

MISSING RUM SHIP HAS BEEN LOCATED

Prohibition Agent Matthews Sends Message that Ves- sel Has Arrived in Mexican Port.

New Orleans, Dec. 7.—(INS).—V. D. Jackson, dry chief of the Gulf zone, today notified the State Department of the safe arrival in Puerto, Mexico, of the rum runner Arsenio J., which broke arrest a week ago with two prohibition officials aboard.

Assistant administrator J. B. Matthews and coast guardian Handley are safe and apparently have been in control of the runner ever since she eluded her captors off Southwest Pass. Matthews wired that the schooner was turned over to customs officials in Puerto.

Matthews' cablegram read: "Arrived here Monday at 10 a. m. with Arsenio J. and crew. Handley with me. Customs officer has schooner under arrest. Crew of schooner under arrest. Cab's instructions cover action American consul J. Starks."

Jackson said he would ask the advice of the State Department regarding whether the Arsenio J. would be brought back to this port.

Matthew and Handley were left aboard the runner as a guard when a stiff gale halted towing operations immediately after her capture November 29. The schooner and the patrol boats 286 and 300 went to Burwood for fuel. When they returned the ship had disappeared.

Then began the most spectacular search in the history of Uncle Sam's anti-rum running forces. Every coast guard vessel on duty in the Gulf of Mexico, from Texas to Florida, was pressed into the search, but not until word was received last midnight direct from Matthews had any trace been found of the Arsenio J.

The happiest person in New Orleans today was Mrs. Matthews, who had come here from her Kentucky home to aid in the search for her husband. Matthews has been in the government service for 40 years, dating back from the time he was in the army fighting Indians.

Attendance At Baseball Meeting Will Be Large

Asheville, Dec. 7.—(INS).—Baseball magnates, managers and scouts continued to pour into the city today as the first day's session of the National Association of Professional Baseball League convention got under way. Indications were that late arrivals would boost the attendance mark above 700.

Among the various matters which are expected to come before the convention is the proposal of Ott. Borchert, president of the Milwaukee American Association club, to limit the price to be paid by major clubs for outstanding players in the minors.

Although the convention proper did not get under way until this morning, Asheville has been filled with baseball magnates and club managers for the past two days here to attend preliminary meetings.

The American Association, after congratulating itself on large attendance last year, adjourned. It will meet in Chicago next week to decide the 1927 schedule.

President Thomas J. Muekey, of the American Association, was given a \$2,000 a year salary raise and was re-elected for three years at \$10,000.

The proposal to restrict players from playing in off-season, the new minor-league agreement, and selection of the 1927 meeting place were among the important matters to come before the convention today.

A movement was under way prior to the opening of the convention this morning to eliminate high priced player-managers in the major leagues. The movement was pointed out, had its beginning with the retirement of Ed. Collins and Ty Cobb.

Clarence Rowland, American League umpire, was here for the convention, a special envoy of Ben Johnson. In addition to his role of observer, Rowland is seeking an umpire to take the place of George Moriarty, who recently took over Ty Cobb's job of managing the Detroit Tigers.

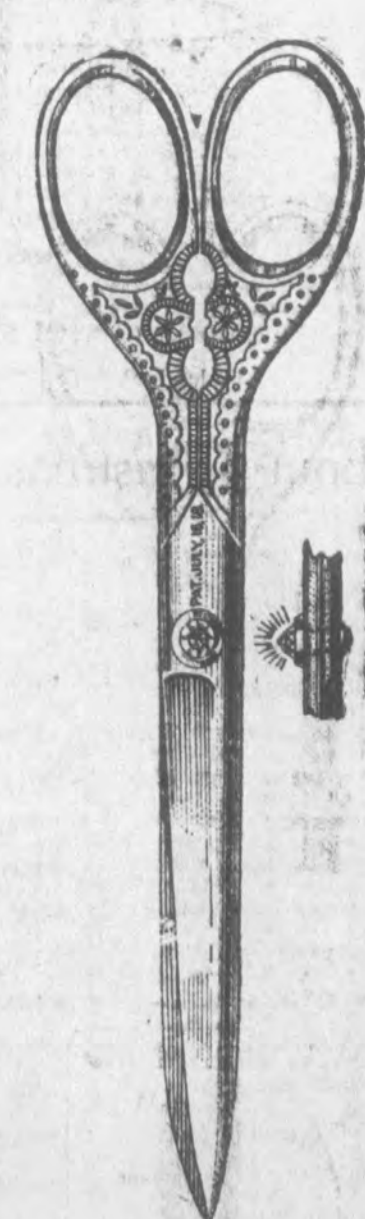
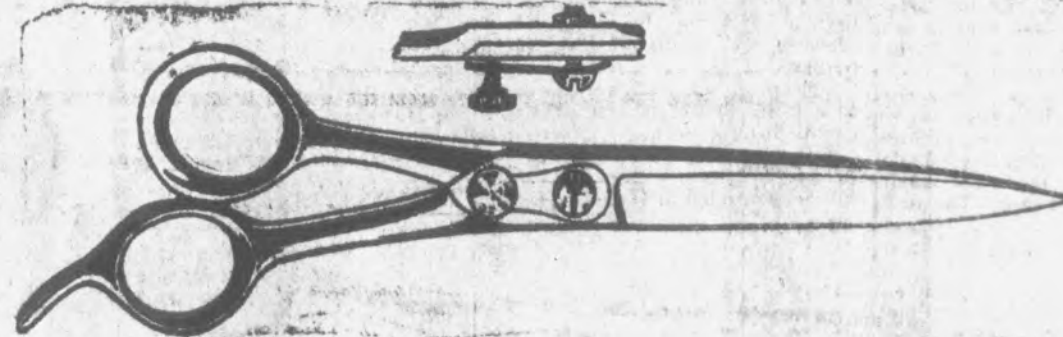
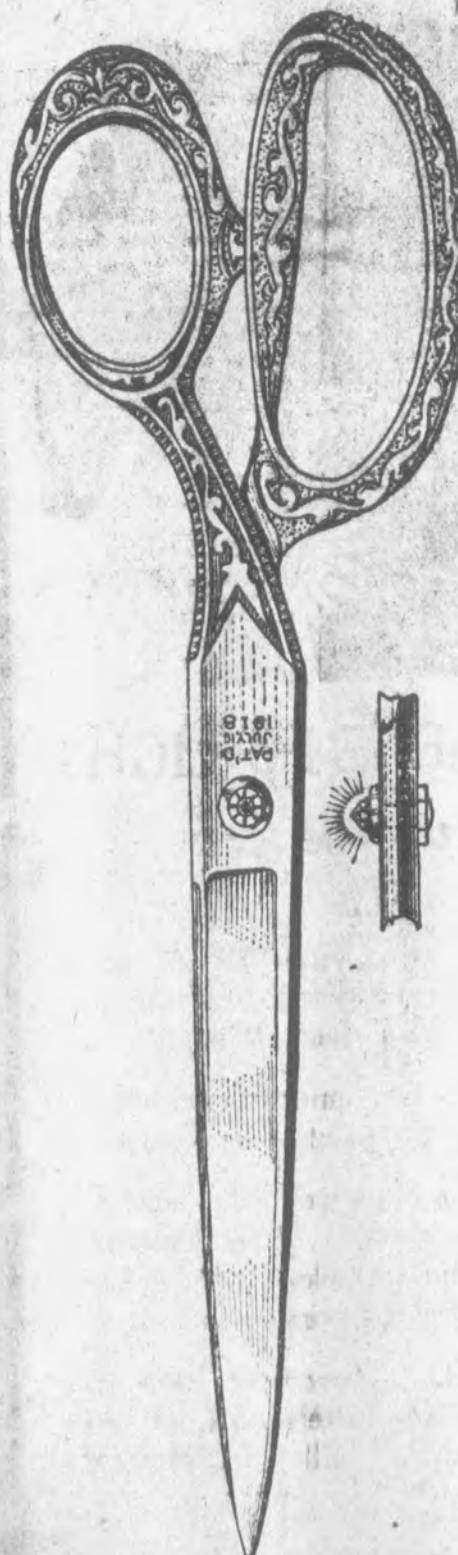

A year or more ago it looked like a daring enterprise for Atlanta to raise from its business men a fund of \$250,000 for advertising, but that was done, the advertising has been carried on, and the official report to report states that in the last ten months this publicity has been instrumental in bringing 136 new plants to Atlanta with annual payrolls aggregating over \$7,000,000, and bringing to the city 10,000 new people.

"The success of that movement has been so great that it is now proposed to raise this advertising fund to \$1,000,000.

"President Coolidge recently called attention to the fact that the prosperity of America has been largely created by advertising. More and more it is being realized that advertising is the lever which lifts business out of the Slough of Despond in times of depression, and is really a creative force which not only lifts business but sustains it on a higher plane of activity than would ever have been possible in any other way. It has been wisely said that chemistry is one of the great creative forces of the world. But chemistry is scarcely a greater science and is certainly not more powerful in the creation of business than is advertising, well directed and continuously and aggressively pushed. It is well that President Coolidge made his recent strong address in behalf of this tremendous force which has built up America and which has created the prosperity of towns and cities and states and individual interests.

"The intelligent business man is everywhere coming more and more to recognize that advertising is not an expense, but is an investment that is just as essential to his business progress as is the utilization of modern machinery or the employment of skilled men.

"Once some people thought that advertising was an experiment. Some thought it was a waste of money. Some advertised only because their competitors did. But now every intelligent business man, be he banker, merchant or manufacturer, realizes that advertising is the foundation on which he must erect his business structure, and that without advertising he will simply be building on a foundation of sand, while with adequate advertising he is building on a rock foundation and his structure will not be shaken by the storms of financial adversity.

"No business is so great that it can afford not to advertise. No business is so small that it cannot afford to advertise. No community is so prosperous that it cannot increase its prosperity, just as Atlanta is doing, by intensive well directed advertising. The cost may be great, but the harvest is greater. Ephemeral or short-time advertising, expecting immediate results, is a false basis on which to operate. Advertising, whether of cities or states or individual enterprises, must be commensurate with the soundness of the institution, the possibility of creating a demand for information and for building a market, whether that market be of new industries such as Atlanta has secured, or new population which is drawn by well directed publicity, or whether it be a market for machinery, for dry goods, or for the thousand and one things which enter into the life of the country.

Atlanta's success in its advertising campaign should be a stimulation to every other town in the country, and pre-eminently to the towns and cities of the South, and to the business men of the nation as a whole."

Washington, Dec. 7.—(INS)—Sweeping changes in freight rates on cattle and hogs in carloads from various cities to points in the South were ordered today by the Interstate Commerce Commission. After extensive investigation the Commission held that the rates from Chicago and East St. Louis, Ill., St. Louis, Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., Omaha, Fort Worth and Oklahoma City to Atlanta and Mobile, Ala., and from Chicago to Birmingham, Jacksonville, Chattanooga, Knoxville and Nashville were unreasonable. New rates, based on a distant scale, were prescribed and the railroads were ordered to put them into effect on or before January 20, next.

PRESIDENT SUBMITS MANY NEW APPOINTMENTS
Washington, Dec. 7.—(INS)—President Coolidge today transmitted to the Senate a batch of several thousand nominations for Federal offices, nearly all of which were recess appointments made since the Senate adjourned last July.

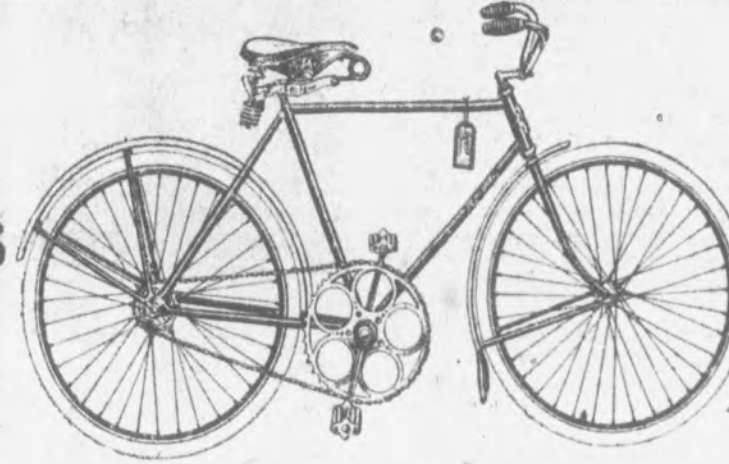

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Honolulu, Dec. 7.—(INS).—Thousands of Honolulu school children, participating in a great "flower festival" which will be planned to typify education in the territory of Hawaii will be one of the major features of the program of entertainment arranged for the international conference to be held here next April under the auspices of the department of the interior.

Governor W. R. Farrington is active head of the committee of governmental and civic bodies that is in charge of local arrangements for this conference. Dr. J. J. Tigert, head of the U. S. Bureau of education, is shaping up the program for the Washington end. Dr. Hubert Work will be general chairman of the meeting.

The purpose of the conference is to establish a basis of co-operation for the promotion of peaceful arts and pursuits among the participating countries; to provide a medium for exchange of knowledge on the subjects under discussion; to afford a wider field of service for certain technical activities and to be of assistance to the territory of the participating countries. It is expected that all of the countries about the Pacific will send delegates. Tours will be made to points of interest on the various islands.

Official statistics submitted to the members of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, assembled here in annual conference showed that the year 1926 was a banner one for the production of sugar on the islands. The total crop taken off was 787,246 tons.

Ernest H. Wodehouse, manager of Theo. H. Davis & Co., Honolulu, was elected president for the coming year, to succeed F. C. Atherton, vice-president of Castle & Cooke. Mr. Atherton in his closing remarks touched upon many vital features of the sugar industry.

Plantation labor is well satisfied, according to report. The liberal pay given to workers here was illustrated by the fact that during September and October of this year there sailed back to the Philippines 723 men who have worked during their stay in Hawaii they had sent back to their homes savings amounting to \$200,000. They had with them in drafts at the time of departure \$110,000. In addition most of them took back such articles as sewing machines, bicycles, phonographs, furniture and a bountiful supply of wearing apparel.

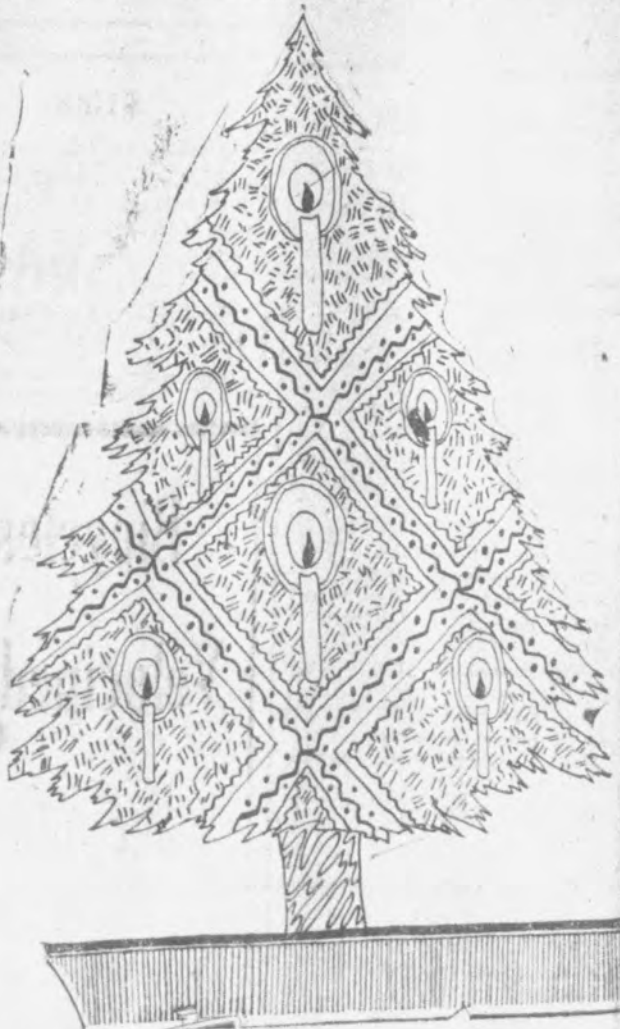

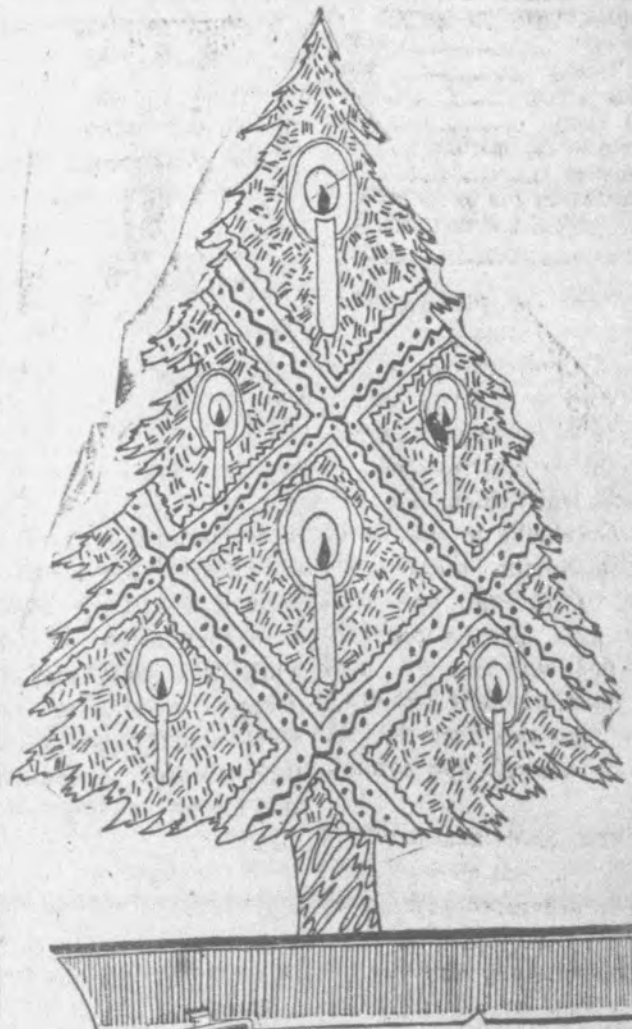

LEAGUE TO CEASE MILITARY CONTROL OF THE RHINELAND

Formula For Meeting Germany's Demand For Abandonment of Control Practically Decided Upon.

Geneva, Dec. 7.—(INS)—While European politics simmered, it was reported today that a formula for meeting Germany's demand that allied military control be abandoned, has been practically decided upon.

The formula is outlined as follows: 1. The present system of military control in Germany would cease in January. 2. Future control of the Rhine land de-militarized zone would be taken from the League of Nations and placed in the hands of the signatories of the Locarno pacts which includes Germany. 3. Control of armaments in the remainder of Germany would remain in the hands of the League of Nations, under approximately the same conditions as outlined in 1924.

A motion was due today by news of the resignation of Foreign Minister Nintchitch, and it is feared there are strained relations between Yugoslavia and Italy.

"The situation between Yugoslavia and Italy is grave," according to a statement made by M. Youvanitch, Yugoslavian Minister to Switzerland. "The Nintchitch" was based entirely upon friendship with Italy. The resignation of M. Nintchitch and his reasons for resigning can be interpreted as a demonstration that a policy of friendship between the two nations is impossible."

United Cigar and Schulte Combined

New York, Dec. 7.—(INS)—The pooling of the assets of the United Cigar Stores and the Schulte retail stores corporation, the two largest tobacco products organizations in the United States, became known today with the announcement of the formation of a huge holding company known as the Union and United Tobacco Company.

The organization of the Holding Company does not constitute a merger of the United and the Schulte companies, officers of the two concerns pointed out. They declined to discuss the extent of which the new company will direct the affairs of the two older companies.

The United and the Schulte companies represent combined assets of approximately \$100,000,000. The new concern has a potential capital of \$250,000,000. Stockholders of both the older companies will be permitted to purchase stock in the new company.

The present development was the result of negotiations covering the past five years. In Wall Street it was viewed as a definite move toward co-operation between the two huge retail companies foreshadowing an open merger

of their interests in the near future. In the present move the identity of the United and the Schulte stores will not be lost, both chain organizations sharing in the profits of the new concern.

New Panel For McDermott Jury Now Apparent

Canton, Ohio, Dec. 7.—(INS)—Possibility of drawing a new panel of prospective jurors to pass upon the fate of Patrick E. McDermott, on trial here in connection with the murder of Don R. Mellett, murdered Canton publisher, loomed today.

Although ten jurors had been tentatively seated, it was predicted that when the State and defense begin to exercise their peremptory challenges the entire remaining list would be exhausted.

The accused man, who was sought by police and private detectives throughout the land for three months before being "turned up" by his family, near Nanty Glo, Pa., sat through the tedious jury selecting task thoroughly composed and with the air of a debonair young attorney.

JURY ACCUITS WAYNESVILLE MAN

Waynesville, N. C., Dec. 7.—(INS)—James Plimmons today stood acquitted of the murder of Robert Miller, a neighbor, after the jury in the case returned a verdict of "not guilty". It took the jury just one hour to reach a verdict.

The killing, the culmination of a three year feud between the Millers and Plimmons, occurred in September, Plimmons entered a plea of self-defense.

CASHIER SHORT \$300,000 COMMITS SUICIDE TODAY

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 7.—(INS)—Clarence Henochberg, assistant cashier of the American Savings Trust Company, shot and killed himself here today after admitting to relatives a shortage that may exceed \$300,000.

The bank did not open its doors this morning. A state ment was issued that depositors will be protected, although stockholders are expected to lose heavily.

Henochberg is the third bank official in the last few months who admitted huge shortages. The two others are at large.

ZEBULON OFFICERS SEEK BAND OF THIEVES

Zebulon, N. C., Dec. 7.—(INS)—Officers today were continuing efforts to apprehend a band of thieves, believed to have been operating in a number of North Carolina towns, which early Sunday morning entered twelve residences and one store here, all within two hours.

Twelve suspects have been arrested, but all except two were released. The remaining prisoners, two negroes, probably will be released today. It was believed, as officers a offer have failed to connect them with the robberies.

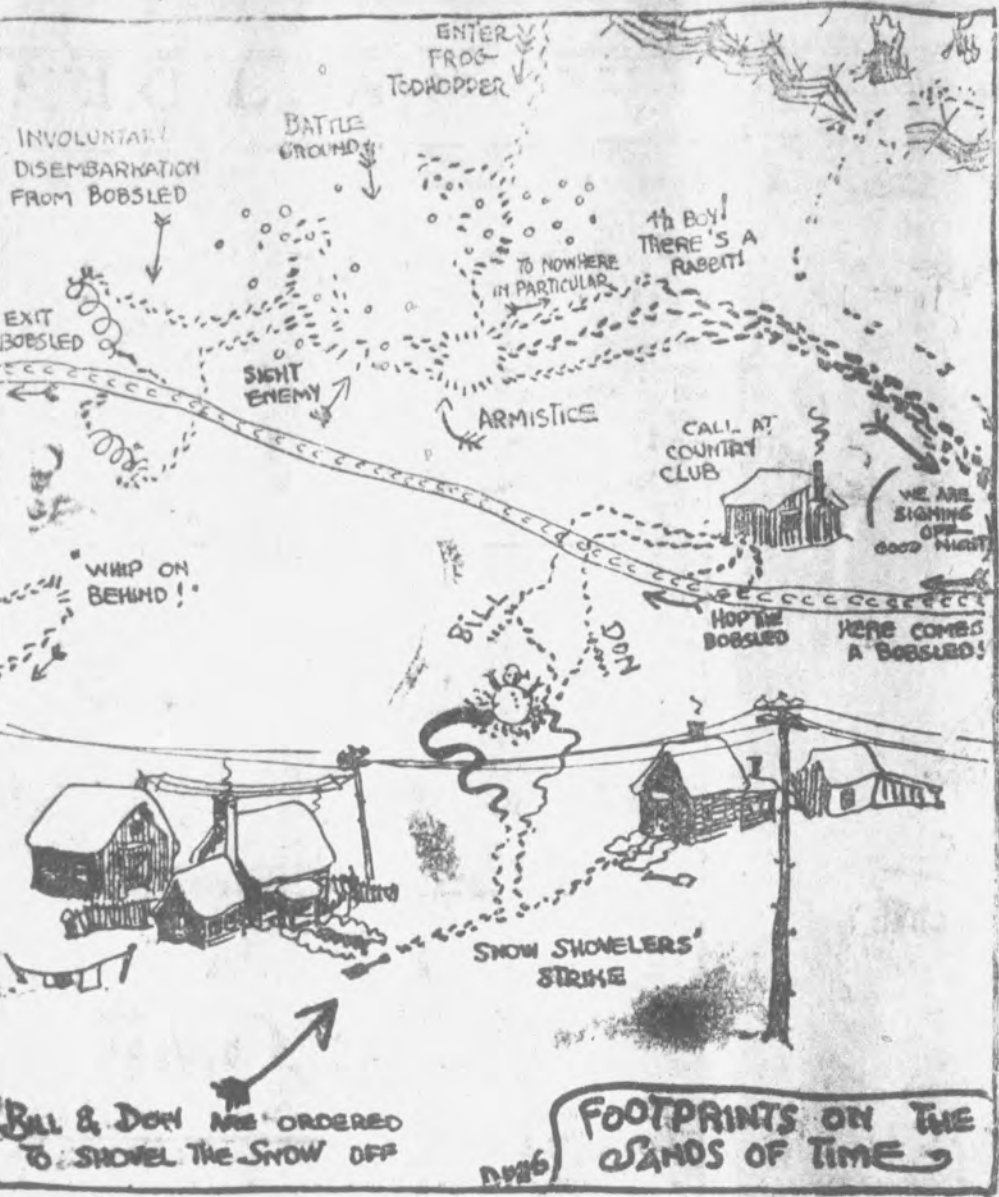
The robbers did not obtain more than \$100 in cash but it is believed that the stolen merchandise will amount to more than double that figure.

SEEKS TO BRING ENGLISH TO TRIAL

Despite Judge's Resignation Movement For Impeachment Proceedings Has Been Started.

Washington, Dec. 7.—(INS)—A movement to force federal Judge George W. English of East St. Louis, to stand trial on impeachment charges, despite his resignation, was started today by Rep. La Guardia, Republican of New York.

"The purpose of trying offenders is not only to punish them for the particular wrong-doing but as a deterrent to others," said La Guardia.

"If judges can flagrantly violate custom and propriety and when caught be permitted to resign, the federal courts will become even more arrogant and judges more inclined to usurp powers."

La Guardia was one of the prime movers in the impeachment of English on charges of undue preference in bankruptcy matter, and unprofessional conduct toward lawyers.

Under present plans, the House, Board of Managers through Rep. Michener, of Michigan, chairman, will recommend, probably on Friday, that the case be dropped. English resigned a few days before the Senate was to try him.

Windsor, O., To Be Great Golf Course

Cleveland, O., Dec. 7.—(INS)—The world's greatest golf course—on which it will require three days of normal play to get around—is to be put under construction here within the next few weeks.

Five courses, of 18-holes each, laid out in continuity with all the abracadabra loved and abhorred simultaneously by golfers, will form the new playground, located at Windsor, O., near here.

The feat has been made possible by A. W. Green, of Warren, O., a wealthy sportsman, who announces that the new organization will be encouraged to become the greatest organization of its kind.

Dues are to be moderate, enabling the "middle class" golf rotary to satiate his desire for the game, hotel to be conducted at moderate rates will be built at the course where members may spend their week-ends.

A contract has been awarded the American Park Builders, a Chicago concern, for construction of the links. This company has built nearly 800 golf courses in America, its chief feat being completion of the Olympia Fields club at Chicago, now the largest in this country.

The initial cost of converting the land into a golf paradise has been estimated at \$1,000,000, according to the organization which is entirely by membership and it is expected that the roster will carry 3,000 names by the end of next year.

Market Report

MARKET LETTER

New York, Dec. 7.—(INS)—President Coolidge's message to Congress today coincided with the Wall Street view of tax reduction, railroad consolidation, tariff on importations, banking, and the general state of prosperity in the country. As a stock market factor it was extremely favorable, and supplied the motive for the buying of a considerable volume of stocks and bonds.

On the whole, the trend of stock prices was upward, though there were a number of weak spots in the speculative list which were the cause of the effect of professional selling it was not always possible to determine; but the marked strength of the sugar stocks, the motors, the tobacco and some of the specialties was related directly to specific developments announced officially during the day.

Buying of the sugar stocks, for example, was based on the boosting of raw and refined sugar prices, to a new peak for the year, to date. The tobacco stocks of the so-called Schulte and Wheelan groups responded promptly to the announcement of the pooling of the interest of these powerful "Tobacco Kings," as related to the manufacturing end of the business. Philip Morris, Vivian, United Cigar Stores, Schulte Stores and tobacco products continued the forward move which has been in progress for about a week.

Money market conditions were somewhat easier with call loan rates at 5 per cent, against yesterday's closing rate at 5 per cent. But there was no attempt made to minimize the effect on the money market of the final income tax payments on December 15, the financing of U. S. Treasury operations, and the preparation for the January interest and dividend payments in the first week of January and thereafter.

United States Steel and General Motors were in the forefront of the upswing of prices, but good buying was in progress from the start in Studebaker, Jordan, Hudson and other of the low priced motor shares. Jordan continued the remarkable comeback which has advanced the price of the stock from 12 to 21 in about three weeks. The high priced "millionaire stocks" like Laclede Gas, Loose Wiles Biscuit, East Iron Pipe, etc., sold 1 to 5 points higher in active trading.

Professors trained the big guns on Warner Brothers Pictures Continental Baking and other stocks which bent backward most easily. Warner declined to 39 for a new low of 4 points while Continental Baking added 4 points to yesterday's 5 point loss. The oils yielded to selling pressure at the beginning of the session, but the leading stocks in this group recovered, notwithstanding that news from the petroleum industry was not very encouraging. The commodity markets were

fairly steady, with narrow price changes. Cotton moved downward, grain lost fractionally, oil prices were steady and sugar firm. Trading in crude rubber was in small volume. Copper in good demand at 13 1/2 cents a pound.

GRAIN CLOSE

Chicago, Dec. 7.—(INS)—Grains closed irregular today with wheat 1-4 cent higher to 7-8 cent lower; corn, 5-8 cent higher and oats, 1-4 to 3-8 cents lower.

Trade in wheat was rather light and mixed. Futures opened 1-4 to 1-2 cent higher. There was general professional buying at the start on strong Liverpool cables with the offerings light. The December delivery showed the most firmness.

Export business over night was fair. Estimated receipts here were 17 cars.

Corn started steady to 1-4 cent higher and immediately advanced further on buying by professional and commission houses. Trade was moderate with the selling scattering. Receipts were 114 cars.

Oats, opened 1-4 cent higher on buying credited to cereal interests. Trade was fairly active. Estimated receipts were 22 cars. Provisions started higher.

Shanghai, Dec. 7.—(INS)—A state of anarchy prevails today in Foochow, with frequent anti-foreign riots and bloodshed, according to dispatches. A mob of radical students raided British and Japanese property today. Chinese who failed to show the proper amount of sympathy toward the raiders were killed. The body of a Chinese was openly dragged through the streets.

Japanese Marines have been landed and are protecting the foreign population. American destroyers are enroute to Foochow. The general strike at Hankow is not effective, but the strike epidemic is spreading to other cities. Today an extensive stoppage of work developed at Swatow, where many foreign firms were left without laborers.

END IS NEAR FOR SENATOR MCKINLEY

Martinsville, Ind., Dec. 7.—(INS)—The death of Senator William B. McKinley of Illinois, is only a matter of hours, it was stated at the Homelawn Sanatorium today. The stricken solon has been a patient here since early in August. Relatives from Campaign, Ill., are at the bedside.

ALABAMA UNIVERSITY TRAINING FOR STANFORD

University, Ala., Dec. 7.—(INS)—Alabama, three Southern Conference champions, expects to start training tomorrow for their game with Stanford at Pasadena on New Years Day. The squad accompanied by sports writers and fans, will leave for the coast on December 21.

Resolution Asks For Withdrawal From World Court

Washington, Dec. 7.—(INS)—The first shot in a battle to withdraw the United States from the World Court was taken this afternoon when Senator Trammell, (D) of Fla., introduced a resolution to rescind American adherence to the Tribunal.

Trammell voted for American adherence but later changed his mind.

LONE WOMAN NABBIT ROBS ILLINOIS BANK

Marseilles, Ill., Dec. 7.—(INS)—A lone woman bandit entered the First National Bank today and after threatening three women employees with a revolver, escaped with \$9,500 in currency.
