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CITY OF SHANGHAI HAS FALLEN INTO HANDS OF THE CANTONESE FORCES

Hundreds of American Marines and Troops of Other Nations Landed to Protect Their Nationals in Shanghai

Shanghai, March 21.—(AP)—Chaos reigned in Shanghai tonight after the fall of the city to the Cantonese this morning.

Rioters ran loose in the native quarter all day and tonight a band of Chinese troops, presumably attached to the retreating northern army, broke through the barrier to the north of the international settlement and began looting.

A British armored car rushed up in response to a police call for aid. The car was subjected to a continuous machine gun fire. Lieut. Newman, corporal Ainslie and two soldiers were wounded.

Shanghai, March 21.—(AP)—The war has come to Shanghai. The vanguard of the Cantonese army entered the native city this morning. The Shantungese fled at their approach, and the city was taken without fighting.

The municipal council declared a state of emergency and landing parties of all nationalities represented in the Shanghai naval concentration, including 1,500 American marines, disembarked to defend the foreign settlements against invasion from without, or trouble from within.

Possibility of serious disorders was intensified by the calling of a general strike of Chinese workers to celebrate the fall of the city to Shantungese southern forces which now hold virtually all of China south of the Yangtze river.

All the barriers between the native and foreign districts were closed and heavily guarded today. The foreign defenders suffered their first casualties when a British Punjab trooper was killed and two were wounded by machine fire from an alleyway at the border of the international settlement.

Two foreign policemen were injured by bricks thrown from the top of a building on the Nanking road.

Hong Kong, March 21.—(AP)—The first battalion of the Devonshire regiment made arrangements today to leave for Shanghai.

Shanghai, March 21.—(AP)—A few shells fell into the French concession this afternoon. There were no casualties. The authorities do not know where the shells came from.

Shanghai, March 21.—(AP)—Naval forces were landed in Shanghai today from all warships in the Whangpoo river off the city.

The municipality declared a state of emergency after the Nationalists entered.

Shanghai, March 21.—(AP)—Shanghai was virtually in control of the Nationalist forces today. The Southerners having entered the native city this morning.

When disorders developed near the borders of the international settlement, soon after the Nationalists arrived, 1,500 United States Marines were landed, while the Japanese landed 900 marines.

Immediately a general strike was ordered to celebrate the coming of the Southerners. When it went into effect at noon there was every indication there would be widespread response by all classes of workers. The trains in the international settlement were the first to cease operations; then the effectives of the largest cotton mills left their work. The strike was entirely political as a show of sympathy with the Nationalist victory and to prove the solidarity of labor.

Just previous to the Nationalist advance into the prize city, 1,200 United States marines from the transport Chaumont route-marched through the principal streets with full field equipment, steel helmets, fixed bayonets and machine guns. The march was not connected with the Chinese military situation. It was merely to exercise the marines who returned to the ship immediately after the parade.

General Pi Shu-Chen, commander of the northern forces in Shanghai, was reported to have taken refuge in the French concession. The Cantonese cut the Shanghai-Nanking railway.

For days past the fall of Shanghai had been a foregone conclusion. The southern army had kept up a steady hammering at focal points in the northern line, capturing key positions in rapid succession. By the collapse of the Shantungese defense on the Sunchiang front, southwest of

MARTIAL LAW IN COFFEYVILLE, KAN. CONTINUES TODAY

Civil Authorities Ask Continuance of Troops Because of Threats Against Negroes

Coffeyville, Kans., March 21.—(AP)—Coffeyville continued under military rule today at the request of civil authorities following reports of renewed agitation against negroes as a result of the racial outbreak Friday night in which four persons were injured.

Scheduled withdrawal of National Guard troops was postponed last night when authorities were informed that high school students planned to bar negro pupils from classes today because of the attack on two white girls by three negroes Thursday.

With quiet restored yesterday, two National Guard cavalry troops returned to their homes at Iola and Yates Center. A pistol battle between four robbers and police and rumors of renewed agitation caused Adjutant General Milton McLean to order troop B, the local unit, to remain on duty indefinitely.

Arrest of a negro who was carrying a pistol and a supply of ammunition, last night caused guardsmen to start a search of all negro laborers in the York smelter and other industrial plants. Thirty American Legion members summoned as special deputies and 15 of them were sworn in. They were armed with pistols and rifles and ordered to assist in patrolling the city.

Mrs. Maggie Elks Died Last Night

Mrs. Maggie Lee Elks, aged 39, died last night at 10 o'clock following illness of only a few days. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. L. R. O'Brien, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, this afternoon. Burial followed in the Elks' graveyard.

The deceased was a member of the Piney Grove Free Will Baptist Church. She is survived by her husband, J. E. Elks; one daughter Miss Alice Elks; and one brother, Ed Worthington, of Greene county.

Says War Debt Claims Must Be Revised

Chapel Hill, N. C., March 21.—(AP)—The first centennial institute of the University of North Carolina got under way today following Sunday's address by Dr. Herbert Adams Gibbons of Princeton, N. C., political economist.

He declared America's war debt claims must be revised in order to be a power in bringing about limitation of armaments.

The institute is divided into international, industrial, and intellectual relations groups, and will continue each day through Friday to acquaint the students with world movements.

Illness Forces Woman Hiker To End Journey

Asheville, March 21.—(AP)—Stricken with a ruptured appendix and fighting against a fever of 103, Mrs. Charles Hutchins of Burnsville, who had planned to walk to Asheville, 43 miles, March 25, in competition against lone distance walking records held by Miss Eleanor Sears of Boston, today cancelled her hike until later in the summer. Mrs. Hutchins was stricken Friday while on a 20 mile walking journey.

BALKAN TENSION CAUSES STIR IN LEAGUE CIRCLES

Commission Assembles to Discuss Grave Situation Caused by Mobilized Troops

Geneva, Switzerland, March 21.—(AP)—Tension in the Balkans today caused a stir in League of Nations circles as the league's preparatory commission assembled to discuss preliminary plans for an international disarmament conference.

Advices from Rome the last few days have told of the mobilization of Yugoslav troops along the Albanian border, and while Italian newspapers have gone into details alleging warlike intentions on the part of Yugoslavia, nothing official has been announced by the Rome government.

The Belgrade government and the Yugoslav representatives in the several European capitals have vehemently denied military preparations except the usual defense against the frontier incidents. The Yugoslav agency at Belgrade has referred to the reports as pure inventions, saying that Yugoslavia is anxious for peace.

Although the Rome newspapers said the Italian representatives in England, France, Germany and other large European countries had presented communications making known Italy's anxiety over the situation on the Yugoslav-Albanian frontier, the Italian foreign office has remained silent.

The Italian newspapers charge the Yugoslav government with a desire to stir up revolt in Albania, pointing out that such a revolt might be advantageous to Yugoslavia's interests. These papers say that England has joined with Italy in protesting to the Yugoslav government against the alleged belligerent intentions of Belgrade as regards Albania.

It is reported that the Italian representative at Belgrade in an official note to Minister of Foreign Affairs Perich, declared Italy could not remain neutral in the face of Yugoslavia's apparent aggressive intentions toward Albania and that immediately afterwards the British Ambassador virtually informed M. Perich that England was in sympathy with the Italian stand.

Belgrade, March 21.—(AP)—Neither the British nor Italian minister has given Yugoslavia any warning regarding the danger of Yugoslav revolutionary incitement in Albania, says an official statement by foreign minister Perich.

This denial is confirmed from a high diplomatic source. The report that such action had been taken was published in the Rome newspapers.

GETS TWENTY YEARS FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Memphis, Tenn., March 21.—(AP)—Courtney Glisson, former teller of the Bank of Commerce and Trust Company, Memphis, Tenn., pleaded guilty to embezzlement in Shelby criminal court today and was sentenced to twenty years in the state penitentiary.

Glisson disappeared from his bank office last October leaving shortages aggregating about \$465,000. He surrendered later.

LARGE AUDIENCES ATTEND REVIVAL SERVICES SUNDAY

Using as a theme, "Kindness," Rev. A. J. Stanford, who is assisting in the revival at Jarvis Memorial, delivered a most forceful and wonderful message on yesterday morning to a splendid audience. Taking as a text 2nd Samuel 9th chapter and 3rd verse, the seeking of Jonathan by King David that he might do him some kindness. The kindness that King David possessed, declared the minister, was the kindness that always sought objects. There is a vast difference, he further declared, in talking about kindness and going out and doing. For the last years there has been too much theory and too little practice in the church. The minister stated that the greatest curse of young life of America was not gambling, not drinking—but that of downright disobedience to father and mother.

Mr. Stanford preached last night on "The greatness of salvation." This morning's theme was "the thing which I believe is shortening more lives in America than any one thing." This the preacher declared to be the sin of worry. He defined worry as needless and corroding care. Cowardly fear, lest we are going to fail, carrying tomorrow's burdens with today's strength and power. Assuming responsibilities and bearing burdens that God never intended us to assume or bear. The minister then gave reasons why we should not worry. Worry is suicidal. It is useless. Then we may worry over things that never come to pass. Lastly a life yielded to God is kept.

New York Woman Makes Statement in Murder Case

New York, March 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Snyder today asserted in a statement to the police, that Henry Gray, now under arrest in Syracuse, had murdered her husband, Albert Snyder, art editor of a magazine in order that he might be free to marry her.

Press dispatches from Syracuse said that Gray was in that city last night.

According to the alleged confession, Mrs. Snyder said that Gray was consoling in their home in Queen's Village when she, her husband and their nine-year-old daughter Lorraine returned early Sunday morning from a car party.

Gray, according to the confession beat Snyder to death and then wound a picture wire around his throat. After the murder Gray bound Mrs. Snyder in order to throw an aspect of burglary over the crime.

Police said Mrs. Snyder had told them she had known Gray for two and one-half years and that she wanted her husband out of the way in order that she might marry him.

District Attorney Newcombe said that a charge of homicide would be filed against Mrs. Snyder, but declined to say what charge will be placed against Gray.

COUNT SAIM WOULD DISCONTINUE LAWSUIT AGAINST HIS WIFE

New York, March 21.—(AP)—Attorneys for Count Ludwig Von Saim today handed to the Clerk of the Supreme Court stipulation and proposed order to discontinue his separation suit against his wife, the former Millicent Rogers. The action was forecast a few days ago.

SEARCH FOR MEN WHO BEAT AGED WOMAN

Raleigh, N. C., March 21.—(AP)—All day search for three unnamed men, alleged to have beaten up Mrs. Fannie Davis, 75, in Barton's Creek township Sunday, continued today.

Deputy Bud Stiel was withholding names of the three, who, Mrs. Davis reported, beat her up because she refused to serve them their customary food. The men turned the house topsy-turvy before they disappeared yesterday, she said.

CONNECTION OF JEWRY CROPS UP IN SAPIRO SUIT

Jury Dismissed and Decks Cleared for Extensive Argument of the Question

Detroit, March 21.—(AP)—The question of the possible connection of international Jewry with the \$1,000,000 libel suit of Aaron Sapiro against Henry Ford, came to the front again today. The jury was dismissed and decks cleared for extensive arguments by opposing counsel.

It was the second time the question had cropped up. The first time, Federal Judge Fred M. Raymond temporarily got rid of the long delay it promised to cause by stating that he would hear the matter when it became necessary.

That moment arrived today. Tracing the inception of the attacks upon Sapiro, Chicago attorney, who became an organizer of farmers cooperative associations, an effort was made to bring out from William J. Cameron, editor of the Ford-owned Dearborn Independent, that the series of articles Sapiro claimed libeled him and caused a million dollar loss to his business, first were intended to concern only Jews as a whole and that later they were turned to Sapiro as an individual.

If the articles had said only that Aaron Sapiro, the individual, was trying to subjugate American agriculture, the world would have laughed. William Henry Gallagher, counsel, for Sapiro, told the court.

It was a much more serious thing he said, when the articles charged that Sapiro was connected with an international Jewish ring by the Dearborn Independent, backed by all the wealth and power of Mr. Ford. Sapiro, he stated, had not been charged merely with individual acts but with being a member of the alleged combination.

Ford's attorneys sought to bring from the court that the suit was one merely of Sapiro the individual, race or creed to the contrary notwithstanding.

From Cameron the information was elicited that the inception of the attacks upon Sapiro came from a letter H. W. Rowland, of the Dearborn Independent's editorial department, wrote to Harry H. Dunn, Berkeley, Calif., August 6, 1923, and that Dunn, who assumed the pen name of Robert Morgan, was chiefly responsible for the investigation necessary and the preparation of the articles Sapiro holds libelous.

The letter: "Don't snicker when I tell you that the Jewish boys are putting the works on the farmers. It began when Barney B. first became interested in Kansas after Wilson left the White house. Since then there had been a great deal of Jewish interest in the plight of the farmer, especially as to mortgaging their souls and bodies thru the government agencies, plus the various cooperative movements."

"We have been desirous of getting something tangible and here seems to be the opportunity to clean up the west coast situation. I don't imagine that you will have much difficulty in rounding the facts up on this, although all of it will take considerable time. If you can get it we'll protect you of course, and it will be as fully remunerative if not more so than the Abrams material."

"Let me know from time to time how the work is progressing and if there is any trip you must make to gather the facts, go ahead and send in the expense account to us. I believe that you have an opportunity to do considerable 'chronicling of the neglected truth.'"

The graft charges were made apropos of a Senate debate on a bill to amend certain sanitary laws.

Chicago, March 21.—(AP)—Mystery surrounding the finding of the body of a boy on an improvised funeral pyre near the Des Plaines River in Forest Park, was believed cleared up by the discovery of the boy's mother and foster father, dead, apparently in a suicide pact in their Chicago apartment.

Police and relatives found the bodies of Arthur (Jack) MacEwan, 35 salesman, and his wife, Mrs. Helen MacEwan MacEwan, 32, when they forced entrance to their flat. This led to the identification of the boy as Robert MacEwan, 11, son of Mrs. MacEwan by a former marriage. The boy's skull had been crushed.

HEFLIN DELIVERS ATTACK ON WETS AND GOV. SMITH

Alabama Senator Was Principal Speaker Before Anti-Saloon Convention Yesterday.

Raleigh, N. C., March 21.—(AP)—The Anti-Saloon League of North Carolina biennial convention stood adjourned today after hearing U. S. Senator J. Thomas Heflin of Alabama in Sunday afternoon address attack the wet of the nation and Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York.

Senator Heflin was tendered probably the loudest outburst of applause when he said he would return to North Carolina many times before the next primary.

He expressed regret that the State had "taken a backward step in repeal by the Legislature of the preferential primary" by which repeal the State's delegates to the next Democratic National convention may go unpledged to any one candidate and feared the repeal might be the "entering wedge" to enable Al Smith leaders to pick delegates of North Carolina.

"But I am glad that we were warned before the time comes to pick delegates to send to the next national convention," he said.

He repeatedly said he was not making a political speech and added he had been asked not to attack Governor Smith, but, he added, "questions that concern the welfare of our country should be discussed on the Sabbath as well as any other day."

Many anecdotes illustrated the points of his address, principally a plea for greater law enforcement, and an edict of the home. He cited the case of the late Senator H. L. Elks, who was a member of the legislature and said some of these in favor of return to the saloon had forgotten all that.

MRS. DORA QUINN PASSES AWAY AT DAYTONA, FLORIDA

Mrs. Dora Quinn, 68, former Greenville woman, died yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock at Daytona, Fla., following a short illness. Funeral services and burial will take place in Greenville, S. C., tomorrow afternoon.

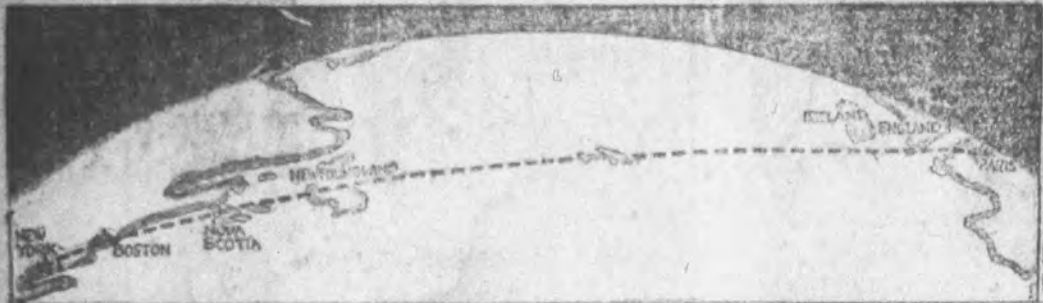

New York to Paris Flight Still Challenges Conquerors of Space

NEW YORK to Paris by air in a non-stop flight may become a fact accomplished early this summer, and the Raymond Orteig prize, \$25,000, for this aviation feat, be won after its eight years of existence without a successful effort to span the Atlantic in the 3,600-mile air voyage between the two great cities.

Lieutenant-Commander Noel Davis, U. S. Naval Reserve Air Service, will attempt the flight early in June under the auspices of the American Legion, whose name his airplane, a Huff-Daland "Pathfinder," now under construction at Bristol, Pa., will bear.

The flight will be financed by the New York-Paris Non-Stop Flight Corporation, capitalized at \$100,000, contributed by manufacturers, by voluntary popular subscriptions and by sale of American Legion post-cards throughout its camps, which the American Legion plans will carry square foot of lifting surface.

to Paris for delivery during the Legion's convention there. The pilot and all the crew must be naval fliers and members of the American Legion, some of them not yet chosen.

The start is to be made at Mitchell Field, Long Island, and the shortest airline course followed—over Boston, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, the Atlantic Ocean, Land's End, England, the English Channel and above the River Seine to Paris.

Davis expects his plane to carry 1,500 gallons of gasoline, stay aloft fifty-four hours, and complete the voyage in calm air in forty-two hours, or in thirty-five if he has the benefit of favoring winds. The plane is designed to carry, with full load, 16,500 pounds, or less than fifteen pounds to the square foot.

The Sikorsky S-35 plane, in which Captain Rene Fonck failed to complete a similar trip last year, carried more than twenty-six pounds per square foot of lifting surface.

Captain Fonck is expected to try again this year in a new Sikorsky-built plane. Commander Richard E. Byrd, of North Pole flight fame, has announced that he will attempt the New York-Paris flight this summer, and there are others preparing to contest for the prize.

In the plant of the Keystone Aircraft Corporation at Bristol, Pa., work on the Davis-American Legion plane is expected to be completed next month and its pilot will spend several weeks in testing it.

It will be equipped with three Wright Whirlwind motors, each of 240 horse power, and is of the highly tested and approved bombing type. The upper and lower planes are of the same size and have a spread of sixty-seven feet, with twelve feet width.

Raymond Orteig, donor of the \$25,000 prize, is proprietor of the Lafayette and the Brevoort hotels in New York.

A DISTINCT CREDIT

The showing made by the local unit of the National Guard in the federal inspection on Friday should be gratifying not only to members of the battery, but to citizens of the town as well. The battery was rated "very satisfactory" in most every particular which is the highest possible rating. Colonel Briggs, who made the inspection, declared that the local battery made the best possible showing in the state with probably one exception. Such a record is indeed a distinct credit to the battery especially in view of the fact that the outfit is less than a year old. Greenville should be proud of the organization and should give its hearty support to Captain Lester Jones and his organization.

"NUISANCE TAX"

Rightly declaring that the provision in legislation recently enacted by the General Assembly that would require a fee of fifty cents for the registration of the title for every automobile and an additional fifty cents for a specially devised purse or card case in which to carry same, should come under the head of "Nuisance Tax" if there is such a classification for taxes, the News and Observer says:

"The automobile owner now builds and maintains the highways of which North Carolina is justly proud. He pays his tax ungrudgingly. There has not been, in the history of the State, a tax yielding a revenue of such proportions, which is paid as cheerfully. The motorist pays whenever he pours a gallon of gas into his tank. He pays the State for a license tag and the price has climbed steadily through the years. He pays for the registration of his title by the State and admits that the protection he receives is worth the price. He pays the town in which he lives, if he lives in a town, for another license tag. In most cases he pays, in addition, for a driver's license for each member of his family who operates his automobile. On top of all this he pays to the city and the county a personal property tax on the value of his vehicle.

Against none of these things do you hear the motorist complaining, but already protests are being received by the Commissioner of Revenue against the most recently imposed burden. There is small wonder. Motorists are willing to pay for the building and the upkeep of roads, because they are necessary and they make their automobiles more useful and more valuable to them. They are willing to pay the tax to the cities and

the towns because it provides revenue for traffic regulation and that is worth while. They are willing to pay for title registration because it is a protection. They do not take any pleasure in digging down into their pockets, even for a paltry 50 cents to buy some additional red tape which the automobile license department seems to have in goodly store.

Probably few of the members of the General Assembly just adjourned realized that they had enacted a provision of the automobile law requiring, not only the issuance of automobile title registration cards annually, but the purchase by the motorist from the State of patented containers, specifications of which were listed in the bill. The card costs 50 cents and the container costs 50 cents. Admitting that the title registration is worth while from the standpoint of additional revenue, it is hard to conceive that the container is worth the price or really meets a need not already provided for in the title registration law.

Commissioner of Revenue R. A. Doughton was quick to disclaim responsibility for the provision. The head of the Automotive Trade Association and Sprague Silver, of the Automobile License Department (who, apparently sponsored this phase of the measure, denied emphatically that the terms of the bill stipulate a patented container that may be purchased from only one manufacturer.

If any sort of tax justifies the title "nuisance tax" this is one of them. This particular provision of the law looks like a whim. It is certainly unnecessary. If, as charged, the measure requires the State to purchase containers from one or a very limited number of manufacturers, instead of from manufacturers of such materials in general, it is not only unnecessary but vicious."

BOSTON RED SOX OFF ON PERSONALLY CONDUCTED PERSONALITY CAMPAIGN

New Orleans, March 21.—(AP)—The Boston Red Sox are off on a personally conducted personality campaign. If they get anywhere in the baseball world it will be directly due to the personality of William F. Carrigan, who has returned to the scenes of his former triumphs, after an absence of 10 years, in an effort to get Boston out of the last place in the American League.

Bill Carrigan has personality plus and he has instilled a spirit in the Red Sox they have not known in recent years. The players training here now are practically the athletes who went through the motions here a year ago but they do not look the same.

Manager Carrigan, who says that he has not seen more than 30 games in the ten years of his retirement, having returned to the game, has come back with a vim which has proved contagious. The Red Sox are hustling now. How far they can get remains to be seen, but a casual spectator at the practice periods can see there is smoke in the camp which may break into fire as the season begins.

The team, of necessity will be much the same as that of last year with one department noticeably strengthened. The club promises to get some good catching. Fred Hofmann, formerly of the Yankees, has returned to the majors after a stay at St. Paul and with Grover Hartley, veteran major leaguer, but still a good receiver and fair hitter, will do the catching. The only contest behind the bat is for the position of third catcher. Clifford Knox, who had a trial with Pittsburgh, seems to be the best prospect.

The Sox have picked up likely infielders, although their immediate entrance into the lineup is doubtful. Paul Wanning, who played some good ball for the Yankees, is on hand and making an impressive showing. Russell Rollings, who played last year with both Portsmouth and Mobile, has shown great promise and is certain to fill a utility role if he is ruled shy of enough experience to get him a regular place now.

Manager Carrigan has said that he knows so little of his players that he has not even attempted to line them up in an array calculated to do the most damage to

opposing teams, but it seems probable that the infield will be composed of Todd at first base, Rezan at second, Rigney at short and Haney at third. William Rogell, advanced from the international league, seems to be slated for a utility role along with Rollings and Wanning.

The outfield presents a problem in one position, assuming that "Baby Doll" Jacobson will take care of one place with Ira Flagstead flanking him. John Tobin, a veteran who is still a good player, must be considered and two younger players have made their presence felt in the spring. Cleo Carlyle, who compiled a good record with Toronto, seems ready for the majors and Walter Shaner has been going at a rapid pace.

Shaner broke a leg during the spring training season last year. Fred Bratche, another veteran, completed the outfielder material.

Market Report Cotton--Stocks--Grain

STOCK OPENING

New York, March 21.—(AP)—Irregular price movements characterized the opening of today's stock market. Leading industrial showed conflicting trends on initial sales, United States Steel improved slightly while General Motors was off.

Foreign exchanges opened easy with demand sterling quoted at \$4.85 1-2 and French francs just above 3.90 cents.

LIVERPOOL COTTON

Liverpool, March 21.—(AP)—The United States Census Bureau figures on cotton ginned was unexpectedly bullish and figures on the cotton exchange moved up slightly. May advanced from 32 pence to 7.52 pence when the figures were announced.

COTTON OPENING

New York, March 21.—(AP)—Cotton futures opened firm, March 14.05; May 14.10 to 14.25; July 14.40 to 14.50; October 14.60 to 14.70; December 14.80 to 14.84.

The cotton market opened firm day at an advance of 26 to 54 points on active covering and more or less general buying inspired by the census report which showed a ginning of 17,687,607 bales, counting round as half, for the season, equal to 17,910,258, five hundred pound bales.

These figures which compared with the December crop estimates of 18,618,000 bales were evidently below expectations and active months sold 53 to 59 points net higher before the end of the first hour, May advancing to 14.43 and October to 14.75. A good many stop orders were uncovered on the advance. After their execution the market was quiet but held within a few points of the best.

POTATOES

Chicago, March 21.—(AP)—Potatoes, receipts 123; on track 276; total U. S. shipments 792 cars; supplies liberal, demand and trading active, market slightly stronger; Wisconsin sacked round whites 1.85 to 2.00, mostly 1.90 to 1.95; Bulk 2.00 to 2.10; Idaho sacked russets 2.75 to 2.90, mostly 2.85 to 2.90.

WEEKLY STOCK REVIEW

New York, March 19.—(AP)—Establishment of record high prices for about a score of the high priced

rails and industrials, popularly referred to as the "Blue Chip Issues," attracted most attention in this week's stock market. Various reasons were assigned to the advance in these issues with expectations of special dividend developments as the most popular. However, erratic price movements in the rest of the market encouraged the belief that the strength of U. S. Steel common, General Motors, Dupont and several others which reached new highs was being used as a cloak to hide distribution elsewhere.

Operators for the rise were favored by a series of bullish developments. These included the publication of the Federal Reserve statement, showing gold holdings to be the largest since 1924.

The further expansion of steel operations, the proposed recapitalization of the National Lead Company, and the temporary reduction in the call money rate to 3-1/2 per cent, the lowest figure since last June were also factors. There were also a few fashionable dividend announcements.

On the adverse side of the ledger were further increase in the brokers' loans, halving of the Continental Banking a dividend and another series of crude oil and gasoline price cuts.

While fear of further price cuts hangs over the market for auto shares, General Motors was heavily bought on the announcement that February sales had exceeded 102,000 cars, as against about 91,000 in January and 6,900 in February 1926. Wall Street heard reports that Henry Ford is planning the announcement of a new car early in April. With the public already not too friendly with the stock market, these issues proved unusually susceptible to adverse price developments.

Sugar shares softened in sympathy with lower commodity prices. With the dull season in the theater business, approaching amusement shares were in rather free supply.

Railroad shares displayed a relatively firm undertone. With Southern Pacific, Lackawanna, Delaware and Hudson, Norfolk and Western and a few others selling at their highest prices in years.

COTTON GOODS

New York, March 19.—(AP)—

Cotton goods markets have been quieter this week but goods are due in large volume and mills are fully occupied on orders placed in the past eight weeks or more. Production is very active and bids fair to hold high for the next six weeks or at least, with chances favoring a continuation of the activity well into June. Goods are being distributed actively in wholesale and retail channels and in most cases the sales are running well up to the distribution of a year ago.

The business on printed wash fabrics and rayon mixtures is of record-breaking proportions and printers and finishers are more active than they have been at this period in two or three years. Many of the large printing plants are being operated overtime. Domestic cottons, brown and bleached, are moving steadily but have been bought ahead and current ordering is wholly of a filling in character.

Colored cotton goods business is better than it has been for years past. Prices are being advanced on chevrons, plaids, khakis, and other lines, and cottonades have become more active than for a long time. Low end ginghams and the finer grades of tissues are selling but the medium priced ginghams are moving in moderate volume only.

Business placed on flannels has been large for fall delivery. Fine combed goods are selling well. Rayon and cotton, and cotton and silk mixtures are in steady demand and recent advances in rayon yarns have led to some advances in the fabrics.

Raleigh, March 21.—(AP)—With but one day left for practice State College meets Springfield, Mass., college here tomorrow afternoon in the first intercollegiate baseball game of the 1927 season in North Carolina.

Coach Doak will pay close attention to his outfield lineup, he said, as only one veteran, Kidd, is back in school to play the outer gardens. Regulars are on hand for the infield with Harrill at first base; Vick, second; Matheson, shortstop; and Austin, third. Carson, of Griffin, will draw the catch and assignment. Either Beal or Shelton will do the pitching against Springfield.

FINAL ESTIMATE OF COTTON CROP GIVEN OUT TODAY

Census Department Places Production at 17,910,258 Five Hundred Pound Bales

Washington, March 21.—(AP)—The 1926 cotton crop, the largest ever grown, was placed at 17,910,258 five hundred pound bales today in the Census Bureau's final ginning report.

Since the Department of Agriculture's final estimate of 18,618,000 five hundred pound bales was made last December there has been much uncertainty as to the amount of the crop which would be picked. The low price of cotton and the scarcity of labor the Department thought would influence many farmers to leave the low grades of cotton unpicked in the fields.

Since that time the price has shown an increase, however, and the amount of unpicked cotton therefore is probably smaller than it would have been, the apparent amount being around 707,000 bales as shown by the agriculture estimate and the ginnings.

The crop is the largest ever grown.

That quantity of cotton exclusive of linters and counting round as half bales, included 234,041 running bales which ginner estimated would be turned out after the March census. The crop compares with 16,122,516 running bales or 16,103,679 equivalent 500 pound bales in the 1925 crop and with the Department of Agriculture's estimate, made last December of 18,618,000 equivalent 500 pound bales.

Until the Census Bureau's final ginning report today there had been much uncertainty as to the exact quantity of the record-breaking crop which would be picked and ginned. Early reports indicated much cotton might be left in the fields, because of the low prices of cotton and the scarcity and high price of labor.

Round bales, counted as half bales, included in the statistics totaled 656,861 compared with 351,121 in 1925 and 314,325 in 1924. The average weight of bale for

the crop, counting round as half bales and excluding linters, was 506.3 pounds compared with 499.5 in 1925 and 499.6 in 1924.

The number of ginneries operated was 15,749 compared with 15,482 in 1925.

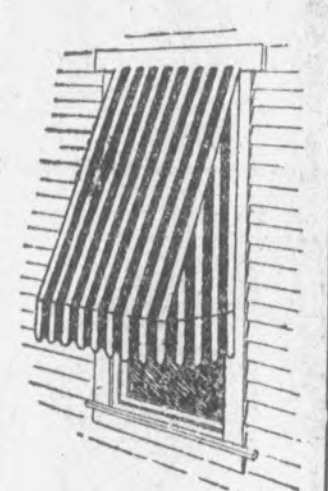

CITY OF SHANGHAI HAS FALLEN INTO HANDS OF THE CANTONESE FORCES

(Continued from page one) Shanghai, Saturday, the road to the objective was opened. This collapse of the northern defense was accomplished through an outflanking movement by the Nationalist or southern forces, and rendered other northern portions untenable.

On Sunday, Nationalist advance guards came within ten miles of the city. Soon the Cantonese were at Lungwha, four miles south of Shanghai. This place had been the Shantungese military headquarter.

When the defense of Shanghai began to falter before the Na-

tionist advance early this year, the foreign powers started moving troops and warships to the great port to protect their Nationals in the event of trouble developing should the southerners capture the city, or in case of other happenings which might endanger foreign lives or property.

Before the end of February 21 warships of five foreign countries were anchored in the Whangpoo river ready for action if necessary to protect foreigners. Five of the vessels arriving early were American.

The foreign forces now at Shanghai to protect the international settlement from any possible invasion total about 20,000 men. There are about 10,000 Nationalist advance early this year, the foreign powers started moving troops and warships to the great port to protect their Nationals in the event of trouble developing should the southerners capture the city, or in case of other happenings which might endanger foreign lives or property.

Crowds gathered after the Nationalists arrived and numerous police charges were necessary to clear some of the streets. Volunteer guards were immediately mobilized.

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When the defense of Shanghai began to falter before the Na-
