PRESIDENT DELIVERS ADDRESS TO CONGRESS ON GEORGE WASHINGTON

Chief Executive Today Set in Motion Movement for Celebration of Washington's 200th Birthday in 1932

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Setting in motion today the movement for a great celebration of George Washington's 200th anniversary in 1932, President Coolidge in an address to Congress described the first of the nation's leaders as a man who had a very high standard of public and private honor and as one whose record as a practical business man had never received the attention to which it was entitled.

The President's address to a joint session of the Senate and House was arranged to put into practical operation the plans for the 1932 celebration, and through a nationwide hookup of radio broadcasting stations millions of persons throughout the nation heard the extolling of Washington as a self made man and as a man of affairs.

"He was an idealist in the sense that he had a very high standard of private and public honor," Mr. Coolidge said. "He was a prophet to the extent of being able to forecast with remarkable vision the growth of the nation he founded and the changing conditions which it would meet. But essentially he was a very practical man. He analyzed the problems before him with a clear intellect. Having a thorough understanding he attacked them with courage and energy, with patience and persistence."

Declaring the facts of Washington's life, though a matter of record, were not easily accessible, the President said that many books written about him, "often scholarly and eloquent," had encountered the temptation to treat him as an heroic figure composed of superlatives and that the real man among men, the human being subjected to the trials and temptations common to all mortals has been too much obscured and forgotten.

"When we regard him in this character," Mr. Coolidge continued, "and have revealed to us the judgment with which he met his problems, we shall all the more understand and revere his true greatness. No great mystery surrounds him; he never relied on miracles. But he was a man endowed with what has been called uncommon common sense, with a tireless industry, with a talent for taking infinite pains, and with a mind able to understand the universal and eternal problems of mankind."

The President described Washington as a man who had a "national mind."

"He was consistently warning his countrymen of the danger of settling problems in accordance with sectional interests," Mr. Coolidge said. "His ideas in regard to the opening of our Western territory were thought out primarily for the benefit of the nation. It has been said that he would have been the greatest man in America had there been no revolutionary war."

It was with clear vision that the first President looked upon religion, Mr. Coolidge continued, because for him there was little in it of dogmatism.

"He placed it on a firmer, more secure foundation, and stated the benefits which would accrue to his country as the result of faith in spiritual things," the President said. "He recognized that religion was the main support of free institutions. Without belief in God, without intolerance he appeals to the highest spiritual nature of mankind. His genius has filled the earth."

COOLIDGE SPEECH HEARD IN BERLIN

New York, Feb. 22.—President Coolidge's speech in Washington today was heard "clear and strong" in Berlin, said a cablegram received by the National Broadcasting Company this afternoon.

The speech was received by station HES in Berlin on the 27 meter short wave length from Schneetadt.

EXECUTIONS IN SHANGHAI AREA CONTINUE TODAY

Death Penalty Proclaimed for Strikers Who Refuse to Return to Work

Shanghai, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The executioners knife continued to swing through the ranks of strike agitators here today, although on a much smaller scale than on Saturday and Sunday when some 30 fomenters of the present industrial trouble were beheaded by Marshal Sun Chuan Fang's authorities in the effort to keep down the demonstration.

The beheadings have been effective in bringing strikers back to work although it also has greatly increased the activities of the agitators who now are directing their efforts from the international settlement. As long as they remain in the settlement they are furnished a degree of safety because police of the native city have no jurisdiction in the foreign colony and the practice of international settlement officials has been to surrender no person arrested there for political activities.

In spite of the improvement it was estimated there were some 100,000 still on strike. With partial resumption of the postal services, all international settlement bus service and with nearly all trains running, however, the situation was a little brighter despite the fact that local shipping remained tied up.

Li Pao-Ching, Marshal Sun's defense commissioner for Shanghai, issued a proclamation which was posted in the main postoffice declaring that any employees not returning to work would be executed. This ended all picketing at the postoffice and brought many postal employees back to work.

It is noteworthy that there still is no sign of anti-foreign strike feeling, although increased anti-British agitation was reported on the Yangtze River. At Ichang Chinese pilots were being intimidated and American ships were threatened for carrying British passengers, while at Changsha the labor unions threatened to condemn to death all Chinese remaining in British employ and all those supply necessities to the British.

JUDGE GRADY QUILTS AS STATE HEAD OF THE KU KLUX KLAN

Declares Actions of National Organization for From Principles of Membership Oath

Raleigh, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Breaking with Hiram W. Evans, Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan because of attempted coercion to secure by subterfuge the passage of what he regards as iniquitous legislation in the North Carolina General Assembly, Judge Henry A. Grady, for four years Grand Dragon for North Carolina resigned yesterday from the Klan.

Following upon the heels of the resignation of the Grand Dragon came the practical dissolution of the entire organization within the State when 66 of the 86 total organizations of the order surrendered their charters, leaving only twenty in the State which have not yet followed the lead of their Grand Dragon in renouncing the order and denouncing the Imperial Wizard.

The Raleigh Klan is among the number surrendering their charters.

Under the legislation which the Imperial Wizard undertook to dictate, and which brought bitter denunciation from Judge Grady, membership in the Catholic church or in the Knights of Columbus would become a felony, and marriages between members of the Catholic church and members of the Protestant churches would be forbidden, when attended by any agreement as to the rearing of children.

Calling attention to the fact that "strategy would indicate" that one of the measures should not be known as a Klan bill, one of the demands upon Judge Grady was that "the bill be introduced in the Legislature by some man who is active in the American Legion."

Negotiations between the Imperial Wizard and Judge Grady have been in progress since January 3rd, 1927, when four pieces of proposed legislation were transmitted to the latter with suggestions concerning the manner of securing their passage without involving the Ku Klux Klan as the responsible agent for them.

The fourth measure prohibited marriage between blacks and whites.

Judge Grady replied immediately declining to sponsor such legislation on the ground that it was a direct blow at the freedom of religion, opposed to the principles of the order, declaring that "as we pretend to be in favor of religious liberty, freedom of thought and the freedom of the press, we are putting ourselves in direct opposition to our declared principles."

In another letter written a few days later, Judge Grady declared that "your Imperial Kliff asserted that the policy of the National organization was to conceal the authorship of some of the bill to which I have referred. I want to say to you that you cannot expect me or any other decent, honorable man in North Carolina to attempt to screen anything. Such bills cannot be introduced in our Legislature as Klan measures."

This letter precipitated an open break between the Imperial Wizard and Judge Grady. Agents of Evans came to North Carolina to endeavor to persuade Judge Grady to change his attitude, and failing, they brought word again that he was out of harmony with the National organization and should be replaced. Exchanges of letters between the National and State heads became more pointed, culminating yesterday with a bitter denunciation of the Imperial Wizard, coupled with Judge Grady's resignation.

"It is a far cry from this obligation (the Klan oath) which you and all other Klansmen have taken," concluded Judge Grady, "to the silly, unseemly and unconstitutional measures which you and your advisors are attempting to foist upon the people of a liberty loving State. I cannot follow you in the fundamental principles of the Ku Klux Klan with all my heart, but I have lost faith in you and your 'Imperial Family.'"

DR. G. W. McDaniel HOLDING REVIVAL AT BAPTIST CHURCH

Head Southern Baptist Convention Conducting Revival in Memorial Church Here

The revival services which are in progress in the Memorial Baptist church are being largely attended and the sermons are proving both helpful and inspiring. On Sunday, the opening day, Rev. H. Frederick Jones, pastor of the church, devoted two powerful sermons, taking for his subjects: "City With a Soul," and "The First Great Christian Revival."

Dr. George W. McDaniel, pastor of the First Baptist church, Richmond, Va., who will conduct the services for the next ten days arrived yesterday, and on last evening delighted his large audience with a splendid sermon, taking for his text, "Blessed is he that readeth, and they that hear the words of this prophecy," Rev. 13. Dr. McDaniel called attention to the fact that this was the only verse in the Bible that pronounced both a blessing on the reader and the hearer of the Word.

The song services are in charge of Mr. Alwyn Howell, assistant pastor of the Melrose Baptist church, Roanoke, Va., who has a splendid voice and is a fine director of music. The song services promise to be an attractive feature of the revival.

In developing his sermon, Dr. McDaniel gave the characteristics of a good reader and a good hearer. The characteristics of the reader being "distinctness," "interpretation," "giving the whole counsel of God without adding or subtracting," those of the hearer being "attention," "appreciation," "meditation," and "obedience."

The speaker spoke of the seriousness of adding to or taking from that which is in God's book. He not only dwelt on his text but read several other passages from various chapters in the Bible in making his thoughts far reaching and effective. Although his sermon was deep and interesting, Dr. McDaniel, who has the gift of humor, added just enough wit to make his sermon easily understood by the children.

Dr. McDaniel needs no introduction to a North Carolina audience. He is one of the South's greatest preachers and speakers, and is the presiding officer of the world's largest religious gathering, being president of the Southern Baptist Convention. He is universally beloved and the people of Greenville have a treat in store for them this week.

Services will be held each evening this week, with the song services beginning at 7:30 o'clock. The public is cordially invited to attend.

GREENVILLE CLUB OBSERVES 22ND ROTARY BIRTHDAY

Program Last Night Featured by Observance of Washington and Rotary Birthdays

Observance of the birthdays of George Washington and Rotary, election of delegates to the 57th Rotary Conference at Wilmington next month, and completion of plans for the inter-city Rotary meet to be held here on the night of March 7, featured the program of last night's regular meeting of the Greenville Rotary Club.

Called to order by the president W. H. Dail, the members enjoyed the evening meal, after which came the business matters followed by an interesting program. Under the head of business, W. H. Dail and James T. Little were elected as delegates to the Wilmington Conference, while J. E. Winslow and S. T. White were chosen alternates. It was made known that quite a number of the members have made reservations for the conference and it is expected that Greenville will have a large percentage of its membership present.

Next on the evening's program was L. A. Stroud, who delivered one of the series of talks by the members on the subject: "Who and What I Am." His talk was very interesting and gave those present an insight into his early life before coming to this city to make his home.

In observance of Rotary's 22nd birthday which is tomorrow, J. B. Kittrell made a short talk on Rotary and told of its beginning; its rapid growth and what it is doing throughout the world. He pointed out that from an organization of four members in 1905, Rotary today was in effect in 38 nations of the world and that its membership was more than 125,000.

J. H. Rose made a short talk on the life and ideals of George Washington, and his talk was followed by a few remarks by F. C. Harding who told of instances in connection with George Washington's visit to this town and county. Mr. Harding declared that time prevented his handling his subject but briefly and he promised at a later date to talk again on Washington.

J. H. Rose announced that the county school commencement and field day would be held Monday, March 28, and urged all the Rotarians to be on hand and lend their assistance toward making the event a success.

URGES FOLLOWING OF PRECEDENT SET BY WASHINGTON

Resolution Would Affirm First President's Policy of Retirement After Two Years

Washington, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Washington's birthday anniversary was made the occasion today for the introduction by Senator LaFollette, Republican, Wisconsin, of a resolution approving the first President's policy of retirement, after two terms.

The resolution which went over under the rules declares that "any departure from this time honored custom would be unwise, unpatriotic and fraught with peril to our free institutions."

The measure was offered by the Republican insurgent leader immediately at the conclusion of the reading to the Senate of Washington's farewell address by Senator George, Democrat, Georgia, and is similar to a move made in the House to put Congress on record against President Coolidge as a Republican candidate in 1928. Its text follows:

"Resolved: That it is the sense of the Senate, the President established by Washington and other Presidents of the United States in retiring from the Presidential office after their second term, has become, by universal concurrence, a part of our Republican system of government, and that any departure from this time honored custom would be unwise, unpatriotic and fraught with peril to our free institutions."

Release Cooper From Federal Prison Friday

Atlanta, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Thomas E. Cooper, former Wilmington, N. C., banker, will be released Friday from the federal penitentiary here where he has been serving a three year sentence for violation of the national banking act and turned over to Wilmington officers who want him on a state charge.

Warden John W. Snook of the federal prison, said today that he had received telegraphic notice from Washington that Cooper's sentence had been commuted by the President to the time served. Cooper was received at the prison February 20, 1925, and his sentence would have expired June 7 with the usual allowance of time off.

It is understood that the former banker, who is 43 years old, is wanted on a state charge growing out of the same case in which he received the federal sentence.

The Cry "Bolshevism" And Breed "Bolshevism" Beware of Just Discontent Its Power Is Great.

This is written in Chicago. Out the Blackstone Hotel window, two lines of motors rush north and south, on new roads, built on new land, borrowed from Lake Michigan.

Our people are forever going and coming, in their 22,000,000 automobiles, and will get where they want to be at last. But it's a long journey.

Coming here from New York, on your Broadway Limited, or Century, you find "heavy" business men worrying considerably about the thoughts of other men. They suspect that others are thinking along "Bolshevism" or "Communist" lines, and, needless to say, all the heavy ones feel that the other men HAVE NO RIGHT to do their own thinking. This is a democracy, of course, and all that. But there should be some energetic way of "dealing with discontent."

There is a way: ELIMINATE THE CAUSES OF DISCONTENT OR THE MOST IMPORTANT AT LEAST.

On the fast train, alert, keen and young, rides Allen Bennett Forsberg, professor of industrial relations at the University of Michigan, in the city of Lansing.

When not lecturing to students he studies industries and workers, co-operating with factory management and workers' organizations. And he tells you that in the highly prosperous automobile industry, the tens of thousands of workers in Lansing are idle, 55 days out of 100. And as in Lansing, so in other cities.

Idleness, and absence of beer combined, stimulate thinking. Uncertainty in employment breeds bitter discontent. Values of motor stocks soar, dividends increase, huge fortunes are made, and the men who provide all the work and a large part of the buying market are idle, worried and angry, 55 days out of 100. That is what produces "Bolshevism" and "heavy" men should think it over.

Industry thinks only of its competitors, of the buying public, and of salesmanship. Little or not at all about the millions of workers upon whose prosperity and peace of mind, all prosperity and stability, (Continued on page four)

Little Observance of 195th Birthday George Washington

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Washington's Birthday went unobserved by the State Capital today save for inability to get a check cashed.

"We cannot tell a lie," chanted fair State employees kept at their tasks by Salary and Wage Commission edict, "we don't want to work, but have to."

Otto Wood, at State's prison, displayed truthfulness and frankness in enunciation of the nation's first citizen.

"I'm not glad to be back. I wouldn't have come back if they hadn't made me," he answered inquiries as to his health.

Schools observed the anniversary with a brief story period. The young folks in the lower grades heard the legend of the cherry tree, gauging eighth graders intimated that it didn't happen that way and high school seniors got the whole Rupert Hughes low down.

Legislature was at work. The House discussed fish in the morning hour and stored up "gim me" oratory for the coming debates on appropriations.

The Senate dealt in divers subjects in utter disregard for the natal day of the master of Mount Vernon.

Wreaths and flags before patriotic homes and hatchets in shop windows bobbed up occasionally to remind citizens of the day, but the banks alone observe it as a full-fledged holiday.

Measure Introduced Today Would Prohibit Wearing of Masks by Members of Any Secret Organizations

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 22.—(AP)—A bill that would forbid the wearing of masks in public by members of secret orders was introduced in the North Carolina Legislature here today. Coming coincidentally with the resignation of Judge Henry A. Grady as Grand Dragon of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is the State measure created unusual interest and was greeted with applause by members of the House.

The measure was introduced in the House by Rep. Oscar Haywood of Montgomery, one-time lecturer for the Ku Klux Klan and in the Senate by Senator Rivers Johnson of Duplin County. A similar measure was defeated at the season t woyears ago, Senator Johnson being one of the bitterest opponents of the measure.

The House although applauding the introduction refused to put the bill on the calendar, sending it to the judiciary committee No. 2. The Senate made it a special order for tomorrow.

While the bills Dr. Haywood and Senator Johnson introduced did not mention expressly the Ku Klux Klan, Dr. Haywood said, in interview, text of his bill clearly revealed its intent. The bill provides for return of property to society members following dissolution in the State.

Senator Johnson in the last session two years ago was one of the fighters against the defeated bill similar to the one he sponsored today.

The anti-masking measure, it is said, reads:

"A bill to prevent establishment, organization or operation in North Carolina of any secret, oath bound society, association or corporation whose membership is concealed, or whose laws, rules and regulations require such members to conceal their identity behind hoods, masks, or otherwise."

The bill contains five sections, the first one makes it unlawful to mask outside of lodge rooms. The second section makes one so masked, guilty of a felony punishable by fine and imprisonment, and in case of grand larceny guilty of fine and punishment.

The third section provides that no corporation or association, or society covered in the bill may own property, money, fixtures, lands and the like, by virtue of a charter of a national or sovereign body, that in event of dissolution of the society in the State the property may be sold under resolution of its members and returned to the individual members in proportion to their contribution toward payment.

The fourth section repeals previous laws in conflict, and the fifth makes the proposed law effective immediately upon ratification following passage by both Houses.

The Senate beside passing the Bridge bill also finally passed into law the D. A. R. bill to place a tablet in the capitol rotunda of State signers of the Declaration of Independence and the bill requiring automobiles from all side roads to stop before entering main roads.

Final passage of the Great Smoky National Park and the Wilmington bridge bills and introduction of anti-masking and secret society dissolution in North Carolina bills stood out in the General Assembly's crowded procedure today.

Tonight the House decided to consider the revenue bill, the proposed 1927 law detailing raising of money for operation of State Departments and institutions the next two fiscal years beginning July 1. The Senate adjourned to tomorrow.

Formally Dedicate New Bridge Today

Hickory, N. C., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Several thousand persons were expected here at 2 o'clock this afternoon when the formal opening and dedication of the new Lenoir-Hickory bridge is held two miles east of this city.

Judge Wade H. Williams of the Charlotte Juvenile Court will make the main address from the center of the bridge which is the dividing line between Catawba and Caldwell Counties. Immediately after Mr. Williams' speech a member of the State Highway Commission will untie a silken rope that separates the two counties and the crowd will come together. The bridge is 800 long and was erected at an approximate cost of \$125,000. It carries a 20 foot roadway.

FROM UNDER COVER
 Rev. Oscar Hayward, whose "anti-immorality" measures in the legislature met with no success, has today introduced a measure that it is hoped will be given serious consideration by the lawmakers. This time the Montgomery minister seeks to forbid masks in public by members of any secret order. The use of masks by secret orders is opening the way for criminals and sneaks to perform all manner of evil under the protection of the mask and turn the blame to the organization who employ masks as a part of their paraphernalia. The time has come in North Carolina that there is no need for secret hooded orders to enforce the law, and it is time that law-abiding citizens insist that secret organizations come from under cover. The order that stands for right and justice has nothing of which to be ashamed and there is no need for its members to cover their faces when they come out in the public. Law-abiding citizens who desire strict law enforcement through the state can obtain same by coming out into the open and insisting that officers of the law do their duties.

We reiterate there is no need for masked enforcement of the law in our state and the wearing of any kind of mask in public should be banned by the laws of our state. From time immemorial the mask has been the instrument behind which the criminal has hidden his identity and only by placing a ban on the mask can we hope to bring these perpetrators of crime to justice.

"FARM RELIEF" THAT WILL FAIL
 President Coolidge should veto the McNary-Haugen Farm Bill. The farmers are in need of relief and they deserve more sympathetic treatment than they have received at the hands of the present Administration, but they will not get what they need and what they have a right to expect if this bill becomes a law.

In three respects the McNary-Haugen bill is fundamentally objectionable: (1) it vests a single economic class with government functions; (2) it is clearly unconstitutional in two important features; and (3) it will ultimately defeat its own purpose by restricting marketing without restricting production.

The general administration of the McNary-Haugen

plan is vested in a Federal Farm Relief Board. Nominally this board is appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate; but the President is limited in selecting its members to a list of nominees selected by farmers. Such a limitation of the President's appointive power is regarded by many as contrary to the Constitution. The Federal Farm Board is empowered to decide how much of certain agricultural products may be sold in the domestic market, and how much shall be withdrawn for export or storage. By thus restricting the domestic supply prices will be raised, but when the decision is made the general public will not be represented.

On the commodities stored or exported there will be certain costs or losses. These are to be made up by special tax, or "equalization fee," levied on the products which have benefitted from the price control. The amount of the tax and the mode of its collection are to be determined by the Farm Board. This delegation of taxing power is likewise believed to be unconstitutional.

In short, the bill provides a new unit of government, a government of farmers, by farmers and for farmers. And if the scheme begins to work as its advocates predict, and agricultural prices are raised to a highly profitable level, every farmer will be under such a strong inducement to increase his yield that the plan must eventually defeat its own purpose. It is in no sense a measure of real relief. — N. Y. World.

London, Feb. 22. — (INS) — Stormy weather took a heavy toll of ships during 1926.

The annual report of the Liverpool Underwriters' Association shows a total loss of 187 ships of all nations as against 174 in the previous year. Casualties to vessels of 500 tons and upwards totalled 77,578, as against 7,056. They included 2,043 collisions, 1,916 strandings, 593 fires and explosions, 1,159 cases of damage to machinery, and 332 ships damaged by stormy weather.

The worker ALSO DEMANDS STEADY, UNINTERRUPTED RETURN FOR HIS MECHANICAL SKILL, STRENGTH AND TIME. Stupid industry, short-sighted high finance refuses to the worker what it demands and gets for itself.

Why should not the worker, employed this week, be thrown out next week, plan to throw out one government and put in another. Big business thinks that when it demands a change in government that is quite correct. But for workers to demand a change is "Bolshevism" anarchy, in fact a shooting matter.

Leaving out the coldness of the financier and the bitterness of the worker, both ignorant outside of their own spheres, both incapable of looking farther ahead than tomorrow, why should not the general common sense of the country, solve the problem of irregular employment?

Each year so many millions of cars are made, so much is paid for them. Why must employment be spasmodic, depending on the im-

mediate buying outlook? That is the EASIEST way, of course. Slavery provided the easiest way of producing cotton and tobacco. But another way had to be found, when the civil war came.

Why wait for the intensifying of class bitterness to a dangerous extent, before finding ways to regulate industry and employment, and thus remove the JUST CAUSES of discontent. The man forced to worry, compelled to be idle, against his will, 55 days out of 100, is bitterly discontented and angry or he is a fool. Even high finance, with the average intelligence outside the counting room, of a 12 year old child, ought to realize that.

Henry Ford proposes a five-day week, that men may have two days to enjoy themselves and consume and spend what they earn. And there is another roar of "Bolshevism." Ford is called an enemy of his class, a dangerous lunatic, because he suggests that men take off, regularly, for pleasure and profit, twenty out of one hundred working days.

And he is denounced as an enemy of industry, by the very men whose haphazard system COMPELS their workers to lose 55 out of 100 working days, irregularly, unexpectedly, making the worker's life a hell of uncertainty.

Heavy business men, and high financiers, if you don't want Bolshevism, don't DESERVE it. You do deserve it now.

And don't forget that Russia is making experiments in which all though is for the workers' profit, just as in your system, all thought is for your own pockets.

One system may be as stupid as the other. Both the feet and the brain, the worker and the organizer need protection. Russia may find that her plan cannot work.

But if it SHOULD work, if it should be shown that Russia, gigantic in size, wealth and power CAN make her millions happy, and free of care, look out for the capitalist system here. Our kind of government, by organized finance is no more immortal or God-given than the old feudalism, tyranny, autocracy or monarchy.

Today's system makes men happier, safer, more prosperous, in the mass, then they have ever been before. Louis Fourteenth's workmen had no shoes, ate black bread no meat. Curs have radios, motors, phonographs, movies, eat beefsteak and canned peaches. But that is no enough. If those on top want to STAY on top they should read discontent among workers, as they dread salt water in their oil wells.

Coal Wage Parley Ends in Failure Reach Agreement

Unless negotiations are resumed elsewhere and an agreement reached before April 1, union miners automatically will cease labor in the central bituminous fields.
