SEVEN THOUSAND
HOMELESS TODAY
RESULT OF FLOODDeath List and Property
Damage in
Floodswept Area
Continue to Increase

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Stricken by the worst flood in its history, middle Tennessee continued its relief measures among the 7,000 homeless today, many hoping and praying angry waters of the Cumberland river would soon subside.

A slight rise in the river, which already has inundated 250 city blocks in Nashville, was noted today, but the crest is expected tomorrow, following which the flood waters will slowly recede.

Patiently waiting to return to their water-soaked homes, were thousands of homeless temporarily housed in tents, churches and public buildings. Much of their personal belongings and furniture have been swept away by the high waters. Many houses were ruined beyond repair.

All previous high water marks have been shattered by the merciless rise of the Cumberland, which today reached a height of 55.7 feet. Only once before had the river, soared above the 55 foot mark and that was in 1882.

Each time the river rises an inch, additional families are driven from their homes and property damage, already estimated at \$2,500,000, increases.

Radio station WLAC which has been broadcasting constantly since 8 p. m., appealing for aid, raised \$8,390 last night, the funds coming in from all sections of the country. More food and clothing was still needed for the flood refugees, however.

The police department has moved practically all the families out of the flooded district. In Nashville these total 6,000 persons, all of whom must remain in their temporary shelter for at least another week, as it is expected to take that long for the river to get back to normal.

Hundred of other persons have been forced out of work by the suspension of factories located in the flooded area.

About 1,000 others are homeless in the towns up and down the Cumberland valley. Clarksville, Celina, Carthage, Gainesboro and other valley towns were hard hit by the high waters.

Many will find their homes with all their belongings swept away. A number of houses were seen floating down the river during the night.

Several houses were dynamited today to prevent clogging up of the Louisville & Nashville railway bridge here. Scores of garages and other small houses have been washed down the river, and the drawbridge here has been turned several times to let large objects through. The water at noon today was within two and one half feet from the tracks on the bridge.

Ducks, chickens and other poultry housed in a building on Second Avenue, in the whole, sale produce district were drowned by the rising waters. Boats are at a premium here, and so are hipboots.

The Nashville Real Estate Association today said, public estimates of losses suffered by the city. The damage to streets alone will reach beyond \$500,000, real property \$3,000,000, and the total damage suffered by surrounding towns in middle Tennessee will be even greater, it was said.

Yazoo City, Miss., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Two more lives were lost in the flooded district last night, according to reports brought here by two car loads of tourists today. A small couple carrying an unidentified man and woman slipped from the road into the big black river and efforts to drag it from the swollen stream were futile.

DIES FROM INJURIES

DEMOCRATS WILL
RENEW FIGHT FOR
TAX REDUCTIONPetition for Discharge
of Ways and Means
Committee Be Cir-
culated at Once

Washington, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Asserting that the federal government will collect a half billion dollars from taxpayers during the present fiscal year more than is needed to run the government, Rep. Oldfield, of Arkansas, the Democratic whip, today announced that the Democratic drive for tax reduction legislation will be renewed next week.

Circulation of a petition asking discharge of the House Ways and Means committee, which refused to take up tax reduction bills, will be started, he said. Many Republicans, Oldfield claimed, have indicated they would sign the request.

The return of \$175,000,000 of illegally collected taxes emphasizes the fact that the government is collecting too much from taxpayers, all down the line, Oldfield said.

Replying to Oldfield's criticisms the treasury said the refunds were mandatory under court decisions. The collections were made illegal under old revenue laws.

The refund, can have no possible bearing on tax reduction, Secretary Mellon declared.

Thieves Stage
Quarter Million
Jewelry Robbery

London, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Thieves, early today carried out one of the biggest hauls in British criminal annals when they raided Harrod's Department Store, getting away with jewelry valued at a quarter of a million dollars. Despite the fact that Harrod's is the heart of the city, the thieves apparently were able to elude the watchmen and work all night collecting their loot.

Every show case in the jewelry department of the huge store was ransacked and there are indications that the thieves left the store with their loot in a taxicab about 5 o'clock this morning.

Enough loot was taken from the store to furnish a well stocked jewelry store. Thousands of articles were apparently carefully packed away by the thieves for transportation, including watches and gold and silver cigarette cases, brooches, rings and bracelets.

The more expensive jewelry had been locked in the store safe.

Scotland Yard has given orders that a watch be kept on all ports as it is believed that the thieves will seek to reach the continent not daring to try and dispose of their haul in England.

Good Will Flight
Continues Today

Tampico, Mexico, Dec. 30.—(INS)—The remaining four of the five huge amphibian planes in which Major H. A. Barge and his nine companions are making the 22,000 mile "good will" tour of the 27 South American republics, hopped off from Hausteca Field here today.

At Vera Cruz, the next stop, the four ships will rejoin the San Francisco, which was the only ship able to take off from Tampico last Thursday.

Perfect weather accompanied the aviators, who had been delayed here for a week due to a mishap to the St. Louis, necessitating the bringing here of a new motor from Kelly Field, San Antonio.

SON ACCIDENTALLY
SHOOTS HIS FATHER

Durham, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Accidentally shot by his son, John 16, Charlie Crabtree, 64-year-old farmer, was making a desperate fight for his life in a local hospital this afternoon.

Physicians held little hope for Crabtree's recovery. He was shot in the head when he, son picked up a shotgun, which discharged. Several other children witnessed the shooting.

FATALLY INJURED
IN CROSSING CRASH

Atlanta, Dec. 30.—(INS)—J. R. Butler, 44, was fatally injured and his son's young wife and her baby girl narrowly escaped death today when their automobile was struck by the Dixie Express, a fast passenger train of the Central of Georgia at Hapeville, Butler died a few hours after the crash.

TREND OF AFFAIRS
WITH NICARAGUA
UPSETS COOLIDGECriticism of Adminis-
tration's Policy
Causes White House
to Soft Pedal Its At-
titude.

Washington, Dec. 30.—(INS)—President Coolidge is becoming disturbed over the increasing criticism of the Administration's policy in Nicaragua and Central America generally, according to indications today.

With senatorial critics threatening with Senator Borah, Republican, of Idaho, charging that the Nicaragua widespread investigation, ragan mess was stirred up by eight or the men not Nicaraguans at all, and with the press of Europe and South America making caustic comment about American imperialism, there appeared today a softening of the State Department's hitherto militant attitude toward the whole situation.

White House, and State Department spokesmen now go to great length to explain that the presence of American Marines in Nicaragua and American warships in Nicaraguan waters is not intervention. They are there, it is explained, solely to protect American lives and property, and it is said they will be withdrawn just as soon as it can be ascertained that American interests will not suffer.

There is reason to believe also by such withdrawal.

In her new confession said to have been made yesterday, Mrs. Wiseman alleged that Roland Rich Woolley, Los Angeles attorney, and his brother, Jack Woolley, had arranged with her to carry out the box. Attorney Woolley was formerly Mrs. McPherson's personal advisor.

The attorney, Mrs. Wiseman confessed, directed her to Jack Woolley, identified by her as the mysterious Mr. Martin who promised her big money if she would come forward with the Carmel story.

At the height of the investigation into Mrs. McPherson's disappearance, Mrs. Wiseman dropped out of a clear sky and told a sensational story to the effect that it had been her companion of Ormsiston, the Angelus Temple radio attendant, in his love cottage in Carmel-by-the-Sea.

McPHERSON CASE
MAY BE DISMISSED
BY THE GRAND JURYConfession of Perjury
By Star Witness May
Lead to Dismissal of
the Case.

Los Angeles, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Fate of the entire Almee Semple McPherson case, was to be determined by the Los Angeles County Grand Jury today.

The possibility was that before tonight the conspiracy charges against the famous woman evangelist, her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, and Kenneth G. Ormsiston, one time radio attendant of Mrs. McPherson's Angelus Temple, might be dismissed.

District Attorney Asa Keyes announced he had asked for the Grand Jury hearing in order to consider the latest confession made by Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman, Schaff, perpetrator of the notorious Miss X Carmel hoax in connection with the McPherson case.

The District Attorney declared that he had proof that Mrs. Wiseman perjured herself in her preliminary hearing of the McPherson case and that consequently her testimony would have to be withdrawn leaving the case with no expectation of conviction.

No prosecutor would feel justified in placing into jeopardy defendants accused by witnesses in whose testimony no credence can be placed, Keyes said.

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INVESTIGATION OF
ORGANIZED BALL
WILL BE SOUGHTOusting of Ty Cobb
and Tris Speaker
May Lead to Feder-
al Investigation.

Washington, Dec. 30.—(INS)—A joint resolution of organized baseball by Senate and House, will be sought as a result of the ousting of Tris Speaker and Ty Cobb it was indicated today.

Rep. Kelly, Republican of Pennsylvania, announced that he would confer with Senator Capper, Republican, of Kansas to devise ways and means of revealing in the inside workings of baseball management.

"I should like to see a joint committee named, or one investigation conducted before Senate and House committees sitting together," Kelly said.

"However, if it appears more feasible to get action in the Senate, I will defer to the action of that body."

Congressional leaders generally continued to frown upon the proposed investigation.

One of the leading lawyers in the Senate declared Congress had no authority to act and also declared that Speaker and Cobb could not succeed in a million dollar damage suit against Judge Landis, baseball czar.

"The federal government has nothing to do with the internal workings of organized baseball," said this Senator, who is thoroughly familiar with the legal machinery of baseball. "It has been officially decided that organized baseball is not interstate commerce, and even if it were, otherwise, the present issue could give rise to no federal question whatsoever."

"Speaker and Cobb voluntarily submitted themselves to the operation of a system of which Commissioner Landis is an integral part. If in the discharge of his duties he acts in good faith, nobody in the organization has any legal redress against him merely because aggrieved by his decision."

Cobb and Speaker have been publicly advised by friends in the Senate to file a suit for a million dollars damages against Landis.

Judicial Conference
Held Raleigh Today

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 30.—(INS)—The North Carolina Judicial Conference met here today in its last gathering before the General Assembly meets January 5, to frame its legislative program.

One of the most important items which the conference probably will decide is the proposed amendment to the Stat. constitution to permit the forming of additional Superior Court districts for the trial of criminal cases, and others for the trial of civil cases.

BROTHERS CHARGED
WITH MURDER OF
SCHOOL TEACHER

Lepanto, Ark., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Harmon Morris, cotton picker, is in jail here today, and his brother, Dudley Norris, is sought following the finding of the body of Noel Klye, 22, school teacher whose throat was cut from ear to ear.

Search for the body was started when Klye disappeared 11 days ago. It was found late yesterday in a clump of bushes two miles from town. Robbery was believed the motive, as Klye's automobile also disappeared. Klye was from Tupelo, Miss.

COMMITTS SUICIDE
AFTER ACCIDENTALLY
SHOOTING GRANDMOTHER

Johnson City, Tenn., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Shooting off the leg of his 80 year old grandmother accidentally with a shotgun and then in a sudden fit of remorse turning the gun to his own chin, blowing away the greater part of his face, Ike Garner, 30, a negro stoker, died in a local hospital today. The aged negro is in a serious condition.

MOONSHINER KILLED IN
FIGHT WITH OFFICERS

Norton, Va., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Grover Branham, notorious gunman and alleged moonshiner, was shot and instantly killed in battle with revenue officers at the mountain home of his father near here, according to reports received here today.

Branham who opened fire on officers when they approached the house to arrest him, was killed when a bullet pierced his heart.

TWENTY LOSE

Moscow, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Twenty persons were killed in a fire which destroyed government flour mills at Rybinsk, according to a word from that city today.

Secretary Kellogg assures Senator Borah that in Nicaragua, we are not taking sides, with the established shaky government, or with the victorious rebels, American forces are only protecting American life and property.

No one questions Secretary Kellogg's absolute sincerity, and his statement is reassuring.

On the other hand, Senator Borah says, "The revolution in Nicaragua was inspired and is directed by eight or ten persons here, who are not even Nicaraguans."

It is perhaps none of the American people's business, but they would like to know who it is that pulls the strings in a neighboring republic, making it necessary to send our forces there.

We would not let Nicaragua land forces here. Why bully a small neighbor. We don't land forces in Russia, you'll notice.

Mussolini says, "I shall make new provinces until 1932. Then I will reward those regions which show themselves LABORIOUS, DISCIPLINED AND PROLIFIC."

Three wonderful words for a nation that wishes to dominate in old Rome, fashion, LABORIOUS, DISCIPLINED, PROLIFIC.

Laborious, you produce results disciplined, you obey without question orders of a mind better than yours; prolific, you provide children to work after you have worked yourself to death.

Three better words, for American, were chosen by a former President of the Santa Fe, Mr. Ripley. ORGANIZE, DEPUTIZE SUPERVISE."

OIL COMPANIES
FAIL TO COMPLY
MEXICAN LAWSFollowing Conference
Today Calles An-
nounced No Exten-
sion Would Be
Granted

Mexico City, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Delioh was expressed in official circles today that sources, in Washington outside of the petroleum industry are fostering antagonism against Mexico's oil law and alien land law which go into effect Saturday.

Ambassador Sheffield held a two-hour conference with Foreign Minister Calles after which President Calles announced that no extension would be granted for compliance with the petroleum law.

A number of important oil companies have failed to meet the Mexican law, alleging it was confiscatory. Production of oil is falling off in the Tampico fields as a result and petroleum exports are declining.

GOVERNMENT TO
TAKE THE POISON
OUT OF ALCOHOLSecretary Mellon An-
nounced Today That
Such Instructions
Had Been Issued

Washington, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon announced officially today that the Government plans to take all poison out of industrial alcohol.

New formulae already have been prepared for denaturing which render industrial alcohol sickening for humans, but not deadly, Mellon said. To a certain extent, these formulae have been put into actual use.

Mellon feels that the Government should not attempt to enforce the prohibition law by use of poison such as wood alcohol. He explained that the present situation is being remedied as rapidly as possible.

Instructions have been given to Treasury chemists to continue the investigation into all denaturing processes, with a view to removal of the virulent poisons from industrial alcohol.

Referring to the general phases of prohibition, Mellon declared that it is unreasonable ever to expect complete enforcement. It would be like anticipating that enforcement of any law would be complete. The Secretary feels that it is a question as to what extent the law can be enforced.

According to the Secretary, the Treasury is endeavoring to bring about the most complete enforcement possible.

Mellon explained that the whole purpose of the denaturing process is to make available tax-free alcohol for the arts and industries and to prevent its re-distillation by the bootlegger. To obtain this objective a strong denaturant is necessary.

He pointed out that there has been a holiday season in which deaths from the consumption of alcohol did not occur. Bad liquor and alcoholic poisoning existed even before prohibition. In the view of the treasury, the use of alcoholic compounds and excessive consumption of bootleg stuff were responsible for more deaths than was poisoned industrial alcohol.

Bootleggers were said to be turning to industrial alcohol as virtually the only source of supply left. The Government, it was explained, has stopped largely the smuggling of foreign liquor and has checked leaks of good whiskey from the distilleries.

As enforcement of the law becomes more effective, it will further drive the rum traffic into the use of lower quality intoxicants, some of which are poisonous according to Mellon.

KILLS WIFE AND
COMMITTS SUICIDE

Punxsautawney, Pa., Dec. 30.—(INS)—James Noll, of Brookhark near here, shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide in the Noll residence, today, according to word received here from the sheriff of Elk county.

DEATH TOLL FROM
POISON WHISKEY
CONTINUES GROWNearly Three Thou-
sand Deaths Result-
ed From Poisoned
Alcohol During the
Year.

New York, Dec. 30.—(INS)—Eight additional deaths, attributed to poison liquor today brought New York's toll from holiday drinking up to 34.

With this record casualty list for the metropolitan districts came figures from many parts of the nation showing an astonishing number of deaths from poison alcohol for the first 51 weeks of the year.

The staggering total for the country, in reports available up to today is 2,897. Admittedly, the figures actually is much larger, as an exact total of the casualties cannot be obtained, it was said.

With this rise in liquor deaths there was considerable condemnation by educators and labor leaders of the government policy of denaturing industrial alcohol which find, it way into the hands of bootleggers.

Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, denounced the government's policy in denaturing liquor. He said: "Murder! Just plain, unadorned murder by our glorious paternal government, is what I think of the deaths attributed to consumption of liquor manufactured from poisoned alcohol."

"Let it go. Why stop it? The more victims of governmental murder, the better the government, I suppose. To a government which has undertaken to do what already has been done in this tragedy of prohibition a few more murders mean nothing."

Best available statistics, on the 1926 deaths follow:

747 in New York City, including holiday toll.

808 in other parts of New York State.

1,342 for other parts of the country heard from up to today.

Medical examiner Charles D. Norris, in announcing the eight additional deaths today, predicted that the total would be augmented during the New Year's Eve drinking. Hospitals, accordingly, are making the necessary provisions to care for alcoholic patients.

Bellevue Hospital, Kings County Hospital and many private institutions are crowded with sufferers from alcoholism, the number of whom it is almost impossible to estimate. Officials reported that 110 alcoholic cases were received in Bellevue since Christmas Eve.

Orville S. Poland, chief of the legal department of the New York Anti-Saloon League, suggested families of poison liquor victims should sue the sellers of the liquor for damages and offered the aid of the league's attorneys in any such action.

"The people of New York are properly horrified and grieved at the reports of so many victims of holiday hootch," said Poland.

Odd Fellows
Meet High Point

Hundreds of Virginians were present for the special Virginia exercises. A basketball tournament is the feature on this afternoon's program.

MEMPHIS BANKER
DROPS DEAD IN OFFICE

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 30.—(INS)—Harry Cohn, elderly president of the American Savings Bank & Trust Company and Memphis millionaire, dropped dead in his office today. Worry over the failure of the bank was believed responsible.

The bank closed its doors several weeks ago after a bookkeeper had disappeared and a cashier had killed himself when a shortage of \$400,000 was revealed by bank examiners.

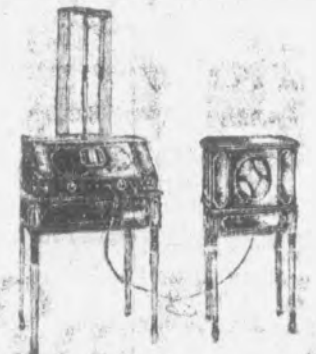

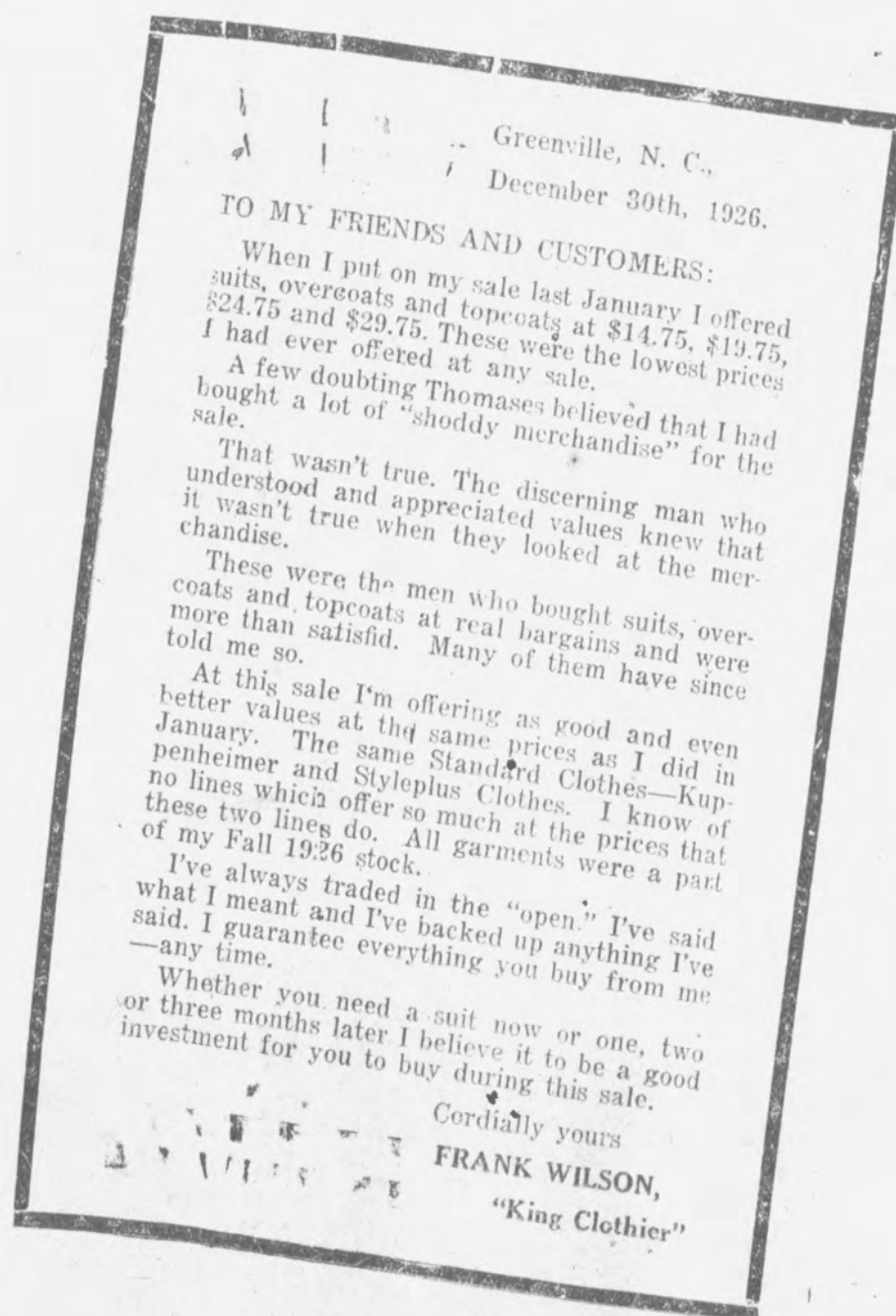
