SITUATION IN CHINA MORE MENACING

JAPANESE - AMERICAN BLUE JACKETS CLASH WITH THE CANTONESE

Situation Throughout China Described as More Serious. Reparation Demand to Go Forward at Once

(By the Associated Press)
Further disorders and continued spread of the area affected by the Nationalist movement marked developments over the week-end in China.

American and Japanese blue-jackets were involved in fighting with Chinese at two widely separated points.

The Americans, charged with guarding the steamer Chinan near Chungking in the upper Yangtze valley, shot and wounded four Chinese who attempted to capture the vessel.

The Japanese faced with a serious situation at Hankow, sent of the Cantonese regime, wounded two Chinese when a mob invaded the Japanese concession. Ten Japanese, including five sailors, were reported carried off by the mob.

The Cantonese are pressing their drive northward in the direction of Peking and the exodus of foreign women and children from the northern capital continues. American and other foreign residents of Kailan, to the northwest have left for Tientsin, near the coast.

Americans are also leaving Canton in Southern China and a gunboat has arrived there. The port of Amoy has been closed on orders from Peking in consequence of Chinese strikes.

The labor situation in Shanghai remains disturbed. Banners in the northern native section, facing the British lines say "evacuate British troops and warships or suffer!"

British officials, while awaiting news of the American government's attitude say a protest and demand for reparation for the Nanking outrages will be sent to the Cantonese in a few days either as a joint measure or as separate but identical notes from the powers.

Eugene Chen, Cantonese foreign minister, is quoted as declaring that the Nationalist revolution is not Communist, although Communists are collaborating with the Kuomintang, or Republican revolutionary party.

General Chang Kai-Shek, Cantonese Generalissimo who has been at odds with the Kuomintang left wing, announces that he will confine himself in the future to pushing the military campaign against the northerners.

The Cantonese are reported to have sprung a coup in Yunnan, one of the most southerly provinces, making the governor a virtual prisoner.

Some foreign newspapers criticize Briand's Chinese policy declaring that he is counting on a Cantonese victory and is thus "putting all his eggs in one basket."

Canton, April 4.—(AP)—A general exodus of Americans from Canton to Hong Kong is under way. The American gunboat Pampanga has arrived here. A British gunboat has gone to Wuchow to protect the Britishers at that place.

Shanghai, April 4.—(AP)—Americans and other foreigners are leaving points in central and western Chihli province as the Cantonese continue their steady advance toward Peking from the south. The exodus of foreign women and children from Peking itself also continues.

Women and Children of Baptist Missions Removed to Japan

Women and children connected with the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board who were located on who took refuge at Shanghai have been taken to Japan for safety, and the men of the mission are to follow as soon as possible. Dr. J. F. Love, corresponding secretary of the board, was advised today by cable.

Dr. Love was unable to give an estimate of the number of Baptist missionaries and their families who were concentrated at Shanghai, but thought that all missionaries in the Central and interior missions of China had taken refuge there.

NATIONAL GUARDS MAY BE USED IN CHICAGO ELECTION

In Meantime Political Parties Maneuvering to Gain Control of Nation

Chicago, April 4.—(AP)—Possibility that national guardsmen might patrol Chicago streets on mayoralty election day, Tuesday to preserve order, loomed today as a result of a conference of Adjutant General Charles E. Black with guard officer and Sheriff Charles E. Graydon.

Should the guard be summoned the situation would be unique in Chicago history, for never before has an election been conducted under the protecting rifles of militia.

Sheriff Graydon several days ago asked that Governor Small hold himself in readiness to receive a call for troops because of what he termed a serious situation. He charged that partisans of Mayor William E. Dever, Democratic candidate for re-election, were attempting to induce a race riot to harm the candidacy of Former Mayor William Hale Thompson, Republican.

Adjutant General Black, who issued a brief statement after meeting the sheriff and major general Roy D. Keeha, commanding the 33rd division, said he would remain in Chicago to study the situation at close hand.

Britain will do anything to maintain her property and prestige in China, because SHE MUST. Three hundred million Asiatics ruled by Britain in India are watching China, and asking themselves, "If four hundred million Asiatics can drive the British out of CHINA, why can not we drive them out of INDIA."

Because her prestige in Asia and throughout the empire requires it, Britain will do whatever she must to hold her position at trade and localized authority in China, under treaties long recognized.

And the British War Department will bomb the Chinese, use all modern war methods, if argument fails.

But what about this country. There is no MUST for us. We have no empire in Asia staked on our ability to co-erce China. Some big oil interests are involved, but those could be bought off, for less than any little war would cost.

France and Japan show us what should be done. Japan will protest against actions of the Chinese mobs, but use no force, that is the latest announcement. France will look on, let Britain attend to China, with help of the country if we are fools enough to create a serious quarrel with an unfortunate country, torn by revolution and civil war.

We are friendly to Great Britain, and should like to cooperate with the British in maintaining world peace. But we are, let us hope, not going to start a Chinese war, to solidify British prestige in China.

Britain has great influence here. Our biggest international banking institution, as much British as it is American, and owing the revival of its fortunes to England and the big war, has great influence with our national administration.

Millions of Americans that would pay the bills, business men of this country whose prosperity unnecessary war would menace, are interested in this Chinese question.

In the big war we pulled chestnuts out of the fire for all Europe, to the tune of ten billions spent abroad and fifty billions spent, squandered and grafted at home.

Are we going to spend more billions, kill more men, because Britain needs to beat China, to preserve her Asiatic prestige, and Indian empire?

The British government, it is said, urging this country to join in coercing China. "finds our attitude disappointingly vague." Let's hope our attitude will become definite and take this form: NO, THANKS, we are not professional, incurable chestnut pullers. We intend to protect our own citizens by taking them out of China. Then we shall leave China to the Chinese, as we keep America for Americans. If our British brothers feel that they must have a Chinese war, that is their affair. We shall neither share it nor finance it.

CONFEDERATES BEGIN ARRIVING AT TAMPA FOR ANNUAL REUNION

Tampa, Fla., April 4.—(AP)—Followers of Lee and Jackson in the War Between the States were arriving today for the 37th annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans which opens tomorrow and continues through Friday. Sons of Confederate Veterans and members of the Confederate South Memorial Association were to hold their annual meetings at the same time.

Registration offices were opened at several places in the city and the work of welcoming the veterans and assigning them to quarters was handled with dispatch, authorities said.

General M. D. Vance, commander-in-chief and General Harry Rene Lee, adjutant general and chief of staff, were not expected until late this afternoon.

POLICE CAPTURE KIDNAPPERS OF EDGAR WILKINS

Ten Year Old Son of Engineer Identifies Captors in Mexican City

Mexico City, April 4.—(AP)—Members of the band which kidnapped and murdered Edgar M. Wilkins, an American electrical engineer, were in the custody of the Mexican authorities at Guadalajara today.

They were captured by the local police near there after having been sought since a week ago last Sunday by federal troops. Three of the men captured were said to have confessed that Wilkins was killed because the members of the band were enraged over the close pursuit.

The ten year old son of Wilkins, who was captured with his father identified Miriano Calzadilla, one of the men taken in custody, as the leader of the kidnapers. The youth had been released by Mexicans shortly after the capture and sent back to Guadalajara with a note demanding a ransom of \$20,000 for the father.

His father, Isidoro Perez and Vincente Perolsado were the other men arrested. From information given by Calzadilla they were hopeful of capturing others of the band.

Wilkins' home was Savannah, Ga. He had resided with his wife in Mexico for 15 years. Government officials said the murder of the American appeared to have the earmarks of a plot to embarrass the Government of President Calles and possibly cause trouble with the United States who had protested against the kidnapping and murder.

Secret service men were dispatched by the Government to Guadalajara to investigate the case. The body of Wilkins was found today and taken into Guadalajara, where his widow resides.

ARREST MEMBERS OF DOPE RING

Raleigh, N. C., April 4.—(AP)—Three men were arrested and a quantity of drugs seized here today as Coroner Waring began an investigation of the death of Howard Scott.

Scott died in a local hospital early today as a result, according to physicians, of an overdose of opiate.

Those under arrest are J. G. and Joe Hill, brothers, and "Red" Hopkins.

Scott was carried to the hospital in an unconscious condition Sunday afternoon from a shack occupied by the Hill brothers.

The coroner stated that he had information which would probably lead to the smashing of a big narcotics "ring."

Sporadic Peace Moves Feature Coal Strike

Chicago, April 4.—(AP)—Sporadic moves for peace marked the opening of a new week in the coal mining controversy that brought idleness to more than 1,000,000 men when the Jacksonville wage pact expired last Thursday night.

Illinois operators and union officials will meet at St. Louis Friday, while a conference of Indiana strip mine operators and union officials has been called for Terre Haute on Thursday. Southern Illinois operators will confer with Rice Miller, president of the Illinois Coal Operators Association in St. Louis on Friday.

Governor John Hammill of Iowa, said he hoped to "make some headway within six days," after announcing he would ask both sides to meet with the Iowa Industrial and Agricultural Commission.

Confidentially it appeared that a conference of Ohio operators and miners planned for Thursday at Columbus, might not be held. Lee Hall, president of the Ohio district mine workers, asserted that the conference invitation extended by operators was so worded as to commit the miners to discussion only of a reduction in wages and that the workers would not meet on this basis.

A number of smaller mines in the central competitive field resumed operations today under temporary agreements pending final settlement of the controversy. Two small mines in the eastern Ohio sub-district were the latest added to the temporary ranks.

FAVOR ROUTE BY NICARAGUA

Enlargement of Panama Canal Considered by Military Leaders of Nation

Washington, April 4.—(AP)—Military men in considering the problem of the enlargement of the Panama Canal or the construction of a new Atlantic-Pacific waterway are inclined to favor utilization of the long projected route across Nicaragua.

This is predicted upon the theory that where an enemy might be kept open for the movement of the battle fleet, convoy and supply train from one coast to the other.

Surveys of the Nicaraguan route have been made from time to time and a new one may be ordered by President Coolidge who is giving thought to increasing canal facilities because of the ever mounting load of traffic through the Panama waterway.

The President is expected to discuss the situation in his next annual message to Congress in December and in reaching a conclusion as to the direction in which relief is to be applied he undoubtedly will consult both military and naval experts.

The last estimate of the cost of the Nicaraguan route, made four years ago by army engineers at the request of President Harding, was one billion dollars. The cost of increasing the lock facilities at Panama is placed at from \$150,000,000 to \$250,000,000.

RALEIGH LAWYER DELIVERS FINAL B.Y.P.U. ADDRESS

Regional Convention Adjourned Yesterday Following Three Day Session

The three day regional B. Y. P. U. convention which convened at the Immanuel Baptist Church in this city last Friday night, was brought to a conclusion yesterday by an address by R. N. Simms, prominent lawyer and church worker of Raleigh.

The final service was probably one of the most interesting of the entire three days' session, it being marked by a musical program of exceptional merit by members of a glee club from the East Carolina Teachers College, and forceful talks by prominent members of the B. Y. P. U. organization.

In his address upon the subject, "The Wealth of Youth," Mr. Simms showed that hope, faith, honor, a sense of justice, and vision constituted the wealth of youth of today. He made an impassioned plea in behalf of church work, and said that only through consecration to the advancement of God's kingdom could any life be what it should.

Other addresses were delivered by Messrs. G. W. of Wake Forest; Miss Log Fleetwood, of Jackson and Hon. Bryce Little of Wilkeson, president of the Roanoke Association.

Saturday night's session of the convention was an equally important one. Dr. Charles Brewer, of Raleigh, president of Meredith College, was the principal speaker at this session. Dr. Brewer used as his subject, "With All Thy Getting, Get Wisdom." He stressed the importance of education in the development of God's kingdom, and said that every effort should be made to give a college education to as many children as possible.

Devotional exercises were led by Miss Ida Ballance, of Rocky Mount.

The musical program was given by members of the Glee Club of the East Carolina Teachers College. This program was probably one of the best of the entire session.

An illustrated lecture was given by Rev. A. R. Phillips, of Nashville. He showed vivid pictures of conditions as they prevail in the missionary fields of South America, and the work that is being accomplished by representatives of the Baptist denomination. As each picture was thrown upon the screen, he attempted to show its bearing upon the lives of the South American populace, and told of what the various missions are doing to effect an improvement in the religious and economic life of the country.

A committee on resolutions expressed its appreciation to the people of Greenville for the hospitality they were receiving, and the many things done for their comfort and convenience. All sessions of the convention were largely attended. The church was packed almost to overflowing at each evening's service by the four hundred delegates in attendance and numbers of visitors from members of other denomination of the city.

Italian Aviator Hops off Again

San Antonio, Texas, April 4.—(AP)—Commander Francisco De Pinedo, Italian aviator, hopped off Medina Lake near here at 8:03 a. m. for Elephant Butte Reservoir, near Hot Springs, N. M., on another leg of his aerial tour of four continents. He did not leave the vicinity of the lake until 8:50 however, having first thoroughly tested his plane. This would not put him into Hot Springs between 3 to 4 o'clock this afternoon, barring unforeseen delays.

Commander De Pinedo was aided by a slight breeze which assisted the plane in getting off the water. A dead calm yesterday morning prevented the Italian aviator taking off the lake with the heavy cargo of gasoline he had stored aboard for his 600 mile flight.

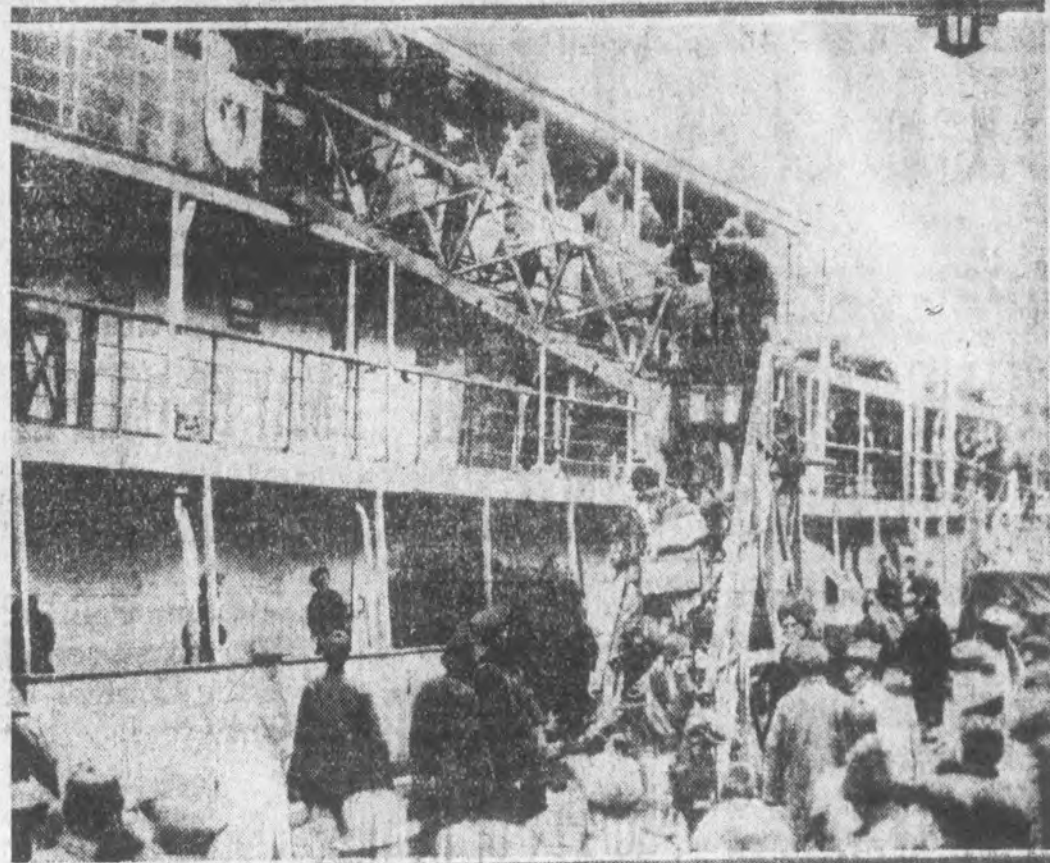

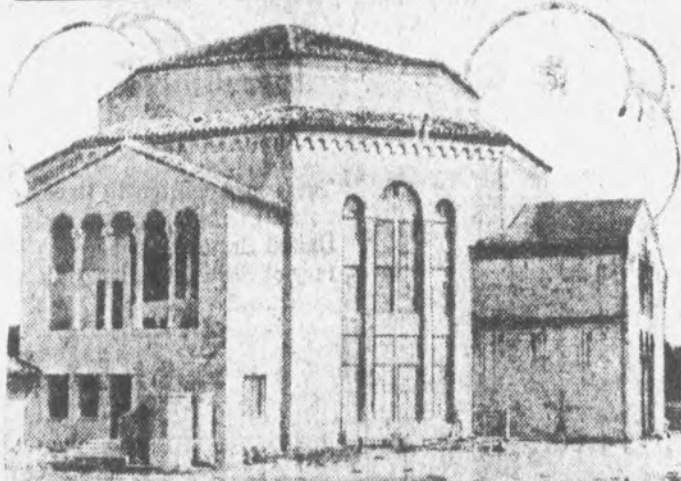

Americans in China Concentrated



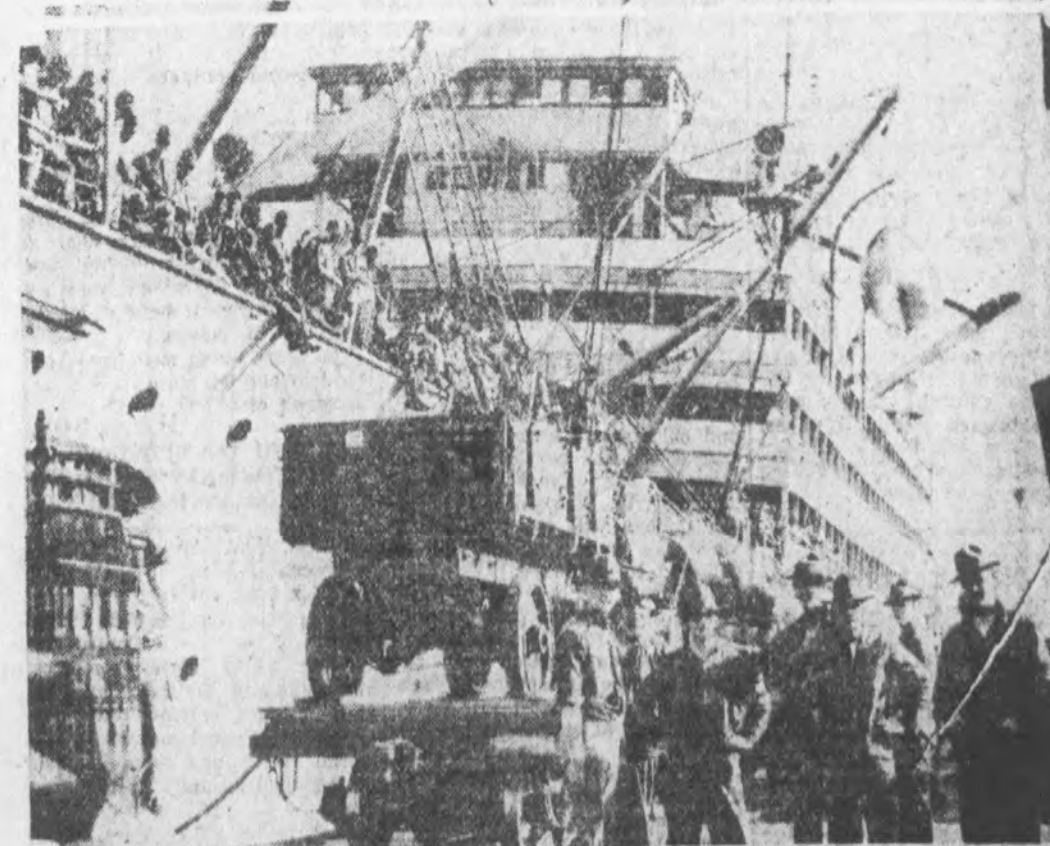

Grenade Corps Flings Death at Cantonese



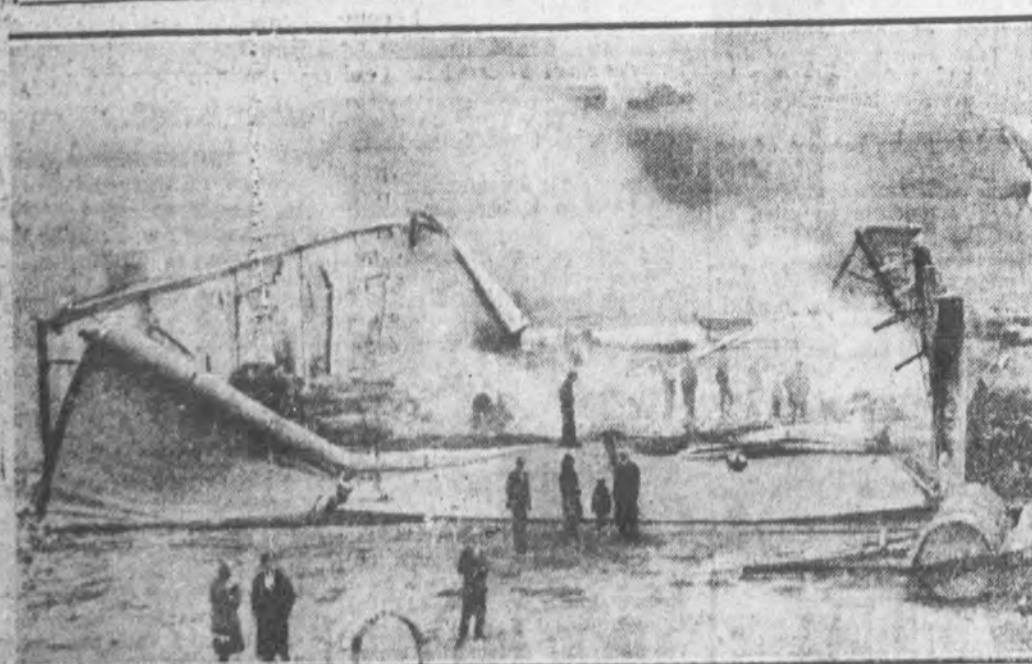

BREWER SPEAKS BEFORE BAPTISTS

President of Meredith College at Memorial Baptist Church Sunday

He declared that sin plays the most dominant part in ruining the beautiful lives of men and women. Intellectual beauty is reflected externally, and a wicked or sinful person cannot express anything but what he is.

OUR QUEENS

Today marks the opening of the annual Eastern Carolina Exposition, in Rocky Mount, and with it the annual contest in which the beauty queens of Eastern Carolina are chosen. COW, HOG AND HEN

Emphasis is laid on the cow, hog and hen program, as fitting in with all types of farming, and applicable to all parts of the South, in a special edition of the Southern Field, just issued by the Development Service of the Southern Railway System. It is made up principally of articles written by Southern Railway System Agricultural Agents, pointing out the opportunities for profits from diversified crops, livestock and poultry, with many illustrations showing in dollars and cents the profits that have been made by individual farmers from livestock, poultry and crops other than cotton.

It is pointed out that, by diversification, the growing of special crops, production of dairy and poultry products and raising of sheep and hogs, the farmer may have a profitable income throughout the year, even more than sufficient to pay all farm and living expenses, leaving the proceeds of cotton or other major crop as clear net profit at the end of the year.

Such a program is one that should be followed on every farm in this county and section if we are to overcome the dull season in each year commonly known in this section as the starvation period on farms and in all lines of business.

BANKING HABITS ENCOURAGE THRIFT

The American people have had much teaching, particularly during and since the World War, in the doctrine of thrift. We have made some measurable progress along that line, to be sure. A century ago the savings banks deposits in this country were less than \$1,250,000; today they are about \$25,000,000,000. 70 years ago there were 8,365 depositors in savings institutions; today these have increased to 40,000,000. The size and number of

banks and similar financial organizations have increased tremendously in recent years, and a glance at the daily news dispatches indicates that this expansion has by no means reached its maximum. In the matter of dollars and cents we as a nation are becoming well placed in the thrifty class.

A NEW FARM CROP

A suggestion that the agricultural problem might be solved to some extent if poor farm lands were converted into forests, was made by President Coolidge in proclaiming April 24 to 30, as "American Forest Week," and recommending its observance to the Governors of the 48 States.

"One-fourth of our soil," the President said, "is better suited to timber growing than anything else. I cannot escape the conviction that our industrial and agricultural stability will be strengthened by bringing into full productive use this great empire of land."

"Although much progress has been made in public forestry, and hopeful beginnings in private industry, we still have a vast aggregate of idle or semi-idle forest land, and another large aggregate of poor farm land that might profitably grow timber instead of adding to the problem of agricultural overproduction."

"Our migratory forest industries would be stabilized and made permanent. Rural industry would be greatly strengthened and vitalized. Agriculture would find in silviculture a strong ally, providing markets for farm produce and for surplus labor. Our farms themselves contain nearly a third of our woodland — an enormous potential farm asset if handled for continuous timber crops."

The President said, he proclaimed the seventh annual observance of forest week, which Canada had decided to celebrate at the same time, in the realization that "no other of our internal problems is of greater moment than the rehabilitation of our forests."

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris, April 4.—(INS)—Seemingly to step right out of an old fairy tale, a tiny little princess has come to Paris from the Far East. It is the Princess of Afghanistan, the daughter of the Ameer, not clothed in fine silks and satins and wearing pearls and rubies, but dressed just like all smart Parisian children, with little half-socks and bobbed hair.

Sultane Djan is only seven years old and is probably the first little woman of her race to make the long journey across mountains, deserts and sea. She came with her grandfather, Monsieur Tarzi, former Afghan minister to Paris and her father's sister, Princess Cohna. Her father, who now calls himself, King Amanullah, has been modeling Afghanistan for the past eight years, and this trip is an expression of his desire to have Afghanistan benefit by the best of Western civilization, all the while maintaining his independence.

When the young king came to the throne after the assassination of his father, woman occupied her usual inferior position. He established schools for women and tried to make their lives more pleasant. Certain Moslem tribes were much stirred up over this, revolted and the schools were closed. But King Amanullah continued to fight for his cause and finally obtained a ruling from high Mohammedan authorities to allow the education of women and the schools were opened up again.

The little Princess will remain in the capital about six months, seeing all that she can with her soft black eyes, perfecting her French and making her first contact with Western civilization. She is a little bewildered by the fast taxis in the crowded streets and thinks that the French dolls are just about the nicest things that even a fairy could make.

Louis the Fourteenth's Latin exercise, written when he was a mere slip of a boy, nine years old, is among the collection of interesting historical documents and fragments of the "Roi Soleil" period which is now to be seen at the Bibliotheque Nationale in Paris. There are also exquisite engravings of the epoch, the funeral orations of Bossuet, the testament of Racine, first editions of Moliere, Corneille and Scudery, together with original copies of the letters of Madame de Sevigne written to her daughter. Other valuable documents on exhibition are the original treaty ending the war with Spain, the warrant for the arrest of Fouquet, the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes, and, most important of all, a little notebook with the last celebrated words of the "Grand Roy": "Mon on, j'ai trop aime la guerre" (My on, I loved war too much.)

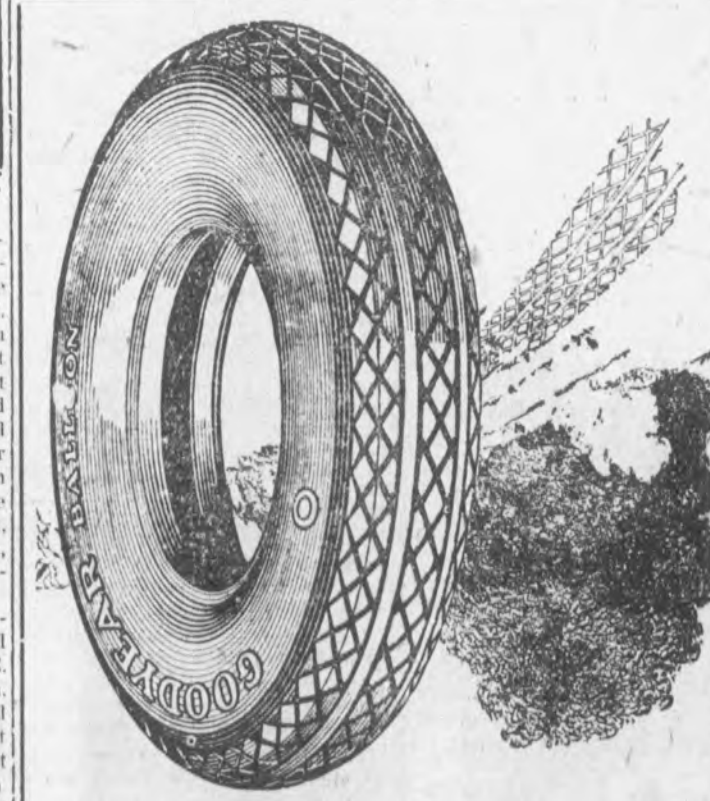
