TWO DIE TRANS-ATLANTIC PLANE CRASH

RECONSTRUCTION OF STORM SWEPT AREA BEGUN

TOBACCO AVERAGED \$28.48 HERE YESTERDAY

LATEST ESTIMATES OF STORM TOLL SAY 400 DEAD 5,000 INJURED

With the known death tell in the hurricanes that swept over the lower riorida east coast standing at 375 today and with the injured still estimated at 4,000 or more and property damage at \$50,000,000 or more, interest centered at what has happened to Pensacola on the west coast, and Mobile, 50 miles further west, and in relief measures to bring the stricken territory back to normal.

The known death toll computed by the Associated Press from all sources last night stood at 369 and was increased today by report of six deaths at Rockport. Eastern North Carolina has gone about its business of curing and marketing about 300,000,000 pounds of bright leaf tobacco, and overnight sleepy v llages cattered over the belt have been hanged into beehives of indus-

Fo'lowing close on the heels of the South Carolina and Geora opening, the New Bright Belt the world's biggest tobacco growing area—is now in the nidst of the yearly marketing season, and all indications point toward the marketing of 300,000

After seven "lean" years, pric es are soaring to new high levels. and are estimated to average 50 per cent better than prices paid out on the New Bright Belt floors in 1925. Prices are estimated to range from 25 to 32 cents a

Sky high prices on the New Bright Belt bore out the predictobacco and ware busemen that this section faced another 1919" after observing relatively higher prices on the South Carolina, Georgia and border markets.

The 18 markets which com-"se the New Bright Belt last year produced something like 235,000,000 pounds. This year, the belt's total production will pass the 300,000,000 mark, accord ing to present est mates.

The New Bright Belt is only a part of the North Carolina tobacco growing industry. Tobacco farmers of the entire state last cear marketed more than 361, 000,000 pounds of the weed for mething like \$76,000,000.

The markets in the Cld Belt will open late in September and early in October. The border markets-that is, the markets in South Carolina and those located just over the state line-are about to be brought to a close, after a record breaking season.

North Carolina, which occupies first place among the 40 tobacco growing states in the value of pro duction, will, as a whole, sell more than 400,000,000 pounds of the leaf at higher prices than in seven years, if predictions of tobac conists and warehousemen run






