COMMITTEE REPORTS READY FOR ASSEMBLY TONIGHT'S SESSION

Favorable Report on Eight Months School Term And Modification of Capital Punishment Law Will be Among Reported Bills

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—With the Revenue and Appropriations Committees holding hearings the eleventh day of the North Carolina Legislature was set for heavy work tonight. After ten days of organization and laying down of major programs by Governor McLean, Budget Commission and legislative leaders, an introduction of accompanying bills, committees today became the keynote of the daily grind.

FORMER TREASURER MISSION BOARD GETS TWENTY YEARS IN PEN

Richmond, Va., Jan. 17.—(AP)—George N. Sanders, former treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, was sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary here by Judge Matthews in Hastings court today, following a short but dramatic trial on two indictments charging him with theft of the Board's funds.

DECIDE CONGRESS HAS THE POWER TO ACQUIRE EVIDENCE

Court Hands Down Opinion That Committees Have Right Make Witness Appear

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The power of the Senate to compel Hal S. Daugherty, of Ohio, to comply with a summons issued in 1924 by the Daugherty investigating committee, was upheld today by the Supreme Court. This was the first time the nation's highest court had passed under like circumstances on the authority of Congressional committees to compel witnesses to appear, a subject which was widely debated during the Daugherty and oil investigations of three years ago. Among those who disputed the authority of Congress to compel testimony included Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, and as a result contempt proceedings are pending against him in Washington at present.

AMERICAN WOMEN SUFFER AT HANDS OF CHINESE MOB

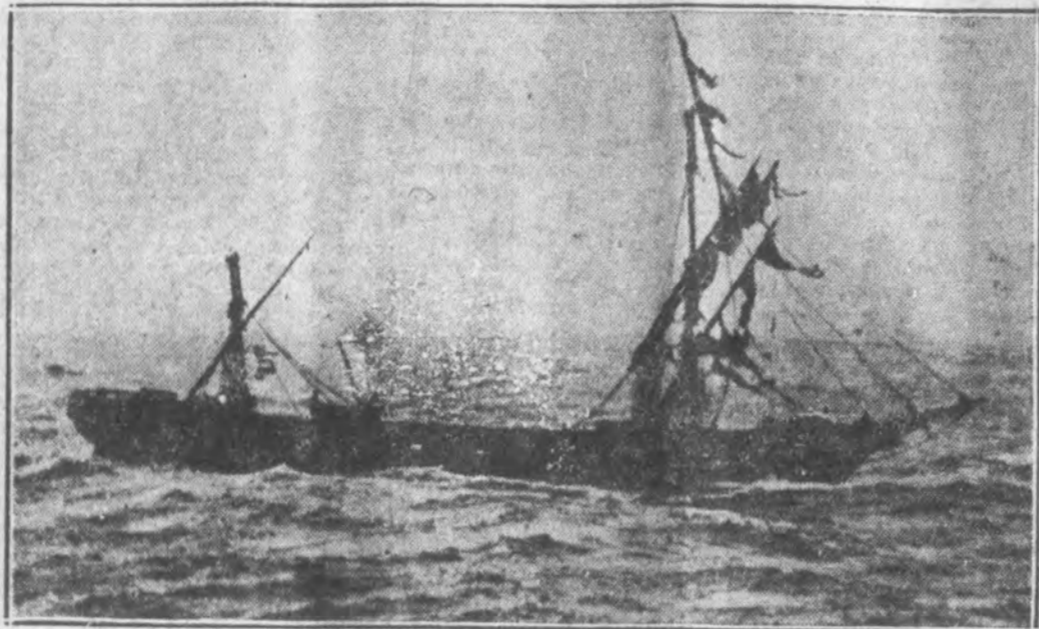
Number of American And British Women Beaten in Foochow Last Night

Foochow, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The rising tide of nationalism in China today reached a new stage of violence. A number of American and British women and two ministers were beaten by Chinese mobs, several of the victims later being dragged through the streets by their tormentors last night. The uprising was the worst demonstration in the history of Foochow. Churches, schools, hospitals and foreign residences were ransacked. The riot was precipitated by northern soldiers incorporated into the Canton army.

Mexico Looks Better Mellon and Hoover More Automobiles Wanted. Bootleg Love (By Arthur Brisbane)

As the week starts there seems less probability of trouble with Mexico. Senator Heflin, of Alabama, injecting the religious issue quite violently into the war question, did not create the excitement that, perhaps, was hoped for.

That the Pope should want war between Mexico and this country is incredible. There could be only one end to such a war and the Vatican would hardly want to put what is now a 95 per cent Catholic country, in spite of passing governmental antagonism to the church, under control of what is, in fact, a protestant government.

The Mexican government continues the campaign against the Catholic church. Four more priests have been deported and many Mexicans are arrested accused of spreading propaganda against President Calles.

One thing that guarantees prosperity, can be said of this country with President Coolidge at the head.

Uncle Sam has men working that really know the United States—what it needs, and that know business, which is prosperity's backbone.

Mr. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury, as able a financier as there is in the world, works for his government at the salary of a chief clerk. He has reduced the nation's debt by THOUSANDS OF MILLIONS already, and his plan if adhered to, will wipe out the debt in a few years, if that be desired. And, thinking of his own country first, Mr. Mellon has protected the interests of the United States in connection with its foreign debts.

Mr. Hoover, before he went to work for the government as Secretary of Commerce, had training in engineering, mining and business in many parts of the world. The work done, the results accomplished by Mr. Hoover, with the co-operation of the President and other earnest men in the administration and in the Senate, entitle Mr. Hoover to the country's thanks.

With Hiram Johnson and others, he has undoubtedly put through the important development of the Colorado river. The commission of which he is the head, makes it certain that the farm products of the middle west will have access by water to the Atlantic through the St. Lawrence, and cheap freight rates to Europe will increase the value of the farmer's wheat from 10 to 16 cents a bushel in the world markets.

Also there is good reason to hope that an adequate waterway will follow from the Great Lakes through the Mississippi river to the Gulf of Mexico.

If in doubt about the automobile industry, you should have attended the automobile show in New York City during the past week. Each important maker had something new to show, and people crowded to see in hundreds of thousands. Men and women stood in line waiting to buy tickets. It was difficult to move about in the neighborhood of the principal exhibits.

Those that talk about an "automobile saturation point" don't realize how many millions of Americans are planning to get their first automobile or a new and better automobile.

Judge Lindsey, of Denver's juvenile court, says "bootleg love" infects the nation. Such terms as "free love" and "trial marriage" are constantly used, and the foundations of marriage and the home are undermined. Marriage seems to be a failure and Judge Lindsey suggests this for debate: "Resolved, that the institutes of marriage can be improved by men."

Men often mistake passing symptoms for a permanent condition. Man has been improving marriage steadily for a hundred thousand years. British husbands are no longer allowed by law as once they were, "to beat their wives with a stock no thicker than the husband's thumb."

Women have rights in their own children and property, which formerly they did not. And as for "free love" and "trial marriage" those are words that needs not worry you.

JANUARY TERM OF POOR WEATHER OF SUPERIOR COURT LITTLE HANDICAP BEGUN HERE TODAY CONTEST WORKERS

About Hundred Civil Actions For Hearing This Week. Criminal Court Next Week

A two weeks term of superior court got under way here today with Judge E. H. Cramer presiding. The sessions this week will be devoted to the trial of civil actions, while next week will be devoted to criminal cases. While about a hundred cases compose the civil calendar this week, very few are expected to be long drawn out, and indications are that the calendar will be cleared before the end of the week.

Probably the hardest fought case of the week will be the case of C. J. Tripp against the American Tobacco Co. This is a suit against the tobacco company for damages as a result of Tripp being shot and seriously injured by a watchman employed by the company. The case is slated for hearing Wednesday.

There are several important cases slated for hearing at the criminal term next week and the sessions are expected to draw a number of people from all sections of the county.

ESCAPED PRISONER TODAY WALKS INTO THE PENITENTIARY

Declares He was Fired Dodging and Wanted to Serve Remainder of His Time.

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Declaring he was tired of dodging and wanted to serve out his time Frank York, white, walked back into state prison today. He had been free since last July when he escaped from Caledonia farm with two years left on a five year term for breaking and entering in Catawba county.

MACHINE TO FORGE FRANCES IS SENT TO JUNK HEAP

Budapest, Jan. 17.—(INS)—The engraving machine which printed the millions of forged francs for Prince Windischgratz and the other convicted Hungarians, has been sent to the junk heap. The machine was used as evidence in court and then broken up. It is now being sold as scrap iron by the government for ten dollars.

PRESIDENT OF AUSTRIA IN PATRIOTIC "MOVIE"

Vienna, Jan. 17.—(INS)—The President of Austria, Dr. Hainisch will become a movie actor to the extent of allowing himself and his model dairy farm to be filmed for propaganda in the interests of national sanitation.

IRELAND TO HAVE LAW TO STOP EVIL LITERATURE

Dublin, Jan. 17.—(INS)—A bill to prohibit the sale of "evil literature" in Ireland—including weekly newspapers which give prominence to unsavory matrimonial cases—is likely to be introduced into the Irish Parliament in response to a demand from the Catholic Truth Society and other public bodies, a commission was set up recently to inquire into the matter, and their report now awaits signature. It is understood the commission recommends the compilation of a "black list" of books and periodicals and the prohibition of newspapers advocating birth control.

OFFICERS SEEKING BUSINESS SCHOOL CONVICTS ESCAPED BANDITS SUFFERS FIRE LOSS FROM PRISON FARM

Two Heavily Armed Bandits Shoot up Florida Town and Get \$40,000

West Palm Beach, Fla., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Two bandits heavily armed with shotguns and revolvers and speeding north on the Dixie Highway in a roadster were sought today by West Palm Beach police following a telephone call from Fort Lauderdale which stated the escaped pair had shot up a small town below there and escaped with \$40,000. The police were unable to learn what small town the report referred to.

Municipal Ass'n. Hold Meeting In Raleigh Today

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The North Carolina Municipal Association today spoke for the new law enabling cities and towns to acquire lands for setting building lines and for widening streets and to assess the benefits on the abutting properties.

PAINTED LEGS TO REPLACE SILK STOCKINGS IN SPAIN

Barcelona, Jan. 17.—(INS)—One of the most curious exhibitions the old world has ever known will take place in this city within a few weeks. The important designers and dressmakers of Madrid and Barcelona will submit to the public their unique designs of painted legs to replace the silk stocking which has been discarded at smart summer resorts for several seasons.

All the loveliest women of Spain are being searched to act as mannequins for this exposition. There will be designs of all kinds decorative motifs in all colors to suit the silhouette of the wearer as well as her frock.

CONSTANTINOPLE TO HAVE NEW CENSUS REGISTRATION

Constantinople, Jan. 17.—(INS)—A new census of the population of Constantinople will be taken shortly, and to ensure that no one escapes registration, all persons must stay at home on the day of the census, and all streetcar systems, shopping, railroads, telephones and other services must be suspended for twenty-four hours.

ARAB AND NEGRO SINGERS PLAN INVASION OF PARIS

Paris, Jan. 17.—(INS)—Paris will be invaded by Arab and Negro singers during the year of 1927, according to promises made by theatrical and musical managers. Ben Said Bourdon, a young Algerian who has been studying music seriously for the past year, is expected to sing at the Opera Comique within a short time. Not a few among the North African tribes, particularly among the Kabyles in the mountains, have extraordinarily beautiful voices. A certain Beni Mahieddine, a tenor is expected to make a great hit when he sings in Paris this winter.

Wilmington Business District Visited by \$25,000 Blaze Early Today.

Wilmington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Damage estimated at slightly less than \$25,000 was done by fire today that destroyed the top story of the four story Gerald building. The blaze was discovered at 8:45 o'clock in the elevator shaft. At times it threatened the entire building and as well as portions of the downtown area. Every piece of fire fighting apparatus in the city was called out.

Condition of Miss Bet Dixon Reported As Favorable Today

Reports from the bedside of Miss Bet Dixon, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Dixon, today state that her condition is as well as could be expected, and while she is in no wise out of danger, she has an even chance for recovery. Miss Dixon is confined in Pitt Community hospital suffering from a pistol wound in the abdomen received Saturday night.

Secretary of State Issues Formal Statement Denying Published Stories.

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Secretary Kellogg issued a formal statement today denying the published reports that a change is contemplated in the American policy toward Nicaragua.

AERIAL POLICE FORCE IS NEW IDEA IN ROME

Rome, Jan. 17.—(INS)—An aerial police force is to be organized by the Italian government, and first tests of the system will be held in Rome this month. The chief duties of the force will be the control of traffic from non-rigid airships, flying low over the large towns and the main roads converging on them, and the suppression and chase of major bandits and escaping criminals in fast powerful airplanes.

DANISH INVENTOR OFFERS ATTACHABLE "HELICOPTER"

Copenhagen, Jan. 17.—(INS)—A big step toward vertical flying is claimed to have been made by a Danish inventor named Rasmussen. Rasmussen has registered a patent helicopter arrangement which is attachable to any airplane. It consists of a system of propellers of special design, winers and lifting and lowering the machine perpendicularly. A German firm is reported to have acquired the patent.

Superintendent Pou Advised Two Prisoners at Caledonia Made Getway.

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Two state prisoners escaped from Caledonia farm number 2 early today for the wilds of Eastern North Carolina. They were Homer Conington, serving five years for non-supporting in Mecklenburg county, and David Wilbanks, just being given a seven years sentence for stealing an automobile in Cabarrus.

KELLOGG DENIES CHANGE IN POLICY TO NICARAGUA

While there have been numerous rumors as to the shooting, there was no eye witnesses, and the condition of the patient has prevented a statement from her so far. Neither her parents nor her intimate friends know of any motive that might have prompted an attempt at suicide and believe the shooting was accidental.

ENGLAND WITHDRAWS FIVE BATTLESHIPS

London, Jan. 17.—(INS)—Partly in accordance with the terms of the Washington Arms Treaty and partly for reasons of economy five battleships bearing names in British naval history will be drawn from active service with the British Navy at noon.

ENGLAND WITHDRAWS FIVE BATTLESHIPS

Two of these ships necessarily had to be scrapped under the terms of the Washington Treaty to make way for the Nelson and Rodney, the two new super-battleships now approaching completion in British shipyards, the others are being withdrawn as part of the economy wave now sweeping British officialdom.

How vigorous this economy campaign is may be judged from the following list of ships which have been scrapped during the past twelve months. During this period have gone enough ships to make a respectable sized navy, including three destroyer depot ships, seven cruisers, seventeen destroyers, and numerous small craft.

WHERE THERE IS A WILL THERE IS A WAY

The Educational Commission appointed by the Governor will make its report today. It is understood that it will be a divided report to 5, with the small margin of majority taking counsel of their fears and the minority taking counsel of the high duty the commonwealth owes to the forgotten children in the rural districts. It is understood that all three of the women on the Commission stood out for the children, not some day in the future and not by piecemeal at a time when it will do no good to children who must secure an education in 1928 and 1929 and 1930 or never.

There is neither reason nor excuse for delaying an eight months school beginning in the fall of 1927. There are sources untouched, or not adequately taxed, from which the additional money needed can be procured this year without imposing an additional cent of tax on homes or land. If the small majority of the Commission had devoted as much time to pointing out ways to obtain the necessary revenue needed as they have in finding justification for furthering what is the immediate need, the report would have been unanimous for providing for eight months school beginning now.

An income tax increase, imposing additional tax only upon those whose incomes justify it, will secure a large portion of the money necessary.

A properly increased tax on public service corporations will raise at least a third of the amount needed. If any one doubts that such increase is just and proper, let him read the abnormal earnings of the Atlantic Coast Line and other railroads which cut melons because of high rates and big earnings. The same thing is true of water power, light and other public service corporations. The tax levied upon them is scandalously low in comparison with the tax paid by the owners of homes and farmers.

The insurance companies pay very small taxes in North Carolina in proportion to their earnings. For every two dollars paid on premiums the people get back about one dollar since the arbitrary increase in rates made last year. Here is a source of revenue for schools.

There is talk of a tax of \$1.00 on every person who drives an automobile, the money to be used to pay for a Highway Constabulary. If that tax is suitable, it is an hundred times better to apply it to giving the forgotten rural children as good facilities as town children enjoy, if funds are available from no other source, than to let the children stay out of school.

Are other sources neces-

sary? If so, read the reports of companies making cigarettes and soft drinks. They are making money hand over fist. Here is a source for increased revenue.

If these are insufficient, why should the large class of people who smoke cigarettes and drink cold drinks go free of helping on the school fund. A small tax on every cold drink and package of cigarettes would hurt nobody, and, if necessary to give an eight months school most of these luxuries would not object to the tax if they knew the money went to educate the children now denied a fair chance of preparation for life.

Again, equalization of assessment can aid. Forsyth pays a very small tax and Clay a very large tax. There is a way to equalize so as to do injury to nobody.

But, men and brethren, the question is not: Where will the money come from? The question is: Is there a will to keep in mind the forgotten children and give them NOW the educational opportunities to which they are entitled? If there is the will, the way will be easy, even though opposition from the defenders of the interests making "big" money will raise a hue and cry against it.

Where there is a will there is a way.— News and Observer.

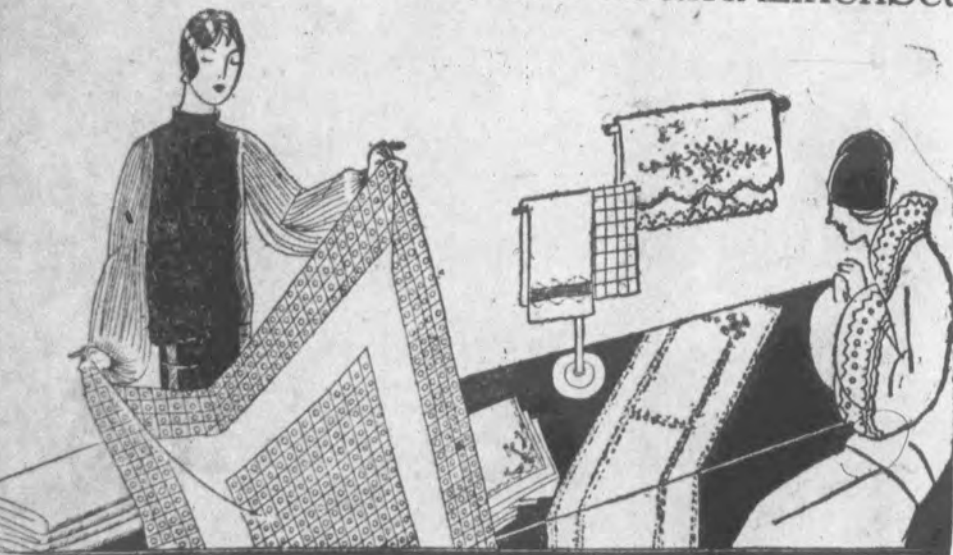
