DECLARES PEOPLE GREATEST ASSET ANY COMMUNITY

Dr. George W. McDaniel Delivers Another Strong Sermon at Memorial Baptist Revival

Declaring that the greatest asset of any city was neither the business enterprises, real estate nor beautiful homes, but the people who made it possible for these to exist, Dr. George W. McDaniel, pastor of the First Baptist church, Richmond, Va., who is now conducting a series of revival services in the Memorial Baptist church, made this statement most emphatic both as a prelude and conclusion to a strong sermon last evening. He based his thoughts on the text, "The Shadow of Peter," Acts 5:15.

Perhaps never in the history of the church has a stronger and more forceful sermon been delivered. The great truths which were so vividly portrayed were brought out in such a clear and concise manner as to bring great conviction and to cause those within hearing of the speaker's voice to take inventory of their past and present lives, and to make a firm determination to live better lives in the future. Dr. McDaniel declared that we only pass along this life's highway one time. There is no turning back. Today follows yesterday and then comes tomorrow. We are making our record, and some day, some time, as surely as God reigns, we will stand before the judgment bar and there before the Greatest of Judges, give an account of our lives.

"In so much that they brought forth the sick into the streets and laid them on beds and couches, that at least the shadow of Peter passing by might overshadow some of them." Every man exerts an influence, either for good or bad. The man who exerts an evil influence brings great trouble to a community, while the man who exerts a good influence is a blessing.

In developing his text, Dr. McDaniel brought to the attention of his hearers the two great facts that we can neither run from our shadow nor hide out our shadow. They follow us and either make for our good or our detriment. The speaker appealed to his audience to live such lives as not to be ashamed of them. When we stand before the Greatest of all Judges, and give a first account of our stewardship, we will be charged and required to give an account of our sins, both of commission and omission. Some people think because they do no great sin that they are living the right kind of lives, and never think of the great sins they are committing in omitting so many great things.

For his scripture lesson, Dr. McDaniel read an account of the rebuke of Peter when Ananias and Sapphira, his wife, for their hypocrisy, fell dead. The speaker stressed the fact that if people who lived today were meted the same punishment as these two people, the churches would indeed be wanting for members. He warned his hearers against telling falsehoods and trying to make themselves appear what they are not. Personality is greater than property and a good citizenship greater than all other assets of a community. The illustrations used by Dr. McDaniel to bring out his points, were well chosen and related in a clear concise manner.

Mr. Alwyn Howell, director of music, sang a solo, "The Beautiful Garden of Prayer." This evening's song services will be featured by a special number, an orchestra composed of fox hunters. The public is cordially invited. Services begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock.

Find Bodies in Hulk Burned Ship

New York, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Bodies have been found in the hulk of the burned British oil tanker, Black Sea, which is beached on Red Hook Flats in the harbor, off Brooklyn.

A wireless message from the tug Resolute, which is standing by the tanker, to police headquarters, today requested that a police launch be sent to the scene.

When the police launch arrived two bodies, presumably those of the seamen, were found on the port side of the tanker. The starboard side of the craft was still red hot as a result of yesterday's explosion off Bayonne, N. J., and firemen and policemen were unable to determine whether there were other bodies in the wreckage.

Great Britain Orders Cruiser To Nicaragua To Protect Subjects

Cruiser to be Place of Refuge for British Subjects Endangered by Civil War

London, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The British cruiser Colombo, attached to the West Indies station at Bermuda and commanded by Captain A. M. Lecky has been ordered to Nicaragua to protect British lives and interests there endangered by the civil warfare now going on.

Dispatch of the cruiser, it is understood, does not indicate a departure in the fundamental British policy in the Central America nor a change in the attitude toward the Monroe Doctrine.

Definite decision to send a cruiser came after the British Charge d'Affaires in Managua notified his government that the American minister could not guarantee to protect British lives and property in case of renewed street fighting.

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Believing the nationals in danger because of the absence of guarantees for their protection from the Nicaraguan and United States governments, Great Britain has decided, although reluctantly, to send a warship to the west coast of Nicaragua to stand by during the Liberal-Conservative warfare.

American and Nicaraguan government officials have been advised by the British Charge in the Nicaraguan capital that such action was contemplated.

The notice given Mr. Eberhardt and forwarded by him to the State Department last night, said the step was to be reluctantly taken in the absence of guarantees from the Nicaraguan and United States governments for the protection of lives and properties of British subjects in the event of further street fighting, incendiarism and pillage in the threatened districts of the Republic.

In view of the practical state of anarchy, Managua dispatches quoted the British Charge as saying, "President Diaz was asked on January 1 whether he could give guarantees for the protection of British lives and property and the replied that he could not, owing to the continued support extended to the Liberals by Mexico and without immediate material aid from the United States."

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The British Ambassador formally notified the State Department today that the British warship Colombo would arrive at Corinto, Nicaragua, February 26 for the "moral effect" its presence might have, but the under no circumstances would British naval forces be landed.

This Union Pacific "Gold Coast Limited," having climbed up 6,000 feet yesterday afternoon and evening, now is crossing from Wyoming into Utah, rolling over snow covered hills 7,000 feet high.

This is real American country, Colorado, Montana, Idaho, the Dakotas, Oregon, Washington, Nevada are your neighbors in this part of the world.

It looks what it is, a great and powerful country. Straight walls of stone, capped with pine trees, tower hundreds of feet above you.

Telephone and telegraph wires cross in all directions. Good automobile roads run beside the track. Below in the mountain valleys long strings of cattle, in single file move before the wind.

Worthy of the trip is the gigantic engine, the most powerful high speed locomotive in the world.

This engine called "Type 7,000" is more than ninety feet long, it can make one hundred miles an hour and weighs 580,000 pounds. Automatic stokers take the place of sweating firemen. Our course, an invisible mysterious electric current, weight nothing at all, will some day do the work of this big locomotive, which will take its place among curiosities of the past.

PASSENGER VESSEL RAMMED AND SUNK IN CHESAPEAKE BAY

Passengers and Crew of "City of Annapolis" Rescued Without Serious Injury

Baltimore, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Miss Esther Starkey of Almond's Wharf, Va., was missing this afternoon when a check was completed of the passenger list of the steamer City of Annapolis, rammed and sunk by the City of Richmond in Chesapeake Bay today.

Baltimore, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The returning to Baltimore today with Bay steamer, City of Richmond, was passengers and crew, 103 persons in all, of the steamer City of Annapolis, which the former craft rammed and sunk in a dense fog in Chesapeake Bay about 2 a. m. a mile off Smith's Point, Va. Wireless messages to the Chesapeake Steamship Company, owner of both vessels, stated that none of the rescued suffered dangerous injuries. The City of Richmond, with her bows stove in, passed Cove Point, Md., at 6:30 a. m. and was expected at Baltimore about noon.

There were 53 passengers, men, women and children aboard the Annapolis about half whom were said to be Baltimoreans. The City of Annapolis sailed from West Point, Va., last evening, the City of Richmond was bound from Baltimore to the same port, with about fifty passengers.

Captain Charles O. Brooks of the Bay steamer City of Baltimore, telephoned from Old Point to the Maritime Exchange here this forenoon that his ship arrived off Smith's Point just as the last survivor was being taken off the sinking vessel. He said:

"It was foggy, one of those dripping thick kind that shuts out everything. I can easily see how a collision might have occurred. When I saw there was nothing to do I kept on down the Bay."

The City of Annapolis lies in about sixty feet of water with her two smokestacks protruding above the surface.

The Chesapeake Steamship Company has sent a tug to convey the City of Richmond to port.

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 24.—(AP)—The Chesapeake Bay steamships City of Richmond and City of Annapolis were wedged so tight in their collision off Smith's Point early today that the passengers aboard the Annapolis were able to climb aboard its sister craft, Captain C. B. Brooks of the City of Baltimore, declared on arrival of his steamer here. Only one lifeboat was launched and that was sent out with a lantern after the Annapolis sank, to mark the spot where she went down.

Captain Brooks said the City of Baltimore was following the City of Richmond down the Bay and at one o'clock this morning he heard distress whistles ahead of him in the fog. Ten minutes later he declared the City of Baltimore came upon the Chesapeake Steamship Company's sister vessel wedged bow to bow. Scantly clad passengers were climbing from the City of Annapolis over the stove-in bows to the City of Richmond.

Both vessels were badly damaged and life boats of the City of Baltimore were swung out. Captain Brooks stood by for 30 minutes.

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SEE NO NECESSITY PROPOSED VISIT TO CENTRAL AMERICA

Kellogg Advises Borah Desired Information Available from State Department

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—After consulting with President Coolidge, Secretary Kellogg has written Chairman Borah indicating that the administration sees no necessity for the proposed visit to Mexico and Nicaragua by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The Secretary, who is ill at his home here, said the committee could obtain full information regarding the situation in those two countries from State Department officials who were directed to appear before the committee at its sessions today.

They are Stanley Morgan, chief of the Department's Latin-American Division, formerly American Charge in Nicaragua, and Williamson S. Howell, Jr., of the Mexican Division.

Secretary Kellogg's communication apparently did not cause Chairman Borah to change his mind as to the desirability of his committee going to Central America during the recess of Congress and he was prepared to press for action on his resolution.

Members Congress Have Busy Week Ahead Before Adjournment On March 4

Little Hope for Enactment of Major Legislation Before Session Dies Tomorrow Week

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Facing adjournment a week from tomorrow and with the filibuster term that practically killed Boulder Canyon dam legislation for the present session sprouting to other controversial measures, Congress entered today upon a program to clean up as many bills as it can but with little prospect of passing much additional major legislation.

Although the Swing-Johnson bill to dam the Colorado River at Boulder Canyon was due to come up again today in the Senate at 2 p. m. after its sponsors were blocked in their efforts to bring it to a vote by a three Senator filibuster during a 30 hour session, there appeared little prospect of action since Republican leaders had planned to displace it two hours later with the alien property return measure.

Once laid aside in the Senate, the bill will stand virtually no chance of a vote in either House at this session, since the House Steering Committee has decided that it will not be taken up in the House unless acted upon in the Senate.

Meanwhile under an agreement reached at another night session, the Senate had agreed to devote the first two hours today to consideration of other subjects, including the Tyson emergency officers retirement bill, while Republican leaders hoped to obtain an agreement to take up the administration's prohibition and customs reorganization measure.

Two hours have been set aside for consideration of Muscle Shoals legislation tomorrow.

The House, proceeding under a tentative program mapped out by its Steering Committee, gave right of way today to the naval appropriation bill conference report, including the controversial Senate amendment providing \$1,200,000 to begin work on three light cruisers, which the House already has rejected in modified form.

After disposing of this subject, it plans to take up the \$33,490,000 deficiency supply bill and the Hawley tariff amendment, approximately \$30,000,000 for various naval activities, including funds for improvements at five naval bases, modernization of the battle ships, and the purchase of a new battleship.

The schedule then calls for a consideration of a longshoremen's compensation bill, to be followed by the Boulder Canyon dam and the army emergency officers' retirement measure, provided the Senate, meanwhile, has approved them.

Senator Johnson, Republican California, who has led a vigorous fight for the Boulder Canyon bill, had practically abandoned his hope for a vote when the long Senate session was brought to a halt early last night on a motion of Senator Curtis, the Republican leader, for an executive session, 15 minutes before the time which previously had been fixed for a recess. After two and a half hours of recess, the Senate went back at 8 p. m. for its second successive night session, but considered only uncontested bills in accordance with a prior agreement.

Manila, Feb. 24.—(AP)—A disastrous fire swept the heart of the Manila business district today, causing a loss estimated at anywhere between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000. No loss of life was reported.

GENERAL STRIKE CHINESE WORKERS CALLED OFF TODAY

Shanghai, Feb. 24.—(AP)—A truce was declared in the conflict between Nationalist labor in Shanghai and the tottering regime of Marshal San Chuan Fung tonight.

Simultaneous proclamations sent scores of thousands workers back to their jobs and called off agitators to General Li Pao-chang, Shanghai defense commissioner, who beheaded 100 or more agitators during the five day walkout which involved more than 100,000 Chinese.

The strike began to peter out at once. Strikers thronged back to work, partly because of lack of funds and partly because of the atmosphere of terrorism which has hung over the native city and even penetrated the foreign settlements where the strike started.

Although nothing definite was obtainable to verify the report, it was learned that General Li's agents repressed the French concession and kidnapped at least 30 members of the Kuomintang (Nationalist Party) agitators who were holding a meeting there this evening. A few kidnappings also were reported from the International settlements but likewise could not be confirmed.

Those kidnapped were taken to General Li's headquarters and their fate is unknown.

CUT PRODUCTION IN OIL FIELDS

Tulsa, Okla., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Oil operators in the Seminoe area today unanimously agreed upon a 30-day shutdown plan to curtail production to within pipe line and tank storage capacity.

KILL AUSTRALIAN BALLOT MEASURE ASSEMBLY TODAY

Statewide Game Bill Passed. New Bill to Raise Pay of State Officers Presented

State Capitol, Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Virtual enactment into law of the State-wide game measure and a death dealing blow to the Australian ballot bill stood out in State legislative procedure today. Both Houses were bent on working day and tonight.

The House killed the Australian or secret ballot bill, 58 to 49, in successful motion to table, to which vote the "Cliche" motion was put, making it unparliamentary to henceforth move to pull it from committee.

Numerous proposed amendments flowed in to the chair in the midst of the debate, carried on from yesterday's discussion, including 27 proposals from members to exempt as many counties from the provision before the adverse vote closed debate.

Passage of the measure, which creates a State Game Commission and provides for uniformity of game regulation throughout the State, alone awaits a nominal stop ratification by House Speaker Fountain, to go into effect, linking North Carolina with many other States in the Union having such laws.

The bill 40 to 3 in favor of amendment. Lieutenant Governor Long, presiding, said it was first time in his many years' legislative experience he had had opportunity to see final passage of such a bill.

Final passage was also given the House game bill in a Senate vote 38 to 7, after the Senate had adopted an amendment which gives the bus companies a six-year franchise. Permitted width of the bus remains at 54 inches.

Second reading in the House, 40 to 7, of the 20 million dollars road bond bill, intact of amendment, points to its passage to the Senate on final consideration tomorrow.

The House Judiciary Committee No. 2 received the Senate unamended bill, passed by the Senate unanimously yesterday. Two-thirds House vote, necessary to secure suspension of the ruling to enact immediate passage failed.

A bill introduced by Senator Hancock of Granville and Royall of Wayne to place tax of one-half of one per cent on the stock in foreign corporations, Mr. Hancock said would put four million dollars in the equalizing fund for schools.

This tax was abolished years ago when there was about 375 million dollars worth of stock of this nature listed. Senator Hancock said that a much greater amount would be put on the tax books if the tax on this class of property were not consumed a large part of the dividends on this class of stock.

The Senate also saw introduction by Melbourn of Moore County, of a bill to increase the salary of the Governor from \$6,300 as at present to \$7,500. Other constitutional officers, the treasurer, secretary of state, auditor, superintendent of public instruction and attorney general, would see increases of \$1,500 each making their salaries \$9,000.

Mr. Taylor moved to this city from Kingston about four years ago and since that time has been making his home with his daughter, Mrs. Z. V. Murphy. Prior to moving to this city he was actively engaged in farming. He was a member of Jones county and a loyal member of Pleasant Hill Christian church, there.

The deceased is survived by his widow, a son H. L. Taylor, and a daughter, Mrs. Z. V. Murphy, of this city.

New York, Feb. 24.—(AP)—An ultimatum by Tex Rickard to Jack Dempsey settles the status of the former heavyweight champion in the promoter's match-making plans.

Dempsey must defeat the winner of the elimination tournament now being staged at Madison Square Garden in order to gain a return match with Gene Tunney. Otherwise Dempsey will be removed from consideration as a challenger.

Rickard said he expected to learn Dempsey's plans from the former champion within a few days. "But he won't get anywhere with me if he insists on getting into the ring with Tunney next September without openers," he added.

BEGIN NOW

Now that the law requiring every kind of vehicle to carry a tail light at night has been passed by the legislature, it is to be hoped that persons accustomed to traveling in animal drawn vehicles will not wait until July 1, when the law becomes effective, to adopt the practice of lighting their vehicles. The measure is one that should have been enacted into law long ago and now is the time for farmers and others to begin to comply with the new regulation. While it is not a misdemeanor to drive an unlighted animal drawn vehicle between now and July 1, it is surely just as dangerous now as it will be after the law becomes effective. Those persons who persist in traveling the roads in unlighted vehicles may never get the chance to comply with the new law when it does become effective.

"GOOD TO KILL"

Declaring that "accommodation" is the livelihood of banking institutions and that the bill, presented to the legislature by Representative Flanagan, of this county, seeking lawyers' fees of ten per cent on past due notes, is a measure under which money speculators might compel payment of amounts equal to sixteen per cent interest, the News and Observer points to it as a "good bill to kill."

Under the caption "What is Accommodation?" the Observer's comment was:

"In the House of Representatives yesterday when the bill was under discussion which would compel the debt or to pay the lawyer 10 per cent who was engaged by a bank to collect an overdue note, as advocates laid great stress on the word 'accommodation.' Their argument was that inasmuch as the borrower had been 'accommodated' by the bank he should pay 10 per cent when the bank found it necessary to put the claim in the hands of a lawyer for collection. It became apparent that the measure might be used by money speculators to compel the payment of a sum equal to 16 per cent interest. When that became apparent the bill was recommitted. It is a bill that, whatever merit it has as used by high-class banks, is open to abuse. It is a good bill to kill. Creditors have all the rights now that they need."

"The constant iteration of the word 'accommodation' raised a question in the minds of some. A bank is in business to lend money. It would fail if people did not accommodate it by borrowing money. The man who gives good security on the money he borrows is the party who accommodates the bank quite as much as the bank accommodates him. There is no compulsion for a bank or individual to loan

anybody money. It is done for profit. If the bank or other lender must go into court to collect his debt, the person seeking to enforce a right should pay its own attorney. There is no right or justice in compelling the party who is the defendant to pay fees of the attorney of the plaintiff.

Debtors should be made to pay, but no such penalty as lawyers' fees of 10 per cent should be assessed against them."

PRESS COMMENT

A LOFTY UTTERANCE

Judge Abner Dunn who is holding court here this week this morning, admitted Mr. John Selby Rieken of this city to the practice of law.

The address of His Honor in granting the commission gave utterance to words that must have inspired the young man as well as impressed all those within the sound of his voice.

Judge Dunn said:

"Permit me to congratulate you, Sir, upon your admission into a great and noble profession; one that has numbered within its ranks the greatest men this country has produced. You have marked out for yourself no easy task if you would attain success."

"Keep constantly before you the meaning and teaching of the sacred emblem of the Law which stands yonder in the Congressional Library at Washington. Its central figure a woman, seated upon a marble throne. In her right hand she bears the sword of punishment and in her left the palm branch of reward. On her breast she wears the scales of justice. On her left are the emblematic figures of Fraud, Deceit, and Violence, on her right Honor, Truth, and Industry. If you do you will not wonder that the lawyer of good deportment and of average ability stands a peer in his community and is expected to lead the wayfarer along the paths of progress and order."

"Indeed, ever since the time when Might made Right, when Humanity was a chaotic tribe struggling in the wilderness, up through the Ages, until now, when peoples everywhere are governed by legislative bodies, acting under Constitutional restrictions and Liberty and Property are protected by orderly conducted Courts, the Lawyer has been in the vanguard, giving of his time and his services to promote the welfare of mankind, so that today wherever you find the lawyer the most numerous, you will find the people most prosperous and civilization farthest advanced. China has no lawyers. In Russia there is one lawyer to every 31,000 of its inhabitants. In Germany there is one lawyer for every 8,700 people. In France one to every 5,100. In England, which stands four square to every breeze that blows one to every 1,100, and in our own United States, whose proud flag flies the majestic sea of time its ideal to make the world safe for Democracy, we find one lawyer for every 759 of its inhabitants."

"I gladly welcome you to this honored profession and wish for you that success which faithful and honest effort deserves. Permit me to admonish you to be attentive to your duty, always faithful to your clients ever remembering that to-day not tomorrow is the time and the opportunity to perform the task that is before you, and when you dedicate yourself to service, the future will take care of itself."

Beach Resort is Forging Ahead

Morehead Bluffs, Feb. 24.—A \$100,000 bond issue for the resort development at Morehead Bluffs has been guaranteed by the First National Company, of Baltimore. The firm carefully investigated conditions and prospects, then bought \$200,000 of the bonds, the rest of the amount being taken by North Carolina business and professional men and firms.

This bond issue means the speeding up of projects at the coastal development, which is the largest really undertaking of the kind in a wide region. During the last season Morehead Bluffs, Inc., contracted for and sold about \$1,000,000 in lots and acreages.

During the short time that the development has been underway, remarkable progress has been made at the site. All grading has been completed and two-thirds of the paving contracts have been already finished, with the remainder to be ready for spring. Capital Bay has been dredged for the establishment of a handsome and convenient 15-foot yacht harbor for the free use of transient boats.

The casino grounds have been finished and are now being allowed

to settle before work is started on the erection of a pleasure casino. The new golf course at Morehead Bluffs Winter Gardens will be finished by March and the Morehead Bluffs Club house should also be ready for the use of members by early spring.

J. R. Woodland, of Morehead City, expects to re-open Morehead Villa shortly. Additional modern conveniences are being installed in the new hostelry which was constructed in record time last summer. Work will begin Monday on a small summer hotel and boarding house to be known as the Muzzie cottage and to be operated by Mrs. C. A. Holt of Princeton. The cottage for the summer on the coast is said to be unusually bright.

ASSAIL METHODS OF CONDUCTING SENATE INQUIRY

**Robinson Charges
Senator Reed With
Basking Alone "In
Sunlight of Publi-
city"**

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The methods of Senator Reed, Democrat of Missouri, in conducting the campaign funds inquiry were assailed in the Senate today by Senator Robinson, Republican, Indiana, who in turn was accused by Reed of making a "cowardly insinuation that he does not dare to make openly."

Robinson assailed particularly the lone hand investigation of Reed in Indiana, as chairman of the Senate Campaign Funds Investigation Committee, declaring the Missouriian has basked there alone "in the sunlight of publicity."

He also opposed granting Reed's committee authority to hold hearings during the Congressional recess, declaring that although he did not know that Reed would do so, it would give him the opportunity to "go into states and get delegates to the National Democratic Convention."

"Insinuation is the last refuge of a coward," Reed shouted when Robinson had concluded. A manly man stands up like a man and says what he is going to say."

Cooper Faces Eighth Years on County Chain Gang

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Sheriff Jackson of New Hanover county today presented to Governor McLean extradition papers to bring from Georgia Thomas E. Cooper, former Wilmington banker.

Cooper served two years of a three year sentence in federal prison at Atlanta. President Coolidge commuted the remainder of his sentence, effective tomorrow when Cooper will leave the Atlanta penitentiary.

Governor McLean declined to act in his case and Cooper faces four sentences of two years each, a total of eight years, on the New Hanover county chain gang for violation of the state banking laws.

Cooper was president of the Commercial National Bank of Wilmington when that institution failed on December 31, 1922.

The Governor will act on the papers later.

Arrest Suspect Connection With Woman's Slaying

South Bend, Ind., Feb. 24.—(AP)—The finding of a bundle of women's clothes in an automobile driven by "E. W. Rogers of Oregon" at Indianapolis, has revived the police theory that the headless and armless torso of a woman found in the St. Joseph river near here, may be that of Mrs. Alice Van Dusen.

A description of Ernest Rogers, former employee of St. Mary's Academy near which place the place the body was found and who disappeared with Mrs. Van Dusen last December, was sent to Indianapolis police who reported they had "E. W. Rogers under surveillance."

ORDER FURTHER INVESTIGATION OF COOPER'S CONDUCT

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Further investigation into the general conduct of Federal Judge Frank Cooper of the Northern New York District was ordered today by the House Judiciary Committee, which is considering impeachment charges against him.

RESUME FILIBUSTER

Washington, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The filibuster against the Swing-Johnson bill to harness the Colorado river at Boulder Dam Canyon was resumed late today in the Senate.

GREAT BRITAIN THREATENS BREAK SOVIET RUSSIA

**Will Sever Relations
Unless Violations of
Treaties Cease**

London, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Great Britain threatened to sever diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia unless the "flagrant violations of the solemn agreements between the two countries cease" and the Soviet authorities call a halt to Bolshevik propaganda. A note to this effect has been sent to the Soviet government.

The note is couched in vigorous language. It is described as one of the most outspoken diplomatic documents ever formulated by the British foreign office.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary, makes the blunt statement that the relations between the British government and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics "continue notoriously of an unsatisfactory nature." He declares that "there are limits beyond which it is dangerous to drive public opinion in Great Britain" and that a continuance of the breaches of the agreement sooner or later will cause a break between the two countries.

"Despite the Soviet Government's protestations of friendship," says the note, "the highest officials of the foreign ministry and other officials and extracts from Bolshevik newspapers and manifestos."

Sir Austen declares there has been frequent violation of the undertaking of the Soviet not to support, financially or otherwise any movement designed to foment discontent or rebellion in the British Empire. In conclusion the note says:

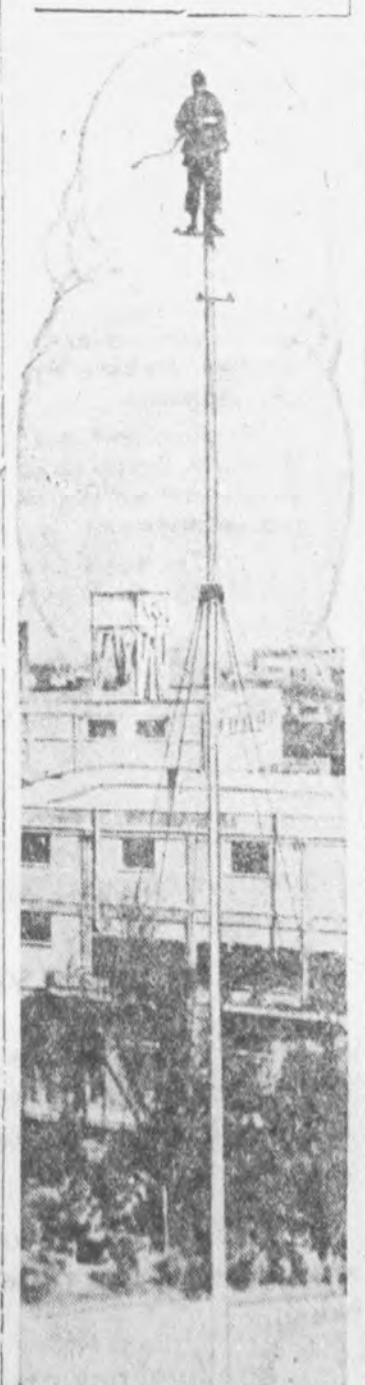
"The British Government trusts that this protest and warning received by the Union of Soviet Republics with the attention they require, and that no further cause for complaint will be given."

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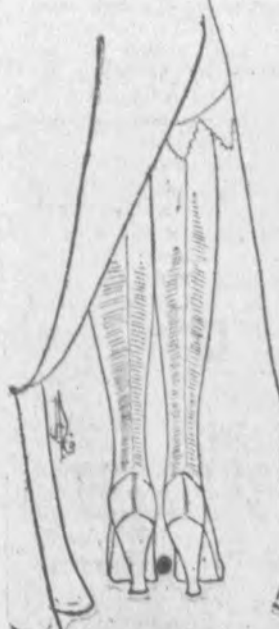

The boy was taken to a Kernersville physician who expressed the opinion that nature will remove the toy, but in the event it does not an X-ray will be used.

Foreigners Taking Refuge in Shanghai

Shanghai, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Foreigners who had been living outside the foreign settlements districts of Shanghai were brought

within its borders today because of the arrival in the city of large numbers of defeated and demoralized soldiers of Marshal Sun Chun-fang, deposed war lord.

The retreating troops arrived by train from the front between Sun-Kiang and Hangchow, where the victorious Cantonese invading army is preparing to continue its advance toward Shanghai.

Shanghai, Feb. 24.—(AP)—One thousand Shantung troops arrived here tonight from Nanking. Their final destination is believed to be Sunkiang, 28 miles south of here, where the Cantonese are expected to attack next in their drive on Shanghai.

These are the first northern troops to arrive here in the Peking regime's program for assisting Marshal Sun Chian-fang in defense of the city.

must not take a foot of American territory." But we have no right to say "You must allow yourselves to be cheated, of your property, honestly acquired, confiscated

by retroactive legislation."

The State Department will have public support in its demand that property rights of Americans be respected in Mexico, as property rights of Mexicans are respected in the United States.

As to the statement that some American concessions have been fraudulently obtained in Mexico, there is nothing improbable about that, and such concessions should suffer the fate of any other fraud.

Wall Street speculators show no overwhelming confidence in the Interstate Commerce Commission or its judgment on railroad values. On Monday the Supreme Court said the Interstate Commerce Commission has power to fix the value of railroads. Thereupon railroad stocks in Wall Street reminded you of Sennacherib's army. You remember the might of the Gehlile, unmolested by the sword that melted like snow in the glance of the Lord.

Speculators turned foolish, and threw stocks overboard.

This isn't a government to knock down values, and keep poor little railroads from making an honest penny.

The law says that prosperous railroads may earn so much, no

more, on what they are really worth, the surplus to be "recaptured" by the government, and used helping weak railroads that can't make ends meet. The idea is to do in a way what the big postoffice does, letting profits of the big cities like New York and Chicago, make up losses in little far-away postoffices that cannot support themselves.

Since it is admitted that our

public men are not competent or honest enough to manage railroads under government ownership, the next best plan would be to have all railroads under one management, the people regulating rates, fairly, insisting on service everywhere, the control over earnings using its profits in one place to take care of its losses in another. Economy of concentrated operation, alone, could stop all losses.

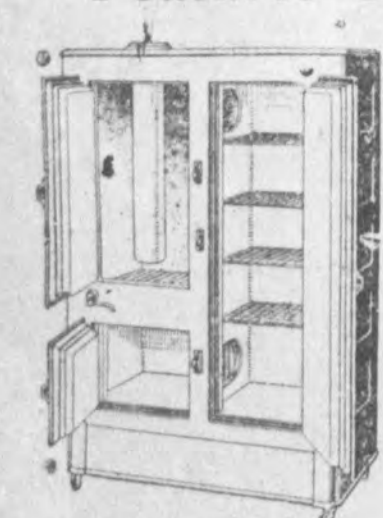
