DIZZY PAGE BEING SET BY SEVERAL WHO SEEK AUTOS

Winterville and Greenville Entrant in Subscription Drive Share Honors Yesterday

But two days remain now before the first decrease in votes in the contest goes into effect. This Saturday night at eight sharp the thirteen candidates for the more than \$5,000 in prizes offers will round the First Period of the contest which has been running four weeks. Then will follow what is known as the Second Period which has only one week to run and the last period of the contest will follow that and this one also runs but a week.

From the opening day of the contest, January 2d, those competing for the Studebaker Sedan, Chevrolet Coach and the various cash prizes have been receiving promises for help in the way of subscriptions to The Reflector. Many of these have been cashed in on but the bulk of these promises have yet to come in. Turning in these promises this week means more to the success of an individual campaign than a like amount of work turned in at a later date. Never again, in the campaign, will votes given on subscriptions count as much as they will count between now and closing time Saturday.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 27.—(AP)—The Allegheny county grand jury investigating alleged irregularities in the elections of November last, today recommended that charges be made against 32 persons including 30 election board officials and a voter and an alderman.

BAPTIST PRESIDENT WOULD EVANGELIZE WORLD

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 27.—(INS)—If every member of every church would get one person every year to confess Christ the world would be evangelized in five years, is the declaration of Rev. Dr. James W. Brougher, president of the Northern Baptist Convention, in session here.

Dr. Brougher explained that he felt it his duty to stimulate as many as possible outside of his own church at Oakland, Cal., with a new desire to carry on personal evangelism. This was done in his church, he said, by a club of five hundred members, who pledge themselves to get at least one person to join the church within one year.

Chase City, Va., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Two children were burned to death today by fire that destroyed a pool room, barber shop and the apartment over those places. Property damage was estimated at \$5,000.

ANTI-IMMORALITY BILLS BRING HOT DEBATE IN HOUSE

First Intimation of Fight Over Smoky Mountain National Park Also Brought Forth

Raleigh, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Big guns boomed in the House today in debate over Representative Oscar Haywood's anti-immorality bill and the first intimation of a fight over the proposed state appropriation for a national park in the Great Smoky region. Debate touching the boiling point raged over the Haywood bill for half an hour of the two hours session after it had been reported unfavorably by the House committee. The Montgomery "Purity Crusade" openly accused the committee of giving him a "raw deal" in refusing to hear him and demanded that it be referred.

Representative Grant, of Davie, minority leader, moved that the motion be tabled and it was carried, but later recalled and referred after several members had expressed themselves as opposed to the bill but not in favor of the minister carrying the impression that he was not treated fairly.

The bill would prohibit the sale of alleged immoral devices and provides a penalty of not less than a year in state prison for violation. The forestry issue was brought in the vote on the joint Senate resolution that would invite Congressman J. W. Temple, of the Southern Appalachian Park Committee, to address the Assembly in joint session. The resolution was presented by Henry Nettie Buncombe.

Judge Winston, Bertie, argued against it and moved that it be referred to the committee instead of on immediate passage by subscription to rules. His motion was voted down as was an amendment offered later that would eliminate the joint session and make the invitation to "address members of the Assembly and the general public."

While the Senate and House ground out for the most part legislation, committees meeting almost simultaneously were making definite reports. Judiciary Committee number two of the Senate devoted to favorably report the bill which would change the beginning of the auto license year from the present July 1 to January 1, so as to run with the calendar year. The matter will come up for consideration Friday under endorsement of the Auto License Bureau which informs the committee that North Carolina was one of the few states in the Union whose license year began and ended in midsummer.

Twenty-seven bills were reported from committees. Five were marked unfavorable, among them the Townsend proposal to stop requiring banks to publish the amount of state bonds on deposit.

ILLINOIS CATHOLICS GET NEW CATHEDRAL

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 27.—(INS)—Catholics of Central Illinois are to have a new cathedral in which to worship. A magnificent new cathedral of the Immaculate Conception is to be erected at the earliest possible moment. The new edifice will form the center of an imposing group of buildings, a parochial school, convent and cathedral house.

The new edifice will cost \$750,000 and more than \$1,000,000 have been expended before the entire group is completed.

The entire diocese is eager for the opening of the drive to raise the necessary funds, set for February 14. The campaign will close February 26.

Actual construction work will get under way by the earliest possible moment. Bishop James A. Griffin is throwing all of his strength into the campaign to make it a success.

The new cathedral is a basilican church, 87 feet wide and 150 feet deep, seating a congregation of about 1,100.

Plans for the structure were drawn by Joseph W. McCarthy, designer of numerous churches.

AMERICA READY NEGOTIATE NEW CHINESE TREATY

Existing Pacts Cannot be Abrogated Until New Treaties Formed Declares Kellogg

Washington, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Assurances that the Washington government is ready to enter into treaty revision negotiations with both the Cantonese and northern factions in the present civil war were given at the State Department today in amplification of the formal statement of the American attitude toward China, published last night by Secretary Kellogg.

The United States today was on record as having notified all Chinese factions and the powers signatory to the Washington Conference treaty that if proper delegates can be agreed upon by the warring country, it stands ready to transact a new tariff and extraterritorial treaty with China.

However, until new treaties are negotiated with China and ratified by the United States Senate, existing pacts cannot be abrogated. These are the main points in Secretary Kellogg's Chinese policy declarations made public.

Find New Use For Metal Found In Parts This State

Raleigh, Jan. 27.—(AP)—And now the state department of conservation and development puts zircon to the fore.

State Geologist H. J. Bryson today expressed belief that science had developed some new use for the zirconium silicate which he put.

Zircon, he said, was formerly used in the manufacture of incandescent lights, but with the substitution of other materials its commercial production was suspended.

His records show the last recorded production of the mineral was in 1911 near Zirconia, known as Tuxedo, in Henderson county. It occurs near Mars Hill, Madison county, also, and near Sterling, Iredell county.

The department of conservation and development, in a statement made public today, announced bright prospects have appeared for the resumption of the production of zircon, a metal which has not been worked in North Carolina for a number of years.

AMERICAN LEGION ENDORSES ACTION OF CONG. WARREN

Pass Resolution Commending Congressman Warren for Vote on the Navy Bill

At a recent meeting of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion the post endorsed the action of Congressman Lindsay Warren in voting for additional cruisers for the navy and a committee was appointed to draw resolutions to this effect.

The resolution setting forth the post's action is as follows: "Whereas, it is the sense of this post that our country should at all times be amply and adequately protected from foreign enemies; and Whereas, this post realizes that should war come from foreign aggression, the protection of our lives and liberties would depend primarily upon our standing army and upon our navy;

"And Whereas during the present session of the Congress of the United States, our wise and efficient Representative, Hon. Lindsay Warren, voted in favor of increasing the strength of our navy by adding additional cruisers thereto;

"Now, Therefore, we, the Pitt County Post of the American Legion, desire to commend our Representative for his stand upon this question, and to urge him at all times to use his influence and his vote to secure the maintenance of an army and navy sufficient and ample for the duties imposed upon them."

BRITISH AWAITING DEVELOPMENTS SHANGHAI TODAY

London, Jan. 27.—(AP)—For the next six weeks British officials will focus their attention on Shanghai for on developments depends whether the British defence force of about 20,000 men being mobilized today, will be brought into actual service.

A race is on for the pivotal city between British land and sea forces and the Chinese of the Southern or Cantonese army. Should the Cantonese get near enough to the great international settlement to cause a situation in any way threatening the life and property of the foreigners, then the British forces in company with available Japanese, French and American troops will take a stand. The troops probably will be spread along a 21 mile line so as to completely cut off Shanghai from the interior.

On Monday night, to amuse a typical prize ring assemblage, a boy of 17, Leo Mahan, amateur and inexperienced, fought and was knocked unconscious. Yesterday he died, a blow in the stomach did it.

If you ask why a country forbidding assault and battery on the street, permits that brutality in the prize ring, the answer is that prize fighting is profitable, politicians get part of the profits, and make laws accordingly.

At Treves in France, archologists have unearthed a temple built by the ancient Gauls, fearing "only that the sky will fall upon us," as they said to Alexander. They erected it to the Persian God, Mithras, once powerful deity of light and the sun, with followers far outnumbering those of Jehovah.

No false God, Mithras or any other, could survive without permission of the real God, of course. But at one time it looked as if Mithras seated in his hill with the morning and evening stars beside him, would rule all Europe.

Fortunately St. Paul could make no headway with Christianity in Asia, so he came to Europe to do his work, and wiping out Mithraism, was part of it.

Mithras, the Great God of Night, "friend of man," is as dead now as the brave old Gauls that built his temple, or the bull upon which he sat, plunging his knife into it.

No low descending sun ever finds Mussolini winding up an idle day. Among other things, the Italian dictator is Italy's air minister. Our "take it easy" government will please note that Mussolini expects by spring, to have a gigantic air fleet, powerful enough to paralyze an enemy that should start a war.

No victory can be won by soldiers on the ground. But if war should start, and a hundred airplanes dropping TNT were immediately dispatched to destroy big cities in an enemy country, though it had 1,000,000 armed men that country might be begging for peace before nightfall.

Those responsible for the welfare and safety of American cities please think it over.

If North and South America cannot set before the rest of the world an example of peace and common sense, something is wrong with North or South America. This year the Latin republic will spend \$100,000,000 developing railroads, and most of the money will be borrowed in the United States. Chile is negotiating a \$40,000,000 loan in New York to electrify the Chilean State Railway. Apparently these South American republics have public officials sufficiently honest and competent to manage state railways.

The financing of desirable industrial enterprises in South America by United States banks is a useful investment for American money. Better than lending money to Europe to keep up fighting equipment.

Swedish engineers and financiers undertake to build Turkish railroads for Kemal Pasha and exploit Turkey's forests and coal fields.

The Swedish syndicate "will probably turn to New York for a loan," that also will be money well lent. Building railroads and industry means fighting poverty and fighting poverty means fighting war.

One billion dollars will be spent on new golf courses and clubhouses this year, including the cost of the 1,000 new golf clubs starting and maintenance of old clubs. If the nation could build a thousand new flying machines, one for each new golf club, to protect the links and laced gentlemen playing on them, it would be a good thing.

OFFICERS AMONG THOSE ARRESTED IN WHISKEY RING

Sheriff and Deputies and Police Officers and Citizens Rounded up in Florida Town

Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Sheriff Carl C. Bryan, of Broward County, all of his five deputies, seven Fort Lauderdale policemen and a number of citizens were rounded up today in a series of arrests and raids conducted under direction of R. P. Tuttle, of Savannah prohibition administrator for this district.

Federal dry agents, who had been concentrated quietly in this vicinity for more than a week said the arrests were the result of a mammoth liquor conspiracy.

Most of the men are charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws and were arrested on warrants drawn on indictments returned at the December Federal Grand Jury at Jacksonville.

NORTHEAST HIT BY COLDEST WAVE OF THIS WINTER

Another Drop in Temperature in Eastern States Tonight or Tomorrow

The northeast today was in the grip of the most severe cold wave of the winter. Temperatures tumbled to zero and sub-zero marks in all state east of the Mississippi river, except in the extreme south. At Raleigh the temperature was as low as 15 degrees.

A further drop is forecast for late today or tomorrow. Records for the winter were shattered throughout New England, where unofficial instruments registered sub-zero marks to 20 below and Boston reported 5 below. In New York at twin bridges the temperature was 30 degrees below, the lowest mark on record, while in the city the temperature tumbled 28 degrees to 6 above zero in a day.

A report from the United States Weather Bureau at Raleigh said the cold wave extended throughout eastern and southeastern North Carolina.

EVANS-JOHNSON TRIAL BEGUN IN COURT HERE TODAY

Edward Evans and Francis Johnson Being Tried on Second Degree Murder Charge

After the examination of several witnesses the State rested in the Evans-Johnson case at 3:55 this afternoon.

Five witnesses for the state had testified in the trial of Edward Evans and Francis Johnson on a second degree murder charge at three o'clock this afternoon. The case against the two, Evans, a young man in his twentieth year, and Johnson, a mere lad in his early teens, was the outgrowth of an affray in which Leland and Wilfred Stancill, sons of Mr. T. J. Stancill, were shot to death.

The case came as the second on today's docket in Superior court under Judge E. H. Cramer. The first case disposed of today was that against Arthur Atkinson, negro, for the shooting of another negro. It was learned that the boy was under sixteen years of age, and the case was transferred to Juvenile court for disposition.

At yesterday's session of court Judge Cramer meted out three penitentiary sentences, the first of the week. Albert Johnson and William Humphrey were given 18 months each in state prison for robbery. Marion Bishop and Willie Harris were given three years each in state prison for robbery, and Marshall Williams and Ross McDowell were given two years each in prison for store breaking and robbery.

The case against Evans and Johnson was called shortly before ten o'clock and at 11:30 the jury had been completed and the first witness took the stand. Robert Stancill, brother of the two young men who were killed, who was an eye witness to the slaying, was the first witness.

Followed on the stand by T. J. Stancill, father of the victims, Mrs. Leland Stancill, widow of one of the slain men, Orylie Stancill, brother, and Raymond Briley. A large number of witnesses have been summoned in the case and it will be late tomorrow at the earliest, it is estimated, before all the evidence will be in and the case ready for arguments by counsel. The case will probably consume the remainder of the present term.

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Ohio Jails 100 Justices of Peace on Graft Charges

Cleveland, O., Jan. 27.—(INS)—A plethora of bootleggers, always agreeable to being "shaken down" for normal sums in order to operate without molestation, has resulted in more than 100 justices of the peace and their constables, being indicted by the federal or state juries during the past 60 days.

In Cuyahoga county (Cleveland) alone, 38 of these peace officers or their aides were indicted recently in a drive against corruption staged by United States District Attorney A. E. Bernstein. They were accused of having starved raids, pocketed the fines and then sold the evidence and equipment back to other bootleggers protected by the conspiracy.

Two of the ringleaders recently pleaded guilty and smiled when they were sentenced to less than two years. They are said to have amassed fortunes running into six figures.

Bernstein predicts that a February grand jury will indict at least a dozen more justices in this and surrounding counties.

Meanwhile bills are being considered by the general assembly at Columbus to curb the powers of justices of the peace. These acts would limit their activities considerably but, according to many legal authorities, would not remove the cause of temptation—the fee system.

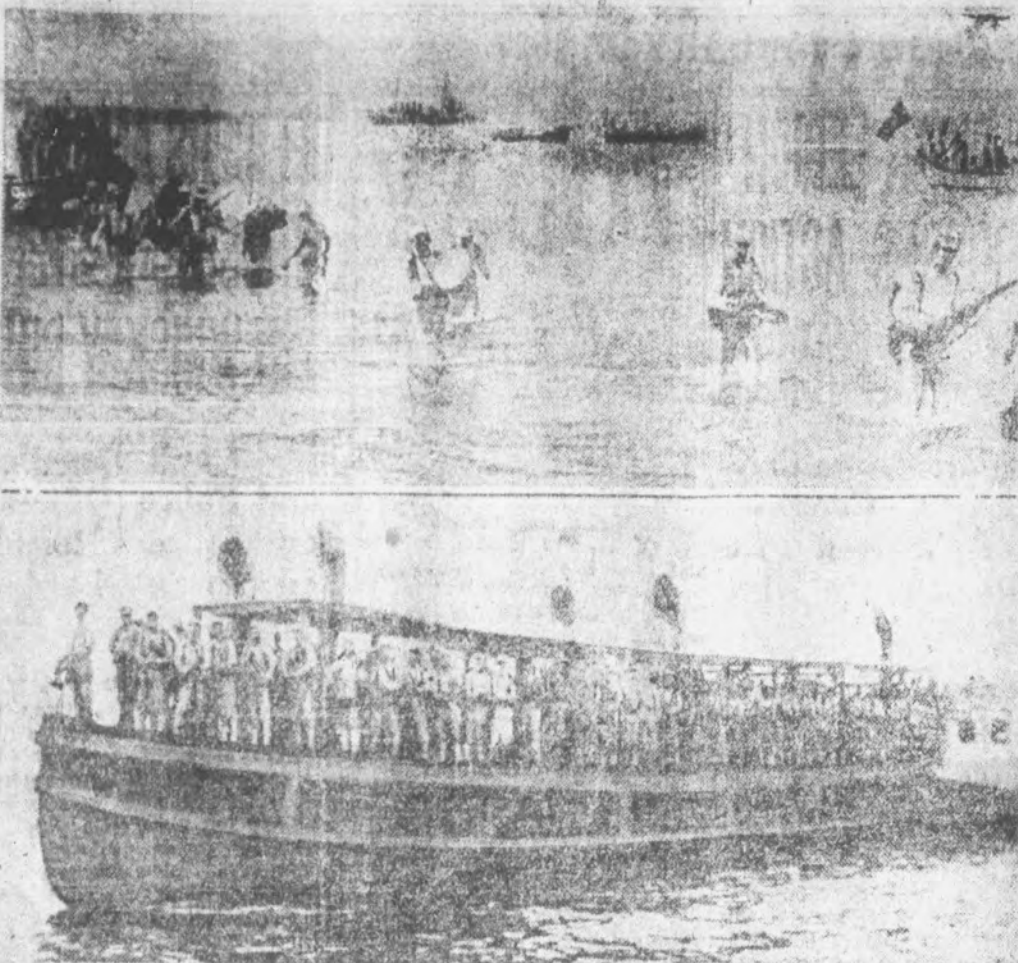
Judge Carl V. Weyandt, of Cleveland, recently declared that the custom of paying justice, jury and attorneys with fees, as is done in Ohio justices' courts, is one of the very foundations of justice. A prisoner, he declared, had not the slightest chance of acquittal.

Armed with this authority, it was simple for the corrupt justices to sit at their telephones, inform bootleggers to "come in or be dragged in," and then stage a trial which was a mockery, the fee being pocketed. No records were made of the cases. It was at this juncture that the federal government stepped in and took a hand.

Hartford, Conn., Jan. 27.—(INS)—Connecticut's motor vehicle department found itself possessed of \$3,924.89 in bad checks when the rush for auto licenses cleared up early this year. As a result of this situation the state's income was increased by upward of \$1,000. A state law makes a charge of five dollars extra upon the person issuing the check, the law having been passed when the check situation was first discovered. The person issuing the check to pay for his license is ordered to produce a certified check, money order, or cash within eight days if the check is bad. According to department officials they all come across even with the five-dollar bonus, and the protest fee for the bank, likewise.

Down in Fairfield County, Charles F. Evans has set a new record by his thirty-eighth consecutive annual election as librarian of the county's law library. Mr. Evans was first elected in 1888 and has had no opposition. He presides over some 17,000 law books adequately housed in Bridgeport's county building where lawyers find all sorts of material for use in preparing their cases.

Trinity College, Hartford's leading educational institution is receiving much attention from the public on Tuesday evenings as various of her professors hold radio debates. Science and politics are the chief topics of discussion. The debates are held in the Travelers Insurance Co. laboratories here and sent out over WTIC now the chief station in Connecticut. From the suburban town of Manchester a copy of the Centennial history is going to Manchester, England, with the assurance of our friendship and goodwill, according to the volume's history. E. L. G. Hohenthal, secretary of the International Reform Federation, is carrying the volume. After he delivers the gift Mr. Hohenthal is to lecture throughout Europe on prohibition. Mr. Hohenthal is slated to speak in Italy, Austria, Hungary, Germany, Switzerland and Czechoslovakia before starting home late in April.

Paris, Jan. 26.—(INS)—Parisians will soon know what a police alarm box looks like. NEW KIND OF STEEL
TESTED IN GERMANY

Washington, Jan. 26.—(INS)—Tests have just been completed at the Bureau of Standards, Department of Commerce, of specimens of a structural steel being introduced in Germany which is arousing considerable interest among German engineers.

The tests disclose a yield point higher than that of ordinary structural steel, somewhat higher than that of high carbon steel and nearly equal to that of the usual structural nickel steel. The ductility and toughness are said to be as good as in nickel steel and markedly better than in high carbon, though not as high as in ordinary structural steel.

The combination of high yield point and ductility is obtained by using a low carbon and high silicon content. The German process is declared not to be new, however.

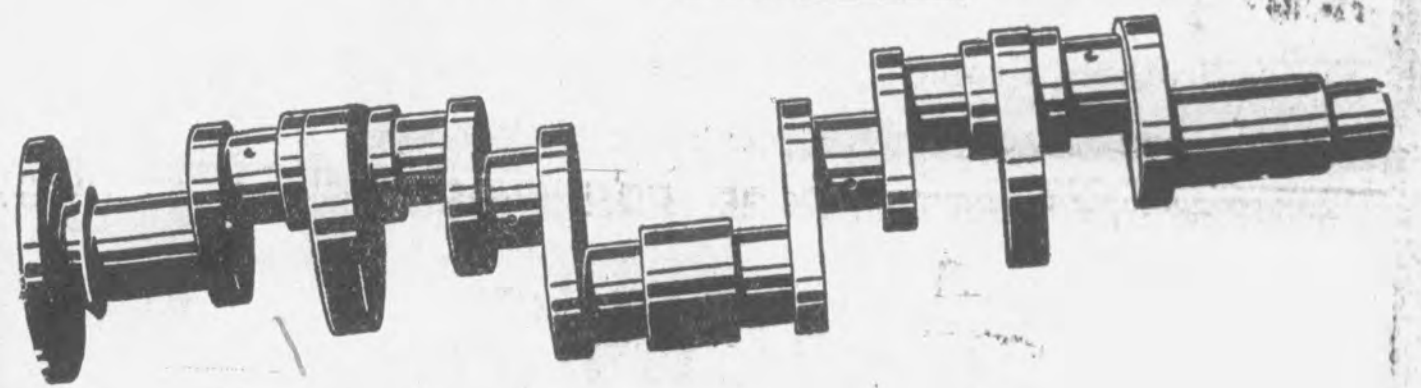

Independent Farmer Doomed to 'Pass Out'

Washington, Jan. 27.—(INS)—The independent, successful farmer is doomed to pass out of importance in America's political and economic life unless a radical change is brought about, according to Rep. Charles J. Thompson, of Ohio, a member of the house agriculture committee which is conducting the farm relief fight in the lower house of Congress.

"Farming is rapidly becoming industrialized under the present system," said Thompson. "Farms are rapidly passing out of the hands of families that have been farmers for generations, and are being acquired by non-resident owners."

"If this is continued the independent farmer will be wiped out and the country will lose a vital force which has exercised wide influence in shaping the course of the nation."

"There is now one producer to every two consumers in the country, and this what makes difficult."

the enactment of legislation designed to bring about a change in the farm situation. "Many residents of large cities feel that if anything is done for the farmer it will cost them money," he said. "The matter of farm relief was presented to Tammany Hall. The leaders of this New York political organization said, 'Yes the scheme is all right. There should be legislation, but we cannot afford to support it because we are consumers.'"

Thompson believes, however, that there is better prospect of the McNary Haugen bill at this session of Congress than ever before. The measure, he said, had been stripped of the embargo provision, no government subsidy is being sought and the government would not be put into business by it.

Asheville, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Predictions that the construction industry will be in the throes of an extensive disorder within five years unless existing conditions are corrected were made today by leading builders who are attending the annual meeting of the Associated General Contractors of America.

The industry is flooded with incapable and irresponsible bidders of the fly-by-night type, speakers and reports submitted to the meeting declared.

Unless definite steps soon are taken by all elements of the industry to prevent incompetent bidders from entering upon construction operations in increasing numbers, a disordered condition that will prove costly to the building public is the only prospect, declared General R. C. Marshall, Jr., general manager of the association.

A committee report submitted to today's meeting declared promiscuous issuance of surety bonds and misuse of the law provisions to be mainly responsible for the cited condition.

Without the assistance of underwriters, who make it possible for the incompetent and the plain crook to qualify for contracts which they cannot possibly perform, those irresponsible who constantly bring discredit upon contracting would disappear from public construction, the report said.

It is common experience that irresponsible bidders without making a semblance of a credit investigation, knowing that the average homeowner is not familiar with lien law provisions and cannot protect himself against dual payment if the intervening purchaser fails to pay, the report continued.

More than 500 builders from all over the country were attending the sessions.

Engineers Meet Raleigh Tomorrow

Raleigh, Jan. 27.—(AP)—The meeting of state professional engineers beginning here tomorrow caused veteran engineers to recall that the profession as it is now constituted dates back only about one hundred years.

A hundred years ago, it was recalled, there were no skyscrapers, subways, electric appliances, and virtually no railroads. Power machinery was in its infancy and engineers were unknown.

The invention of the locomotive brought forth demand for many new things—strong bridges of great length, steel roadways and a general knowledge of the principles of machinery and of the strength of materials.

As a result a specialized individual sprang up, the civil engineer. The mechanical engineer followed, and soon the electrical specialist. Today these men have altered almost our way of living.

They have built huge cities and made possible their continuance in a healthy and efficient manner through modern means of sanitation, transportation and communication, it was pointed out.

The convention will last through Saturday, and takes the place of the numerous small gatherings of engineers usually held during January and February. It is expected to bring together more engineers than any other meeting since the first engineers' organization was formed in the State in 1916.

Governor McLean, Max Gardner, Shelby, and Mayor E. B. Culbreth, Raleigh, are on the program.
