BELIEVE DEATH TOLL WILL REACH 700 IN STORM STRICKEN AREA

Entire Stricken Section Under Martial Law; Relief Ships Arrive in Miami With Food Supplies. Reports From Outlying Districts Tell Of More Deaths and Devastation.

The hurricane that cost the lower Florida east coast upward of 400 lives, 4,000 or more injured and property damage of \$50,000,000 or more, having passed all sections today, efforts were centered on trying to ascertain the exact casualty list, restoring interrupted communication and repairing the property damage.

The Miami area, which was the hardest hit of all, was going about the work of rehabilitation caring for the injured and seeking out the dead in a systematic manner. The American Red Cross and other relief agencies were on hand in full force with troops, on guard and martial law existing in many places.

The injured in Hollywood have been ordered removed to points north of the city, and persons unable to secure aid in the relief and rehabilitation work have been instructed by military authorities to evacuate the city.

Dr. William R. Redden, national director of the American Red Cross medical service, estimated the seriously injured at 1,400. He found 1,300 patients in Miami hospitals and estimated the total injured there 3,500, of whom 1,000 suffered serious injury.

Pensacola and Mobile, hit by the hurricane, just before it passed inland, made known to the world that there was no loss of life in either city. Mobile was connected with the outside world by telegraph last night and Pensacola was connected to the Associated Press circuit this morning. Over the wire and through a wireless dispatch to the Associated Press, it was known that Pensacola came through a 120 mile wind without loss of life, but with considerable property damage. Several ships were driven ashore and there were three deaths by drowning in the section, but none in Pensacola.

At Moorehaven, an agricultural city on the western bank of Lake Okeechobee, martial law went into effect early today and an effort was being made to check up the death list already known to be around 100. Approximately 70 bodies had been recovered up until last night, and it was said that 40 others had been found and would be reclaimed today. Estimates still put the deaths here at 150 or more with most of the victims white.

In some places final surveys have brought down the original death list, as some persons previously reported among the dead have been located. At Fort Lauderdale the death list reached 11 last night and at Hollywood it was expected the total would be around 70. Miami Beach, it was revealed, as Biscayne Bay slowly gave up the bodies which had been washed out, had a list of 22 known dead.

The property loss at Coral Gables was conservatively estimated at \$1,500,000 in an official statement. This suburb probably suffered less than any of the Miami suburbs.

Okeeland, an everglade village, was entirely wrecked and only the postoffice and the store in which the postoffice was situated, remained standing. The population of 21 persons has been sleeping in this building since the storm.

Varying estimates of the 60 mile coast area in the past of the gale placed the property damage between fifty and one hundred million dollars.

Rescue and relief workers believe a complete search of the mass of tangled wreckage in the score or more stricken towns, and cities, and the final count of the bodies cast up by the waters of Biscayne Bay will swell the death toll to more than 700.

Martial law remained in force throughout the storm area with National Guardsmen patrolling the area.

COTTON STATES SEEK REDUCTION FREIGHT RATES

Seven States Filed Complaint With Interstate Commerce Commission Today.

Washington, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Cotton growers co-operative associations in seven states, Georgia, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Arizona, Tennessee, and South Carolina, today filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission identical complaints against railroad rates on cotton to principal marketing and export centers.

The rates prescribed were all attacked as excessive, unjust and unreasonable, but no statement was made as to degree of reduction demanded. The commission was asked to consider the general cotton rate structure, and to make such changes as its investigation might determine to be desirable.

DR. W. E. FURELLE ELECTED COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER

Will Succeed Dr. C. L. Outland Who Has Accepted Position With City of Richmond.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Health, Dr. Walter E. Furelle, of Northampton county, was elected Health Officer to succeed Dr. C. L. Outland, resigned.

Dr. Furelle is a graduate of Wake Forest College and Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia. He comes to the department with experience as Health Officer and highly recommended by those who know him. He will arrive in Greenville next week.

Much Interest Being Manifested In Coming Fair

Much interest in the coming Pitt County Fair is being shown by all sections of the county and the exhibits this season promise to be the best ever offered. In order to take care of the large number of exhibits this year, work yesterday was begun on an additional agricultural exhibit building and same will be completed before the fair opens.

County Demonstrator Reeves yesterday announced that there would be several community exhibits in addition to the individual exhibits. The communities named by Mr. Reeves as already making known their intentions of having exhibits at the fair are Pierce community, Winterville, Fountain, Belvoir, Bethel, Stokes and Pactolus. Both the Winterville and Fountain sections will also have community fairs in addition to exhibiting their products at the county fair. Individual "Live at Home and Farm Exhibits" will be put on by Mrs. E. E. Randolph, R. E. Corbett, Mrs. Carl Langley, S. J. Vance, J. E. Winslow and R. W. Smith as was announced yesterday.

Mr. Reeves also stated that several of the State Fair exhibits would be put on here during the Pitt County Fair.

Florida's Disaster.
The Lisbon Earthquake.

The disaster in Miami, and other parts of Florida proves to be more extensive than first reports indicated. Hundreds are killed, gigantic property values swept away.

None the less, Florida will NOT be discouraged. The rest of the nation, deeply sympathizing, knows that all parts of the country are exposed to the fury of nature's forces.

We read with horror of "hundreds killed," and well may. It is wise to remember that one single shell, bursting in war time may kill more than were killed in this Florida tornado. One heavy shell, dropped from a bombing airplane, could wipe out more life and property than the great Florida wind destroyed.

Men become accustomed to everything, especially when it happens at a distance in a space and time. We talk now calmly of twenty million lives destroyed by the great war, and that number is no exaggeration. News of hundreds killed in Florida moves us more deeply than did news that tens of thousands had been wiped out in a single battle.

Men dread, especially the stroke of nature's power, realizing his helplessness before it. At any moment our great sea coast cities might be swept away out of existence by a tidal wave. And man can no more prepare against it than the ant can prepare his tiny city against the gardener's watering pot.

Men have learned to take disaster philosophically, and to find relief in effort.

It was not so, in other days. When "the great earthquake of Lisbon" wiped out thousands of lives, and destroyed a city, many lost their faith in God, and in eternal justice, as others lost their lives and property.

The earthquake and dreadful fire came on a holy day, when the churches were packed with worshippers.

Roofs of churches and cathedrals fell in, crushing great numbers, even as they knelt, imploring Divine mercy.

The day has passed when a natural disaster could be made a convincing argument for shallow atheism. Men have lost much of their superstition, without losing their faith in Eternal Wisdom and Justice.

We know that nature's laws work eternally and evenly, and it is for man to rely on his intelligence and science, not on protecting miracles.

When the heat of the tropics causes great volumes of air to rise suddenly and other masses of air rush in, creating a tornado, life and property must be destroyed. The wisdom that rules ten million suns in space will not suspend the laws of nature and of physics, for one tiny planet in one small solar system.

But there is nothing discouraging about that, nothing to diminish faith in eternal goodness. When a small child falls it cries, and waits for its father to pick it up. A grown man falls, gets up, blames himself, and is more careful.

Childlike ages, in calamity, wait for their heavenly Father to pick them up, and doubt His goodness when the fall was very painful. The human race, grown older, wiser, has outgrown that, is proud to rely upon itself, gratefully for life on a planet so marvelously safe, in a universe managed with such perfect justice.

Better a life of struggle and accomplishment, in a world with laws the same for all, than the slavish life of an oriental dream type, relying on some Alladin's Lamp or other device to bring what is needed.

Mrs. Cotten Addresses Members Rotary Club

Declaring that "the future will come to us inevitably but the present is the mother of the future, and we must prepare to know how to go out and meet it," Mrs. Robert R. Cotten addressed the members of the Greenville Rotary club Monday night on the future of Pitt county and several needed reforms. This future is to be better than the past or present. Her address brought home to those who heard it the conditions as they now exist in the county and a realization that steps must be taken to safeguard the future. Mrs. Cotten's address was one of a series being delivered to the club by prominent Pitt countyans, and came after the regular business session of the club.

Following the evening meal, there were committee reports and business matters heard, after which several members delivered short talks, in which they expressed regret that Dr. C. L. Outland was attending his last meeting in Greenville and extended the hearty thanks of the club for his untiring efforts as its secretary for nearly three years past.

Then came the address of Mrs. Cotten, which follows in part:

Looking into the future is a serious business and you may not approve of my suggestions. The emblem of the Rotary club is a "wheel" which ever turning brings new things to pass. I assume it means progress, not stagnation, progress does not just happen. It has to be worked for, and we were made to work for it. It is only a more popular name for evolution. Evolution does not mean men, nor monkeys. It means a gradual growth—even until ultimate perfection. The Great Teacher said, "Be ye perfect even as your Father in heaven is perfect," and He would never have given us an impossible task. The future will come to us inevitably—but the present is the mother of the future and we must prepare now to go out to meet it.

"We study the past to learn how to improve the future. If we do not work now for future betterment, that future will be dark and it is the future of Pitt county of which I wish to speak."

"Some of my suggestions may sound revolutionary at first—may meet your emphatic disapproval, but remember all new ideas seem ridiculous at first. Remember the old adage 'we first condemn—then pity—then embrace' and think of it. There has recently been much public discussion of our school system. Even the professor of Rural Education at our University, has declared that we are at the bottom educationally, and gives generous knocks of criticism and disapproval—but has not yet suggested a better plan."

"Please remember that in my suggestions tonight there is no criticism of our state system or our county system—both are greatly improved, and I know, because the rural school has been my 'hobby' for forty years, and the great improvement is everywhere manifest, except in the attitude of the fathers, who wish their children to remain out of school and work with them."

"I may be attacking some of Don Quixote's windmills, but I had rather attempt the impossible and fail, than never to attempt anything. The weak points in all things are the points which should

be made strong and the weak point in our Pitt county system is the rural school, and we should study that weak point and try to strengthen it. The rural homes in our county are not all they should be—which I attribute to the tenant system—but over which I can have no control. The value of the home maker is underestimated. Greenville grows and boasts of its success, but the average home maker in Pitt is still overworked, and has not been taught how to lighten her own burden. Education is the only lever by which we can elevate these homes, and we can only accomplish it through the better education of the younger generation, who will take to the homes the knowledge gained at school."

"The object of education is not solely to enrich the mind, but to furnish knowledge which applied to life, will make better homes and better citizens. We do not need a new revelation of truth so much as we need to apply to daily life the truth already known to man and I boldly declare that all knowledge is vain which cannot be applied to the betterment of humanity. In building for a future, we must examine the present foundations and see if they are strong enough to bear the greater future it is our wish to build."

"Now, it is very easy to talk—at least I find it so—very easy to tell others what to do—but often very difficult to get them to do it. Life is more than books—more than prosperity, and we must look to the life results of our schools. Do they make better citizens? Are our foundations strong enough to bear a greater future? I say no, because nothing is strong enough which is built on injustice. What then is wrong? It is the inequality of opportunity which retards the rural school—the rural home—the rural citizen."

"The teachers in the large schools of the towns and cities receive much larger salaries than those who teach in the country. The children of those city schools have many advantages undreamed of and unknown to the country boy and girl. Is that just? Is that strengthening the weak point?"

"Consolidation of small schools is a step forward but it is not enough. The best teachers should be sent to the rural schools and the largest salaries paid to them to induce them to relinquish the pleasures and advantages of the city life. Then every time a rural school teacher returns to the same school, her salary should be increased. Every educator will recognize the value of this gentleman. I know this sounds revolutionary, and may be hard to inaugurate and harder still to perpetuate, but it would work wonders. It would be justice—and justice is the only sure foundation on which to build."

"I am well aware that it means more money. All improved conditions call for more money, and Americans are born with a hatred of taxes. Yet taxation is the fastest way of going forward. Look how we protested against the cost of our hard surfaced roads, and now how proud of them we are, and how we enjoy them. Look at the money which built our continent wide system of railroads, and yet we would things are the points which should

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SHARPE AND SECY ANDREWS DECIDE TO BURY HATCHET

Announcement Made That Administration And Prohibition Head Are Now in Complete Accord.

Washington, Sept. 22.—(AP)—At a conference today with Assistant Secretary Andrews in charge of prohibition enforcement, Ben Sharpe, dry administrator of South and North Carolina and Georgia, announced that the differences between him and Sharpe and Washington headquarters had been straightened out.

Sharpe said that while he had complained that his area was being flooded with liquor from Florida, that the situation had been remedied. While Andrews stated he was satisfied with the report of Mr. Sharpe, there were indications that he objected to the administrator making public statements about the administration without first forwarding such complaints to headquarters.

CONTINUES EFFORT TO PREVENT BOUT

Another Injunction to Stop Dempsey-Tunney Fight Filed in Court Today.

Philadelphia, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Another injunction suit was filed in common pleas court today to stop the Dempsey-Tunney bout here, and this time the Sesqui-Centennial Exhibition Company and the Pennsylvania State Athletic Commission are the defendants in an action brought by B. C. Clements of the Chicago Coliseum club.

The common pleas court today denied a motion to postpone arguments on the application of B. C. Clements, of the Chicago club, for an injunction to stop the Dempsey-Tunney fight here tomorrow night.

HUNGARIAN DETECTIVES TRY HAMLET'S METHOD IN FINDING MURDERER

Sprakovsd, Hungary, Sept. 22.—(INS)—The method of detecting murderers employed by Hamlet in rehearsing the killing before the eyes of the guilty one has been proven successful in this case also.

Several men, suspected of having murdered a peasant near here were taken to the scene of the crime. There the body of the dead man was laid on the ground and a police officer attacked it with a knife much in the manner as the assassin must have employed.

While the knife was raised, one of the prisoners, Ferenc Lakatos, fainted and on being revived, confessed to the crime.

DEFENSE FIGHTS BACK TODAY IN DAUGHERTY CASE

Offer Proof That Other Settlements Made Quicker Than Societe Suisse Claim

New York, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Striking swiftly through a government witness, the defense in the Daugherty-Miller conspiracy trial today offered proof that the claims of the Societe Suisse for \$7,000,000 of American Metal Company shares, which were paid in three days, did not "break the all time speed record for the Alien Property Custodian's office as alleged by the government."

Recalling Mrs. Edna Sarie, the registry clerk in the Alien Property Custodian's office, counsel for Thomas W. Miller, who is on trial with Harry M. Daugherty, veiled by government exhibit that a claim made by the company, of Philadelphia, for 500,000 of notes of the Imperial German Government was paid the day before it was filed.

San Francisco, Sept. 22—(IN)—Rebald San Francisco's oldest collar button.

It is 165 years old and belongs to Ernest L. Eggert, San Francisco carpenter, former Lutheran pastor, Michael Frederick Eggert, a native of Germany.

Thence the button, according to Eggert, "descended" to the present Eggerts' grandfather, Michael, remaining in his possession for eighty years. The grandfather, a lawyer, died in 1865 in Marienwerder, West Prussia, and the button came into possession of Samuel Eggert, father of Ernest.

Samuel, hale and hearty at 75, missionary in Russia.

Eggert came out with his treas-

ure in response to a contest for picture collar buttons started by the San Francisco Call.

"I've got the button all right," Eggert said in sending in his trophy. "It's the oldest collar button in San Francisco—at least I think it is."

The button is spiked shaped affair of gold with a bone back. Eggert's investigation he said, has revealed that it first rode the Adam's apple of his great-grandfather, resident of Goldberg, Samuel gave it to Ernest who treasures it as highly valuable heirloom.

Hypnotism cures may be all right in their own way but the trouble is they don't weigh very much according to Dr. Warner Brown, professor of psychology, University of California.

Suggestion may succeed somewhat in nervous ailments the two professors believe, but it is not helpful when any tissues or organs are diseased.

Recent experiments in Germany in which it is claimed sugar in the blood had been reduced from four percent to nothing in diabetic cases by suggestion on patients in deep hypnotic sleep, prompted the



California professors to express their opinion.

"In certain nervous ailments where no organ is affected, suggestion during hypnotic sleep sometimes affords temporary relief," Dr. Burnett said. "It is possible that some heart diseases might be relieved in this manner."

The results of the German experiment were probably a coincidence instead of an effect, according to Drs. Brown and Burnett.

Although hypnotism is seldom used in the United States for the plunger collar buttons started by relief of ill, it is used to a slight extent in Europe they say.

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

BE, and it is hereby ordained by the Board of Aldermen in regular session assembled:

SECTION (1). THAT it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owning, operating or in control of any motor vehicle, or horse drawn conveyance, of any kind, to park same on Evans Street between Second Street and Fifth Street or Five Points, for a longer period than one hour at any one time.

SECTION (2). That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, owning, operating or in control of a motor vehicle, or horse drawn conveyance of any kind to park same on Seventh Street (known as Sutton's Lane)

where same intersects Dickinson Avenue, otherwise than within the white lines designated on said Street or Lane, for parking purposes.

SECTION (3). That any and all violators of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined \$10.00 for each and every offense.

ORDINANCE REGULATING USE OF CIRCULARS

BE, and it is hereby ordained by the Board of Aldermen in regular session assembled:

SECTION (1). THAT it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation or the agents or employees thereof, to distribute hand bills, circulars, or other advertising matter on the streets of the town of Greenville, by handing same to pedestrians or plac-

ing same in automobiles, or in any other manner, other than delivery within places of business or within homes.

SECTION (2). THAT any and all violators of this ordinance shall upon conviction, be fined \$25.00, for each and every offense.

ELECTRICITY ON FARMS

(Charlotte Observer)

Electricity has had a magic
effect as a factor in the devel-
opment of industry. No other
single agency perhaps has been
such a potent factor in the build-
ing up of an industrial empire
here in the piedmont region of the
Carolinas. It has revolutionized
industry in many localities in other
part of the country.

In suburban life it has been a
tremendous factor in promotion
of the comfort and convenience
of the people. Its use in lighting
streets and residences, offices and
business places, and in the opera-
tion of urban transportation
facilities has been followed by
its introduction and general use
in the home for cooking, for the
operation of sewing machines,
washing machines, and for num-
erous other purposes.

The next step in the develop-
ment in the utility of electricity
is the extension of its use in ru-
ral communities, not only for do-
mestic use in the country homes,
including lighting, but as a factor
in farm operations. New uses
of electric power are already be-
ginning to lighten farm work in
field and home. Experiments in
dicate tremendous expansion of
electrification in many rural dis-
tricts in many states. Increasing
use of electricity on farms of the
United States is bringing about
manifold benefits, it was reported
by Dr. E. A. White, director of
the committee on the relation of
electricity to agriculture, at its
third annual meeting in Chicago
the other day. A dispatch to

The Christian Science Monitor
reports Doctor White as saying
that electricity is releasing farm
men and women from drudgery
in much of their long day of ac-
tivity. In homes it is used not
only for light, but to speed up
many household tasks and de-
crease physical toil in connection
with them. For the poultry farm-
er electricity is being used in-
creasingly for stimulation of egg
growth, brooders, incubators, and
in food preparations. Investiga-
tions of the committee show that
great good is being accomplished
by use of electricity for the dairy
farmer. Some uses involve
water supply, ventilation, steriliza-
tion of equipment, feeding,
milkling and separation. It was
reported. East of the Rocky
Mountains and particularly in the
truck farming district, much in-
terest is being directed toward
use of electricity in development
of overhead irrigation.

There is every prospect that
within a few years development
of electricity in rural America will
make tremendous strides, Doctor
White said, in an interview. He
has travelled almost constantly
during the past year, investigating
directing and observing for the
committee, and he reported that
there is noticeable a great improve-
ment in rural homes, much of
which may be attributed to the
use of electricity.

Catalina Contest Drawing Swimmers

Los Angeles, Sept. 22.—(INS)—Now that the English Channel has been thoroughly tamed, long distance swimmers with longing for fame and vaudeville contracts turned their attention to the unconquered and defiant 23-mile expanse of sea water separating Catalina Island from the mainland. Competition will begin January 15 for the \$25,000 prize offered by William Wrigley, Jr., chewing gum magnate, to the first person swimming the Catalina channel. 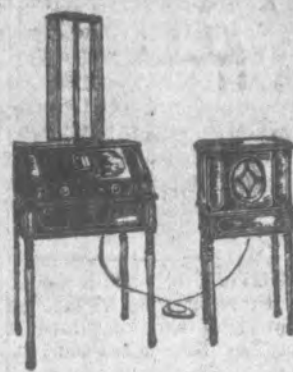

(Continued from page 1) not exchange the railroad for the money they cost. The advantage gained by increased taxes must always outweigh the money investment.

"I have learned that the taxable wealth of Pitt county is more than fifty million dollars. It ranks, among the first fifty counties of the United States in agricultural wealth and does not rank at all educationally.

"Greenville township, with over fourteen million taxable wealth, still has five one teacher schools. Is that good? Are the men who aspire to represent us in the next legislature going to vote for an eight months school term? If not, we should know it. Gentlemen, make them declare themselves. We must have an eight months school term, or we are recreant to our duty.

"I recognize the splendid progress being made in our schools. Mr. Fitzgerald, Miss Brogden and Miss Ferguson are working together with big ideals and fine results, but it is not enough. Nothing just happened. There must be a plan, a vision, before good or evil can materialize. Help is the keynote of life's universal

song. We must work for another generation. Selfishness seems to be ruling the world because we do not resist it in ourselves or others. Life is a fight. We must conquer or be conquered. Our opponents are not men—they are conditions—though men do create the condition, and men can create better conditions if they try to do so.

"Our struggle should be to make conditions better and thus enable men and women to make themselves better. Success or failure belongs to the individual and personal will power is the dynamo which enables us to improve conditions. Evolution means simply to get better ourselves and help others to get better. To get—we must give. It is a law of the visible and invisible, remembering that we reap what we sow.

"One person told me recently that country children do not need better schools because they learn so much from nature—but alas! the mysteries and beauties of nature are sealed to the eyes not opened by education and thought. The beautiful sunset which charms my eye and delights my soul is unseen and unappreciated by the tenant's wife, who it is the same time cooking supper for her tired husband. It is a pathetic truth and not overdrawn. Let's unseal her eyes, and give her time to admire the sunset. As a tree is wrapped up in an acorn, so a new example—a departure from old methods may become a powerful factor in all future development.

"I have stated facts plainly, and suggested a remedy. Even if it fails, it may open the way for something better than my thought, but let us aim for the highest and not be content with material prosperity. I have spoken plainly and while I do not expect my suggestions to materialize soon, I do beg you to remember that he who serves humanity serves God."

Prisoners Cost State \$358.00 Each Last Year

Raleigh, Sept. 22.—(AP)—It cost the State of North Carolina an average of \$358.00 each to maintain the average daily population of 1,486 prisoners at the prison during the last fiscal year according to statistics recently compiled by Supt. George Ross Pou.

Of this population 283 were classified as non-producers principally because of physical disability. The remainder of the Central prison quota was a constantly changing one, 668 new prisoners were admitted, 337 were discharged due to the expiration of sentences, 68 were paroled or pardoned, and 45 escaped, but of this number 35 were subsequently recaptured, five died and two were killed while attempting to escape.

The per capita expense is made up of maintenance costs, farming, expenses, commutation paid upon discharge, rewards for recapture, and all other expenses.

The report covers the annual period from Jan. 30, 1925 to June 30, 1926, during which period the prison received \$510,859.91 from the state for operating expenses of the Central prison, prison farm and the various camps and turned in \$428,515.21 revenue, showing a deficit of \$82,336.70, according to figures obtained from the office of Baxter Durham, state auditor.

Twelve persons lost their lives at Fort Myers on the west coast, it became known last night, and eight were killed at Lakeland. In a dozen or more small coastal cities in the territory between West Palm Beach and Miami, there were casualties reported of from one to seven.

With the arrival of an adequate supply of fresh water, sanitary conditions have been greatly improved in Miami and Hollywood, where water and sanitary systems were totally destroyed.

As search went on for additional dead throughout yesterday and last night in Miami, long lines of destitute filed into the emergency relief centers for small portions of bread, water and fuel.

Miami, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Five relief ships, came into Miami today and their cargoes of food and medical supplies were being quickly unloaded and distributed among the various relief agencies and hospitals.

Jacksonville, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Five hundred refugees from the storm swept area of Southern Florida, arrived here today on the first special refugee train operated into Jacksonville.

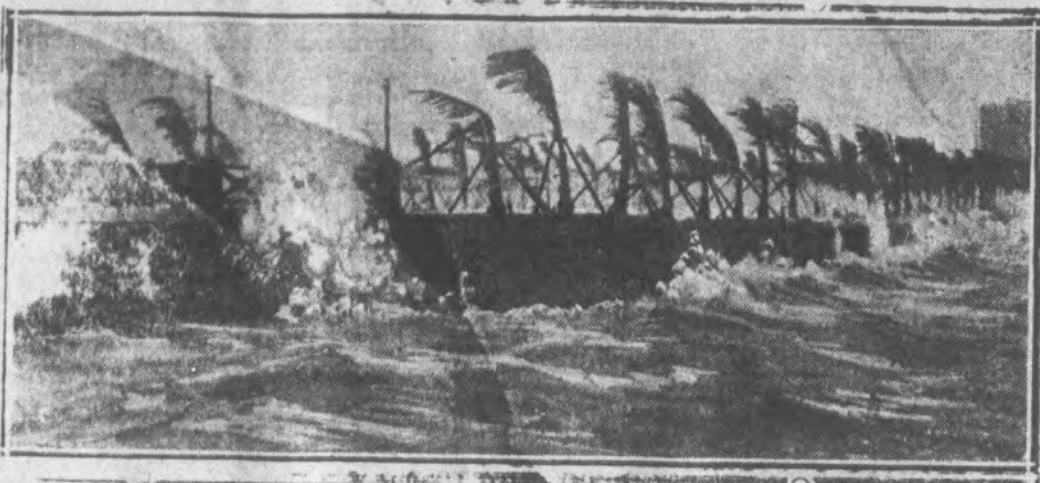
