

"One there is above all others
Well deserves the name of Friend,
His is love beyond a brother's
Costly, free, and knows no end.
They who once His kindness prove
Find it everlasting love."

1st. Note that the Israelites had a Hope. These two men were the type of their countrymen. In common with the faith of their fathers they looked for One who would redeem Israel. (See Acts 1:6). They expected a Deliverer who would free their nation from the yoke of Roman bondage. It was a national expectation. "We trusted it had been He," they said.

Herein the Jewish people differed from other ancient people. The poetry and mythology of Greece and Rome reveal that the eyes of their people were fixed on some golden, heroic age in the past; and are tinged with regret rather than with hope. The Hebrews, on the contrary, looked forward. They, too, had their heroic ages of history, their Moses, their David, their Elijah; but their constant gaze was directed to the future, when an era should be of which the golden days of David were but a type and figure.

No one can carefully read the Old Testament without being impressed with its prevailing Messianic character; and discovering how that prophecy divides into two lines:—the Human Deliverer and the Divine Savior. These two lines of hope run side by side—and

are only truly fulfilled in Christ.

2nd. Not the Sources of Their Hope. When these two disciples told Jesus of their disappointment over recent events in the city of Jerusalem, He comforted them by taking them back to the original springs of their hope—the Hebrew Scriptures and their national history. "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, He expounded unto them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself."

One would give much to have been present at that exposition! Yet we have the same Scriptures, and the Spirit who "guideth into all truth."

"Beginning at Moses," I think Jesus would have recalled the promise made to Eve (Genesis 3:15); and the promise to Abraham (Genesis 22:18). He would not like to forget the Paschal lamb, the Scape-goat, the brazen serpent, the star and scepter, the smitten rock, or the greater Prophet—all of which are written in the books of Moses; and all of which are applied to Him by New Testament writers.

"And all the Prophets":—It would be impossible in the space allotted me to name all that these inspired preachers said concerning the Coming One—the Messiah; but I will ask the careful reader to refer in their own meditation to the following passages:

CARELESS DRIVING CAUSE ACCIDENTS

(Wilson Times)

Now since the tobacco markets have opened and there is more traffic in the highways with the increase of fall business, it would be well for all vehicles to observe sensible rules and regulations to prevent accidents.

While the legislature killed the bill to require the drivers of all kinds of vehicles to carry lights at most unwise measure for all hands in the opinion of the Times we feel that all vehicles should carry lights for their own protection if for no other reason.

It is very difficult to see a wagon or a buggy without lights proceeding along the highway especially if the coming lights are between a vehicle and your own car, and since it is difficult to see beyond the lights of the car coming accidents on this account are likely to occur.

Again people driving automobiles should be compelled to carry lights. Frequently cars are seen on the road and driving rapidly without lights, and this of course, will cause an accident, because if another car is coming with lights, it is impossible to see the car without lights.

Again the habit of taking chances of getting by another car with one coming in the distance only a short way is also dangerous, and if persisted in will eventually carry the driver to sorrow because one cannot get by with it forever. Something might happen, he might miscalculate the distance, the car coming might not slow down as they frequently do not, then it would be the end of the world for some one.

Another is the habit of driving up on highways from side roads without stopping to see whether there are cars coming liable to cause a collision. This is frequently the cause of accidents.

North Carolina leads all states in number of accidents and our people should be more careful.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Philadelphia, Sept. 18.—(INS)—On the files of the Missing Persons Bureau at City Hall here, are written stories too real for fiction. 'Why Girls Leave Home,' has been shown on stage and screen but here in The Port of Missing Girls the true reason is given.

Today Philadelphia police are searching for 4,000 persons and of this number more than 28 per cent are women, mostly minors.

According to statistics 95 per cent of missing persons are recovered.

Margaret Lyons is on file in the Bureau. She was reported missing. She was 16, when she walked out of her home. Search has been made several years. She is still missing, although search was diligently made.

Unfortunately, according to Missing Persons Bureau officials, the time that elapses in finding an elusive 'missing girl,' is the period in which she breaks under the strain of loneliness and hunger and, faced with disappointment, turns in desperation to the first offer of help—help, investigators say, usually proffered by a man versed in the ways of deception, and fraught with danger.

radio has been a great help, investigators say in the recovery of missing persons.

The innocent motorist who offers a 'hitch' to the hitch-hiker is an enemy to the Missing Persons Bureau, Charles Schwarz, efficient chief of the Bureau told visitors. It helps the runaway to put distance between home and indefinite, perhaps dangerous destiny.

There are girls who will remain on the missing files forever, it was said; girls whose absence is unwarranted; the girls who disappear leaving neither trace nor clue.

The 95 per cent found are soon supplanted by new missing.

Wood can now be 'embalmed' to withstand the ravages of time even as the Egyptian Mummies have stood the test of ages. The process has been scientifically perfected by Dr. S. Weinberg, consulting engineer, working in conjunction with scientists at the University of Pennsylvania.

This 'Wood Embalming' fluid Dr. Weinberg asserts preserves dead trees so that lumber cannot rot or decay or be eaten by wood worms.

The 'embalming' of trees and dead lumber is made possible Dr. Weinberg explained, through injection of certain poisons which kill all wood worms and protect the wood against the elements.

Telegraph poles and railroad ties are now 'embalmed'—but it takes a year to make them properly immune to destruction.

Dr. Weinberg also predicted that 'science is on the verge of perfecting unflammable wood.'

'It is exceedingly possible,' he said, that wood can be made non-inflammable. You may expect an announcement at any hour that science has perfected a solution to perfect this.'

FAMOUS FRENCH RECIPES

Paris, Sept. 18.—(INS)—'Moka Tiki' is an easy dessert to make and delightful to eat. Dip one pound of dry tea biscuits or lady fingers in black coffee and arrange in a charlotte mold.

Put over these a thick layer of moka butter made by mixing one-fourth pound of powdered sugar with the yolk of two eggs. Stir thoroughly in a bowl until the sugar is completely melted.

Add another layer of the biscuits, then one of cream, etc., until the mold is filled, finishing off with a layer of biscuits.

Put into a cool place and re-dry, sprinkle with finely chopped toasted almonds.

HAWAII SENDS DELEGATES TO U. S. COMMERCE MEET

Honolulu, Sept. 18.—(INS)—Hawaii is planning to send a very strong delegation to the annual bi-year meeting of the Western Division of the United Chamber of Commerce to be held at Colorado Springs, December 6 and 7. The Honolulu chamber directors have unanimously approved a plan to extend a formal invitation to the Western Division to hold its 1927 session in this city. The new steamship Malolo of the Matson fleet will be in operation at that time and this fine new Royal Hawaiian hotel will be completed, a combination which it is believed will have a very strong pull on Western business men.

LIGHTNING CAUSES LOSS THROUGH HOLDOVER FIRES

Flagstaff, Ariz., Sept. 118.—(AP)—Ben Franklin argues electricity from the clouds to the key string, but forest supervisors would like to have some inventive genius discover how to get rid of it.

'Lightning holdovers' caused several fires in the Coconino national forest during the forest fire hazard season, as they did in other parts of the west, destroying thousands of acres of valuable timber and drawing men from other pursuits to fight the flames.

Lightning generally hits these trees in out of the way places, invisible from the lookout's tower. The fire will smoulder along for a few days, waiting for a stiff breeze to fan it to other trees, and before it is discovered several acres of good timber will have burned.

Atlanta Will Use Smoke and Tacks to Catch Runners

Atlanta, Sept. 17.—(INS)—A deadly smoke screen, together with a barrage of tacks, has been laid down by rum runners here speeding through the night with their cargoes of liquor.

This new method of warfare has rendered the runner very difficult of capture, and police declare it is a 'menace.' Two automobiles equipped with such smoke screen contrivances have been captured in one week, but only after the runners lost control of their cars and collided with the officers.

The 'menace' to police comes in when after the chase is fairly started, the runner throws out his smoke screen and lets go his cargo of tacks, rendering the chasing policemen soon incapable of further pursuit. There is considerable charging among the police, too, because at this time there is no law preventing use of smoke

screens here.

The only charge on which the driver using a smoke screen could be held, is speeding or unless his car is found to contain liquor.

The cars examined after they were wrecked, were found equipped to burn kerosene and ammonia and other. In any case impenetrable wall of black smoke covers the road and the speeding motor car must either come to a stop or run the risk of a fatal crash, police declare.

FLAPPER STYLES LOOK FAMILIAR TO FIJI CHIEF

Oakland, Cal., Sept. 18.—(AP)—Refinements of civilization have produced opposite results in America and the Fiji Islands, declares Ratu Heli Salaboga, former cannibal chief visiting the United States with a group of missionaries.

Ratu spent half of his life as a cannibal but was converted to Christianity 27 years ago. He still wears native garb and speaks thru an interpreter.

'Twenty years ago Fiji flappers painted their faces, black, while American flappers paint their faces white at present,' he commented. 'A narrow cloth, possibly two feet in length once served as the sole costume of a Fijian female, also short bushy hair was the prevailing head dress. These styles have been discarded in the South Seas and have found their way across the Pacific.'

RESTORE OLD PUEBLO

Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 18.—(AP)—A prehistoric pueblo beside the highway between Flagstaff, Ariz., and Tuba City, is being restored by the Bureau of American Ethnology of the Smithsonian Institution. The ruin is the largest of many dotting the forest, which cover the San Francisco mountains.

The work is far from completed, but Dr. J. W. Fowkes, chief of the bureau, who is in charge of the excavations, estimates that the pueblo comprises about thirty-five rooms.

That the pueblo is certainly old is indicated by the age of a majestic yellow pine, at least 150 years old, growing in one of the rooms.

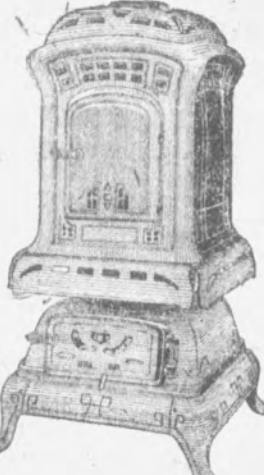
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
