MORE THAN 600 LOSE LIVES IN STORM PROPERTY LOSS OVER HUNDRED FIFTY MILLIONS HURRICANE SWEEPING FLORIDA AND ALABAMA

HUNDREDS DEAD AND THOUSANDS HOMELESS IN SOUTHERN FLORIDA

Miami, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Estimates ranging from 600 to 1500 dead prevailed in the Miami disaster area this morning as fast contact was established with the outside world by airplane, automobile and relief trains. The damages were estimated at \$150,000,000.

In the Miami storm disaster area are included Hollywood, Fort Lauderdale, Red land, Moorehaven, and Clewiston.

Little contact with these places had been established as the causeways were flooded and wrecked and high water barred traffic. Because continued severe winds pilots of air planes were reported as wary of attempting to enter the storm area.

Airplanes could not find landing places and seaplanes feared the rough and debris filled water.

The American Red Cross had established relief stations through out the stricken district and the aid of nearby towns and cities were ordered. Relief trains from West Palm Beach have arrived, bringing additional physicians, trained nurses, medical supplies and essential food.

Efforts were being made to find relatives or friends of more than 200 children who have been found wandering about what remains of Miami, separated from their families. The city was under martial law and no one except government or state officials newspaper men and persons of mission relief were allowed to enter.

Profiteering has been banned under proclamation of city manager Wharton. It provides that no prices may be charged in excess of September 18, the day preceding the storm. Violations will suffer consequences of their supplies, a heavy fine and imprisonment.

Scores of automobiles were leaving here hourly with refugees for the most part, families with children, for whose health there was concern, due to the scarcity of milk and lack of proper sanitary facilities.

Identification of the dead in the various sections was proceeding today slowly as search for the additional bodies continued.

City manager Wharton ordered all persons off the city streets unless they are searching for missing relatives, attempting to identify the dead or assisting in relief work.

Avon Park, Fla., Sept. 20.—(AP)—With 56 bodies in an improvised morgue here today and the missing totaling nearly 200, rescue workers in Moorehaven were bending every effort to remove all persons from the flooded area. Nearly 500 refugees arrived last night. The water is receding, officials said, who returned here this morning and the collection of the dead will be resumed immediately.

According to one eye witness, the dyke along Okeechobee broke Saturday morning and the water poured over the land until it stood 12 to 14 feet deep in the highest spot of Moorehaven. In the lowlands, it was over the roofs of houses.

Few anticipated the break, he said, as the dyke was supposed to be invulnerable. No one had

FLOODS DO FIVE MILLION DAMAGE NORTHWEST IOWA

Four Persons Known Dead With 21 Others Reported Dead As Result of Flood Waters.

South City, Iowa, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Flood waters receded today in Northwestern Iowa leaving in their wake damage estimated at five million dollars. The principal damage occurred along the Floyd and Big Sioux Rivers and their tributaries which were fed by torrential rain Friday night.

Farmers suffered huge crop and property losses. Four persons are known to have lost their lives. Reports of 21 other deaths could not be confirmed.

LOCAL MAN DIES AS RESULT OF FALL EARLY SATURDAY

Wiley Dunn Suffered Fractured Skull When He Fell From Scaffold While at Work.

Funeral services for Mr. Wiley Dunn, who died late Saturday as the result of a fall sustained Saturday morning, were conducted at his late home on Chestnut street at three o'clock yesterday afternoon, and interment followed in Belvoir township. The services were conducted by Rev. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, and Rev. L. B. Jones, pastor Jarvis Memorial Methodist church. The deceased is survived by his widow and two sisters.

The accident which caused the death of Mr. Dunn, occurred Saturday morning while he was at work on a building on the North side of the river. He suffered a fractured skull when he fell from a scaffold several feet to the ground. He was rushed to this city for medical aid, but died about six-thirty Saturday evening.

Yorkshire School Teach Cooking To Housewives

Barby, Yorkshire, Sept. 20.—(INS)—Schools in this neighborhood are giving a real lesson to housewives in the art of catering and reducing food costs to a minimum.

By growing their own vegetables the County School here, and the Glendike Council School, are able to supply hot midday meals to the school children for four cents and three cents.

For four cents the Barby children have soup and the choice of hot-pot, shepherd's pie, meat and potatoes, sausages and potatoes, sausages and cabbage; and for four cents there are current roll and custard or fruit and custard. There is no stint on the amount a child eats.

R. R. FLEMING DIED THIS AFTERNOON

Mr. R. R. Fleming, 83, of Pactolus, one of the most prominent farmers and business men of the county, died this afternoon following a week's illness. Funeral arrangements had not been announced shortly after four o'clock.

Sheriff's officers on Saturday night raided the filling station of A. H. Stepp, near this city, found a small quantity of whiskey on the premises and arrested Stepp. While the officers were at the station two negroes, William Thompson and John Henry Bogden, arrived with whiskey in their possession and were arrested on a charge of transporting.

Stepp was arrested a few weeks ago when his filling station was raided by officers and was out on bond pending hearing of that case in Superior Court. No doubt hearing in the new case against him will be set for the same time as that of the former case.

WESTERN UNION RATE HEARING BEEN POSTPONED

Corporation Commission Delays Definite Action Pending Re- port of Experts.

Raleigh, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Hearing on a petition of telephone companies to day away with the flat rate system of telegraph tolls and to establish a zone system of calls has been indefinitely postponed by the State Corporation Commission. The action was taken pending the employment by the commission of expert accountants to make a report on the necessity for such a change.

CIGARETTE TAX BUILDS UNIVERSITY BUILDING

Pierre, S. D., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Smoke from cigarettes may help build air castles elsewhere, but in South Dakota it provides actual, man-made buildings of stone and mortar.

The reason for this is that in South Dakota the income from a state cigarette tax is devoted solely to the construction of buildings at the state's colleges and University.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, South Dakota smokers consumed sufficient cigarettes to erect a library for the state agricultural college at Brookings, and a physical education building for Northern Normal college at Aberdeen. The approximate cost of these buildings is \$380,000 and it was necessary to smoke better than 7,000,000 cigarettes to provide this amount.

The tax ranges from a half of one cent on cigarette papers to eight cents for a package of expensive cigarettes. On the cheap and more popular brands the tax is three cents.

You have read of Miss Mabel Normand just married and know about her "screen" work. Hear now how fortunate are the thrifty that fate sends to California. Miss Normand went out there as she herself says, "Just a little girl, knowing nothing about business." She made a little money, saved \$30,000. "Just a little nest egg." She put that into Los Angeles real estate and now it is worth three quarters of a million.

This is not advising you to invest in anything in particular, but just to let you know what one little girl, knowing nothing about business, can do, if she goes to the right place to do it.

Car-new American industry, bootlegging, complaints of over production in Kansas City. One bootlegger telephone the police that other cut prices so that an honest bootlegger can't live. He gives five addresses and the police find bootleg organizations, stills and plenty of whiskey at each address.

This "squawking" on bootleg price cutters may help temporarily, and it seems justified the cut rate; gentlemen were selling corn whiskey at \$1.50 a quart.

HURRICANE REPORTED TO BE DESCENDING ON PENSACOLA DISTRICT

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 20.—(AP)—The devastating hurricane which raged across the lower part of Florida over the week-end today was reported descending upon Pensacola with a wind blowing at the rate of 100 miles an hour and a terrific rain fall reported, the city of Pensacola and nearby towns were cut off from communication.

Wire communications with the city was interrupted early this morning when the Associated Press circuit and the Western Union lines went down. The Western Union Wire Chief said that all wires into Pensacola had been lost and that communication was virtually down to all points between Mobile and Montgomery, Ala.

The unwelcome visitor from the West Indies apparently was headed directly toward Burwood, Ala.

SINK REFUSES TO STAY EXECUTION OF JOHN WILLIAMS

Telegraphic Protests From Prison Reform Association Fails Move Commissioner

Raleigh, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Despite telegraphic protests from officials of the North Carolina Prison Reform Association, at Asheville, against the execution of John Williams at state prison tomorrow morning, Prison Commissioner Sink today held out little hope for the condemned man.

The statements of the reform officials that Williams was a "poor, ignorant and friendless negro, who was the victim of circumstances" did not jibe with his own findings, the commissioner stated, following a personal interview with the condemned man. Williams was convicted at the August term of Halifax Superior Court for the murder of Alex Bradley, an aged negro landowner, on whose farm the convicted man was a tenant.

RUN AWAY AUTO KILLS WATCHMAN

Winston-Salem, Sept. 20.—(AP)—George Bodenhamer, 60, was instantly killed today when struck by a touring car which ran wild. Bodenhamer, watchman for the Southern Railway, was sweeping the track, when the car, traveling backward, bore down upon him, crashing into him, and hurling him a distance of 20 feet. The car was left parked in front of a laundry when it broke loose traveling backward a block to the tracks.

Motorcycle messengers were pressed into service by the Western Union to carry telegrams, between Miami and West Palm Beach. All messages to Miami are being accepted subject to indefinite delay.

Atlanta was in intermittent touch with Miami Beach for a time last night, but the telegraph circuit had to be abandoned because of lack of power. Messages from the stricken area continued to pour into Atlanta today reporting deaths, shipments of bodies and survivors.

Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Efforts to communicate by telephone with six towns northeast and near Pensacola reported to be in the path of a 100 mile an hour wind, were unavailing up to noon today. Telephone officials reported the service was acute in the area.

Mobile, Ala., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Weather bureau barometers continued to drop at Mobile and Pensacola early today, as the West Indian hurricane continued its sweep along the Gulf Coast.

The weather bureau reported at seven o'clock that the wind had reached a velocity of 100 miles an hour at Pensacola.

Mobile, Ala., Sept. 20.—(AP)—(by way of Hattiesburg, Miss., by telephone)—The velocity of the wind was 96 miles an hour at 12:30 o'clock this afternoon, and the barometer registered 29.06 as the hurricane struck this section. Thus far no lives have been reported lost and only minor injuries have been sustained.

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 20.—(AP)—A radio message from the Warrior River Service boat, 12 miles north of Mobile, said that all lines of communication with Mobile had been lost and that the storm was rapidly gaining in intensity. All boats on the river had scurried to cover.

Appeals For Aid For Sufferers

Washington, Sept. 20.—(AP)—President Coolidge today appealed to the American people to come to the assistance of sufferers in the Florida disaster. In the Presidential proclamation, he asked that contributions to a relief fund be sent to the American Red Cross.

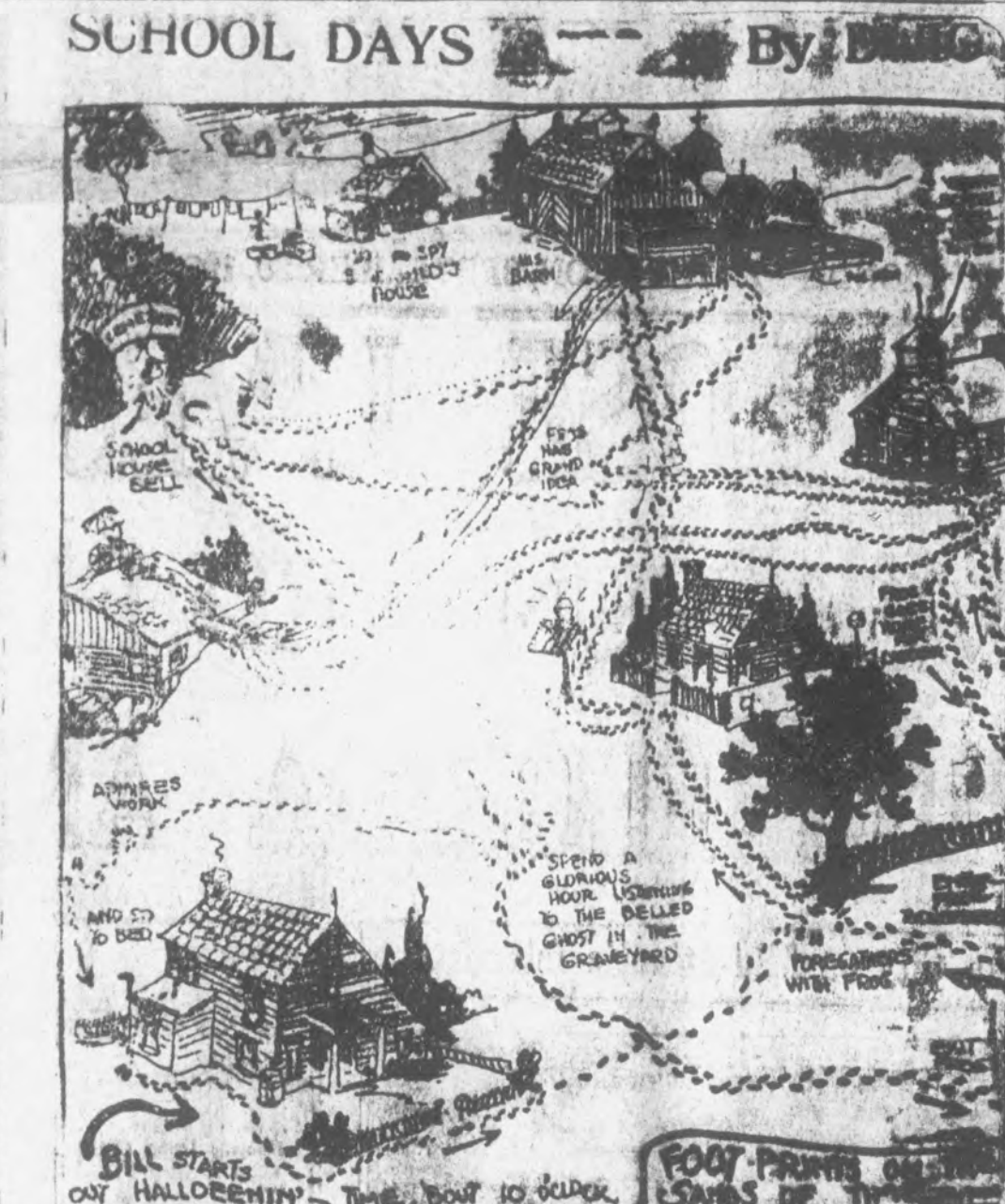

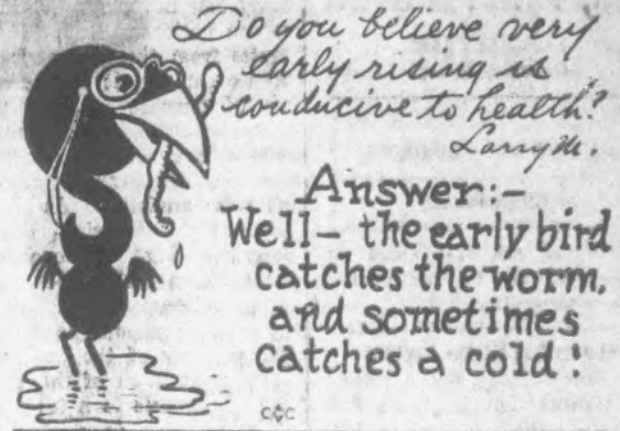

CLEVELAND HAS SUBWAY PLAN TO COST 40 MILLION

One Penny From
Every Fare to Pay
Loan City Needs For
Work.

Cleveland, O., Sept. 20.—(INS)—A \$40,000,000 subway system for a penny from every man, woman and child who rides a street car.

That is the plan of Raymond T. Cragin, organizer of the Cleveland Subway Company, and formerly representative in Cleveland of the Pennsylvania Railroad.

Figures prominent in the nation's financial affairs are behind the "Penny Subway Line." It was learned today. Through the backing of the Rockefellers, Sr. and Jr., who have extensive holdings in Cleveland, a New York bank has agreed to find the necessary money, estimated at \$40,000,000, to Cragin and his associates, with which to build the subway. The Van Sweringen's,

Cleveland's prominent railroad promoters, have also signified their intention of backing the project. Cragin's plans which he will present to the Cleveland City Council when the necessary papers for a franchise are prepared call for the construction of a 12 mile subway at somewhat less than \$4,000,000 a mile.

The subway is to be built with money borrowed from the New York bank and in order to pay off the debt, street car and bus fares are to be increased one cent per ride, the increase to be turned into the city coffers, under Cragin's proposal.

Estimates reveal that one and one-fourth per cent of the population of a city is moved via the street cars each day, Cragin said.

Cleveland's population is hovering about the 1,000,000 mark and at that average the penny a ride for each person would add \$12,500 a day to the city's treasury, or \$4,562,000 a year. In twelve years the city would be able to take over the system at the cost of construction, plus the accrued interest, according to Cragin.

City officials can then lease the subway system to any railway company desirable and the city treasury will be the recipient of a large yearly rental, the promoter declares.

This will be the first time that a subway project to be paid by the people's pennies will be tried in any city the promoter said. The present carfare in Cleveland is 6 cents, with a penny extra for transfers.

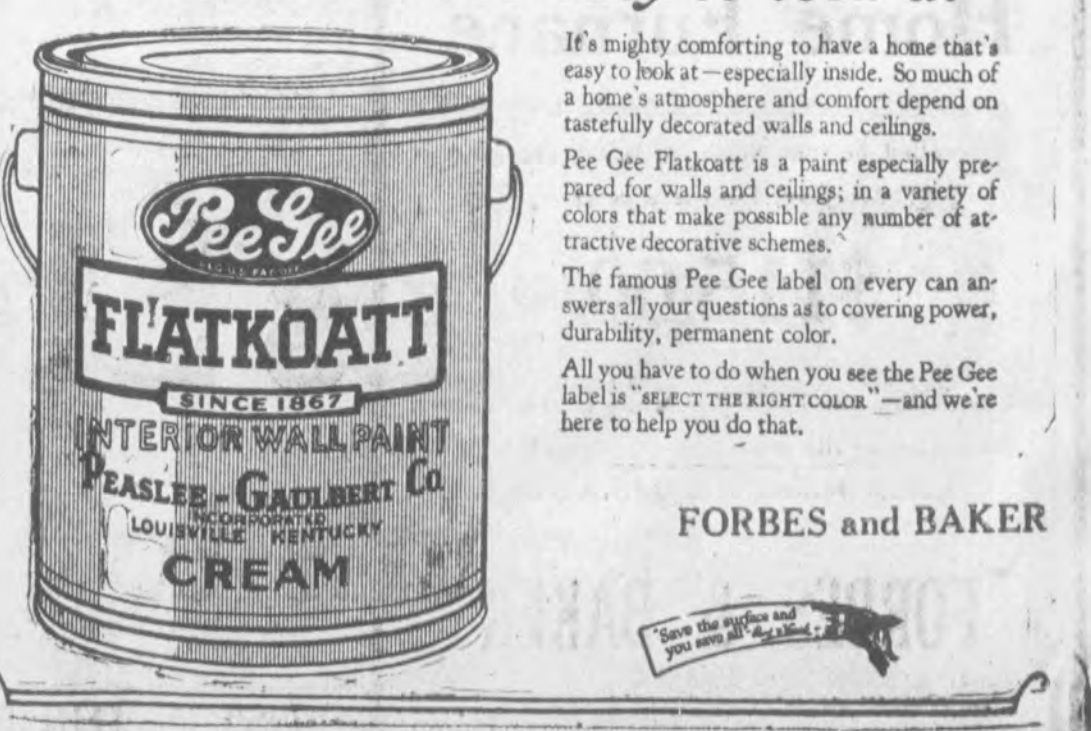

Oldest Salt Mine Discloses Home of An Ancient People

Reno, Nevada, Sept. 20.—(INS)—Announcement that they had discovered the oldest salt mine in America and had come upon evidences of an ancient people was made here recently by representatives of the Heye Foundation, Museum of the American Indian, just returned from an exploration trip through the southeastern part of Nevada.

The party brought with them prehistoric remnants, such as bone hammers and picks, pieces of grass, woven sand, drying sticks, fiber strings and dried corn.

Both the mine and the specimens were discovered in the Virgin river valley, southeastern Nevada.

The people who once used these specimens, according to members of the exploration party, were more ancient than the Pueblo Indians, whose ruins have been excavated at Pueblo Grande de Nevada.

The earlier tribe were so crude they hewed their hammers and picks from solid rocks without providing notches or grooves for handles. They apparently had no knowledge of pottery, as no examples of the art were found in the ancient mine.

Discovery of both mine and prehistoric remnants was made about 16 miles from St. Thomas, six miles above the junction of the Virgin and Colorado rivers. Further excavations are proceeding under supervision of Dr. M. R. Harrington, noted archaeologist.

8,000 Miles of Penn. Roadway Complete

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 20.—(INS)—Pennsylvania today was preparing to spend the last ten million dollars of her second fifty million dollar road bond issue. At the same time advocates of good roads were outting a campaign whereby an additional fifty million dollar issue which will require another amendment to the state constitution, may be launched. If this bond issue is put over, the money cannot be made available before 1928.

During the past four years the State Department of Highways has spent nearly a quarter of a billion dollars on highway construction and maintenance. In this four year period 3,000 miles of hard surfaced road have been constructed and 1,200 miles of stone based road have been re-surfaced.

The ten million dollars, which, under the terms of the last bond issue, will become available next month, will be required for projects already under contract. These projects under contract practically will complete the ma-

for trans-state arteries of traffic as well as a number of important connecting links.

In the last decade road building in the Keystone state has been carried out entirely in accordance with a carefully mapped plan. A decade ago it was decided to stop the practice of building segregated stretches of improved road to reach country estates of prominent politicians, and instead follow the important cross-state routes.

More than 12,000 miles of road of which 7,581 miles are hard surfaced, comprise the present highway system of Pennsylvania. These hard surfaced roads are kept free of snow in the winter and are under constant repair in the summer.

When this year's building program is completed next summer the state will have more than 8,900 miles of improved highways. Regardless of how carefully its surface may be maintained with drag and oil, no road is considered or marked "improved" in Pennsylvania until it has been hard surfaced.

Nearly 4,000 miles of dirt road were placed under the control of the highway department by a recent act of the legislature. It has been estimated that two hundred million dollars will be necessary to hard surface these stretches of connecting highways.

Necessity of widening sections of the main routes has added to the expense of maintaining the primary system and has reduced the mileage of improvement in the more outlying sections. The majority of the highways were built 18 feet wide.

Calendar Reform Studied at Geneva

London, Sept. 20.—(INS)—Two schemes for calendar reform are to be put forward at Geneva this month by the sub-committee of the League of Nations which has been studying the question for two years.

One proposes to equalize the quarters of the year by locating two months of thirty days each, followed by one thirty-one day month. The extra day which makes up the year would either be fixed as a zero day preceding January 1, or would be added to one of the months, making that quarter contain two thirty-one day months and one thirty day. In leap year there would be two such quarters.

The other scheme is that the year should be divided into thirteen months each of 28 days, thus fixing all day names to permanent dates. The 365th day which is not provided for by this division, would be known as "year day" and would not be distinguished by a day-name. The same would apply to leap day.

The Committee will also recommend that Easter be definitely fixed as taking place on the second Sunday in April.

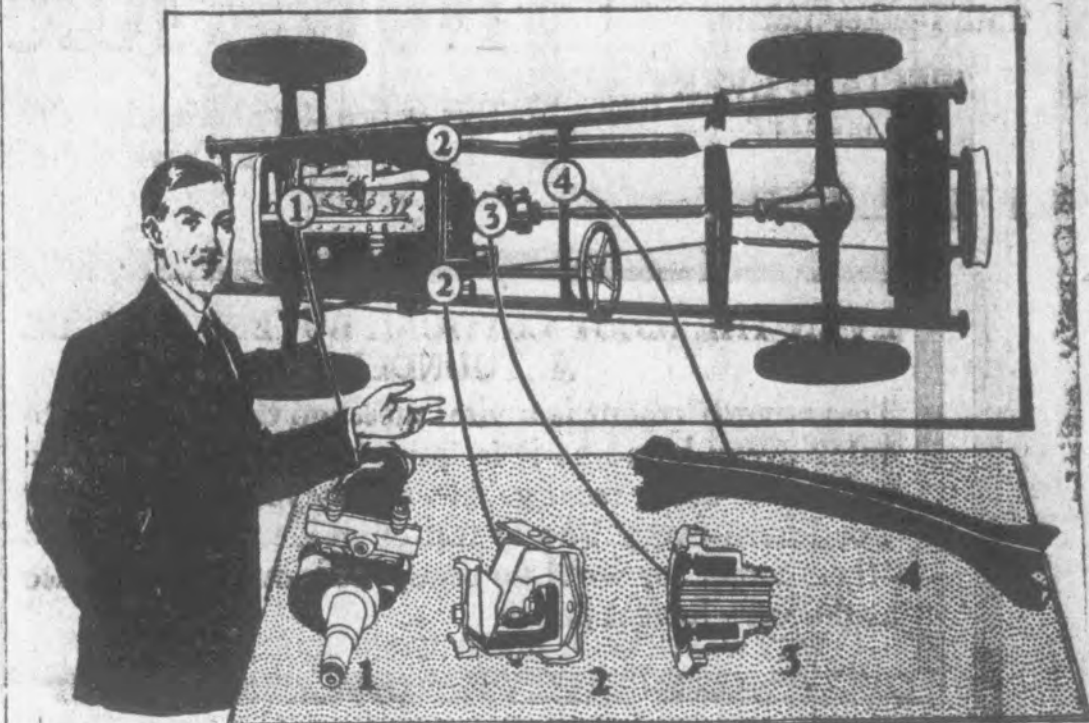
