U. S. OF EUROPE BRITISH, GERMAN INDUSTRY AIM

Important Secret Meeting Was for the Purpose of Arranging Union. Tariffs, Prices, Production Methods Were Discussed By Statesmen

London, Nov. 27.—(INS)—The idea of a United States of Europe was the primary reason for the recent important, but secret meeting between the heads of British and German industries.

On one side the meeting was headed by Sir Robert Horne, ex-Chancellor of the Exchequer, now one of the leading figures in big business of today; on the other side the German delegation was led by Dr. Cuno, former Chancellor of Germany.

The meeting took place at the country house Broadlands, of Colonel Wilfred Ashley, a member of the British Government and Minister of Transport. The discussions were carried on with the full knowledge and approval of the British Government.

Tariffs formed the keynote of the discussions and a remarkable map, graphically illustrating the comparative heights of tariff walls erected by various European countries, was one of the centers of attraction in the discussion of a United States of Europe.

Both sides agreed on the view that the continual building of tariff walls is harmful to trade, and the delegates visualized a future in which there would be no tariff barriers within Europe, but, on the other hand, and actual United States of Europe.

It was realized that it would take years to educate the different nationalities up to this standard, but both sides undertook to do their best.

Agreement was also reached between the nations as to price, production and quality of various articles, and a plan was evolved, mutually to avoid "dumping" on the ground of its being harmful to stable economic conditions. The next meeting of the two sets of industrialists will take place, in Berlin.

The only salvation for Europe lies in a Locarno for industry, said Sir Robert Horne. Industry in Britain is in a bad way. The stoppage of the coal industry threatens wide circles of trade and industry with collapse. Steel and iron industries are unable to reduce the costs of production and compete with low-wage countries.

Not only are British exports down, but the country is actually importing from all steel. Even confirmed optimists are becoming skeptical as to the future of the country. Depression is rampant in the shipbuilding, shipping, wool, and cotton trades.

It is urgently necessary to stabilize British industry to co-operation with European competition. Instead of fighting like cut-throat competitors.

Southwest Confab Football May Result In Big Controversy

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 27.—(INS)—As an aftermath of the winning of the Southwest Conference title by the Southern Methodist University football team of Dallas, local followers of the champion Mustangs are stirring an agitation for a post-season game with some other sectional champion.

While the enthusiasts have indicated no particular opponent for the Ponies Leland Stanford and Alabama, respective champions of the Pacific Coast and the Southeast, have the call.

The nation-wide publicity attendant upon a Tournament of Roses battle, with Leland Stanford on New Year's Day seems to be particularly intriguing to the S. M. U., followers, and, if the present excitement continues to seethe, overtures may be made to the University authorities with the view of learning their attitude towards such an inter-sectional fray.

To date the faculty's silence on such a matter is profound. Conference permission would also be required, but this is regarded as easy to get, provided the local University authorities sanction the proposition.

Another section of the populace is touting the advantages of a game with the Crimson Tide, of the University of Alabama, South east conference champions. They point out that the winner of such a classic would be the all-South champions. If initiated, local fandom would be enthusiastic for an annual Southeast and Southwest game between the champions of both sections.

Southern Methodist University won the conference championship at O'Connell Oval, Dallas, last Saturday when they crushingly defeated the Baylor University Bears, 31 to 3, in a one-sided contest.

Is Cleopatra Buried in Paris?

Paris, Nov. 27.—(INS)—Is Cleopatra buried in Paris? Several Parisian archaeologists and Egyptologists are inclined to believe so and would be much disappointed if the mummy of the famous Nile Queen should be found elsewhere.

Every ten or fifteen years the report spreads that one of three decayed mummies buried in the little garden of the National Library in 1871, during the Commune, is that of Cleopatra.

Three persons assisted at the burial services of the three mummies, only one of them M. Mortreuil, retired general secretary of the library, is now alive.

"There were many Egyptian antiquities in the library when I began to work there in 1869, at the age of nineteen," says M. Mortreuil. "Among them were three mummies, without bindings one of which passed for that of Cleopatra."

"Why Cleopatra? I don't know. Perhaps, only because the mummy was very beautiful. At any rate we were all very much in love with our Cleopatra."

"I heard it reported that Napoleon had brought the three mummies—the other two were males—from Egypt. It was even reported that Napoleon spent a whole night alone with the mummy in his tent at the foot of the pyramids. Perhaps it was he who baptized her Cleopatra, or perhaps he identified the mummy definitely as that of Cleopatra. We do not know when, why or by whom the bindings were taken from the mummies."

"Then came the war and the seizure of Paris. To protect the Egyptian collection from German shells we transported it to the cellar, the mummies included. The humidity decomposed them and when the Commune took possession of the library the mummies were giving forth such an odor that it was decided to bury them."

MARKET LETTER
New York, Nov. 29. (INS)—A victory for the New York City Lighting Companies in the so-called "dollar gas law" in the United States Supreme Court today, helped to turn the tide of industrial and utility stocks, and to cause a sharp rally in prices of the market leaders. Previous to the announcement that the Supreme Court had decided in favor of the companies, the market had been dull and heavy, under the influence of the sharp calling of loans.
On the whole the market was dull and irregular. The industrial speculative leaders were selling pressure in the early trading, but received such support that prices snapped back promptly to the levels of Saturday's close. A number of the low priced motor stocks were well bought and the sentiment of the financial district with respect to the motor trade was favorable.
The direct calling of loans by the New York City banks aggregated about \$30,000,000, most of it in preparation for the December settlements.
The selling of the railroad stocks

did not reach a considerable volume. The October railroad earnings reports. Now going through indicate a 5 per cent increase in the lot as compared with last year, though individual have reported from 10 to 30 per cent gains.
Bethlehem Steel was an active bullish leader in the steel group. On report that the directors would place the stock on a 5 per cent dividend basis in January. Oils appeared to have been completely liquidated, and, in the east of Philadelphia and Maryland, ready for a recovery, though the balance of the oil list was unable to respond and equipments were inactive and suggestions steady.

Coroner L. M. Waring declared today he believed considerable light would be thrown on the Forsythe mystery tomorrow morning when the coroner's inquest into the case is resumed. A number of persons have been subpoenaed for the inquest.
Investigation now has shifted to Clayton, in Johnston county, where Forsythe's body was delivered to two garage men to bring to a Raleigh hospital. Blood-stained clothing, a bloody cap split as if by a sharp-edged instrument, and pools of blood have been found along the road where Forsythe is alleged to have been slain.
