ENTOMBED MINERS ARE STILL ALIVE SAY RESCUE CREWS

Workers Declare Distinct Signals Received From Forty-Three Men Entombed in Mine

Ironwood, Mich., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Indications of life from the rock-bound eighth level of the Pabst mine where 43 men were entombed by a cave-in last Friday imbued rescue crews today with a do-or-die spirit.

The indication came yesterday when a distinct signal on a water pipe was heard by a crew of workers in reply to their hammering on the pipe. Later Alfred Maki, a rescue worker, descended with a safety line about his waist, made his way through debris to the nearest point reached to the miners.

"I heard men working," he reported. "It was distant, but it was definite. I am sure they are alive." Maki made another discovery which was disconcerting. The passage was blocked 50 feet beyond the point where the rescue parties are working in the mine shaft to clear away the wreckage. This discovery means a long while before rescue can be effected by this route.

Meanwhile, however, every available bit of energy of the 470 men is being concentrated on this and three other avenues to the entombed men. One of these is a hole being cast by a diamond drill to facilitate the passing of food, clothing and messages to the men. Another is a horizontal tunnel from the adjoining mine while the fourth and most hazardous is an attempt to dig below the men from a lower level. The lower level was reached by means of another shaft and workers hope to dislodge the debris that blocks the tunnel below the men and to drop it to the bottom thus clearing an opening from below to the eighth level.

Everyone is confident the rescue will be made, but just how long it may take cannot be determined. Some expect it is possible that one of the openings will be completed tonight. The Oliver Mining Company, who owns the mine, however, issued a statement declaring four or five days more would be necessary.

The bodies of three men who were crushed by the rock fall, were recovered Saturday from the bottom of the shaft.

An attempt to communicate with the entombed men by telegraph code using an iron pipe as the transmission medium, failed early today. The code for "O.K." was hammered more than a hundred times by a telegrapher but there was no response. One of the entombed miners understands the code mine, officials said.

Old Belt Markets Open October 5

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(INS)—With the border belt practically over, and the new belt now in full blast, eyes of the tobacco world are turning toward the 10 Old Belt markets which will open Tuesday, October 5.

Nine of the Old Belt markets have already opened. With the others opening Tuesday, the entire Old Belt will be represented. Markets opening Tuesday are: Winston-Salem, Monroville, Burlington, Mount Airy, Reidsville, Elkin, Mountain, Mebane and Roxboro, in North Carolina, and Brookneal, Chase City, Danville, Kenilworth, Martinsville, Rocky Mount, South Hill, Clarksville and South Boston in Virginia.

Higher prices on all the earlier markets have caused tobacco exporters and warehousemen to predict that relatively higher prices will prevail in this section of the Old Belt.

SEVERAL CASES SETTLED CIVIL COURT MONDAY

Land Case in Courts for Number of Years Received Final Disposition Yesterday

Several cases were disposed of in yesterday's session of civil court now in progress here with Judge N. A. Sinclair presiding. Probably the most important of the cases heard was that of J. Q. Adams versus Fred Wilson. This case was for the accounting of rents on certain lands belonging to Adams and occupied by Wilson. The judgment in favor of Adams to the effect that he is entitled to ten years of \$125 per year for the past seven years and possession of said lands brings to an end a controversy that has been in the courts here for the past several years.

Other cases heard yesterday included the following: The case of Richard Harris, F. S. Harris and others versus the Board of County Commissioners and County Board of Education appealed from a former term was removed from the docket.

The case of Q. L. Joyner versus W. H. Fleming appealed from the February term, was not perfected and the judgment in favor of the defendant, the former hearing was permitted to stand.

The Globe Soap Company was awarded a judgment for \$48.77 against R. C. Davis. In the case of First National Bank of Morristown, Tenn., against the Farmers Bank, upon agreement of counsel the court awarded a judgment of \$455.00 in favor of the plaintiffs.

Lincoln Potter Co., Inc., was awarded a judgment against W. Williams trading as Farmville Department Store, in the sum of \$26.50.

In the case of J. E. Barnhill and wife against N. W. Outlaw and the Greenville Banking & Trust Company, it was made known that the bank had received settlement from N. W. Outlaw and the mortgage held by the bank ordered cancelled.

North Carolina Bids for Governors' Meet

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(INS)—North Carolina is going to make a strong bid for the 1927 Governors' Conference.

Governor Angus W. McLean, of North Carolina, has addressed a letter to Carey A. Hardee, secretary of the conference, inviting the governors to hold their 1927 meeting at Pinehurst, N. C.

The meeting place is to be determined by the executive committee next spring. The last conference was held in Wyoming. The conference of governors at present is considering a proposal originally advanced by Governor McLean. The proposal is for a commission of states to make possible co-operative action on the part of groups of states in dealing with problems of particular concern to the respective groups.

Turns Attention To Rabbit Raising

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Domestic rabbit meat, declares a biological survey issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, "tastes more like chicken than wild rabbit." The department is now carrying on investigations of rabbit raising methods and has issued an attractive poster calling attention to the edible qualities of rabbit when cooked in different ways.

TRACE BONDS TO JESSE W. SMITH

Witness Testifies He Traced Bonds to Daugherty's "Good Man, Friday"

New York, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Five Liberty Loan Bonds valued at \$40,000 which formed a part of the \$391,000 commission paid to John T. King, for rushing the \$7,000,000 claim through the Alien Property Custodian's and Attorney General's offices were traced to Jesse W. Smith today in the Daugherty Miller conspiracy case.

The name of Smith, described as "Harry M. Daugherty's Good Man Friday," was fitted through-out the first fifteen days of the trial. It was first mentioned when it was testified that Smith helped Richard Merton, German metal magnate, to become acquainted with Thomas W. Miller and the assistants of Daugherty. It was then shown that Smith got half of the retainer Merton gave King. Today Edward N. Toland, an assistant in the Attorney General's office, describing how he traced to Smith \$40,000 worth of bonds Merton gave to King.

Spartans Arrive to Play Chicago 3 Soccer Games

Chicago, Sept. 28.—(INS)—With one of the most impressive records in the history of the game the Spartans soccer team of Prague, now touring the United States, has arrived in Chicago for a three game series opening October 3.

The "Iron team" of Chicago made up of Chicago stars, will play the European visitors in Soldiers Field October 3 and in the second game of the series the invaders will clash with the Canadian champions, Ulster United of Toronto.

The third tilt will find the visitors facing the Chicago Spartans at Cermak Park, October 23. Already this year Chicago has turned back two foreign teams, the Ontario All Stars and the Hottentot aggregation of Austria.

It is figured a battle of evenly-matched teams will thrill the fans when the Chicagoans meet the visitors, who hold wins over Uruguay, Olympic champions and Bolton Wanderers, English cup holders.

Medical Head of Red Cross Declares Num- ber Cases Disease Not Unusual for Time of Year

West Palm Beach, Fla., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Belief that all danger of a disease epidemic had passed was expressed today by doctors, nurses and workers in the score or more of communities in the path of last week's hurricane. Timely warning by the press, ideal weather, energetic efforts by the doctors and nurses and response of the populace to immunization efforts have fast minimized the danger of an epidemic, according to William R. Redden, medical director of the Red Cross. The splendid immunization work by the doctors constitutes one of the finest pieces of preventative work the country has ever known outside of military circles, he declared. The few cases of typhoid and other diseases now found are no more than is usual at this season of the year.

Inoculations continued yesterday when several hundred in the various sections of the storm-swept area bared their arms to the anti-typhoid needle. With the growing menace of the hurricane and the rebuilding of sanitation systems, progressing the national guardsmen who have been assisting the civil authorities have begun to leave for their homes.

The accurate number of the dead, seriously injured and missing will not be available for several days. The number of known dead compiled from various sources remained around 400, while the number of missing is estimated between 150 and 300. The number of injured is placed at 1,800 of which 75 are not expected to live.

New York Democrats Renominate Al Smith for the Governorship

New York, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Democrats of New York State unanimously and for the fifth time nominated Alfred E. Smith for Governor today. The nomination was accomplished by a demonstration of tremendous enthusiasm.

The eight hour day opened the way to prosperity in America, says Ford, and so the five day week will open our way to a still greater prosperity.

Tar Heels to Attend National Dairy Show

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A departure from the usual club custom in North Carolina of confining young people's aid to their own cities, has made possible a trip for three students of rural agricultural schools to Detroit, where they will contest with representatives from all parts of the nation in the National Dairy Show to be held during the week October 4 to 13.

The boys are being sent by the Rotary clubs of North Carolina, and if they follow precedent they will acquire themselves with honor in the contest, for many valuable prizes in livestock and dairy products judging.

Out of a series of elimination contests the following boys were selected to represent the state farm life schools: Roy Paramore, Vanceboro Farm Life school, Craven county; Ernest Kenney, Friendship school, Alamance county; Murphree Royal, Salemburg school, Sampson county, and Houston Austin, of Oakhorn school, Stanley county, as alternate.

The boys will leave Raleigh next Monday for Detroit. They will be accompanied by an instructor from the Vanceboro school.

150 CONVICTS TO RETURN TO RALEIGH PEN

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(INS)—Approximately 150 state convicts are expected to leave Madison county for Central Prison here next Wednesday night, prison officials announced here today.

The convicts have been employed on construction of highways in Madison county. The projects have been completed.

PLENTY OF FOXES COLUMBUS COUNTY

Cerro Gordo, Sept. 28.—(INS)—Foxes are going to be plentiful in Columbus county this year. That, at least, is what the hunters say.

"A sign of plenty of foxes is lots of tracks and the damage they do to the fowl houses," says G. W. Edwards, Worey farmer. And many Columbus county farmers can testify to seeing lots of tracks, and missing fowls.

BETS AUTOMOBILE ON DEMPSZY

Asheville, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Wall street guessed wrong to the tune of three to one in its odds on the now historic Dempsey-Tunney bout, but one local citizen backed his faith in the dope by wagering his automobile against a cheap watch.

Whether the small-ender insisted on the wager being made good or not, has not been recorded, but the incident is regarded as indicative of the general trend of opinion in the hill country where Dempsey put in several weeks of training during the spring, even if all who thought that way didn't bet their cars against fat stem-winders.

MORTICIANS ARE BRICKLAYERS TO PRESIDENT'S AID

When Undertakers Received By President, Aide Tells Him They Are Bricklayers

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Morticians are "bricklayers" to some unnamed aide at the White House. His misunderstanding of the term relayed to the President yesterday as he received 200 undertakers left the President in ignorance of the occupation of the men with whom he was conversing. A crowded calendar prevented the Chief Executive from knowing the identity of the visitors, before they began filing past his desk.

"Who are these men?" he asked one of the aides in his office. The question was transferred to Everett Sanders, secretary to the President.

"Morticians," he replied. The recipient of the information, who was to relay it to the President, looked rather astonished but by the time he reached the President his problem was solved for him.

"Bricklayers," he told the President, sotto voce, and the delegation continued to file past the desk.

WOMAN EVANGELIST WITH SIX OTHERS BE- ING TRIED FOR CON- SPIRACY TO OBSTRUCT JUSTICE

Los Angeles, Sept. 28.—(AP)—District Attorney Asa Keyes today expected to call additional state witnesses to testify in Municipal court here in his effort to identify Mrs. Almase Semple McPherson, as the woman who occupied the cottage at Carmel-by-the-Sea, with Kenneth G. Ormiston, last summer while the Angelus Temple evangelist was absent from her pastorate.

At the opening of the preliminary hearing in Judge Sam Blake's court yesterday, Mrs. McPherson and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, waived the reading of the complaint charging criminal conspiracy and heard five state witnesses testify they were positive that the evangelist shared the cottage with Ormiston who was radio operator at her church. A sixth witness declared the bungalow was rented by Ormiston under the name of George McIntyre, four days before the evangelist disappeared.

George Considine, carpenter, who is said to have witnessed the several love making scenes in the back yard of the cottage, is one of the principal witnesses slated for appearance today. Miss Bernice Morris, considered by the prosecution as one of its star witnesses, will be called at today's session also in event the witnesses from Carmel complete their testimony. Her testimony centers upon the alleged plot of Mrs. McPherson to manufacture false evidence to substantiate her kidnapping story.

The present hearing is the outgrowth of felony complaints executed recently by Keyes charging Mrs. McPherson, her mother and five others, with criminal conspiracy to obstruct justice and preparing false evidence in connection with the evangelist's story as having been kidnapped and held for ransom.

Wheeling, W. Va., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Snow fell here early today for the first time this season. It lasted but a few minutes.

U. S. Labor Meets Surprise Tillett, British Organizer

London, Sept. 28.—(INS)—The formalities attaching to the meetings of the American Federation of Labor seem to have started Ben Tillett, veteran labor organizer, during his recent visit to the United States.

"Nevertheless," says Tillett, "the gatherings compare well with our own, although we lack the rites and formality of the average American assemblage of trade unionists."

"The total of four million trade unionists compares rather unfavorably, and to the disadvantage of America, if a population of forty-four million people, with nearly a five million membership, is compared with a country of over a hundred millions."

"But the abnormal distance separating the workers in America have much to do with the paucity of membership. Then the question of language counts, although the Jewish workers of New York, with a veritable babel of tongues, are the best organized and best fighting unions of America. They are the most generous, too."

"Although America commands the greatest number of races and tongues, she is insular in spite of her vastness. The American worker is almost as insular as we are. But there is really need to close up if Anglo-American amenities are to be of as much use to labor as they are to Anglo-American financiers."

FAIRMONT MARKET POSTPONES CLOSING DATE

Fairmont, Sept. 28.—(INS)—The Fairmont tobacco market will remain open until October 20. This was decided at a recent meeting of the Tobacco Board of Trade here.

The Board of Trade took this action because an average of 200,000 pounds of tobacco is still being marketed on the Fairmont floors.

After October 1, only single sales will be conducted. During the season the Fairmont market has had double sales.

Practically all of the Bordr Belts have closed, including those located in South Carolina. The larger markets, which are remaining open, probably will close late this week, it was said.

Belief in Evolution Held by All M. D's. Dr. Morton Thinks

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 28.—(INS)—If doctors of medicine would announce their belief in Evolution, people in general would come to believe in Evolution, according to Dr. Dudley J. Morton, widely known as a member of Yale University's department of surgery. Dr. Morton recently addressed eighty members of the Cambridge, (England), University Medical school who came here to look over Yale and urged that medicals throughout the world express themselves on the controversial subject which he calls "The Phenomenon of Evolution."

"I believe that fully one hundred per cent of those whom we owe our important advances in medicine are fully assured of the fact of Evolution," Dr. Morton said. "They are strongly convinced that the scope and rate of our future advances bear a direct ratio to our better understanding of the historical laws which have guided its course."

Hydroplane Contest Wilmington Oct. 9

Wilmington, Sept. 28.—(INS)—Four hydroplanes will compete for the Bankers' Trophy cup here on Saturday, October 9.

ILL. PARK WILL SAVE HOMES OF MOUND BUILDERS

144 Acre Tract With Prehistoric Earth Works To Be Preserved; State Road Being Built to Make Site Accessible to Tourists

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 28.—(INS)—All possible speed will be used in beautifying the 144 acres comprising the Cahokia Mound Park in Southern Illinois and in completing the second state bond issue road to this park. Contracts for work on the park have been let and the ground will be broken up and graded.

The Mounds will not be disturbed.

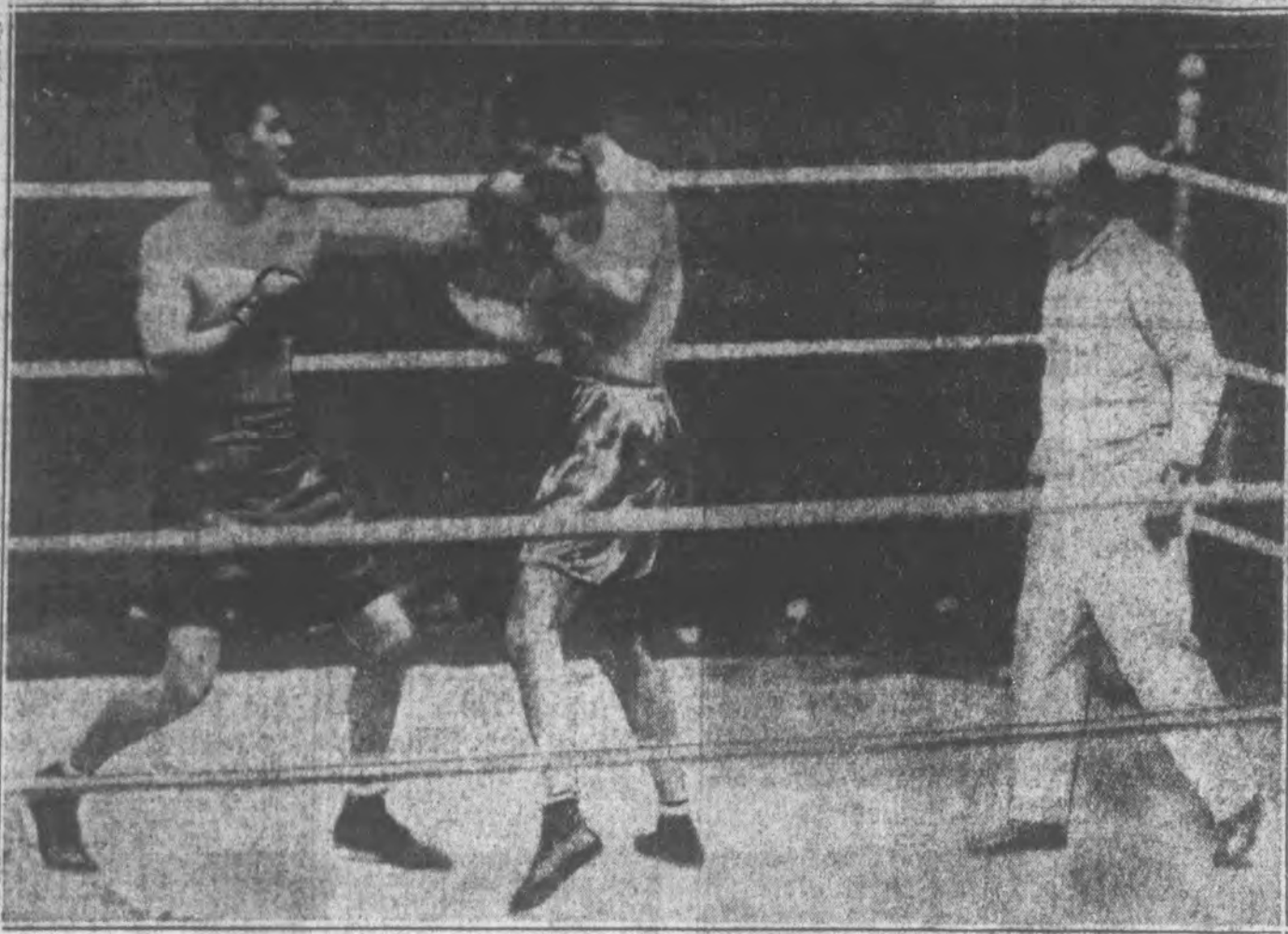
The Great Cahokia Mound, or 'Monk Mound,' is easily the largest prehistoric artificial earth work in the United States and is to the 'Mound Builders' what the Great Pyramids were to the Pharaohs of Egypt.

The dimensions of Monk Mound are: base, north and south, 900 feet; east and west 721 feet; height 100 feet. It covers 16 acres and is estimated to contain 84,000,000 cubic feet of earth. It has been figured that it would take 2400 builders working 10 hours every day for two years to complete this mound.

The Mound won its name because in 1804 the order of Trappist Monks built a mission there. The name Cahokia comes from the tribe of Indians LaSalle met in 1681. In addition to this mound there are 45 smaller ones scattered about.

The Cahokia mounds, scientists say, are identical with structures which the Spaniards found the Aztecs using in Mexico City for religious ceremonies in the early part of the sixteenth century.

Just when the mounds were built has never been determined. It is believed, however, that construction antedated the arrival of

the white man by several centuries.

It has never been agreed upon by archaeologists as to who built the mounds. Some believe they were constructed by Aztecs who wandered north, others thinking that the relics found in the mounds indicate greater culture than that possessed by the Indians found when Columbus discovered America.

Appropriation was made by the Illinois assembly so that this heritage might be preserved.

OLD HAMMER GUN BRINGS KING GEORGE HIS GROUSE

York, Eng., Sept. 27.—(AP)—King George made his record bag of 12 grouse in one drive at Abbeystead with two pairs of old-fashioned double barreled hammer-guns manufactured thirty odd years ago.

As a young man the King laid the foundation of his reputation as a shot with these guns and still clings to them for sentimental reasons.

An English firm which makes guns for the crowned head, of half the world, has been keeping the King's guns in condition for years. At the end of each shooting season, the guns are sent to the factory, stripped, cleaned, overhauled, given an oil bath and put in storage until the next year.

STONE FROM WESTMINSTER FOR PITTSBURGH CHURCH

London, Sept. 27.—(INS)—One of the most ancient stones of Westminster Abbey, first used in 1200, has been presented to the new church of St. Mary, Baver Falls, Pittsburgh.

It must not be thought that we give away anything that can be used further in the work of restoration.

ELECTRIC RAILWAY MEN T OMAHA TROLLEY SHOW AT CLEVELAND CONFAB

Cleveland, O., Sept. 27.—(INS)—Every type of street car and bus manufactured in this country will be on display at the annual convention of the American Railway association here, October 4-8.

More than 9,000 delegates representing the nation's street railway companies and manufacturers of street cars and buses are expected to be present, according to Colonel John Alexander, vice-president of the Cleveland Railway Co., in charge of the display.

The exhibits will reveal that street transportation methods have greatly advanced during the past year alone and that there is very little room for further development, he said.

A special convention hall to house exhibits which will not fit in the city auditorium, has been erected; and two miles of track have been laid on lots surrounding the buildings upon which the street cars will be displayed.

London, Sept. 27.—(INS)—Curving snake bracelets that can be worn around the neck, on the arm, or circling the ankle are the latest novelty appealing to the ultra fashionable.

Rubies, amethysts, sapphires or emeralds gleam on the heads. The flexible self-adjusting bodies are fashioned of gold.

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PROTECTION NEEDED

The recent tragedy in Washington brings home the fact just how much danger there is connected with being a police officer and just how much the police officer means to his city as a public servant. Should we decide to leave our homes for the night we go out knowing that our premises will be protected by our officers, or when we go to our beds for the night we do so with a feeling that the presence of police officers in our city makes us secure from harm. Police officers are for the protection of the life and property of our city and our people, but have you ever stopped to think that in turn we, as a city, are not giving the families of these police-men protection?

As was the case in Washington, some day one of our officers may be called upon to give his life in carrying out his duty to society and in so doing his loved ones may be deprived of a means of livelihood. We understand that the city of Greenville carries insurance upon its firemen and other employees but that not one cent of insurance is carried on the policemen to protect their families from want in case of a tragedy similar to the one in Washington should occur here.

Fine words of tribute for the faithful officer will do much to comfort grief-stricken loved ones but these will not keep the wolf from the door and Greenville should now take steps to protect the families of their officers by insuring the officers.

PRESS COMMENT

A POLICY OF NO POLICY

(News and Observer)
After a visit to President Coolidge a violent anti-World Court Senator, Dr. Moses, of New Hampshire, gives it out that the President is through. That state ment has been broadcasted and not even the Official Spokesman has denied it.

Why should it surprise anybody that Mr. Coolidge is ready to drift with the current? In 1918 he was elected Governor of Massachusetts as an advocate of the League of Nations. When President Wilson returned from France, Murray Crane and Calvin Coolidge were understood to be heartily for its ratification. Murray Crane died in the fall. Coolidge was nominated along with Harding and during the campaign, Taft told the people that the way to get into the League of Nations was to vote for Harding and Coolidge, while Hiram Johnson told them such a vote would insure keeping out. Then Harding died and Coolidge preached the funeral of the League. Later, mildly, very mildly, he

recommended going into the World Court. He was silent as entrance was conditioned upon reservations that cut most of the heart out of it.

The international policy of this administration is no policy. If Moses says it is against the World Court, nothing is said. If Shortridge it is for the World Court, the same silence is preserved. It is the same in domestic concerns. In New York and Pennsylvania it is wet. In Iowa and Vermont it is dry. In Illinois and Pennsylvania it seeks the advantage through tugs by lavish expenditures.

It is a policy of no policy, seeking to secure voters both "coming and going."

THE PROSPECTS FOR DISARMAMENT

(New York World)
The League Assembly has unanimously resolved that a general conference on arms reduction should be held before it meets again in September, 1927, unless material difficulties prevent. It would be easy to exaggerate the significance of this resolution. It is simply a gesture urging all possible haste by the Preparatory Disarmament Commission in dealing with the technical problems, and by the League Council in dealing with the political problems, which must be solved before a conference is possible. In the same spirit, the Assembly a few days earlier urged the experts who are preparing plans for a world economic conference to complete their work within the next few months. The Assembly's business is to express the eagerness of world opinion for action. It is the Council's business to decide when the time is ripe for a successful arms conference and economic conference.

Arms reduction will come, but no mistake could be greater than to grow impatient because it is slow in coming. It will be slow because it depends upon the creation of a general sense of national security. Security for France means something very unlike what it means for the British Empire. For this reason, the proceedings of the Preparatory Disarmament Commission have revealed a fundamental division between the Anglo-American concepts and the ideas of France and her allies. The French definition of what constitutes armaments is very different from England's definition. Their views of the political prerequisites to disarmament are also very different, as the discussion of the protocol showed. Locarno has taken Europe a long distance toward a practical arms conference, but there is much ground still to traverse.

Lord Cecil remarks that "no counsel is more fatal" than the counsel of precipitate speed. But every one who regards the progress Europe has made between the Ruhr invasion and Germany's entrance to the League must feel that the world's profound longing for disarmament will yet be satisfied.

exist of the college, announces. The new station is the only one in the Ohio valley and will consist of a complete laboratory of latest seismographical instruments for determining earth disturbances.

The new station will be equipped with two distinct types of seismograph, one known as the Wood-Anderson equipment and which is used to record only disturbances generally horizontal to the topography of the earth, the other known as the Gaitzlin modification of a Wood-Anderson type instrument used only for recording vertical or up and down movements of the earth.

Two sets of the horizontal recorders are required placed so that they register at right angles. One set will record all East-West disturbances and the other all North-South disturbances, Mr. Herr explains.

There is also a pair of special instruments for recording local disturbances.

Mr. Herr explains that the Gaitzlin instrument records the movement of the earth disturbances through a mirror attached to a delicately hung pendulum. A finger of light from a small lamp strikes this moving mirror and the variations are transferred through other mirrors of a roll of photographic chart paper from which the lines of variation or disturbances are then read.

The new station will cooperate with Government seismograph services and will be largely relied upon by the states of Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, and parts of Pennsylvania, Illinois and Tennessee.

N. Y. Bonus Comm. Out of Existence End of This Year

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 28.—(INS)—The New York state bonus commission will pass out of existence on December 31.

Murphy, of Rochester, who as fiscal officer of the state, draws the checks in favor of the men eligible to receive a bonus, announced today that the total number of claims paid up to September 1, amount to 399,677 out of a total of 414,905.

To date the total amount of bonus paid to World War veterans by this state is \$47,117,866.67. In addition to Comptroller Murphy the Bonus Commission is composed of State Treasurer Lewis H. Founds, Attorney General Albert Ottinger and Adjutant General Franklin B. Ward.

An analysis of the figures covering bonus applications shows that the major percentage of the men who submitted claims under the bonus law had their claims rejected, said Comptroller Murphy. Out of the total of 414,905 applications, only 6,434 have been rejected. There still remains 8,894 claims to be disposed of before the commission goes out of existence, he added.

Some veterans who saw service only long enough to put on and take off their uniform, received bonus checks amounting to 33 cents but there were very few of these, the commission said. A total of 26,174 veterans centers Mountain Camp and the tribute to their bonus to the Veterans' American Veterans' Unit. These contributions totaled \$208,965.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers

San Francisco, Sept. 27.—(INS)—Justice and honor will at last be done to the man who introduced scientific irrigation in Australia forty years ago, and then went bankrupt.

George Chaffey, now living in retirement in Whittier, Cal., one of California's greatest developers and among the foremost irrigation engineers in the world, is the man who took irrigation to Australia and lost a fortune there.

When the steamship Thiti arrived in San Francisco from Australia recently it brought a man who has traveled almost 10,000 miles to do justice to Chaffey.

This man is Joseph A. Alexander, journalist. He will gather the material for an extended biography of Chaffey which is to be published in Australia to bring to the people of that continent a knowledge of the man who added to its industries on that in 1925 was worth more than \$35,000,000.

Chaffey was one of the master minds of California irrigation in the early eighties. Riverside, Ontario, Elvanda and the Imperial valley districts are among the projects with which his name and that of his brother, W. C. Chaffey, who died in Australia a number of years ago, are associated.

In 1883, in response to an invitation extended by Alfred Deakin, then Victorian minister of water supply and since, three prime minister of the commonwealth, George

Chaffey introduced into Australia the American system of irrigation colonies which has so revolutionized the productive capacity of California, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and other states.

Lockie was sent to California to make a study of the irrigation project there and took Chaffey back with him.

George Chaffey and his brother obtained from the Victorian government land concessions aggregating 200,000 acres, for their right to divert water from the Murray river, Australia's Mississippi.

They founded the town and colonies of Mildura and Renmark, which are still prosperous, and are the centers of the fruit districts since developed.

Stupidism and faint-heartedness, however, helped destroy faith in the project and in the financial depression of 1895 Chaffey Brothers, 124, were forced into liquidation.

George Chaffey returned to America, helped to develop the Imperial valley with the Owens river project and later became president of the Imperial Savings Bank of Los Angeles and of the Whittier Water Company.

The honor that has so long been kept from him will shortly be his.
