OFFICER NOBLES DIED EARLY TODAY RESULT INJURIES

Died This Morning Without Regaining Consciousness; Funeral Tomorrow Afternoon

Motorcycle officer J. L. Nobles of the Greenville police force, died in Pitt County hospital at five o'clock this morning as a result of injuries received when he was thrown from his motorcycle Saturday night. Mr. Nobles died without regaining consciousness after the accident.

The accident occurred near Winterville as the officer was en route to the scene of another accident. The motorcycle from unknown cause, skidded from the road and the officer's skull was fractured when he was thrown to the hard surfaced road.

Funeral services will be conducted in Jarvis Memorial Methodist church here tomorrow afternoon by Rev. L. B. Jones, and interment will follow in the Bethel Cemetery. The Bethel Masonic Lodge, of which Mr. Nobles was a member, will be in charge of the services at the grave. Members of the local police force and officers from several of the neighboring towns will serve as active pallbearers. Offices of the various departments of the city government will be closed during the services here tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Nobles was a native of this county, having been born near Stokes, November 11, 1883. On November 12, 1902, he was married to Miss Ora Marton, of Bethel and the union was blessed with four children, Luther, J. L. Jr., William and Eleanor, who with the widow of the deceased survive him. He is also survived by a brother, H. E. Nobles, of Stokes; three half-brothers, Grover, Murphy and Euriah Leggett, of Bethel; and two half-sisters, Mrs. Frank Warren and Mrs. G. Crandall, of Stokes.

Mr. Nobles for the past five years has served on the Greenville police force and was an efficient officer. He was a member of Jarvis Memorial Methodist church here and a member of the Bethel Masonic Lodge.

FLOOD WATERS STRICKEN AREA RECEDING TODAY

Property Loss From Floods in the Middle West Will Run Into Millions of Dollars

Chicago, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The retreat of havoc-working waters from the mid-western areas first hit by the cloud burst that arrived with October, today carried the flood limits down the courses of the largest tributaries and into the Mississippi.

Along the Kansas - Oklahoma state line the floods were receding, and eastern Missouri and Central and Western Illinois were threatened with further losses in life and property as the crest moved toward the gulf.

More homes were hastily abandoned as the water threatened to increase at Bardonia in central Illinois where the levees gave way yesterday and let the stream into the town. Virtually all of the wall in front of Bardonia had disappeared.

Mississippi river lowlands to the north of St. Louis went under water brought about by the constraint of the Missouri with the larger streams and trains moving in and out of St. Louis were hours late and had to be enroute because of washouts.

The rivers and creeks climbed to flood stage in central Oklahoma as the crest passed and at Bartlesville a hundred deputies were sworn in to protect homes of those who fled before the flood.

This Santa Fe Express from California to Chicago is crossing from Arizona into New Mexico at Manuelito. Luigi Cornaro wrote he 'hug to live to be ninety to know that the world is beautiful.'

He lived and built fine places in Venice hundreds of years ago, with the Adriatic and the Alps close by. But never having been in western America, he died without knowing how beautiful the world really is.

These high lands of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado are the most beautiful and dignified regions in the world.

Here the earth looks big. Greece and Italy, France and England are little countries, with little rivers, little mountains, small scenery, pretty, inspiring to poets.

Compared with this land such pretty places are like a wax doll compared with Michael Angelo's statue of Moses, or like the First Baptist Church compared with St. Peter's.

Across miles of land you see no sign of human life except a swift automobile hurrying from east to west, or an Indian boy with his band of goats, or some prospectors riding one donkey, leading another on the old hunt for gold.

Wise Providence is saving this land for a human race worthy of it. You should come and see it now, however, and select a spot for your distant reincarnation, or settle here at once if you are already worthy.

On these highlands, far from big cities, you are reminded that the last twenty-five years have been the most remarkable in the earth's history, industrially and scientifically. In a nearby Pullman compartment, a radio machine is gathering information and music from Denver, San Francisco and other points.

At Hodge, Calif., just west of Barstow, flying machines pass east and west carrying the mail. Drilling rigs, going down for water in the Mojave Valley run by electric power from mountain streams far away, change the desert to a garden.

The west, in addition to being big, knows how to advertise. Turning from the New Mexico Enchanted Mesa to the Sunday Los Angeles Examiner, you see something to interest all business men. It is one advertisement covering eleven pages, published by Walker's Los Angeles Department Store. When the Pacific Coast believes it has something to say, it says it so that all may hear.

It is desirable to deserve all success, all important in these days of quick action, to know how to COMMAND SUCCESS. Conservative merchants will say 'one advertisement covering eleven pages is excessive,' but it isn't.

The Los Angeles Sunday Examiner circulates 400,000; biggest circulation west of the Mississippi River, and is read by 2,000,000 people. When you talk to such an audience you should make a noise to be heard.

Chicago contributes to bootleg lore, the interesting history of Richard Evans, nineteen year old boy, who killed a policeman, in ten minutes a jury decided to hang him. Asked what he had to say, the young murderer, looking at his mother sobbing in a corner, replied: 'Judge I think the sentence is severe in view of my condition.' He was half drunk when he put a revolver to the head of a policeman, driving him to the lockup, and blew out the policeman's brains.

If anybody is to be hanged, hanging that young murderer is correct, but what of the bootlegger that sold him this whiskey? Why not hang him beside the murderer? He has more to do with the killing than the nineteen year old boy that pulled the trigger.

Chicago statistics show that bootleg whiskey's killing record about equals that of pistols.

PASSENGER SHIP ARRIVES IN PORT WITH FIRE RAGING

387 Passengers and Crew of Steamship Byron Believed to Have Suffered No Injury

New York, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The steamship Byron, of the National Greek line, which sailed from Pireus on September 17 with 387 passengers aboard, raced into Quarantine today with a fire raging in her hold. Apparently the crew and passengers were uninjured.

In response to S. O. S. calls received when she was off Ambrose Light, a city fire tug, two pilot boats and a police launch steamed down the bay to her assistance. Wire calls asking the nature of the fire and if she was in immediate danger were acknowledged but no details were given.

A telephone message from Quarantine station to the Marine department of fire headquarters stated that the fire was in the stern of the ship and that she was not in danger.

NOTHING IS WRONG WITH O. L. JOYNER

Rumor That He Had Been Shot to Death By Farmer Yesterday Without Foundation

Just how and why the rumor that Mr. O. L. Joyner, of this city, was shot to death on the tobacco market yesterday, started, no one knows, but bad news travels fast and it was long before the unfounded rumor had spread over this entire section.

The first that the Reflector knew of it, a telephone call from the Wilson newspaper stated that the report had reached that city and asked confirmation of the same. They were immediately informed that there was no truth whatever in the rumor and that Mr. Joyner was at his warehouse conducting tobacco sales and that there had been no trouble or disturbance thereabouts. Little attention was paid further to the rumor until last night and this morning when Mr. Joyner's family received several long distance telephone messages, and letters of condolence.

Mr. Joyner stated today that he was enjoying the best of health in years and that he was at this time very much alive. While it is regrettable that such a rumor should have been broadcast, he declared, he was glad to be in position to personally deny same and brand it as false.

Alabama Senator Opened Johnston County Fair Today

Smithfield, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Senator Thomas J. Heflin, of Alabama, officially opened the Johnston county fair here at noon today. Senator Heflin will return here next Friday night and open the Democratic campaign in the county following a speaking tour which carries him to Rocky Mount tomorrow. At Rocky Mount he will speak along with other notables including the Governor, North Carolina's two Senators and several of her Congressmen at the opening of the Rocky Mount fair.

COLE BLEASE INVITED TO VISIT THIS STATE

Whiteville, N. C., Oct. 5.—AP—Cole L. Blease, United States Senator from South Carolina, has been invited to make the annual opening address at the Columbus county fair which opens here on October 26.

Extensive preparations have been made for the fair, which will be participated in by Bladen and Brunswick counties as well as Columbus. A large number of exhibits have already been entered.

Launches Campaign For Extension of Highways Eastern Section of State

In Address Before Local Rotary Club, Congressman Lindsay Warren Declares At Least Ten Per Cent More Mileage Should Be Added To State Highway Program.

Declaring that good roads are conducive to the development, progress and happiness of eastern North Carolina and that the salvation of the section depends on the action of the next General Assembly, Congressman Lindsay C. Warren, in an address before the local Rotary Club last night urged that every citizen in every county in the section see to it that the long delayed justice due eastern North Carolina counties is meted out to them. Congress-

man Warren's address was the feature of the evening's program and his remarks were received with enthusiasm by the club members. In addition to Congressman Warren, Road Commissioner Frank Kugler, and Messrs. Carl Goerch and Herbert Bonner, of Washington, were also guests of the club.

Last night's program began with several musical numbers by club duet and quintette which were greatly enjoyed. Following the musical numbers the club accepted an invitation from Rev. H. Frederick Jones to attend the Memorial Baptist church on next Sunday evening, at which time he will deliver a special sermon to the Rotarians and other citizens of the city.

W. H. Dail then told of the preparation that is being made for the Pitt County Fair which opens here next Tuesday. This year's fair, he declared, will eclipse all former fairs held here and stated that more space had been reserved for agricultural exhibits than ever before and so great was the demand that a large building for this part of the fair alone was now in the course of construction.

Rotarian Carl Goerch, of the Washington, club, and Road Commissioner Frank Kugler made short talks after which R. H. Wright presented Congressman Warren.

In addressing the club, Congressman Warren launched a campaign that the entire eastern section of the state, especially those counties comprising the first road district, are vitally interested in. He stated that the future of this section depends upon the immediate completion of the state highway system, and that if eastern Carolina was to forge ahead it was necessary that the State Highway Commission be authorized to add at least ten per cent more mileage to the state map.

The first district, composed of 20 counties, has an area of 8819 square miles, a population of 426,062, and a total road mileage of 919. Mr. Warren said that there were vast sections still unserved, and that it stood as a challenge to the state to afford communication for all of its people. The speaker declared that the counties, certainly those in the far east, had exhausted their resources in road building, and it was now incumbent upon the state to enlarge the program. He said that the state map had already been increased from 5500 miles to 6103 miles. He pointed out how the first district was handicapped by the necessity for costly bridges, and as a result of this only half of its mileage had been paved.

"Highways," said the First district Congressman, "will solve three fourths of the problems of the east, and increased mileage is the greatest single thing that our legislators can do." He praised the administration of Governor McLean, and the work of the State Highway Commission and said he could not imagine them opposing the proposition if they were convinced that the roads to be added were necessary for the state system rather than some pet scheme.

HIGHER PRICES ON TOBACCO MARKET HERE YESTERDAY

805,606 Pounds of Tobacco Sold Here Monday for Average of \$26.91 Per Hundred

Prices on the local tobacco market yesterday took an upward trend with the result that the day's sales of 805,606 pounds of tobacco brought a total of \$216,829.53, an average of \$26.91 per hundred pounds.

Out of respect of Mr. J. M. McGowan, who was killed Saturday night in an automobile wreck, the market closed at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon and all tobaccoists attended the funeral in a body.

Today's offerings will pass the million pounds mark and reports from the market indicate that prices are continuing their upward movement. Warehousemen are urging the farmers to grade their offerings close, seeing to it that all dead and green leaves are taken out, and to keep it dry and in good order. The sales yesterday and today bring the season's total sales well above the fifteen million pounds mark.

CINDERELLA BRIDE QUITS HUSBAND RETURNS HOME

"Peaches" Browning Returns to Mother After Living Six Months With Millionaire Husband

New York, Oct. 5.—(AP)—"Peaches" Browning, the Cinderella bride, has gone home to mother, leaving behind her millionaire husband who is 35 years her seniors, and a "lot of dreams that have never come true."

Edward W. Browning, the 51 year old bridegroom, says that separation from his 16 year old bride of six months is only temporary, however. She left him Sunday.

"Mrs. Browning has gone away for a few days with her mother," he said in a statement given out by his secretary. "The parting is temporary. There has been no quarrel. We have agreed to separate for a few days but there is nothing definite about our being apart. We have given up our apartment for the time being."

The Herald Tribune says Mrs. Browning's mother took her to stay with friends at a point some where in New Jersey.

"The reason for our separation will have to come from Mr. Browning," the paper quotes, the bride as saying. "It is for him to say how long it will be."

Mrs. Catherine Heenan, mother of the bride, was asked if her daughter had given up the magnificent Long Island home Mr. Browning bought for her.

"Oh, that is one of the things that has never come true," said Mrs. Heenan.

"That was good on paper and in the papers. I guess it was somebody's dream. There were lots of things that never happened and the palace on Long Island was just one of them."

FIRE PREVENTION PROCLAMATION BY MAYOR D.M. CLARK

Mayor Urges Greenville Citizens Co-operate in Helping to Cut Down Fire Losses

"October 3rd to 9th, inclusive, has been designated as Fire Prevention Week throughout the United States, and I urge the citizenship of our city to cooperate in this great work of conserving both life and property by reducing their premises of all useless and worthless inflammable material during this week.

In order to make the work thorough and easy for you, the city will remove all such material free of cost if placed on the street on the days already scheduled for the removal of garbage in your respective wards and streets.

Carefully compiled figures show that in 1925 \$58,525.00 worth of property was destroyed by fire in our city. Our firemen answered 24 calls. While there were 293 human beings burned to death in North Carolina in 1925, none of them are charged against our city.

I therefore urge that the week of October 3rd to 9th be set aside as Fire Prevention Week in accordance with the Proclamation of our President and our Governor and to that end I ask your cooperation with our State Insurance Department and our city officials to see to it that all schools, churches, theatres, hospitals, public buildings, factories, stores and hotels be inspected to see that every safeguard against fire is provided, and that exit facilities are sufficient, in case of fire.

I therefore issue this my proclamation and do set aside, as Fire Prevention Week in the city of Greenville and do urge our people to observe it in obedience to our National and State laws.

Oxford, N. C., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Five convicts were still at large today as the result of a sensational break for freedom by 13 prisoners at the Greenville county road camp near here yesterday.

The men held up the guard while they were being assembled for the day's work and left them helpless while they made their getaway. The alarm was spread shortly after the delivery and a drag net spread over the country resulting in the capture of one man and the voluntary surrender of 12 others.

Manager Huggins sent the veteran Dutch Reuther to the mound for the Yankees while, Hornsby depended on the stalwart Jesse Haines to pitch for the Cardinals.

QUEEN TO VISIT NORTH CAROLINA NEXT DECEMBER

**CHICAGO AQUARIUM
LARGEST IN WORLD**

Chicago, Oct. 5.—(INS)—Having begun construction on what is to be the largest aquarium in the world, Chicago now has turned its attention to animal life and has announced plans for a zoo which will house 5,000 animals.

Windsor, Eng., Oct. 5.—(INS) The Black Lady, Windsor's name for the ghost of Queen Elizabeth I., re-appeared at Windsor Castle.

The appearance is connected by old residents with the appointment of a new architect at the castle, as the legend is that the Queen's ghost is always seen about the ancient battlements whenever there is a change in the personnel of the royal residence.

The spirit of Queen Elizabeth, according to Windsor people, is concerned with the welfare of the

servants of the Crown responsible for the structural maintenance and repair of the castle.

The Black Lady is England's most illustrious modern ghost, and has been seen by at least one member of the Royal Family, Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, when she was occupying a suite at the castle.

The latest appearance of the ghost was from a window of the Saxon Tower, which has been unoccupied for more than a year.

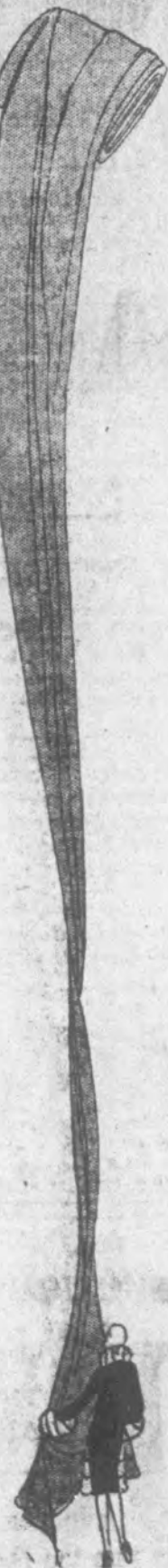

OUR LOSS

The death of officer J. L. Nobles early today brings to two the toll of the two accidents near here Saturday night. The accidents cast a shadow of gloom over the entire community and the sympathy of all is with the families of Mr. Madison McGowan and Officer Nobles. One of these men was a prominent factor in the greatest industry in the city, the other a public servant and guardian of the lives and property of our city. In the death of these two men, our city suffers a distinct loss.

FIRES MUST CEASE

"The great waste of energy, for wealth is but stored energy, cannot in our generation, be entirely eliminated," says the State Insurance Department in urging observance of Fire Prevention Week, "but if every citizen in the state will use Fire Prevention Week in an honest effort to reduce unnecessary fire hazards, a large part of it can be eliminated and a foundation laid to relieve the children of this generation and their children of an economical burden, which if not materially lightened, will within their lifetime prove disastrous," says the department. This is the appeal passed on to the people of our state. During 1925 293 people in our state lost their lives, twice that number were injured and property losses from fire amounted to nearly seven millions of dollars. Seventy-five per cent of these fires, according to the Insurance Department, were caused by carelessness and could have been prevented had proper precautionary measures been taken. Is this not sufficient to bring home to the citizens of our state the need of studying fire prevention and practicing the same not only this week but throughout the entire year and the years to come.

PRESS COMMENT

SECOND THOUGHTS ABOUT THE WAR DEBTS

(New York Times)
Sober English opinion is evidently a little ashamed of the hysterical outcry against the United States kept up for a time by what Englishmen themselves call the "stunt" press. Quieter and more sane discussions have followed the shrieks about "Uncle Shylock." One writer in an English magazine humorously pictures his fellow countrymen as making two serious mistakes about the United States. One was when America entered the war. Then Uncle Sam was enthusiastically

described as a Don Quixote. Afterward came the pressure upon England to pay the loans that she had contracted in the United States, and thereupon the erstwhile Don Quixote at once became a Shylock. But in fact, remarks this English writer, Uncle Sam was not so much of a Don Quixote as we thought he was in 1917, nor is he so much of a Shylock as we charge him with being in 1926. All nations at all times think first of what they regard as their highest interest. America did it when she declared war against Germany, and she is doing it when she busies herself in settling the war debts. Of course, she may be making a mistake about what she conceives to be her highest interest.

This is a point suggested, if not explicitly raised, by the noteworthy article of the London Times last week discussing this whole matter. It brushed aside all the railing accusations brought against the United States, by a few excitable and sensation loving newspapers. Such outbursts do not comport with English dignity. They are one of the things that are "not done." The London Times rises above that level in its serious estimate of the whole position as it stands today. Great Britain would never think of repudiating an honest debt. No public man, no political party, in England contemplates even asking for a revision of the agreement with the United States Treasury. The British Exchequer will find the money to make the stipulated payments, even if it hurts. That the United States made a settlement with Italy, and has proposed one to France more favorable than that agreed to by England, the English are well aware. But they do not propose to whine over it. In a way they take it as a sort of compliment to their superior credit and to their sturdy resolve to maintain it at all hazards.

Yet, when all this is said, English informed opinion thinks of the war debts as a great international question which cannot yet be said to be settled right. More things are involved than money. We have to consider the intangibles of intercourse between nations. We have to ask how so unprecedented a thing as the continuing financial obligation of one Government to another Government for sixty-two years is going to affect the minds and attitudes of our children, and our children's children. Disguise the matter as we may seek to do, the fact will remain that one nation will have been forced into the position of servitude to another. This cannot make for good relations in the long run. It is bound also to have unfortunate consequences for international trade and finance. How can there fail to be resentment, even if it is unexpressed and sullen, in countries struggling to get upon their feet after the immense losses and dislocations of the war, when they realize that the labor of hundreds of thousands of their own citizens is mortgaged for years to a creditor across the seas? Real and far sighted statesmanship can not be satisfied with such a prospect. It must think of the debt settlements already arrived at as merely provisional, certain to undergo modifications or readjustments before many years have elapsed. Such, in effect, is the judgment of the most competent Englishmen who are at the same time most disposed to be friendly with America.

Over the Channel in France similar sentiments are finding expression. The French Government takes the honorable position which has been officially maintained ever since the war, that France must recognize her debts to the United States, and pay them as soon as she is able. Premier Poincare has recently made it plain that he would like to have the matter disposed of at the earliest date possible. Apparently he means to urge the French Parliament to ratify the Washington agreement as quickly as may be after it convenes at the end of this month. But even if this is done, as we hope it will be, the difficulty will be surmounted only temporarily. Behind the first obstacle will rise a whole series of others. There will be, for example, the problem of transferring such great sums from one country to another. Upon this point M. Poincare laid significant emphasis in his speech of last week. Possibly the French Government may ask for a safeguarding clause on this point. Granted that this can in some way be taken care of, we at once see rising the question of payment by goods and services instead of by cash, involving as this would the willingness of the United States to receive large quantities of foreign produce, which itself might require a change in our tariff laws.

These are but hints of the way in which the war debts are bound to remain to trouble us until some new way of disposing of them is found. At first, the thing seemed perfectly simple to the ordinary American. Europe owed us a lot of money. Let it pay Uncle Sam as enthusiastically

VIENNA, ONCE FAMINED, IS NOW A MODEL CITY

Vienna, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Within less than a year Vienna has become one of the model cities of Europe. The Socialist-Democratic municipal government has erected 30,000 modern apartment houses for workers, a series of great public bath houses, hospitals, children's homes, nurseries, schools, playgrounds, gymnasiums, municipal lodging houses, trade schools, libraries, dental clinics, and social centers. More than 250 miles of streets and highways have been paved.

The whole city has been electrified, the underground railway built, omnibus and new trolley lines established, and a great electric power station installed.

Fox Hunt Again Heard Through Alabama Hills

Gadsden, Ala., Oct. 5.—(INS)—The music of the fox hunt once more sounded through the hills and valleys of north Alabama when five hundred hounds participated in the field trials held by the Etowah Fox Hunters Association here.

The association, which was formed this year, among its members some of the noted hunters and sportsmen of the state. Plans have already been made to make the event an annual affair and an elaborate program was announced for the next trials at the end of the three day meeting that has just been brought to an end.

The event is sponsored by the people of the community who have contributed the liberal prizes offered in both the field and bench events. The big hunt was brought to the little town nestled in the foothills of the Smoky Mountains some of the most famous hounds in the south.

The first day of the three day session was given over to registration of the entries following which a big parade of all the dogs was staged in the streets of the town.

On the morning of the second day of the meet the first hunt was called. Long before the sun had topped the surrounding mountains the trail, were lined with people from all walks of life who had gathered to hear the music of the chase. They came in autos and on foot and it is estimated that fully five hundred people were present. The dogs were unleashed at five o'clock and in fifteen minutes had Reynard on the go. For two hours the hills resounded to the music of the dogs and the listeners were held enraptured. The dogs were called off before the fox was caught.

On the second morning of the chase an even larger crowd was present. The dogs were unleashed and soon had another fox going. The chase lasted until well up into the morning and the fox was chased into an adjoining county.

The next day was given to the awarding of prizes in both the field and bench events. Three prizes were awarded in the field events, being based on speed, driving ability and endurance. In the bench trials breeding and appearance were taken into consideration by the judges.

The preserve where the races were held is well stocked with fox. It is located on Rainbow mountain, just south of Gadsden. The grounds commence at the country club and continuing for a distance of about ten miles along Rainbow Drive make one of the most ideal preserves to be found in the state. It is stocked with the famous red fox that are noted for their ability to give the hounds a merry chase and recent events were no exception.

TEXAS IS IN NEED OF 125,000 MEN FOR FARM WORK

Business Men Are Also Needed in Almost Every Part of the State; Booster Committee Sends Out Report of Conditions in All Lines

Waco, Texas, Oct. 5.—(INS)—Over 125,000 farmers are needed in Texas and business men are needed in 75 per cent of the state, according to a survey of the needs of 100 county townships, just completed by the Advertiser Texas Committee, Inc.

Not only are farmers needed in all of the counties queried, but in all of them comments are made that a large number of farm hands are an immediate necessity.

A wide range is covered in estimates of the number of farmers and business men needed in the various parts of the state, figures starting as low as 100 and mounting to 25,000 in regions which are as yet sparsely populated, in Southwest Texas.

In some of the reports mention is made of the fact that many farmers are attempting to raise nothing but cotton, thereby leaving themselves entirely at the mercy of the prevailing market at the time they must market their crops.

Some farmers leave themselves in a predicament by hiring negroes to run their farms, when it is generally known that negroes are primarily cotton growers, and know nothing else, one of the reports states.

New manufacturing concerns are asked by many of the localities, reporting, the criticism being made.

BRITISH ARMY TRIES TO LIGHTEN SOLDIER BURDEN IN MARCHING TO FIGHT

Aldershot, Oct. 5.—(INS)—Can the British Tommy be relieved of the burden of his pack when marching to the fighting line?

This is the problem which the present British Army maneuvers at Aldershot are trying to solve. The main idea is to find out how much of the burden carried by every soldier in the fighting line may be transferred from his shoulders to the first line transport, made up entirely of motor-vehicles.

The question is asked:—Can the soldier go into battle with little more baggage than his weapons, ammunition and clothes he stands in, and can he rely upon motor-transport to carry his other belongings—coats, pack, haversack, rations, field-dressings and so on, and deliver them to him when and where he may need them?

If these questions are answered satisfactorily, then the soldier in

future will go into battle metaphorically 'stripped to the buff' instead of carrying a load weighing anything up to 80 lbs.

DRYS AND WETS STIR SCOTLAND BY BIG BATTLE

Issue to Be Decided in December
Has Country Highly Excited;
Some Observers Believe Prohibition
Will Receive Further Setback

Edinburgh, Oct. 4.—(INS)—The great battle between the Drys and Wets of Scotland, to be decided in December, proceeds with unabated

energy and virulence. At present impartial observers think that Prohibitionists will receive as big a set back as in 1920 and 1923, and, curiously enough they believe the votes of women will be largely responsible for this defeat.

This argument sounds strange at first, because it was the women's vote that brought its few victories to Prohibition in the two previous elections. But it seems the unmarried women have changed their minds in the present dry centers. They say that the unmarried men drift away from the dry towns to the wet ones and are lost; and as they can get drunk so easily elsewhere, it would be just as well if they were to procure it in their own home town.

Local feeling of this description is becoming one of the greatest thorns in the side of the Prohibitionists.

A good example of this situation occurs in the tiny industrial town of Stewarttown, about 29 miles from Glasgow and five from Kilmarnock. A prohibition majority in the 1920 elections closed the nine saloons and two hotel bars of Stewarttown. The same verdict was returned in 1923. So for nearly six years Stewarttown has been entirely dry. And yet even a number of the local prohibitionists think it will go wet at the coming poll.

They admit that drinking has not diminished. It is only done in another place.

They also say that the shopkeeper's turnover has diminished because the tendency is for a woman to accompany her husband when he sets forth in search of week-end refreshment in a neighboring wet town. The husband does his drinking while his wife goes shopping.

Accordingly, on Saturday afternoon, a great flow of motor omnibuses is in readiness to convey the greater part of the population of Stewarttown to Kilmarnock—only 15 minutes drive. The one business street of Stewarttown is deserted and that of Kilmarnock is thronged.

Local business men say that there is more drinking done nowadays by Stewarttown people than before the place went dry. People who want to drink have to go further and they instinctively feel that the extra effort entitles them to get the most value for time and money spent.

VALENTINO'S DOG GOES BACK TO MAYOR ROLPH

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—(INS)—The dog that was presented to Rudolph Valentino by Mayor James Rolph, Jr., of San Francisco has just been returned to the mayor.

On returning the dog George Ullman manager of the late screen idol, stated that he knew Mayor Rolph would give the pet better care than anybody else.

TUNNEY TO FIGHT RICKARD'S CHOICE

Marlboro, Oct. 5.—(INS)—Gene Tunney will fight any man that Tex Rickard may pick as his opponent. Tommy Loughran, the Philadelphia pride, I do not feel is suitable timber to give the new champion a battle for his title. I feel that Jack Delaney is at the present time the most promising of the heavies that might be in line for a titular battle.

These statements were made by Joe Gorman, formerly of Marlboro, former world's amateur 125 pound champion, and the man generally credited with teaching the rudiments of boxing to Tunney. The pair were inseparable comrades in the A. E. F. in France.

Gorman, who came east for the big fight, is spending a few days with relatives in his native city.

When 200 of us left France for the fight, there were but two of us who predicted a victory for Tunney. Gene beat Dempsey in the first round of that fight, when the champion realized that his customary rushes were of little avail to the contender who met him with a new sort of combination offense and defense.

I was with Tunney after the fight when he spent an hour with Dempsey. Jack, a mighty good sport told Gene that he had won in a fair and square battle and all he sought was another fight.

Gene Gorman stated, assured Dempsey that the fight could be arranged. I was always confident that Tunney could whip Dempsey, whether over the long run or in a ten round contest. I started him winning in France and I saw him through 20 fights in France and witnessed him batter his way to the championship of the A. E. F. he said.

Gorman has an enviable record, himself, winning the national amateur 115 pound title in 1909 and 1910 and annexing the world's 125 pound title in 1915. He has been through 183 battles, most of which he won.

FAMOUS FRENCH RECIPES

Paris, Oct. 5.—(INS)—For braised red cabbage cut the vegetable into quarters. Remove the outside leaves and heart and wash well.

Chop two or three onions and brown in butter. Add the cabbage well-drained and blanched.
