MINISTER URGES STRONG ACTION IN CHINA

Mystery "S" Breaks World's Automobile Speed Record

FIRM HAND NEEDED TO PREVENT RECURRENCE OF NANKING OUTRAGES

Many Americans are heading homeward. American troops will not merge with forces of other powers.

Peking, March 29.—(AP)—Alarmed at the events at Nanking all the American members of the Peking Medical College have decided to leave for home immediately.

Washington, March 29.—(AP)—Recommendations for strong action to prevent recurrence of the Nanking outrages at other points in the nationalist controlled territory were contained in a message forwarded to the State Department today by Minister MacMurray at Peking.

While the message which reached MacMurray from Nanking did not bear the signature of the sender as received here, Department officials believed it probably was signed by Consul J. K. Davis who is still aboard a ship at Nanking.

The State Department's announcement said: "The incident at Nanking could hardly have been more outrageous. The worst incidents would have been greatly multiplied but for the timely bombardment."

"Suggestion is made in this message of the immediate withdrawal of all Americans in Nationalist territory and the undertaking of some action sufficiently strong to deter the perpetration of similar incidents elsewhere."

Washington, March 29.—(AP)—American forces in China will not be merged with the forces of other powers.

President Coolidge considers the United States has its own commander in the field, with an establishment under his direction so that independence of action on the part of the American military groups can be maintained.

Nevertheless, the President feels that the American forces will cooperate with the troops of other powers, especially since reports have indicated that American refugees are scattered throughout their foreign consular area particularly at Shanghai.

In case an emergency arises the President understands that the French concession, in particular, is compact enough to lend itself to the best defense, but the American officer in chief command would have discretion to act upon his independent judgment of what the requirements were.

Tokyo, March 29.—(AP)—The Japanese Cabinet at a meeting today is understood to have decided to refrain from using force in China but to endeavor to secure a peaceful solution by diplomatic means. The Japanese minister in Peking will be instructed accordingly.

Washington, March 29.—(AP)—Moderate leaders among the Nationalists in China apparently were in control at Shanghai today as no reports of renewed anti-foreign agitation were received by the State and Navy Departments.

While late dispatches reaching the city told of reported incidents at Hankow, saying Cantonese were placing heavy guns at points along the Yangtze, down which the ships loaded with refugees must pass, and apparently bore out the apprehension manifest here, even though no official advice were received from Admiral Williams, commander of American naval forces in Chinese waters or from diplomatic and consular representatives.

The latest dispatches from Shanghai were that the international settlement there was being guarded carefully against mob attack. Consul General Gauss reported the activities of the so-called "labor groups" in that area had prompted some alarm in the foreign settlement. He said that there were a "considerable number" in the Chinese areas.

Meanwhile, he added, efforts were being made to reach missionaries in outlying districts, destroyers being sent to get in touch with them.

War With China? Why? What Would It Cost? Money Involved? Pay It. Let Russia Have China (By Arthur Brisbane)

Our military and naval men in China were their government that were serious trouble, is coming. Hundreds of Chinese workers, well armed, are eager to storm the European settlement at Shanghai and wipe out foreigners.

This country has sent more men but only a tiny detachment, compared with crowds that China can throw into a conflict.

What kind of war should we have with China, if we were foolish enough to begin a war there, in defense of American dollars? Two or three million men seemed a great force in the big war. Remember that China has SIXTY TWO MILLION MEN OF FIGHTING AGE. She could not produce an army equal in numbers to the combined total populations of France and England.

Shall we foolishly land our men on Chinese soil, to kill, scientifically, for a while, and then be overwhelmed by Chinese armies, supplied with weapons from Russia?

For the moment our men are safe on our fighting ships. They can land for a quick attack, under protection of our big guns, then return to their boats.

But suppose Russia loans China a few submarines to attack from below, and airplanes with heavy bombs, to attack from above. Where would our ships be? They would soon be at the bottom of the water, off the Chinese coast, or, if fortunate, under full steam out into the wide ocean.

To land armies of any reasonable size against the Chinese, fired with revolutionary ardor and hatred, would be a suicidal task.

Young Woman Says She Killed Father

Wiona, Iowa, March 29.—(AP)—Kitty Jones, 15, maintains steadfastly that she killed her father, Ira Jones, and severely wounded her mother Sunday night because they showed more attention to a nine year old girl, today the girl was in the same jail with Sam Boyd, 33, to which the wounded mother charges the tragedy.

The man and woman were shot in their bed. Jones died without awakening. Mrs. Jones told Sheriff I. M. Thompson that when she awakened she saw Sam Boyd step from her room into a dining room adjoining. Physicians said the woman had a chance of recovery and a preliminary hearing for the daughter and Boyd on technical charges of murder will be determined by her condition.

Boyd denied the charge, officers said.

No License Card Holders This Year

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—There will be no fifty cent license card containers this year.

That is the pronouncement of R. A. Doughton, Commissioner of Revenue, relative to the new state license period beginning on July 1.

A "sleeper" is the automobile law, passed by the last legislature, making it compulsory for all automobile owners to display the cardboard duplicate license number issued with the metal tags in a patented container to be fastened on the dashboard. A charge of 50 cents was prescribed for the patented device specified.

Mr. Doughton had nothing to say about whether the containers would be required with the 1928 licenses or not.

Farmville Wins On Track

JURY FAILS TO REACH DECISION IN CHECK ISSUE

Mistrial Ordered by Judge Crammer in Case Against Farmers Bank

Mistrial was ordered this morning by Judge Crammer in Pitt County Superior court in the case of O. H. Roush against J. M. Short and the Farmers Bank of Greenville, in which the plaintiff was suing for the recovery of \$100 which he claimed to belong to him in payment of a check.

The jury considering the case deliberated yesterday afternoon and last night. This morning they still had not reached a decision, and Judge Crammer ordered them dismissed.

The local bank contended that the amount of the check had been paid to the plaintiff. He contended it had not, and carried the issue to court.

The court this morning was hearing the case of J. J. Perkins against Guy Evans. The suit involves \$292.00 which the plaintiff claims the defendant owes for some building material purchased from him. The issue will likely go to the jury some time this afternoon.

Dr. Hubert Potat Principal Speaker At Literary Exercises. At Teachers College Monday Morning.

The great part which character building and education are to play in American life was depicted in an interesting way in the auditorium of the Teachers College here yesterday by Dr. Hubert Potat, of Wake Forest College, who was the principal speaker at the sixth annual Pitt county school commencement day exercises.

The address came at the conclusion of one of the best programs ever arranged for an occasion of this kind, and was heard by an audience composed of citizens from all parts of the county.

Dr. Potat used as his subject "Playing the Great American Game." He told in a plain and convincing way the part which character building and education must play in the lives of our young men and women if they are to make the best of the responsibilities which life eventually places upon the shoulders of every man and woman. Character building and education are inseparable, in that the latter can never accomplish what it should unless it rests upon a foundation of human morality and duty.

The literary contests opened promptly at 9:30 o'clock, and continued in various rooms of the college until 10:30, when the principal part of the program was presented in the auditorium. In the contests Belvoir, Bethel and Winterville were the winners. Belvoir and Bethel tied for first place. Each will receive a \$20.00 library. Winterville will be given a \$20.00 library. Bethel won first place in the choruses, Winterville taking second place, and Fountain third place. The prize in this contest was \$5.00.

Notorious Baby Bandit Held On Murder Charge

Macon, Ga., March 29.—(AP)—A "baby bandit" who two years ago terrorized Miami, Fla., and two companions were in the Bibb county jail today, charged with slaying E. B. Hogan, local banker, the night of March 16, during an attempted holdup.

Bradley McIntosh, alias George Hall, 17, the "baby bandit" of New Bern, N. C., Jack Kenton, alias Kelly, of Toledo, Ohio, and Bernard Shroyer, of New York, all of whom escaped from a Florida prison camp a few days before the slaying, made voluntary confessions to participation in the slaying, police announced.

Following the confessions, Mrs. Evan Tanner, pretty 37 year old widow, Hogan's companion when he was shot, was released from jail, after having been held for nine days charged with the killing.

The case probably will be presented to the grand jury when it convenes in regular session on Monday, April 4.

On the spot where Hogan's car was crowded to the edge of a lonely road ten miles from here, and forced to stop, the trio waited for the officers. All had steadfastly denied knowledge of the slaying, on their way here from Knoxville, Tenn., where they were arrested for stealing an automobile.

"Does this place look natural to you?" one of the officers asked as the party stopped at the spot where Hogan was shot. "It was moonlight when you were here before."

Again the men denied connection with the slaying but questioning continued until Kenton abruptly

Tobaccoists Will Hold Convention at Morehead City, N. C.

Danville, Va., March 29.—A. B. Carrington, this city, president of the Tobacco Association of the United States, today announced that arrangements had been completed for holding the 27th annual convention of this important organization at Morehead City, N. C., from the North Carolina seaside resort. The dates fixed are June 22, 23 and 24. Headquarters will be at the new Hotel Villa, located a short distance along the seashore from the city.

Decision to hold the 1927 convention in the North Carolina city was reached by the association's board of governors at a recent meeting in Richmond, at which a pressing invitation to come to Morehead City was presented by the North Carolina members of the board. A committee was then named, composed of E. V. Webb, Kingston, N. C.; James S. Ficklen, Greenville, N. C.; R. P. Watson, and W. T. Clark, Wilson, N. C., to arrange for the convention.

This committee today reported to president Carrington, with the announcement that an elaborate program of entertainment for members of the Association was being arranged and would be given out shortly.

Among the important matters to be determined is that of opening of the auction sales markets. Under a resolution adopted at the winter meeting of the board the sales committee, which fixes the dates for opening the markets, is also empowered to name the closing dates, a matter that has recently come in for considerable consideration among tobacco farmers certain sections.

BRITISH AUTOMOBILE RACING EXPERT HUNG UP NEW RECORD TODAY

Major H. O. D. Segrave Attained Speed of 207 Miles Per Hour at Daytona Beach, Florida

Daytona Beach, Fla., March 29.—(AP)—Burning up the sands of the famous Daytona Beach ocean side speedway, an American born Englishman in a four ton brilliant red speedster today catapulted to an unofficial world's speed record for the mile straightaway of 207.015 miles an hour. A meeting of American Automobile Association officials will be held later to officially time the race.

Major H. O. D. Segrave, premier of European drivers, drove his "Mystery" at the astounding pace of 207.015 miles an hour down the course, after driving up the track into a quartering head wind that threw his huge racer into skids that promised instant death. The computed average time for the mile on the two runs was 207.015 miles an hour, 207.111 for the kilometer and 207.015 for the kilometer.

The first run northward against the wind was attempted at 10:07. After the second run Major Segrave stopped for a time change. The wind pressure was such as to make steering all but impossible he said. He exhibited wild burns and complained of aches in his wrists from the effort of fighting the wind. Just before the start he had read a cablegram from his wife wishing him the best of luck.

On the second trial the huge four ton speedster struck three course marking flags without the major knowing it.

"I'm satisfied. Now we'll pack up and go home," Major Segrave told Klee Guinness, his companion, when he found that a broken brake shoe would prevent his making a third run.

At the time of the attack the plane was flying at an altitude of about 1,500 feet. It was struck 12 times by bullets. No estimate as to the casualties suffered on the ground was contained in the report.

Chicago, March 29.—(AP)—Two girl employees were slightly injured when they jumped from a third story window to the elevated tracks to escape a fire in the plant of the Wellington Shoe Company, a lamp shade factory. The girls, Gladys Rayner and Lucy Kinsey, suffered cuts and bruises.

Nac, Whiteokos, another employee, was slightly injured in the panic occasioned when 50 of the 100 employees found themselves trapped on the third floor.

The damage was estimated at about \$25,000.

Pinedo Arrives at New Orleans

New Orleans, March 29.—(AP)—Commander Francesco De Pinedo arrived in New Orleans shortly after noon today concluding his 700 mile non-stop voyage from Havana, Cuba.

The flier arrived at 12:19 o'clock. Commander De Pinedo missed the landing field at the entrance to the industrial canal and proceeded to the foot of Esplanade avenue near the center of the city.

Oil's Machinery For Collecting Automobile Tax

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—Machinery for collecting half a year's automobile license tax plus 25 cents from 100,000 Tar Heel motorists was given its first oiling of the year today.

Revenue Commissioner R. A. Doughton announced that there would be 32 state license tag branches—21 counties being served by the Carolina Motor Club and nine by the Winston-Salem Motor Club. This is the same number that were in operation last year.

The 1927 license tags will be good for six months only, due to the last legislature changing the license year to run concurrently with the calendar instead of splitting it from June to July as formerly. The 25 cents extra was applied to pay for the change.

The change means that North Carolinians must purchase two licenses this year—one by July 1 and another to have ready for display on January 1, 1928.

Another change by the legislature moves up the lowest fee bracket to cover motors of 25 horsepower instead of 24 as previously. This will mean reduction of license fees from \$20 to \$12.50 annually for thousands of owners of one make of light car with a rated horsepower of a fraction over the old 24 limit.

LIQUIDATING AGENT TAKES CHARGE BANK OF BELHAVEN, N. C.

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—The Corporation Commission has sent J. B. Carson, its liquidating agent, to take charge of the Bank of Belhaven.

Commission officials said today they were reserving judgment as to the cause of the bank's failure. The bank was founded by J. B. Carson, of Beaufort, and Van Buren Martin, of Washington, for the appointment of the Branch Banking and Trust Company of Wilson as liquidating agent for the failed bank.

Jersey City Pitcher Severely Injured in Fight at Greenville

Greenville, S.C., March 29.—(AP)—Clarence Allen, of Anderson, S.C., a recruit pitcher for the Jersey City club of the International League, was fighting for life at a local hospital today, suffering from a number of knife wounds, while J. R. Peden, 45, and his son, Boyd, 18, were between the three men just before the exhibition game between the Greenville Spinners and the Jersey team at Graham field.

The encounter occurred when Allen went after a long hit ball that was slugged over a board fence into the peyan garden.

The player jumped the fence and ran to recover the ball. He picked it up and started to throw it back into play when young Peden, spectators said, came running up and demanded the ball. The fight then started. At this juncture the Elder Peden ran up and the three men milled around until other players came to Allen's rescue. The Pedens ran to their house nearby and Allen was carried to a hospital.

Physicians said the player had sustained one deep puncture of the left lung by a knife blade and also had deep cuts about the neck, arms and abdomen.

Ball players and fans were staging a demonstration on the Peden property when a squad of police arrived and took the Pedens to jail. Both sustained minor cuts and bruises during the encounter. Police said they found a knife on each man.

The elder Peden told officers that he had made repeated efforts to prevent players from coming on his property to recover batted balls and that the fight was the logical outcome as he saw it.

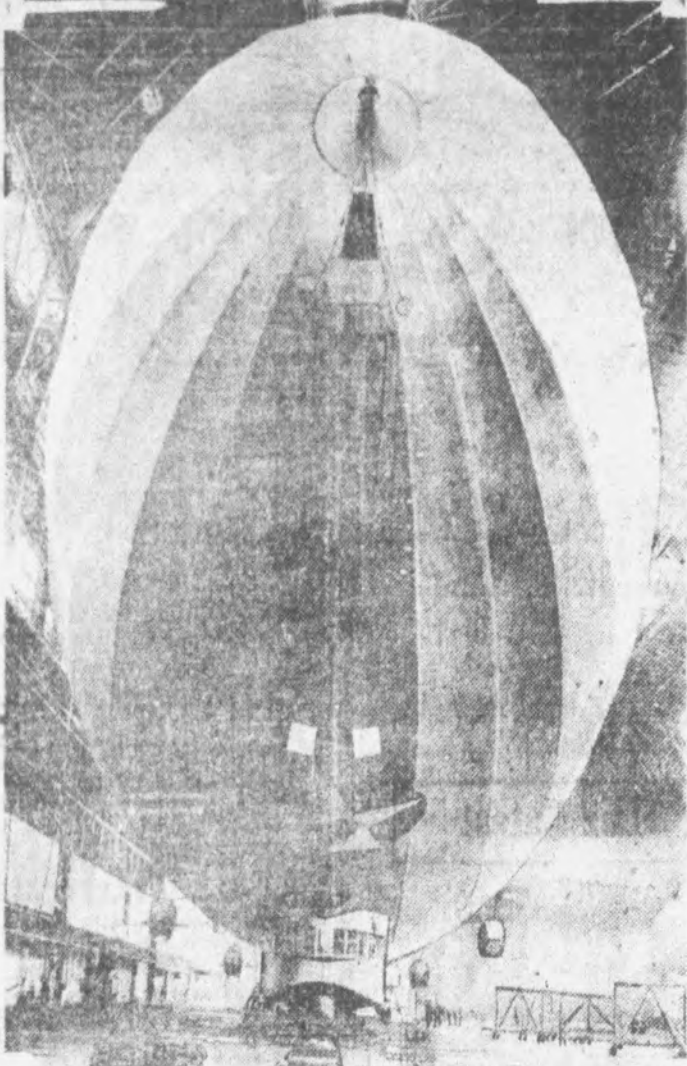

He told officers that he and the boy were especially anxious to secure the ball today as it was to be used along with 80 others and one football similarly obtained in court when the civil suit is heard.

Golden Attracts the Attention of Tax Collectors

Atlanta, Ga., March 29.—(AP)—John Golden, Patterson, N. J., golf professional, gets the attention of income tax collectors interested in the winner of \$4,000 first money in the Southern open tournament.

With a pay to, he defeated Johnny Farrell of Quaker Ridge, N. J., by one stroke in an 18-hole play off Saturday. The two were tied at 84 for the 72 holes after Bobby Jones had won the title with 281, beat out the glory and Farrell 217.

Golden snatched a one stroke advantage on the first green when Farrell dubbed the only short putt he missed during the match. Through 19 holes of brilliant play Golden, with splendid recoveries and at the 18th Golden had snatched a one stroke advantage. Jones missed a shifty long game

with eight one-putt greens to stay fairly even with a steadier opponent, who reeled off the first nine holes in 23, two under par.

At the eighteenth, a one shot hole across water to an elevated green, both drove short into traps. Golden, finding his ball inches in front of a pop corn bag dropped by some spectator, elected to explode the ball. He topped it and sent it across the green under trees. His mind hit a limb. A fourth shot trickled ten feet past the cup leaving him a slide hill putt.

With \$2,250 riding on a mashie-niblick shot out of the trap, Farrell cracked. He was out in three with a fairly long putt for a four but missed it to take five.

Golden, with little ado, sent his 10 foot putt on its \$4,000 ride.

LEXINGTON CLAIMS LARGEST LOOSELEAF MARKET

Lexington, Ky., March 29.—

Lexington has again become the largest looseleaf tobacco market in the world, according to the figures of this week, placing the total sales for the season at 72,632,545 pounds, more than 2,000,000 pounds larger than the next largest market, that at Wilson, N. C.

Lexington was formerly the largest looseleaf market in the world and lost that title after 1921, when the Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association was formed. This year, the association sold all its tobacco over the looseleaf floors and the total sales exceeded any former year by more than 5,000,000 pounds.

The Lexington market also has the distinction of having the largest looseleaf floor in the world, the Big Burley house. A total of 1,093,800 pounds of leaf was disposed of in a single sale at that house, the largest single floor ever sold.

The market at Wilson, N. C., sells fine cured tobacco which is

used principally in the manufacture of cigarettes. The total sales on that market this year amounted to 69,662,233 pounds, \$37,772 pounds short of the seventy million goal that was set. The Wilson market broke the world's record last year with a total sale of 76,000,000 pounds, but it is probable that the Lexington market will exceed that mark before the selling season is over this year.

A total of 4,827,065 pounds of leaf was sold last week for an average price of \$13.53 a hundred, the lowest mark of any week this season. The average for the season has declined to \$14.71 a hundred. Most of the tobacco sold last week on the independent floors was the tail end of the crops and average less than \$10 per hundred. Some good leaf was sold at the Pool houses, averaging \$13.93.

The Burley Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association sold 4,263,020 pounds of the total for the week, and his disposed of 44,962,915 pounds of the season's total. The Lexington market will probably close the end of this week, the date set for the closing of the pool houses.

Spring is indeed here. The first straw hat of the season made its appearance on the streets today.

TOWARD PROSPERITY

The program for farm activity in Pitt county adopted at a recent meeting of the county board of agriculture, if carried out, will be indeed a step toward greater happiness and prosperity in Pitt county. Emphasis was placed upon the fact that for too long farmers of the county have depended almost entirely upon their money crops and passed up the opportunity to make the farm produce a steady year round income. The program outlined by the county farm agent calls for diversification in farming in the county and points out several income producing sidelines for the farmers.

Growing of more potatoes in the county, the bringing in of 600 high producing milk cows, establishment of butterfat market, doubling of acreage of soy beans for hay, selling of \$100,000 worth of butter fat annually, feeding and shipping of 20 car loads of hogs annually, shipping of at least ten car loads of poultry annually and plans for production of higher type tobacco and cotton in the county are included in the program that the department is endeavoring to carry out. The adoption of such a program on the farms of Pitt county will work wonders in this section and will enable the farmer to a great extent to overcome his present financial difficulties. Diversification is the one hope of the Eastern North Carolina farmer and the sooner he gets at it the better.

WATCH YOUR DOG

Other cities about us have been experiencing the mad dog menace and now comes the report that several persons in this city have been bitten by dogs. There is already an ordinance here that prevents dogs from running at large in the city, but this is not enough precaution to take with rabies so prevalent all about us. Persons who have dogs would do well to have them examined and inoculated. The dog that has not been treated with the preventative is indeed unsafe and under no circumstances should the children be permitted to play with the dog that has not been treated.

STONE MOUNTAIN

Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial, daily growing into shape and figure, depicting the likenesses of Davis, Lee and Jackson, stands not in glorification of any one man or woman, nor any one sculptor, politician or special group of people. It stands, even in its incompleteness, as an honor

bestowed upon the armies of the South, who served in the years 1861-65 and to us of the South in the year 1927, who are making possible the building and finishing of the world's greatest monument.

Furthermore, at this time it stands as an everlasting memorial to some 40,000 living veterans of the armies of the Confederacy, who now within the next few days, in thinning ranks, will pass in review, along the streets of Tampa, Florida.

Those who are directing the affairs of Stone Mountain, during the past two weeks, have been the recipients of messages of approval from all southern patriotic and civic organizations, because of a special movement that has been set on foot to signally honor these living veterans.

In addition to the four books of Memory now being created to contain the names of one million children and in honor of those who served the Confederacy, they have started an additional volume to be entirely devoted to the enrollment of the 40,000 living veterans. Besides, a special medal has been designed and struck off for presentation to the veterans. Hundreds of these men marching in Tampa will be wearing these medals. Some of them will not unless we exert ourselves to see that they have them to wear.

There are approximately 4,000 living veterans in North Carolina, only a small number of whom have been enrolled. Many communities have plans under way that will insure every veteran in their county being enrolled. Is our county doing its part? Can we afford to permit representatives from our county to go to Tampa unadorned with this medal? Are you willing to honor these men in a manner that will be appreciated by them? The person who enrolls a living veteran will have his or her name enrolled with that veteran in the Book of Memory. Five dollars will enroll one veteran and help build the Memorial.

Worst of Forest Fires Brought Under Control

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—After covering about 20,000 acres of forest lands, the worst of the forest fires reported yesterday in the southeastern part of the state has been brought under control, the Department of Conservation and Development announced today.

District Forester C. H. Flory of Fayetteville, who made an investigation of the condition on instructions from assistant state forester W. C. McCormick, reported that the worst fire of the section occurred in Sampson county, starting from a slash pile at a saw mill and burned east a distance of six miles, jumping two streams of one hundred feet in width, and finally being stopped at Magnolia road near Clear Run. Burning through the heart of the huckleberry district of Sampson, the fire, according to district forester Flory, destroyed completely the crop over the area which it covered. Mr. Flory took charge of the fire fighting force yesterday afternoon at around five o'clock and reported after working more than five hours that the flames were under control.

cooperation on the part of the county," said Mr. McCormick, "no organized effort was possible in handling the fires except that supplied by the district forester. This, of course, was of little avail when no trained fighters were attempting to handle a fire of this magnitude.

"State owned fire fighting equipment was supplied to a limited number of fire fighters in combating this flame. District forester Flory reported that there were approximately 100 men scattered at various points around the flames, but that their efforts could not be the most effective because of lack of organization."

Neither Onslow, Brunswick, New Hanover, Pender, Sampson nor Cumberland, where forest fires have been reported recently, have organized cooperating forces at this time, and therefore, the fires occurring there are not being handled by state wardens, forester McCormick explained.

At the same time that the flames were raging in these counties, district forester Flory reported that five fires started in Roberson, a cooperating county, within a radius of five miles, and all were under control within the same day in which they started with a small amount of damage.

"As far as we have been able to determine," said McCormick, "all fires reported from cooperating counties have been handled by wardens and placed under control with the least possible damage."

"We have been repeatedly urging that everyone handling fires where they are exposed to spreading to nearby forests keep them under control, and to prevent them from spreading. Statistics show that about 99 per cent of our forest fires are caused from human sources, and if care is always exercised we can cut this number with the resultant damage down to a minimum."

Both Liverpool and the continent were said to be buying here. Private cables said trade calling with Manchester and Continental buying had caused the advance in Liverpool in the absence of selling pressure.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Vienna, March 29.—(INS)—The even elaborate palaces of the Hofburg, the former imperial palace of Vienna, probably will shortly be used for such common public institutions as a coffee house and a cinema. The Socialist government of Vienna which succeeded the imperial regime of Francis Joseph has spared nothing royal or venerable amount the city possesses if it could be capitalized for the benefit of laboring Socialists and their efforts have included already the famous gardens and many parts of the Hofburg.

The gardens have been opened to the public and are crowded in summer with a collection of caga bonds of both sexes and all descriptions and interested is a commercialism represented by numerous small stands where edibles and tobacco are sold.

A section of the basement of the Hofburg, formerly the room occupied by the old Emperor's chief wine stewards and the entrance to his famous cellars, is now a wine cafe, where, with an almost malignant sense of irreverence, those famous old wines which Francis Joseph collected over more than half a century, are being sold to the public.

The royal bottles containing the choicest wines of the old Empire and France collected with infinite care and trouble, and stamped with the Hapsburgs arm are now being tossed about while the company of laborers of all sorts sing their songs and drink the wines once only served at the Royal table.

Radio has become so popular in Austria that hundreds of people are deserting the coffee houses to its tea in at home. The coffee house proprietors have reported a loss of business during the last year which they found to be due to the radio and complained to the government. That institution, of course, could take no action so the proprietors decided to install radio head-phones in a number of cafes to watch the results.

It was found that business picked up immediately and in some cafes increased. Now shortly at Vienna cafes will have radio instruments and instead of complaining of the radio service the proprietors association has notified the broadcast to increase and improve their programs.

Education is gradually coming into its own in the Austrian bureaucracy where birth and fortune friendships have been so important. Under the Republic of course, bureaucracy has lost much of the importance it exercised in the Imperial government but still among the smaller public servants, it is much in evidence. Promotion usually has come only after long and arduous service or generally through the good-will of the men higher up.

Now under recent regulations, more pay and advancement will be given to civil servants possessing certain educational qualities. Fore most will be the ability to speak foreign languages and all tramway employees and policemen qualifying will receive better pay and better jobs.

tred of foreigners, would be criminal. Keep warships off shore. Indefinitely, as an operating base would be impossible.

We do not need war with China, and it would not be a righteous war, once we have rescued our nationals.

Having told Asiatics that they may not live here, it would be playing the hypocrite and bully to object to China's decision that she does not want us or Europeans, on her soil. If we may exclude Asiatics, justly, China may, with equal justice, exclude us.

Business and money are our real interest in this Chinese affair. To fight China would cost taxpayers at least ten times as much as the money involved, one hundred times as much probably, and cost lives also.

If we must protect American dollars and our enterprising business men, why not guarantee them against loss, and pay them off, at the lowest possible cost, without war.

It would have been much cheaper, in the civil war, to buy all the slaves, at a fair price, had that been possible.

It is possible, and it would be sensible, on this occasion to compensate for all losses the steel, oil and other commercial American interests have sustained in China. And it would be cheaper than war.

Our British cousins, never doubt it, will find a way out, without real war. Their choice, naturally, would be to let Uncle Sam do it. But Uncle Sam should know better.

He has recently been lampooned, and, metaphysically, kicked all around the lot in Europe, hatred and despised, because he sent his men and his billions to run a European war, which he might have let alone, as the Japanese did.

If he now makes himself Europe's catpaw in China, he will deserve whatever happens to him. Our big men that demand protection for their dollars in China, should be content to have the country stand their losses, and then be content with business at home. There is plenty of it.

Every American will approve whatever may be necessary to rescue citizens of this country, in danger on Chinese soil. But when that has been done, our part in the war should end.

If it is desirable to save from death business men and missionaries, it is equally desirable to avoid sending American soldiers to death. The fact that they are not missionaries or business men would not justify sacrificing them.

There will be an abundance of stories, some true, more false, to stimulate a demand for war. You remember the yarns, since proved to be lies, about German soldiers mauling enemy soldiers up, alive, cutting off the arms of children, etc. Such stories, much embellishing, will come from China. And some will be true, for a revolutionary mob is not gentle.

Stories are already sent from China, telling of missionaries' fingers cut off, to get rings from their fingers, and of American women outrageously treated. The usual details, and some, probably true, unfortunately.

All the more reason for getting our people out of China, then calling back our troops and ships.

Russia seems inclined to take China in hand. LET HER DO IT. In a few months Russia will be advertising for some one to take a Chinese elephant off her hands.

Many European nations have interests in China. Britain more than any nation. Those other nations will find good reasons for keeping out of actual war. That is what we should do.

In this emergency, it is quite safe to count on President Coolidge's common sense. He knows that fighting China would be like th we ragaist rabbits in Australia. It was almost impossible to conquer those rabbits, although they did not fight back. China would fight back, and fight well.
