RESCUED MINERS ARE RECOVERING FROM WEAKNESS

Men Entombed in Mine 121 Hours Tells Story of Their Nerve Racking Im- prisonment

Ironwood, Mich., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Safe after 121 hours of nerve-racking imprisonment in the damp depths of Pabst Iron Mine, 43 bewildered men saw daylight from hospital beds today for the first time in almost a week. Rest for them and the 400 men who labored untiringly for their rescue, was the order of the day.

Entombed 800 feet under the ground last Friday by a cave-in which killed three men, the last of the 43 miners was brought to the surface at midnight, ending one of the greatest rescue efforts in mining annals. Today the men are recuperating from their harrowing experience.

They were given light food replacing the dried birch bark tea which they brewed over improvised stoves made from lunch pails. The birch bark was stripped from the mine's reinforcements and seepage water was plentiful. Most of the men, attending physicians said, will be able to go to their homes by tonight.

The rescue was effected through hundreds of feet of underground shafts and laterals, some hurriedly constructed and others weakened and made unsafe by cave-ins. Soup, coffee, tobacco and other articles to make the men as comfortable as possible, pending removal to the surface, was sent into the mine late yesterday when communication was established. Men who had started making the rescue passage safer with heavier timbering.

None of the entombed men gave up hope. They took care to keep watches running and knew they had been imprisoned five days. Each 24 hours a mark was placed on a piece of timber indicating that another day had passed. Larry Uran, the Salvation Army miner, often led his fellow prisoners in gospel meetings, of singing and praying. That an effort was being made to rescue them was known by the men. They heard the blasting operation from time to time they said.

Of the three efforts undertaken to provide a way to bring the imprisoned men to the surface, the most hazardous was successful. This was upward from the bottom of the shaft which was blocked in several places by cave-ins. Access to the bottom of the shaft was gained by a "lateral tunnel" connecting the shaft with another mine. Working upward the rescuers found the tunnel blocked at the twenty-third level. They dug around this section and on the twenty-first level they found the shaft open. From there they worked their way upward thru the debris to the eighth level which was the subterranean prison.

Split in Democrats Indicates Hot Fight In Columbus County

Whiteville, N. C., Sept. 30.—(AP)—A red hot political fight is predicted in Columbus county on November 2 as the result of a split in the Democratic party over the nominee for the office of sheriff.

Democrats dissatisfied over the results of the primary in June, met this week and named Clyde Gore, the incumbent, as their choice for sheriff. Gore was defeated by J. O. Ammons by a close margin in the primary, but Gore supporters claimed that Republicans voted in the primary.

The convention endorsed the remainder of the Democratic ticket selected at the primary, and answered Donald McCrackan, Democratic nominee for the state senate, who asked that the primary selections be supported, with good natured cat-calls.

Major interest in the November elections is centering on the office of sheriff.

BIGHAM TRIAL IN SOUTH CAROLINA BEEN CONTINUED

Case Has Been to Supreme Court Sev- en Times; Bigham Twice Given Death Sentence

Florence, S. C., Sept. 30.—(AP)—The third trial of Edmund Bigham, charged with the murder of five members of his family, scheduled in Horry Superior court today, has been continued on court order. The order was issued for continuance on representations by Bigham's counsel that his wife, a material witness in his behalf, would be prevented from testifying at this term of court by sickness.

Convay, S. C., Sept. 30.—(INS)—Weary after five years of "living death" under the shadow of the electric chair, Edmund Bigham, alleged wholesale slayer of his family, was scheduled to go on trial for his life a third time in Horry Superior Court today.

Bigham stands accused of the murder of his aged mother, Mrs. M. M. Bingham, his brother, Sn. ley, his sister, Mrs. Margery Black, and her two little adopted boys, John and Leo McCracken. The crime was committed on January 15, 1921.

Bigham's long fight to evade the electric chair is the most sensational on South Carolina court records. Twice Bigham has been tried, convicted and sentenced to die. Bigham's counsel, after obtaining numerous stays of execution, won their fight for a new trial. Through the five-year period when Bigham's fate swung pendulum-like through the South Carolina courts, the prisoners has steadfastly protested his innocence. He vehemently maintained that Smiley Bigham—one of the five victims—wiped out the entire family in a characteristic "fit of madness" and then ended his own life by suicide.

Large Moonshine Still Captured Late Yesterday

Officers yesterday captured a large moonshine still in Sutton Town, in lower Chicod township, and destroyed about 6,000 gallons of beer. When the officers approached the scene near the still, they saw the operator, making a hasty departure, but were unable to overtake them and the men escaped without their identity being known to the officers. The officers then proceeded to the still which was found to be in full operation. The plant was of the steam type and of unusually large size. It was estimated that the destruction of the still and beer set back the owners of the plant over a thousand dollars.

Carving On Stone Mountain Mem. Been Resumed

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 30.—(INS)—Carving figures of Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis and Stonewall Jackson and a Confederate coat bearing, on the precipice of Stone Mountain is well under way.

The carving, awarded by the Stone Mountain Memorial Association to the Stone Mountain Granite Corporation, was started Monday of this week.

Governors and Senators gathered at a barbecue given at the mountain yesterday afternoon and viewed the progress of the work being done.

Paved roads now lead from this city to the mountain and the studio. Auto running time is now less than half an hour.

Three weeks have been required by the carving company to overhaul their machinery, scaffolding, and building stairways to reach the point of their work.

Officials of the granite company and the sculptor estimate that the figures can be carved in two years. This is a minimum of time they say, for the work and every effort will be made to complete it by that time.

Mr. Ottinger, Attorney General of New York State, sets a good example to officials in other states, by his effort to protect public investments, including investments in bonds on real estate. There are real estate bond houses that stand as high in security and usefulness as any financial institution in the country. One real estate mortgage bond house in business for half a century without loss of a penny in principal or interest to any customer, has established a record that other institutions might envy and emulate.

While some great railroads like the New Haven had half a dozen others, to say nothing of New York's fraudulently managed street car and subway systems have gone down to reorganization, ruining thousands, buyers of real estate bonds have combined absolute security with a high return on their money.

If any concern in the field of real estate bonds is weak or unsafe, the attorney general will discover it and give the people the facts. He will not however allow interference with or arouse distrust in a great business that has produced two most important results.

It has given the people housing and business facilities needed, at a time when old fashioned lending agencies were practically inactive. It has promoted with widespread building HIGH WAGES AND CONSTANT EMPLOYMENT FOR MECHANICS.

A way will be found to weed out any weak or unsound concern, without taking any action that would disturb those whose savings are safely invested, or that would check building enterprises and put mechanics out of work.

Some old line institutions that would appraise real estate at sixty per cent of its real value and then lend sixty per cent of the undervaluation would like to discourage sound financial enterprises that has made nation-wide building possible.

Attorney General Ottinger and Governor Smith will not be used as the agents of evasive old fashioned financial incompetency.

To protect public investments is the first duty. To protect constructive, sound financial agencies and to protect public confidence is almost as important.

KILLS WOMAN AND COLLEGE OPENED COMMITTS SUICIDE THIS MORNING

Massachusetts School Teacher, Principal in Tragedy, Was the Father of Four Chil- dren

Leominster, Mass., Sept. 30.—(AP)—A 39-year-old school teacher, the father of four children, and the woman who has been the object of his attentions for more than a year, lay dead here today. Don C. Clark shot Mrs. Irene Leger, 33, and then killed himself last night.

Constantine Leger, husband of the slain woman, from whom he had been living apart, returned home unexpectedly and found Clark in the home. Clark ordered Leger out of the house when the husband forced an entrance after finding the front door bolted. Leger left and returned a few minutes later with a policeman. The two retreated when Clark shouted a threat that he would shoot if they moved.

Later they returned with additional policemen and as the police moved towards the house, shots were heard. They burst the door open and found the woman's body at the foot of a flight of stairs and Clark's at the head.

VIENNESE FIRM IS GIVEN RUSSIAN WOOL CONCESSION

Moscow, Sept. 30.—(INS)—A concession to manufacture woolen textiles has just been granted by the Chief Concessions Committee to the Viennese firm Bernhardt Altman. The Soviet government has granted the firm the privilege of taking over the factory formerly belonging to the Russian manufacturer Gorbachev, located at Kozino, on the Kazan railroad.

The concessionaire has obligated himself to reequip the factory with modern machinery. He will be charged the regular customs duties for the import of raw materials from abroad, but as far as internal taxes are concerned, will be taxed on the basis of a government institution.

At the expiration of eighteen years the works with all the inventory will automatically revert to possession of the Soviet Government.

SECOND VICTIM OF AUTO CRASH DIES SALISBURY

Detective John Byers of Charlotte Police Force Succumbs to Injuries Received Tuesday

Salisbury, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Detective John M. Byers, of Charlotte police force, died in a local hospital shortly after nine o'clock this morning. Byers was injured in the automobile accident near here Tuesday in which Chief Detective Joe Orr, of Charlotte, was fatally injured. One other detective also sustained serious injuries.

The accident occurred when the police auto from Charlotte was making a riot test run to High Point from Charlotte as a part of the program of the convention of North Carolina Policemen's Association. The driver of the machine said the accident occurred when upon rounding a curve he came face to face with another automobile. He was trying to pass a car at the time.

LAUGHINGHOUSE ASSUMES DUTIES STATE FRIDAY

Prominent Greenville Physician to Be Sworn in As State Health Officer To- morrow

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Dr. Charles O.H. Laughinghouse, of Greenville, will be sworn in as Secretary of the North Carolina State Board of Health tomorrow morning at 9:15 o'clock, by Associate Supreme Court Justice George W. Connor in the office of the Health Department.

Dr. Laughinghouse was elected at an executive meeting of the board here last summer to succeed Dr. W. S. Rankin, who resigned last year to become connected with the Duke Foundation at Charlotte. Since Dr. Rankin resigned the position has been filled by Dr. G. M. Cooper, who for the past four years has been Assistant Secretary. The incoming secretary has given no indication as to changes in his department.

The Secretary of the North Carolina State Board of Health is the executive officer of a State department now in its fifth year, the Board having been created in 1877 by legislative act. In assuming the duties of Secretary Doctor Laughinghouse is the fourth to hold the position. The first secretary, Doctor Thomas F. Wood, served fifteen years. Doctor Richard H. Lewis, who succeeded him, served seventeen years. The third secretary, Doctor W. S. Rankin, served sixteen years.

The secretary of the Board is by virtue of his office, the State Health Officer. He is elected by the Board for a term of six years. (Continued on page 4)

Boy of Fourteen Is Star Witness In Murder Trial

Gastonia, Sept. 30.—(INS)—James Holon, 14, will be the State's star witness at the murder trial of Charles D. Keever, young Stanley merchant, prosecution counsel announced here today.

Keever is charged with slaying Will McGinnis, his neighbor, following a brief argument over a meat account owed the defendant.

The Holton boy, at a preliminary hearing testified that after making a purchase at Keever's store, he heard Keever McGinnis in a heated argument.

MILLER DEFENSE PUTS WITNESSES ON STAND TODAY

Defense in Daugherty- Miller Case Begins After Judge Denies Motion for Dismissal

New York, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The defense of Thomas W. Miller, former Alien Property Custodian charged with conspiracy, was begun in Federal Court today. Miller is being tried jointly with Harry M. Daugherty, Attorney General in the Harding Cabinet. They are charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States of their honest and unbiased services in connection with payments of \$7,000,000 claims.

The first witness called was George Williams, of Passaic, N. J., managing director of the Alien Property Custodian's office. Previous witnesses had testified that Williams had tutored Richard Merton, German metal magnate, in filing his claims on behalf of the Societe Suisse for the impounded shares of the American Metal Corporation. Williams S. Rand, counsel for Miller, began the defense without an opening address.

Daugherty's defense will be conducted separately.

Just before Williams took the stand Judge Mack ruled Williams had not had jury knowledge in 1921 of the alleged efforts of Miller and Daugherty to defraud the United States. For this reason Williams was not considered a co-conspirator as the government alleged, but that testimony regarding him would be retained on the record on another ground. It had been objected by counsel for Daugherty and Miller that testimony regarding conversation Merton had with Williams was not admissible unless it was shown that Williams was a co-conspirator.

Although Rand launched Miller's defense without an opening address his questioning of Williams revealed that an attempt would be made to show that the \$7,000,000 claim was valid and paid in good faith.

The government's argument in presenting its case contended that the conspiracy charge could be shown regardless of whether Merton's claim was valid.

OLD RUSSIAN MONASTERY TO BE SOVIET LIBRARY

Moscow, Sept. 30.—(INS)—One of the oldest monuments of monastic architecture in Moscow, the Strastnoy Monastery, situated on Strastnoy Place in the heart of the city is scheduled to go the customary revolutionary way and become a government office building. The Main Science Board of the government has demanded that the monastery be turned over to it to be used by its administrative staff and as a distribution center for books published by the Board. The Monastery has not been occupied by monks since the decree prohibiting monasticism but until now it has been preserved with all its 17th century artistic treasures.

APPEAL FOR FUND TO SAVE OLD MISSION BELL - TOWER

Oceanside, Cal., Sept. 30.—(INS)—The campanile, or bell-tower of Mission San Luis Rey, erected by Fray Antonio Peyri, in 1812, will be destroyed during the winter rainy season if \$8,000 is not subscribed for its preservation. Franciscan fathers now occupying the mission declared in an appeal for funds.

On the morning of July 22 the bell-tower, said to be one of the most perfect examples of old mission architecture in California, collapsed, and since then the historic bells whose melodious tones have echoed throughout San Luis Rey valley for more than a century have been silent.

MONUMENT TO MODJESKA AT HER CALIFORNIA HOME

Anahim, Cal., Sept. 30.—(INS)—A monument to Mrs. Helene Modjeska, the famous Polish tragedienne, will be erected in Orange county, where she lived many years, according to plans now being formulated by citizens here.

TAX COLLECTION SHOW BIG GAIN OVER LAST YEAR

Revenues for the First Quarter Exceed Same Period Last Year By Quarter Million Dollars

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—(AP)—An increase in tax collections for the general purposes amounted to more than a quarter of a million dollars for the first quarter of the 1926-27 fiscal year, over the preceding fiscal year, it was announced today by the Department of Revenue of North Carolina.

Collection for the first three months of the present fiscal year totaled \$2,091,088.29, according to figures of the department. This figure includes collections of revenues exclusive of automobile license and gasoline taxes for the months of July, August and September. Collections for the corresponding three months in the past fiscal year were \$1,840,817.65. September revenues amounted to \$616,154.94 as against collections during September a year ago of \$457,999.95.

Mrs. C. M. Harris Died Yesterday

Funeral services for Mrs. C. M. Harris, were held this afternoon at two-thirty o'clock, from her late home, with Rev. Mr. Bammer, of the Christian church, and Rev. L. B. Jones of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church officiating, and her neighbors acting as pallbearers.

Mrs. Harris died at 8:30 Tuesday afternoon, after a lingering illness, having always lived, died and been buried on a farm about two miles from Greenville. Before her marriage to Mr. C. M. Harris, she was Miss Lula Melissa Jolly, daughter of the late Susan Harris and Frank Jolly. She died in her fifty-seventh year, and had for many years been a faithful member of the Greenville Christian church. Besides her husband, she leaves one son, C. B. Harris; one daughter, Mrs. Maybelle Harris; one brother, R. F. Jolly; one sister, Mrs. J. J. Polard, all of whom reside near Greenville.

Governor McLean to Be 'On the Air' Night of Oct. 11

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—(INS)—North Carolina's Governor will be heard on the air the night of October 11th.

October 11 is North Carolina Day at the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition, and Governor Angus W. McLean will deliver a short address over Station WIP as a part of the Tarheel program.

The Governor has just received the invitation from the North Carolina Committee, and has not decided just what the subject of his address will be.

This will be the first time that Governor McLean has been "on the air," although he has received numerous invitations for such engagements.

VILLAGE IS SOLD AT PUBLIC AUCTION

Attleboro, Vt., Sept. 30.—(INS)—The industrial village of Hebronville in this city went at public auction for \$38,800, marking the passing of another of New England's numerous company owned communities.

The sale included a mill plant, a store and 28 tenement houses. Many of the occupants of the houses were among the purchasers who bought outright rather than lease what has been their home for years.

Joseph Finberg, a local philanthropist, who intends to give the city a site for a new school purchased a plot of 4,000 square feet.

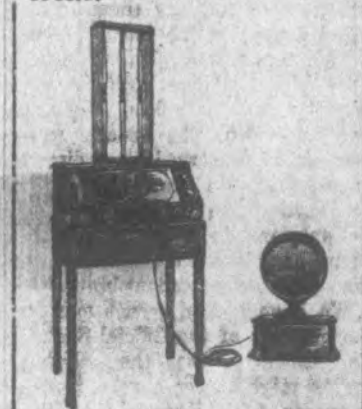

MAKE IT REAL

Next week has been set

to it that it is a real fire
prevention week and that
the study and practice of
fire prevention is not just
for that week alone, but for
all time.

With the winter season,

(New York World)

This advice comes to Mr. Cool-
idge from perhaps the most en-
thusiastic Coolidge newspaper in
the country, the Boston Herald.
"Editor and Publisher asks
President Coolidge to put an end
to the practice of saying things
to newspaper representatives
upon which he cannot himself be
quoted and on which his office
evidently feels free to issue a
denial in case the popular inter-
pretation is not exactly as he in-
tended it."

"This is good advice. The
present situation is insincere. It
is the President who says these
things. He should either stand
for them or not say them. The
latter course is the natural one."

"While we are glad to print
what Mr. Coolidge says in his
capacity as 'Unofficial Spokes-
man' we think the general wel-
fare would be served by a discon-
tinuance of the practice and by
his limiting the expressions of
his opinions to those not infre-
quent occasions on which he can
clearly assume responsibility."

We have had in recent months
the incident of the Official Spoke-
man affirming that the United
States might enter a race in ar-
maments with Europe, and the
President denying it; the incident
of the Official Spokesman explain-
ing that the Senate's World Court
reservations meant one thing, and
the President (via the Official
Spokesman) explaining that they
meant another; the incident of
the Official Spokesman rebuking
a French Ambassador, and the
President taking it all back.

Such incidents do not invest
the President with dignity. The
Boston Herald can be accused of
no partisan animus when it ad-
vises Mr. Coolidge either to say
what he has to say in his own
word over his own name or avoid
saying them entirely.

Laughinghouse
Assumes Duties
State Friday

(Continued from page 1)

The duties of the office require
that this official should be a man
of technical training and experi-
ence, and, therefore, should be
selected on account of his tech-
nical rather than because of his
political qualifications. It is,
therefore, right that he should
be selected by a specially qualified
committee, that is, the State
Board of Health, and not be
elected in a general election, as
would be the case if the office
were a political one. The six
year term of office is in accordance
with the idea of permanency of
policies. The law requires that
the Secretary, and State Health
Officer, shall be a registered phy-
sician in the State, and that he
shall not engage in private prac-
tice, but devote his time and
energy to the work of the Board.

The work of the State Board
of Health is large and varied.
For efficiency of administration,
this work is apportioned among
a number of bureaus or special
divisions, each directed by an
administrative head chosen for
his special training and ability.

These bureaus in the present
organization of the Board con-
sist of the following: the State
Laboratory of Hygiene, to ex-
amine water and diagnostic speci-
mens, and to produce and dis-
tribute biological products, vac-
cines and sera; the Bureau of
Vital Statistics, to secure, cor-
rect, tabulate, and publish infor-
mation as to distribution and
causes of death, and as to distri-
bution of births, and to secure
reports of communicable diseases,
and epidemics; the Bureau of
Medical Inspection of Schools, to
develop interest in the health of
school children as it is related
to their education, and to stimu-
late more adequate treatment for
their most common defects; the
Bureau of County Health Work,

to interest county authorities in
providing efficient county health
departments, and to advise with,
correlate, and assist such county
departments, now totaling 37;
The Bureau of Maternity and In-
fancy, to develop a higher degree
of public intelligence regarding
the importance and the care of
the problems of maternity and
infancy; the Bureau of Sanitary
Engineering and Inspection, to
exercise supervision over the
construction and maintenance of
public water supplies and sewer-
age, to inspect and enforce sani-
tary conditions of privies, jails,
convict camps, hotels, and public
institutions; the Bureau of Health
Education, to prepare and pub-
lish educational material and di-
rect the mobile visual education
unit.

The correlation of the work of
the several bureaus, to insure a
harmonious and efficient ad-
ministration of the work of the
Board, is through the supervision
and direction of the executive of-
ficer of the Board. There are
naturally many problems and du-
ties which cannot be assigned to
any of the special bureaus, which
by their nature must be under
the immediate direction of the
secretary. These may be briefly
stated as follows: (1) to as-
sume primary responsibility for
the enforcement of the more im-
portant State health laws; (2) to
consider and determine, with the
advice and consent of the Board,
what should be the more impor-
tant public health policies of the
State; (3) to secure the needed
legislation that will make possi-
ble the adoption of desirable health
policies; (4) to supervise and as-
sist in the execution of establish-
ed policies.

The enforcement of law rests,
in a general way and broadly,
upon the judicial machinery of
the state. On the other hand, it
is not only the privilege but the
duty of any citizen to see that
the violation of any law is brought
to the attention of the courts and
dealt with. The more thorough
understanding of the purposes
and the character of the public
health laws and the keener ap-
preciation of their importance im-
poses in a special way upon the
executive officer of the Board of
Health, the duty of seeing that
these particular laws are complied
with.

The duty of considering and
formulating for the action of the
Board what should be the most
important public health policies
of the state rests largely with the
executive officer of the Board on
account of its primary and gen-
eral responsibility for the develop-
ment of an effective program of
human conservation.

After the Board has considered
and definitely decided upon a
course of action it becomes the
duty of the executive officer to
bring to the attention of the peo-
ple generally the need of the

course of action approved by the
Board, and to so inform, interest,
and appeal to the public, and re-
flexively and directly to the Gen-
eral Assembly as to secure legis-
lative approval and provision for
the public health policies which
have been adopted by the Board.
The efficiency of any agency is
largely conditional upon the per-
sonnel employed in its activities.
The responsibility of finding and
securing persons properly quali-
fied by native endowments; train-
ing and experience to direct the
special bureaus or divisions en-
trusted with carrying out the es-
tablished policies of the Board
rests largely upon the executive
officer.

As has been pointed out hereto-
fore, the organization of the
work of the Board embraces a
number of special bureaus which
are so organized as to be largely
independent of each other. Natu-
rally, these bureaus or divisions in
the character of their work are
closely related and some means of
co-ordinating their activities is
necessary. This means is sup-
plied by the executive officer.

The majority of the calls by let-
ter or person upon the Board for
service or information can be and
are referred to the special bureaus
of the Board concerned directly
with the kind of service or in-
formation desired. However,
there are a large number of such
calls that are general in charac-
ter and which of necessity must
be handled by the executive offi-
cer.

The interest and support of the
people in public health is in pro-
portion to their understanding of
the problem. To reach people,
therefore, with information as to
what the public needs of the
state are and how the Board pur-
poses to meet the needs is, of all
the Board's duties, the most fun-
damental and the most important.
Moreover, the educational work of
the Board is of a general nature,
dealing with the interests of all
the bureaus or special divisions
and, therefore, belongs largely to
the executive officer.

The duty of receiving, disburs-
ing and accounting for the public
moneys provided for the work of
the Board is a duty that rests
primarily upon the executive offi-
cer.

The appropriation by the Gen-
eral Assembly for the work of the
Board for the current fiscal year
is \$425,000. An additional sum of
approximately \$50,000 is secured
from other sources. The organiz-
ed county health departments and
city health departments of the
state have budgets exceeding \$800,-
000 annually. Altogether, the ex-
penditures in the state annually
for public health exceeds \$1,000,-
000. That these expenditures shall
be made wisely, and adequate re-
turns obtained, is primarily the
responsibility of the executive offi-
cer of the Board.

U. S. METAL CASES SHOW AN INCREASE

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 30.—(INS)—Patients in institutions for mental diseases throughout the country increased from 187,791 in 1910 to 267,017 in 1923, or from 204.2 to 245 per 100,000 population, according to a report just published through the co-operation of the New York state hospital commission and the federal government.

One of the points brought out by the report is that which compares the alcoholic admission in 1922 with those of 1910.

In 1910, the report says, "the alcoholic cases constituted 10.1 per cent of the total admissions to institutions for mental diseases. In 1922 they constituted but 8.7 per cent of such admission."

In New York State the percentage of alcoholic for both sexes dropped from 11.5 in 1910 to 3.0 in 1922; in New Jersey from 19.7 to 4.2; in Pennsylvania from 6.9 to 5.0; in Maine from 6.5 to 3.4; in New Hampshire from 11.1 to 1.7;

In Massachusetts from 14.6 to 6.4; in Rhode Island from 11.4 to 7.2 and in Connecticut from 10.6 to 4.1.

New York State, however, has not been maintaining its reduction in the percentage of alcoholic first admissions since 1922. In 1923, New York State's percentage of first alcoholic admissions rose to 4 per cent; in 1925 to 5.4 per cent and in 1926 to 7.0 per cent. This percentage for 1926 probably will not be known, the hospital commission said, until early next year.

Over 50 per cent of all the patients suffering from mental diseases in 1923 in the country were single and 34 per cent were married, the report shows.

Transportation On U. S. Waterways To Be Changed

St. Louis, Sept. 29.—(INS)—Rail and water transportation in the United States enters a new era through the successful adaptation of the principle of the electric drive to the propulsion of river craft, recently developed by United States army engineers,

according to Major John G. Gotwals, district government engineer in St. Louis.

This principle, said to be the most economical and efficient form of motive power ever devised, culminates years of effort by army engineers and is the initial step toward realization of the dreams of railroads throughout the country for years.

It embodies the successful application of the Diesel engine electric drive to a stern wheel of a river boat—oil being used for fuel. The innovations were incorporated in the recently completed river towboat "Gouverneur" now on duty with the U. S. Army engineer corps here.

"Although the electric drive has been used in the navy for 15 years this is the first Diesel electric boat to appear on the Mississippi or any other inland stream," Major Gotwals declared. "In this boat there have been incorporated the oldest type of river motive power, the stern wheel Pittman drive, with power produced from the most modern of Diesel engines and transmitted to the wheel through novel designs of electrical equipment."

"There are two Diesel engines on this boat totalling about 350

horsepower, 250 of which is transmitted to the stern wheel. Even with this substantial power only 80 cents worth of oil is consumed per hour as fuel in driving this powerful machinery. This is about one-fifth the cost of producing power with steam and steam engines.

"In a similar steam-driven boat it would cost about \$4 for fuel per hour. The monetary saving alone in our work will be about \$70 per day since the electric boat consumes only 16 gallons of oil an hour compared with about 84 gallons per hour for other vessels."

"Another important feature of the new boat is the fact that it has electric controls, which enables the pilot to reverse or stop without communicating with the engine room. This affects a material reduction in the number of men required to man the boat."

"In this type of boat we have developed on the river what the railroads have been spending millions to accomplish. While the same principles have been applied a number of times in railroad practice to small locomotives, intense efforts are being made to apply the Diesel electric drive to larger locomotives."

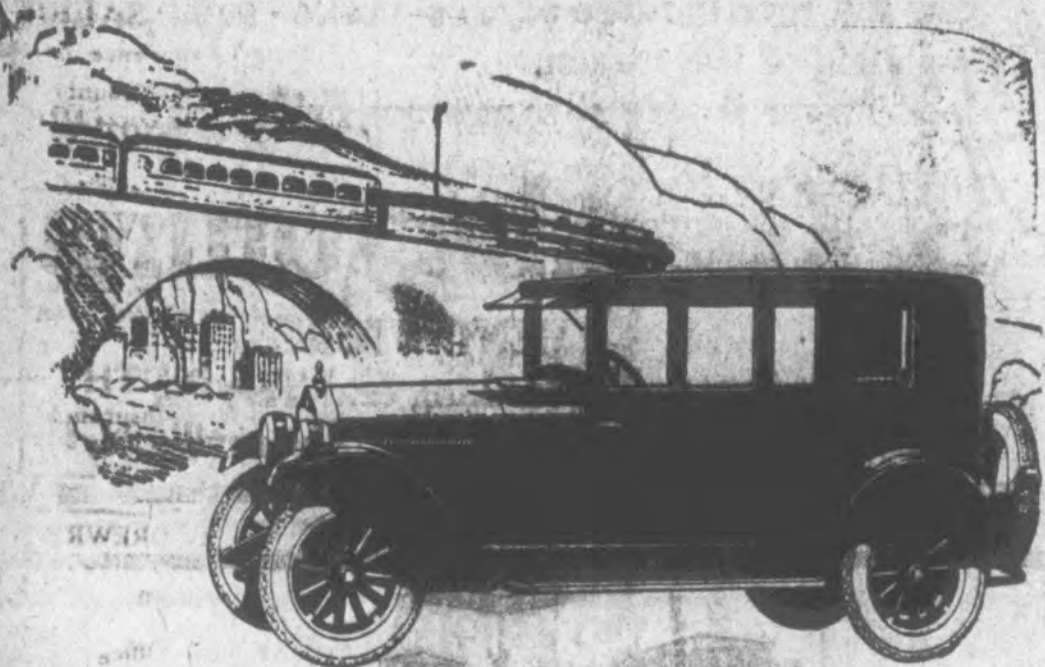
"The success of the same novel and radical application of power developed in this boat to the operation of locomotives is predicted. Similar savings will be realized in the elimination of water stations and boiler trouble with various kinds of feed water used in the boiler."

DIVORCE IN SOVIET UNION NOW ACCOMPLISHED

Moscow, Sept. 29.—(INS)—Divorce in the Soviet Union may now be accomplished, practically speaking, by a wave of the hand. A further simplification of the already excessively simple procedure of divorce has just been put into effect. A new decree provides that seekers for divorce may obtain one in any registration bureau throughout the Soviet Union and not merely in the bureau where the marriage was recorded, as was required until now.

The procedure now necessary is as follows: The seeker for divorce enters the registration bureau, approaches the desk and says: "I want a divorce." The clerk tosses him a blank which he fills in with his name, address, and the name of his wife and date of marriage.

"One rouble please," says the clerk.

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—(INS)—Lassen Peak, only active volcano in the United States, with the exception of those in Alaska and in Hawaii, will be henceforth under continuous scientific observation by the section of volcanology of the United States Geological Survey, according to the statement just made by E. E. Dittmar, manager-secretary of the Lassen Volcanic National Park Association of California.

R. H. Finch, associate volcanologist of the Geological Survey, with Mrs. Finch, arrived in San Francisco a few days ago from the Hawaiian National Park, where he has been assistant under Dr. T. A. Jaggar, chief of the section of volcanology, and has departed for Lassen Volcanic head quarters, near Mineral, and will establish and take charge of the new volcano observatory.

BOSTON STREETS STRAIGHTEN OUT

Boston, Sept. 30.—(INS)—Jibes and so-called wis cracks referring to Boston's crooked "cow-path" streets are no longer consistent.

Under the regime of the present Board of Street Commissioners, the city has seen one of the greatest and highway booms in history. Millions of dollars have already been spent in street widening and extensions. And in order to keep abreast of the general expansion wave, more improvements are under advisement.

The city is virtually taking on a new lease of life, insofar as street improvement is concerned. Even the "townies" stand awestricken momentarily when they round into familiar haunts where improvements have been completed or are under way.

Dock and Faneuil Hall Squares have been transformed and the site of the "Cradle of Liberty" is no longer hidden in a maze of crooked and narrow streets. The squares have been merged into one and the historic shrine now stands out in bold relief. The cost of this improvement, including widening and building construction, was \$2,500,000.

The widening of Tremont street, 60 to 8 feet, between Arlington Square and Stuart street cost \$2,400,000. From a varying width of 40 to 50 feet, Cambridge street has been widened to a beautiful thoroughfare at a cost of \$4,000,000. It will cost the city \$2,400,000 to widen Kneeland street to an 80-foot highway between Washington street and Atlantic avenue.

It cost \$2,000,000 to make Stuart street a 70-foot highway between Washington street and Huntington avenue. Avery street widening improvement totaled \$1,500,000. The widening of Province street cost \$1,250,000.

Governor Invited to Take Part in Tree Planting

Raleigh, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Governor McLean has been invited to act with President and Mrs. Coolidge and other Governors of the thirteen original colonies in emulating the example set by Washington, Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton by planting 13 trees at Philadelphia as living memorials to the colonies forming the republic.

The date for the ceremony has been set for October 11, which is also "North Carolina Day" at the Sesqui-Centennial. The planting is scheduled to take place in Independence Square at noon, and to be followed by a luncheon to the visiting dignitaries given by the women's committee of the exposition.

The plan calls for each Governor to turn a spadeful of native soil about the roots of a tree representing his state as a part of the Sesqui-Centennial exercises.

An especially large crowd is expected to be on hand for the occasion as the day also marks the opening of the National American Legion convention.

Governor McLean stated that while he would like very much to accept the invitation and would do so if it did not conflict with

the "North Carolina Day" exercises at the Sesqui-Centennial grounds, he was afraid that it would be impossible for the North Carolina delegation to participate on account of the state flag presentation ceremonies which are set to begin at eleven o'clock at the exposition grounds, five miles out of the city.

AERODROME HIGH IN ALPS FOR CONTINENTAL FLIERS

Innsbruck, Sept. 30.—(INS)—An aerodrome 2,000 meters above

sea level will be built in a center of the Tyrolean Alps, near Innsbruck. The aerodrome will be built to allow a safe landing place for planes which must make the dangerous trip across the Alps.

With this new haven it is expected that new passenger routes will be established from Zurich to Vienna, from Basel to Venice and from Milan to Berlin, for the Alps have heretofore been the only barrier to the establishment of such flights.

Studying Democracy at State University

Chapel Hill, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Half a hundred students at the University of North Carolina will study the "Problems for Democracy in North Carolina" and publish their findings in book form at the end of the present college year. It has been announced by the North Carolina club, an organization having as its purpose the study of state problems and conditions.
