Market Report

MARKET LETTER

Oil Company of New Jersey.

The bears were thrown into confusion by a 5-point advance in Baldwin Locomotive to 141-1/2, accompanied by the usual rumors about the proposed selling of the Philadelphia property of the company, the distribution of some of the recently acquired cash, etc. American sugar advanced 2-1/2 points in the lead of the sugar stocks, and practically all of the Cuban sugar shares sold higher.

Liquidation and short selling of Standard Oil of New Jersey provided a steady stream of selling orders into the market and the common stock broke to 39, while

the preferred held steady around 117-1/4. Blocks of the new rights as high as 70,000 shares changed hands at fractionally below \$2,000 which would give the new holders the privilege of buying the new stock at 37.

Professional selling extended over a wide area as the day advanced, and all sections of the market were deflected downward. Heavy selling of the rails resulted in losses of 2 to 4 points in New York Central, Atchison and others. U. S. Steel and General Motors led the reaction in the industrials, the latter selling on its new basis, \$5.75 special and regular dividend at 140-1/2, specialties and high-priced mercantile stocks plunged downward as the selling wave increased in severity, and for many stocks the advances of the week to

date were entirely wiped out. Call money ruled at 11-2 per cent.

GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Nov. 19.—(INS)—Grains closed steady to easier today with wheat off 2-1/8 to 2-1/4; corn up 1/8 to 5/8; oats unchanged to 1-8 lower.

Wheat started steady with trade mixed. The selling was mostly professional led by a broker who usually represents eastern interests and the market broke sharply. On the decline there was commission house buying and the market steadied. Trade was fairly active. Weakness at Buenos Aires was a depressing factor. Prices there at mid-day were 1-1/2 to 2-1/2 lower. A private message from there said the weather was clearing favorably. Estimated receipts were 29 cars.

Corn opened 3-8 to 1-2 better with the buying scattered on the unsettled weather conditions over the belt. On the advance offerings increased and the market eased under it. Weakness in wheat was a depressing factor. Trade was moderate. Estimated receipts were 82 cars.

Oats started 1-8 to 1-4 better under light offerings. On the advance there was commission house selling with the buying mostly by shorts. Trade was moderate. Demand for the cash article is fair with the offerings rather light. Estimated receipts were 20 cars. Provisions were strong.

MORE TROUBLE FOR MELLON: COOLIDGE TAX REBATE PLAN

Senator Lenroot Open in Opposition to Plan; Democrats for Reduction

Washington, Nov. 19.—(INS)—Troubles continued to pile up today for the Coolidge-Mellon plan to rebate some \$250,000,000 in collected taxes by action in the short session of Congress.

Senator Lenroot, Republican of Wisconsin, a consistent administration supporter, opposes the plan openly, and this opposition is shared by many Republicans privately.

The Democrats, while, not solid, are prepared to fight for a straight reduction bill of probably \$350,000,000. No definite program has yet been worked out, but Senator Simmons of North Carolina, and Representative Ganser, of Texas, the Democratic finance leaders, are substantially agreed on the board general principles of the Democratic program, as they always have been. This call for a slight lowering of the corporation tax, perhaps from 13-1/2 per cent to 10 per cent, the elimination of excise taxes, and lowering of surtaxes.

There is little chance, however, that any reduction program can be pushed through at the short session.

Representative Green, Republican of Iowa, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, who recently announced his opposition to the White House rebate proposal, said today he had not

yet made up his mind on the alternative Mellon proposal of giving credits against next year's payments.

Green said he believed the Ways and Means Committee would be able to get down to consideration of the tax situation by the Christmas holidays.

ROUMANIAN QUEEN HEADS FOR HOME

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 19.—(INS)—Shortly after Prince Nicolas had left here at 9 a. m. today by special car to Detroit, the special train bearing Queen Maris and her retinue left Cincinnati directly for New York.

The train bearing her majesty was routed over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad through Southern Ohio, and was scheduled to pass along the Ohio River, touching at Point Pleasant, W. Va., and at Parkersburg.

After leaving the Ohio River route at New Martinsville, W. Va., the train was to proceed directly to New York, railroad officials announced.

Meantime, greatly disappointed by the complete "flop" of their elaborate reception arrangements because of the cancellation of her majesty's visit here, city fathers were today putting away their

high hats and the city was getting back to normal.

"We think it's a dirty shame," Mayor Seasongood's secretary declared when informed that the visit was "off."

Uncle Sam's Navy World's Best Eaters

Washington, Nov. 19.—(INS)—Best fed navy in the world is Uncle Sam's. Statement of the food supplies purchased last year by the government, which has just been made public, would make an old-time tar seastick with envy. "Chow time" is a rite on board a man of war nowadays. The salt pork, black coffee, bread and molasses diet of the days of frigates and clipper ships has gone the way of the wooden bottoms. A gob live, the life of Reilly, at least insofar as its food is concerned.

The government supply list proves that point beyond argument. Apricots, asparagus, corn, meats, spinach, tomatoes, figs, spices, jams, sauces and fruits— are but a few of the items on the canned food list alone. Uncle Sam's sea fighting forces consumed over 7,500,000 pounds of canned corn, peas, and tomatoes during 1925. They ate 821,600 pounds of asparagus, 353,300 pounds of pumpkin, 636,955 pounds of sauer kraut, 1,273,000 pounds of assorted jams, 834,000 pounds of canned salmon and 1,467,000 pounds of corned beef and 5,885,000 pounds of evaporated milk.

Seventy-five million meals were prepared in the navy last year, the report shows, and on the average it costs 53 cents a day to feed each sailor.

British Dry Merger Challenge to World

London, Nov. 19.—(INS)—The vast new fusion of British Chemical Companies, capitalized at \$284,500,000 is intended as a direct British challenge to the new industries of the world.

"Imperial Chemical Industries Limited" is the technical title of the new merger, and the four companies, which are to be henceforth combined instead of competing are: Brunner Mond and Company, Ltd., Nobel Industries, Ltd., United Alkali, Ltd., and British Dyestuffs Corporation.

Alfred Mond, ex-president of the Board of Trade, is to be the President of the Company. Sir Harry McGowan is to be deputy president. Other members of the Board of Directors will be Lord Reading—ex-Viceroy of India, ex-Lord Chief Justice of England, Lord Ashfield, President of the London underground railroad system, Sir John Brunner, Sir Max Muspratt, leading British chemical expert, and Sir Josiah Stamp, head of the British railroads.

The company's capital is practically the same as that of the German Dyestuffs Trust. According to the prospectus, after providing for reserves and depreciation, the new company's earnings should exceed \$20,000,000 annually. This is expected to pay an ordinary dividend of 8 1-2 per cent and 2 1-2 per cent on the deferred shares.

The British Government has made the reservation, in regard to the merger, that not more than 25 per cent of the share may be held by foreigners.

All four companies engaged have many points of contact. The fusion will eliminate overlapping

of financing, stocks, production and research. It will enable the heavy chemical industry of Britain to operate as one unit.

FAMOUS COLONIAL HOUSES BEING "WRITTEN UP"

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 19.—INS—Connecticut's ancient dwelling houses, are being tracked down and written up, and their histories filed in the state library here for the sake of future generations.

Nearly two score of such houses have been described, photographed and investigated within the past few months. The work is being done by the Connecticut Society of Colonial Dames, through Mrs. A. H. Terry, chairman of the committee on old houses.

The ancient towns of Wethersfield and Milford furnished the bulk of the houses, all now being in full use though some are far over two centuries old.

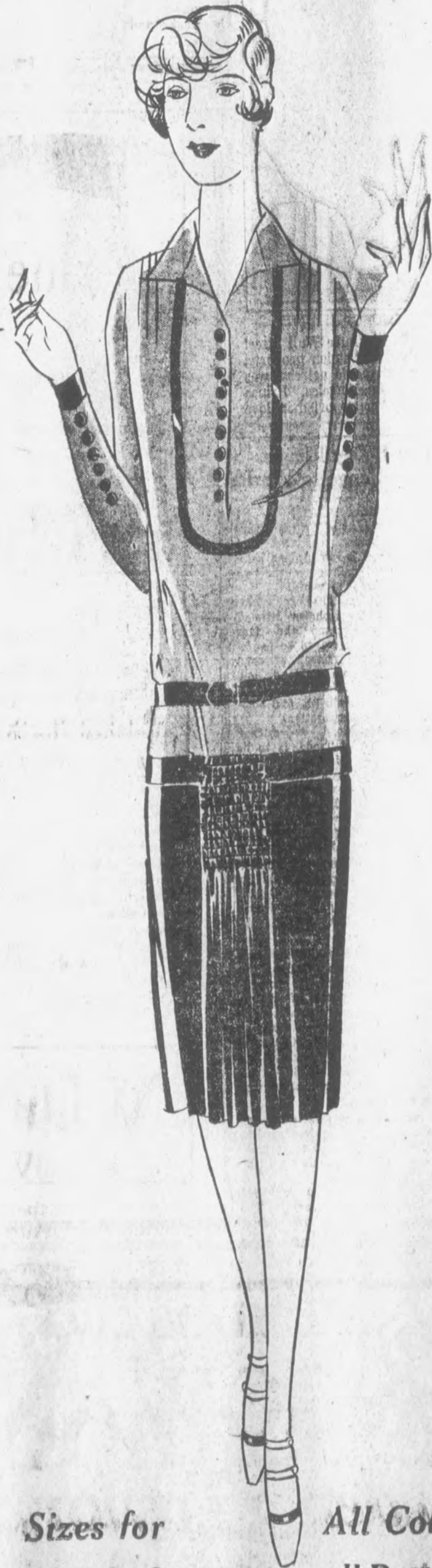

U. D. C. CONVENTION NEXT YEAR GOES TO CHARLESTON

South Carolina City Wins Out Over Gulfport, Houston and Los Angeles

Richmond, Va., Nov. 19.—(INS)—Charleston, S. C., was bidding hard today against Los Angeles for next year's convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, as the annual meeting here went into its third day. Texas and Mississippi were also after the convention.

Although the appropriateness of choosing Charleston seemed paramount following the reelection of Mrs. St. John Alison Lawton, of that city, a president general, many coast delegations, supported by outside delegations, favored Los Angeles.

Today, Fitzgerald Flourney, professor at Washington and Lee University, pleaded for preservation of "the history and the spirit of the South," he appealed for a "Southern South."

Major General Mason M. Patrick, of West Virginia, chief of the Army Air Corps, the son of a Confederate Veteran, in accepting a cross of service from the Daughters, said:

"The time has come to think less of sectionalism and more along national and international lines."

The Raines Banner, the highest honor given by the organization for historical work done during each year, was presented to North Carolina. Last year Virginia held the banner.

Charleston, S. C., was selected this afternoon as next year's meeting place for the convention. Charleston won out over Gulfport, Miss., Houston, Tex., and Los Angeles.

Autos and Dancing Causing Downfall of Boston Girls

Boston, Nov. 19.—(INS)—Automobiles and public dances are the primary causes for the downfall of many Boston girls which has resulted in what investigators include to as alarming conditions. In reaching this conclusion after a survey of cases brought to the attention of public welfare societies, it has also been determined that the much talked of hip flask or other methods of drinking, has but little or no connection with the

morals of modern girlhood. A survey of conditions has been conducted by officials of the Evangeline Booth Rescue Home and the facts revealed strike a new note in the declaration of those who interest themselves in unfortunate girls.

Girls in suburban and country communities are more susceptible than the city-bred girl to the dangers of the parked automobile, the survey indicates. Of 60 girls questioned in the course of the investigation, 61 were from suburban or country towns. One of the 60 blamed the use of liquor for her moral failure.

The chief sufferers appear to be girls who are under 20 years of age. The average age of the girls who go astray is dropping alarmingly. The youngest of the girls in the survey was only 13 years old when received into the rescue home. Another was 14, two were 15, three were 16, two were 17, six were 18, seven were 19, eight were 20, five were 21, eight were 22, and the remainder were older.

Girls employed as domestics apparently are more subject to temptation than any other class, for 15 of the hundred girls were employed in housekeeping work.

A particularly pathetic fact revealed is that six of the girls were still in school, while there was one school teacher in the group. The other occupations are varied, between factory work, clerking, and girls living at home.

OCEAN GREYHOUNDS SOON TO GIVE WAY TO AIRPLANE

London, Nov. 19.—(INS)—The day of the ocean liner as the fastest means of crossing the Atlantic Ocean, is fast drawing to a close, according to Sir Alfred Yarrow, head of the famous shipbuilding works bearing his name on the Clyde River, and inventor of the Yarrow boiler now generally used by the navies of the world.

Aircraft will supersede the liner, according to Sir Alfred, who foresees the day when giant airships will take the American traveler to England in two days or less.

It is my opinion that shipbuilders are shutting their eyes to the inevitable development of trans-ocean airways. Anyone about to build fast liners for the Atlantic trade should bear in mind these possibilities, or rather probabilities, and remember that within the next two decades the necessity for the ocean greyhounds may no longer exist, he said.

U. S. COLLECTORS
BIGGEST BIDDERS
ON ART OBJECTS

Sensational Sale of Art in Hampton's London Rooms Draws Americans; Lord Michelham's Famous Accumulation of Pictures to Go on Block

London, Nov. 19.—(INS)—What is confidently expected to be the most sensational auction room sale within living memory is being held this afternoon at the famous sale-rooms of Messrs. Hampton in Saint James' Street, Piccadilly, where the almost priceless collection of objects d'art gathered together by the late Lord Michelham is being offered for sale by his executors.

One of Britain's greatest financiers, the late Lord Michelham during his lifetime accumulated from all parts of the world its most famous objects d'art. From the Orient he and his agents secured the rarest old pre-Mongol Chinese vases and Japanese prints, while both the pre-renaissance and the post-renaissance efforts of the Occidental were garnered for his collection, including some of the finest Sevres China, Gobelins and Beauvais tapestry. His collection of old masters of the Sir Joshua Reynolds, Gainsborough, and Lely type was world renowned.

All these and more besides are to come under the auctioneers' hammer this afternoon and record-breaking prices are anticipated. That catalog reveals that nearly two-hundred pictures of merit and class will be offered, including fifteen that would invest any ordinary sale with first-class importance. Experts expect these fifteen pictures alone to realize two million dollars.

The fifteen include four Romanesque, three Hoppers, two Raeburns, and works by Gainsborough, Sir Thomas Lawrence, and Lely. The four Romanesque are considered by many to represent some of the master's finest work, and two of them rival in interest even the portrait of the famous Mrs. Davenport, which brought the record price of approximately \$300,000 for a Romney when sold by Sir William Brouley-Davenport last July.

Gem of the Michelham Romanesque is the portrait of Anne Lady de la Pole—a beautiful work which lay hidden away for more than a century before its importance was realized. Twenty-three years ago Sir Joseph Duveen, the famous English dealer, purchased it for Lord Michelham for more than two hundred thousand dollars, and it is expected that bidding will reach the three hundred thousand before this picture is knocked down.

The other Romanesque of importance in the collection are portraits of Lady Elizabeth Forbes, the Three Children of Captain Little, technically considered one of the finest pictures ever painted by Romney, which came from the famous Otto Kahn collection, and one of the celebrated Lady Hamilton as The Ambassadors. Emma Hamilton was a favorite sitter of Romney, and some of his finest work is seen in his portraits of her.

The three Hoppers include a portrait of Lady Louise Manners, for which Charles Wetheimer paid 210,000 dollars twenty-five years ago, the then highest price ever paid in an auction room for a single picture, and his group of the Bowden children. Last year Hopper's small portrait of Lady Elizabeth Bligh made nearly \$69,000 at the Darnley sale, and the Michelham group is expected to easily surpass that figure.

The attention of the public is centering around Gainsborough's Master Heathcote, however. Gainsborough's Blue Boy was sold for approximately \$750,000, the highest price ever paid for a single picture, and, with stories of the beauty of the Master Heathcote portrait in their ears, they think it will create a sensation at this afternoon's sale, even with the staggering precedent of the Blue Boy. Master Heathcote has never appeared in a public auction before.

Most of these treasures will undoubtedly go to the United States, and it is frankly admitted that the success of the sale will depend upon the attendance of the famous American buyers, many of whom are in London for the sale.
