STATE GEOLOGISTS SAYS PROSPECTS FOR OIL HERE ARE EXCEEDINGLY GOOD

**Says Oil Indications
On Westbrook Prop-
erty Here Best He
Has Seen Outside Of
Proven Field.**

Surface indications of oil here are the best that have ever been seen outside of a proven field, according to H. J. Bryson, State Geologist, who arrived in this city late yesterday from Raleigh and today made investigations on the Westbrook property where preparations for drilling for oil are now in progress.

A charter for the Westbrook Drilling Company was granted by Secretary of State W. N. Everett yesterday and contracts for the drilling will be let on Saturday, according to announcement here today.

Since the first discovery of the oil and gas seepage following an accidental discharge of dynamite on the property about three months ago, the presence of oil has become more and more prevalent and four experts who have visited the spot have expressed belief that oil in commercial quantities would be located here.

As soon as the contracts are let Saturday the machinery will be moved to this city immediately and work on the actual drilling will begin. The contract is being let for a first complete section of 1,750 feet and then in 500 foot sections until a depth of 3,750 feet has been reached. It is necessary to go that deep. The contract calls for the completion of the first 1,750 feet within forty-five days from the letting which means that no time will be lost in getting equipment on the ground and getting the drilling under way.

The owners of the property and those in close touch with the project are becoming more and more enthusiastic over the prospects as favorable reports from the different experts have been received and the visit of Mr. Bryson here today has done much to strengthen belief that oil will soon flow from beneath the earth here.

STATE SELLS TEN MILLIONS BONDS DURING MORNING

**Syndicate Headed By
New York Bank Suc-
cessful Bidders For
N. C. Bonds.**

Raleigh, Dec. 2. —(INS)—A syndicate headed by the First National Bank of New York today was the successful bidder for \$10,000,000 worth of North Carolina bonds at 4 1/4 per cent interest.

The sales included \$5,000,000 public school building bonds and \$5,000,000 highway bonds. No other bids were offered on the 4 1/4 per cent basis, and the bonds were awarded to the New York syndicate.

The First National Bank also offered to lend the State \$10,000,000 to renew the remainder of the state's highway bonds not sold, the notes to bear interest at 4 1/4 per cent and mature July 1, 1927.

This was made upon the condition that the bank should have an option until April 1, 1927 to purchase the remaining \$10,000,000 of highway bonds unsold in anticipation of the sale of which the \$10,000,000 highway bonds maturing July 1 are to be issued at 4 1/4 per cent interest rate.

The offer of the First National Bank was accepted by the Governor and Council of State.

Governor McLean expressed satisfaction at the sale of the bonds at 4 1/4 per cent interest. This, the Governor declared, brought about the result for which he and State Treasurer Lay have been striving for nearly two years.

"We started out early in 1925," the Governor said, "to handle the bond sales in such a way as to substantially reduce the interest rate which North Carolina has been paying on its long term bonds."

"These," he said, "are the first long time bonds the state sold at less than approximately 4 1/4 per cent, and definitely places the long time bonds of the state of North Carolina on a 4 1/4 per cent basis to the first time since the large program of bond issues was launched five years ago."

HOME COOPERATION NECESSARY TO CHARACTER EDUCATION

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 2. —(INS)—Without full co-operation of home and school, character education is predestined to fail, declared Dr. L. A. Cohnstein, of Cincinnati, speaking before the annual fall rally of the Minneapolis Classroom Teachers' Association here.

"The school must insist upon home co-operation," he asserted. "Only by zealous, social living under guidance can children build right. Modern youth demands zealous living, the parents and schools must provide the wise guidance."

Modern speed and parents' indulgence is responsible for much of the misunderstanding and grief rising from problems of our youth according to Dr. Cohnstein, who is dean of the college of education at Cincinnati.

"Children see all too frequently their parents living and acting inconsistently with the best precepts he declared."

TWO BANKS CLOSE RUN TODAY ON THIRD

DEFENSE COUNSEL SUMS UP EVIDENCE HALL-MILLS CASE

**Big Guns Of 'Million
Dollar Defense' Flay
Testimony And Tac-
tics Of Prosecution.**

Court House, Somerville, N. J., Dec. 2. —(INS)—In impassioned addresses to the jury in the Hall-Mills murder trial, the "big guns" of the defense, Robert H. McCarter, the senior counsel, and Senator Clarence F. Case, summed up the case of the defense today.

Both bitterly scolded the tactics of the prosecution and asserted the absolute innocence of the defendants. Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, and her two brothers, Henry and William Stevens, Case charged that the State's conduct of the case was "in itself, unfair and vindictive." He flayed the "dramatic" prosecution of Alexander Simpson and the use of a "hideous" was model in the court.

He demanded to know why the State hadn't produced the young couple who found the bodies—Raymond Schneider and Mrs. Pearl Bahmer. He expressed the belief that Schneider killed Rev. Hall's pocket, and scattered the cards found in his card case about the body. The state had charged that on a card found near the bodies was the finger print of Willie Stevens.

McCarter pointed a finger of suspicion at James Mills, husband of the slain choir singer, during his address to the jury.

"Why," asked McCarter in his opening speech, "Why was not he indicted? He knew his wife was receiving love letters from Rev. Hall. He had quarreled with his wife. No one knew what was his movements on the night of the crime."

Both cases and McCarter assailed the testimony of Mrs. Jane Gibson, the State's star witness who testified from a bed in the courtroom.

Both attorneys termed the finger print cards, which the state claims bears the impression of Willie Stevens' left finger, as "phony."

Case stressed the assertion that "Hudson county officials are coming down into Somerset and Middlesex counties to show them how to administer justice."

"Are we a bunch of outlaws down here?" he thundered. "Haven't we gotten along pretty well?"

Case's voice thundered as he declared that the persons who found the bodies—Raymond Schneider and Pearl Bahmer—were not brought into court by the State to testify.

"As I see it there are two essentials to the State's case," he declared. "The first is the so-called card, said to have been found at Dr. Hall's feet."

"The other is the evidence offered by Mrs. Jane Gibson, the Pig Woman."

"How did that card get there? I'll tell you. I believe that Raymond Schneider rifled that body and he took the watch and the fob and the money, except the loose change."

"Assuming that he had nothing to do with the murder, he went through Dr. Hall's pockets, and he rifled the card case and threw it on the ground. The contents of that card case were spilled on the ground. And detective Totten's identification of that card is the only one we have and Mr. Totten identifies it by the fly specks on it."

Cards with fly speck, were scattered all over the ground near the body, said Case. He impugned the authenticity of the State's card exhibit "S-17."

"Why did not they bring Schneider and Miss Bahmer here so we could cross examine them?" He asked.

Case said the state refused to present a map of the scene of the crime as it was four years ago. If they had, he added, the defense would have made Mrs. Gibson show the various places "she claimed to have passed," and "passed the" of her various stories.

"Why did they try the murder of Eleanor Mills personate that of Edward Hall?" he asked. "The facts are identical. It is because she acts like a lady and die to these defendants that they might be tried again, if acquitted this time."

Case took up Mrs. Hall's first, she would like to see our women get letters to Henry Stevens. He said, she is a lady.

Two Day Football Meet Opens Tomorrow

Jacksonville, Fla., Dec. 2. —(INS)—More than 50 grid members from all over Dixie were here today for the annual session of the Southern Association of football coaches this afternoon.

The coaches' meeting will be the prelude of the two-day convention, opening here tomorrow, of the southern conference, comprising 22 of the south's foremost colleges and universities.

Outstanding in the matters to come before the conference is the request of University of Alabama to participate in the tournament of roses at Pasadena, Cal., on New Year's day, meeting Stanford University in a game that virtually will decide America's national grid championship this year.

The necessary permission will be readily forthcoming, it was believed.

Prospects Good For Extension Of National Forest

Raleigh, Dec. 2. —(INS)—Prospects for the extension of the national forest area in North Carolina were brightened today with the receipt of J. S. Holmes, State forester, of a telegram from Senator Charles L. McNary, of Oregon declaring that he would push the McNary-Woodruff bill, carrying provisions for an extension of the forests, to a vote at the session of Congress which convenes next week.

Senator McNary is chairman of the Senate committee on forest extension, which is reporting the bill following a survey of the forests over the country. The bill calls for an appropriation of \$400,000 over a period of ten years for forest extensions.

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MR. W. E. PROCTOR DIED LAST NIGHT IN WASHINGTON

**Funeral Services To
Be Held Tomorrow
Followed By Inter-
ment In New Ceme-
tery Here.**

W. E. Proctor, 1244 Grimes and prominent business man of this county and well known throughout this section of the State, died at seven o'clock last night in a Washington hospital. The remains were brought to this city last night for preparation for burial and then were carried to his home in Grimesland. Funeral services will be conducted in the Grimesland Christian Church tomorrow afternoon at one o'clock and interment will follow in new Greenwood Cemetery here at 2:30 o'clock. The services will be conducted by Rev. Warren Davis and Rev. Richard Bagby, of Washington. Rev. Perry Case, of Wilson, and Rev. J. M. Waters, of Arapahoe.

Services at the grave will be in charge of Bethlehem Commandery Knights Templars.

The deceased survived by his widow, Mrs. Lena Galloway Proctor; four daughters, Mrs. T. R. Andrews, Bethel; Mrs. W. T. Bryson, Greenville; Mrs. W. A. Hudson and Mrs. Norman Edwards, of Grimesland, and three sons, J. Knott Proctor, Greenville; Edward and David Proctor, of Grimesland. He is also survived by two brothers, J. O. Proctor, of Grimesland and John A. Proctor, of Sassafras, Maryland, a half brother, H. H. Proctor, of Grimesland; and two half sisters, Mrs. Sam Harris and Mrs. Richard Harris, of Greenville.

William Elijah Proctor, was born in this county, July 21, 1854. He always made his home in this county and was one of the county's foremost citizens. In 1882 he and his brother J. O. Proctor entered the mercantile business in Grimesland under the firm of J. O. Proctor and Brother. While Mr. Proctor made his home in Grimesland, he has been a big factor in business enterprises of this county. He built the Proctor Hotel here and for a number of years controlled it later selling it to E. G. Flanagan of this city. At the time of his death he was Vice President of the Greenville Banking and Trust Company and was president of the Grimesland Branch of the same bank. He had other business connections here and in other nearby cities.

For a number of years he has been a faithful member of the Christian Church in Grimesland and was instrumental in the building of and dedication of the church building. He is a member of several fraternal orders including the Masonic Lodge, Grimesland Bethlehem Commandery Knights Templar, here, Sudan Temple of Mystic Shrine, Newbern and the Elks Lodge, Washington.

For the past few years Mr. Proctor has been in bad health and several visits to specialists and hospitals, in the cities of the North failed to bring about his recovery. Death came last night after he had been confined in the Washington hospital for two months.

His death is a distinct loss to the entire county and he is mourned by his wide circle of friends throughout the entire section of the state.

GOV'T RESTS CASE AGAINST FALL AND DOHENY TODAY

**Government Counsel
In Oil Conspiracy
Case Rests And De-
fense Argument Be-
gins.**

Washington, Dec. 2. —(INS)—The government rested its case today against Albert B. Fall, ex-Secretary of the Interior, and Edward L. Doheny, multi-millionaire oil magnate, on trial for conspiracy to defraud the government in the leasing of naval oil reserves.

Attorney General Owen J. Roberts, chief government counsel, brought the government's case to a close soon after the trial opened this morning, and the defense then began its effort to tear down the federal indictment of the two "old prospectors."

The last government witness was Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Montana, who took the stand to present a letter he had received from Fall during the Senate investigation three years ago in which the cabinet officials declared E. B. McLean, wealthy publisher had loaned him the \$100,000 under scrutiny, although the checks to that amount were never cashed. Fall wrote further he was too ill to answer a subpoena to appear before the Senate investigators.

"I can assure you that the loan was not from Mr. Sinclair (H. F. Sinclair, the oil operator) or any one connected with the teapot dome or any other lease," Fall had written.

With this parting shot into the vitals of the defense, Roberts and Pomerene, rested and Wilton J. Lamberg, chief of Fall's counsel, launched into his opening argument to the jury.

Lamberg was entitled to open this late date because the defendants have separate counsel. Frank Hogan, first Doheny attorney, had addressed the jury at the outset of the trial when Roberts did likewise for the government.

Lamberg concentrated his early fire on establishing with the jury that Fall was out of Washington while the oil leases and contracts in question were being negotiated. He cited that the former Secretary of the Interior was way July 1, 1921, to October 17, 1921; from October 25 to 28, 1921; from December 1, 1921, to January 27, 1922; and from Oct. 8 to Nov. 37, 1922.

The Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, oil and storage bus were opened April 15, 1922, and the contract, which stipulated that the Doheny interests were to get leases in the naval reserve at a later date, was awarded on April 25, 1922.

Referring to the return to the capital of Fall from the last trip cited—November 27, 1922—Lamberg said:

"He returned just two days before the famous letter of Nov. 29 from the pen of Secretary of the Navy (Edwin Denby) which changed the whole aspect of the situation."

"So, too, we will show you the concurrence of the President of the United States, Warren G. Harding."

"You have heard these government officials who have testified. Other government officials will appear and offer you evidence just as straightforward and just as conclusive."

"We will show you that Fall didn't have a thing to do with the first contract," said Lamberg.

He told the jury further that Doheny was awarded the Pearl Harbor contract only after acting Secretary of Interior Finley H. Foster, then director of the Bureau of Mines, and Admiral J. K. Robinson had urgently recommended it.

Lamberg ridiculed the charge that the \$100,000 loan had been a bribe.

"They can't raise the ghost of that transaction," he declared. "The defense would establish, he said, a long standing friendship between Fall and Doheny, of such a close nature as to fully explain an unsecured loan of such an amount."

New Developments Expected Soon In Coroner's Probe

Raleigh, Dec. 2, (INS)—Seizure which surrounded the coroner's inquest into the murder of "Mighty" Forsthe today was taken to indicate that new developments in the case would be forthcoming soon.

Heretofore all sessions of the coroner's jury have been barred from the public, although newspapermen were allowed in the courtroom. Today even these were barred, and after the inquest recessed this afternoon, Coroner Waring refused to make an announcement "just now."

It was rumored that new developments have occurred, which, if made public, would hinder officials in bringing the investigation to a close.

FLOWERS AND WALKER MEET FRIDAY NIGHT

Chicago, Dec. 2, (INS)—Tiger Flowers, middleweight champion of the world, will go after the light heavyweight title held by Jack DeLaney, providing Flowers is successful in his middleweight clash with Mickey Walker at the coliseum here tomorrow night.

This was disclosed today by Walk Miller, Flowers manager who believes a victory over Walker will have eliminated the last outstanding middleweight and that the Georgia deacon will then be ready to seek new laurels in a heavier division.

PRINCE OF WALES NAME ON ROLL CALL IN PARIS IS MADE LANCE CORPORAL

Paris, Dec. 2, (INS)—When one name is reached on the roll call at the weekly parade of the 1st Battalion of France, the following nation regularly is made: "Lance-Corporal the Prince of Wales, absent with leave at the court of His Majesty the King of England."

The Prince was made an "anspessade" or lance-corporal when he visited the French military school at Saint-Cyr on October 29th last. This rank exists only in the Saint-Cyr Battalion and only two other persons have been granted it since the cadet school was founded by Napoleon. The word "anspessade" is derived from the Italian "lancia spezzata" originally meaning a non-commissioned officer in a foot regiment.

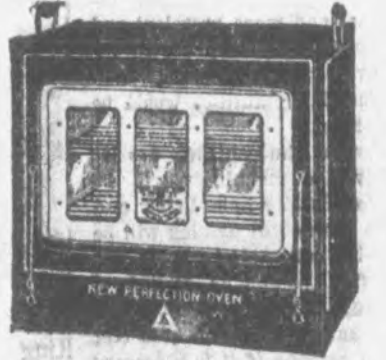

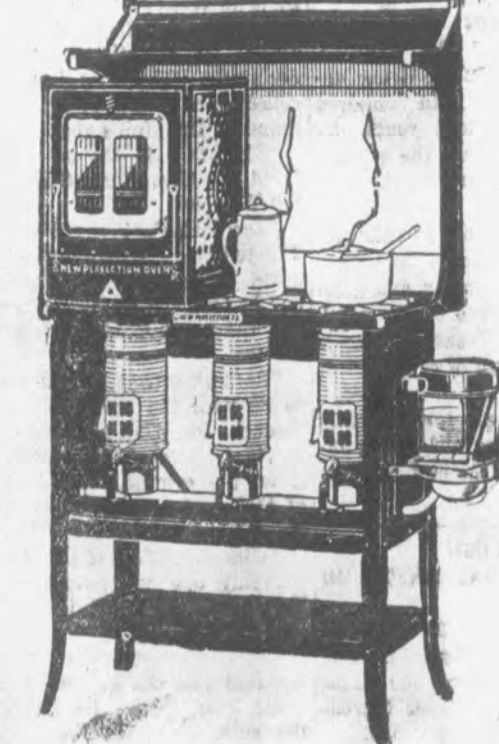

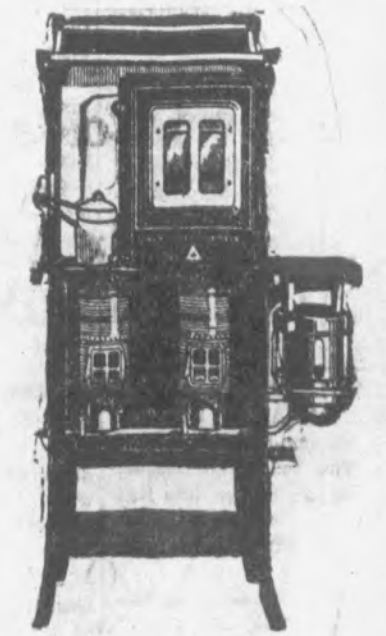

Kidnap Two
Dry Officers

New Orleans, Dec. 2.—(INS)—Parasuted by a frigate dry navy, the French rum runner Arsene J., with two kidnapped prohibition officials on board, was believed nearing Havana or Nassau today.

No trace of the schooner which put to sea after overpowering Assistant prohibition administrator J. B. Matthews in da machinist's mate, has been found since she escaped in a gale Monday. Commander J. L. Brookway of the coast guard cutter 302, reported by radio today.

Commander Brookway informed O. D. Jackson, chief dry administrator for his district, that in the forty hours since her escape the Arsene J. has had ample time to reach either Havana or Nassau. A report that the cutter 302 had overtaken the schooner only to lose it again when a tow line broke, was found to be untrue.

Meanwhile fear was expressed here that Matthews and the mate met with violence at the hands of the nine or ten men that composed the Arsene's crew.

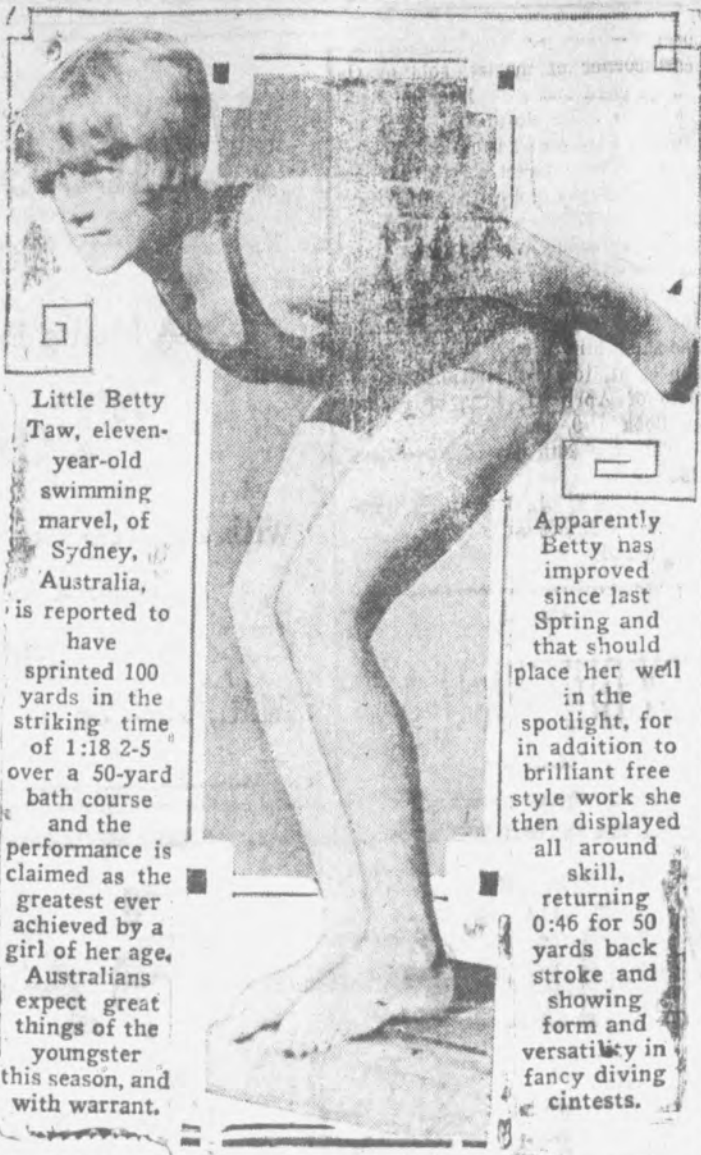

Market Report

MARKET LETTER

New York, Dec. 2.—(INS)—A rally in the oil, steel, utility, specialty and limited number of the railroad stocks, carried prices of the active issues to higher levels today. The market gave an exhibition of underlying strength. With the prevailing call loan renewal rate at 5 per cent, funds were freely available at that rate.

Allied Chemical, Industrial Alcohol and other special stocks and motor shares which carried the brunt of the recent selling, appeared in the tape, after which the advances to higher price levels were quite pronounced.

A new 1-2 point rise in Baldwin Locomotive brought that stock back to 142 1/2. United States Steel 2 3/4 and 401 stage pass points point gain and General Motors at 142 1/2, up 2 1/2. The trend of the oil stock was higher.

Pere Marquette sold at the highest price on record after advancing 4 points to 114.

Call loan rates were marked down to 4 1/2 per cent. In the last hour, and other evidences of an easier situation in the money market were presented.

The industrial and specialty

stocks reached their highest price levels in this period. Chrysler Motor sold near 38 and U. S. Steel was taken in large blocks around 149. Speculative interest also centered around a number of independent oil stocks, including Midcontinent, Phillips and Marland. Tobacco and utility stocks were strong on a bullish at the close.

MILLS TO BECOME UNDER-SECRETARY

Defeated Gubernatorial Candidate Of New York To Succeed Winston Under Mellon.

Washington, Dec. 2.—(INS)—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon announced officially today that under-Secretary Gerald B. Winston would be succeeded by Representative Ogden Mills, Republican, of New York, who was defeated for Governor by Al Smith.

Winston has not yet resigned, but will retire as soon as it is possible for Mills to leave his Congressional duties. Winston will practice law in Chicago.

Asked concerning his own plans, Mellon indicated that so far as he knows now he will remain in the cabinet until the end of the administration.

Incidentally, Mellon remarked that he might even be found in the cabinet of another administration. He is 71 years old.

Atlanta Prison Warden Has Plan Cure Drug Addicts

Atlanta, Dec. 2.—(INS)—Dissatisfied with the present method of handling drug addicts in federal prisons, Warden John Snook of Atlanta penitentiary has recommended the establishment of an institution solely for the cure of violators of the Harrison narcotic law.

Snook's plan would be to keep the addict in the special institution until a competent board could pass upon his condition and pronounce him cured. The addict would be released on probation and kept under surveillance.

If they should again become users of drugs, Snook said in his recommendation to attorney general John G. Sargent, they could be arrested and returned to the institution the same as parole violators are returned under the present parole law. This would save the time of the court and needless expense to the government in their readjustment and trial.

Several of our judges continue to sentence addicts to a year and a day in the penitentiary. It is my judgment that to sentence an addict for a year and a day in the penitentiary in order to reestablish him in society entirely fails of its purpose.

The violators of the Harrison narcotic law comprise one-third of the entire population of Atlanta penitentiary. Of the 713 violators of the drug act received during the past fiscal year, 292 were under sentence of a year and a day; 91

or 31 per cent were 'repeaters,' while only 17 per cent of those received with a longer sentence were 'repeaters.'

The use of narcotics undermines the whole moral fibre of the white race and they soon have no sense of responsibility. It requires at least two years of a drug addict's system to undergo a change so that he will have sufficient will power to resist temptation. It is a well known fact that at least 95 per cent of the drug addicts who are sentenced to a year and a day fail to refrain from its use after their release from the penitentiary.

The money that is now being expended by the government in trials of this class of convicts, could, it seems, be much better applied in the building of such an institution as I have described and at the same time relieve the overcrowded conditions existing today in the federal penitentiaries.

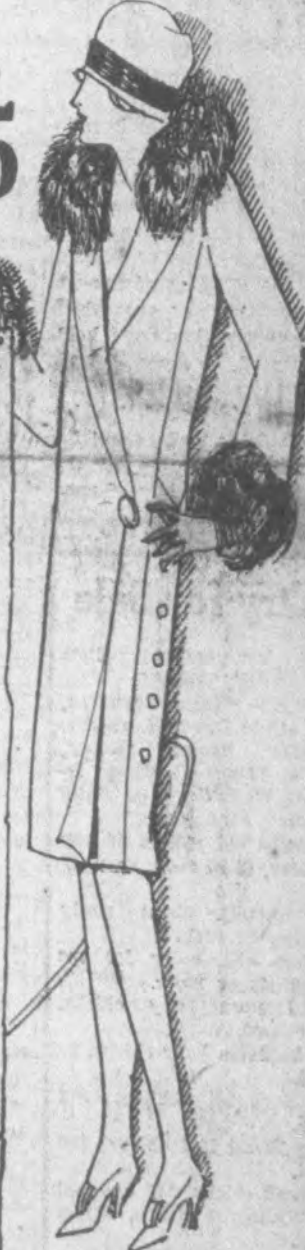

GEN. WOOD TO QUIT POST AS GOVERNOR OF THE PHILIPPINES

**His Retirement Has
Been Definitely De-
cided Upon By The
Coolidge Administra-
tion.**

(c) International News Service
Washington, Dec. 2.—The turbu-
lent days of Leonard Wood as Gov-
ernor General of the Philippines
are numbered.

His retirement has been definitely
decided upon by the Coolidge ad-
ministration, it was learned today
and consideration is now being
given the selection of a successor.

Three names are being consid-
ered: Senator James W. Wad-
sworth of New York, recently de-
feated for re-election; Col. Carini
Thompson of Ohio, who has just
completed a survey of the Islands
for President Coolidge; Col. Hen-
ry L. Stimson of New York, Sec-
retary of War in the Taft adminis-
tration.

Other names have been suggested
but it is this trio that are receiv-
ing major consideration. All are
veterans of the Spanish-American
War. All have a more or less in-
imate knowledge of Philippine af-
fairs, and all are available in that
they are generally acceptable to
party leaders and are now politi-
cally at liberty.

Col. Thompson's report on his
three months' investigation of af-
fairs in the Islands will be laid on
President Coolidge's desk shortly.
If it is not already in his hands.
It is understood to make three
prime recommendations:

1. Appointment of a civil rather
than a military governor.
 2. Removal of the Islands from
control of the War Department to
a civil department, such as the
Department of the Interior.
 3. Revision of some of the na-
tive laws, particularly one which
limits any corporation from hold-
ing more than 2,500 acres of land.
- The first two are designed to
remove some of the friction be-
tween the Filipino leaders and the
American administration of the

PEACE BETWEEN INSURGENTS AND G.O.P. UNCERTAIN

Western Insurgents In House Will Not Sub- mit To Caucus Sys- tem Of Republicans.

Washington, Dec. 2.—(INS)—The western insurgents in the House never will don the mantle of party regularity if they are forced to abide by the caucus system, members of the Wisconsin delegation announced today.

This answer to intimations of Republican leaders that the insurgents would be restored to committee from which they were expelled, if they enter party caucuses, somewhat dimmed the possibilities of the impending Senate armistice spreading to the House.

"I will never enter into an agreement to bind myself in advance on a vote," declared Rep. Henry A. Cooper, the venerable dean of the insurgent band.

Moreover I think that any man

who does so violates his oath of office.

"I will enter a conference, and nine times out of ten will agree with the result. But I will not bind myself to caucus rule." The insurgents will demand their right to be considered as Republicans but will make no overtures to the majority. It was declared by Rep. James A. Frear, also of Wisconsin. He endorsed the statement of Rep. Cooper.

Rep. Edward Volgt, who was not a candidate for re-election, expects to see his Wisconsin colleagues accorded party privileges by the Republican majority in the seventieth Congress which begins March 4.

"The alleged reasons for this disciplining of the progressives will largely have disappeared when the seventieth Congress meets," he said. "It is my opinion that the progressives will be accorded their rightful places."

The progressives, it was declared by Volgt, will never apologize for their support of Senator Robert M. La Follette in the 1924 Presidential campaign.

Rep. George J. Schneider, another Wisconsinite, also asserted that the insurgents wanted to be classed as Republicans but would never petition the majority to restore them to committees.

Meanwhile President Coolidge today assumed the role of peace-maker in an effort to smooth out

the latest differences between Republican leaders and the insurgent bloc in the Senate.

After disrupting previous peace negotiations by an objectionable appointment in North Dakota, the President invited Senator Gerald P. Nye, young insurgent, to the White House. They were to discuss the appointment of Colonel C. F. Mudgett as U. S. Marshal in North Dakota.

As Mudgett was named at the solicitation of L. B. Hanna, who Nye defeated for the Republican nomination in the last primary, the appointment will be bitterly fought by the insurgent bloc.

After conferring with the President this morning Senator Nye declared the situation is not irreconcilable.

"I think it can be ironed out satisfactorily," said Nye, leaving the impression that the nomination of Mudgett will be withdrawn, although he did not say so.

"We will oppose the nomination of Mudgett," said the North Dakotan.

COMPARISON OF OUR BODY WITH A STEAM ENGINE OR AUTOMOBILE

An original piece of work done by a general science student in the Greenfield High School. Louise Clarke, 8th grade, Pearl Williams teacher.

A steam engine runs on coal, which makes steam. An automobile runs on gasoline and air. Carbon, hydrogen and oxygen are the elements found in gasoline. The waste from burnt gasoline is carbon dioxide and water. We run on food, water and air. The body also produces waste and among the waste materials are carbon dioxide and water.

The steam engine also produces heat which is disposed of. Our body produces heat and some is cooled off by perspiring or perspiration.

Our food comes from animals and plants. In every kind of food we eat there is at least some of the five kinds of foods, protein, fats, carbohydrates, water and ash. Some samples of each are: celery and green corn for water; lard butter for fats; sugar honey and chestnut for carbohydrates; smoked herring, dried beef and cheese for proteins; raising and salt cod for ash.

It is necessary to consume our food so that we can digest it and our body can use it. The cells and blood needs it so as to build

up tissue and make us grow, as well as to make us able to work. It enables us to form more bone, more muscle, more blood and more nervous tissue. An automobile needs to be kept up in every part, because if one thing in the automobile gets wrong it will not run. Neither will it run if it does not have gasoline and water.

The energy which we secure from food is used for repairs and growth, as well as for work and heat. The gasoline in a car is burned to supply kinetic energy which drives the pistons and moves the car, but fails to repair worn parts.

Unless we keep our body in running condition we will not be able to work or we will get sick. Our body must have food and must be kept in order. The first responsibility is to take care of our teeth. We need them all—the flattened front teeth (incisors) for cutting, the pointed canines for tearing, and the bicuspids for grinding. We should form the habit of drinking plenty of water every day, eating some food at every meal, such as oatmeal, bread, fruit and vegetables. The automobile or steam engine need to be looked after and oiled as well as be supplied with their food. The automobile's food is gasoline and water. The steam engine's food is coal or wood and water.

Our own body will sometimes be torn and worn by improper food, improper exercise and careless habits. The steam engine will, sometimes be worn and torn by accidents and improper care. The broken down parts of our body will have to be repaired or rebuilt by careful and proper attention by the body itself. Sometimes in our body the broken down parts will collect and become a waste material when something is the matter with the steam engine, it is repaired. What if anything gets wrong with the automobile or steam engine new parts have to be ordered and put in to replace the old one.

Our bodies are the greatest and most perfect engines constructed, so why not value it and take care of it as you would an expensive automobile.

That which is pleasing to the eye of the motorist will indeed attract his attention and will create in his mind the most favorable impression of our city. Let other organizations join with the Daughters in carrying out this program of beautification of the approach to Greenville.

A LOST OPPORTUNITY

The larger portion of our fall season is now history and the Christmas season is upon us. Other cities in this and other states have already raised the funds to take care of their charities and other civic work during the coming year but so far Greenville has done practically nothing toward a Community Chest which means that next year we must take care of our obligations to society in the same haphazard manner as in years past. Early in the fall a move for a Community Chest for Greenville was started but apparently interest lagged and the beginning and the end of the project was one and the same. Again Greenville by its lack of interest has chosen a haphazard method of expenditure in preference to a plan that has been tried throughout the nation and found to be practical. No doubt the opportunity to effect a Community Chest here for this season has now passed but it is not too early for those interested to begin formulating the plans for the perfection of the Community Chest before another year. Let's get out of the rut and put our charities and welfare work on a business like basis.

CAN THEY STRAIGHTEN IT?

With a mounting surplus in the Treasury, obtained by taxes on individual incomes and corporation taxation, the Republican leaders in Congress give it out that they will strangle any effort to reduce taxation at this session of Congress. Evidently they are voicing the Treasury point of view. If the Republicans are bent upon denying reduction

of unnecessary taxation, levied on incomes or through tariff schedules, the Democrats and Progressive Republicans ought to demand action, and if the party in power refuses to permit a vote upon reducing taxes, they ought to force it by an extra session of Congress. Farm legislation and tax reduction are not things that may be postponed a year. It would be very agreeable to those on Easy Street, being enriched by the taxing policy, to wait a year. But farmers who can find no remunerative market for their crops and business men whose income is cut down feel that the time for action is now.

Democrats and Republicans who know the true situation should not permit the policy of delay to prevail. —News and Observer.

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers
of Population.

Moscow, Dec. 2.—(INS)—Caucasian communists are hanging their heads in shame and the city of Aul has had to change its government, all because of a black cat. Communists declare that God is a superstition, but some of them still believe that a black cat has potent power. For the mayor of Aul, a lone small black cat had the power to lose him his job and send him to jail to await trial.

In the Caucasian mountains the belief has persisted from time immemorial that the only way to cure domestic animals of any disease is to chase them over a tunnel occupied by a live black cat. Citizens of the city of Aul, distressed at the sight of their flocks and herds perishing from a plague, appealed to the city Soviet for help.

The chairman of the Soviet Dzerzhinsk, ordered the citizens to gather their cattle, sheep and goats in one big herd on the following morning. That night Mayor Katmesov himself went to a friend whom he knew possessed the largest black cat in town, and borrowed the animal, as he said, for therapeutic purposes.

Next morning Mayor Katmesov had a couple of city engineers dig a tunnel under the road near the pen where the cattle were herded. Tying the cat in a basket, he slipped it into the tunnel, and then ordered the citizens to drive their cattle across.

Everybody went home satisfied, but within a week all the previously healthy cattle in town had caught the disease from contact with their infected comrades. Government veterinarians were called, and the story, passed on to their superior officers, and Mayor Katmesov was called upon to explain his actions.

Deposed from office, Mayor Katmesov now awaits trial on the charge of "prompting ignorance and superstition."

Superstition seldom needs much active promotion in Russia. Saturated with it from the earliest days Russia may still be described as the least rational country in the world, even under the avowedly materialistic regime of the Bolsheviks.

Though Christians by profession the inhabitants of the Pechora district in the far northern part of European Russia are addicted to a system of infant sacrifice which has aroused the Soviet government to take active measures for its suppression.

A special governmental commission, sent to Pechora for the purpose of investigating the religious habits of the community, discovered that a suspiciously large number of babies were dying of starvation. Probing deeper, they found that the Pechorans believe that if a child dies before it is a year old it goes straight to heaven, and there appeals before the heavenly tribunal for its parents, who lose at least one-half of the responsibility for their sins.

Believing thus, Pechoran parents take care that at least one of their children shall die before the age of one year.

Another feature of Pechoran life that puzzled the investigators was the discrepancy in the reports of births and deaths. They found that not a single citizen of Pechora had died with the name with which he

was christened. Inquiring for the reason, they found that the Pechorans always had themselves rechristened when facing death, believing that under the new name St. Peter would let them in to heaven without checking back on the sins committed during their life time under the old name. Thus a feverish death bed the priest re-christens Peter into Paul, Ivan into Pavel, and Martha into Mary. The Soviet commission decreed that the inhabitants might continue to try to slip into heaven under an alias if they wished, but warned all parents that infant deaths from starvation hereafter would be rigorously prosecuted.

It so happened that George Gipp, Notre Dame immortal All-American, was in that game and during the intermission Rockne decided to abolish the shift for the remainder of the day.

Romance lies in the fact that Rockne took pains to tell Daly before play started in the second half that his team would run all their plays from punt formation, which it did with much success and satisfaction.

Gipp ran wide and wild around the Army flank for the rest of the afternoon and pulled the Irish out to decisive victory.

Rockne's answer to Yost, however, will probably be that there will never be another George Gipp hence the shift is important despite rules, arguments or observations.
