STRIKE VOTE BEING
TAKEN BY RAILROAD
THROUGHOUT SOUTH

Ballots Being Circulated Among Conductors, Trainmen and Yardmen for General Strike

Richmond, Va., Jan. 6.—The Richmond News-Leader today says a strike vote is being taken by conductors, trainmen and yardmen of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, the Atlantic Coast Line, the Norfolk and Western, the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac, the Seaboard Air Line and other railroads of the southeastern territory.

The newspaper said the men are being asked to vote whether or not they will remain in the service of the employers unless a satisfactory agreement can be obtained which is agreeable to the general chairman and the executive officers of the organization. The ballots are being cast at the request of the executive committee of the organization with the approval of L. E. Sheppard, president of the Order of Railroad Conductors, and W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Trainmen.

Other roads affected by the vote are the Atlanta West Point Railroad, the Atlanta Joint Terminal, Central of Georgia, Florida East Coast, Georgia Railway, Gulf, Mobile and Northern Railway, Jacksonville Terminal, Louisville, Henderson and St. Louis Railway, Louisville, Henderson and Nashville, Louisville, Nashville and Chattanooga, and St. Louis, Norfolk and Southern, Tennessee Railway, Western Railway of Alabama and Winston-Salem South-bound Railway.

The order for the strike vote was mailed from Washington on December 23, last.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The Southern Railroad is not named among those roads in the southeast on which trainmen strike vote have been ordered. It is understood that Southern's contract with the trainmen does not expire until March.

Wilmington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—F. R. Albright, general manager of the Atlantic Coast Line railroad and chairman of the general committee on railroad salaries and wage contracts of the southeast, was today without any information with regard to the strike vote which it was said is being conducted by the conductors and trainmen.

WINTER TERM OF
E. C. T. COLLEGE
STARTED TODAYEnrollment for Next
Fall Term Filled and
Applications Being
Received for 1928

The winter term began today at East Carolina Teachers College. A few new students are entering for this term, but not enough to make any appreciable difference in the enrollment, for some have dropped out and other have been dropped from the roll on account of unsatisfactory work during the fall term.

There are now 366 names on the waiting list and refused list for the fall term of 1927. A considerable number have registered for the fall term of 1928.

It is hoped by the college authorities that by many of the patrons of the college that the present General Assembly will provide for the normal growth of the institution so that this congested condition will not exist in the future. The Board of Trustees has asked for sufficient appropriations to increase the dormitory capacity of the college by 300 students.

Miss Emily Goodlett of Jackson, Ala., has taken the work of Miss Agnes Whiteside in primary education. Miss Whiteside is away on leave of absence at Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn.

Scandals, Mikados, Old Age, Just Spoiled, Any Mexican War? See The Pacific.

Fresh baseball scandals, others to come, and only a fraction of the truth will ever be known. It's a short story. "Professional sport" racing, baseball, prize fighting or whatever is dishonest. Exceptions of individual honesty—do not clean the nest.

It is better to play a good game yourself, than to sit watching others, playing and fooling you. If too old for a good game, take a walk, or read a book.

One Mikado is dead, his son and successor is too ill to attend his father's funeral.

Japan does not depend, any more than Britain does, on the health or wisdom of hereditary rulers. The elders in Japan, the commons in England decide what shall be done. The King and Mikado say "Yes."

Dr. Charlotte De Galier Davern, charming lady who lectures on health, looks about 70, and is actually 102 years old, states good W. C. T. U.'s with this: "To live long, eat when hungry, exercise, drink moderately, don't smoke too much."

The lady has Russian and French blood, both good for long life. And most important, she weighs 120 pounds. Your body is an irrigation, farm, your heart the pump, your blood the water. A light body calls for light pumping. Cut down your weight, wisely, and add to your life. Every added pound means more work for the heart.

J. N. Moore, University of Illinois sophomore, wrote, before killing himself, "It raises the Devil with me to think of having to slave around and work like the devil and just grow old. I can't see the idea of wading through school, then dash bravely out and get a big old job at a hundred a month."

In six words of his letter the young man explains what is really the matter with him. "I am just spoiled, I suppose." If all the spoiled children in this foolish country committed suicide, there would not be enough graveyards.

Young Mexicans gathered in Rome, representing the Gioventu Cattolica, swore in the presence of Pope Pius to resist until death Mexican attack on the Roman Catholic faith, each received from the Pope a "medal of merit."

That solemn promise made by Mexican youth to the Pope is a serious menace to the anti-Catholic government of Calles.

No Mexican outbreak yet, although it has been promised for three days. It would be a picture of an army of Yaqui Indians, all devout Catholics, against the Mexican government, and the Mexicans, people themselves divided between their hatred of laws that oppress their church, and their hatreds of a foreign foe, in case the United States should join with De La Huerta. Such a war would be an interesting struggle, between religious and patriotic sentiments.

Leaders of any invading army would rely on Mexican Catholic hostility to their government.

That the Vatican, representing the power and the influence of Rome, would welcome an internal revolution, overthrowing Calles and his laws against the church, is probable.

But to encourage invasion and possible conquest of Mexico, one of the few truly Catholic countries, by a nation like the United States, classed as protestant, would be a different matter.

Our constitution recognizes no particular religion, and the Catholic church is the most numerous well organized and most powerful unit of the Christian church in the United States, undoubtedly.

But protestants, and those with no religion that may be called "ultra-protestants" far outnumber Catholics, so that this is in number a protestant country.

Conquest of Mexico by the United States would not restore Mexico's public schools to control of the church teachers.

It is a complicated situation. Perhaps there won't be any war, only enough threatening and demonstrating on this side of the Rio Grande, to obtain reasonable oil and church concessions.

BY FIRE TODAYFire Damage at Lenoir-Rhyne College
Early Today Estimated at \$100,000

Hickory, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Fire originating from an unknown source swept through the administration building of Lenoir-Rhyne College at an early hour this morning and virtually leveled it to the ground. Early estimates were that the loss would amount to \$100,000 in actual damages.

The entire library, valued at \$20,000, was totally destroyed. The president's office and library, the auditorium, college store, two class rooms and a literary society hall were all wrecked by the fire. The administration building was the oldest and most beautiful in the college group. The building was partially covered by insurance.

GOVERNOR DELIVERS
BIENNIAL ADDRESS TO
GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Explains Successful Workings Of Budget System; Makes Several Recommendations He Deems Necessary For Continued Progress Of The State.

Raleigh, Jan. 6.—After explaining in some detail the successful workings of the executive budget system during the past two years, and urging that it be continued, Governor A. W. McLean in the course of his biennial message to the General Assembly, last night suggested or recommended a number of new measures which in his judgment he thought necessary for the continued progress of the state. Among the new measures advocated by Governor McLean are:

1. Taxation reform.
2. Appointment of a tax commission to study the question of local taxes with a view to a more uniform system of local taxation.
3. Enactment of legislation looking toward an improved form of county government to eliminate waste and inefficiency.

4. Authorization of a \$30,000 bond issue for state highways, and enactment of legislation to provide for their beautification.
5. Authorization of an equalization fund of at least \$2,000,000 a year for the public schools of the state.
6. Enactment of a state fish and game law.
7. State supervision of weights and measures in an effective manner.
8. Operator's license for motor vehicles and provision that all vehicles on highways must carry a light at night, whether motor or horse drawn.
9. Development of transportation facilities, especially water transportation by means of inland waterway system.
10. Stricter regulations in sale of deadly weapons and more severe restrictions and penalties for violation of law regarding concealed weapons.
11. The submission of a constitutional amendment providing for a revision of the judicial system with adequate temporary legislation to provide relief in the interim.

Although the questions of taxation, local taxes and needed improvements in the present system of county government were the last to be taken up by Governor McLean in the course of his message, the fact that he left the discussion of these matters until the close of his address is taken as an indication that he undoubtedly considers these matters of utmost importance to the state.

No mention or discussion of the budget and fiscal affairs of the state is made in this message, the Governor explaining that he had purposely omitted these matters from the present message, since they will be discussed in a special message to be delivered later when the report of the advisory budget commission and the appropriation and revenue bills will be submitted.

Although there was nothing particularly startling or new in the message, it bore the evidence of much careful and profound study with the welfare of state as a whole uppermost in the mind of the Governor. The first part of the message, which deals almost exclusively with a review of the first two years of Governor McLean's administration, presents a most inclusive account of the workings of the new measures enacted by the last legislature, and of the manner in which the executive budget system has operated is very warmly approved, as was expected. Strong approval was also given to the work of the salary and wage commission, and the commissioner of pardons. The Governor recommended that the salary and wage commission be continued as constituted since it had by no means completed its work. He also asked that the creating the commissioner of pardons and paroles be continued in its present form. He suggested that the capital issues law, better known as the "Blue Sky Law" be modified slightly to permit the sale of securities subject to registration under the act. Continuation of the public health program was also urged. The importance of the department of agriculture along the lines of education with view to greater diversification was also stressed.

In discussing the question of law enforcement, Governor McLean said that the record of the state had been steadily improving, especially with regard to the abolition of lynchings and mob violence. However, the homicide rate is still too high, and in order to reduce this, he advocated stricter measures with regard to the sale of deadly weapons and heavier penalties for those who violate these laws. In this same connection, he also advocated the enactment of a law requiring the licensing of automobile operators, in view of the mounting number of

casualties from automobile accidents on the highways. This would be a most effective means of eliminating the drunken drivers, who constitute one of the greatest menaces to life and property. Thus if all drivers of automobiles were to be licensed, and a driver should violate the law, his license could then be forfeited, and he could be prevented from operating a motor vehicle anywhere in the state. It is significant to note in this connection that no mention was made by the Governor of a state highway patrol force, such as has been advocated by a number of individuals and organizations.

Discusses Taxation
The problem of taxation continues to be a perplexing one in North Carolina, the Governor declared in opening his discussion of this question. "I am convinced, as you are, that we will never reach a solution of this age old problem that will be entirely satisfactory. So we must continue to give it our attention and seek to approximate a solution at stated intervals to meet new conditions."

While North Carolina has made much progress in tax reforms, there are still inequalities and imperfections that call loudly for treatment. "However, it is not so much the taxes for the support of the state government that are too high, as it is the local taxes," the Governor declared, when he said that "the most serious phase of our tax problem arises in connection with local taxation."

"Every thinking man and woman knows that personal property and real estate, whether devoted to home, agricultural or personal uses is bearing too heavy a burden of taxation. The fact that these taxes are levied for local purposes makes them none the less burdensome. In some counties, taxes on farm lands are out of proportion to the earning capacity of these lands. A striking example of the lack of uniformity in county tax rates is afforded by the fact that in one county local taxes paid by cotton mills amount to \$2.49 per spindle, while in another county it is but 56 cents per spindle."

This question of local taxes is thus closely related to the matter of improving our local government and should be given most serious consideration. I believe the appointment of a commission composed of a group of able patriotic and successful citizens of the state who will study the whole question of taxation as it relates to conditions in the state will give us the information which is absolutely necessary to any correct, just and permanent solution of the problem."

County Government Reform
The Governor then took up a brief but cogent discussion of the needs of improved methods in county government, and the relation of this need to local taxation. The Governor calls attention to the fact that many of the counties in the state are operated under a system that is antiquated and inadequate and that does not meet modern needs. This system is largely responsible for many confusing aspects of county government and can trace its ancestry back to old England, from whence it was brought, he declares. The Governor called attention to the platform of the Democratic party pledging the party to take action looking toward building up a better system of county government, and said:

"This pledge must be kept. Therefore, I cannot too strongly urge upon the general assembly the enactment of measures for this purpose. It is not necessary that a revolutionary program be instituted. The general assembly (Continued on page two)

LARGER FORCES
TODAY ORDERED
TO NICARAGUAAdditional Ships and
Marines Being Sent
to Protect American
Lives and Property

Washington, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Additional naval vessels have been ordered to Nicaragua carrying an expeditionary force of 400 marines. The Navy Department said the purpose of this dispatch of additional troops, and ships is to enable Admiral Latimer to thoroughly protect American lives and property in the war-torn Central American country.

The troops are to report to Rear Admiral Latimer, in command of American forces in Nicaraguan waters, for such disposition as conditions warrant.

JAPAN TO FLY PLANES WITH NEW RADIO DEVICE

Tokio, Jan. 6.—(INS)—A device to enable airplanes, warships and motor cars to be operated by radio has been perfected by a Japanese military officer. Tests made by the army have demonstrated its efficiency. Similar devices have been in use in western countries for some time but never before in Japan.

First construction on an 81-story tower, proposed as the tallest building in the world, will begin in Detroit in January.

DOCKET CLEARED
IN COUNTY COURT
LATE YESTERDAY

Dennis Jones Convicted on Liquor Charge Instead of Larceny as Reported

This week's session of county court adjourned yesterday afternoon after the disposition of a number of cases including many liquor cases. Owing to no sessions of the court since early in December, there was a heavy docket when court convened Tuesday morning, and hard work was necessary to clear the docket by yesterday afternoon.

In yesterday's report in the Reflector, it was stated that Dennis Jones was convicted of larceny and fined \$50 and cost. The charge against Jones, was for the possession of liquor and not larceny as was reported.

Cases disposed of during yesterday's session were, Larry Jenkins, larceny, not guilty.

Sam Hart, non-support, was given a 12 months jail sentence, the same to be suspended for a period of two years provided defendant did not disobey any of the criminal laws and provided he would secure employment and support his wife and child.

Joseph Holland, assault with deadly weapon, was fined \$50 and cost.

W. O. Vinson and George Anne Boyd, F. and A., case against George Anne Boyd not taken and W. O. Vinson adjudged not guilty.

Isaac Barnes, charged with abandonment, was sentenced to twelve months on the roads. He appealed to superior court under \$500 bond.

Henry (Gost) Pine, carrying concealed weapon, was fined \$50 and cost or 90 days on roads. On a charge of assault he was found not guilty.

William Wilkes, for driving a car while drunk, was fined \$100 and cost and \$36 damages to car of Wm. Clark. In case of failure to pay fine and damages, defendant must serve six months on the roads.

Charles Simmons was found guilty on a charge of driving while drunk.

British Armed
Forces Withdrawn
Hankow, China

Hankow, China, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Representatives of labor, farmers, merchants, students and soldiers of Hankow, have formulated demands to be presented to the Cantonese government through consuls including a demand for indemnity for Chinese alleged to have been killed and wounded in the disturbances of Monday, in the withdrawal of guns and an apology to the Chinese government.

The situation here is growing more critical every hour. Foreigners were amazed at the withdrawal of British armed forces and the feeling was that all concessions would fall into the hands of the Chinese. The fate of foreigners remaining here is decidedly insecure. All business is at a standstill. All British women and children are being taken to Shanghai.

TIME FOR ACTION
The work of the 1927 legislature is already under way and if an extension of highway number eleven north of Bethel is to be included in the state road map, it is time citizens of this community were getting busy. The value of such an extension to this entire section of the state has been thoroughly discussed in these columns from time to time during the past few months and everyone interested must be familiar with the issue. Wanting the extension of the road, however, will not get it unless the wanting is backed up by strong effort on the part of the citizens to have it included in the state appropriation. Now is the time to act. A few more days and legislators will have completed the formulation of plans for this session. Delay now in urging the extension of highway number eleven will mean that it will be at least two years before the matter can be brought before the state and probably another like period of time before same is made a reality. Get in touch with your Senator and Representatives now and let them know that the citizens of this section want the highway extended into the territory north of Bethel.

THE MASS MEETING
The mass meeting called by the Merchants' Association for tomorrow night is of vital interest to every resident of this town and vicinity. Whether or not there is oil in Greenville or Pitt county interests every individual. The mass meeting will go into a full discussion of the possibilities of oil here, and if indications are favorable will endeavor to form a company for the purpose of sinking a test well. The meeting will prove interesting whether or not you have any desire to take part in any oil venture, and you are due to yourself to be on hand at the court house tomorrow night.

FIRST CONSIDERATION
The great question at this time in the minds of those in this state interested in education is what will the General Assembly do with the appropriations bill. All state institutions are seeking larger appropriations and it has been indicated that the granting of such would bankrupt the state. There can be no question, however, that some of the institutions at least must be enlarged if they are to accomplish the purpose for which they are intended. East Carolina College, beginning its winter term yesterday, announced that nearly four hundred applicants for the next fall term have already been declined

because of lack of accommodations and already a large number are placing applications for the 1928 term. There is a crying need for school teachers throughout the state and it is only through the colleges that those who would devote their lives to the teaching profession can get the proper training. The needs of the children of the state should be taken into consideration by the legislators before they go too far in the process of slicing the appropriation bill.

can, by general act, provide for various plans of county government along whatever lines it may deem wise, thus making it possible for any county to adopt the plan best suited to its needs, whether managerial, commission or any other feasible plan. State Highway System. Authorization of a bond issue of \$30,000,000 for highways is advocated for the biennium, in 20 year serial bonds, to mature in equal installments of \$1,500,000 annually, and that short term notes be issued in anticipation of the sale of these bonds. This recommendation was preceded by a brief resume of the state's bonded indebtedness for highways, calling attention to the fact that the bonds for highways now outstanding amount to \$85,000,000 with an additional \$600,000 for the construction for the Chowan River bridge. He also asked the general assembly to empower the highway commission to take whatever action is necessary for the beautification of the highways of the state by planting grass, trees and shrubs. Weights and Measures. Calling attention to the fact that the present law with regard to weights and measures was entirely inadequate "in the light of present conditions" and that he has received numerous complaints because of this, Governor McLean advocates a uniform law providing for state supervision weights and measures, under the general supervision of department of agriculture. A uniform fish and game law, is now almost required as the result of the decision of the State Supreme Court, rendering ineffective, many county game laws, the Governor declared, and he recommended such a law, but one that would not "interfere in any way with the rights of the citizens." The failure of the last General Assembly to enact a statewide law was, I am sure, due largely to the attempt to unduly restrict the privilege of the ordinary poole, and line fishermen and hunters in rural districts who are not professional sportsmen. The contention, that old time fishing and hunting are the only free sports remaining must be reckoned with in connection with whatever action is taken. Public Education. In discussing the matter of education, the Governor called attention to the progress that already has been made and commended it, but also pointed out that much was still to be attained. He called attention to the need for better elementary school, and better teachers, but did not mention the question of an eight months school, either directly or indirectly, evidently leaving this question up to the educational commission. However, he did state that the budget to be submitted later would provide for a minimum of \$3,000,000 a year for the equalization fund, instead of \$1,500,000 as now.

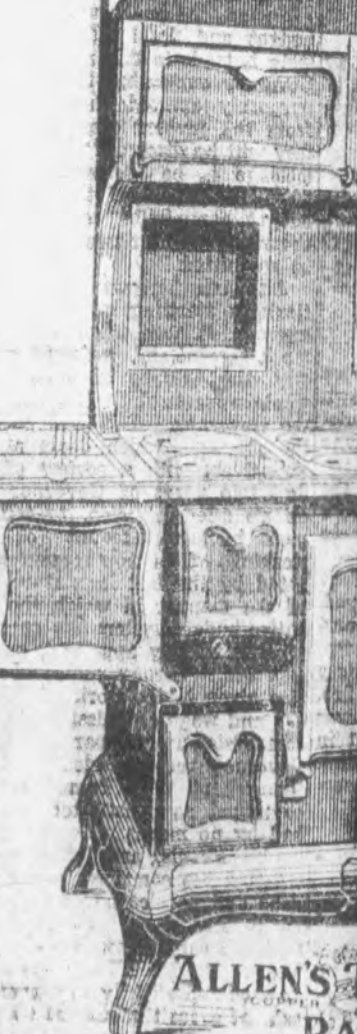

Daily News Letter
Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Honolulu, Jan. 6.—(INS)—Old wooden vessels of the Inter-Island fleet, which during the "Gay Nineties" were the finest of the period, are being towed one by one to the windward coast of Lanai island and beached on a barren portion of shore known as the "graveyard." These vessels were retired from active service several years ago, but have been held in reserve for possible use, in cases of emergency. However, they slowly rotted away and finally reached a state where they were absolutely useless.

Among the vessel, which have been thus disposed of is the Nilahu, which formerly handled the service between Honolulu and the Hilo, island of Hawaii; also the Mikahala which did duty between Honolulu and the ports of Maui and Molokai. The former U. S. gunboat Bennington, which was sold into the Inter-Island service after her fateful explosion at San Diego in 1905, is also being junked. Both the army and the navy have declined to use this vessel as a target.

Fifty leading business men of Honolulu have given their endorsement to a plan of the vocational department of the public schools to place boys between the ages of 14 and 19 directly on the plantations, under the supervision of competent instructors. This scheme has been advanced in an effort to educate the rising generation to a practical outlook on life and to fit for a place in the plantation life of Hawaii. Only those boys who express a desire to, learn, agriculture, and mill work should be included, but these would be carefully trained in every line of sugar production. Each plantation manager would be wholly in charge of the group of boys assigned to his plantation.

A hundred foot flagpole of Douglas fir sent as a gift from B. G. Campbell, Seattle lumber merchant, to the Oahu Country Club, has been raised in the clubhouse grounds. Campbell's gift was in appreciation of courtesies extended to him by club members during his recent visit to the islands. The dedication ceremonies were marked by music by Col. Curtis P. Lanke, former chamberlain to King Kalakaua on the silver hunting horn which was the property of that monarch. Designs of ancient Hawaiian tapa, native cloth made from the bark of a certain tree, are to be reproduced on the ceiling of the new Bank of Hawaii building now under construction, thereby introducing a new type of interior decoration to Honolulu. Rare old tapa has been obtained from the Bishop Museum for sample, designs and the decorative work is being carried out under the direction of Julian Ellsworth Garnsey, mural painter of Los Angeles.

Six luxurious and speedy buses, each seating 19 people, will be operated in a sightseeing and motor transportation service, in conjunction with the new Royal Hawaiian Hotel. In addition to these buses there will be about a dozen touring cars and limousines. The transportation company will be managed by J. L. Crosby of Banff with Wayne Stewart, formerly manager of the Seattle Automobile Club, directly in charge.

The world's most beautiful hotel grounds are destined for Honolulu, in the opinion of Ralph T. Stevens, noted landscape architect of Santa Barbara, who, has recently spent some time in the islands completing plans and sketches for drives, bowers, fountains and gardens for the Royal Hawaiian premises at Waikiki beach. "No other land beneath the sun lends itself to the fancy of a landscape architect as does Hawaii," Stevens declared. "The grounds of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel have the advantage of a historic setting and the presence

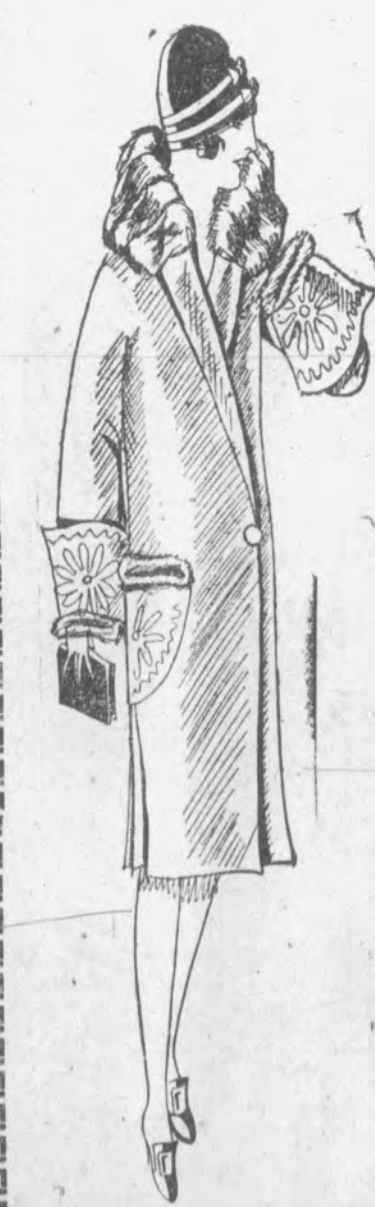
