Wanted—A Canal
Fonck Will Try Again.
Why Must We Fight China?
Old Law, Modern Cruelty

Congressman Holt, of Illinois, wants a canal from Lake Michigan to the Gulf of Mexico, and the people of the United States ought to have it. Congressmen from Texas, Louisiana, Florida, every state in the union, should work for it.

A canal connecting Lake Michigan and the Mississippi would establish transportation by land and water ways between Houston, St. Louis, Kansas City, Chicago, Omaha, all the Great Lake cities.

And the thing could be done with a few of the scores of millions that we are so cheerfully sending to Europe now, in private loans, to build up THEIR industries, canals, and other enterprises. Some day this nation will realize that it pays to develop your OWN country.

The attempt of Rene Fonck, the brave Frenchman, ends in disaster, and the loss of two lives, although Fonck, fortunately, escaped.

There will not discourage the Frenchman. He will try again for the unassisted non-stop flight between New York and Paris. He or another will soon succeed, and such flights in twenty years will be an everyday occurrence.

Again an American gunboat is fired on, from two points on the Chinese coast. Recently a United States ship found itself obliged to fire on the Chinese, but considerably used on light machine guns.

Heavy gunfire was avoided, not because Chinese women and children were in range, but because guns that had fired on our ship "were very close to Standard Oil properties which would have been damaged by heavy gun fire."

It is believed that "war between China and the Powers" will not long be avoided. China is divided into fighting groups, and a war with China would not be serious. But couldn't we keep out of the firing line for awhile? The Standard Oil Company knows more about diplomacy than our government, and could protect itself in China in the Chinese way, with cash, of which it has plenty.

It is reported that the ambitious Mexican Huerta is using the Yaqui Indians in his fight for control of the Mexican government. To turn Yaqui Indians loose with "automatics" on white people seems atrocious.

A few years ago, our British brothers were turning Indians loose with tomahawks and scalping knives on the Colonists, and paying the Indians well for their work.

Often the events of today remind us of improvement, and in some shocking way. Yesterday, for instance, at Malalo, in our Philippine possessions, a mob seized a man Deacruz, and his wife, called them witches, and cut off their ears.

That seems horrible, and it is. But the great King Cyrus, who killed many and captured another king, could write calmly, "I cut off his nose and his lips and chained him at my door." And in the Eighteenth Century, just before Franklin went to France as our Ambassador, a young man had his tongue torn out because he had failed to remove his hat as a sacred procession went by.

What was once the highest law everywhere, burrowing alive, torturing, is now left to superstitious mobs.

Two oil companies in California have slashed the retail price of gasoline to 17 1/2 cents, including the state tax of two cents a gallon. Automobile owners are sweeping. Oil stock owners are

LIST OF DEAD GROWS AS REPORTS COME IN FROM STORM CENTERS

MEMBERS PARTY SAY GOVERNOR IS GREAT FISHERMAN

Governor McLean and Party Returned Yesterday From a Fishing Trip at Ocracoke

Not only was the Governor of North Carolina carried away with the beauty of Ocracoke Island and its good fishing, but the islanders were carried away with their Governor as well, as a result of a three days' fishing trip which ended when Governor McLean returned to Raleigh yesterday. According to members of the party, the North Carolina Governor proved to be a very good fisherman, and the party's satisfaction that the Chief Executive of the Nation was not the only public office holder that was a fisherman.

On Sunday Governor McLean, with Ben Dixon McNeil and Highway Commissioner Frank Page, motored down from Raleigh to Washington, where he joined Mr. E. G. Flanagan, of this city, and Mr. Frank Kugler, of Washington, and the party motored on to Swan Quarter. From Swan Quarter the party took a boat for Ocracoke and arrived there about 8 o'clock Sunday evening.

Bright and early Monday the party was up and stirring, and the morning hours were spent fishing, with the result that a large number of trout and blue fish were taken captive. In the afternoon the party set out for what was the Governor's first attempt at drum fishing, and when the two boats returned to the docks, fourteen large drum were exhibited to those who awaited the return of the party. The largest fish in the catch was pointed to by the Governor as having been landed by his prowess, and according to a member of the party the Governor "strutted his stuff."

During the day word had gone around the island that the Governor of the state was paying a visit there, and before the evening meal was over, the islanders had turned out in full force to greet the Governor and "speech, speech," was their cry when he appeared upon the scene. In compliance with their request, Governor McLean addressed the gathering for about three quarters of an hour, and at the close of his remarks the inhabitants of the island were more impressed with the Governor than ever.

During the course of his speech the Governor paid tribute to the wonders of Ocracoke, and especially to the good fishing and in describing his catch, he held his hand about six feet from the floor and declared his prize fish to have been that long. While he apparently felt that the monster must have weighed something like seventy or eighty pounds, he expressed regret that there were no scales available at the time the catch was weighed and the exact weight was unknown. Alas, the Governor did not know that the islanders, weigh the fish as soon as they are left on the dock, and he was somewhat surprised when a voice from his audience pealed forth the information that the prize fish weighed exactly 43 pounds.

"Well," said the Governor, "43 pounds is not so bad for a fish, at that."

The Governor's party enjoyed another good day of fishing Tuesday and on Wednesday morning, after bidding farewell to the island province, departed for Swan Quarter thence homeward. The Governor arrived in Raleigh last night declaring that no summer vacation was complete without some fishing.

Martial Law Still Pre- vails in Stricken Area Aad Only Those En- gaged In Rescue Work Permitted To Be On Streets; Num- ber Of Known Dead Continues To Grow

Sanitation, movement of refugees out of the storm area, and efforts to locate and recover the bodies of the uncounted dead today occupied the attention of workers endeavoring to rehabilitate the southeastern Florida coast section hit Saturday by a hurricane.

Every effort was being made to get into the district medicine and serums needed to prevent a serious epidemic of disease and in an effort to prevent sickness. Davis and Moorehaven have been ordered evacuated by all except workers needed to clean up or search for bodies. All persons remaining in the district are required to be vaccinated against typhoid.

The known dead today stood at 400 with the possibility that Moorehaven, a little agricultural city on the banks of Lake Okechobee, might have more deaths even than the city of Miami. A total of 110 bodies had been recovered up to last night at Moorehaven and probably 200 more were killed there, according to Colonel T. J. Lowry, Jr., in charge of troops guarding the area.

At Miami the known death list reached 100 last night, but estimates of the final total vary widely.

An undertaker in charge of compiling the list, estimated that not more than 10 more bodies would be found. F. R. Collins, head of the missing persons bureau, expressed the belief that 750 more bodies would be found in all of the wreckage along Biscayne Bay where unexplored spots had been searched and the bottom of the Bay had been dragged. He was supported in this belief by J. O. Irvin, city editor of the Miami News, who watched the storm from the News Tower. Mr. Collins pointed out that 300 vessels were in the harbor at the time and all were wrecked.

Known deaths in all sections struck by the storm today stood at exactly 400. This number of bodies had been reported recovered. The chief of the Seminole Indians in the Miami area, leaving the Everglades for treatment for his injuries, reported that many of his people had been killed; but could give no exact figures, although persons who talked with him interpreted his statement to mean that perhaps 100 of the 350 Indians in that section had perished. Should even a fraction of these have perished, as they doubtless did, the known death list would be swelled to well above 400.

Danger of a typhoid epidemic was stressed today by Dr. W. R. Redden, National Medical Director of the American Red Cross.

Plans for rebuilding the destroyed buildings already are being made and repairs have started in many places. The National Board of Fire Underwriters of New York, is sending its staff of adjusters to Miami to assist local underwriters and public adjusters in classifying and paying off insurance losses estimated at between six and ten million dollars.

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The Florida storm completely destroyed 4,700 houses, and damaged more or less seriously 930 more in the Miami area alone, Henry M. Baker, national director of the American Red Cross reported to headquarters here today.

NATIONS SURPLUS LARGER THAN WAS FIRST ESTIMATED

Secretary Mellon, However, Says It Is Too Early To Talk of Tax Reductions

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Increasing tax receipts flooding the Treasury inspired Secretary Mellon today to boost his original estimate of \$185,000,000 surplus for the fiscal year.

He was unwilling, however, to predict what the eventual surplus might be, and maintained that it was too early to talk of tax reduction.

Cotton Prices Break Four Dollars a Bale

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Cotton prices broke more than \$4.00 a bale to the lowest level in several years today when the government crop report indicated a yield of 15,810,000 bales which was far ahead of expectations.

New Orleans, Sept. 23.—(AP)—

The government cotton crop report was a great surprise on the market today. Prices, promptly broke 85 or 90 points or about \$4.50 a bale from the levels existing just before the report was issued. The decline compared with the highest of the morning, was approximately \$5.00 a bale.

World War Veteran Seeks Governorship Of South Carolina

Chester, S. C., Sept. 23.—(INS)—Solicitor J. Lyle, Glenn, Jr., of the sixth judicial circuit, a veteran of the world war, has announced his candidacy for Governor of the state of South Carolina four years hence.

ESTIMATE COTTON CROP THIS YEAR 15,810,000 BALES

Government Report Today Says North Carolina Will Make 1,199,000 Bales

Washington, Sept. 23.—(AP)—A cotton crop of 15,810,000 bales of 500 pound gross weight is indicated by the September 16 condition of the crop which was 59.5 per cent of normal, the department of agriculture announced today.

Cotton of this year's growth ginned prior to September 16, totaled 2,511,317 running bales counting round bales as half bales and excluding linters, the Census Bureau announced today.

A crop of 15,156,000 bales was indicated by the September 1 condition which was 59.6 per cent normal. Last year production was 16,103,679 bales.

The condition as of September 16, an indicated production by certain states follows:

Virginia, 65 per cent production, 47,000 bales. South Carolina, 55 and 1,057,000. North Carolina, 69 and 1,199,000. Texas 57 and 5,259,000.

The ginnings for North Carolina were 35,723 bales.

Atlanta Raising \$100,000 For Storm Sufferers In Florida

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 23.—(INS)—Atlanta has resolved to raise \$100,000 in a hurry to relieve the homeless and sufferers in the storm-swept regions of Florida.

The City of Atlanta has started the contributions with \$10,000 and the Coca Cola Company was second with \$5,000. Other contributions are pouring in while a mass meeting will be held today at the call of Mayor Sims.

VOTE ACCEPTANCE U. S. RESERVATIONS TO WORLD COURT

Conference Today Adopts Committee Report Concerning U. S. Reservations

Geneva, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The World Court delegate conference today adopted its committee report concerning acceptance to American reservations to membership in the Court and then adjourned.

The conference voted to give the members of the court the right if they saw fit later on, to withdraw their approval of the American reservations concerning adoption of amendments to the court statute and concerning the question of asking advisory opinion of the court.

Oil Drilling To Continue Newbern

New Bern, Sept. 23.—(INS)—Oil drilling will continue around New Bern.

Plans are under way here for the forming of a new company to take over the Great Lake Drilling Company and finance the completion of the well being drilled at Camp Bryan.

While no definite action has been taken, stockholders of the Great Lake Company are now discussing the forming of a new company, as a result of a called meeting at which this proposal was advanced.

The well being drilled by the Great Lake Drilling Company was started more than two years ago, and is now 2,500 feet deep. Operations, however, have been at a standstill for some time.

Some people say that the liquor traffic has been swept away and others claim it has just been swept into the cracks and crannies out of the way.—Nashville Banner.

WEeping GIRL AKES STAND IN DAUGHERTY CASE

Introduce Evidence To Show Bonds Given King Exchanged For Smaller Ones

New York, Sept. 23.—(AP)—A weeping girl gave testimony today in the conspiracy trial of Harry M. Daugherty and Thomas W. Miller, that led to the introduction of evidence to show that two Liberty Loan bonds with a value of \$20,000, that Richard Merton, German metal magnate, paid to John T. King, late Republican National Committeeman, from Connecticut, were exchanged for bonds of smaller denomination by an attorney in the Alien Property Custodian office.

Former Greenville People In Florida Survive Hurricane

Word received in this city today from Clarence M. Jones, of Tampa, former resident of this city, stated that members of his family escaped unhurt when the hurricane swept over Florida. He described the storm as one of the worst in the history of the history of the state and the property damage as heavy.

A telegram from I. F. Taylor, of Lakeland, Fla., received today by his mother, Mrs. J. G. Taylor, announces his safety. The telegram read as follows:

"Just in off run. Am o.k. Worked every day. Lakeland is practically unhurt. East coast and lower west coast lots of damage and deaths."

A letter received by Mrs. B. B. Walden, from her husband, who was in Miami at the time of the storm, describes the storm as the most terrific ever to visit that section and stated that loss of life and property would reach an enormous figure. He escaped unhurt.

Now comes the report that Charlotte is putting on a curfew law for all boys under twelve years of age, which necessitates these youngsters being off the streets by nine o'clock at night. Such a law might, throughout the state, do much toward putting a stop to the present tendency on the part of boys to "run wild." It would be even better if the curfew regulations applied to boys above the twelve years mark as well.

Don't forget the disabled veterans. Next Saturday has been designated as "Forget-Me-Not Day", and ladies of the Legion Auxiliary will sell forget-me-nots, the proceeds of the sales to be used for the relief of the disabled veterans. Buying the forget-me-nots is merely paying an obligation the nation owes to those who gave their best in the world war.

SHOULD FORGET PAST GRIEVANCES

Rightly declaring that both Germany and France should forget their old grievances of 1917 now that both nations are in the League of Nations, and should turn their eyes to what the future has in store for the world, the News and Observer says:

"The admission of Germany as a member of the League of Nations made no deep impression in Germany or elsewhere. Four years ago that even, and the warm and friendly speech of M. Briand upon Germany's admission, would have been received with glad acclaim by lovers of peace everywhere. Maximilian Harden, while thinking of Germany's entrance may open the door to realize Wilson's ambition to 'make the world safe for democracy,' and says: 'Did not the same minister in 1917 desire to take the left bank of the Rhine from Germans, and also give the ores of the Saar basin to France, together with Alsace-Lorraine? Was not his passionate evangelism of peace designed to extinguish recollections of his starring performances at Washington, where the timber and bel canto of his soft bass-baritone aroused applause? Was not the whole stage setting at Geneva determined by a desire to recommend debtors as messengers of peace to the creditor Unit-

ed States?" "Why cannot Germany forget what the Frenchman said in 1917, and why cannot French forget Germany's aspirations in 1917?" "Briand and Stressemann drank a glass of wine and a stein of beer together and smoked the pipe of peace. Why cannot their countrymen do likewise? Recollections of past hates is the only barrier to good understanding."

PRESS COMMENT

PROFITS IN PUGILISM

(Memphis-Commercial Appeal)
It seems to be sadly true that the chief effect of prohibitory laws is to increase the profits in the things prohibited for those who are willing to dare the prohibition. The Volstead law has not prevented the use of intoxicating liquor, but it has raised the price of it, and, by so doing, increased the profits of those engaged in the illicit traffic. Nor was prize fighting so profitable years ago before many of the states had taken action to prevent it. With in the last few years the so-called "manly art of self-defense" has been restored in a few states, and the returns are sufficient to interest the "get rich quick Wallingfords" of the nation. How profitable these tests of civilized adaptation of cave man strength now are must be evident from the fact that three wealthy men are paying more for tickets for such a test next Thursday night than was paid by everyone who witnessed another championship battle in a western state a few years ago.

In order to see for themselves whether Mr. Jack Dempsey or Mr. Gene Tunney has best adapted cave man prowess to civilized usage, the American people will pay almost \$2,000,000 for admission tickets. For witnessing the attempts of two men to beat each other into insensibility during a thirty minutes exchange of fists, Americans will spend enough to establish several primary schools, a couple of libraries or some institution for the teaching of the higher arts and sciences. As for charity, anyone can figure it out himself what the money expended in primitive violence will mean.

But the \$1,700,000 or more, that will be paid for admissions on Thursday night does not represent by any means the full bill that will be collected for this exhibition of higher physical culture. For weeks the two gladiators have been developing their agility and punching power, and other thousands of people have paid daily admissions to see them at work. To this must be added the profits that ticket speculators will gather, the returns to the various concessions, and the amount that has cost the newspapers in the way of free advertising. Prize fight promoters nowadays are business men, and they are not overlooking a single thing that will bring in added dollars.

But it would seem at least as if the free contribution already made by the press of this country to the classic event would entitle the newspapers to the right to spend more money in broadcast ing the fight details by radio free to the public, without paying for rendering this free service. However, the profit-takers now say they will charge any radio station at least \$30,000 for the privilege of rendering a free service to the nation. This money grabbing scheme must seem somewhat unfair to the newspapers, without whose free contribution of space for weeks the fight would amount to nothing.

But profit takers in pugilism, we suppose, must be allowed to reap profits from everything, even the free air. We know not what other sources of profit there can be except it be the sale of every article connected with the fight, from the gloves down to the ropes and canvas as souvenirs, to the prize fight enthusiasts. Or it might be that the promoters will demand pay from the newspapers for the space they give in recording the details of the event. We suppose no one should expect such trivial things as the nomination, election and inauguration of a president of the nation could be compared with the all important and supreme event in which two men attempt to batter each other into unconsciousness. Radio stations can broadcast free a chance of government, but not so a possible change of prize fight champions. Also we find churches paying for advertisements of their services while prize fights are allowed to demand pay from those rendering advertisement for the honored privilege of doing that service. Intellectual culture in this nation of ours seems to be growing apiece.

POLICE RECOVER STOLEN GOODS

**\$1,500 Worth Stolen
Samples Recovered
By Local Officers on
Yesterday Morning**

Police officers here yesterday recovered about \$1,500 worth of merchandise stolen during the early hours of the day from the automobiles of three traveling salesmen. The robbery was discovered and most of the stolen property had been recovered before the owners who were asleep in the hotel, knew of their loss.

Early yesterday morning a negro man, who had rented a vacant house on First street, began to move his effects into the house, and to his surprise found a quantity of merchandise already in the building. He immediately informed the officers and the merchandise was brought to the police station. Upon investigation it was found that the articles consisting of shoes, jewelry and ladies' silks, were salesmen's supplies, and that same had been taken from three automobiles parked on the vacant lot next to the postoffice. Each of the automobiles were of the closed type and the salesmen had locked the doors and gone to the hotel feeling that their merchandise was safe. The officers found that one of the cars had been pried open, the door removed from another while the third had been entered through a window. A search of the lot where the cars were parked, revealed quantities of the lot concealed beneath the hedge and in the weeds about. The owners of the cars were notified and after a check-up of the recovered articles it was found there were still missing a string of real pearls, valued above \$200.00, and a silk shawl valued at close to a hundred dollars. Police so far have found no clue as to the identity of the parties who committed the crime, nor have the other missing articles been recovered.

Washington, Sept. 23. (INS)—The Cuban budget for the year beginning July 1, carries the principal expenditure—\$12,482,000 for public instruction and fine arts.

Total expenditures are estimated at \$36,143,000 with revenues at \$36,733,000.

New to public instruction in the budget comes cost of operation of the war and navy departments at \$12,482,000.

Both revenues and expenditures in the new budget exceed that of the preceding year by about \$2,000,000.

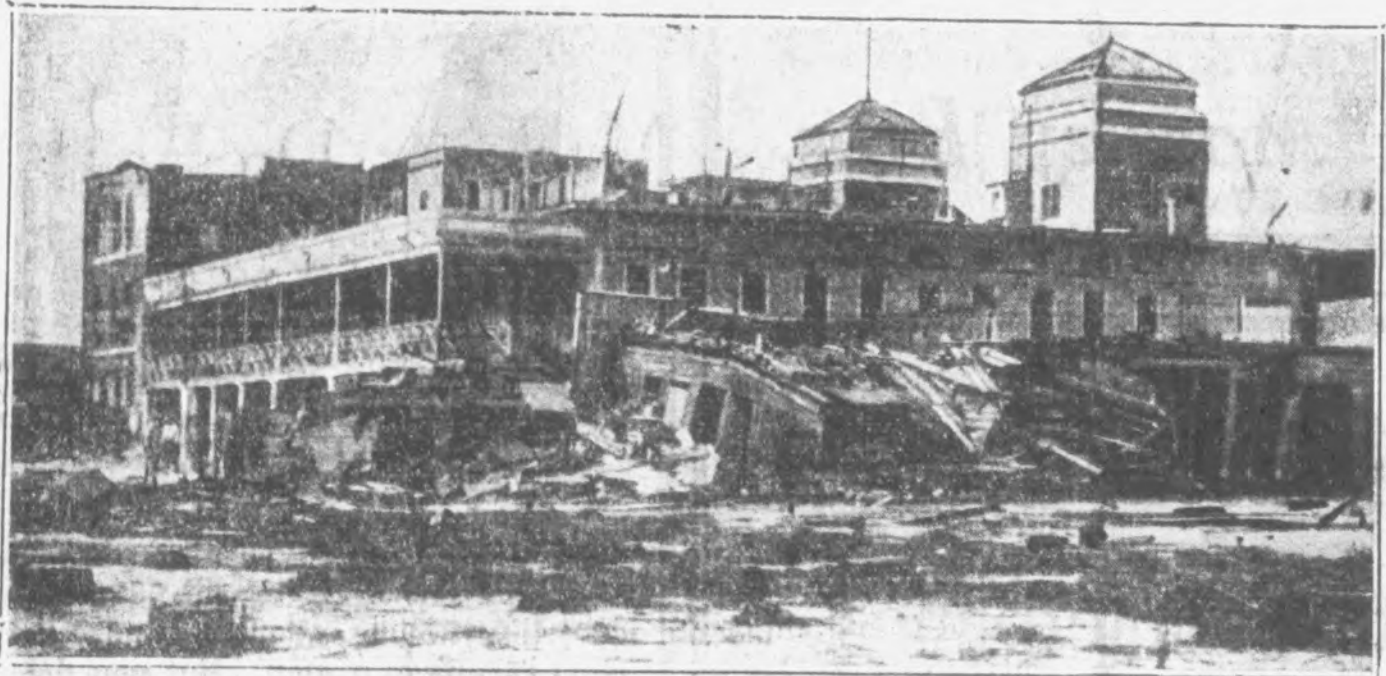

We were almost drowned when the roof was blown from the hotel and torrents of water came down the elevator shaft. "People were on their knees everywhere, praying. The clerk began distributing whiskey. That kept us alive through these hours. Dawn finally broke. I saw a drowned sailor's body swept down the street which was now a small river. "Our hotel was soon turned into a hospital. Now that I'm safe back in Atlanta, it all seems like a frightful nightmare. Water was being sold at 50 cents a glass when I left."

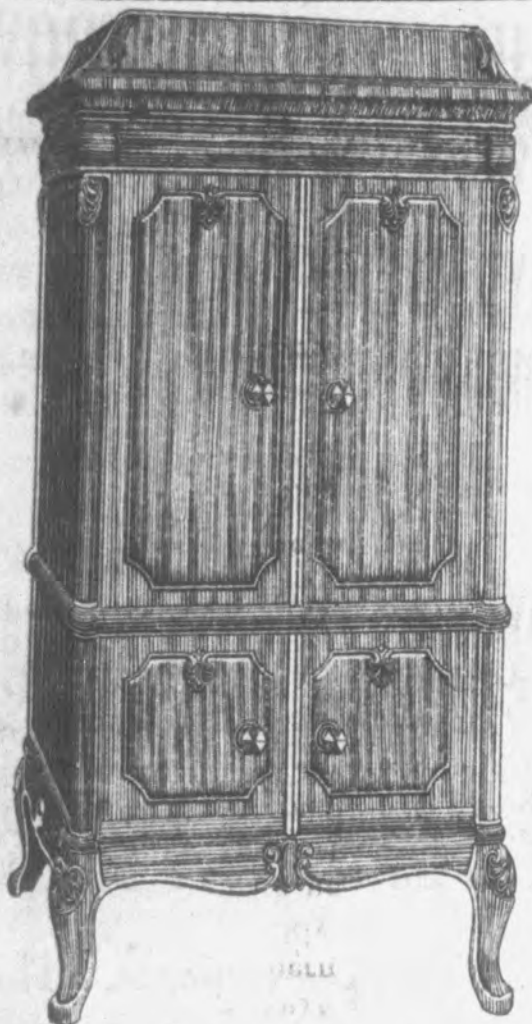
