MORE THAN 600 LOSE LIVES IN STORM

PROPERTY LOSS OVER HUNDRED FIFTY MILLIONS

HURRICANE SWEEPING FLORIDA AND ALABAMA

HUNDREDS DEAD AND

Miami, Sept. 20-(AP)-Estimates ranging from 600 to 1500 dead prevailed in the Miami disaster area this morning as fast contact was established with the outside world by airplane, automobile and relief trains. The damages were estimated at \$150,000,000.

In the Miami storm disaster area are included Hollywood, Fort Lauderdale, Red land, Moorehaven, and Clewiston.

Little contact with these places had been established as the causeways were flooded and wrecked and high water barred traffic Because continued severe winds pilots of air planes were reported as wary of attempting to enter the storm area.






