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TOBACCO MARKET BREAKS ALL RECORDS

NAVY DIRIGIBLE MAKE SAFE TRIP BACK LAKEHURST

Return Trip From Detroit Completed in Little Less Than Fourteen Hours

Lakehurst, N. J., Oct. 16.—(AP)—The navy dirigible, Los Angeles was back home today after a hurried flight from Detroit which was made necessary by an approaching storm. Her return marked the successful completion of a test flight similar to one that spelled disaster to her sister ship the Shenandoah, while flying over Ohio a year ago.

The return was made in thirteen hours and fifty-five minutes by way of Lake Erie, Buffalo, Syracuse, Albany and down the Hudson River to New York. The ship functioned perfectly all the way. For a time a speed of 70 miles an hour was maintained. The original plan of Lieutenant Commander C. E. Rosendahl in command of the ship, was to remain in Detroit and vicinity until nine o'clock this morning, but the storm warning made necessary a change in schedule. The return trip was made in a shorter time than the trip to Detroit, which took sixteen and a half hours.

AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION ENDS

Parting Legionnaires Enthusiastic Over Prospects for Trip to Paris Next Year

Philadelphia, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Winding their way homeward after the eighth annual convention of the American Legion, veterans and their wives and daughters today appeared to be of one mind that next year's convention in Paris must be as successful as the one just ended.

"See you in Paris next year," was the parting greeting of the Legionnaires.

Enthusiasm was unlimited as the former soldiers envisioned a second trip to France. For a number who will make the trip, however, it will be the first visit to the French nation, for not every member of the A. E. F., as many can testify, was able to get across for the big fight.

The 1926 convention will be remembered for the stiffest fight for national commander in the history of the organization.

The Legionnaire, balloted 20 times and were unable to give any one candidate the necessary number of votes and it was not until the 21st ballot that Howard P. Savage, of Chicago, was elected. J. Monroe Johnson, of Marion, S. C., was Savage's principal opponent and his withdrawal on the 21st ballot gave the election to Savage.

The Reverend Joseph J. Wolfe, a Catholic priest of Philadelphia, was elected national chaplain.

Mrs. Adeline Wright MacAuley, of Wisconsin, was elected president of the women auxiliary.

NEGRO DEACON JAILED WHEN HE FAILED TO PRAY

Spartanburg, S. C., Oct. 16.—(INS)—Frank Fant, a negro deacon, is in jail here because he hesitated when he was called upon to pray the other day.

But his hesitation was the cause of him seeing Bob Anderson, another church member, wink at his (Fant's) wife. Fant was prepared and rose from his knees as he tossed a brick at his fellow churchman.

Anderson is nursing a severely bruised head at a local hospital.

AURORA BOREALIS PLAYS HAVOC WITH TELEGRAPH LINES

Unusual Atmospheric Disturbances Inter- rupt Commercial and Press Telegraph Service

Charlotte, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Aurora Borealis played havoc today and yesterday with the commercial and press wires of the eastern section of the United States.

Commercial wires from Canada down the Atlantic seaboard and in the eastern states were reported in trouble throughout the day with interruptions caused by the atmospheric conditions ranging from a few minutes to an hour or more at a time.

Associated Press telegraph wires were visibly affected by the disturbance but the printer circuit of the Associated Press were virtually without any trouble and operated throughout today and yesterday without interference.

The bank, which is but a motion picture "set," was built before the world war and has figured, with many alterations, in scenes of more thrilling action than almost any motion picture "set" in existence.

GOVERNOR McLEAN TO STUMP STATE FOR DEMOCRATS

Left Raleigh This Morning for Two Weeks' Speaking Tour of the State

Raleigh, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Embarking upon his first tour of political speaking since he stumped the state in his campaign for the Governorship in 1924, Governor McLean motored westward from the state capital early this morning to begin a campaign that will consume nearly two weeks and takes the Governor into more than a quarter of the state's counties.

The Governor's first stop was scheduled at Greensboro, where an unofficial party conference with Guilford county Democratic leaders is on the program. From the state city he will proceed to Lexington for the first speech of his campaign on behalf of the Senatorial, Congressional and Legislative candidate.

While the Governor is opening his oratorical attack at Lexington, the state's only living former Governor, Cameron Morrison of Charlotte, will hold forth in Johnston county, where the Democrats are launching a determined drive to recover ballots lost in the 1924 contest. Former Governor Morrison is due in Raleigh for party conferences over the week-end and then will go to Durham on Monday for his second speech. He will conclude his campaign at Newton on November 1 after daily speeches over a large area.

Both Governor McLean and former Governor Morrison will for the most part invade hostile territories on their campaign tours, which were outlined with a view to recovering for the Democrats a large percentage of the 20 counties which voted Republican in 1924.

Pre campaign predictions of party leaders have it that the Democrats might carry 95 counties at the coming election and would gather a heavy women's vote. These predictions have been attacked by the Republicans, who from their state headquarters at Greensboro have launched a heavy barrage. State Chairman Jackson and the Republican Senatorial candidate, Johnson L. Hayes, started earlier than the Democrats and have kept up a strong pace throughout the state. Mr. Hayes invaded the capital this week and returned over the week-end shelling the woods of recognized Democratic strongholds.

In addition to the two Governors to open tonight, former Congressman Felix Alley, is slated to tell the Republicans up in Jackson county how much they have benefitted from the Democratic regime and Pete Murphy is set down for the same kind of speech at Lillington.

Atlanta to Make War on Beggars

Atlanta, Ga. Oct. 16.—(INS)—Nine civic organizations and charitable associations have launched a drive here to rid Atlanta's streets of beggars and have called upon the tax committee of the city council for the city's aid.

Practically all beggars make more than \$100 a month and refuse charity. An investigation made by the junior Chamber of Commerce revealed. Fit persons who have been begging on the streets, will be cared for by organized charity. The city will be ridden of other, the drive leaders say.

Vice-President Dawes thinks the direct primary should be abolished.

In its place would come the old convention, and candidates selected by political bosses.

On the whole the direct primary is the better plan. Sometimes you cannot buy the voters. You can always buy the bosses, and they are cheaper than direct primary buying.

What does the public gain by enabling a rich man to buy his seat in the senate more cheaply?

Andrew Furuseth, head of the Seamen's Union, a fine old sailor, says unions face destruction at the hands of courts and suggests, "It may be necessary for us to tell courts that enjoy us, we refuse to answer your questions, we refuse to recognize you," etc.

M. Furuseth is earnest and honest and labor unions compelling employers to pay decent wages have, in past times, been powerful in increasing general prosperity.

But those unions really will face destruction on the day they decide to overrule the courts. That must be done only through the ballot box, not in the back-room of any labor and union or corporation.

Rhode Island, including Newport and its luxury, is Republican, and wet.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS COURSE BEGINS SUNDAY

Training School for Teachers Opens Methodist Church Tomorrow Evening

Beginning tomorrow night at the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church at 7:30 there will be held a Standard Training School for Sunday School Teachers. The faculty of the school will consist of a director and four teachers. The director is Mr. L. L. Gohbel of the Sunday School Board of North Carolina Conference. The teachers are Dr. J. M. Ormond, of Duke University; Mrs. M. H. McArde, of Norfolk, Va.; Miss Georgia Keene of Durham, N. C., and Mrs. Junius H. Rose, Greenville.

The four courses offered by these instructors cover practically the whole field of Sunday School teaching. For instance Dr. Ormond will give a course entitled "The Life and Letters of Paul." This course will be particularly helpful to all adults and teachers of adult classes. Mrs. Rose will offer a course entitled "A Study of Early and Middle Adolescence." This course will be very much worth while for teachers of boys and girls between the ages of twelve and seventeen. Mrs. McArde will offer a course in "Workshop." This course should appeal particularly to superintendents of Sunday Schools, superintendents of departments, presidents of young people's organizations and presidents of any church organization.

Miss Keene will offer a course in "Story Telling." This course makes its biggest appeal to teachers in the Beginners, Primary and Junior departments.

All four members of the faculty have had years of special training for their particular fields. This same faculty with the exception of Dr. Ormond is just closing a successful school at Sanford, and most of this faculty was engaged in a school in Fayetteville the week preceding.

While the school is being sponsored by the Methodist Church, it is non-sectarian in character, none of the courses to be offered have anything to do with doctrines. In fact one of the teachers, Mrs. McArde, is a member of the Christian Church, and workers from all churches are invited to be present and take advantage of the opportunity offered.

There is no charge for the course. The only expense involved will be the purchase of one text-book.

The school will continue through Friday night of next week, six sessions in all.

Alleged Murderer Expects Shoot Quail This State Soon

Greensboro, N. C., Oct. 16.—(INS)—"I will be down this winter to shoot quail."

This was the way Henry Stevens, one of the four persons held in jail at New Brunswick, N. J., in the Halls-Mill's murder investigation, climaxed a letter to Deputy Sheriff Burray Benbow.

The letter stated that he knew nothing about the murders of the rector and his pretty choir singer and was written from his cell by Stevens. "I wish the case could be tried in North Carolina. I could get justice there," he said.

Enclosed was check to Deputy Benbow for keeping watch over the game preserve and hunting lodge near here which is owned by Stevens and his associates.

Stevens is a crack huntsman and has many friends in this section who are watching with interest the developments of the sensational murder case.

VETERANS OF THE CONFEDERACY IN MEET IN RALEIGH

Veterans Association Will Urge Next Leg- islature to Grant Pension of \$1 Per Day

Raleigh, Oct. 16.—(AP)—A handful of veterans of the Confederate Army gathered in the hall of the State Senate here today to lay plans for another campaign—to secure a pension from the state of \$1 per day for the few thousand remaining men in North Carolina who followed the fortune of the South in the bitter sixties.

General W. A. Smith, of Ansonville, commander of the N. C. Confederate Veterans, presided over the meeting, which was well attended by sons and daughters and state officials.

The meeting was opened by Mark Ervin, of Asheville, who declared that North Carolina, despite its wonderful progress along material lines, still stood at the bottom in providing pensions for the wearers of the Grey.

WOMEN DEPUTY SHERIFF GUARDS MECKLENBURG JURY

Charlotte, Oct. 15. (AP)—Miss Maude Little is one of the few women in North Carolina ever to have twelve men, most of them married and got away with it.

And Miss Little possesses no other charm that the title of Deputy Sheriff. It all came about like this.

Sheriff Little happened to be available when all the male deputies were engaged in court duties, so she was asked to take charge of the jury, conduct the twelve members to their hotel and back again when they decided they couldn't agree and didn't try to escape or discuss the case with outsiders, while the jurors expressed themselves as well pleased with their guardian.

Average of \$32.03 Yesterday Was the Highest of Season; Week's Average \$30.78 Per Hundred Pounds

The Greenville Tobacco Market is believed to have broken the world's record yesterday when four sets of buyers bought 1,113,330 pounds in a single day's sales. The total amount paid for yesterday's sales was \$356,629.87, or an average price of \$32.03 per hundred pounds, the highest average reached during the present season.

Yesterday's sales, according to official figures made public today by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade, brought the week's total sales to 3,764,150 pounds for \$1,158,743.28, averaging \$30.78 per hundred pounds. Total sales for the season to date are 21,752,385 for \$5,844,001.52 average \$26.86 per hundred pounds.

Last year's sales for the corresponding week were 2,497,284 pounds at an average of \$27.63, while the season's sales last year for the corresponding period were 15,765,268.

According to all report it was a great day on the market yesterday and only by untiring efforts were the buyers able to complete the purchase of the last pile before the light of the day faded away. Beginning half an hour earlier than the regular schedule the buyers faced what was apparently an impossible task and when the noon hour was reached a ten minute rest, a sandwich, and they were at it a gain. When the auctioneer knocked out the final sale of the day the clock showed the time to be thirty minutes past the usual closing hour, but the seemingly impossible had been accomplished and the market had avoided a block.

Wilson Market Sets New Record

Wilson, N. C., Oct. 16.—Sales on the Wilson tobacco market yesterday established what is believed to be a new world's record for daily sales when 1,423,636 pounds of the golden weed sold for \$372,057.09, averaging \$26.13 per hundred pounds.

The previous world's record for daily sales was established on the Wilson market in 1922 when 1,410,000 pounds were sold.

Yesterday's sales brought the total thus far this season to 26,613,794 pounds with receipts totalling \$6,835,731.62.

LIMIT NUMBER OF CATHOLIC PRIESTS

Calles Submits Proposed Regulations Limiting Number of Priests and Ministers

Mexico City, Oct. 16.—(AP)—President Calles has submitted to Congress proposed regulations limiting the number of Catholic priests and ministers of every denomination permitted to function in each federal district to 90 for each nomination.

It is estimated that there are 350 Catholic priests at present in the federal district and 40 ministers of all other religious denominations.

COMMENT"THE HISTORIC AND
PROPHETIC COMINGS
OF CHRIST"

I Cor. 1:7—"Waiting for
the coming of our Lord
Jesus Christ."

It is natural, when we
think of the historical com-
ing of Christ, that we also
look forward to His coming
again. The old English col-
lect most beautifully ex-
presses it: "Thy Son Jesus
Christ came to visit us in
great humility.....in the
last day, when He shall come
again in His glorious maj-
esty to judge both the quick
and the dead."

1. Now, the historic com-
ing of Christ is better estab-
lished than any other fact
of human knowledge. No
secular fact in history is at-
tested by evidence equal to
that which proves that
"Christ Jesus came into the
world."

The battle of Marathon,
for instance, in which Milti-
ades defeated the Persians
who outnumbered his forces
ten to one, and which
brought fame and immortali-
ty to Greek arms, is accept-
ed on the simple testimony
of Herodotus. It was one
of the turning-points of the
world's history and consid-
ered by itself would seem
unbelievable. But it fits into
other historic events, and
has been handed down as
fact in every age, and we
all accept it as true today.
The coming of Jesus is his-
torically proved by four
evangelists; by the estab-
lishment of the church, of
the Lord's Day, of the Sac-
raments; and by a mass of
corroborative references in
the writings of heathen au-
thors, in Roman edicts, and
contemporary history.

No other event can be so
easily proved.

2. The Scriptures repeat-
edly tell us that Jesus is
coming again. The phrase
so often heard, "the second
coming of Jesus" is both
misleading and unscriptural.
The New Testament does
not speak of His "second
coming," but only of His
"coming again."

There are at least five
"returns" of Jesus referred
to in the Gospels.

(1). The coming when
there will be "signs in the
sun and moon and upon the
earth distress of nations....
men's hearts failing them

for fear." (S. Luke 21:15).
(2). His coming within
that generation "not to call
the righteous, but sinners
to repentance." (S. Luke
15:32).

(3). The coming at His
Resurrection.

(4). His coming as the
Holy Spirit, "I will not leave
you comfortless, I will come
to you."

(5). His coming at the
death of a disciple, "I will
come again and receive you
unto myself."

The New Testament teach-
es repeated or continuous
"comings" of Christ, rather
than one second coming.

Jesus may be said to have
come again in the year A. D.
70, when the centres of
Jewish life and religion
were struck out of exist-
ence, and Jerusalem fell,
"and great was the fall of
it." Yet, even then, men
saw the Kingdom of Heav-
en coming with power. An-
cient moulds of thought
were broken in men's minds
as completely as were the
walls of the city and tem-
ple; and the scattered Jews
with their Old Testament
culture prepared a way for
Christ in the very heart of
heathendom.

Jesus came again at the
fall of the Roman Empire.
Modes of custom and stereo-
typed thought were again
broken up, and fresh entry
for the truth was made. One
of the direct results was an
outburst of missionary fer-
vor on the part of the church
bringing Christ to the bar-
barians of northern Europe,
and His great return to the
souls of men everywhere.

In the 12th century out
of the deserts of Arabia
there poured out a torrent
of God-intoxicated Fanat-
icism, when the hosts of Mo-
hammed fell in judgment on
a corrupt Christian culture,
and bathed whole nations in
blood. It was a time of un-
paralleled horror. Yet among
its results were diffusion of
learning—the Renaissance—
leading straight to the
Reformation, and thus a
still wider way was made
for Christ in the world.

Thus, also, the French
Revolution led to the free-
dom of slaves, and to the
modern social passion—
bringing Christ into fresh
contact with the poor and
needy.

And the great world war
through which we have
passed may be looked upon
as another coming of Christ.
It has liberated humanity
for new and larger ideas; as
General Smuts said, "Hu-
manity has struck its tents
and is again on the march."
The passing of the old order
fields hope and opportunity
for the new.

3. Of course there is to
be a FINAL COMING to
this dispensation, when "He
shall come again to judge
both the quick and the dead."

New Mexico
Campaign Brings
Serious Charge Gov.

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 16.
(INS)—Charges that Governor
A. T. Hannett and the Democr-
atic leadership sought to disfran-
chise thousands of Spanish-Amer-
ican voters feature Republican
campaign attacks during pre-
election week in New Mexico.

The so-called Hannett election
code was made the issue through
which Republican voiced asser-
tions that the governor's reputed
attempt at election law reform
were in fact nothing but an effort
to impose voting restrictions that
would prevent a large restriction
that would prevent a large por-
tion of Spanish-Americans from
casting their ballots.

The election code was framed
last winter by a committee of
three Democrats and three Re-
publicans and contained the pro-
vision that voters should mark
their ballots without assistance
unless physically incapable of do-
ing so.

The Governor promised to call
a special session of the legislature
to enact the law if assured of its
passage. The Republican senate
members refused to approve it,
and the legislature was not called.

Richard C. Dillon, of Encino,
sheepman and merchant, is the
Republican nominee for governor
opposing Governor Hannett, who
broke a precedent in the state by
winning the re-nomination, and
running for a second term. Dillon
has served in the state senate and
has made his campaign on prom-
ises of a business like administra-
tion.

Congressman John Morrow is a
candidate for re-election on the
Democratic ticket and is opposed
by Juan Sedillo, youthful su-
preme court reporter. The state
has but one representative in
congress.

No vacancy occurs in the senate
until 1928 when the term of Sen-
ator A. A. Jones, Las Vegas, Dem-
ocrat, expires.

No echo of national issue has
been heard in the state campaign
candidates, confirming themselves
entirely to discussion of local
policies. Prohibition was not an
issue, altho a ruling of the supreme
court last winter held unconstitu-
tional the state enforcement act,
leaving Volstead act enforcement
entirely to federal officers.

Next to the governor's greatest
interest centered about the office
of state land commissioner. Ed
Swope, an appointee of Governor
Hannett's is seeking re-election
on his record and Benjamin F.
Pankey, Santa Fe, prominent cat-
tleman, is opposing him on the
Republican ticket. The state
land commissioner has control of
the state's vast land holdings and
his position carries with it enor-
mous power over the economic
status of sheepmen, cattlemen
and farmers who lease or purchase
state lands.

Two women oppose each other
for secretary of state; for the
Democratic Miss Jennie Fortune
Coccorro; for the Republican,
Miss Mary Bartolino, Raton.

Representatives of organized
labor put their organizations on
record officially early in the cam-
paign, as endorsing the Democ-
ratic ticket with the exception of
two candidates, Judge C. R. Bice
for supreme court, and Mrs. Au-
rora White for school superintend-
ent. Republican candidates en-
dorsed were Justice John C. Wat-
son, incumbent, and Miss Lois
Randolph Ga lup.

Business. Brief remarks regarding their work were made by Mrs. E. M. Davis, of Wilson, state treasurer; Miss Annie Perkins, of Farmville state secretary; and Miss Tabitha de Visconti of Farmville.

The reports of the different clubs were full of helpful suggestions, and the achievements of many of them were marvellous, proving, indeed, that "woman-power has never been measured."

Miss Violet Alexander gave a splendid report of the work of Home Demonstration clubs of Beaufort county.

A telegram of sympathy was sent to Miss Pauline Smith, district agent of Home Demonstration clubs, who was prevented by sickness from being present.

"Mother Cotten" preached a short sermon worthy of emulation by every woman who heard it. She said, "I love women, I

love to talk to them, and to talk about them, but I never say anything bad about them. If they are bad, I try to make them better; if they are good, I try to make them better." She urged all women to adopt her hobby—citizenship—and asked them to stand solidly behind the Public Welfare work of which Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson is head.

Mrs. E. L. McKee, federation president, made a very business-like address, explaining for one "survey of women in industry in North Carolina" was necessary. There are 170,000 women employed in industry in N. C., and their condition in labor has been given a very low standard nationally. No statistics are available, either to affirm or to refute charges. We have only three state laws regulating employment of women, 17 for a sixty hour week, seats for employees and separate toilets for sexes and races.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

San Francisco, Oct. 15, (INS)—Two brothers, Leonard Franklin, 94 and Merritt Birdsall Case, 87, sons of Reuben Case, who served in the Revolutionary war, have just been admitted to membership in the California Society of Sons of the American Revolution, according to Major Leon French, secretary of the organization.

The two aged men, who reside in Los Angeles, are believed to be the only living "Revolution sons" in the world. Both brothers have a clear recollection of their father's statements as to his participation in the Revolutionary War. Mere Birdsall Case is a veteran of the Civil War.

Exactly 30,382 deaths were reported in California during the first six months of 1926. L. E. Ross, chief of the state bureau of vital statistics has just announced.

Diseases of the circulatory system led as a cause of death during that period with a toll of 6399. Tuberculosis was responsible for 3187 and death of violence, including murder, accidents and suicides, totaled 2197.

Three thousand employees of the San Francisco public school department are included in a blanket industrial accident insurance policy to be taken out in the State Compensation Insurance Fund. It was announced recently following adoption by the Board of education of a resolution providing for such insurance. The board heretofore was a self-insurer.

The cost of the insurance is approximately \$10,000 a year. The

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list of insured includes 2600 of school teachers, 240 janitors and all office employees of the department.

Flat feet and color blindness are the most prevalent physical faults among the men students of the University of California.

This fact was revealed by Dr. Robert T. Legge, head of the university infirmary, who has supervised examination of 1821 freshmen this semester.

Aside from these defects the freshmen were found to be on the whole physically fit when the judge by one of the highest standards, the regulation army examination.

Only 202 or 11 per cent, were rejected as unfit, whereas in the first draft made by the United States war department the percentage was 35.

Good physical training and sports programs in the high schools of California are held responsible by Dr. Legge for the high degree of physical fitness evidenced by the young men.

The ancient theory that toast and crusts are healthful has just been exploded by Dr. Agnes Fay Morgan, chairman of the household science department of the University of California.

As the result of experiments carried on by Dr. Morgan she announces that toast and crust are not as good for one as are plain bread and untoasted cereals.

Her experiments have shown Dr. Morgan says, that the biological value of the cereal protein was changed by dry heat. Dr. Morgan advises that no toast be given to children until they are about 5 or 6 years in age.

County officials then raised the hunting license to \$5.25, adding the amount charged to the outsider and the amount previously paid by residents, together and set a standard for everybody.

Radio Products Show Big Increase

Washington, D. C., Oct. 16, (AP)—An increase of 215.5 per cent in the value of radio products manufactured in the United States in 1925 over 1923 was shown by figures made public by the Department of Commerce here today.

The tremendous increase in the radio industry was reflected in the tabulations disclosing that \$170,390,575 worth of radio products were placed on the market last year as against 1923, the same period the number of tube-type sets increased from 190,374 to 2,180,622, a percentage rise of 1045.4 indicating that prices for individual sets have dropped greatly with the increased volume. A notable increase was also shown in the manufacture of radio tubes for the two years under comparison. The production in 1925 of only 4,687,400 was dwarfed by an output of 23,934,658 in 1925.

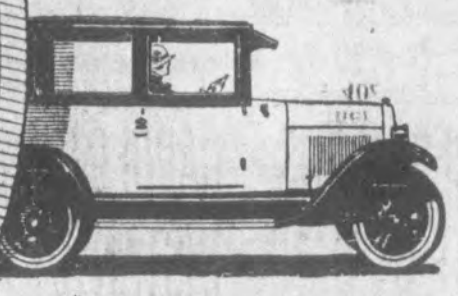
