NORTH CAROLINA VOTERS TO POLLS ON TOMORROW

Gruelling Two Weeks Battle of Oratory Comes to Definite Close Tonight

Raleigh, Nov. 1.—North Carolina's gruelling two week battle of oratory will come to an official close tonight, and tomorrow voters will trek to the polls and choose a United States Senator, eight Congressmen, and a score of state and county officials.

Although there is no outstanding issue in the election, the campaign has been anything but lukewarm, and it is expected that the largest number of persons ever to be aroused to the voting point by an off-year election in North Carolina, will assert themselves at the polls.

Realizing the lack of a vitally important issue, both Democratic and Republican camps are attempting to bring out the largest number of voters possible tomorrow in order to clinch the election. In bringing out the voters, they both concede, lies victory.

Paramount interest is focused on the Senatorial race between Senator Lee S. Overman, veteran Democratic leader, and Johnson J. Hayes, chief of standard bearer of North Carolina Republicans. The Democrats boast of carrying in excess of their 80 counties in 1924, while the Republicans claim 25.

The chief concern of both camps, however, is the election of eight Congressmen. Two of the Democratic incumbents—Lindsay C. Warren and John H. Kerr, of the first and second districts, are unopposed.

In the Congressional race are where the surprises, if any, are scheduled to break. Close races have been known in the west, particularly in the eighth and tenth districts.

Charles L. Abernethy, (D) is opposed by Rosco Butler in the Third; Edward W. Pou (D) by Robert Brantley (R) in the Fourth; Charles M. Stedman (D) by O. C. Durland (R) in the Fifth; H. C. Lyon (D) by Lemon Baggett (R) in the Sixth; Wm. C. Hammer (D) by S. C. Williams (R) in the Seventh; R. L. Doughton (D) by O. F. Pool (R) in the Eighth; A. L. Bulwinkle (D) by G. D. Bailey (R), in the Ninth; and Zeb Weaver (D) by R. K. Smathers (R), in the Tenth.

Four Supreme Court Justices 11 Superior Court Judges, a member of the Corporation Commission, a legislature, and hundreds of county officers will be filled.

The Pennsylvania sash fund probe, the South's cotton crisis, and "Republican Prosperity" have been among the divers matters which have been threshed out on the stump. National political records have been reviewed, lauded and attacked. Here and there came a splash of the wet-dry issue. While the evolution question wreaked its fury on a few of the State's 100 counties. These, however, were injected into only a few of the county contests.

PRINCE NICHOLAS NOT IN AMERICAN MARRIAGE MARKET

"There are plenty—and of good stock, too," the youthful prince answered.

NOVEMBER TERM CRIMINAL COURT STARTED TODAY

Four Murder Cases Among Those to Be Heard Before Judge Sinclair During This Week

With a docket of more than a hundred cases, Superior Court, for the trial of criminal cases got under way here this morning with Judge N. A. Sinclair presiding. Mayor D. M. Clark, of this city, was acting solicitor, owing to the absence of Solicitor Jesse H. Davis who is taking an active part in the campaign in Craven county and will not arrive in this city until Wednesday.

As soon as the morning session got under way several short cases were called for hearing and three were disposed of before the noon adjournment. The judge's charge to the grand jury was postponed until this afternoon.

Among the cases to come up for hearing this week are four murder cases and while a calendar for all cases had not been set at the noon hour, it was announced that two of the murder cases would be heard on Wednesday and two on Thursday.

The case against Edward Evans and Francis Johnson, charged with murder, has been set for Wednesday. This case will no doubt attract large crowds to the court room as all the parties concerned are well known here. The case against Elmer McLawhorn is also set for Wednesday. The two murder cases set for Thursday are those against Major Adams and B. Hugh Highsmith.

During this morning's session Alonzo Moore pleaded guilty to possessing liquor and was sentenced to serve six months on the roads. Ollie Gorham was found guilty on a charge of attempting to drive an automobile while he was intoxicated and was given a three months road term. Clifton Fornes, charged with abandonment, was given a suspended sentence upon payment of costs.

FAMOUS HOUDINI DIED YESTERDAY

Death Came as a Result of Appendicitis; Be Buried Beside Mother in New York

Detroit, Nov. 1.—(INS)—The body of Harry Houdini famous magician, who died yesterday afternoon, will be buried beside his mother in a New York City cemetery.

Operated on last Monday for appendicitis, three days after his appendix had burst, Houdini became the victim of streptococcal peritonitis, from which recovery is rare.

A special pallman has been chartered by Mrs. Houdini. The train will leave at 7:10 p. m. today.

The remains will arrive at the Grand Central station at 9:30 a. m. Tuesday. In New York the body will be taken to the West End Funeral Parlor.

The body will rest in the special airtight bronze coffin which Houdini recently had made to prove his contention that anyone could live without air for an hour if they did not let fear overcome them.

It was Houdini's expressed wish that he be buried in this coffin.

Cocaine Dealers Get Two Years

NAVY'S HOPE FOR VICTORY DIMMED BY CONANT'S DEATH

Slated Contender in Schneider Cup Race Killed in Plane Crash Saturday

Washington, Nov. 1.—(INS)—The Navy's hope for victory in the Schneider Cup races on November 11 was dimmed today by the death of Lt. Frank H. Conant, Jr., one of the service's crack racing pilots.

Conant was killed Saturday afternoon in an airplane accident. Considerable mystery surrounded his death. His wrecked plane was found in 12 feet of water near the Hampton Roads Naval Base. The engine was missing. Officials believe that Conant was flying low at a high rate of speed when the plane's undergear snagged in a fish net.

Funeral services for Conant will be held here tomorrow.

The Italian team which will compete against the Navy for the Schneider Cup has arrived in the country for practice spins.

Rear Admiral Moffett today designated Lt. C. C. Champion to succeed Conant in the races.

ROUMANIAN QUEEN RUBS ELBOWS WITH FARMERS TODAY

Discusses Problems With Western Farmers Who Are Guests on Her Special Train Today

Aboard Queen Marie's Special Train (in the Northwest), Nov. 1.—(INS)—Queen Marie, of Roumania, rubbed elbows today with "just folks," the typical American farmer and his wife.

While her million-dollar train sped through the fertile lands of North Dakota a dozen real farmers and their wives on the soil boarded at each stop and chatted with her majesty until the next stop.

It was the appointed day of freedom for Queen Marie in which she was to do what she wished and see whom she chose. Her majesty began it with a royal proclamation that high hats were "out" for this day at least. She expressed the desire to meet and talk with the back-bone of America, and later to ride with the cowboys at Medora in the heart of North Dakota. "Bad Lands" where a rodeo will be staged.

An escort of honor from the State American Legion accompanied the Queen through the North Dakota tour. Governor A. G. Sorlie, was to board the train at Bismarck and instruct her majesty in cooperative marketing and agricultural problems.

North Dakota Indians in tribal costume performed an Indian dance for the royal party at Mandan and presented the Queen with an Indian bonnet.

Quake Shocks Felt At Denver Today

Denver, Nov. 1.—(INS)—Violent earth shocks of one hour and seven minutes duration were recorded on the seismograph at Regis College, early today, according to Father A. W. Forestall, seismologist, who declared the shocks as severe as those of last Saturday.

The disturbance started at 5:43 and reached its maximum at 5:51, and ended at 6:30.

The shock was of the second magnitude, estimated at about 1,500 miles in a westerly direction, probably off the coast of Oregon.

SOMERVILLE GETS READY FOR TRIAL HALL-MILLS CASE

Murders of Four Years Ago to Be Aired in Court By Over One Hundred Witnesses

Somerville, N. J., Nov. 1.—(INS)—Eleventh hour preparations were being made here today for the staging of the Hall-Mills murder trial—one of the most famous criminal cases of the generation.

The trial begins Wednesday morning. Today, normally quiet Somerville was agitated with excitement. Every train brought more reporters, special writers, lawyers and camera men. On all sides there was an air of expectation.

Counsel for the defense announced that all three defendants, Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall and her brothers, Willie and Henry Stevens, will take the stand. They are to go on trial for the murder of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills.

It was reported this morning that the defense will concentrate a heavy fire on Mrs. Jane Gibson, the "big woman," whose story is the backbone of the prosecution. She claims to have been at the scene the night the murders were committed in De Russes's Lane near New Brunswick, N. J., September 14, 1922. The defense is said to have collected much material bearing on Mrs. Gibson's past life.

The trial will be broadcast to the world by a hundred or more reporters. The court room, which seats only 278 persons, will be taxed to its capacity. The Telegraph companies have made arrangements to send out as much as half a million words a day. A radio company will broadcast the news of the trial from across the street from the court house.

The prosecution's case is practically completed. State Senator Alexander Simpson, who conducted the revived investigation of the four-year-old murders, indicated he expected the jury would be selected the first day and that the taking of testimony would get under way quickly.

Subpoenas have been issued for 102 witnesses. Twenty-five additional subpoenas were to be issued today, bringing the total to 127.

Seven Killed and Seven Hurt When Truck Hits Trolley

BOTH PARTIES CLAIM VICTORY ELECTION EVE

Pre-Election Prophecies Give Control of Next Senate to the Democratic Party

New York, Nov. 1.—Devoid of outstanding national issues, yet replete with bitter sectional contests, the off-year campaign came to a close today with the leaders on both sides making their customary extravagant claims of victory—and secretly hoping for the best and fearing for the worst.

A surface indication points to Democratic gains in Congress, although it would take a drift of almost landslide proportions to give the party actual control of either house.

The Democrats, however, can hardly escape emerging from tomorrow's balloting without material gains. Their present strength in Congress is almost their irreducible minimum, and it is the history of off-year elections that the pendulum swings away from the party in power, hence they are in the fortunate position of standing to lose nothing and of gaining much.

The Democrats admittedly stand an excellent chance of capturing the Senate. There are 27 Republican seats at stake tomorrow, and if they can take nine of them they can organize the upper house to the confusion of the administration for the next two years.

In the House, the Democratic chances are not considered so good. To gain control there it would be necessary for them to reclaim 25 seats now held by Republicans and even the most optimistic of the minority leaders privately do not think this is probable.

Popular and political interest centers in the Senate fight, for it is there the battle lines are most closely drawn and the results of incalculable importance to the Presidential campaign of 1928.

It is not improbable that the control of the Senate of the seventieth Congress will hinge upon the outcome of Senate contests on half a dozen states—New York, Massachusetts, Ohio, Missouri, Oregon and Illinois.

Of the 34 seats at stake tomorrow, but seven are Democratic. They are all in the Solid South, and can be written off as remaining Democratic.

Of the 27 left, all now held by Republicans, an even dozen are generally conceded to the Republicans—Connecticut, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kansas, California, Vermont, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, North and South Dakota and Washington.

The 15 remaining are classified as "doubtful" in that the Democrats have good or indifferent chances of winning.

In five of these states—Maryland, Kentucky, Arizona, Missouri and Oklahoma—the Democrats are considered to have an edge. All are border states, more often Democratic than Republican, and the incumbents are those who rode with Harding in the landslide of 1920.

In five others, the Republicans are conceded to have the edge—Indiana, Utah, Nevada, Colorado and Idaho. These states are all normally Republican.

Thus the fight narrows, in the opinion of most neutral observers to a small handful of states, of which New York, Illinois, Massachusetts and Ohio are the outstanding.

A comparison of the privately expressed opinion, of both Republican and Democratic leaders show the consensus to be that the Democrats will gain probably six seats in the Senate and a dozen to fifteen in the House. In either case, it is short of control—a situation that is more pleasing to some Democratic leaders than actual control. Control would mean the Democrats would have to organize both houses, and not a few of the leaders are not keen about the responsibility in the face of Presidential campaign, now only

ANOTHER ASSAULT ON MUSSOLINI WAS MADE YESTERDAY

Assailant Lynched; Steps Being Taken to Round Up Others in Conspiracy

Rome, Nov. 1.—(INS)—While the mutilated body of the youth who attempted to shoot Premier Mussolini lies in Bologna today, three other would-be assassins lie in jail awaiting trial for their attempts to kill the Duce.

Major Zaniboni, who is alleged to have planned to shoot Mussolini while he made a speech from the balcony of Chigi Palace, on November 5, 1925, will probably go to trial during the latter part of this month or the first of next.

The public prosecutor has recently announced that he will ask for the trial of the Hon. Violet Gibson, the English woman of noble birth, who shot at the Premier on April 7, 1926. And who has been believed to be insane.

Gino Lucetti, who is alleged to have hurled a bomb at the Premier's automobile in Rome on September 11, 1926, also awaits trial.

Rome, Nov. 1.—(INS)—Two powder-burned holes near the arm of his coat—one in the front and one in the back—today were the only visible evidence about Premier Benito Mussolini that he had passed within an inch of death at Bologna yesterday at the hands of a youthful assassin. It was the fourth attempt on the life of the Premier during the present year, and the sixth such attempt since he assumed power four years ago.

Calm, as on the occasion of the previous attempts, the only cognizance the Premier took of the murderous attack was to announce:

"I earnestly believe that God has me in His keeping."

London, Nov. 1.—(INS)—A large number of persons have been arrested in Bologna for investigation in connection with yesterday's attempt on the life of Premier Mussolini, according to a dispatch to the Central News.

Rome, Nov. 1.—An appeal to Fascist to strike down those who planned and organized yesterday's attempter assassination of Premier Mussolini was issued today by the Fascist party Secretariat.

A message to all blackshirts, sent out by the secretary of the Fascist party said:

"The criminal has been lynched on the spot. The first act of justice has been accomplished. It now remains to strike down the accomplices."

The assassination attempt was the result of a well defined plot, it was learned today.

On Friday, it was disclosed, the Bologna police seized numerous copies of a manifesto which had been placarded throughout the city in a mysterious fashion carrying a hint that the Premier would not leave Bologna alive.

Discovery of this placard aroused the police and most elaborate (Continued on page six)

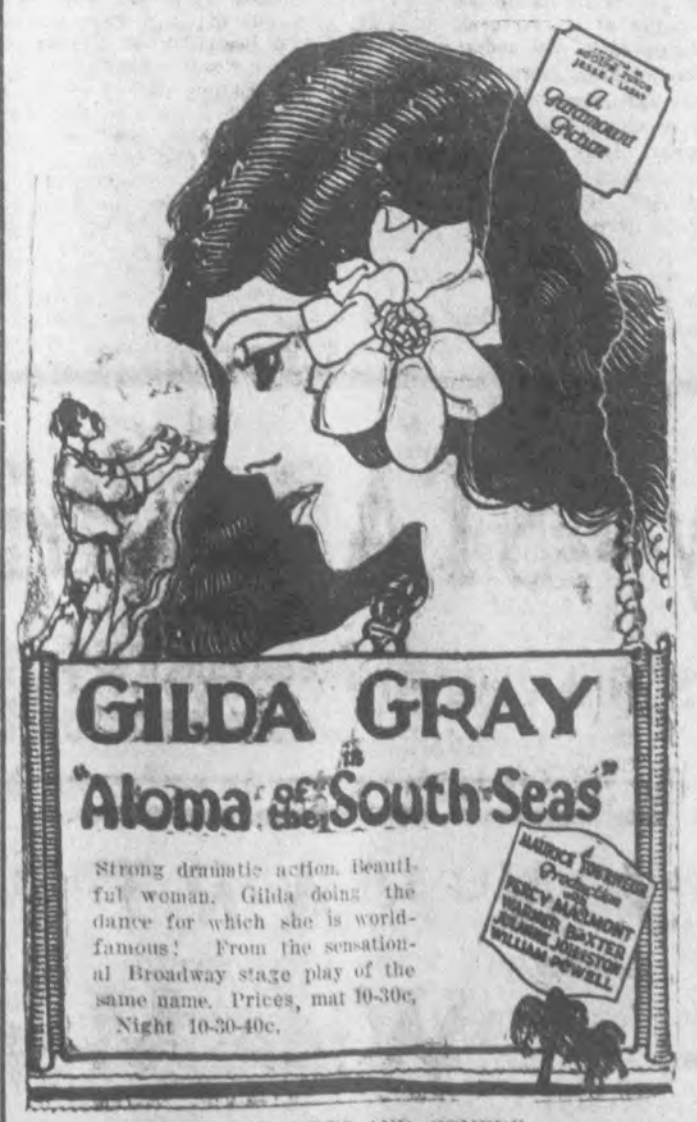

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DANGEROUS PASTIME

Boys will be boys and we expect them to be, but one of the forms of amusement now being enjoyed by the youngsters of this city will end in serious injury to or the death of some lad if steps are not taken by parents or by city authorities to put a stop to it. The sport to which we refer is that of trailing. Throughout our city there are those children who have no idea of the dangers that accompany the putting on of a pair of roller skates and then swinging to the back of an automobile or some other vehicle. Traffic conditions in our city are such that it is exceedingly dangerous for the children to engage in any form of amusement on the streets, but this swinging to passing automobiles is probably one of the most dangerous and parents are urged to warn the children against these dangers and see to it that they do not flirt with death in this manner.

A LAST APPEAL

Tomorrow is election day and we take advantage of this last opportunity to again impress upon the minds of the citizens of our county their duty to their county, state and nation. We reiterate that to vote is not only a privilege but a profound duty of every citizen and those who fail to cast a ballot tomorrow are failing in one of their duties of citizenship.

Regardless of the number of votes cast in our primaries, our county is ranked politically in the state and nation on the basis of the vote cast in the regular election, and if our county is to take its proper place among the counties of our state and nation the citizens must rally to the polls tomorrow and cast their ballots.

Not only are the men who are to run our county, state and nation to be chosen at tomorrow's election, but there are certain issues of vital importance to our state to be decided. As a citizen you are interested in the two amendments that are to be voted upon, and it is your duty to express your desires in the matter.

The recent world war was fought to make the world safe for democracy and those who refused to respond to the call to the colors were branded slackers and were rightly looked down upon by the good citizens of our nation. Tomorrow's election is another call to the colors to preserve a

representative form of government in our state and nation, and those who refuse to answer the call are the slackers of 1926 and should be regarded as such by all good citizens.

DIVERSIFICATION ONLY HOPE

The low price of cotton and high price of tobacco this season has brought forth expression from all sections that next year a goodly portion of the cotton acreage will go into the production of tobacco. In the face of the present prices such a step might appear a wise one at first glance, but if the farmers will pause for just a moment to think what it means, they will immediately realize that such action on their part would be ruinous for all concerned. An overproduction of tobacco next year would do to the tobacco prices what the record cotton crop this year has done for the cotton prices, and the inevitable result would be bankruptcy for the entire tobacco growing section.

We are convinced that the cotton acreage of this and every other cotton state must be considerably decreased if the farmers expect to receive a living price for their product but in carrying out the reduction program we urge the farmers not to put this additional acreage in tobacco. More diversified farming is the only hope for the agriculturists of our state, and the wise farmer is the one who next year will produce the majority of his own supplies and not put his entire time, effort and dependence in his money crop.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—(INS)—There is plenty of evidence to show that surgery had reached a high plane of development among the ancients, according to Dr. Robert V. Dolbey, professor of surgery at the University of Cairo, a guest of the University of California.

Bones of Greek soldiers recently exhumed from the site of a modern apartment house in Alexandria, Dr. Dolbey said, disclosed that the surgeons who cared for the Macedonian pike men of Alexander the Great were of the very best, and the results they achieved in repairing fractured bones were as good as modern surgeons can expect.

There were few cases of ununited fractures in the bones of even the mercenary troops of the great Greek military genius, Dr. Dolbey declared.

There is also evidence to show that anesthetics were known to the Egyptians of old, Dr. Dolbey announced. They were not familiar with modern ether, to be sure, the University of Cairo surgeon said, but they achieved somewhat the same result by inhaling the fumes of brandy, oakum and mandagora.

Dr. Wolbey revealed that he and a group of associated scientists are carrying on a study of medical knowledge of the Egyptians of 4000 to 5000 years ago.

California ranks sixth in the list of salt producing states and the port of San Francisco, which includes all docks around the bay, ranks second only to Buffalo in salt exports, according to statistics just made public.

In California salt making is largely confined to Alameda county, across the bay from San Francisco. The first plant in the state was opened in Alameda, Alameda county, in 1862, and since that time more than 30 companies have operated in that county. Salt is found in all forms in California. Send Destroyer to Protect Amerigans

Washington, Nov. 1.—(INS)—The American Government has dispatched a destroyer from Bluefield, Nicaragua, to Ceiba, Honduras, to protect American interests following a revolt there last Wednesday.

The destroyer, it was announced at the state department today, left Bluefield Friday night. The revolt was led by prisoners in the penitentiary at Ceiba, who were aided by soldiers. Government forces were routed, the jail and the entire town seized, and the court house burned.

A truce was established and order restored through the efforts of American Consul Evans.

Advises to the government here, however, indicate that while the Honduras government is in control it is feared that there may be a slight outbreak at any time. It was in anticipation of such a situation that this government dispatched the destroyer.

Authorities Seek Maniac Bent On Blowing Up Bank

New York, Nov. 1.—(INS)—Hundreds of detectives are searching today for a maniac armed with a pint bottle of nitro-glycerine, who is bent on getting a satchel full of money even if he has to blow up a bank to do it. Detectives are stationed in every bank in the city.

The "demon crank" made his first appearance Friday at the East Forty-second street branch of the National City Bank. He carried a satchel and after displaying the bottle of liquid death, thrust a note through the paying teller's window. The note read:

"The bottle in my hand contains enough nitro-glycerine to blow up this building. Don't call any guards and don't draw your gun. It will do you no good. Give me all the \$1,000 notes and the \$100 bills that will fill this bag. I am suffering from a terrible disease and need money to hire a doctor."

"Again I warn you to give me at least fifteen minutes' start when I leave here. Don't have anyone follow me on the street, for if I drop the bottle on the street the resultant explosion will cause a greater loss of life than it would here."

The teller asked the man to wait and left his cage. When he returned the man had disappeared.

FAMOUS FRENCH RECIPES

Paris, Nov. 1.—(INS)—Delicious cheese croquettes have the name of "Annette" in French kitchens.

The night before make a very thick white sauce, called Bechamel, with cheese and cream. Season well, adding a bit of paprika. Mix in chopped mushrooms cooked in butter. Let cool in a shallow dish.

The next day, divide the paste into small parts. Roll in the form of croquettes, bread them and fry in boiling fat. They should be brown and crisp outside but soft in the interior.

Serve hot with fried parsley and slices of lemon.

DIES IN LEAP FROM AUTOMOBILE

Detroit, Nov. 1.—(INS)—The beautiful well dressed young woman who died in a leap from the car, was identified today as Mrs. Virginia Fink, a cabaret entertainer, wife of an actor living in Chicago. A policeman who saw her girl fall to the Oakwood bridge over the river Rouge pursued her companion for half a mile, firing shots at the speeding car but the driver escaped. Mrs. Fink wore four valuable diamond rings, but had no money. Her skull and the entire upper portion of her face were crushed.

GOVERNMENT TRACT IN PITTSBURGH TO BE SOLD AT AUCTION

Washington, Oct. 31.—(INS)—A tract of land in the heart of Pittsburgh's industrial district that has been the property of the United States government for more than a century will go on the auction block Nov. 10.

The War Department today announced that it will sell the Pittsburgh storage and supply depot under authority of an act of the last session of congress. The tract embraces 16-2-3 acres on the Allegheny River front on which have been erected more than 20 buildings of brick, stone and concrete, railroad sidings, etc.

Central Texas are unusually adapted for the lighting effect required by many big feature productions. According to J. H. Jarboe, of the United States Weather Bureau, the white, fleecy Texas clouds, because of the absence of moisture and its accompanying density, are more conducive to good lighting effect than the heavier, denser clouds of the Golden States. The Texas clouds, he says, permits the sun's rays to penetrate them, making a softer lighting effect for motion picture photography.

LEAD AND SILVER MINING BE REVIVED BLACK HILLS; PROSPECTING IS STARTED

Hot Springs, S. D., Nov. 1.—(INS)—Revival of mining in the Black Hills, which has been forecast by several movements in mining circles during the past year, are centering in action which has taken place recently.

ORMISTON'S TRUNK
Los Angeles, Nov. 1.—(INS)—
Contents of Kenneth G. Ormiston's
trunk, containing dresses,
robes, shoes, and dainty lingerie

The woman evangelist, her

Pherson.

The state contends that Mrs.
McPherson, who says she was
kidnapped and taken to Mexico
spent a part of the time she was
missing with Ormiston, former
radio operator at Angeles Tem-
ple, and that her story of being
kidnapped, while her followers
thought her drowned, was not-

ing but a hoax.

Keyes will also attempt to prove
that the clothes found in Ormiston's
trunk belonged to Mrs. Mc-
Pherson.

Meanwhile, Mrs. McPherson
charges a Los Angeles newspaper
of bringing the trunk angle, as
well as the "Jackie" love letter—a
missive which Keyes claims she
wrote to Ormiston, and which was
intercepted—to the fore, and at
the same time she alleges two of
her friends offered a sum of money
if they would betray her.

The evangelist made those as-
sertions last night at Angeles
Temple, where her followers fair-
ly rocked the building with their
cheers as she branded the "Ormiston's
trunk" and "Jackie letter" as a
diabolic hoax.

Next Sunday, Mrs. McPherson
said she would "expose the great-
est liar in Los Angeles."

"All of you know who that is,"
she exclaimed from the pulpit.
Thunderous applause greeted her
assertion.

Attorneys for defense and
prosecution will submit briefs to
Judge Blake tomorrow. He will
then decide if the three defend-
ants shall be held for trial in
Superior court.

Rio Grande Country Due for Boom When Railroad is Finished

Matita, Tex., Nov. 1.—(INS)—
Assurance of the completion of the
gap in the Kansas City, Mexico
and Orient railroad, from the
present terminus at Alpline to
Presidio, an approximate distance
of eighty-seven miles, has focus-
ed the eyes of agriculturists every-
where on the Rio Grande country
of southwest Texas.

Presidio, the gateway city on the
Rio Grande, is situated at a point
almost midway between El Paso
and Del Rio. It is here that the
great Orient road will cross into
Mexico on its contemplated junc-
tion with Topolabampo, on the
Mexican coast. This line, when
completed, will be approximately
fourteen hundred miles and it will
shorten the rail and water haul to
the Orient by about that distance.

Realizing the opportunity at
hand, hundreds of people from all
sections of the country are pour-
ing into Presidio, for, in addition
to the silver mines of Presidio
county the city is in the center of
one of the most fertile regions in
America. Lack of railroad facilities,
however, has minimized to a
great extent the possibilities of
this rich, virgin territory.

The Conchos, one of the largest
rivers in Mexico, joins the Rio
Grande at Presidio and the valley
formed by the junction of these
two rivers will naturally be a feed-
er to the border city with its vol-
ume of unexcelled cotton and other
products, and will guarantee suf-
ficient resources to support a large
community. Cotton of the most
superior texture is now being pro-
duced at Presidio, in some cases
yielding one to two bales to the
acre. Some of the larger oil in-
terests of this section have been
making quite surveys of the dis-
trict for indications of oil in abun-
dant quantities. Again, lack of
railroad facilities have held to
development.

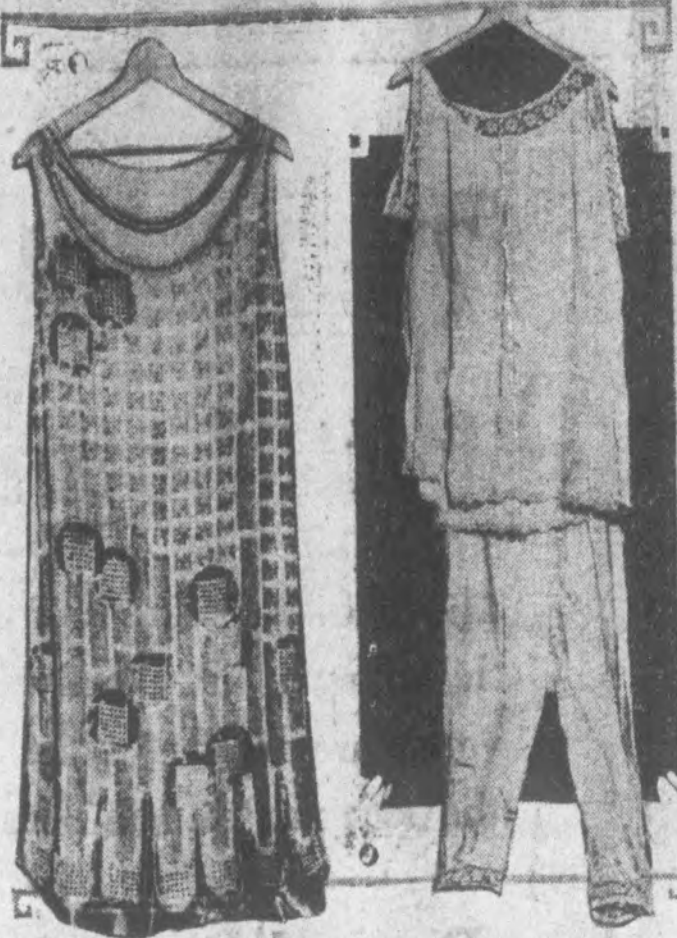
Opposite Presidio and reach-
ing clear to Chihuahua City in
Mexico, is a valley with rich pos-
sibilities for the cultivation of
cotton, fruits, and vegetables,
most of which would be marketed
at Presidio. At the present time,
fully sixty per cent of the busi-
ness fraternity of Ojinaga, just
across the Rio Grande do their
marketing on the American side
of the river.

With the completion of the gap
in the Kansas City, Mexico and
Orient railroad, it seems reason-
able to expect that this section of
southwest Texas, and Presidio in
particular, is bound to reap a rich
harvest.

Opportunity is pointing to the
Big Bend country and its gateway
city on the Rio Grande.

TEXAS MINISTER GOES ON TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Rev. J. Frank Norris
Being Tried for Kill-
ing of D. E. Chipps,
Last July

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 1.—
The trial of the Rev. J. Frank
Norris, pastor of the First Baptist
church here, charged with the
murder of D. E. Chipps, wealthy
lumberman, July 17, was formally
opened today in Judge George
E. Hosey's District Court.

Court was recessed to prepare
a formal answer to defense coun-
sel's motion for a change of
venue.

Attorneys of both sides say it
will take a week to dispose of
this motion finally, as a great
many witnesses will be intro-
duced by both sides.

Rev. Norris, long a thorn in
the Southern Baptist Convention,
from which he was ousted sever-

al years ago, is charged with in-
dictment with having murdered
D. E. Chipps, wealthy Ft. Worth
lumberman, by shooting Chipps
three times when the lumberman
visited the pastor in the pastor's
study, on the evening of July 17.

Today was not the first expe-
rience of Norris in a court room,
or the Chipps killing not the
first time he has been known to
use a gun.

In 1912 Norris was accused of
arson in the burning of his home.
He was indicted on charges of
burning his church. He also was
accused of perjury in connection
with his testimony before a grand
jury which investigated the home
burning. He was acquitted on
the perjury case on an instructed
verdict, and was acquitted on
one of the arson charges. The
other charges were dismissed for
insufficient evidence.

Several years ago, Norris had
some trouble with the late Bob
Poe, veteran Fort Worth con-
stable. Poe met the preacher on
the street one day and slapped
his face.

An evangelist and pastor,
especially during the time when
he was accused of arson, Norris
repeatedly has told of the neces-
sity of his having to have gun-
men to protect him.

That happens in Monte Carlo often. The authorities there will always pay your fare home when your money is gone, that you may not die in the house.

The gambling, probably, not the cancer, caused this Hungarian's suicide. Men kill themselves after gambling, not because they have lost money, but because they can no longer satisfy their gambling passion, most violent of all passions that make fools of men. The confirmed gambler would rather be dead than not gamble.

The wise deplore smoking by women, at least until they finish having children. Hitherto men have done the foolish things, women have been wise, and children have had at least half a chance.

But after all it is the individual woman's business to decide about smoking.

The lovely W. C. T. U. ladies of Kokomo, Indiana, have written a letter to Queen Marie, who smokes, saying 'We are loathe to believe that you do not understand the pernicious effects of smoking.' Queen Marie will think, although she won't write, 'I am loathe to believe that you ladies do not realize the pernicious effects of not minding your business.'

Two possible Presidential candidates are seen in Gov. Vic Danahy and ex-Senator Atlee Pomerene, both Democrats. Both have figured largely in Democratic speculation for 1928.

Sales of pig iron in this city and Ohio showed a considerable increase in the latest tabulations, more than 30,000 tons having been shipped for shipment last week, against 22,500 tons in the week before buyers were not inclined to haggle over prices.

When completed, the September earnings reports of the railroad systems will make favorable reading for the stockholders, but the last three months of the year are expected to pile up record-breaking net incomes for the whole post-war period. It is for this reason that Wall Street looks for the rails to lead the next upward movement in stock prices. Call money was in good supply at a 1/2 per cent, unchanged from last week, though funds were available at 4 per cent.

Under the leadership of Pan American and Texas Company, the oil shares gave a better account of themselves today.

The copper stocks and the independent steels were also favored with buyers of speculative stocks. Something substantial in the way of increased or extra dividends are expected from a number of the copper companies, while Bethlehem steel is likely to inaugurate dividends in the early part of next year.
