SEVEN LOSE LIVES RESULT BLIZZARD NEW YORK AREA

Snow Fall From Seven to Twelve Inches Record in Sections of North Yesterday.

New York, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Seven persons at least are dead and much discomfort was caused by an unexpected snow blizzard that swept New York City and the Atlantic seaboard from the Delaware Capes to Maine.

Weather predictions for today are colder and cloudy, with the end of the snow not yet in sight. The snow attained a depth of seven inches—the deepest for this time of the year since 1886.

The fall was general, extending from the Delaware breakwater to Maine, and as far inland as Ohio. Because of the week-end, holiday business was much less disrupted by the storm than would have been the case had it occurred during the week. Transportation and communication companies were given an opportunity on Sunday to put armies of emergency workers at their task, or clearing the lines for the opening of business today.

Widespread suffering was caused. In the metropolitan district, five lost their lives and many were injured as a result of the storm.

The gale rolled in huge waves at sea which deranged shipping. In northern New York State the storm was more severe. A fall from seven to twelve inches was recorded in Buffalo. There were three deaths there due to the storm, which was accompanied by a near-zero temperature. Syracuse reported a sweeping blizzard and zero weather.

New England, from Maine to Boston, recorded the coldest weather on record, with heavy snows and a high wind.

Over Hundred Ships Imprisoned In Frozen River

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 6.—(INS)—Hope of freeing the 121 ships valued at \$150,000,000 imprisoned in ice jammed St. Mary's River with their crews of approximately 2,000 men waned today as the blizzard with its below zero temperature continued to rage.

The entire fleet is suffering from lack of food and a number of the ships are in dire need of coal. Coast guards will be dispatched with food supplies, it is believed.

It was reported two sailors had drowned when they fell through the ice.

The ship blockade, said to be the worst in marine history, is several miles long on each side of the island. The ice is a veritable dam, twenty feet deep.

The use of thermite, the ice-smashing chemical invention which was used in the Pennsylvania ice jams last spring, has been suggested to officials of the Lake Carriers Association who are here.

Food provisions are being hauled by truck and team over drifted roads to the river, thence by tugs to steamers.

Eleven ships have been released so far.

Will Not Contest Seat of Sen. Steck

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Reports from Iowa that Senator Stephens, Democrat of Mississippi, planned to introduce a resolution ousting Senator Daniel F. Steck, Democrat of Iowa, from his seat in the Senate, were denied this afternoon by Stephens.

"I never heard of it," said Stephens. "Somebody must have dreamed it."

Stephens led the fight last spring to seat Senator Brookhart, Republican of Iowa.

69TH CONGRESS ENTERS LAST LAP EXISTENCE TODAY

Little But Routine Business Expected From Body Before END OF Session on March 4.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Congress came back to work today—the same Congress that was given such a shaking up at the polls a month ago.

It faces a veritable mountain of problems with only twelve scant weeks in which to solve them, and the opinion of the general among the leaders when the gavel fell that the closing session of the 69th assembly will pass into history on March 4th next, with comparatively little accomplished outside of the routine and the necessary.

It will be a session, according to the leaders, that will see much sharp fighting, much political maneuvering, much oratory, and a little of first rate accomplishment. "Lame Duck" Congress rarely set any records for achievement, and this one is expected to prove no exception.

With the sentence of death already passed upon it at the polls, the efforts of the leaders will be devoted to keeping legislation of the statute books, rather than seeing how much can be put on. In this endeavor time is their chief ally, for there remains but twelve weeks of life to this "Coolidge Congress," so called because it came into power on the crest of the 1924 landslide.

Disposal of the Treasury surplus of nearly \$400,000,000, farm relief, and radio regulation—these problems constitute the trinity of major tasks confronting the members when they assembled today. If these are adequately dealt with, in addition, passage of the usual appropriation bills, administrative leaders will write history on March 4 fairly well satisfied.

The fighting over the Treasury surplus, will be sharp. President Coolidge has recommended that the millions be turned back to taxpayers. The Democrats insist the surplus be made the basis for a general tax reduction. If the Congress's that neither proposal can prevail, and that in the end the enormous surplus will go by default into the retirement of the public debt now totaling approximately \$19,500,000,000.

The fighting over farm relief will be even sharper. Mid-western members, French from the disgruntled grain belt, have revived the McNary-Haugen bill which President Coolidge considers "radical." The bill was defeated a year ago because the Southerners would not support it. Since then, however, the South has been hard hit by the decline in cotton prices. The bill's only chance of passage lies in a coalition of South and West. Few believe that it can be accomplished.

A solution, temporary at least, for the present radio confusion probably will be found. If for no other reason than public demand for it is so great. The House has passed the White bill, giving Secretary of Commerce Hoover almost czar-like authority to regulate radio. The Senate passed the Dill bill, creating an independent bureau with regulatory powers. A compromise between the two probably will be worked out.

Chief among the other questions to be dealt with are prohibition, Muscle Shoals, alien property, shipboard board reorganization, railroad consolidation, primary "slush funds," et cetera. On all these matters, opinion is so sharply divided that it is not believed possible to work out any definite disposal. The wet bloc, for instance has organized to defeat any attempts at enforcement reorganization, sponsored by the drys, and by delays and parliamentary maneuvering can probably block any action for twelve weeks.

The dying 69th Congress assembled with the threat of a new session, of the 70th hanging over it.

Recognizing the futility of accomplishing much in three months, the Democrats are openly forecasting an extra session of the 70th Congress to deal with the problems that will not be dealt with in this session—principally tax reduction and farm relief. In the 70th Congress, the Democrats will be stronger, more militant, and in a better strategic position to enact their own program.

The present session will not really get down to business until Thursday. After the gavel, fall today the usual adjournment was taken out of respect to dead members. Tomorrow will be devoted to hearing President Coolidge's annual message. Wednesday will be devoted to the hearing of the budget read and discussed. Thereafter the fighting begins.

NORTH CAROLINA TO SHARE RIVERS AND HARBOR BILL

Chief Army Engineer Retired Naval Captain Says Doheny's Action Prompted By "Highest Patriotic Motives."

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Expenditure of \$65,177,365 on river and harbor improvements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, was recommended in the annual report of Major General Edwin Jadwin, chief of engineers, U. S. Army, made available today. This is partially distributed as follows:

For river and harbor work, general, \$44,458,365; Mississippi river flood control under Mississippi river commission, \$10,000,000; expenditures for river and harbor work during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1926, totaled \$6,463,786 of government funds and \$3,108,165 of contributed funds, not including \$3,744,435 sent to the construction and maintenance of dam No. 2, Muscle Shoals. The \$29,259,958 for new work included \$18,528,485 for maintenance of general projects; \$7,356,327 for new work and \$1,375,146 for maintenance, under the Mississippi river commission.

River and harbor allotment for the present fiscal year ending June 30, 1927 aggregated \$14,550,150 with \$4,469,850 of the \$50,000,000 appropriation received for the agencies. Recommendations of amounts exclusive of available funds that may remain unexpended at the end of the present year, which can be profitably expended during the fiscal year 1928, included: Potomac river at Washington, \$14,000; Potomac river below Washington, \$150,000; improvement of Potomac at Washington, \$1,000; Chesapeake Bay, \$1,000; Backwater river, \$1,000; Mohawk river, \$3,000; Roanoke river, \$3,000; Susquehanna river, \$1,000; Pamlico and Tar rivers, \$12,000; Neuse river, \$12,000; Contentment creek, \$1,500; Trent river, \$800; Beaufort harbor, \$15,000; waterway connecting Core sound and Beaufort harbor, \$3,000; Calumet waterway, Beaufort to Jacksonville, \$10,000; Morehead City harbor, \$5,000; Beaufort harbor, \$3,000; Cape Fear river at and below Wilmington, \$1,000; Cape Fear river above Wilmington, \$12,000; Northeast river, \$1,000; Black river, \$3,000; South Carolina: Savannah river, \$1,000; Great Pee Dee river, \$8,000; inland waterway Charleston to Beaufort, \$74,500; Charleston harbor, \$95,000; Santee river and Esterville-Basin canal, \$6,000; Shipyard creek, \$1,000.

Walsh Presents Resolution Demanding Investigation as the Maine Senator Takes Seat.

Arrest Head of Narcotic Ring.

New Orleans, Dec. 6.—(INS)—With the arrest of Napoleon Taylor, 41, negro, known in various parts throughout the United States as a "foodlum" narcotic agent today declared they had barged the head of a national drug smuggling and selling ring they have been trying for ten years to capture.

Taylor, when arrested by narcotic agent Maurice Helbrant, was wearing a \$3,000 diamond ring and was said by Helbrant to be worth more than \$500,000.

Officers declare more than twenty men are in the federal prison at Atlanta serving sentence for violation of the Harrison act, convicted while in Taylor's employ.

The capture was made by Helbrant after he disguised himself as an underworld character and made a purchase from Wilbert Jones, a negro.

Jones, made a complete confession and disclosed Taylor as the man he was operating for.

DECLARES PEARL HARBOR PROJECT WAS NECESSARY

Retired Naval Captain Says Doheny's Action Prompted By "Highest Patriotic Motives."

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—The general body of opinion against possible invasion from the Pacific was important at the time E. L. Doheny, millionaire oil operator, contracted to build a huge storage plant at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, "and it is important now," Capt. J. K. Robinson, U. S. N., retired, made this statement today on the witness stand in the conspiracy trial of Doheny and former Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, in defense of the Pearl Harbor contract which the government is attacking as an act of fraud.

The defense, through Robinson, had developed that in 1921 the Navy was in receipt of a report, made by Doheny and the Philippine defense, contended that only the "highest patriotic motives" prompted Doheny to make the Pearl Harbor contract which he obtained a preferential right of choice from which he later got a slice of the Elk Hills Naval oil reserve.

Under cross examination by Owen J. Roberts, government counsel, Robinson took by his testimony that the Pearl Harbor project was an important part of the "war plan" when the "war plan" report was received and for that reason kept the negotiations secret. At the juncture, however, Roberts read from two long testimony in which Robinson had said the secrecy was maintained for a reason.

Roberts questioned Robinson about the Washington disarrangement conference which was so long while the Doheny negotiations were on, in an effort to show the jury that the nation feared of secretly mobilize against the United States, at the very time was agreeing to reduce its navy.

DEMAND PROBE OF BRIBERY CHARGES AGAINST A. GOULD

Walsh Presents Resolution Demanding Investigation as the Maine Senator Takes Seat.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—A formal Senate investigation of the bribery charges raised against Senator-elect Arthur R. Gould, Republican of Maine, during the recent campaign there, was proposed in the Senate today in a resolution introduced by Senator Walsh, Democrat of Montana.

Walsh sponsored the resolution just as Gould advanced to take his oath of office. Republicans and the crowded galleries at first believed Walsh sought to block the seating of Gould, but his resolution merely demanded an immediate investigation.

The incident came with dramatic suddenness and was smoothed out only after Vice-President Dawes ruled that the resolution could not be considered until tomorrow.

As Gould advanced to be sworn into office, Walsh halted the proceedings to sponsor the resolution which recounted how Gould was involved in the payment of \$100,000 bribe to the Premier of the Province of New Brunswick several years ago. Gould stood silent beside his colleague, Senator Hale (R.) of Maine, while the charges were read.

Republican leaders immediately went to Gould's assistance. Senator Curtis, Republican floor leader, made a point of order and then Senator Moore (R.) of New Hampshire, invoked the rules of the Senate which forbade immediate action on the resolution. Dawes upheld Moore's request that the resolution go over for one day.

PAWNBROKER KILLED AND DAUGHTER INJURED IN HOOD-UP TOODAY

Chicago, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Davy Weinstein, 40, pawnbroker, was shot and killed today and his daughter, Jeannette, was probably fatally beaten by a lone hold-up man.

LEAGUE NATIONS COUNCIL OPENS GENEVA TODAY

German Minister Will Not Object to The League Supervision Germany's Armament Program.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—(INS)—The session of the League of Nations Council opened at eleven o'clock today with the foreign ministers of seven countries present. M. Vandervelde, Belgian foreign minister, presided.

Before the preliminary private session for drawing up the agenda for the session Foreign Minister Stresemann of Germany, gave an indication that he would object to the League's procedure for controlling German armaments, which had been decided upon by the council at its 1924 session.

There was a report current today that M. Briand had entered an agreement with Stresemann, not to object to League supervision of armaments in Germany on the understanding that the council of Ambassadors, would shortly decide the permanent provision of the Versailles treaty and the allied supervising committee would be recalled.

It is generally admitted that unless Stresemann can return to Germany with some concessions he is doomed to meet with an attack that may oust him from office. Neither M. Briand nor any other League leaders desire to see the downfall of Stresemann, whom they regard as perhaps the warmest supporter of the League in Germany.

Everett Resigns As Cashier Of Hood System Bank

Cecil Everett has resigned as Cashier of the Hood System Industrial Bank to enter the mercantile business as head of the Everett Porter Co., Inc. This company will operate a general mercantile and farm supply store at Grimsland, N. C.

FINAL HEARING IN FORSYTHE KILLING BE HELD THURSDAY

Wake Coroner Says Case Will Be Definitely Settled Before He Closes Thursday's Hearing.

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 6.—(INS)—Startling revelations, which will be heard before the Wake County Coroner's jury Thursday morning, will bring the two-week investigation of the slaying of L. G. "Mighty" Forsythe, picturesque run runner, to a smashing climax.

Every indication pointed to this today as Coroner L. M. Waring continues to unearth new clues in Wake County's now sensational murder drama. The coroner, who has thrown a veil of secrecy around the investigation for the past few days, has called his jury to reconvene for a fourth time on Thursday morning.

Coroner Waring intimated today that he might call the jury together again before the session set for Thursday. "It all depends on developments," he said. Officers will bend every effort from now until the jury reconvenes to apprehend Robert Stephenson, the fourth man wanted in connection with the case.

Stephenson's testimony before the coroner's jury is regarded as "vitally important" by Coroner Waring. Stephenson is alleged to have been an occupant of the automobile in which Forsythe was killed, apparently by a blow across the head with a sharp edged instrument.

Robert Separk, run runner, and Evelyn Britt, 18-year-old Durham girl, held on charges of murder, are expected to be called to testify on Thursday's hearing. That the coroner's jury wants to hear more of the Britt girl's story was indicated when a capias for her arrest was issued. She was released on bond, again, however, only after State counsel had offered considerable opposition.

Separk, recovering from injuries he sustained in an automobile accident while trying to escape from officers, has intimated that he desires to go before the coroner's jury again. However, he indicated that he would reiterate, at first, story that Forsythe was killed when he fell from the speeding automobile.

Both Separk and the Britt girl are alleged to have been in the automobile with Forsythe when he was killed. Harry Fournier, of Raleigh, a so-called fall here charged with the murder, while Archie W. Thompson, of Durham, is being held on charges of accessory after the fact.

That the last revelation of the case is expected to reach a climax today, is indicated by the fact that Coroner Waring today.

"The case will be settled next Thursday if I have to keep the jury in session all day and all night and FF lay," Coroner Waring declared.

Moguls Arrive In Asheville For Baseball Meet

Asheville, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Baseball magnates continued to pour into town today to attend the 25th annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues which opens here tomorrow.

Prior to the big convention the American Association was in session, transacting routine business of no public importance. A tentative schedule was drawn up, but no dates announced. The only real business was the election of the meeting of the Western League to allow St. Joe, Ind., which is to be transferred to Asheville, Tenn., and the election of the Oklahoma City and Tulsa clubs which had threatened to withdraw. Dale Gray was re-elected president of the league.

Seeks To Locate Summer White House West of Mississippi

Washington, Dec. 6.—(INS)—A definite move to locate a summer White House west of the Mississippi river will be made by the Congress assembly today, as was announced by Rep. L. J. Dickinson, Republican of Iowa. Dickinson dropped into the legislative hopper today a bill to create a commission to select a site for the Western White House to report back to the 70th Congress next December.

Farm Agents Meet In Raleigh

FARM AGENTS P. Raleigh, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Approximately 80 North Carolina farm agents met here today for the first day winter farm conference.

Although not listed on the program, it was expected that cotton acreage reduction would occupy a greater part of the conference. An array of notable speakers has been scheduled to address the conference and a variety of problems are scheduled to come under discussion.

111 Years Old Veteran Passes

Hillgroveville, Ga., Dec. 6.—(INS)—"Uncle Billy" Collins, Civil War veteran, died here at the age of 111 years. He is survived by 55 grandchildren and 50 great and great-grand children.

"Uncle Billy" was born in Alabama but lived practically his whole life in West Georgia as a farmer.

CHRISTMAS SEALS MAKE LONGER LIFE

"Seven years have been added to the duration of the average man's life, since the development of the Christmas seal only eighteen years ago," according to a statement prepared by the committee on tuberculosis and public health of the State Charities Aid Association and broadcast last night from WGY.

"One of the outstanding pioneers in tuberculosis work in America was the late Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau, founder of the Trudeau sanatorium in New York state, and from whose ideas and accomplishments there have now sprung more than 600 tuberculosis sanatoriums in the United States.

"A consumptive himself, doomed to what was then thought cer-

tain death, Dr. Trudeau went to the Adirondack mountains to spend his last days. He did not die, but lived for forty years, and in so living saved many others. Today his ideas are being expressed in health campaigns, conducted by 1,500 organized and functioning tuberculosis and health associations.

"The tuberculosis organizations finance their work almost entirely by the yearly sale of Christmas seals.

"Just how far the Christmas seal will be able to spread its light this year depends on how many seals you and I and all of us buy and use on holiday letters and packages. Buy Christmas seals and fight tuberculosis.

UNLIGHTED VEHICLES
In a collision near here last night between an automobile and an unlighted animal drawn vehicle, several persons received injuries. This is a common occurrence on the highways of the state and should have the attention of the lawmakers when they gather in Raleigh next month. The list of injured throughout the state from such accidents is a forceful argument for laws requiring the lighting of all vehicles and it is to be hoped that despite its former failures, the vehicle light measure will be given favorable consideration when it is presented to the next General Assembly.

SAFE AND SANE
Now comes a plea from the State Department of Insurance to the people of the state for a safe and sane observance of Christmas, and a warning against a repetition of the usual number of holiday fires and accidents. Pointing out that during the last year in North Carolina 293 lives were lost by fire, and 486 persons were injured in addition to property losses of more than six millions of dollars, the Insurance Department issues the following warning regarding the dangers that surround Christmas trees.

"Many fires are caused by candles on Christmas trees. The tree should be fastened firmly, so that it cannot be upset, and should not be decorated with paper, cotton or other inflammable material. Cotton which is used to represent frost or snow, catches fire very easily. The same effect can be secured by the use of asbestos or mineral wool, which is safe. The candles should be placed on the tree so that they cannot set fire to branches above them, and should not be lighted by children. Before the gifts are distributed the candles should be extinguished. Electricity is much safer than candles for lighting Christmas trees. Doors should remain closed while the candles are burning, because of the danger of drafts swaying the branches or blowing curtains against the tree. The floor around the tree should be protected by a piece of zinc

Biggest Airship Soon Ready to Start to India

London, Dec. 6.—(INS)—The closely guarded secrets of what is claimed to be the most wonderful airship in the world were unfolded to the Dominions Premiers at the Imperial Conference recently when they visited the airship sheds at Cardington. R-101, the British super-airship destined for the England-Egypt India route, was shown to them in its partially completed state, while they were given access to the plans showing how the ship will look when she is completed. Although details of this new airship have not been officially divulged, it is generally understood that the R-101 breaks completely away from the notions of Count Zeppelin and that she differs in practically every detail from any predecessor. Stainless steel is being employed throughout in her construction and it has been found that strength for strength, it is lighter than duralumin. There will be five 600 horsepower engines, each housed in a car slung underneath the ship. Gasoline will not be used, heavy oil, which is stated to be very economical in use, taking its place. The propellers will be of steel in order to resist tropical conditions. Other main features of the airship are: Carry capacity: 100 passengers and their luggage, and ten tons of mail. Sleeping cabins with two and four berths. Lounges, smoking rooms and dining rooms, capable of seating fifty people at a time. Promenade decks on which the passengers will be able to stretch their legs. Fully equipped kitchens, making it possible to serve a five or six course dinner. Shower baths. Accommodation for dancing and games. Probable facilities for radio entertainment and possibly even for a daily newspaper. An elevator. The whole of the passenger accommodation of the R-101 will be contained in the hull of the airship. The accommodation is amidsips, divided into upper and lower decks. On the upper decks will be the lounges and the main part of the sleeping accommodation, while running along each side of the airship will be two promenades. On the lower deck will be the smoking room, kitchen—with an elevator to the dining room—crew's quarters, and the remainder of the passenger's sleeping accommodation. Both R-101 and her sister ship, R-100—which is being built later at Howden—will have a minimum speed of seventy miles an hour at an altitude of 5,000 feet, with a cruising speed of 63 miles an hour, and will have a range at cruising speed with an ordinary load of about four thousand miles. When completed they will have trial flights in England, and will then be further tested on cruises to Egypt and India. The airships will save ten days on a trip between England and Bombay, 18 days, between England and Melbourne, and 13 1/2 days between England and Africa. R-101 will be 730 feet in length with a maximum diameter of 130 feet. Her load lift will be 150 tons, half of which will be reserved for fuel.

Chicago Merchant Princes Talk of Jazz
Chicago, Dec. 4.—(INS)—Chicago's merchant princes are all hot up over the knotty problem: Does jazz dancing increase the efficiency of the help? J. J. McCarthy, contractor, started the ruckus and before the last emphatic "No" was sounded, the loop district had reached new noise-making heights. McCarthy said the Charleston and other dances increased the efficiency of his employees. He confessed that his success was mainly due to the dancing college graduates he hired. "That is the bunk," said William Wrigley, Jr., when asked if Charlestoning bachelors of science kept his gum works going. "Nobody in my office or factory does the Charleston. If they can do it the secret is kept dark. We haven't any time for dancing in our organization." P. F. Smith, who does the hiring and a good bit of the firing at the Montgomery Ward mail order house, was, if anything, even more emphatic. "Efficiency and dancing have no connection at all," said Smith. "When we want men to drive our trucks, we don't, as Mr. McCarthy says he does, look for college graduates." Milton Callner, contributed another contractor's view on the naughty problem. "Not a college graduate or a valedictorian contest winner works for me outside of my office staff," said Callner. "No tea hound can drive a truck for me or my company. I don't care where he got his diploma."

Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 4th. (INS.)—Announcement that Ray "Cracker" Schalk, White Sox first string catcher, has been named by President Charlie Comiskey to succeed Eddie Collins as manager of the Pale Hose was received with general surprise in sporting circles.

Only two of the once mighty White Sox team of 1917, 1918, and 1919 are now in Cl-cas. Schalk, himself, and Urban "Red" Faber, the great spitballer from Casade, Iowa.

The Chicago American League team of 1919 has been regarded by sporting experts, generally as the greatest aggregation of players ever gathered together on the team and came to be known as "The Million Dollar Team."

When the famous scandal erupted in the White Sox Cincinnati Robt world series of 1918 shook the baseball world, President Comiskey, in one magnificent gesture, smashed the mighty team he had taken years to build and \$1,000,000 worth of baseball stars, aged and grimy, but none the less stars, were thrown on the scrap heap.

Names to conjure with! The mighty Joe Jackson, undoubtedly one of the greatest natural ball players of all time, the lovely left-handed "Shoelace Joe," "Lefty" Felsch, centerfielder, without peer; Chick Grandil, one of the finest first basemen of his day; Charlie "Swede" Rishberg the erratic but brilliant shortstop; Black Weaver, popular idol of the South Side fans, and one of the most brilliant and versatile third basemen the game has ever known; Eddie Cickie—who came to the Sox as a discard who wrote pitching history for the Pale Hose in his last two seasons; Claude "Lefty" Williams, running centerfielder, close second in brilliance of mound effort. And, last, McMullen, veteran infielder.

The great scandal left but few stars on the once great team. Schalk, one of the games greatest backstops, remained. "Red" Faber, the dependable, "Kable" star of the mound, survived. Eddie Collins, left fielder, was re-proche. He was the only infielder left. Shano Collins and Nemo Leibold alternated in right field. They were faithful. "Wee" Dickie Kerr, the hero of the clouded series, also was untouched.

Two pitchers, two outfielders, a backstop and a second baseman was what Comiskey had left of his great ball team.

Shano Collins and Leibold went the trade route. Dick Kerr took up pro baseball to return to his old team but the cunning had left his great little south paw and he is no longer in the big show. Schalk, Faber and Collins only remained.

Now Eddie Collins is gone. The fastest thinking second baseman we ever saw has been slipping.

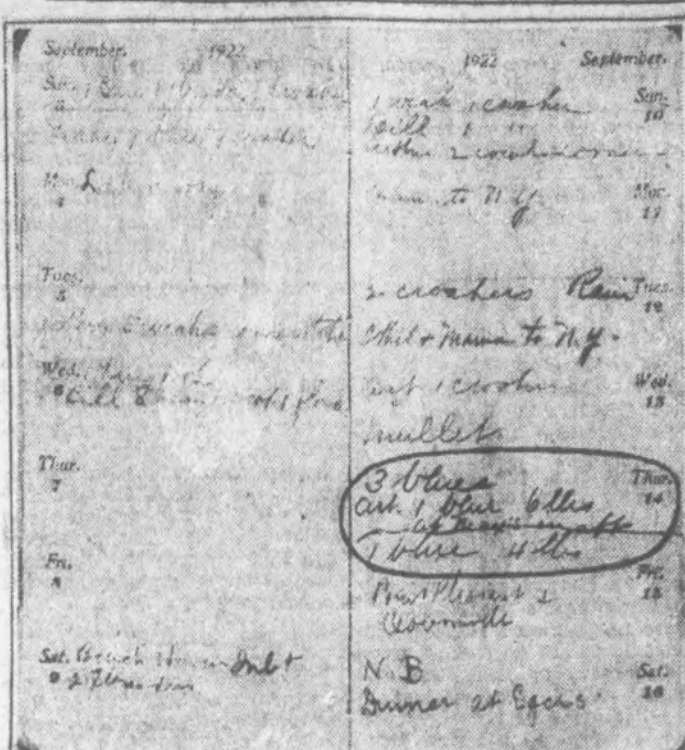

NEED THREE MORE YEARS TO REBUILD ALL PARTS OF WAR RUINED FRANCE

Paris, Dec. 4.—(INS.)—It is estimated that at least three years more will be required for the rebuilding of that part of France which suffered the most destruction during the war. This war in his Nord, Alsace, Pas-de-Calais, Marne and Somme departments where the actual loss of a material kind is put at 38,000,000,000 francs and the total indemnity at nearly four times this amount. Altogether 834,844 buildings were destroyed or damaged. Already, however, 321,913 have been permanently rebuilt and 42,000 temporary ones have been put up with old material. In face of these figures one can scarcely think that France is leaving her ruins untouched for the world to visit, although 108,000 wooden shacks put up during the war are still being used by people unable to find a better roof to shelter them.

Paris Style Hints

Paris, Dec. 4.—(INS.)—Even before the first snow falls the smart dressmakers are out with hints for early spring wear. These clothes are usually the ones first seen at the winter resorts. There seems to be doubt now if it skirts are to be two or three inches longer when the first robin sings his song, this will bring them well below the knee which is quite visible these days. It will not be a marked change but even a little inch or so makes a big difference in this matter. The lighter shades of blue, all more or less of a grayish tinge are prime favorites for the spring and beige has come to the fore again.

Rubber Buying Pool Organized

New York, Dec. 3. (INS.)—A score of the largest and most powerful automobile manufacturers and rubber manufacturers of the United States today were banded together in a gigantic rubber buying pool aimed to break the monopolistic grip of England on the world's supply price of raw rubber.

Arrangements for a joint purchasing fund credit of \$40,000,000 negotiated with the National Bank of Commerce of New York and the International Acceptance Bank.

The plan was attributed to Charles B. Seger, president of the United States Rubber Company.

London, Dec. 3. (INS.)—No danger of anything resembling a trade war in rubber was anticipated today by British Rubber interests as a result of the purchasing pool organized by American combine the head of one of the largest rubber syndicates in Great Britain told the International News Service today.

"Such a combine will help to stabilize prices and prevent seasonal fluctuations," this spokesman said. "The British Rubber capital is so large that there is no possible danger of anything resembling a trade war as the result of the American footing their resources."

Raw rubber advanced on the market today upon news of the new combine.

Market Report

MARKET LETTER
New York, Dec. 6.—(INS).—In an attempt to reap the benefits of a top-heavy market for industrial stocks, following about ten days of almost uninterrupted advance, professional traders in an out of Wall Street offered stocks quite today and the general trend of prices was downward.
Price movements were narrow and unimportant, many of the active stocks retracing their steps a dozen times around a given point, while speculative activities revolved about a few groups of stocks, including the tobacco, the equipment, the motors, amusement stocks and the baking stocks.
Money market conditions favored the bears. Banks called a considerable volume of money from the call loan market in order to correct their impaired reserve position as revealed in Saturday's bank statement, and the call loan rate advanced from 4 1/2 to 5 per cent. The usual nervousness attending the launching of a new session of Congress was in evidence in the financial district.
The wave of profit-taking and professional selling which flooded the market in the forenoon was well absorbed but with moderate recessions in prices, after which many of the speculative stock leaders appeared to be in line for a rally. Most to the trade and business reports of the day were favorable, with the exception of a decline in steel mills operations in the Mahoning Valley District, which was not unexpected.
Railroad stocks passed almost completely out of the picture, the only trading in that department being a few of the "investment rails" and usually at slightly lower price ranges. Industrials were dominated by the professionals to a greater extent, even, than in the last two or three weeks and the prevailing attitude was one of indecision and mark-time policy in all but a few of the specialty stocks.
Baking stocks were freely offered and Continental Baking A dropped back about 6 points to 164 1/2 while hard lost 2 points. The tobacco stocks were buoyant; Textiles firm, with American Woolen up 3 points at 35; Amusement stocks firm, with the Famous Players up 2 points; oils and copper slightly reactionary with fractional losses for the active stocks in these groups.
Sales in the first three hours were nearly 300,000 shares less than in the same period on Friday, and the contraction in the number of stocks traded in was greater in proportion. Call money was boosted to 5 1/2 per cent in this period, the effect of which was to further restrict stock market activity.
The commodity markets were quiet and featureless. Petroleum markets were firm as also were the rubber and sugar markets. Foreign exchanges were steady, with French francs easing off to 3.93 cents.
Industrial stocks were firm in the final period, notwithstanding the 5 1/2 per cent call loan rate and the heavy volume of professional selling.
Baldwin Locomotive was a buoyant leader, advancing 5 points from the low of the day to 157 1/2. American Woolen sold up 3 1/2 points to 35 1/2, while the preferred was in demand at 88 3/4, up 1 1/2. Tobacco stocks continued to move forward. Mercantile stocks sold higher, and Oil stocks recovered the bulk of their early losses.
Westinghouse Airbrake, International Harvester and other high-priced shares featured a strong and active market near the close.
GRAIN CLOSE
Chicago, Ill., Dec. 6.—(INS).—Grains closed irregular today with wheat 5-8 cents higher to 1-2 cents lower.
Trade in wheat was moderate and without much feature. Prices were 14 to 16 higher at the start on buying by commission houses and locals. The Liverpool cables were not as strong as expected, opening 1-2 to 5-8, higher. Buenos Aires opened unchanged.
Estimated receipts were 21 cars. Corn opened 1-8 to 3-8 better under light offerings and buying by professionals. On the advance there was local selling and the market lost some of its gain.

Plemmons Fate To Be In Hands Of Jury Today

Waynesville, Dec. 6.—(INS).—The fate of J. L. Plemmons, on trial for the slaying of Arthur Miller, of Canton, probably will be in the hands of a jury late this afternoon.
Arguments were started when court reconvened for the week this morning, after the jury in the case had been released since Saturday afternoon. All evidence was in when court recessed Saturday.
Th arguments were expected to last into the afternoon. Plemmons is being tried on a charge of second degree murder. He admitted slaying Miller, but entered a plea of self defense. The defendant testified that Miller and one of his sons attacked him, and endangered his own life before he decided to shoot. Plemmons' wife and several of his children corroborated details of evidence given by the defendant. All defense evidence showed that Miller was killed in a free-for-all fight.

To Discuss Settlement of Hall-Mills Case

Somerville, N. J., Dec. 6.—(INS).—Now that the world famous Hall-Mills murder trial is all over somebody has to pay the bills of the long drawn-out prosecution, but the taxpayers of Somerset county are no taxpayers to assume the responsibility.
The question of settling the bills estimated to total from \$75,000 to \$125,000, will be discussed tomorrow at a special meeting of the board of chosen freeholders, and it has been reported that a committee of taxpayers will be on hand to oppose payment.
Meanwhile, in New Brunswick two of the four former defendants were giving their views on the case.
"After what has happened to me I cannot be so proud of being an American citizen as I once was," said Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall. Mrs. Hall expects to remain at her home in New Brunswick with her brother Willie Stevens, another of the defendants.
Henry Carpenter, New York stockbroker, who was indicted for the killing of the Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, announced that he would leave today with his wife for a plantation, thirty miles south of Charleston, S. C., on a duck shooting expedition. Commenting on the case, he said:
