DEMOCRATS MAY
CONTROL SENATE
OF 70 CONGRESS

Frazier, of North Dakota, Listed as Independent Instead of Republican

Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—After suffering a series of defeats in Tuesday's elections, the Republican Party faced a new peril today in the possibility that the Democrats may assume actual control of the Senate in the new Congress.

While the Republicans boasted of holding 48 seats in the new Senate—just enough to organize that body after next March 4— their calculations included Senator Lynn J. Frazier, of North Dakota, insurgent, who was openly and eagerly thrown out of the party just twenty months ago. Now like a "chicken come home to roost," Frazier hasn't made up his mind whether he'll be a party Republican when it comes time to organize the Senate.

Without Frazier's vote, the Senate would divide 47 Republicans and 47 Democrats, 1 Farmer-Laborite and 1 Independent—as the Republicans themselves have classified the North Dakotaan. Since March, 1925, this Republican strength includes Senators-elect Smith, of Illinois, and Vane, of Pennsylvania, and if their certificates are returned at the initial session of the new Senate, all hope of Republican control will be destroyed.

If Frazier votes with the Democrats to organize—regardless of the Smith and Vane contests—that party will control the Senate, sweep off all the chairmanships, the patronage, the choice offices and the glory of putting Democratic names on legislation. If Frazier and Senator Shipstead, of Minnesota, walk out of the room or vote independently, no matter what happens to Vane and Smith, the Republicans and Democrats will have to divide all chairmanships and the rest of the glory. And Shipstead recently was memorialized by the Farmer-Labor Party to vote Democratic in the future, thus adding to the peril.

Here is what Frazier had to say of his future conduct. "I think I'm a Republican. I was elected as a Republican. But the Republican party in the Senate robbed me of my committee assignments, away my seniority rights and told the world that I was not a Republican. They did this by a formal vote of the Republican caucus and confirmed it by a record vote of the Senate. The way I vote on organizing the Senate will depend entirely on developments between now and March 4. I haven't made up my mind as yet."

Incidentally, there would be no such threat to Republican prestige if Republican leaders, headed by William M. Butler, late Senator from Massachusetts, and by Sanford McNider, Assistant Secretary of War, had not helped seat Daniel F. Steck, a Democrat from Iowa, while ousting Senator Smith W. Brookhart, a nominal Republican, last June. With Brookhart in and Steck out, Republicans would have nominal control no matter what Frazier decided to do. Thus another "chicken comes home to roost."

Making peace with Frazier may be a difficult matter too. When ousted from the Republican Party, along with Brookhart, the late Robert M. La Follette and the late Edwin F. Ladd, Frazier lost a number of choice committee assignments. In fact, if he had retained his seniority rights, he would be chairman of the Indiana affairs committee in the next Senate, a position of tremendous importance to the middle-distance west. And Frazier may well demand that chairmanship, all his old committee assignments, a vote of vindication by the Republican caucus and a vote of apology.

AVERAGED \$32.68
DURING WEEK

Sold 32,265,422 Pounds This Season for \$9,282,632.85 Averaging \$28.76

The Greenville Tobacco Market yesterday finished another week of high prices, the total sales for the week, averaging \$32.68 per hundred pounds. Offerings during the week were somewhat lighter and the week's sales were a little less than three and a half million pounds. The week's sales brought the season's total to more than thirty-two million pounds.

The official figures on the sales and comparative figures on last season's sales, made public today by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade, are as follows:

Sales for the week, 3,334,598 pounds, for \$1,089,821.21, averaging \$32.68 per hundred. Season's sales to date, 32,265,422 pounds for \$9,282,632.85, averaging \$28.76. Sales last season for corresponding period totaled 27,314,014 pounds.

PEACE REIGNS
ON ROYAL TRAIN

Queen Marie Assumes Roll of Peace-Maker Between Her Over Zealous Entertainers

Aboard Queen Marie's Special Train (In Washington) — Nov. 6.—(INS)—The Queen of Rumania smiled today upon the turbulent forces seeking to serve her and peace dawned over her kingdom on wheels.

Her Majesty took hold of a delicate situation with the diplomacy for which she is famed. She let it be known that she considered recent untoward incidents aboard her transcontinental train as merely the outgrowth of a too ardent desire on the part of the combatants to represent her interests. While taking no direct side in the controversy between Sam Hill, whose guest she was at the decorative exercise at Maryhill Museum, and Major Stanley Washburn, her aide and advisor, Queen Marie called both her friends and hid the hatchet between them.

It is felt in royal circles that "the white lion" as the Queen sometimes calls, Sam Hill, has had his "big moment" in the matter of queenly blessing bestowed upon his museum and will beg to be excused when the royal train reaches Seattle this afternoon. However, the quixotic millionaire is known to have expressed a wish that he could alter his personal plans so as to accompany the party to Chicago. Above the cooling of the dove of peace echoes of the Washburn-Hill feud could still be heard. Since Hill, arguing over a matter of etiquette, declared he was "the boss" and would "crush" the Major if he did not leave the train neither of the principles have spoken to each other.

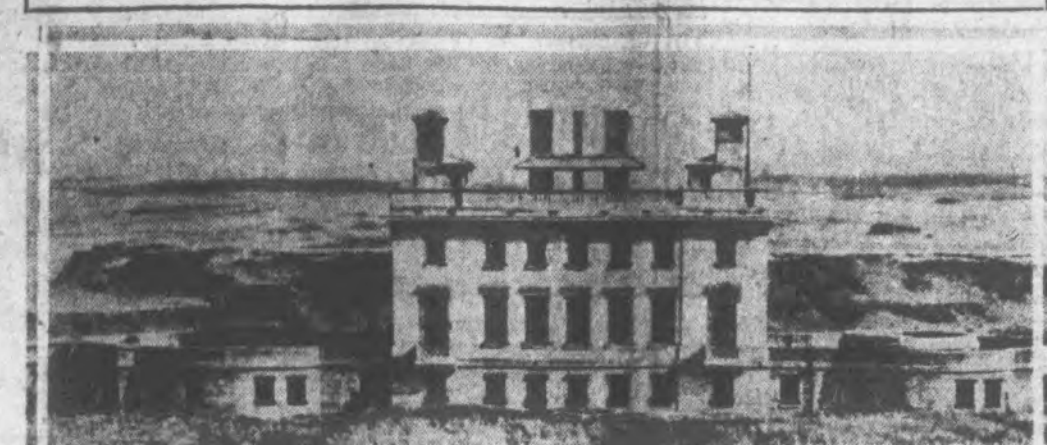

TURNS ATTENTION
TO TAX REFUNDS

Democrats Declare Action is Political Gesture to Regain Election Losses

Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—The average small taxpayer in America will get a refund of 25 cents, if Congress approves President Coolidge's plan for a 10 to 12 percent rebate on 1925 incomes, which are payable this year. It was revealed today by Treasury figures.

Income tax officials regard the "average small taxpayer" as a married man with two dependents who earns \$5,000 or less a year. For extremely wealthy taxpayers, the refunds will amount to \$200,000 in some cases.

A stupendous task would confront the Treasury in making refunds. Approximately 2,500,000 persons reported taxable incomes this year. The total collections are estimated at \$1,000,000,000 from corporations and \$800,000,000 from individuals.

Based on a ten percent reduction, the following refunds would be paid a married man with two dependents.

Income \$5,000, refund 25 cents
Income \$10,000, refund \$8.62
Income \$30,000, refund \$17.4
Income \$40,000, refund \$31.6
Income \$50,000, refund \$48.5
Income \$100,000, refund \$100.2

Between 85 and 85 persons had incomes of more than a million dollars this year.

Three persons will pay income taxes of at least \$6,000,000.

Democrats in Congress declared today "The President's proposal is simply a bold political gesture to retrieve some of the losses he suffered in the elections, and to forestall a Democratic plan of tax reduction that would help the little fellow and not the big taxpayer," declared Senator Blaine, Democrat of South Carolina.

Hall-Mills Case

Somerville, N. J., Nov. 6.—(AP)—The trial of Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall and her brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, charged with killing Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Charlotte Mills, moved slowly today, perhaps because court was in session a day that is usually court holiday.

Contending counsel was less belligerent. Mrs. Mary Demarest, who gave the concluding testimony, started yesterday, was irritated by defense counsel questions but managed to control her temper after one loud reply. Henry L. Dickman, former state policeman, who worked on the case four years ago and left without collecting back pay, was on the stand at lunch. He testified in February 1923, he saw Henry Stevens at his home and was told by the defendant he was fishing at the time of the double slaying.

NO STATE RIGHTS
IN PROHIBITION
DECLARES LENROOT

Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—Congress will never delegate to the states the right to define the alcoholic content of beverages, as proposed by the prohibition referendum overwhelmingly approved in New York and Illinois, Senator Lenroot, Republican, of Wisconsin declared today.

Congress itself has the right, if it desires, to raise the alcoholic content to 2.75 per cent, but I am sure it never would pass that power over to the states, Mr. Lenroot said.

HANDLE COTTON

Governor McLean and Others Confer With Eugene Meyer in Washington Today

Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—Seeking additional credits for the marketing of cotton, Governor A. W. McLean, of North Carolina, J. W. Simpson, of Greensboro, N. C., and August Kohn, of Columbia, S. C., conferred today with Eugene Meyer, chairman of the President's Cotton Board, and the Farm Loan Board.

They sought new credits to be administered through the Intermediate Credit Banks.

Simpson is head of the North Carolina Cotton Finance Corporation and Kohn the Director of the South Carolina Cotton Corporation.

Lack of Punishment
Blame for Liquor
Traffic Says Andrews

Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—Disregard of prohibition laws chiefly arises from inadequate punishment or uncertainty that the offender will get a heavy fine or imprisonment, General S. D. Andrews, dry chief, declared today.

Andrews pointed out that in the military services offenses are fewer than in civilian life because of the uncertainty of punishment.

Wise Desert Pack Rat.
He'd Interest Coolidge.

President Coolidge has been invited to California, ought to accept, and should visit the Mojave Desert. On a possible leg to a big rock, he would see a complicated, ingenious blueprint of small branches, each one carrying thorns protecting the hole of the desert pack rat.

It's a thoroughly American rat in relation to the black and brown rats of Europe. It fears rattlesnakes, copper snakes and ground owls. It has never seen one otherwise it would not be alive.

But it knows they exist, and might come at anytime sliding down the hole, bringing death.

So the desert rat prepares and does his little best, with thorns and cactus. If he were President of the United States he would build flying machines, and make this nation independent of the flying rattlesnakes of Europe and Asia.

The big fellows, those whose working unit is a million and whose goal is a billion or two are not disturbed by the election. Rebellious gentlemen, from Wisconsin and elsewhere, outlaws who believe the rule of that big business should be controlled, seem to have power in a Senate so closely divided.

That does not worry intelligent big fellows. Everybody knows how the British Parliament would have voted on a proposition to touch off Guy Fawkes powder as it lay in the vaults, under the members' seats.

That's how the American Congress would vote on any proposition to interfere seriously with our government by intelligent and moderately benevolent plutocracy.

We are a conservative nation, busy getting richer, and this is no place for any one that takes radicalism seriously. "What are you trying to be radical about? Big business asks the little man. 'Aren't you getting your five dollars a day, and sometimes ten? Take it and shut up.' And the little man usually shuts up. Ask him what he thinks about Russia."

Virtue in the Senate plans to throw out Vane of Pennsylvania and Smith in Illinois, because cash helped them.

But the people are supposed to choose Senators, and the voters knew as much about Vane and Smith as any Senator did, when the votes were cast.

The Senate might say "We know things that the voters did not know, when they voted, so we reject these men." But they have no right to say "You accepted those men, knowing all about them, but we don't allow you to have them."

Such news as comes here to the Mojave Desert indicates that Republicans will control the Senate by one vote, which would mean that the Republican Party might be controlled by one vote.

This column has suggested frequently during the past few years that a time might come when the Republicans would wish they had been more polite to young La Follette, and some others. The time has come.

California votes to keep out horse racing and the gangs of gamblers and all around criminals that go with it.

That vote will help the Senate. Some good people think the big wind was sent to Florida because that state licensed a gambling race track dive. That probably is not so, but bidding for all the country's crooks to join your winter colony is not wise.

California seems to have voted to put the Bible, officially, into the public schools although the vote is close.

The Bible will hurt no one, whatever his religion if you omit certain parts from reading for young people. It is a book with which every human being should be familiar.

CRIMINAL TERM
SUPERIOR COURT
ADJOURNS TODAY

Election Holiday and Long Drawn Out Case Slows up Progress of Court

The criminal term of Superior Court under Judge N. A. Sinclair came to an end this morning after the court had received the report of the grand jury. Owing to the recess of the court last Tuesday because of the general election, and the practically three days consumed by the Wilkinson case that ended yesterday, very few cases on the heavy docket were reached. The docket for the week consisted of approximately a hundred cases and the majority were continued until the next regular term, unless a special term should be ordered to clear up the docket. It was indicated here today that a special term was regarded as necessary to avoid a congested docket and that Governor McLean might be requested to designate such a term to be held in the near future.

During yesterday afternoon three jail cases were disposed of and the defendants received jail sentences. Tommie Jones, charged in two cases with forgery, was sentenced to six months, his judgment suspended upon payment of costs and good behavior. Robert Godette was sentenced to two years for engaging in liquor traffic, and was permitted to give bond pending the beginning of his term on February 15, 1927. Kemp Joyner drew six months in jail for engaging in liquor traffic.

\$700,000 DAMAGE
IN BIG HOTEL FIRE

Guests Take to Fire Escape When Flames Enveloped Mississippi Hotel

Natchez, Miss., Nov. 6.—(INS)—Property damage estimated at \$700,000 was done by a fire which destroyed the Natchez hotel and for a time threatened to sweep the entire business and a large portion of the residential section. The fire was in darkness last night due to the necessity of cutting electric wires. William Druetta, a fireman, was slightly injured.

Blazing embers hurried high in the air caused several fires to start at various places, some almost half a mile distant and with the Natchez fire department fighting to keep the hotel fire from spreading. It was only the timely arrival of the Fire-riders, La., fire apparatus which kept a large part of the city from being swept.

The Natchez hotel, which was valued at about \$800,000, had recently been remodeled and a \$200,000 annex added. An automatic sprinkler system, was being installed but had not been connected up and the firemen were faced with an almost hopeless task in the effort to save the building. The fire originated in the attic. No one was injured in the hotel but a number of guests had to make use of fire escapes to leave the building when the elevators and stairways were enveloped in flames.

Dedicate Airport
at New Orleans

New Orleans, Nov. 6.—(INS)—After ten years of waiting and hoping, New Orleans today dedicated its first airport and aviation field.

Twenty-five planes from various fields and stations of the army and navy presented an unusual appearance when they flew in mass formation over the Alvin Callender Field, the city, Tulane stadium and Audobon Park.

During the day the public was given opportunity to inspect every new type of plane represented. Addresses, dedication ceremonies, stunt flying and a banquet tonight featured the program.

FRANCO-ITALIAN
RELATIONS ARE
STRAINED TODAY

French Papers Charge Mussolini With Creating Pretext for Break With France

Paris, Nov. 6.—(INS)—Franco-Italian relations are strained today, as the result of the disclosure made by Col. Ricciotti Garibaldi, who is detained here after having made statements concerning his activities as an agent provocateur for the Fascist regime in Italy, while posing as an anti-Fascist.

The French newspapers declare that Col. Garibaldi has confessed that he worked for former Minister of the Interior Federzoni of Italy. They declare that he has admitted spending large sums of money in France, securing information concerning the activities of anti-Fascists and fostering anti-Fascist plots, which were disclosed to the Italian police at the right time.

Further charges are made in some sections of the press that Col. Garibaldi was responsible for formulation of the Catalan plot against Spain, which was broken up this week by the arrest of Col. Macin and many of his followers at Perpignan.

The left press openly places full responsibility for Col. Garibaldi's activities upon Premier Mussolini. "It was Mussolini, through Garibaldi, who fomented the plot against Spain in order to disrupt Franco-Spanish relations," charged Le Juifides.

Mussolini sought a quarrel with France and having no pretext he created one," he charged.

The indignation of the French public is thoroughly aroused and it seems certain now that all plans for an early Franco-Italian rapprochement have gone astray.

It is now expected that Col. Macin, alleged leader of the Catalan plot, will be brought to Paris to confront Garibaldi.

Madrid, Nov. 6.—(INS)—The police have placed sixty alleged syndicalists, communists, liberals and republicans under arrest for alleged connection with the Catalan plot which was frustrated at Perpignan this week. It is reported that 500 plotters succeeded in crossing the border and are now in Catalonia.

Rome, Nov. 6.—(INS)—The Fascist regime has reached the summit of the provocation," declared the Popolo D'Italia today in commenting upon the drastic measures laid down by the cabinet yesterday for stifling opposition to the government and for crushing the activities of those who plot against the lives of the Premier and his followers.

The new and drastic internal policy which has been adopted finds full support in the Fascist newspapers and Premier Mussolini's action in taking over the Ministry of Interior, the seventh portfolio which he holds, is applauded.

The newspapers do not connect the displacement of Federzoni with the Garibaldi affair in France, and scoff at the charge that Col. Garibaldi was an agent of Fascism aided by the Perignan plot against Spain. The newspapers point out that Italy is in entire sympathy with the Spanish directorate and would not foster any movement which might injure Spain.

Those persons who are now awaiting trial on charges of attempts on the life of Premier Mussolini will be tried by the new tribunals—similar to court martial—but will be judged under the law effective at the time of their attempts and not under the new laws, it was stated semi-officially today.

Premier Mussolini's cabinet shake-up has caused something of a commotion, the friends of Signor Federzoni today voicing considerable indignation over his resignation to the post of Minister of colonies. The resignation of numerous under-secretaries has also caused wide comment.

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION
THE PEACEMAKER AND HIS REWARD
(An Armistice Day Thought)

S. Matthew 5:9:—"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God."

Who is the "peace-maker?" Surely he must be a person who knows what peace is. You can never make peace, or anything else, unless you know something about it. You can have something that looks like it, but which is not it at all. No one would pretend that since Armistice Day there has been peace in Europe. One of the commonest sayings in the press and upon our lips has been that we won the war, but we have not won peace. In the six years following the Armistice there were forty little wars, and Mr. John Carter has just published a book entitled "War is Hell—But it is Human." To prove that "it was, and is, and is to come." There is still hate and fear and suspicion and a measure of mutual contempt among the nations of men.

It is one of the easiest things in the world to make war—any criminal fool can do it. It is one of the most difficult and delicate things to make peace. You can make a desolation, as Oliver Cromwell did in Ireland, and call it peace. You can cry, as the Old Testament prophet says, "Peace, peace, when there is no peace." You can drive underground by sheer force national aspiration and the longing for independence, and fill the land with armed men and set up a reign of terror; but that is not peace.

War rarely, or never, makes peace. It can create the silence of death and the bitterness of humiliation; but the underdog will only bide his time and opportunity to bite again.

Who, then, is the peace-maker? Not the mild man who says leave wrong and oppression and injustice alone, because it is so terrible to have a disturbance. Not the amiable person who will let corrupt conditions go without raising a finger—or a voice above a whisper. Not the coward who keeps silence through fear; nor the person who simply wants his own com-

fort. The peace-maker is the man who works to remove the causes of war, and labors for that which is just and pure and right and fair. He begins with himself, purging his own heart of all selfish passion, malice and revenge. Being himself the center of peace, he is also the center of strife. He will not be popular. Extremists on both sides will denounce him. You know that, if you have ever tried to settle a quarrel between people who love a quarrel and hate to be put in the least degree in the wrong. It is now without significance that in the very next verse our Lord should say, "Blessed are ye when men shall revile you and persecute you."

What are the roots of those international conflicts that send multitudes of men in the pride of youth to the horrors of war and to untimely graves?

1. Ambition and greed, often.
2. Suspicion and fear of other nations.
3. Commercial rivalries.
4. Military preparedness, with a false halo of military glory.

Up till now the world has not been ready to accept the ideal of peace which its farthest-sighted leaders desire; and it will not do so until the weight and force of public opinion so decree. For, after all, it is not by laws, treaties or agreements that the peace of the world will be secured, but by an enlightened public opinion, a new spirit in the nations, a spirit of good-will; a broad love of truth, justice and service.

And I see no hope of attaining this save in the acceptance of Jesus Christ as Lord and King. Accepted, followed, enthroned and reigning in the lives of men, He can and will bring peace. The surest way to the reconciliation of classes and masses, is their reconciliation to God through Christ Jesus. "No man cometh unto the Father but by Me."

Therefore, the enlightened, fervent, loving Christian as the true peace-maker; man or woman who earnestly tries to get Christ accepted as Master and Lord. These are called "the children of God"—than which the world holds no higher title! If you desire the name, go forth and by life and lip

commend Jesus to others. Walk in the path yourself and guide the steps of others "into the way of peace." Only thus can you merit this "Blessed."

Mellon Pleased With Outlook for Handling Cotton
Washington, Nov. 6.—(INS)—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon today expressed gratification at the steps being taken in the South to meet the cotton situation. "I am very much interested in the organization of cotton finance corporations, with ample capital to finance the storage of this year's surplus crop until it can be marketed advantageously," Mellon said. "The manner in which the bank and business men are co-operating with agricultural interests in a practical program, which it is hoped will meet the situation effectively, is extremely gratifying, and I trust that the program will be carried through to a successful conclusion. "I understand that the co-operative marketing associations in every southern state, have placed their facilities at the disposal of the cotton finance corporations, and that these two agencies will, I am sure, work together in the general interest."

DRAW LONG TERMS FOR BRUTAL MURDER
Rogersville, Tenn., Nov. 6.—(INS)—Bob Tipton and his wife, Alma, were sentenced to 23 years in the State Penitentiary here today on conviction of the murder of Novella Winkle, 12-year-old orphan girl several months ago. The trial was transferred to Hawkins county on a motion of change of venue. The Winkle murder was one of the most brutal in the history of the state and created considerable excitement in Greene county. Mrs. Tipton, a former nurse in the United States Sanitarium at Johnson City pleaded insanity, admitting that she hacked the child to death with an axe after slashing her throat with a razor. "I've always wanted to kill somebody," she told police the day after the murder. "The spell came upon me while my husband was away." The husband was arrested on testimony of witnesses that they heard a man's voice mingling with the screams of the child. Plenty of green in a house has a soothing effect, says an interior decorator. Texas to Demand New Constitution
Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 4.—(INS)—Declaring that the extensive use of the pardon power by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson necessitates a change in the Constitution restricting the executive's authority, State Senator Robert A. Stuart, of Fort Worth has announced that he will introduce in the Fortieth Legislature, next January, a bill providing for submission to the voters of Texas the question of calling a constitutional convention.

"Changed conditions in the last half century," Senator Stuart said, "demand changes in the Constitution."

Texas has not had a constitutional convention in 58 years, the Senator declared, and added that while there have been numerous constitutional amendments, he favored an entire revamping of the State Constitution rather than piecemeal changes.

"There is, theoretically a pardon board now," Senator Stuart or in itself, it is merely a figurehead. It has the right to recommend clemency to the Governor but can not grant or prevent clemency by the chief executive. The Governor can ignore the pardon board's recommendations, or can issue pardons or paroles without recommendation by the commission. The board being appointed by the Governor, it can be readily seen that the executive has unlimited power in this matter."

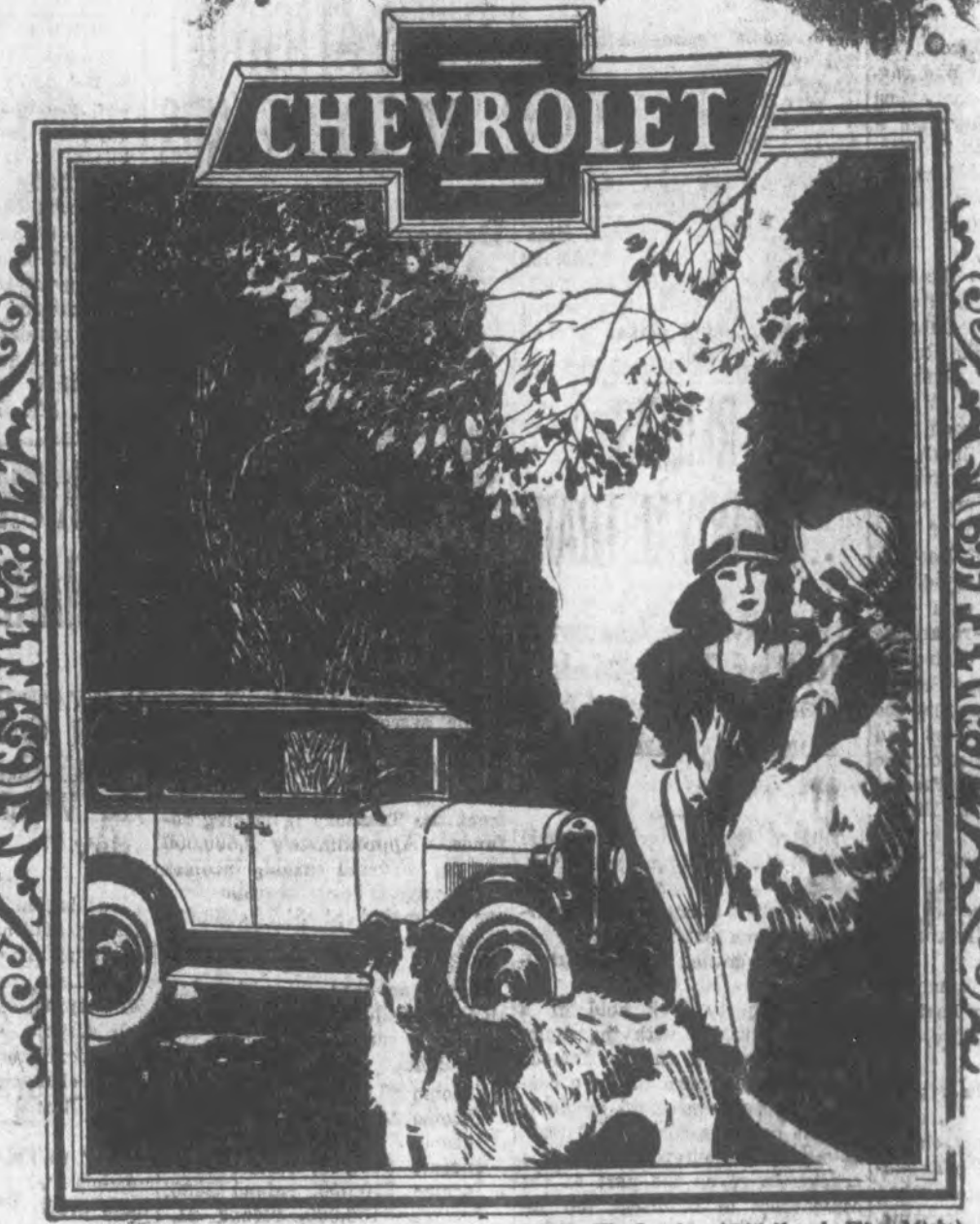

AN UNUSUAL OPPORTUNITY COMING TO THE WOMEN OF GREENVILLE
(By T. E. Browne)

Director, Vocational Education The Adult Home Economics classes conducted by the Division of Vocational Education, in co-operation with local school authorities, have proven one of the most popular and effective projects fostered by the Division.

There are two outstanding reasons for this success: first, they have met a distinct need among women of the state and at a time when the instruction could be put to immediate use. Second, we have been fortunate in securing as instructor, for these classes women of unusual ability, who by both experience and training were qualified to put over a real job of teaching.

Mrs. Anna L. Grimes, who is helping with the organization of these classes and teaching the units in foods, and child care because of her excellent social contacts is capable of meeting and handling any situation which may arise among any group of women. She is a native North Carolinian, being connected with some of the most prominent families in Eastern Carolina. She received her undergraduate training in the state and has had successful training experience as a housekeeper.

In addition Mrs. Grimes has taken an advanced course in Teachers College, Columbia University, and at Vassar, while on New York she was especially interested in nutrition and had valuable experience working in the nutrition clinic of the city. I consider any community fortunate in securing Mrs. Grimes' services to conduct adult classes, and bespeak for her the heartiest co-operation.

During the past year adult courses for women were conducted in thirty towns of North Carolina in such subjects as Foods, Clothing, Child Care, Nutrition,

Interior Decoration and Millinery. The interest the women have taken in these classes, is indicated by the enrollment of five thousand, seven hundred and forty-nine women in these courses. These women have been enthusiastic over the instruction received, and in most cases have asked for a return of Mrs. Grimes.

This is a remarkable opportunity for women in North Carolina to get at a minimum cost, a type of instruction in the fundamentals of home making that women of all ages and classes attend Vassar and Columbia to get at a much greater cost. The State Department of Education is glad to co-operate with local authorities to give the women of the state this opportunity.

Mrs. Grimes will begin a two weeks' school of foods and nutrition in Greenville on Monday morning, November 8th. The classes will be held in the Domestic kitchen of the high school building.
