Wilmington, March 21 .- AP -If citizens continue to frame up excuses to escape jury guty as they are doing in New Hanover and other counties of the state, the courts may as well be placed "in the hands of a receiver and violators be given license to proceed to disrupt the society of the state," Judge W. M. Pand, presiding over New Hanever Superior court said today.




