No New Ford
A New McNary Bill
Killed Their Bootlegger.
We are Religious.

The Ford Company sends to agent, the statement published some days ago in this column, that Ford is not going to put out new models or new cars of any kind, six, eight or any other number of cylinders. That should be generally known to prevent disturbance of one of the greatest and most valuable industries.

REPORT BILL TO CUT DOWN NUMBER COTTON REPORTS

Would Also Give Investigators Power to Examine and Classify Cotton on Hand

Washington, Dec. 17.—(INS)—The House Agriculture Committee decided today to recommend passage of the Jones Bill curtailing Government cotton estimate reports to monthly statements between September 1 and December 1. The bill also would give Government investigators power to examine and classify warehoused cotton.

The committee removed from the bill a provision for the growing of weekly reports during the reporting season, the measure, as reported contains provisions also for a report to be issued showing the number of acres of cotton in cultivation on July 1, to be followed on September 1 and December 1, with an estimate of the acreage abandoned since that time.

An amendment giving the Department power to make investigations to develop new uses for low grade cotton also was adopted.

The Madeira Islands are Portuguese territory, off the northern coast of Africa.

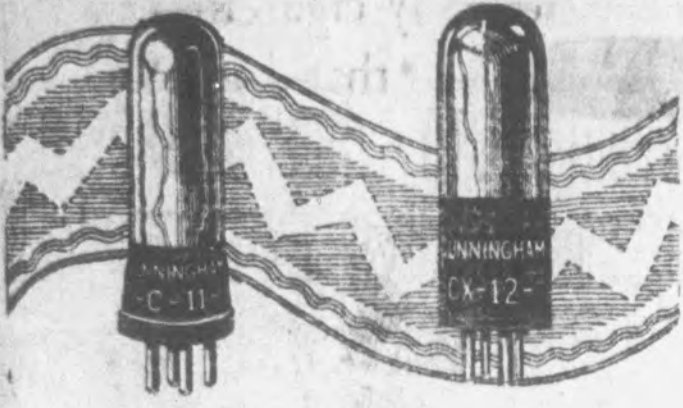

Petroleum Demand Makes Big Increase During Year 1926

New York, Dec. 17.—(INS)—For the first time since the close of the war, the petroleum industry of the United States, will close the calendar year with less oil on hand than at the beginning of the year, said H. E. Sinclair, chairman of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil Corporation.

The total demand met by the American market, including domestic consumption and exports, has increased more rapidly in 1926 than in either of the two preceding years. This total demand has been far in excess of the domestic production of crude oil, a fair balance between supply and demand being maintained by the importation of petroleum in both crude and refined form.

A fact frequently overlooked by consumers of petroleum products is that the rate of demand is less, subject to rapid fluctuation than the rate of supply of the raw material. Demand for individual products, such as gasoline is subject to seasonal variation but the trend is steadily upward. Even the seasonal variations are less apparent when figures covering all products are combined in order to get a more comprehensive view of conditions. When compared with this steady upward trend of demand, the curve showing production of raw material appears decidedly irregular. At one time we are told there is too much oil. A few months later we hear gloomy predictions of shortage and these are followed again by reports of so-called over production.

I fail to see any reason for anxiety on either count. It is practically impossible to maintain at all times a perfect balance between supply and demand. Nevertheless, the history of the industry in itself should be sufficient assurance that the needs of consumers will be met and that there will be a reasonable relationship between supply and demand for the future.

Illinois May Spend \$2,000,000 For a Fight on Crime

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 17, (INS)—An appropriation of two million dollars will be asked of the Illinois legislature to carry on the state-wide fight against organized crime, Hinton G. Claubach, new Illinois' supervisor of pardons and paroles, declares. The parole board, Claubach states, is the chief safeguard society has against the steadily increasing encroachments of organized criminals. The parole law, due to inadequate machinery to operate it has been a farce to date, he further avers.

Four men, Claubach says have been asked to function in 102 counties. This, obviously, is impossible, he contends and as a result the parole board has been "guessing men in and out of the penitentiary."

Armed with statistics of criminal law abuses, wherein some trial judges have thrown the burden on the parole board, to be crippled to shoulder the added duties, Claubach asserts he will ask the state solons for this amount of money. This appropriation, he states, would be a sound economic investment in the interest of the state of Illinois. If the legislature turns a deaf ear to his appeal the fight will be carried to the people, he says.

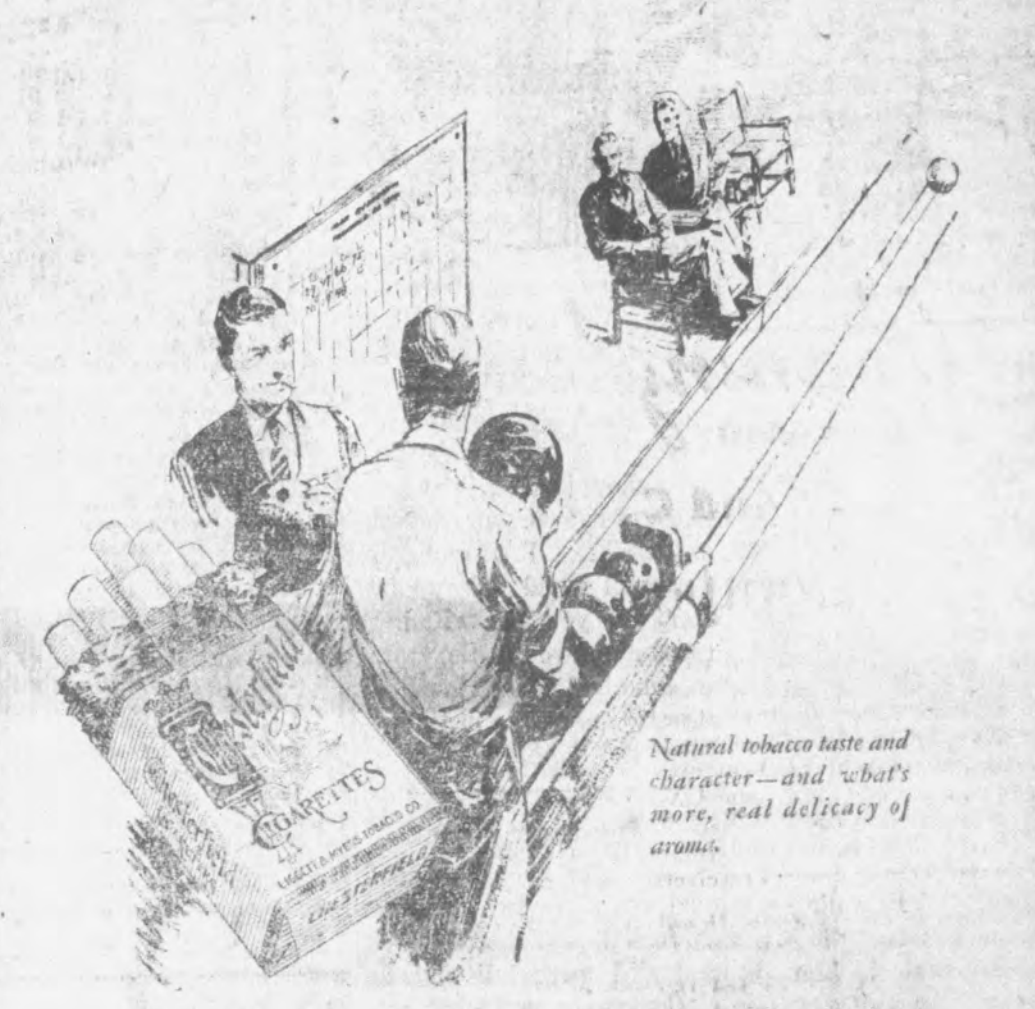

 Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Vienna, Dec. 17, (INS)—Vienna has found out that Socialism whatever and however it may benefit the workman, in his desire for a easier life, does not reduce misery or beggary. Today there are more beggars on the street of the capital than ever before and they are more earnestly beggars probably than were those who frequented the street, under the Imperial regime. There is no work to be had nowadays, things are dear and although the city makes ample provisions for the workers who, is associated with the Socialistic government, the lot of the beggar is worse.

Under the Emperors the beggar at least came in for frequent demonstrations of Royal bounty there were the rich nobles, annually sufficient subsistence money to the grasping hands of the unfortunate creatures to keep them. They find nowadays that the bourgeoisie and the worker has not the gracious heart of the noble—they are much to, near source of money to be generous to others. The city authorities still do not ask beggars for license money, as Francis Joseph decreed should not be done and they still give out soup, but there is probably not a set of stronger monarchists in the country than the beggars. That form of government brought occasional good to them at least.

A majority of the Vienna beggars have just formed an organization, to govern, their activities provide subsistence for those who fall sick and to bring throw the shade of publicity on their misery. They have profited by the example of the Socialistic trade unions. The city has been divided into districts, which are operated only by one man or woman. The amount which the beggar receives governs his donation, to the common funds and he is allowed to keep his post for only two weeks after which he must go to another district. The fund provides him with sick benefit and meat, if he needs them. Even the lunch hour is cared for by a traveling substitute who relieves the principal at meal times.

With the security of the organization, however, has come a new demerit to the beggar. It is not infrequently now that they are heard to curse those who refuse their pleas and to shrug their shoulders at the money given to them. Arrogance and prosperity are twins according to the philologist which may be read with a certain, relief by the citizens, for the Socialistic government is about to place a heavy tax on the taking of the miscreants.

All through its gay history, Vienna has been infested by beggars. When the Emperor went forth they hovered about his carriage with impudence that would have been disciplined elsewhere. The magnificence of Hapsburgs was generosity to their people. They daily held audiences that those with grievances might come personally to their Sovereigns. Maria Theresa's generous heart broke the Imperial treasury many times and the fanatical habits of her son, Joseph II, who walked about the streets, of his capital throwing about money, established precedents that their later heirs were forced to continue, to the delight of the beggars.

The Hapsburgs always threw money from their carriage window, on fete days and birthdays. Their noble, followed the royal fashion and threw fortunes out of their carriages into questionably deserving hands. Even through the reign of Francis Joseph the beggars were largely supported through the imperial generosity. Few requests were ever refused by the old Emperor and when there was occasion for Imperial rejoicing the unfortunates shared the good fortunes of their Sovereign.

They came to expect a livelihood from their richer and more fortunate countrymen, and they acknowledged charity when the donor, noble rank or not, in respect. When the Republic arose, aside the nobleman it removed from the beggar, respect, but not his expectations and he still demands a living without thinking of helping himself or rendering thanks to the new bourgeoisie which lessened charity for these two classes are fast part, here the middle class demands acknowledgment for charity where the aristocrat gave with grace.

"King" Ben of House of David to be Tried on Criminal Charges

Benton Harbor, Mich., Dec. 17 (INS)—King Benjamin, Purnell, aged leader of the House of David, a religious colony here, pictured by his faithful followers as a sick and persecuted man and denounced by the enemies as a consummate actor feigning illness, to arouse public sympathy, goes on trial December 22, charged with three statutory offenses.

He is accused of maltreating three of his former girl followers. They are Mrs. Gladys Bamford, Mrs. Ruth Bamford Reed and Mrs. Bessie Woodworth.

Their stories are expected to add new details of the secret rite, of purification which the long-haired Benjamin is alleged to have performed.

In 1922 the Bamford girls presented their charges. This resulted on an international hunt of four years for King Ben which came to an end on the night of November 16. On this eventful night he was found in the colony during a raid there by state police.

Twenty-five troopers, swinging axes and carrying guns, descended on the colony's quarters. When they had crashed the doors in, they found the cult leader in a lighted room upstairs. He was clad in his underwear, a sweater and a night cap. With him was Myrtle Turk, his favorite.

Behind the raid was the courage of a young girl, Mrs. Woodworth. It was she who tipped the police off as to Benjamin's whereabouts; it was she who aided the officers through the rooms of the colony; and it was she who led them only and it was she who led them up the stairs to the room of the King.

"I am betraying only my betraying," she said.

Mrs. Woodworth charges Purnell attacked her under the guise of performing a religious rite when she was 15.

Purnell was taken to the Benton county jail for the night. He was released next day on bonds totalling \$125,000. He told his attendant that he was a sick man and was being persecuted. The state believes however, that he is healthier than he claims to be.

Well or well, he faces a trying ordeal. In addition to standing trial on the three criminal suits he has been named defendant in \$100,000 damage cases instigated by the Bamford sisters. It is probable that Mrs. Woodworth will start similar action. Then too, the state will push its dissolution proceedings against the colony.

But the King is still the beloved leader of his colony. They have rallied around him and have promised a \$1,000,000 defense, if it is necessary.

How faithful Purnell's followers may be after the trial's have brought to light the stories of his accusers, is a matter of conjecture. Their testimony it is believed will be patterned after that given during the hearing of the suit brought by John Hansel and his wife, Margaret, who donated their entire fortune to King Ben, lived and worked in the colony for 8 years without one cent remuneration and then deserted it. They were granted \$28,000 damages.

After the court had heard all the testimony it referred to King Ben, as a man, who tried to place the tin or evil with the gold of religion.

A few of the charges made public at the hearing of Hansel case were: King Ben had driven a girl member insane; that he had given beer and wine to girls to purge their souls, that he had

forced girls to know and had made them leave for distant lands with money in their possession; that he worked his disciples and never paid them; that he practiced fraud to avoid court action; that he conducted himself in the presence of young girls in a way which demanded immediate prosecution.

King Ben is believed to be 65 years old. If he is convicted he will probably be sentenced to life imprisonment.

Practically all of the sensational charges made against Purnell are in connection with his alleged purification rites. One of the first revelations made concerning these alleged rites, came from Mrs. Esther Hansel, daughter of the Hansels who were plaintiffs in a civil action.

"I often met Benjamin in the Park (at the Israhelie colony) and I was flattered and pleased when he spoke to me one day," she said. "I told my girl friends about it and they were envious. To have

him notice me I thought was a great honor.

"At first he treated me with respect. He began to talk to me of what his faith meant. He told me that he had been purified that he was Christ's son. He said that he would live forever and that he had it in his power to give me everlasting life."

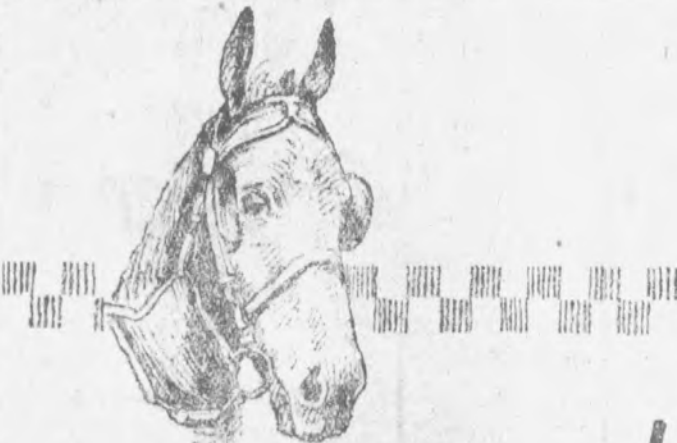

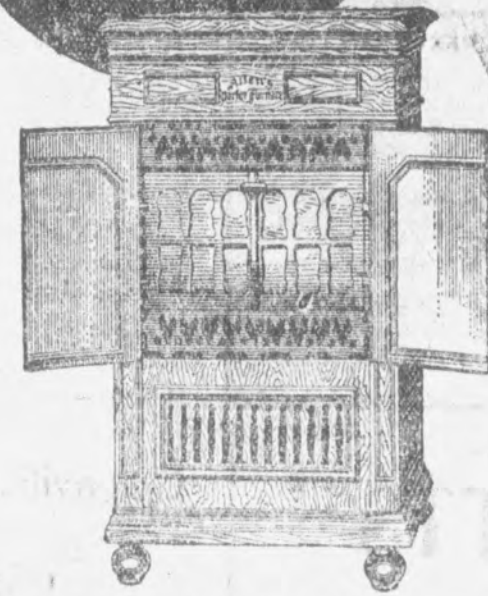

Market Report

MARKET LETTER

New York, Dec. 17.—(INS)—Taken completely by surprise by the United States steel stock market, traders rushed into the market to purchase steel stock today in one of the most sensational and active sessions of the stock market this year. Long before the noon hour period transactions in the stock had exceeded half a million shares; then came a short breather, after which the crowd and pushing around the "steel post" on the floor of the stock exchange was resumed in full force.

Transactions in the steel stock reached the 500,000 share mark before the end of the second hour after which the pace gradually slackened, and the total volume for the day was approximately 700,000 shares. The highest price recorded was 69 1/2, a net gain of about 6 1/2 points over the previous close and of 7 1/2 points over yesterday's low. This is the highest price ever paid for steel stock, the previous high record of 137 5/8 having been made in September, since which time the stock dropped back to 136.

Professionals caught with heavy short contracts outstanding were compelled to settle at top prices of the movement, which also were the highest prices ever recorded for the stock in its 25 years of operation.

Under the lead of New York Central and Atchafalpa, railroad shares pushed forward vigorously in unusually heavy trading. Stock sales in the first three hours aggregated 1,750,000 shares, or at the rate of about 3,000,000 share for the whole session.

New York Central's 5 points jump to 143 1/2 was in recognition of the recent gain in earnings of that road and its rapidly increasing surplus. Lehigh Valley and Reading, two of the important "links" control of which powerful railroad magnates are in avowed competition. Southern Railway, New Haven, Frisco and Southern Pacific also participated in the brilliant advance in the stock.

Call money was firm at 5 per cent for week-end loans and commodity markets were steady, with few important price changes.

GRAIN CLOSE

Chicago, Dec. 17.—(INS)—Grains closed steady today with wheat unchanged at 1-8c lower; corn 1-4 to 3-8c higher and oats 1-8 to 3-8c higher.

Wheat opened unchanged to 3-4c lower. Trade was rather light with the majority awaiting

developments. Liverpool opened unchanged to 1-2d lower. Cash wheat market was relatively strong with a good demand.

Estimated receipts were 12 cars. Corn strated 1-8c to 1-2 down on scattered local selling in small amounts. The buying power was light. The trade was small and scattered. Estimated receipts were 367 cars.

Oats opened steady to 3-8 down on heavy liquidation. Trade was active. Estimated receipts were 53 cars.

Provisions were a shade higher early.

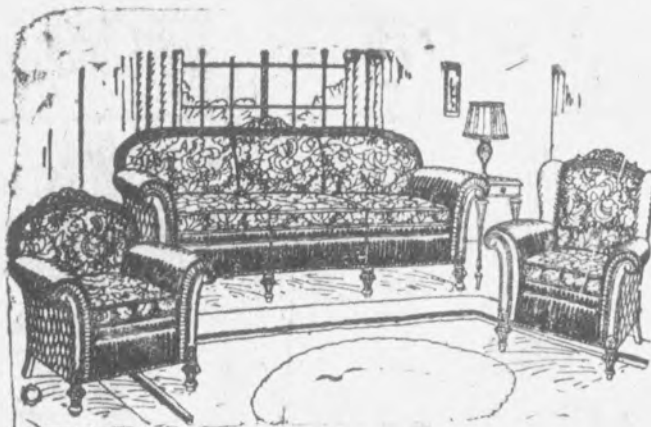

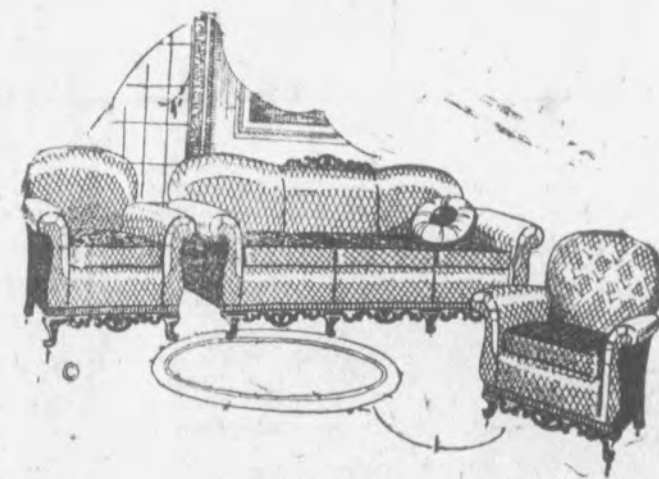
