MORE ANTI-AMERICAN AGITATION REPORTED PREVALENT IN CHINA

American Gunboats May be Forced to Leave Yangtse River Because Strike Cut off Coal Supply

Shanghai, April 6.—(AP)—Anti-American agitation, taking the form of a strike and a boycott of American goods, has broken out at Changsha, capital of the province of Hunan, in Southern China. A wireless dispatch from that place today said the strike and boycott went into effect at noon Monday and reported that the American consular staff had been ordered to leave the city. The whole province of Hunan will be evacuated by foreigners shortly because of labor and anti-foreign manifestations.

Kiangsi, on the Yangtse River in Kiangsi province, reported that a general strike against all foreigners has been called to begin at noon today, while at Hankow, headquarters of the Cantonese, or Nationalist government, all business was virtually at a standstill.

Japanese civilians boarded steamships on the Yangtse, making ready to evacuate Hankow, about 100 French, Belgians and Swiss remained in the city. British and Americans took quarters close to the waterfront so as to be ready to leave at short notice. The Americans in Hankow number about 105. Several heads of American firms applied to the American consul general for his approval of their remaining at their posts but he informed them they would stay at their own risk.

The state of affairs south of the Yangtse River, caused by anti-foreign agitation, appears to be growing steadily worse. The civil war situation north of the great river is becoming more precarious further toward the Northern capital, Peking.

For the moment the objectives of the Cantonese are Tientsin, capital of Shantung, and Tientsin, strategic railway center of the North.

Marshall Chang Tso-Lin, the Northern war chief, it is felt here, can hold Peking only so long as he is able to retain possession of Tientsin, for that railway center provides the only means of communication with the Northern forces.

Americans and Britishers in the territory through which it is expected the Cantonese now will make their way are hastily seeking points of safety.

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—Fears of an interruption to shipping on the Yangtse River, which would hamper activities of American and other gunboats engaged in evacuating foreigners to the Chinese coast, were communicated today to the navy department.

Rear Admiral Hough of the American Yangtse patrol force, reported that virtually all ships in the Yangtse area were coal burners and a shortage of fuel, caused by serious labor troubles, may require that the craft be sent to Shanghai.

The only alternative, it was said, would be the shipment of coal from Shanghai to the river patrol vessels which, in the opinion of many department officials, would seriously embarrass those in charge of the Yangtse evacuation.

SAYS COOLIDGE WILL NOT BE CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENCY

New York, April 6.—(AP)—The Herald Tribune today quotes Senator Moses of New Hampshire, as saying President Coolidge will not be a candidate for re-election next year.

"Mr. Coolidge's psychology is such that he does not want to be confronted with four years of diminishing," said the Senator.

Road Commission Discusses Taking on More Mileage

Raleigh, April 6.—(AP)—The problem of picking county road mileage to be taken over by the State Highway Commission under provisions made by the recent General Assembly, confronts the commission today and tomorrow.

The amount of new mileage probably will be the outstanding question of the session.

The commission met in executive session this morning. This afternoon and tomorrow the commission planned to hear requests from delegations representing a majority of the road governing bodies of the counties and decided to consider only those roads approved by the local road bodies.

The General Assembly authorized the commission to take over as much as 20 per cent of its present mileage but the request from counties involve roads at most equalling the present mileage.

New laws pertaining to the commission were discussed in executive session.

Thompson Victorious In Chicago Mayoralty Race

Chicago, April 6.—(AP)—William Hale Thompson, former cowboy, landed the mayor's chair in Chicago's biggest election yesterday, and prepared to ride into the city hall with a plurality of 52,972 votes in his saddle bag.

The sun of a beautiful election day barely had sunk in the west where Thompson won punching victory, when his election was over but the shooting and rioting continued until the sun had trotted around the world and appeared again in the east.

Nearly one million votes were cast. Thompson received 512,749, Mayor William E. Dever, Democrat, seeking a second term, got 429,668, and Dr. John Dill Bigham, Republican, carried for an insurgent Republican faction, was a poor third with 51,264.

Viewed by wards, Thompson and Dever split nearly even, Dever carrying 23 and Thompson 27 wards. The second, third and fourth wards, strongholds for the Southside negro vote, went prodigiously for Thompson. Of his 52,972 plurality, those wards contributed 52,215. Thompson running better than 4 to 1 ahead of Mayor Dever there.

Besides the four year term as mayor, Thompson also apparently won control of the council, having the promise of support from 18 of the 39 aldermen chosen at the February 22 primaries to which were added probably 16 favorable aldermen yesterday.

Despite foreboding of bloodshed and disorder, and much viewing with alarm by enforcement agencies, the election was one of the quietest in California's history. "As quiet as a quaker funeral," said the detective bureau called in.

NEW BERN SUFFERS FIRE LOSS TODAY

New Bern, N. C. April 6.—(AP)—Fire of undetermined origin early today gutted the Kafer building and routed two families from their apartments on the second and third floors and did damage estimated to be in excess of \$30,000.

The fire was discovered about 2:30 a. m. and for a time it looked as if it would get beyond the control of the local department. Calls for aid were sent to Kinston and Morehead City, both responding promptly. The run from Kinston here was made in 33 minutes, while from Morehead the time was 45 minutes.

Three stories, in addition to Kafer's bakery, in the baking room of which the fire started, occupied the first floor. These, the Merit shoe store, Hibbard's jewelry store and the A. and P. store suffered only water and smoke damage as a solid brick wall prevented the flames from reaching the stocks.

The bakery, however, was a complete loss, partially covered by insurance. Also the household goods of A. A. Kafer and Vance E. Swift, number of the high school faculty, were either burned or made worthless by water and smoke.

Quite Prosperous, Thanks. We Don't NEED A War. Chicago's Busy Day. Uncoth Bolsheviks. (By Arthur Brisbane)

Some seem to be prosperous. In 1924, 75 citizens told Uncle Sam they had incomes of a million dollars a year or more. This year 207 announced \$1,000,000 or more yearly. Eighty-two per cent of the people pay no income tax. And fewer than one in a hundred pay 95 per cent of the total tax. They feel badly about it, but many that pay no tax would change places.

Americans at Shanghai ask Uncle Sam to join Britain in an effort to coerce China. 115,000,000 Americans would rather pay their fare home to the United States, which would be cheaper, more friendly.

We could not conquer China without killing thousands of non-combatants including many women and children. This nation would not like that job. If China does not need us we do not need China. In any case, we do not want to shoot crowds of non-combatant Chinese.

Admiral Williams says Chinese natives are indulging in "hate demonstrations" against America, Britain and Japan, because of the shooting of Chinese natives. We might organize "hate demonstrations" here if Asiatics were shot one by Americans, even offering plausible reasons.

This is Chicago's busy day, and Chicago's citizens take the solemn duty of voting seriously. Nearly a million votes will be cast while police with machine guns and other prophylactic apparatus will be out to protect voting citizens, or the interest of candidates, as the case may be. And state troops will be held ready should events become too lively for the police.

SPECIAL SESSION IS NOT PROBABLE

Preparations to Bring Suit to Test New Laws are Now Being Made

Raleigh, April 6.—(AP)—Chances of the North Carolina General Assembly being called in special session to correct alleged technical blunders of its last gathering faded today.

Chester B. Masslich, New York bond attorney, was on his way to Tallahassee, Fla., after spending yesterday here exposing alleged flaws in the county finance and permanent improvements bond issue measures.

Conferences between Mr. Masslich, Secretary of State W. M. Everett, and Frank Nash, assistant Attorney General, resulted in announcement that injunction proceedings against Secretary Everett to halt printing of the public law containing the alleged imperfect statutes would be brought as a means of testing their validity.

Preparations for bringing the suit were under way today, and the whole matter took on more of an aspect of testing the final authority of journals of the House and Senate, than of the possibility of calling a special session of the legislature to make it possible for counties to borrow money and levy taxes and for state institutions to build buildings promised them by the Assembly.

One of the main flaws detected by Mr. Masslich, it developed today, was an amendment to the county finance act excluding Rockingham county, alleged not to have passed separate readings as required.

"A mare's nest," state officials more or less unanimously branded the whole business after the first flurry of special session talk.

Assistant Attorney General Nash expressed the opinion that such purely technical matters would not serve to invalidate the measures of such importance to the extent of necessitating a special session.

Decade Since America's Entry In World War Has Wrought Many Changes

Those Who Signed War Resolution Have Passed On; Military Leaders Have Retired And Hospitals House Wounded Thousands.

(By Kirke L. Simpson)

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—The decade that for Americans envisions the Great War has gone trooping down the corridors of time. Ten years ago today the call to arms was shrilling in every town and hamlet under the stars and stripes.

The war resolution passed the House at 3 o'clock this morning, say the yellowing records. Already it has cleared the Senate and the House roll call in the early hours of the new day showed 373 to 56 for the war declaration, with every amendment to limit the powers of the President in the light of overwhelming defeat. Already, too, the President's call for the first billion dollars for the war chest lay on the desks in Congress and army and navy orders for mobilization of the first two million young Americans for the struggle would mean the President's command.

In the House, as the call of the roll proceeded, Janet Rankin of Montana, the only woman member, with bowed head, unswerving as her name was twice called.

"Vote! Vote!" came cries from the floor around her.

"I want to stand by my country, but I can not vote for war," she sobbed back as she stood to reply, grasping at her desk for support.

There was cheering a little later when the totals were announced and Speaker Champ Clark affixed his name to the resolution. By 3:30 the House had adjourned.

Just after noon Vice President Marshall added his signature and the resolution was on its way to President Wilson. Already the wires had carried orders to seize the German shipping in American harbors.

The scene shifted to the White House.

"The war resolution was signed by the President at 1:11 o'clock," said another message sent humming over the wires.

"The President signed with a pen handed him by Mrs. Wilson, and which he will preserve."

"The President also signed a proclamation formally declaring a state of war between the United States and Germany."

That let loose the mobilization orders. Already the recruiting of

fices were swarming with eager volunteers.

The ten years since that day have brought to the grave all three of the men whose names are written on the war resolution. Wilson, Marshall and Clark. Only a bare handful remain to struggle with the freight of aftermath of war.

Soldierly Pershing, his years of active service ended, presides now over the commission on American graves in France, busying himself with affairs of that legion of the army—that was, who will never be mustered out or come home.

Clemenceau, Tiger of France, heavy with years, dreams away the days in peace remote from public affairs; "Papa" Joffre, pipe in mouth, takes his ease, careless of his great honors in the placid contentment of his home.

Hals, who saw it through from Mons to the Marne and back against Mons and victory, is now a country gentleman. Lloyd George, England's war premier, stirs with politics at home.

Not far away, as the crow flies, William of Germany lives his latter days in exile and seclusion.

Name by name, the years have taken toll of them. Only those two master soldiers, Hindenburg and Foch, go on in the heat of great post-war problems. Hindenburg as President of the new German Republic; Foch still France's most trusted son in the hour of battle peril.

The ten years have seen vast changes in the men and the material with which the great war was fought. There remain unknown in the graves of France more than 1,000 Americans killed in battle, while another 1,100 are unaccounted for; survivors are supplies aggregating an original cost of more than \$3,000,000,000 have been sold or transferred with a return to the government of around \$100,000,000 and the wastage by death among the 3,000,000 men discharged from the army in 1919 is physically fit to serve again, has made heavy inroads on the trained veterans on whom the country can rely.

By 1925 the total of these veterans between the ages of 18 and 38 had dropped to 2,800,000 and of those a steadily increasing number were unavailable for front line duty by reason of dependence, or (Continued on page six)

Says Newspapers Have a Right to Demand Records

Charlotte, April 6.—(AP)—Records of arresting officers in North Carolina are public documents and as such newspapermen have a right to demand access to them, Superior court Judge T. B. Finley held here today.

The ruling was made in issuing an order on the sheriff of Alexander county to turn over to a reporter for the Charlotte News the names of six persons jailed at Taylorsville last Monday on liquor charges. The action of the judge sets a precedent in North Carolina, it was said, and is one of the few such cases ever reported in the country.

In a story published here today quoting the judge's order, the News Charlotte men had been arrested at Taylorsville and their automobile seized when a quantity of liquor was found in the car. She sheriff and chief of police both refused to divulge the names of the men held to the News correspondent at Taylorsville. The court order then was secured and a reported left this morning for Taylorsville armed with it.

21 Connected With Immoral Play Face Jail Sentences

New York, April 6.—(AP)—Mae West, author-star and her 21 associates in "Sex," raided Broadway play, today faced jail sentences.

The entire company, two managers and the Morals Producing Company, the financing corporation, were convicted yesterday by a jury of presenting a play tending to corrupt the morals of youth.

Bail was continued pending sentence April 19. The law provides penalties of not less than ten days nor more than a year in jail, or not less than \$50 nor more than \$1,000 fine, or both.

INTER-CONTINENTAL FLIGHT OF ITALIAN ENDS IN DISASTER

Roosevelt Dam, Ariz., April 6.—(AP)—The intercontinental flight of Commander Francesco De Pinedo came to disaster and at 12:05 today when the Santa Maria caught fire as the plane was being put under way preparatory to taking off for San Diego from Roosevelt Dam.

The Santa Maria had arrived here at 10:15 a. m., Mountain Time, from Elephant Butte Dam, N. M., and had stopped at Roosevelt Lake to refuel. The Italian flyer, who flew over dangerous Brazilian jungles without mishap, had intended to reach San Diego by 4 p. m. Pacific Time.

The plane is a total loss. Commander De Pinedo and his crew escaped uninjured.

At 12:05 p. m., the Italian aviator announced he was ready to take off and the craft on the lake had moved shoreward, when the Santa Maria was seen to be afire. Almost immediately the hydroplane was aflame from stem to stern. The vessel's crew leaped overboard for their lives.

Commander De Pinedo paused after word had been given for the start toward San Diego to say goodbye to Glenn Hill, manager of Apache Lodge. Before the farewell was finished the plane was a mass of flames. Only the skeleton of the big aircraft remains floating on the waters of Lake Roosevelt.

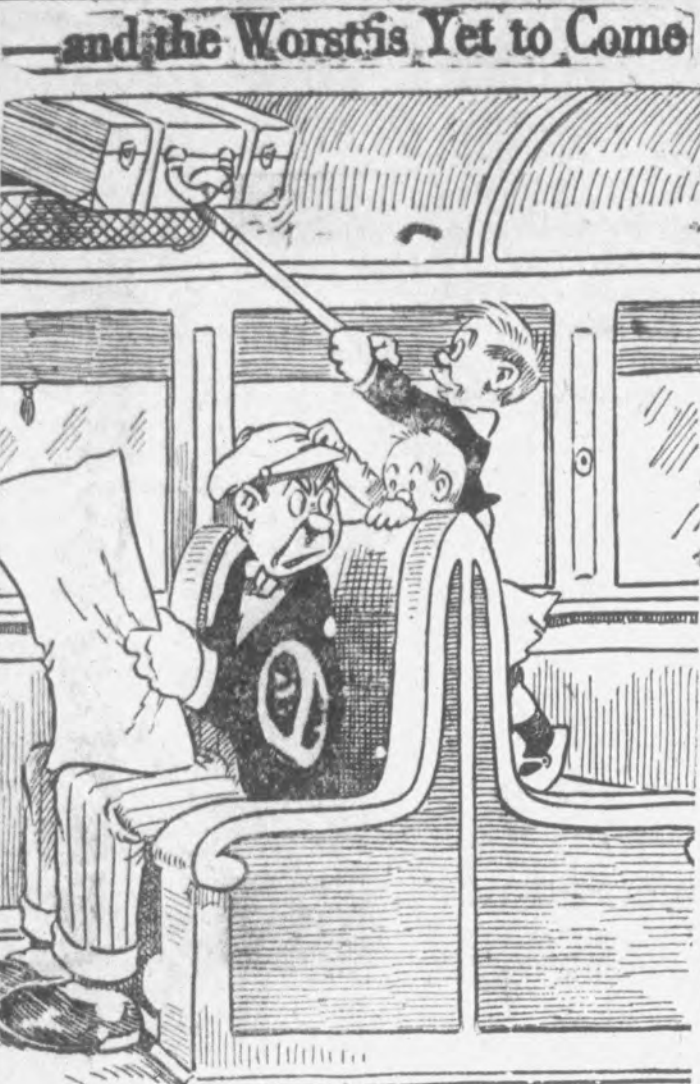
As an example of the trend of thought among the sons of this county who are attending the University, we carry herewith the lead editorial of the issue which appeared under the heading, "Food for Thought."

OPEN FORUM

GREENVILLE PEOPLE FEEL INSULTED OVER BAND ACTION

(By Harry G. Johnson, Band Editor)

What seems as the most gross insult accorded to Greenville, her city schools, business organizations and particularly the G. H. S. Sea Scout Band was inflicted on Monday, April 4, opening day of the Eastern Carolina Exposition.

There are two sides of this question, and either seems inexcusable and unpardonable. WHY? A contract was awarded to this Band to lead two parades. As the contract called to lead a statement published in the Greenville Daily Reflector which reads "the policeman was instructed to place the Band behind a float," is wrong. Behind a float is not leading. The greatest known band in the world, Sousa himself, could not march and play behind a truck that has to stop every few feet in a parade. Here is one place that seems to break the contract.

Secondly, marshals could not say that they did not see the Band. All members were uniformed in regulation Sea Scout uniforms, and they also drilled for a few minutes in front of a building from which the marshals were at that time getting their horses.

Upon being told to stand on the corner of Thomas street, the Band drum major immediately gave orders for the Band to march to this point, which they did. After seeing many trucks and floats lining up for the parade inquiries were made of a marshal as to where the Band's position was in the parade. The reply received when asking the marshal where the place was this, "I could tell

you, but you would not know if I did." The writer is sure that there is enough intelligence among Bandmen to find any place providing that they were properly directed to this destination.

Then the parade started moving. Awe struck every member of the Band. Perhaps they were to go to the next corner and turn, there by being in the place that their contract called for, therefore, one member goes this way, and upon reaching this place sees that the parade has turned and was going back from whence it started.

Now, what do you think the Band felt like? How could they have been neglected in this manner unintentionally? The Band, as has been stated before, was wearing the regulation Sea Scout uniform, and thereby presented quite a spectacle and could not be mistaken for an audience of spectators. Marshals rode by and saw them standing and said nothing to them as to where they were to go.

On Monday night, the writer accompanied by four other Bandmen wished to relieve themselves of the situation, if such were possible. They were anxious to acquire some explanation of the pride hurting and embarrassing place in which they and their fellow Bandmen had been placed the afternoon before. Upon finding Mr. Bartlett the question was asked why has the band been so neglected.

Question appeared evident to Mr. Bartlett. He was entirely ignorant of what had happened on the afternoon before. He assured that such would not happen again, and said that by all means to have the Band there Friday. He said that he had given his marshals definite instructions to place the Band. He could not personally attend to the parade on account of the lateness of the exhibit's arrival.

This assurance was comforting but at the same time so much embarrassment was suffered. Mr. Bartlett and Mayor Gravelly wired apologies to the Band and Mayor Lanier of Greenville, but apologies are owed to the Band, parents of Band members and especially to Director E. T. Robeson.

This article is not directed at Rocky Mount, Mr. Bartlett, or the marshals of the parade, but the purpose is to show in what way they had been embarrassed, and for the purpose of finding WHY they were treated in such manner.

The writer will be glad to answer any questions from any person who does not fully understand the situation. Let it be known that there is no personal feeling toward any one, but in any way it seems that the matter is unpardonable and inexcusable.

FARM NOTES

Props for Cash Crops
E. F. Arnold, county agricultural agent, addressed the Rotarians of Farmville on "Props for Cash" Tuesday night.

"Pitt county is one of the most favored counties in eastern Carolina from a cash crop point of view," said Mr. Arnold, "but the underpinning, the farmer, is not in a healthy financial condition due to depressed prices in cash commodities grown." The remedy for this by the county agent, was to encourage farmers to give more attention to such side lines as poultry, hogs and cows. "The best way to interest farmers in this kind of farming is to establish a market that will take the surplus of the farmers' hands at a fair price," said Mr. Arnold. He said that the purpose of the poultry car for Farmville on Friday, the 8th, and Greenville on Saturday, the 9th, was to encourage farmers at this season of the year to increase their flocks and to assure them that whenever they have a surplus it will be no trouble to secure a car that will pay cash for any quantity they may produce. The checks told the story. Any farmer who has 50 to 100 old worn-out hens can get from \$40 to \$80 for them on the above mentioned dates.

Plans are underway to make Stokes community a poultry center for poultry. The county agent on a visit to Mr. G. H. Roebuck's poultry farm found every facility necessary for the development of this industry here and with the cooperation of Mr. Roebuck feels that there will be no difficulty in doing so. Mr. Roebuck has 275 white leghorns of the Tom Barron strain, which produced 5,586 eggs in March. He explained that he did not feed them for high production, but for hatching eggs, which are worth 5c each. He also has 700 broilers ready for the Easter market in addition to 600 biddies he is carrying to select pullets for laying purposes this fall.

Mr. Roebuck is planning to hatch from his 5,600 capacity incubator at least 5,000 biddies next January and grow out for the April broiler market. Plans are on foot to get the farmers of the community to join in and produce enough broilers at this time to ship a car with Mr. Roebuck. In this way the world to the community whereas now if a farmer has 100 broilers he is limited to the local markets.

A Farmville bank says that from now on you can find not less than three bills of lading for hay in his bank any day. This hay is of a low quality and Mr. Jno. T. Thorne says that farmers can sow loreda soybeans on the places not suitable for tobacco or cotton, without fertilizer and make around one and one-half tons per acre that is worth twice as much in feed value as the common hay on the market. Every farmer should figure out just how many tons of hay he is buying each year and then sow enough loreda soy beans to provide his needs for next year.

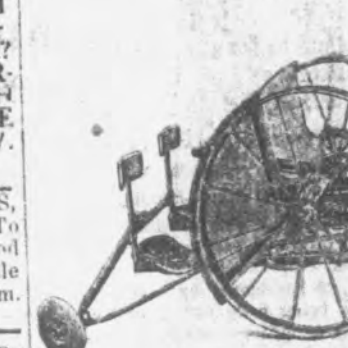

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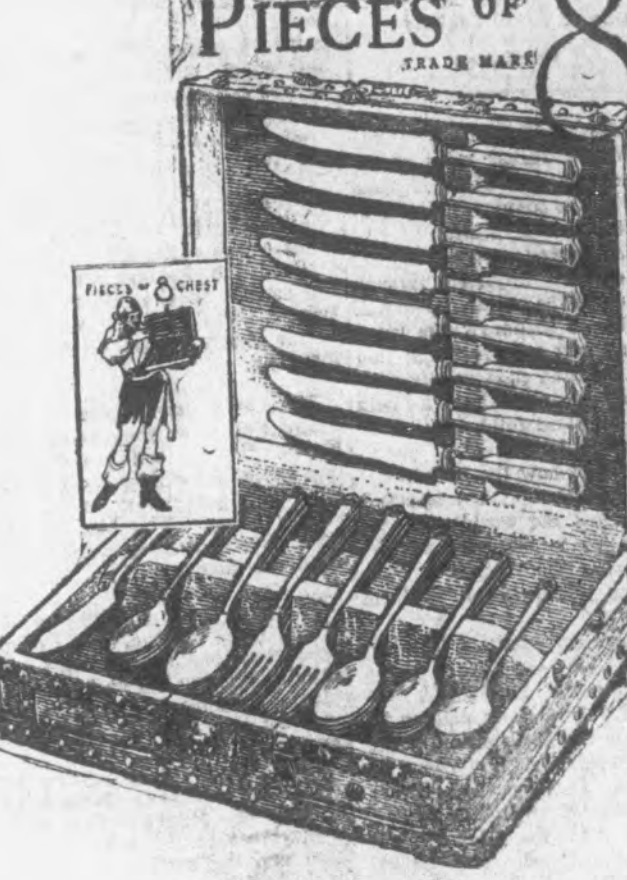

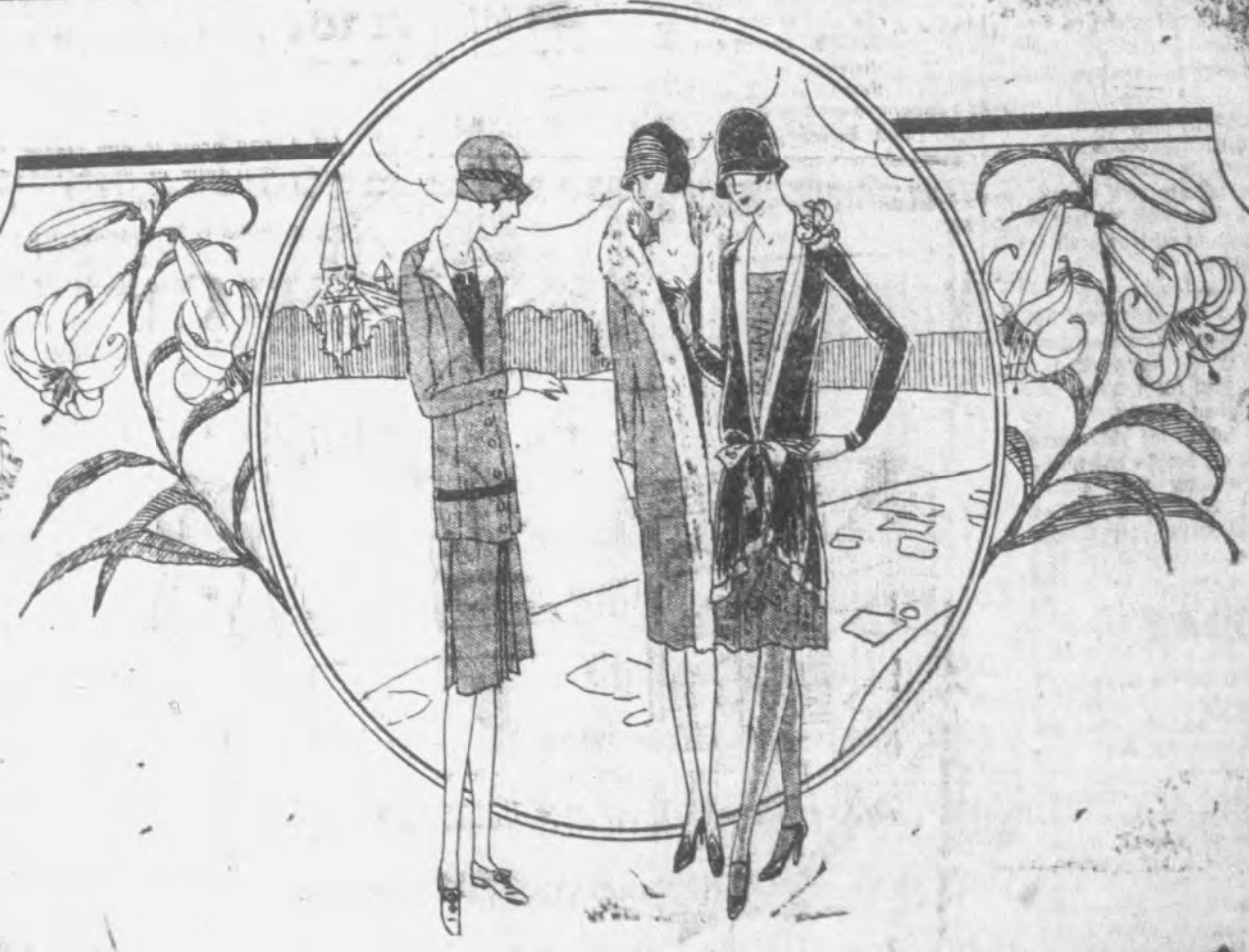

President Coolidge says: "Familiarity with the Scriptures brings culture."

Occupation in essential war industries or for other causes. The tables show that on the normal rate of physical disabilities alone by 1943 there would be less than 4,000 of the youngster of 18 who got into the war, who would still be effective for military duty.

During the decade the great army has been re-absorbed into the peaceful business of the country but of its 193,000 wounded who came back, a force comparable to the small peace time army at home still is under treatment at the hospitals of the veterans' bureau.

Of the war time battle fleet of the navy, 17 capital ships have gone to the scrap heap in the decade just ended. All of the destroyers, including five completed in 1917 are gone, scrapped or transferred to the coast guard to chase rum runners. In their place is the huge war built destroyer fleet, ranging from 75 to number 347, with gaps here and there where ships have been lost in the accidents of the sea.

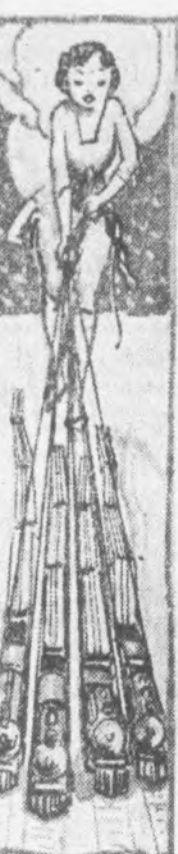

Woman Railroad Boss Cuts Rates First Day at Post



Mrs. Mamie G. Easton, of Florida, became America's first woman railroad commissioner. Within twenty-four hours after she took the oath of office she plunged into her work and ordered a cut in passenger rates between Miami and Jacksonville.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (Special) —Mrs. Mamie G. Easton was heralded as the first woman railroad commissioner in the country when she was appointed to commission in Florida one day. On the next day she was hailed as the most go-getting official in the South. Within twenty-four hours after her appointment she had taken full charge of her office and had ordered a slash of passenger rates between Jacksonville and Miami. Mrs. Easton was appointed by Governor John M. Martin of Florida to succeed her late husband as railroad commissioner after he had served only one month of his term. At the same time the new commissioner is not wholly without experience as to railroads and their methods, as she is one of the world's largest shippers of watermelon seeds gathered from her huge plantation in Monticello, and which she inherited from her father several years ago. Mrs. Easton, the mother of five children, is considered by her associates as being a shrewd executive. She is the daughter of William Gerdeau, who during his lifetime, was full charge of her office and had considered the "Luther Burbank" of the South, and at one time served as a member of the United States Senate.

Parco, Wyo., April 6.—(AP) —The death toll in the explosion in the Producers and Refiners oil refining plant here early today reached 15 at noon with the death of Calvin Smith in a hospital.

Two men were missing shortly before noon and were believed to have died in the blast and subsequent fire which caused damage of \$500,000 in the refinery.
