FATE OF FORTY THREE ENTOMBED MINERS MAY BE KNOWN LATE TODAY

Rescue Workers Are Nearing Spot in the Pabst Mine Where Men Have Been Held Since Friday

Ironwood, Mich., Sept. 29.—(AP)—The fate of the 43 men entombed since last Friday in the Pabst mine of the Oliver Mining Company here may become known today. Possibility that one of the efforts to pierce the barrier of rock and earth in the shaft to the eighth level where the men are imprisoned 800 feet below the ground, may be crowned with success today did not, however, deter the men engaged in three other rescue attempts.

Today, hope was from the bottom of the shaft which is clogged in the middle by a cave-in. Admittance to the lower level of the mine was gained by connection from the shaft of a nearby mine. Working upward the rescuers penetrated the 20th level after several days of hazardous effort. Completion of timbering will permit easy access to ladders of the shaft which were intact as far as rescuers could see upward today, giving hope that they might climb up to or nearly to the eighth level.

It is 1,200 feet from the twentieth level to the eighth level where 40 of the men are believed to be. On the eighteenth level a mine inspector is believed to be imprisoned and above him on the thirteenth level, two other mine inspectors are believed to be imprisoned.

Relatives, anxious and tired but still hopeful and patient, discussed the rescue workers. No one will give up. Everyone is sure the miners live and will be rescued. Meanwhile physicians and nurses are waiting to care for the men when they are reached.

Great Lakes Salmon Fishing in Prospect

Madison, Wis., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Salmon fishing in the Great Lakes is a possibility of the future.

The state conservation commission is experimenting with the propagation of salmon to determine whether the fish can be made to inhabit Lake Superior in sufficient numbers to make canning an industry in this section.

Only a few salmon have been drawn from the lake in the nets of fishermen, but they are sufficient to give B. O. Webster, state superintendent of fisheries, hope that eventually salmon will be plentiful in the inland waters.

Two hundred thousand salmon of "fingerling" size have been planted in Lake Superior annually for five years. Only a few of the fish were expected to reappear in the lakes due to the comparatively small number planted.

NO SESSION HELD DAUGHERTY TRIAL DURING MORNING

Further Hearing Is Postponed Until Afternoon While Judge and Lawyers Discuss Dismissal Motion

New York, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The jury in the Daugherty-Miller conspiracy trial was dismissed today until 10:30 tomorrow morning to allow the defense attorneys to continue presenting argument on the dismissal motion to Judge Mack.

Chicago Curfew Law Causes Police Unusual Hardship

Chicago, Sept. 29.—(INS)—A method for distinguishing the "flapper" of high school age from her married sister, her mother and her grandmother was being sought by Chicago police today following renewed attempts to enforce the city's 25 year old "curfew" law.

The ordinance written into the city's law record when Chicago was only a thriving midwestern city, was revised recently at the instance of welfare workers and police head, in an effort to stamp out the alarming increase in the number of attacks on young girls. It was made effective following a period in which two girls, victims of moron's attacks, died and more than a score of others suffered injuries which physicians declared might cripple them for life.

And then the troubles of policemen on night beats began. Immediately came complaints of the patrolmen that with the prevailing modes of short skirts, rolled hose and bobbed hair for grandmother and granddaughter alike, they were unable to distinguish the "kids" from their elders. In the first week that the law was in operation, scores of young married women were hailed into police stations where they indignantly produced proof that they were over the "curfew" age.

Despite this, however, police declared that enforcement of the curfew regulations was being desired results. Under the terms of the law, girls under sixteen found on the streets unescorted after 10 p. m., are brought into police stations and held until their parents come for them.

FAIR LADIES LACKING IN GENEVA ASSEMBLY

Geneva, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The assembly of the League of Nations, honored last year by the presence of the Duchess of Athol, delegate for Great Britain, offers scant comfort this year to the admirers of feminine beauty.

Among the lady delegates, fewer in number than for several years, there are lawyers, social workers, and one Romanian poetess. None of these worthy ladies, real adornments of their sex in their chosen lines of endeavor, would aspire to the title of beautiful. Nor do the wives and daughters of the men delegates add much to the ensemble.

General Pangalos is tried on charges of unlawfully hanging Greek Generals. His turn to hang may come.

Serious conditions in Turkey, the holding up of news dispatches indicates revolutionary trouble in that energetic hanging country.

At Ironwood, Michigan, forty-three miners are buried 400 feet under ground. A pipe is sunk through which the men will be fed with condensed food tablets while waiting to be dug out, if they are dug out. What is happening in Turkey seems not important to them.

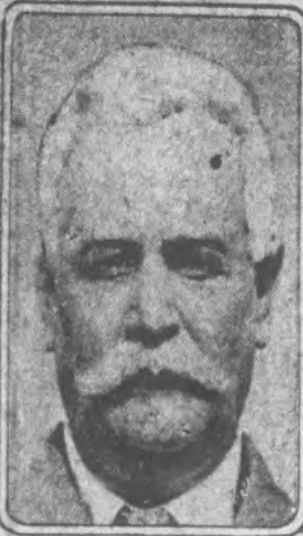
The lawyers for the defense will probably object that such conduct is calculated to injure his client. Murderers are very sensitive.

GOLDSBORO MAN HOLDS NORVELL FOR KILLING KINSTON MAN LAST MONDAY

Nathan O'Berry Appointed to Vacancy On North Carolina Education Commission

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Governor McLean today announced the appointment of Nathan O'Berry, of Goldsboro, to succeed Charles A. Webb, of Asheville, on the North Carolina Education Commission. Webb tendered his resignation recently on account of pressing business duties that prevented his devoting the proper amount of time to studying the school problems expected of members of the commission.

Digs Up Figures On Richest Men in the Country

Minneapolis, Minn., Sept. 29.—(INS)—Minnesota has 119 millionaires, and of this number, thirty-five live in Minneapolis, the largest city in the state, according to reports made public by the internal revenue collector here. The survey also shows that Minnesota ranks eighth among the states in millionaire population.

There are 23 millionaires in St. Paul and 19 in Duluth, the report continues. Other figures made public show that there are 11,000 millionaires in the United States today.

New York has 2,800, while North Dakota is the only state with none. South Dakota has only one.

There is only one billionaire in the country. One person in every 10,450 in the country has a million or more. Twenty-four persons pay \$1,000,000 or more each in income taxes.

In 1914 there were only 44 millionaires to 100,000 of population while in 1926 there are 95 to every 100,000.

The increase in the number of millionaires is due to the wonderful prosperity of corporate business, the survey shows, and many war-made millionaires are being "squeezed out."

FIGHT FOR CONTROL OF NEXT CONGRESS NOW IN FULL SWING

Heads of Senatorial Committee of Two Parties Claiming Victory in November Elections

Washington, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The argument over the state of the Union and particularly whether prosperity now exists in the United States continued unabated between official spokesmen of the Democratic and Republican parties. With eyes set on the November elections which are to decide the complexion of the Seventieth Congress, Senator Phipps, of Colorado, chairman of the Republican Senatorial Committee, declared: "This is a Republican year," while Senator Bayard, Delaware, treasurer of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, characterized Senator Phipps as an "unconscious humorist."

The people, Senator Phipps asserted, after a conference at the White House, have undiminished confidence in the President and believe he should be presented with a majority in Congress to help him maintain the "most abundant prosperity the country has ever had under a Republican tariff."

But Senator Bayard said this statement would be received by western farmers with "their tongues in their cheeks."

In the latest statement issued, Senator Bayard asked whether Senator Phipps "is the only person in American unaware of the fact that 13,000 employees of the Ameskeag Manufacturing Company, of New England, declined only last week to accept a cut in wages which the company dangled before their eyes for the alleged purpose of getting contracts."

Senator Phipps countered with a statement that "the situation looks good in Massachusetts." "It is difficult," he continued, "to imagine how it could be otherwise inasmuch as Massachusetts is an industrial state strong for both the tariff and the President. From New England generally, from the middle western states and from the far west," Senator Phipps said, "we hear of no movement away from the President and therefore from the candidate of the Republican party."

But Senator Bayard asserted that "agriculture admittedly is 'flat on its back' and added that 'the rural population is upward of 47 per cent of all our people.'"

"The Democratic party," Senator Phipps concluded, "has reached the state where it is a party nationally only in its interpretation and without a single national issue on which it can stand with any hope of success," while Senator Bayard declared that "nearly half the population for five years past has carried the bag politically and financially for the Republican party," and asked whether Senator Phipps thinks such a statement as he gave out today will be ratified when ballots are cast in November.

SULTAN'S OLD PALACE TO RESOUND TO JAZZ

Constantinople, Sept. 29.—(AP)—A real American negro jazz band is one of the features promised for the big gambling resort on the Bosphorus, into which an Italian syndicate has converted Yildiz Palace, home of the last Sultan of Turkey.

One of the most elaborately decorated buildings in the palace grounds is Mesasim Kiosk which Sultan Abdul Hamid had built especially for the German Kaiser.

WOMEN MAKE GAIN IN MAINE POLITICS

Portland, Me., Sept. 29.—(INS)—Women are fast gaining recognition in Maine politics. The recent elections determined that six women will sit in the legislature when the new session convenes. The feminine representation elected by the Maine voters includes two members in the Senate and four in the House.

Mrs. Mabel P. Coney, Democrat, residing in Lisbon, will be the first woman to represent this party in the House. The other five legislators elect are Republicans.

STATE EMPLOYEES ARE GRANTED HIGHER PAY BY WAGE COMMISSION

RALEIGH MEN HELD FOR THE SLAYING OF HARNETT MAN

Deputy Sheriff and Four Deputized Citizens Held Under \$5,000 Bond Each

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Deputy Sheriff Walter Norwood and four deputized citizens were held for Wake county grand jury under bond of \$5,000 each following an inquest completed here today by Coroner L. M. Waring into the fatal shooting of Billie Dean, young Harnett county man near here Sunday night. The citizen deputies are Heister Smith, Plummer Leonard, W. E. Murray and Alton Mangum. Dean was shot while he was attempting to flee from the sheriff's party after being surprised at his home near here. He was being sought on liquor charges.

When the officers approached the house, Dean jumped into his car and sped away but was halted when one of the fullsize of bullets entered his skull causing instant death. The car lurched into a ditch at the side of the road at his death.

Examination of the bullet that caused his death revealed it was of 45 calibre and could have been fired from the pistols of only two of the men, Leonard and Smith. Leonard's pistol contained four discharged cartridges and Smith's two. Deputy Norwood's 38 calibre showed it had been fired once and a gun found in Dean's car, contained one empty shell.

DESCENDANTS ANTHONY JONES IN REUNION

South Sudbury, Sept. 29.—(INS)—Assembled on the broad lawns of the famous Wayside Inn in this town, was gathered one of the most interesting family parties that has been held at the old manse in many years. Thirty-five direct lineal descendants of Capt. Anthony Jones, the dauntless navigator who piloted the Mayflower with the original band of Pilgrims to the "stern and rock bound" New England coast made merry.

As though this family tree were not sufficiently illustrious, the members in this reunion gathered on the old walls of the inn and realized that it was David Howe, Sr., one of the forebears, who built and later presided as landlord at the Wayside Inn. Henry Ford, now landlord emeritus at the inn, hearing of the contemplated family reunion, offered the use of his entire estate for the occasion. A telegram of congratulation and good cheer was received from the auto magnate.

The family gathering actually represented the lineal descendants of William Phelps Jones and Catherine Brown Jones. The latter was the granddaughter of John Brown, first deacon in Sudbury and she was a grandniece of Rev. Edmund Brown, first pastor of that church. Her mother or was a first cousin of President John Adams.

SAMUEL INSULL AND "BIG TIM" MURPHY PUT NAMES TO SAME DOCUMENT

Chicago, Sept. 29.—(INS)—Samuel Insull, one of the world's wealthiest fifty owners, and Big Tim Murphy, recently discharged from Leavenworth after serving a three year term for mail robbing, signed the same document here during a friendly little session recently.

The document was a new contract for the gas workers under which they receive a five percent increase in salary. Insull represented the Peoples' Gas Light and Coke Company and Big Tim the Gas Workers' Union, of which he is president.

Highway Employees and Department of Public Instruction Most Benefitted by Action

Raleigh, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Increase in salary of state employees totalling \$21,200 were granted by the Salary and Wage Commission at its recent meeting here and authorized eight new positions, carrying total minimum salaries of \$13,200. It was shown here today in the report of the commission's meeting made public by its secretary.

One hundred and thirteen increases were granted employees of the State Highway Commission, a total increase of \$14,940 a year. Many increases, however granted were to employees promoted to positions left open by resignation, and it was explained the net increase in payrolls of the commission would not show as large an annual increase as the figures would indicate. Next to the Highway Commission the Department of Public Instruction benefited most by the Salary and Wage Commission's action, as three positions discontinued a year ago because of lack of funds were reinstated by the commission.

What Geneva's Night Life Offers Delegates

Geneva, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Night life in Geneva affords delegates some relief to those who wish it. Besides the municipal Casino of Kursaal, there are three fairly spacious dancing and dining resorts, where the League delegates can relax and enjoy the night life by day, in tangoing by night.

Curfew in Geneva rings at 3 a. m. for these nocturnal establishments, and after that hour there is no place to go. Geneva rarely blows itself to all-night parties, except on the occasion of the "Escalade" the fête day in December which commemorates the repulse of the hostile Savoyards from the city walls. At that time all Geneva gets into fancy dress and stays in that costume for three whole days and nights. Like France, Switzerland prohibits the sale of genuine absinthe. It goes France one better in prohibiting as well the sale of the absinthe substitute, with which its neighbor country is now flooded. Outside of that, however, the sky and the visitor's pocketbooks are the limits in the matter of liquid consumption.

ALL-MASCULINE SOCK DARNING AND SEWING CLUB FLOURISHING

Sacramento, Cal., Sept. 29.—(INS)—Announcement has just been made here that California's first all masculine sewing club is flourishing under the shadow of the state capital right in this city.

Organized under auspices of the University of California, the male sewing club boasts eight members, who can darn socks and other intimate objects with almost feminine deftness. The club members of which are boy students at the Carroll School, is headed by Lester Core, youth who has vanquished all feminine competitors in sock darning and shirt mending contests.

The boy needle experts plan to compete with champion girls sewers of Sacramento county for the right to attend the state sewing meet at Davis, scheduled for October 18 to 20.

Officers Capture Still Yesterday

Officers yesterday afternoon captured a still about three miles east of this city, but the operators were not present at the time of the raid and no arrests have been made.

The still was of the double capacity type with two worms. When the officers arrived on the scene the plant had just been in operation and some whiskey and a quantity of beer were seized and destroyed.

POLICE BATTLE DRUG PEDDLING ALONG RIVIERA

French Coast Is Called 'Snowbird's Paradise' As Traffic Grows; Heroin Is Popular Dope But Cocaine and Opium May Be Obtained

Nice, France, Sept. 29.—(INS)—The Riviera is a 'Snowbird's Paradise' Police officials admit that drug peddling and drug taking on the French Riviera is more prevalent than ever but claim they are powerless to stop it.

"If we arrested every person caught selling drugs there would not be enough prisons to hold them," a plain clothes drug-squad detective told International News Service. "We have to be content with confiscating their stock in trade and escorting them across the frontier. Of course if he is a vendor in a big way we do put him in the 'riddle'."

one of the higher ups, arrested recently, was almost immediately released on 10,000 francs bail, about the amount of his profits for one week in the season.

At any hour of the day or night between October 15 and April 15, sufficient 'snow' can be obtained for a dollar and a half for two or three sniffs, which furnishes the habitual drug taker at least an hour of sweet dreams.

The winter season is the gold n harvest for drug sellers, their chief customers being society women who take drugs in order to calm nerves that have been shattered by long hours of high stake gambling, dancing a surfeit of expensive champagne of poor quality.

Heroin is the drug chiefly sold although both cocaine and opium may be obtained in large quantities by persons prepared to pay the high prices demanded.

All these drugs are easily brought from Marseilles, at which port they arrive clandestinely from the Orient. Large quantities are also smuggled in from Italy by way of the numerous mule paths which traverse the mountains.

The chief Riviera distributors are said to be an Egyptian and his daughter living in a superb apartment, who are received in the best society of the city.

They have sub-agents scattered in all the principal tourist centers

who, in turn, distribute to the actual sellers. These consist of managers, and attendants of high class L-Rs, women attendants of ladies' cloak rooms in theatres, Casinos and luxury hotels, and last, but not least, the 'camelots' who during the season sell opera glasses, pear necklaces, carpets, scarves and postcards on the various Riviera promenades.

A small shop in a good section of Nice, ostensibly dealing in 'Ja-

panese fancy goods and articles appealing particularly to women, also sell clandestinely. The Japanese articles are only camouflage. The real business is the sale of opium pipes and opium. In a large room at the rear of the shop, carefully decorated, both men and women are welcome to indulge in a pipe or two.

Savage Seris Another Tribe Passing Away

Nogales, Ariz., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Eradication faces another of the western hemisphere's fiercest and warlike tribes.

From the time of Spanish conquistadores, until within the last two decades, the Seris, a savage tribe on an island just off the coast of Sonora, Mexico, have defied the advances of armed forces

and the olive branch tendered by the white man or by native tribes. Living on their diet of "powdered dried straw and raw meats" as described by Alvar Nuez Cabeza de Vaca, a Spanish military explorer, in 1536, the hardy tribe of savages held aloof, content with its barren island and existence.

Bloody wars were waged for nearly two centuries, but their submission was never more than superficial. Thousands of troops fell before their arrows, scores of daring missionaries were stoned to death, and as late as 1896 two navigators were killed in an attempt to explore Seris.

Of late years the few remaining members have become strangely docile. The tribe now numbering but 125, has retrograded into a race of almost imbecile, meek, aimless seekers, delighted to guide fishermen who now walk peacefully along the shores of Kino Bay.

YOUNG FOLKS UNHAPPY SAYS DEAN FRANKLIN

Boston, Sept. 29.—(INS)—"Young people of today are generally unhappy." This was the astonishing statement of Dean Lucy Jenkins Franklin, of Boston University, talking to the conference of normal school instructors at Framingham.

"Young people," said the Dean

"seem to be pleasure bent and sometimes morally plunging, but in reality they are trying to rid themselves of being bored."

The dean challenged the statement of critics that the present day boys and girls care only for pleasure and thrills.

She said that the youth of

today was really groping for something real, true, and tangible.

Dean Franklin advocated teaching youth in the ways of ethics and advised mothers and fathers to educate themselves in order to understand their children.

Wise Men Follow The STAR

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GREATER FACILITIES NEEDED

The stage is all set for the
beginning of the fall term of
East Carolina Teachers' Col-
lege here tomorrow and
since yesterday morning the
young women who are to
compose the student body,
have been arriving in this
city.

Greenville is always glad
when the vacation period is
over and we can welcome
the young women, of the col-
lege back to our city but to
those who are in touch with
the true educational condi-
tions in our state the opening
of college here brings a sad
touch.

Throughout North Caroli-
na children eager to gain
knowledge are clamoring for
an education and in reply to
their requests the state
must furnish a number of
teachers, unfitted and un-
trained to carry on the great
work of imparting knowl-
edge to the children. This
condition, we say, makes
the opening of the college a
sad sight when we stop to
realize that more young
women have failed to gain
admission than have been
admitted because of the lim-
ited facilities of the college.

The first of December
last year the college enroll-
ment for the present term
was filled and since that
time more than 900 applica-
tions for admission have
been refused.

Were it possible for us to
have here tomorrow all the
State Legislators, all the
young women who have fail-
ed to gain admission into the
colleges of the state this
year, and all the children
who must necessarily suffer
the consequences of un-
trained teachers, the rela-
zation of just how badly en-
larged facilities of the col-
lege are needed would be
brought home to the law-
makers and when the col-
lege asks for additional
funds at the coming General
Assembly these men would
gladly appropriate neces-
sary amounts to provide
greater educational facili-
ties. Without trained teach-
ers the children of the state
cannot receive the educa-
tion to which they are en-
titled and without facilities
for taking care of more stu-
dents the college cannot
train the hundreds of young
women who want to devote
their lives to the teaching
profession.

Will our state permit con-
ditions as they now exist, to
continue or will we climb
from our low place on the
ladder of education by see-
ing to it that provision is
made for the proper train-

ing of teachers who in turn
will train the children of
the state?

PRESS COMMENT

LOOKING TWO WAYS

(News and Observer)
When the prohibition amend-
ment was adopted and the Vol-
stead law was enacted, the Repub-
lican Legislature enacted a State
enforcement act and ratified the
amendment. Later the Demo-
crats nominated "Al" Smith, a
well known "wet" for Governor
and he was elected. City legisla-
tors of both parties followed his
lead and repealed the State en-
forcement act. Smith was re-
elected, the Republican candidates
for State office saying they favored
enforcement, while the Demo-
cratic candidates were "wet" in wet
territory and arid in dry terri-
tory. Smith's victories gave Sen-
ator Wadsworth and Nicholas
Murray Butler and other Republi-
can leaders in New York cold
chills. They became wetter than
Smith and joined with the Demo-
crats in the Legislature to sub-
mit a so-called referendum, a
"brutum fulmen," as to whether
the voters of the state wished to
modify the eighteenth amend-
ment. And now they nominate
Wadsworth, as wet as Smith, for
Senator, and Mills, as wet as
Vare, for Governor, and with
Pecksniffian hypocrisy declare for
"the enforcement of the eight-
teenth amendment and the Vol-
stead act." These empty decla-
rations in view of the wetness of
the candidates and the recent
legislative record, is the sop
thrown to the dries, who are sup-
posed to swallow the hook with
the sawdust bait. If that sort of
hypocrisy and looking two ways
catches the dry vote in New York
the dry vote is so stupid it is

comparable only to a horse who
would take shavings in place of
fodder.

It may be good politics and
expedient to appeal to both ele-
ments by such Pecksniffian meth-
ods, presuming upon the hope that
the dry Republicans will take
hypocrisy instead of open opposi-
tion to prohibition endorsed by
the Democrats of New York. You
never can be sure of what will
happen in politics. The action,
however, shows that the Republi-
can pretense of standing for
law enforcement is confined to
words. Mr. Coolidge says probi-
bition is a salutary law and
Mr. Mellon names politicians who
see the law flouted when they do
not wink at it. "Now you see it
and now you don't."

What have the Democrats in
New York gained by espousing

the wet cause? They have two
or three times elected "Al" Smith
Governor, but in 1924 they
elected nobody else to office. If
New York State. The Republi-
cans elected every state officer
and the Legislature and the Gov-
ernorship. In the days of Tilden
Cleveland, Hill and Howers a
Democratic victory in New York
state meant a Democratic gov-
ernment. Under Smith it means
Smith at Albany and no other
Democrat to a state office.

To this complexion have politi-
cians become in New York State.
The Democrats are ready to sur-
render everything in the state to
elect Smith. The Republicans
are ready to surrender everything
to elect Wadsworth. Party vic-
tory and party principle are sub-
ordinated to make each party the
creature of two "wet" politicians.

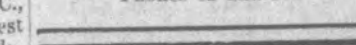

Dorothy Ellingson, A Year in Prison, Plans New Life

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—(INS.)—The girl in whom psychologists of the nation were interested a year or more ago—whose elemental mind baffled science, and whose punishment was a problem—has at last answered the riddle herself.

Dorothy Ellingson, at the close of her first year in San Quentin for the murder of her mother, has broken silence.

In an amazing letter to her father she answers the questions that were once on everybody's lips:

"What should they do with a 16-year-old girl who kills her own mother?"

"Will imprisonment soften or harden her?"

"Are there any illusions left, any thoughts of repentance, any hope for the future?"

Facing nine more years of her 16-year term for manslaughter, which may be reduced to six for good behavior, the "lax girl" of the past seems to be making a struggle to live down the trampled

vintage of her youth.

Here is her letter, received the other day by her father, Joseph Ellingson, San Francisco tailor, who with each stitch that he takes still dreams of the fifteen-haired child coming back to him a free woman:

"San Quentin Penitentiary, Cal. 'No. 41269.

"My dearest father:

"I sincerely hope, father, dear, that I may have the opportunity of showing you some day that I realize the many mistakes that I have made and the unhappy hours that I have caused you and my loved ones to suffer; but I am going to pay it all back to you in showing you that in the declining path of your life, that you still have somebody that will come to you and care for you in that time when you most need one's love.

"I received your most welcome letter the other day, and also the lovely records, and father, dear, I want to thank you so much for them because you have no idea of the many hours of enjoyment that I, and others, receive from them.

"Although we are confined here within four gray walls we are able to spend many happy hours enjoying music from the radio and our phonographs, and also spend time reading many fine books.

"Now, father, perhaps you think today that I am rather sentimental, but I am just expressing my heart's desire to show you that I want to do right, live right and think right by the grace of God.

"Hope you have seen Earl (her brother) lately, and that he and his wife are well.

" Hoping that I may hear from you soon, because every letter brings extreme pleasure to me, I will say good-bye, with bushels of love.

"DOROTHY."

"P. S.—I would like to take up some line of study by which I would be in a position when I leave here, to step out and earn a good living for myself. I wish you would give it some serious thought, and when I write of I see you again you can give me some advice on this line.—D."

TAKE 5 CHINESE SMUGGLED INTO U. S. FROM CUBA

Boston Taxicab Bringing Stowaways to Newark Is Stopped by Jersey Police; Arrests Expected to Lead to Deportation of Many Other Chinamen

Jersey City, N. J., Sept. 29.—(INS).—Five Chinamen, who were smuggled into this country by way of Boston, Mass., several days ago and who were apprehended by the Jersey City police Headquarters, were questioned at the Jersey City Police Headquarters by immigration officials. They gave information to the government agents which indicates that a plot for the wholesale smuggling of Orientals into this country is under way. The base of operations is supposed to be in Cuba.

They also gave information of the whereabouts, in even remote parts of the country, of friends and relatives who have gotten by the immigration bars. This latter information will probably lead to the deportation of hundreds of Chinamen. It has been announced by the Jersey City police that four Chinamen recently smuggled into the country were arrested in Brooklyn as a result of the information secured by the government men in Jersey City.

The five Chinamen were discovered in a taxicab, speeding through Jersey City towards Newark. The fact that the cab bore Massachusetts license plates and the name "South Boston Cab Company," aroused the suspicions of two police officers and after

chasing the machine several blocks caused it to stop. The five Chinamen inside were unable to talk English. They were brought to Headquarters and the immigration men and an interpreter sent for.

It was learned that they came to Boston as stowaways from Havana, Cuba, arriving in Boston a few days ago. They were fed and cared for during the voyage by one of the ship's crew and were assisted in their escape upon arrival in Boston by another of the ship's crew. They were housed a day or so in Boston, they didn't know where, and then started on the taxi trip to New York. They took the cab at the company's stand at Broadway and Dorchester avenue, South Boston. William Foley of 204 D street, S. Boston was the driver, who accepted the fare. He said that he was offered \$100 to make the trip. Half of that amount was given him in Boston and the balance was to be given when the party reached New York. Upon arrival in New York the Chinamen succeeded in making the driver understand that they wanted to go on to Newark. Going through Jersey City they were stopped.

The police learned from Foley that the Newark destination was a restaurant on Market street. Several officers were sent out there and visited the place with Newark police. They found two men waiting for the arrival of the Orientals and arrested them. These men are believed to be the two who assisted in the smuggling. They provided the Chinamen to Newark by train. The white men will be questioned in an endeavor to find out from them the persons back of the smuggling ring.

The Chinamen are of the coolie type who have been imported into Cuba to work in the sugar industry.

Trolleys Introduced to Cut Transport Costs Cleveland

Cleveland, O., Sept. 29.—(INS).—A street car, constructed of duralumin—possessing greater resistance than steel yet with one third less weight—has been manufactured here and will be introduced to the transportation world soon.

The car is fashioned throughout of the alloy with the exception of wheel, axles, springs and sills. It is expected to inaugurate a new era in electric railway construction.

Not only does this new mode of transportation afford greater safety to passengers but it cuts the weight of a single unit from 42,000 pounds to 32,000 pounds. This means a diminution of power, necessary to operate it, of approximately 15 per cent.

The alloy used in constructing duralumin cars contains an admixture of 4.5 per cent copper; 0.75 per cent magnesium and 1 per cent manganese. It is fabricated by rolling, as in the manipulation of steel.

The alloy is heated to a jelly-like mass, then rammed through dies forming sheets. Instead of tripping with immense shears, as is done with steel, a power saw is employed.

Couzens Picks Two Farmers for Famous 1,000 Acre Ranch

Detroit, Sept. 29.—(INS).—Two brothers, one a practical farmer and the other a graduate of two colleges, have taken possession of the 1,000 acre Wabek farms which Senator James Couzens recently offered to lease rent free. The Senator picked Mark N. Williamson, 33, and his brother, Frank, 23, to run the farms. He found after examining 1,000 applications that they came nearest to measuring up to the qualifications set in his proposal to lease the farm.

Mark Williams has operated a 120 acre farm in Waterford township, Oakland county, and in that vicinity is considered a highly successful farm manager. Frank graduated from Michigan State college a year ago. Previously he had completed a course in the University of Wisconsin. He won a \$400 scholarship offered by the National Dairy show for judging cattle.

Senator Couzens after selling his prize herd of cattle several months ago decided to quit farming. He had the valuable farm land on which he had placed buildings valued at \$100,000 on his hands. He offered to give a lease to anyone without rent providing the farms could be operated successfully.

The lease given the Williamson brothers gives them five years operation of the farm, including the use of the land, buildings and equipment rent free while Senator Couzens will pay the taxes. The brothers agree to keep all buildings and equipment in as good condition as they are at present, to keep the land fertilized and free from weeds and to conduct the farm according to the best methods of farming. In return the Williamson get all the profits from the farms.

No trees can be cut and nothing new on the farms can be removed without consent of Senator Couzens. She lease agreement provides for arbitration in case of dispute.

Senator Couzens said he was well pleased with the arrangement. I believe these boys will make a great success of it, he said.

The Williamson brothers said they were confident the Wabek farms could be made to pay a big profit. They expect to sell milk at a low bacterial count for which they are planning to build up a special market. Jersey and Guernsey herds will be placed on the farms at once, they said.

Discovers New Method Measuring Distance to Stars

(By INS)

A new sensational method for determining the distance of the stars has been perfected by Ching Sung-ya, Chinese student at the University of California.

His work is a development of a discovery made by Doctors Adams and Kohlshutter of Mount Wilson Observatory, that spectral analysis could be determined both the absolute brightness and distance of stars.

The Chinese student's discovery differs from Dr. Adams' in that whereas the latter's method depended on lines appearing within the spectrum of the stars, his method depends on a study of the background in the ultra-violet region.

Both methods determine the absolute brightness of the star by means of the spectrum, and by comparing them with the apparent brightness compute the distance.

These methods, in addition to being more accurate than the troublesome, old-fashioned triangulation method, are able to measure the more distant stars and present results in a shorter time.

Observations in the old method

were taken over a period of a year or more.

WOMEN'S CHICKEN CALLING CONTESTS TO BE HELD IN IOWA

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 29.—(INS).—Not to be outdone by their menfolk, who have been taking the limelight lately by entering hog-calling contests, the women of Iowa's rural sections are now staging chicken-calling contests for themselves.

Where recently the power of a call of the pork yodelers reigned alone, there now may be heard the soprano like "chick, chick, chick" of the farmer's better halves.

The gentle but until recently obscure art of calling hogs has come to the front in the middle west by leaps and bounds in the last few weeks. The series of contests, wherein aspirants strained their vocal cords and disturbed the peace of a neighborhood within a mile was capped when an Omaha radio station staged such a match over the air.

Paris, Sept. 29.—(INS)—The tomb of the Unknown Soldier under the Arc de Triomphe tell receives the greatest number of visitors of any museum or other place of interest in Paris. Stand there at any hour of the day and you will observe the almost interminable stream of people who pass under the Arch. Begin to count them but you will soon be obliged to stop. The people come in pairs, small groups and large ones. There is probably no other spot in the world affording a better opportunity for studying the varied types of the human race. Every nation under the sun is represented and every tongue is spoken. So numerous have been the crowds lately, and among them many dangerous individuals, that it has been found necessary to place an attendant at the gate. He is a wounded soldier and wears many

medals.

The French love their beasts and birds. Four million of francs have just been appropriated for the use of the Paris Jardin des Plantes, which is the zoological garden. A large part of the buildings will be rebuilt, a new monkey house set up to replace the one recently destroyed by fire and an open-air theatre erected. It is hoped that a little money will be left to be used for purchasing a few animals. A great many of them had to be killed or given away during the war when food was dear and scarce.

Paris may be a bit quieter in the future if regulations planned by M. Morain, Prefect of Police can be put into effect. The nerve-racking autoborns which are used quite unnecessarily a great deal of the time, will henceforth sound a uniform deep tone and motorists will be allowed to sound it only once for a specific purpose. Shrieking sirens will be strictly prohibited. Hawking by taxicabs and autocars picking up passengers for the races or tours is also to be stopped and a special squad of traffic police will enforce this order.

Austrians eat more meat and Italians less than any people.

Meat eaten in Austria amounts to 245 pounds. In Italy the average persons eats twenty-three pounds; Americans consume 118 pounds. And in spite of their beef-eating reputation, the English are content with 11 pounds and Norway and Sweden with 86. Frenchmen use 73 pounds, Germans 70 and Spanish 49 pounds every month.

That the best things often come in the smallest packages has once more been proved by a French naval officer who has just invented a pocket-edition diving suit. It does away with the helmet and air pipe. The diver carries on his back a bottle filled with compressed air which he operates unaided and which enables him to remain under water for ten minutes at a depth of five fathoms.

The inventor, Commandant Yves le Prieur often made use of his diving suit when stationed in the Mediterranean Sea to take submarine photographs. It was recently tried out with success at the Tourelles Swimming pool in Paris.

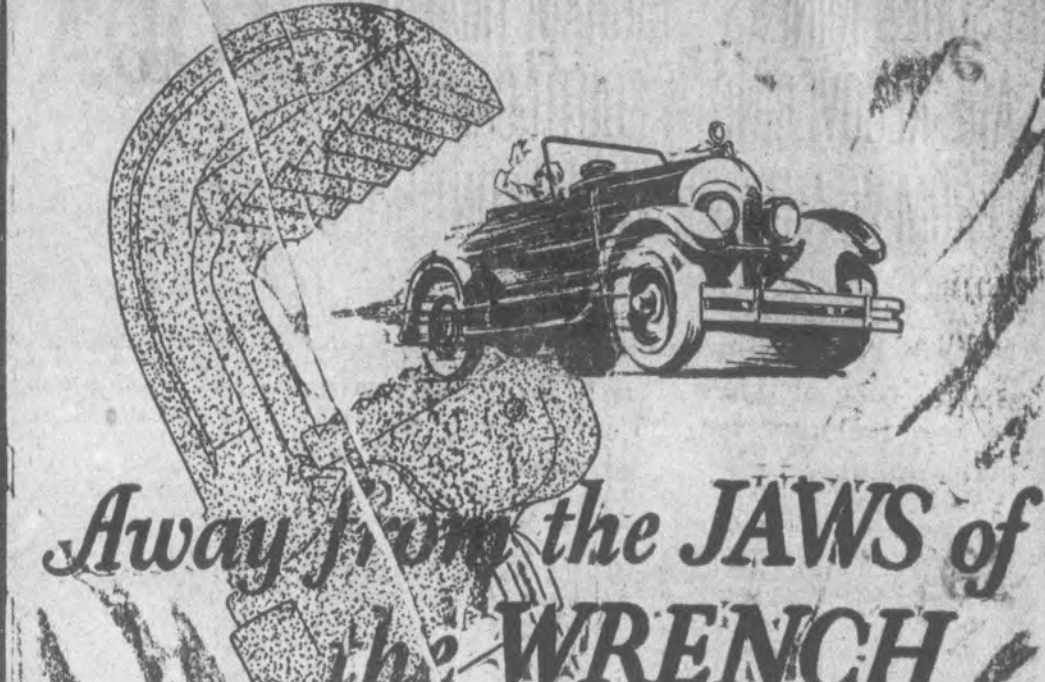
