STORM SWEEP SECTION WORKING TO PREVENT EPIDEMIC OF DISEASE

Battleships and Airplanes Rush Serums To Stricken Sections Town of Moorehaven Entirely Evacuated.

Miami, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Florida's hurricane stricken lower east coast today bent its efforts to prevention of disease and removal of homeless refugees to cities to the north for shelter and care. Thousands yesterday bared their arms to the anti-typhoid needle and stores of incoming serum were being exhausted as fast as received.

Reports here were that airplanes with thousands of units of anti-tetanus and typhoid serums were speeding from northern points and that a warship was rushing to Miami from Charleston, S. C., with an additional supply.

Meanwhile thousands of refugees were leaving for their former homes in the north and for northern Florida cities where food clothing and shelter awaits them. Several thousands passed through Jacksonville yesterday while other cities north of West Palm Beach sheltered thousands in city buildings and tourists camps.

All women and children are being removed from Hollywood where the greatest fury of the storm was felt. All men have been conscripted for the work of clearing away the mass of tangled wreckage.

Several carloads of food supplies, received by the Miami American Legion Post, have been distributed through the Miami, Hollywood and Fort Lauderdale areas and 10 per cent of the building and roofing material received during the last few days is being reserved for repair of homes whose owners are unable to finance the work.

As Red Cross unit, public health details, and other relief workers went about their tasks of burying the dead and relieving the injured large forces of city workers continued their search for bodies in the mass of wreckage of buildings and along the water front.

Additional surveys and rechecks of the 60 mile coastal area between West Palm Beach and Miami and of the Lake Okechobee region, where the hurricane spent its fury, showed 349 dead, 1,100 injured and a property loss of approximately \$16,000,000.

Miami officials have estimated that the property loss in the Miami area alone will reach \$100,000,000.

Hollywood and Fort Lauderdale each suffered damage between \$25,000,000 and \$35,000,000 and damage to other smaller cities has been estimated in the millions of dollars.

Restoration of Miami's harbor and refloating of the scores of boats beached by the mountainous waves, will be a major task of the next few months.

Approximately 300 craft were estimated to be destroyed or sunk in the harbor.

The threatened epidemic of typhoid fever here was giving cause of alarm today but the doctors and sanitation experts regarded the situation as well in hand. At medical headquarters it was said that the chlorination of the city water supply by experts from Chicago probably had saved a grave situation and it was expressed that two days more would see the use of city water officially approved.

Yesterday, while funeral services were being said over a body identified as that of Tom Gills, a seaman employed on a dredge sunk in the Bay, Gill himself appeared on the doorway.

Moorehaven, Fla., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Some 200 remaining residents of this storm devastated town were evacuated today by National Guard troops despite their protest and appeal to Governor Martin.

Troops will remain on guard here until citizens are allowed to return. When that will be is problematical, for the community has all but ceased to exist. This section was so hard hit by the wind and overflowing waters of Lake Okechobee that today,

DECLARES FONCK WAS INCOMPETENT TO HANDLE PLANE

Hartney Says He Quit Argonauts Company Because of Fonck's Incompetency.

Minnetka, N. Y., Sept. 21.—(AP)—District Attorney Edward Today made public an affidavit by Colonel H. E. Hartney, former general manager of the Argonauts, Incorporated, backers of the disastrous Fonck plane flight in which he stated he resigned from the organization because he believed Captain Fonck was incompetent to handle a ship of that size and load.

The District Attorney said he had asked Mr. Hartney for the affidavit as he had heard that he might have some information that would cause him to change his previously announced opinion that there was no criminal negligence in the conducting of the proposed flight.

Mr. Edwards said he had no information regarding published reports that a grand jury investigation of the flight would be made.

Life of Editor Is a Hard One

York, S. C., Sept. 24.—(INS)—Hard is the life of a politician, newspaper reporter in South Carolina. Especially in the Democratic campaign years such as this year. Non-partisan in the Democratic party is equivalent to election.

The poor scribe wonders where he would get the \$25,000 should the candidate get judgment before a petit jury.

Another candidate, "sore" over his defeat and laying it to an article of the paper written by the young scribe, writes: "I'm going to shoot you on sight."

Several other letters, threatening every day from death to torture, have also been received.

The scene presented early today as the first of the survivors started to leave was reminiscent of some of those in France during the world war. Residents waded knee deep and sometimes waist deep through the flooded streets towing row boats loaded with salvaged household and personal effects.

A number of the refugees led cows or pulled hogs along the streets. The scene of desolation is almost indescribable. The town is practically wiped out. The atmosphere is charged with offensive odors caused by the decomposition of animals as well as by decaying vegetable matter swept into town during the flood from Lake Okechobee.

SIX YOUTHS FACE MURDER CHARGE

Onslow Youths to be Tried in October for Slaying Their Chum

By HENRY LESEISNE (INS Staff Correspondent) Jacksonville, N. C., Sept. 24.—Six rather frightened farm boys, none of them over 20, today swore to face again the grim walls of Onslow jail and learn that they will stand trial for murder October 11.

These six youths, all related and all boyhood chums, are accused of the slaying of their pal and cousin, Ellis Hollis, the 17-year-old youth whose knife-scared mangled body was dragged from the cover nearly two months ago.

Although the six boys have been given the third-degree time and time again during the six weeks' confinement in the Onslow jail, and grilled at two inquests they steadfastly protest their innocence of the crime.

Throughout the two weeks during the time the inquests were held, Onslow county authorities ran down every clue, and made several other arrests, but failed to establish more than a chain of circumstantial evidence.

Investigation has been continued throughout the period the youthful alleged murderers were in jail, and officials declare they will spring sensational new evidence when the case is finally called for trial in October.

The six boy defendants are: Arthur, Lonnie and Jody Howard, Leon and Leonard Edens and Roy Hudson. Hudson, who was released after a preliminary inquest, was arrested again and held without bond with his cousins.

When the three men refused to be taken into custody and headed toward the swamp Deputy Seymour opened fire wounding two of them. Despite their injuries all the men made their escape into the swamp and have not yet been taken into custody.

Other evidence consists of a blood-stained stiletto and a blunt razor blade, which Chief of Police Brian said he found in the rock-crevice of Leonard Edens. The police chief claimed also to have found a pair of "knucks" on another of the boys. These the pros who was visiting here.

7 Greatest Battles, Roosevelt's Warning, Who Would "Consent?" Happy Young Couple. By ARTHUR BRISBANE

Many important battles have been fought since Alexander sent Julius Caesar to his death. The taking of Constantinople gave the Turks a foothold on European soil. They still hold it. The defeat of Mohammedans by Charles the Hammer, twelve hundred years ago, kept Allah and his Prophet from taking the place of our deity in western Europe. The Battle of Waterloo set led one Emperor, after he had made all other kings ridiculous. Battles preceding the recent Armistice saved another Emperor and sent him to Holland.

It would be interesting to know which are really "The Seven Deadly Sins of the World" this morning. Last night's battle in Philadelphia seemed to millions of Americans more important and interesting than any seven battles you could pick out of history.

Theodore Roosevelt, in his speech on Tuesday formulated a useful warning against inappropriate measures to combat acknowledged evil.

A few rich men spent large sums at the primaries. It is suggested that the system of primary elections be abolished. That would put complete power of nomination more in the hands of crooked bosses. As well suggest return to monarchy or autocracy because government by the people does not always work smoothly.

To cure the evil of intemperance, says Mr. Roosevelt, "I've jammed through by caucus, by propaganda, by every method known politically." A prohibition law that has produced bootlegging, crime, and drinking of whiskey by high school boys and girls far more harmful than the condition we sought to remedy.

It is the old fable of the tame bear determined to kill a fly on the head of its sleeping master. The bear selected a large rock, and did kill the fly. He also crushed his master's skull.

The President permits the state men that he will not allow the United States to enter the World Court except on one condition. WITHOUT OUR CONSENT. DENY ANY QUESTION AFFECTING THE UNITED STATES.

Why, if that is the President's mind, should we join the World Court at all? They don't need us to help decide questions that DO NOT CONCERN US. And Uncle Sam has enough business of his own without meddling in Europe's quarrels.

Also that "without our consent" is not quite satisfying. WHOSE consent?

Some day we might have an international high finance, the dominating power, and able to give the United States consent to European adjudication of American questions—such as international debts, etc.

We have done fairly well in our own courts, deciding things for ourselves, in the 150 years since we set up in business for ourselves. Why not continue?

The Belgian Crown Prince will marry Princess Astrid, niece of King Gustavus of Sweden. It is a royal love match and "the Princess can consent." The Belgian Crown Prince, 24 years old is "democratic and like a glass of the popular Belgian beer, taken at a cafe table."

State Has Good Cotton Crop

Raleigh, Sept. 24.—(INS)—North Carolina has a better cotton crop than the average farmer believes and yet much worse boll weevil damage than he anticipates.

This was the statement issued here today by Frank Parker, the state crop statistician.

Crop investigations made in 10 North Carolina counties, all located in the cotton growing belt, indicated 7.9 infested bolls per running foot, according to Parker. The average weight per hundred bolls, picked was over 20 ounces seed cotton, Parker said.

The survey was made in the following counties: Wake, Chatham, Lee, Moore, Richmond, Scotland, Hoke, Cumberland, Hartnett, Johnston, Wayne, Nash, Edgecombe, Halifax and Northampton.

Challenger Outpoints Worlds Champion Boxer in Ten Round Bout at Philadelphia Last Night.

Philadelphia, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The scepter of the world championship kingdom that Jack Dempsey has held since 1919, was welded today by Gene Tunney, idol of the Marines and of New York Greenwich Village.

Through a steady downpour of rain drenching the greatest fight spectacle of all ages, Tunney fought his way to the peak of pugilistic fights. In a match that completely reversed general expectation and was stunning to his one-sidedness, Tunney pounded and flayed the title holder into semi-helplessness. Dempsey was so badly battered that only fighting instincts kept him on his feet to the final bell.

Tunney won all the way. He outpointed the challenger to all intents and purposes after the first round when he beat Dempsey to the ropes and staggered him with a succession of powerful rights to the head. From then to the finish the challenger dominated the fight, outfighting, outboxing and outgeneralling the title holder with a magnificent exhibition. Tunney failed to bring his foot down but he hit and the heavy forward champion, into almost complete submission with such decisions that the fight announcement of the referee was that a new King was born in the arena that broke down with the tap of the last gong.

Working In Interest Carolina Motor Club

H. B. Hodge, district manager of the Carolina Motor Club, will be in this city for the next two weeks in the interest of his organization. OHIO BUS LINES GET DELUXE CARS

St. Clairsville, O., Sept. 23.—(INS)—Deluxe motor buses with unbreakable glass enclosed observation platform, tiny electrically equipped pantry, wash-room, and cozy chairs of the chair-car type, will become a part of the travelers' life, according to Earl R. Lewis, local attorney and president of the Ohio Bus Association.

Some of the machines, capable of carrying 20 passengers are already being tried out here, said Lewis, and they are to be improved for long distance traveling.

The glass observation platforms will become a feature, Lewis predicted. The roof over the platform will also be made of the unbreakable glass, so that passengers will be able to see mountain scenery, where the buses will be used for touring canyons.

Larger windows also of the same material are seen by Lewis. Curtains, coming together in the middle, will keep out the sunlight, or may be thrown wide open to afford the tourists an unobstructed view, he said.

SUDBURY, MASS., MANS TEA ROOM SHIMMY

Sudbury, Mass., Sept. 24.—(INS)—"Shimmy if you must, but shimmy outside the sacred boundaries of this historical old New England hamlet."

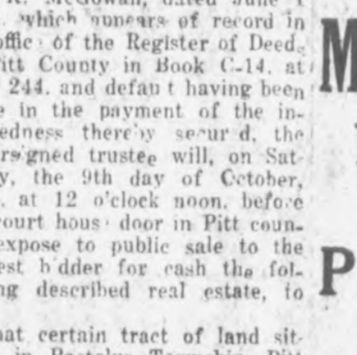

Can any god be more debasing than what a great artist makes by selling the story of his most intimate moments with a woman who was herself a great artist and who apparently for years adored him? He sold his birthright by his own admission for a mess of pottage.

Indeed the reality seems to be that the possession of the dollars is the evil. Kipling in the same fashion, owes no little of his fortune to his popularity or rather to the popularity of his writings in the United States.

highest literary product of Spain in the last two generations, could have gained little by his fame had he not come to the United States. The million dollar revenue reported due to the American publication and movie rights of the 'Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse' was the gift of the dollar loving land to an admired writer.

Kipling, with jaundiced verse, bemoans the belated proffer of American aid in the war. But he has never had much affection for his American cousins although he married an American girl.

But he found congenial topics for his books and stories here and Washington and Roosevelt both were pictured in his 'Reveries and Fancies.' Probably Roosevelt was indicated in his poem, variously estimated beginning, 'If you can keep your head when all about you are losing theirs, etc.'

But d'Annunzio is perfectly sincere and serious when he rails at American gold. He can see perfectly where there is something sordid in the gathering of shekels in an ever increasing heap, but is blind entirely to what has been sordid in his own life and his ceaseless pursuit of beautiful women.

FATHERS 412 BILLS FOR "LEGISLATIVE CHAMPION"

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 24.—(AP)—John A. Yeager, representative from Lamar county in the Mis-

issippi legislature, believes himself a "legislative champion." The latest volume of the Mississippi Acts, of 1926 contains 412 chapters, all bearing the name of John A. Yeager as author. They represent 412 necessary bills, made in one session of less than three months.

While the legislature was in session, the United States Supreme Court made validation of all road district bonds by legislative act necessary. Mr. Yeager with the assistance of the attorney general, prepared the bills in the space of three weeks.

The bills were passed on one roll call.

TURKEY WILL INSIST ON OWN LANGUAGE IN TRADE AFTER FIRST OF JANUARY

Washington, Sept. 24.—(INS)—Foreign corporations doing business in Turkey will be required after January 1, to conduct all correspondence, transactions, and relations with Turkish departments, instructions, and citizens, in the Turkish language.

"Such foreign corporations and instructions can employ another language besides Turkish, but the Turkish text must be the original and the responsible signatures must be affixed to this text," said C.
