## SENATE PASSES \$400,000 BOND ISSUE MEASURE FOR STATE PRISON FARM LAND

### Legislators, Working Without Pay, Give Speedy Action to Many Measures Dur- ing Today's Sessions

State Capitol, Raleigh, March 7.—(AP)—The General Assembly is hanging over legislation, working without pay and bending efforts on adjournment Wednesday in conclusion of its biennial session, sent bills flying between both branches by special messengers today.

Bills passing one house were immediately sent to the other for final disposal late today or tonight.

The Senate made the first final legislative step of the day when it passed the House bill authorizing issuance of \$400,000 of bonds to buy additional land for a state prison farm.

Enactment of the measure brought the total amount of bonds for buying lands for the prison to \$1,356,000.

The House passed to the Senate the Wertz equalization bill on the third reading for the Senate's concurrence.

The annual bonus and compensation bills flowed in, but in fewer number than last session. Clerical pay has been raised to care for the customary bonuses, and the allowances were for special service or reimbursement of extra expenditure.

The revenue bill passed its second reading 92 to 2.

Local bills were then run thru the passage mill.

The House broke into applause when Dr. Higgins, sergeant at arms, brought in Speaker Fountain's two children and placed them on the stand beside him.

Tom Gold, Guilford, did the honors, complimenting the Speaker on the beauty of his family, and his own excellence in conducting business of the House. There was more applause.

The House settled into debate on the Williams bill on appropriate \$60,000 for an industrial farm colony for delinquent women too old for admittance to Samaritan. Only 12 voices raised against the bill as it passed second reading. There were 96 "ayes." The bill passed.

Local bills passed by the House were measures relating to the roads of Pitt county, to bonds of High Point, prescribing court cost of Wayne superior court, fixing salaries of public officers of Pitt county, relative to roads and bridges in Wayne county, providing the Australian ballot for Guilford.

Senator Lawrence, Hertford, this morning made an effort to resurrect the Hargett bill, which would regulate automobile drivers, which was tabled on Saturday night. The motion to take the bill from the table failed to get the two-thirds vote necessary. The vote was 24 to 29.

The Senate abolished the presidential preferential primary in North Carolina by passing the Connor bill today revealing that section of the law which provides for such a primary. This leaves the delegates to the national convention with hands untied.

Senator Hines of Guilford, made an effort to prevent the passage of the bill which would give all the clerks and pages of both houses an extra dollar a day but the Senate, 30 to 9, voted extra pay. The bill went to the House, special messenger.

New bills in the Senate included one by Williams of Pasquotank, Broughton of Wake and Woodson of Rowan, co-jointly, to fix the salary of the state commissioner of revenue at \$6,000; one by Hargett and Broughton, amending the motor vehicle law; and one by McGuire of Surry, requiring the state highway commission to connect state roads with those of other states.

The Senate entered a debate on third reading of the bill to allow the state to buy nitrate of soda to sell to the farmers at cost.

Senator Dunlop declared the scheme was impractical and the state would stand to lose a large amount of money and the farmers would not get soda for less than they were getting it at present.

Senator Hargett spoke for the bill. Senators Call and Sedberry spoke against it.

The vote on the bill was 22 to 23, the bill failing to pass third reading.

Senator Sedberry moved for a reconsideration in order to table the bill. The effort to clinch the measure failed by a vote of 22 to 18.

The \$400,000 bond bill for the purchase of a state prison farm passed, 36 to 7. There was no discussion. It was ordered enrolled for ratification.

## FIND BODY NEGRO WHO KILLED WIFE

### Buster Barrett Believed to Have Committed Suicide After Slaying Wife

A telephone message to the sheriff's office here today announced that the body of Buster Barrett, negro, who a week ago yesterday shot and killed his wife at their home near Farmville, had been found in the woods near his home. The decomposition of the body indicated that Barrett had been dead at least a week, the report said, and it is believed that he committed suicide after escaping into the woods following the slaying of his wife.

Sheriff S. A. Whitehurst and Coroner E. S. Williams left this city about noon to visit the scene where the body was found.

A week ago yesterday morning Barrett after having trouble with his wife shot her through the door apparently as she held it to keep him from entering the house. The load of shot took effect in her body and she died the following morning. Officers who visited the scene shortly after the shooting heard the report of a gun fired in the nearby woods but a search of the premises failed to disclose Barrett's whereabouts. The finding of the body this morning led to the belief that the report heard was that of Barrett's gun and that he took his own life at that time.

## Says Husbands Are Apt To Take Things For Granted

Gastonia, N. C., March 7.—(AP)—The trouble with husbands is that they are apt to take things for granted, Dr. I. S. McElroy of King's Mountain told hundreds of persons assembled at the First Presbyterian Church here last night for the celebration of the golden wedding of the Rev. and Mrs. J. M. McLean. The celebration was attended by six other couples, members of the church, and a seventh not members, whose married life has spanned a half century.

The celebration was arranged that the city and congregation of the church might honor both the aged pastor and his wife and the other seven Gaston county couples. 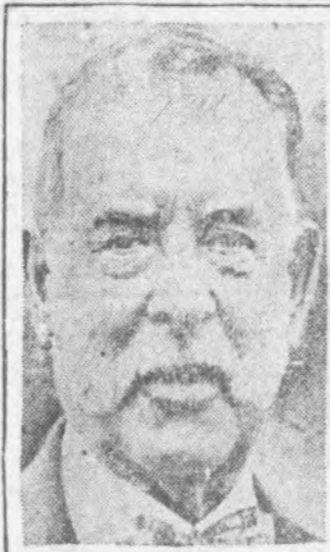
Children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren were present for the occasion as well as a crowd that overflowed the church.

"You do your woeing until marriage," Dr. McElroy told the men of the congregation, "and then you forget how to woe. Keep on telling them that you love them. That's what God meant when he said love your wives. The trouble with husbands is that they are apt to take things for granted."

Speaking to the women he said he had always substituted the word "revere" in the marriage ceremony for "love." "Reverence" means that the woman has the interest of her husband at heart, he said.

Dr. McElroy asserted that he would never accept "man-made" laws dissolving marriage. Attacking the divorce laws he asserted that "incompatibility of temperament was never a good excuse for divorce and he had always refused to marry persons who had obtained divorces for this cause. "Marriage is more of a religious institution, he said. It is sacred because it is of divine origin, because it is protected by divine law, because it has a divine purpose and because it represents the spiritual bargain between God and the church."

## JURY FOR TRIAL OF OIL MAGNATE SELECTED TODAY

### Harry F. Sinclair in Court for Refusal to Answer Questions Senate Oil Commit- tee

Washington, March 7.—(AP)—Selection of a jury for the trial of Harry Sinclair, oil magnate, on a charge of contempt of the Senate in refusing to answer certain questions in the Teapot Dome investigation required only a little more than two hours today in the District of Columbia Supreme Court.

The taking of testimony was delayed until tomorrow, however, government counsel announcing that their witnesses had been summoned for that time.

The indictment against Sinclair resulted from his refusal to answer questions asked him by the oil committee three years ago. It is the first criminal proceeding against Sinclair to come to trial, although a civil case seeking cancellation of the Teapot lease already has resulted in a government victory in the lower courts and now is pending in the Supreme Court.

Sinclair was in the courtroom half an hour before Justice Hitz opened court accompanied by his lawyers, George P. Hoover of Washington, Martin W. Littleton, of New York, and George T. Sanford of New York. Owen J. Roberts and Albee Pomeroy of special oil counsel, for the government, were assisted by Peyton Gordon and District Attorney.

## Two Men Killed By Explosion

### Buffalo, N. Y., March 7.—(AP)—Two men were killed by an explosion early today in the Atlas plant of the Standard Oil Company. Four others were missing this morning.

An ammonia tank in the Paragait plant blew up, wrecking that portion of the property and shaking houses for blocks.

An official estimate placed the loss at \$350,000 to \$400,000.

## Good Will Plane Falls Into Ocean

### Montevideo, Uruguay, March 7.—(AP)—One of the American army goodwill planes fell into the sea shortly after taking off today for the North. There were no casualties.

## NEW OUTBURSTS OF ANTI-FOREIGN FEELING IN CHINA

### Cotton Mills at Ning- po Close as Result of Anti-Foreign Dem- onstrations

Shanghai, China, March 7.—(AP)—Development of a menacing anti-foreign situation at Ningpo, South of Shanghai, on the coast of Chekiang province, commanded the attention of the British naval authorities here today, and the British flotilla leader H. M. S. Keppel was sent to that port.

Announcement by the Kuomintang (Cantonese left wing) of plans for a anti-imperialist demonstration on a big scale tomorrow has heightened the nervousness of the Americans and British remaining in Ningpo and several Englishmen left for Shanghai Saturday.

Previously nearly all the British and American women and children had been removed. On Saturday a minor hostile demonstration at the China Mission Society's hospital caused two English nurses to take refuge on a Shanghai steamer. The vessel called before finishing loading when a large Kuomintang procession approached the docks.

American consular officials and mission leaders are considering the Ningpo question but have taken no action. The missionaries feel that further protection is unnecessary at present. The Americans known to be in Ningpo number four women and eight men.

The anti-foreign movement there has developed gradually since the Cantonese occupation began. Post-imperialist and "cultural penetration," the latter being interpreted as especially being aimed at the missionaries.

Handbills have also been distributed calling on the populace to consider the Americans, British, Japanese, and French as their enemies because of their dispatch of military and naval forces to Shanghai.

The Japanese cotton mills, where Japanese naval forces are on guard, was a trouble center today, the wounding of a mill official, allegedly by a worker, and threats to kill the manager of another mill brought on a lockout, affecting 2,000 workers.

## CHINA WITHHOLDS ITS PROTEST TO LEAGUE NATIONS

### Says All China Wants is Noninterference With Sovereignty and Territorial In- tegrity

Geneva, March 7.—(AP)—Dashing into the League of Nations palace for the private session of the council this morning, Chu Chao-Hsin distributed a statement declaring that China would not raise the Chinese question in the council.

"Our attitude" the statement read, "is conciliatory and our demands are most legitimate since we have nothing to ask but for non-interference with our sovereignty and territorial integrity."

"Some thought that China would suddenly raise in the council the international situation in China but I can assure you no such action will be taken."

Chu said he was instructed by acting Premier Wellington Koo in Peking to notify Sir Eric Drummond, the league's secretary general, that the Chinese (Peking) government reserved the right to answer the British statement submitted to the league on February 8.

He did not know whether an authentic text of the British statement, which was sent by mail by way of Siberia, had yet reached Peking and up to the present he had received no fresh instructions from Mr. Koo.

Chu's statement was interpreted to mean that Peking is still holding a protest to the League up in case of emergency.

## South Carolina Has Second Sunday of "Old" Blue Laws

Columbia, S. C., March 7.—(AP)—South Carolina's second "blue Sunday" was marked yesterday by eleven arrests, but at Aiken residents in the winter colony, played golf undisturbed, while Governor John G. Richards' constables served with injunctions restraining them from interfering, looked on.

Ten golfers were arrested yesterday at Camden and ordered to appear in magistrate's court today to answer charges of violating the ancient "blue law" that prohibits playing of sports on Sunday. The golfers, all residents of Camden, fared forth for their usual game and were arrested by Sheriff J. H. McLeod.

Fred S. Ammar, restaurant proprietor, was arrested here last night by Y. W. Rogers, State constable, charged with selling cigarettes. Rogers said that the sale was made to an "under cover" assistant. Ammar was ordered to appear before a magistrate for hearing today.

## UNFAVORABLE REPORT EIGHT MONTHS SCHOOL TERM BY COMMITTEE

### Committee Votes 12 to 5 for Unfavorable Report. Minority Re- port Carries Fight to Floor of Senate

Raleigh, N. C., March 7.—(AP)—The bill proposing an amendment to the constitution to provide an eight months school term was reported unfavorably by a vote of 12 to 5 by the committee on education this morning. Senator J. M. Broughton filed notice of a minority report, so that the matter will be thrashed out on the floor of the Senate some time before the end of the session.

### High Court Says TEXAS PRIMARY LAW IS INVALID

### Court Declares State Has No Right to Bar Negroes Voting in Primary

Washington, March 7.—(AP)—The constitutional guarantee giving negroes the right to vote applies to primaries as well as general elections, in the opinion of the Supreme Court.

Overthrowing a Texas statute under which negroes are prohibited from voting in Democratic primaries, the court found today that even though the primary is not mentioned in the Federal Constitution, federal jurisdiction is sufficient to bar the states from making laws out of harmony with the constitutional guarantee of equal rights for the races.

"States may do a good deal of classifying that is difficult to believe rational," said the court in an unanimous opinion, "but there are limits, and it too clear for extended argument that color cannot be made the basis of a statutory classification affecting the right set up in this case."

The court said it was not even necessary to take into account the fifteenth amendment, which gives negroes the right to vote, because the injustice of the Texas statute was sufficiently apparent when considered merely in the light of the fourteenth amendment which prohibited the states from making any law to abridge the rights of citizens on account of race or color.

"The statute of Texas assumes to forbid negroes to take part in a primary election the importance of which we have indicated, discriminating against them by the distinction of color alone," said the opinion.

"The objection that the subject matter of the suit is political is little more than a play upon words."

## CHARLOTTE GROCER SHOT BY ROBBERS

Charlotte, March 7.—(AP)—J. T. Wilkie, a grocer, was shot and seriously wounded by burglars as he opened his store here shortly before daylight this morning. The robbers fled without warning.

Wilkie told police who talked with him at a hospital, that he was greeted with the flash of a gun as he opened the front door of the store. Two negroes, he said, ran from the place. They had forced their way through a rear entrance.

No trace of the assailants had been found this morning. Wilkie was shot through the jaw.

Several other matters pertaining to religious work in the city and community were discussed by the ministers.

The change in the church hour for the summer is in accordance with the usual custom of beginning services at a later hour during the late spring and summer months when days are longer.

Rev. J. E. W. Cook, of St. Paul's Episcopal church, extended to the ministers of the city an invitation to participate in a pre-lenten service to be held in St. Paul's church on Friday before Easter Sunday.

## Another Cyclone Sweeps Islands of African Coast

St. Denis, Reunion Island, March 7.—(AP)—A new tornado of great intensity following that of last Thursday was menacing this island today.

Reunion Island is Abd-el-Krim's place of exile. It was feared the new storm had swept over the island of Madagascar where there were many deaths and extensive property damage in last week's storm.

No details were available as to the exact number of dead at Madagascar but there came confirmation that the town of Tamnave, on the East coast, was virtually wiped out by Thursday's storm.

Several small steamers due here were missing today. It was feared that the steamer St. Anne from Madagascar, had been lost with all aboard.

## FOUR ELECTROCUTED IN PENNSYLVANIA TODAY

Rock View, Pa., March 7.—AP—Four men, condemned for killing a policeman in an attempted hold up in Philadelphia last May, paid the penalty with their lives in the electric chair in the western state penitentiary today.

They were Joseph Vurry, 29 years old; Harry Bentley, 23; William Juliano, 27; and Frank Doris, 27, all of Philadelphia.

## More Marines Are Expected to Arrive Nicaragua Today

Corinto, Nicaragua, March 7.—(AP)—The United States transport Henderson, with about 1,200 marines aboard, is due here today.

The British cruiser Colombia, which anchored off Corinto a week ago to afford a refuge for British citizens if that became necessary, left Corinto Saturday. Just where the warship is going is not known here.

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**DECORATION OF DISHONOR**

Declaring that the North Carolina Legislature has bestowed upon itself a "decoration of dishonor" by tabling the unmasking bill, the News and Observer after quoting the statement in which Imperial Wizard Evans expressed gratification at the Assembly's action, says:

"The tribute from the Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan will be regarded by most people as the severest condemnation that has come to this General Assembly. His statement that the measure was killed 'when all the facts were before' the Legislature is based on false information. There were no facts whatever presented in favor of tabling the bill. One member expressed the fear that it might deter the Moose from building an Orphanage in North Carolina; one, who now regrets his hasty statement, that it was 'an invasion of constitutional liberty' to wear sheets and pillow cases and strike in the dark; and another regarded it as a 'row between factions.' There was no discussion, no defense of the Klan, and before its opponents could point out the damage such action would do North Carolina, the motion to table which cut off any debate or presentation of facts, killed the bill. It also shamed the Legislature and made North Carolina hang its head in humiliation.

The statement of the Imperial Wizard approving the action of the Legislature has already girdled the globe. Approval by him will do North Carolina more harm than all the good things the General Assembly has undertaken, for the K. K. K. is regarded the world over as a cloak of hate and prejudice and lawlessness.

"This Legislature ought not to adjourn until it has removed this stigma from the good name of North Carolina.

"Let it not be forgotten that the Imperial Wizard demanded that the Klan covertly, try to secure legislation in North Carolina that is 'unwise, unpatriotic and un-Christian,' as Judge Grady characterized it! He truly said the measures were 'silly, unseemly and unconstitutional.' The suggestion that 'strategy would indicate' that a Klan measure 'be introduced in the Legislature by some man who is active in the American Legion' would alone condemn the Wizard and any organization which would follow a leader who would propose such a course. Judge Grady truly declared that no 'decent, honorable man in North Carolina' would be guilty of screening and American Legion men who condemn the mask resented the suggestion that they could be

used as stool pigeons by the Imperial Wizard.  
 "The Governor should send a ringing message to the Legislature this morning urging the passage of another measure such as the one that passed the Senate and the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House and other leaders should unite to remove the injury done North Carolina by approval by the Imperial Wizard.  
 "Let North Carolina repudiate the 'deep damnation' of approval of the only act of the Legislature that brings it discredit in the eyes of the whole world.  
 "Let us decline the decoration of dishonor."

 The annual post-season series with the South Atlantic League champions will start Monday, September 12.  
 Petersburg opens the season in Richmond, Norfolk receives Portsmouth, Wilson is host to Kinston.  
 Decision to have an outsider draft the schedule followed inability to break a deadlock in mail vote on three schedule drafts submitted.



## COTTON

The cotton market opened steady today at an advance of 4 to 9 points in response to higher Liverpool cables and soon showed net advances of 10 to 15 points on trade buying and covering. Offerings were comparatively light after the heavy selling of late last

week, and there seemed to be some rebuying by interests that had taken profits on long contracts on the recent advance.

Reports of rains in the southwest suggested further delays in farm work which may have had some influence but the main factors were supposed to be the absence of southern hedging in sufficient volume to indicate any general weakening of the spot situation.

Private cables reported trade calling and French buying in the Liverpool market with a small supply of contracts.

The advance extended to 14.43 for May and 14.72 for October contracts or about 17 to 20 points above Saturday's closing quotations.

Prices reacted a few points on light offerings but the market was quiet and steady within 4 or 5 points of the best at midday.

## "Women's Rights" Subject of Debate League Council

Geneva, March 7.—(AP)—Women's rights blazed their way into the first meeting of the 44th session of the League of Nations council today when Sir Austen Chamberlain, backed by Dr. Benes of Czechoslovakia protested that women had insufficient representation in the league's health committee.

Alluding to Dr. Alice Hamilton of Harvard, the British foreign secretary pointed out that there was only one woman on the health committee and that she was there merely in an advisory capacity, with no right to vote. This, he said, constituted a grave failure to recognize the ability of women who certainly were in a position to contribute greatly to the cause of international health.

The council referred the complaint to the health committee, and it is probable that favorable action will be taken on it.

## MENTION NETTLES FOR 1929 SPEAKERSHIP

Raleigh, N. C., March 7.—(AP)—Friends of Representative Nettles of Buncombe County today presented his name for consideration for the 1929 speakership.

In the last quarter century, they said, the Piedmont West had six speakers: David Pharr, Grier, Murphy Frahan and Brummett; and the mountaineers, "which give the largest Democratic majority" has had but one, Walter Moore of Jackson County. Speaker in 1900.

## Two Killed, Three Wounded in Battle With Madman

Johnstown Pa., March 7.—(AP)—Two men were dead, another was dying and two others were recovering from wounds today as a result of a six hour attempt by possesmen to capture John Bruno, 50, known to be demented, after Bruno had barricaded himself in his home at Beaverdale, near here, late yesterday.

The affray ended only when a bullet fired by one of the possesmen posted in a church across the street from the besieged house, struck Bruno beneath the heart, mortally wounding him.

Before he fell, Bruno had shot and killed Max Miller, 35, of Beaverdale, probably fatally wounded John Libbertoe, 34, also of Beaverdale, and less seriously wounded two others.

## President Commutes Sentences of Two Dry Law Violators

Washington, March 7.—(AP)—President Coolidge has commuted the sentences of Nufield and Winfield Jones, serving sentences in Atlanta penitentiary on prohibition violation charges.

The brothers were convicted in Baltimore and each was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Nufield Jones formerly was assistant federal prohibition director for Georgia. They entered the prison last June.

Their conviction was based on the misuse of denatured alcohol owned by the Maryland Drug and Chemical Company of which they were officers. Efforts to obtain clemency for them have been in progress almost since they began serving their sentences.

The commutations are effective immediately.

## Former Atlanta Policeman Confess Killing Investigator

Atlanta, Ga., March 7.—(AP)—A former Atlanta policeman under arrest in Chattanooga, Tenn., has confessed to murdering Bert Donaldson, special investigator for Solicitor John A. Boykin. Donaldson was assassinated in a fashionable hotel here last July.

Charles N. Fitchett, 31, in a document delivered to the Atlanta Constitution, declared he killed the investigator at the instance of a group of rum runners and gamblers who also planned to "get a solicitor general."

Three men drew shots to see who would fire the straw, Fitchett asserted, and he, drawing last, got the shovest start. Jack Lance fired Donaldson to the hotel room, the confession said. R. K. Lovett invited the two inside, and had fired from a close with a mulef sawed-off shotgun as the investigator approached a table.

Fitchett, a policeman here in 1919, was arrested in Atlanta last November on a charge of passing worthless checks and returned to Chattanooga. Solicitor Boykin said he doubted the accuracy of many points in the confession but that he would bring the man here and take him before a Fulton county Grand Jury tomorrow.

Lance is serving a year's sentence in the Fulton jail on another charge. Lovett, arrested soon after the murder, later was released. Six other men are implicated in the confession.

## Leaps to Death From 15th Floor in New York Hotel

New York, March 7.—(AP)—Mrs. Natalie Schley, widow of Buchanan Schley, Jr., who was deputy collector of the port of Baltimore in the administration of President Cleveland, died today after a fall or a leap from a window in the 15th floor of the Hotel Buckingham in West 57th street.

The body, fully clothed, was found on a roof over an extension of the second floor by her son Buchanan Schley, a cotton broker, who lived in a suite with his mother.

Mr. Schley knocked at his mother's door to greet her this morning and receiving no response, walked in. Looking out of the open window he saw her body on the roof below.

Mrs. Schley's husband, who died here on November 15, was for 29 years a member of the New York Cotton Exchange and was first cousin of the late Rear Admiral Schley of Spanish war fame.

(Continued from Page one) science. German and French scientists plan to produce electrical power by the use of tropical sea water, at one tenth the present cost. That discovery may be worth a thousand times as much as all the diamond fields in the world.

Equally important is the discovery that makes possible transmission of electric power to a distance of 1,000 miles. The present limit is 100 miles. No one can estimate the value of that discovery, or its effect among many industries, especially steel.

With power from a waterfall carried economically to raw material a thousand miles away, beds of iron ore can be made into steel by the new electric process, any-

where within a thousand miles of cheap water power.

The Pacific coast may go ahead of Pennsylvania, and Indiana in steel manufacture.

This country is really getting into big business. Seven different concerns are in the BILLION DOLLAR CLASS. And for some a billion is the unit. The American Telephone and Telegraph Company has assets above three billions. In 1926 that one company spent \$317,000,000 improving and extending its plant, a sum greater than the total capitalization of many railroads and of a majority of industrial enterprises.

Before long the "billion" will take the place of the "million," in familiar conversation. And Wall Street will say "The first billion is the hardest to get."
