BODY OF DEAD EMPEROR JAPAN ARRIVES CAPITAL

Subjects Stand With Bare dHeads as Dead Ruler is Carried to Palace.

Tokyo, Dec. 27.—INS.—One million subjects lined the five mile route which the body of the late Emperor Yoshihito of Japan traveled through darkened streets tonight following its arrival on a special train from Hayama at 7:05 tonight.

Three hours earlier Hiroito, the new Emperor, returned to Tokyo for the first time since his accession.

His return was marked by the utmost simplicity, no soldiers accompanying his return, only a police guard.

The new Emperor dressed in a military uniform saluted gravely the 75,000 silent, bareheaded subjects who greeted him. The Empress, dressed in black her eyes downcast, accompanied him.

The Emperor and Empress met the arriving funeral cortege at the station. During the ninety minutes journey of the special funeral train from Hayama to Tokyo, thousands of country folks assembled at each village to pay respect to the dead ruler.

Ten army officers tenderly lifted the casket into the hearse, which was drawn by two coal black horses and the slow procession began through the darkened streets of the city. Every piece of litter had been removed from the streets and they were then given a covering of sand, making the passage of the cortege barely audible.

Before the procession left the station, the police guard was augmented by a detachment of the Imperial guards.

The dowager Empress sat in the first carriage behind the hearse and Prince Takamatsu occupied the second one. There remained carriages for court officials and other government officers.

The new Emperor and Empress awaited at the palace, for the arrival of the procession. There the coffin was taken from the hearse and carried to the great hall where the body will lie in state until the final rites are pronounced.

Officers Probe
Mysterious Death
Asheville Nurse

Asheville, N. C., Dec. 27.—INS.—Special investigators to aid local forces in clearing up the mysterious murder of Miss Mary McGuire, retired Asheville nurse, may be sought by Mayor J. H. Cathey, it was intimated today when three days of investigation had failed to offer a solution. The victims' mangled body was found in a negro section here Christmas morning.

Police have ascertained the place of the nurse death by the finding of a broom on the street on Page Avenue, near Battery Park. The automobile which carried the woman to the negro section was a blue colored sedan and was driven by two negroes, police declared they had learned.

Officers investigating the case were inclined to scout a theory of robbery, although it was made known that the nurse obtained \$800, a few days ago from an insurance policy withdrawal. This money has not been accounted for yet.

The nurse was killed apparently by a blow across the head with a heavy blunt instrument. Marks on her body also indicated, police said that she was struck by an automobile and was dragged for at least 100 feet.

Liquor Prices Due For Slump

Toronto, Ont.—Liquor prices are due for a slump. With Ontario now lined up in the wet column it is believed the federal government will no longer be able to resist the strong pressure being brought to bear for a substantial reduction in excise duties on alcohol used for beverage purposes.

On at least two occasions, Premier Taschereau, of Quebec, replying to certain criticism of the operations of the Quebec liquor commission, which was accused of making excessive profits out of the retail sale of liquor, openly called upon the federal government to grant some relief from the excise duty on alcohol.

At present the federal government collects an excise duty of \$10 a gallon, to which must be added customs duties, and sales taxes, thus raising the ultimate cost of the commodity to the consumer.

1926 Years Ago

1926 years ago, "as nearly as men can reckon it, with changing calendars and doubtful dates, a baby was born, in the Holy Land, destined to have greater influence upon the world than all of the human beings born on earth, since time began.

From the hour when his mother first held that divine infant in her arms, a better time began for all mothers and all children. The father had power of life and death over them. If unwelcome, they could be legally exposed in the public square, at birth, to be devoured by dogs, or taken to be raised as slaves.

Few were the angry, or threatening words that Christ spoke and the strongest were warnings, in the defense of children.

For the man that hurt "one of these little ones," it were better that he were cast into the sea with a millstone around his neck. And sternly men were warned, concerning the children, that "their angels do always behold the face of my Father, which is in heaven."

Few and uncertain are the historical facts concerning the life and work of Christ, a few authentic words, written, by a Jewish historian; nothing else. The rest is faith, and solemn scientists even affirm that Christ had no actual historical existence.

But there are truths about science and historical record, and the greatest among them deal with the works of Jesus, friend and protector of women and children, and of the poor.

He lived here, a few years, died a shameful, painful death, by slow torture, and the world has been slowly growing better through the centuries that have passed, thanks to His teaching, and His example. There is less poverty, less cruelty, infinitely less misery of all kinds. And even the brutality, superstition, cruelty and selfishness, preached in His name by pretended Christians, have not been able to hold back His work.

One thing should be remembered, on this day that has so often been made a pretext for race and religious hatred. Christ was put to death by order of Pilate, a Roman Governor, ruling the Jews, and the method of his killing was a Roman punishment, crucifixion, unknown to Jewish law, and detested by it.

Christ's mother was a Jewish girl, and all his earthly relatives were of the Jewish race. Keep that in mind.

There should be only kind thoughts and words, at this time, but there is no bitterness in hoping that the 1927 model Santa Claus will bring Uncle Sam some flying machines that will go up and STAY up.

THREE KILLED IN CROSSING CRASH NEAR TARBORO

Farmville Couple and Sparta Woman Killed When Auto Stalls on Railroad.

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 27.—INS.—Four persons were killed and many injured in North Carolina over the week-end.

Three were killed near Tarboro when their automobile stalled on a railroad crossing and were struck by an Atlantic Coast Line passenger train. The dead, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Baker, Farmville, and Mrs. Katherine Watson, Old Sparta.

George Ives B. was killed and J. T. Edens seriously injured when the automobile in which they were riding turned turtle at Wilmington.

Two persons were injured at Hickory when two cars collided. They were: Charles Barnes, 15 Horace Lutz, 11.

Investigate Death College Professor

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 27.—INS.—Coroner Paul Robinson will hold an inquest today in the death of Professor Louis Siff, 72, for many years head of the mathematics department at the university of Louisville, Ky.

The professor's body, his pockets bulging with nearly \$30,000 in Liberty Bonds and cash was found by a negro porter in his room at the Hotel Severin, here, yesterday.

His throat and both wrist were slashed and a bloody razor laid beside the body.

Police received word from Louisville University authorities that Professor Siff left there Thursday morning to attend a mathematical convention in Chicago and that recently he had made his will in which he made Professor Anderson, a faculty colleague, the administrator of his estate. It is believed the aged professor committed suicide.

Professor Siff had no near relatives, according to information from Louisville. He had been noted for his eccentric habits.

Legislature to Study the Cotton Farmers' Problem

Sumter, S. C.—A solution to the South's "cotton problem" will be proposed in the South Carolina Legislature which convenes this month, by Rep. E. W. Lohr, Jr., of Sumter County.

The Sumter representative will propose steps designed to bring about government control of cotton production through action taken by Legislatures of the Southern States, he declared in a statement issued here.

Federal machinery for keeping surplus cotton off the market and from being seen as inevitable steps State laws to limit cotton production, but cotton growing on a basis, by Representative Lohr.

"We have had years of voluntary control," he said. "I think the time has come for government control."

News Briefs

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 27.—INS.—Of North Carolina's total development water power in 1925 of 537,000 horsepower, energy from about 111,000 horsepower, or 18.4 per cent, was transmitted for use outside the State. It was made public by the department of conservation and development today.

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Wilmington, N. C., Dec. 27.—INS.—Workmen today were put aboard the schooner Charles A. Dean to strip the vessel of everything valuable or movable. The ship was grounded off frying pan shoals two weeks ago.

Charlotte, N. C., Dec. 27.—INS.—Opening guns of the Anti-Evolution fight in North Carolina, which is expected to be the storm center of the January Legislature, were touched off here today by Zeb V. Turlington, Morriseville Statesman and head of the North Carolina Bible Society. Turlington, in a statement made here, said the Bible League would fight against Schools Teaching a thing as truth that remains in the realm of an unproved hypothesis. The Bible Society meets on December 30 to formulate its Legislative program.

Boston, Dec. 27.—INS.—A cold wave today followed in the wake of a twelve-hour snow storm that blanketed New England beneath a mantle of eight inches of white.

One death and several injured was the toll resulting from the storm. Mrs. Catherine A. Saunders, 46, was killed by an automobile while in an elevated safety zone in Somerville, the snow blinding the vision of the autoist.

The latest snow fall gave New England a total of 23.07 inches for December, the snowiest December in forty-three years.

Washington, Dec. 27.—The Post Office Department has advised Representative Lindsay Warren that the Griffon post office will be required to be kept open on Sunday nights for one hour after the scheduled arrival of the mail so as to afford window delivery service to the patrons. The Department discontinued Sunday service at Griffon on December 1, which brought a storm of protest, from citizens of that town, as they had been getting the Sunday service for many years. Since then Mr. Warren has been working to get the service restored.

Paris—A new French aviation company has just produced a large twin-engine machine of the flying wing type. It is constructed entirely of duraluminum and steel, and can be used either as a bomber or as a passenger-carrying aircraft.

The cabin instead of being long and narrow and situated in the fuselage is formed in the middle part of the single plane itself where it is believed that it creates less resistance. It is also more spacious and more convenient in shape. The load carried by the machine is nearly 3,000 pounds.

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SITUATION IN NICARAGUA IS STILL UNCERTAIN

Conflicting Reports of Developments Have Been Received in Washington.

Washington, Dec. 27.—INS.—Actual development in Nicaragua where American Bluejackets, have been landed at several places, were obscured today by conflicting reports as to the activities of American forces there.

Charges by Nicaraguan Liberals that the Americans had occupied their capital at Puerto Cabezas and expelled the revolutionary leaders were official denied at the State Department.

Admiral J. L. Latimer, in charge has no authority to declare neutral zones in the little republic. It was announced at the department, and is not "taking sides" in the revolution there.

The Nicaraguan Liberals' junta here, however, claimed today that Latimer has clamped down a wall of censorship over the entire east coast which has "rendered the constitutional government incommunicado with the rest of the world."

The department made public today a dispatch from Admiral Latimer which told of a victory won by the Liberal revolutionists over the American-backed Diaz forces, but contained no references to the reported ouster of the Liberals.

Government forces have left their dead and wounded on the field. The government has been given permission by Moncado (the Liberal commander) to send an unarmed force out to bury the dead and succor the wounded.

I have issued an order to the effect that if the government forces should be compelled to enter the neutral zone because of lack of food or any other emergency they would be disarmed. This order was issued with reference to article 4 of the agreement signed October 26.

The State Department cited Admiral Latimer's warning that they would disarm government troops to substantiate its claim that the American forces are not taking sides.

The neutral zones have been established by the warring Nicaraguan parties, said not by Admiral Latimer, although he is using his forces to keep them neutral.

A Senate investigation into the activities of American armed forces in the Nicaraguan situation may be forthcoming soon after Congress re-assembles.

Thousands of persons from the two states, and peanut growers and product manufacturers from all parts of the country are here for the opening parade at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Conservative estimates place the attendance during the week at 20,000.

Numerous exhibits showing the growth of the Gopher have been placed. In one display, 8,000 lined feet are strung together in the exhibit. Another exhibit is that of Dr. Charles W. Carver, of Tuskegee Institute, showing 133 peanut products.

The Exposition will continue through the week a sectional High School Girls Championship, a Beauty Contest in which towns throughout the section will participate, and numerous other features are included on the weeks program.

London—Captain Victor Cazalet, Member of Parliament, will take a British squash racket team to the United States in January to meet a representative American team.

Captain Cazalet is holder of the squash racket championship of England, and with the Prince of Wales, is perhaps England's keenest devotee of the game.

MOUTH ORGAN LEAGUE
IS FORMED IN LONDON

London—In order to settle the vexed question as to who is the harmonious champion of Britain, the British Mouth Organ League is organizing a contest on a national scale in London January next.

Two thousand players are expected to take part and an eminent musician will adjudicate.

BABSON ON BOOZE

Because oger Babson is a professional statistician rather than a professional reformer, his observations on prohibition carry more weight with the public than most others. Here are some statements he recently made in print which, considering their source, cannot but be taken seriously.

Prohibition, he finds, "has resulted in increasing the working power of the wage worker and has been a great factor in bringing about higher wages."

What has been done, then, with their extra money?

"Instead of being employed uselessly for hiring labor to build houses, make clothes and other things that are worth while."

Among the other things, labor savings, formerly spent on liquor, have gone into savings banks and helped to keep interest rates low.

Especially interesting is Mr. Babson's reference to installment buying.

"Had it not been for prohibition," he says, "the present growth in the installment business would have been impossible. It was prohibition which enabled workers to establish credits. Without prohibition these credits could not have been established; the goods purchased could never have been manufactured, and the prosperity which we now enjoy would not exist."

All this Mr. Babson decodes of his rohabrdl hru duces not from his moral code or his inner consciousness, but from careful study of thousands of facts and acres of figures.

JURY FLAWS

The jury system in this country is frequently criticized for its shortcomings. Yet it seems to be true that no one has a better system to suggest.

On the whole, perhaps, it works best with comparatively unimportant cases. The bigger the case, the more the jury system succumbs to the general evils of court procedure. Lawyers are allowed to demand that every member of the jury should be completely uniformed about the case in hand. If it is a big case, then the only persons so qualified are citizens with little intelligence or interest in current affairs.

In England, where the jury system appears to work better than here, the selection of juries is chiefly up to the judge, instead of the lawyers. The judge asks tentative jurors a few simple questions to discover their intelligence and the fact that they have no confirmed opinion in the case which would not yield to evidence. That is about all there is to picking them. In England,

too, very few persons are excused from jury service; it is considered one of a citizen's most important duties. Here, whole classes and groups of intelligent citizens are exempt from service and far too many others can get off if called.

Our jury system doesn't so much need to be thrown out entirely as it does to be taken seriously, improved and separated from some of the bad habits of legal procedure.

NEW NAVAL RIVALRY

The government naval program calls for the building of 18 cruisers of 10,000 tons each, of which eight have already been authorized and two are under construction. They will cost about \$14,000,000 apiece for ships and equipment.

The United States can afford the money, and can afford to maintain and man these warships if any when they are built. There is, however, no great popular enthusiasm for them. Habitual and professional "big navy" advocates are eager for them; most of the people remain cold, seeing no menace from any other navy and disliking any appearance of new armament competition.

The program is not so ironclad as its ships. The bill authorizing the new construction provides that the president may suspend part or all of it "in the event of an international conference for the limitation of naval armaments."

This looks like a bid for another conference. One is needed to supplement the last one, at Washington. It is increasingly clear that it is going to be of little use to restrict capital ships when the powers are left free to build all the light cruisers, submarines, torpedo boats and seaplanes they want. Rivalry is now developing in those classes as bad as the old rivalry in battleships.

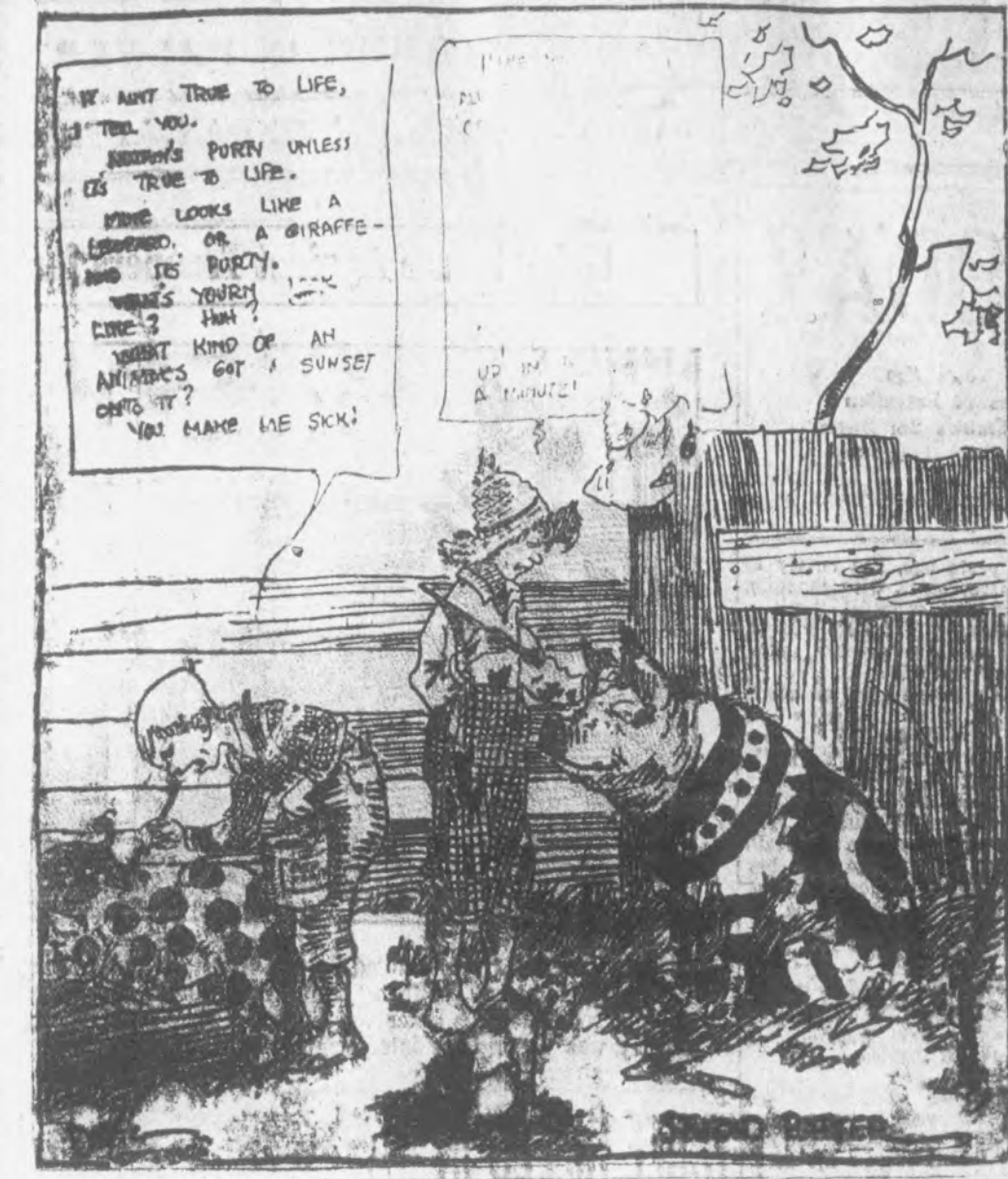

Ford's offer is said to have saved the dam. Congress has been saving the whole project ever since.—Albany Daily.
