REPLY TO REPARATIONS DEMANDS DELAYED BY NEW CHINESE OUTBREAK

New General Strike in Shanghai Aimed at British. Chinese Occupy Standard Oil Property at Chinkiang

Washington, April 12.—(AP)—The actual outbreak of hostilities between moderate and radical elements of the Cantonese armies in China has shoved into the background, for the moment at least, speculation as to the Chinese reply to the demands of the powers, submitted yesterday and has turned attention to the possibilities of the political split in the Nationalist party, which is giving signs of widening rapidly.

Fighting today between the factions, reported at several points including Shanghai, Hangchow and Nanking may serve to delay replies to the five power notes, demanding reparations for insult and injury to foreigners by Cantonese troops at Nanking, but it also may have far-reaching results on the whole future of China, and the policies of other nations toward that country.

The victorious march northward of the Cantonese apparently has been made possible by their ability to present a united front, although it has been evident for some time that the moderate and liberal wings were at odds.

There were no official indications available here today to indicate when a reply to the five power demands might be expected either from the political government at Hankow or from General Chiang Kai-Shek, military chief, who now apparently heading an active moderate revolt against radicalism in the Nationalist party.

Chiang is understood to be at Nanking. Indications have pointed to his intention to prevent the political government at Hankow from taking over Nanking as a new capital for the Nationalist movement.

Shanghai, April 12.—(AP)—Occupation by Chinese troops of all foreigners' houses and the office buildings of the Standard Oil Company at Chinkiang was reported in a wireless message received here today.

Sammans and junks were being kept off the Yangtze river near Chinkiang by rifle fire from the steam launches.

Shanghai, April 12.—(AP)—A definite anti-British movement which may take the form of a boycott similar to those recently declared at Canton and Hong Kong, was launched in the native section of Shanghai today.

A great anti-British league was organized at a meeting attended by representatives of the Kuomintang (Cantonese), the Women's Association, the tram workers union of the international settlement, the telegraph operators' union, students of the Shanghai University and others.

Dinner April 23

New York, April 12.—(AP)—The New York World says today that the annual Jefferson Day dinner of the National Democratic Club here April 23 will mark an effort by Democratic leaders toward "wiping out the bitterness engendered and restoring the party morale shattered by the convention of 1924."

Governor Smith will attend and the World says undoubtedly efforts will be made to turn the affair into a real Smith boom, although the closest friends of the Governor will not encourage any open presidential demonstration.

Leaders to no less than seven McAdoo States have already accepted invitations to attend, says the World, "and acceptance coming in from other States indicate that virtually every shade of belief in the Democratic party will be well represented."

THREE KILLED WHEN

ROOF COLLAPSES

Barnesley, York, England April 12.—(AP)—Three men were killed when the roof of the Wharfedale Colliery near here collapsed this morning. Fourteen men were injured by the collapse. All were taken out. Four injured were removed to a hospital.

Fire broke out after the collapse and the rescue was made with difficulty.

EARL CARROLL TO BEGIN SENTENCE IN PRISON TODAY

After Spending Last Day on Broadway, Theatrical Man Begins Trip to Atlanta.

New York, April 12.—(AP)—New York, April 12.—Shirley Earl Carroll, theatrical producer presented himself at the Federal Building today to surrender to officers waiting to take him to Atlanta penitentiary to serve a year and a day for perjury committed in connection with his "bath tub" party more than a year ago.

New York, April 12.—(AP)—Today was Earl Carroll's last day for a while at least, on Broadway where the shooting occurred did not try lights over his theatre. This afternoon he begins his journey to the federal prison in Atlanta, where he will be known by a number on a tag.

Under sentence of a year and a day for perjury because, as he said he "fled like a gentleman," before a federal Grand Jury when he testified that Joyce Hawley, model and show girl, did not enter a bath tub at a Washington's birthday party in his theatre, the theatrical producer spent his last full day of liberty in Washington in futile eleventh hour appeal to the Department of Justice for clemency.

He returned to New York last night when his request to be permitted to board the prison special car at Washington was refused and he was ordered to surrender at the Federal Building in time to make the train.

In company with 20 other prisoners, but not handcuffed, Carroll will leave New York at 3:40 p. m. today in custody of United States Marshal William Hecht, on a Seaboard Air Line train.

Mrs. Carroll is preparing to live in Atlanta while her husband is in prison.

FIRE DESTROYS AYDEN BUILDING

Temporary Dining Room at Eureka College Burned, Entailing \$2,000 Loss

Fire of undetermined origin early this morning destroyed the dining room building Eureka College at Ayden, entailing loss estimated at \$2,000. The building was a wooden structure used as temporary dining room quarters during the construction of the new seminary building, and was partially covered by insurance.

The fire started about four o'clock this morning and had gained such headway when discovered that all efforts to save any contents of the building proved futile. About \$250 worth of provisions stored away in the building was a complete loss.

Britain is worried about the government's "trade disputes—trade unions" bill. It is intended to cripple the power of trade unions, limiting the extent of strikes, etc. Britain fears the rise of a dangerous class war. Organized labor's ability to establish its own government, with Ramsay MacDonald as prime minister, shows the power of British labor organization, a power that in this country is scorned by both political parties.

However, Baldwin, and others responsible for the British empire, know the empire cannot rule all around the world if power is divided at home. The general strike and long coal strike showed that the empire might be destroyed at home. Those responsible must fight that, even if it does mean "class war."

It is trouble at home, not rebellion abroad, that threatens Great Britain. In China the North now has the advantage over the hitherto victorious South. Those hundreds of millions fighting back and forth, killing each other help to solve Europe's Chinese problem. A British warship riddles the Yangtze forts.

Russia is mobilizing an army to make China respect Bolshevism which it refuses to adopt. "If you won't love me, fear me," says Russia.

What does it take to constitute a living sacrifice? First of all we should have the abolition of our life. Let God have his way. Let us deny our personal ambitions.

Sacrifice of time, business and social functions are always calling people away. The sacrifice of our means. Ever since the day of Cain and Abel God has called on men for sacrifices.

The man who is not the most into Christianity is the man who is getting most out of it. Is your life, your body, on the altar for Jesus Christ?

TO TAKE LIFE OF

ITALIAN PREMIER

Facist Leaders Aroused Over Confessions of Tito Zaniboni at Trial in Rome

Rome, April 12.—(AP)—Facist leaders were aroused today over the outburst of Tito Zaniboni when he was put on trial for plotting to kill Premier Mussolini.

They were particularly incensed over Zaniboni's references to Mussolini as an "impostor," and as the "illegal head of the government, stamping upon the liberty of the people and the constitution of the state."

Seated in the iron prisoners' cage, with five armed carabinieri guarding him, Zaniboni made no attempt to conceal his hatred for Fascism. "I hate Fascism," he shouted. "I will always hate it."

At the outset he proclaimed he was guilty of a desire to kill Mussolini, adding that he wanted to replace the present dictatorship by a military dictatorship, placing all powers in the hands of the king.

To show that he intended to carry out a real revolt, and not a mere wanton assassination, Zaniboni explained that if his attempt against the Premier had succeeded, he would have had 200 men armed with machine guns make the Fascist masses during the celebration of November 1925 when the plot was discovered.

Zaniboni denounced his secretary Quaglia, who had betrayed him.

"I tried for months not to believe he was a spy," he remarked, "becoming convinced when he begged to be allowed to help me shoot Mussolini. Now I know he was an agent provocateur."

He steadfastly refused to divulge information concerning other persons alleged to have been associated with him in the plot, saying: "I am guilty, but I alone."

General Luigi Cappelletti and six others are on trial with Zaniboni before a military court presided by Premier Mussolini as a subversive.

Several Road Sentences Marked Regular Weekly Court Session This Morning

STATE RESTS IN

TURNER MURDER

HEARING TODAY

Fifty-seven Witnesses Examined Since Trial Began in Lee Last Week

Sanford, N. C., April 12.—(AP)—The State rested in the Sheriff Turner murder trial this morning.

The State finished its case after calling Deputy Ind. St. of Raleigh and Sheriff N. F. Turner of Wake County to the stand, completing its quota of 57 witnesses examined since the trial began last week before a Lee Superior Court jury of the four men, Bud Davis, Mason Harrison, Tom McViney and Parker Robbins, charged with slaying Sheriff J. L. Turner recently in a whiskey raid.

The jury is comprised of Barnett County men.

Cross-examination by the defense marked the finish of the State's presentation of testimony. Questions by the defense, expressly aimed to establish that the deputy had arrested Bud Davis for insanity, were ruled out by Judge Sinclair of Fayetteville, presiding.

Cross fires from almost all of the thirteen attorneys representing both sides of the case resulted in little headway in the morning session. Sheriff N. F. Turner detailed arrest of three of the defendants near Raleigh. The only statement from the three men, he said, was made by Harrison that the still near "money but this met with objection to him."

Counsel asked the privilege of conferring with Davis and Davis wife out of presence of the jury following conclusion of prosecution testimony but this met with objection and the matter was thrashed out before the judge while proceedings lapsed.

The State was bent expressly on having the defendants appear on the stand in order of the indictment, first Davis, then Harrison, McViney and Robbins, respectively, but the defense was objecting.

Prosecution guns were hammering at Davis as testimony for the State drew to an end after a week's uninterrupted fire into the record from the 57 witnesses while the defense's move were awaited by observers for this afternoon's proceedings.

FACTIONS IN CHINESE ARMIES ARE FIGHTING AGAINST EACH OTHER

THREE KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO NEAR PAW CREEK

Locomotive of Crack Southern Train Derailed; Two Persons Also Injured.

Charlotte, April 12.—(AP)—Three women were instantly killed and another woman and a man were injured when the Crescent Limited crack Southern railway New York-New Orleans passenger train, southbound, struck an automobile near Paw Creek, six miles west of here at noon today. The locomotive of the train was derailed.

The bodies, badly mangled, were brought to a local undertaking establishment. Thompson and Mrs. Barber were placed in a local hospital.

No details of the accident were received here up to two hours after the accident. It was said, however, that the limited which travels at high speed between Charlotte and Gastonia, struck the auto at a grade crossing, dragging it many feet and mangle the occupants horribly.

Physicians and nurses were sent from Charlotte with ambulances as quickly as the accident was reported. A wrecking crew was ordered out and sent to the scene. None of the passengers or crew of the train were injured, railroad officials at Salisbury, division headquarters said.

Neither Thompson nor Mrs. Barber was seriously injured it was said at the hospital. Beyond severe shock, lacerations and bruises they suffered little, physicians said. No bones were broken.

Moderate and Liberal Wings of Cantonese Armies Clash in Shanghai and Other Places Early Today

Shanghai, April 12.—(AP)—The split between the moderate and radical sections of the Cantonese have developed into fierce fighting at several points.

Moderate groups, in one case using field guns have attacked radical gatherings in Shanghai, Hangchow, Nanking and Amoy and disbanded large numbers of radical laborites.

The fighting in Shanghai occurred during the early hours this morning when adherents of General Chiang Kai-Shek, the Cantonese moderate leader and military commander in chief, descended on the red labor unions in the Chapei, Nantao and Pootung native sections.

Armed with machine guns, pistols and bombs, the raiders, who were in plain clothes, attacked every known union center. Twelve were killed in the various fights and 600 laborites were arrested, including Chen Tsu-Shu, the chief radical leader in the Shanghai district. Many Unionists were wounded.

Seven machine guns, 300 fifty many pistols and bombs and much ammunition was seized.

Three hundred and fifty laborers in one building refused to surrender until field guns were brought up. The headquarters of the general labor union now is occupied by Chinese troops and the chairman of the union is missing.

Simultaneously a similar raid was carried out at Hangchow where numerous persons were disarmed and arrested. Moderates also dispersed the radicals in the latter city.

General Pei Tsung-Chi, military commander in the Shanghai district and subordinate of General Chiang Kai-Shek, issued a proclamation after the raids forbidding meetings, strikes or demonstrations of a mass nature as a precautionary measure in the suppression of radical activities.

Paris, April 12.—(AP)—A group of 5,000 anti-Communists, says a Shanghai dispatch to the Havas agency under Monday's date, attacked the Southern railroad station of Shanghai, occupied by Syndicalists, who retreated after an hour's violent firing. The Communists are said to have lost heavily.

Rochester, N. Y., April 12.—(AP)—The Standard Brewery, reputed to be the "only place in western New York making real good beer" was closed by federal agents after a raid today.

Warrants issued for Thomas J. Franken, of Rochester, the president; two directors, both New York City men, and three employees, brought promises from their attorneys the men would appear before United States Commissioner Phillips here this afternoon.

LIVE MORE STAGED STOCK MARKET CAUP

New York, April 12.—(AP)—A sensational stock market coup of \$1,000,000 was attributed to Jesse J. Livermore by the New York Times today.

Reports in Wall Street from persons known to be in Mr. Livermore's confidence, said the Times, were that the coup was made in a cleverly maneuvered pool operation in stock of the Prepropt Tuxas Company. The stock yesterday touched 74 3/8, 1 1/8 below its high for all time, reached Saturday. He low mark was 8 in 1925 and 1926 in 1926. After yesterday's high mark it had a break closing at 72.

One Killed and Several Injured in Heavy Storm

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 12.—(AP)—An electrical storm, accompanied by a tornado at Mustang, 20 miles southwest of here, last night claimed one life, injured several persons and caused heavy property damage.

The storm brought ruin of considerable proportion and forced the North Canadian River from its banks here early today.

More than a score of buildings were demolished and many damaged at Mustang. Mrs. Frank Sewer was killed and her husband and son were injured. Railroad officials said.

High winds also damaged buildings at Mineo and Union City.

BELIEVES YOUNG RAMSEUR WAS KILLED

Raleigh, April 12.—(AP)—Hubert Ramsey, of Raleigh, uncle of Harrison Ramsey, whose body was found near Shelby, N. C., last Friday believed today that the youth was murdered.

The body was found on the running board of his automobile on a lonely road with a bullet through the head. The Raleigh kinman expressed opinion it was a murder and gave his reasons.

"I do not believe," Mr. Ramsey said, "that a man killing himself would hold a pistol at an angle that would result in such a wound," pointing out that a bullet entered the right side of the youth's temple and came out on the left side, ranging downward.

"It was also noticed that blood oozing from the wound was above it. The body was found in an upright position or nearly so with the head against the door of the car. Had there been no other person figured in the tragedy it seems to me it is clear that the blood would have spread downward," Mr. Ramsey said.

"The note found purporting to be written to the youth's sweetheart was not even in his handwriting," declared the Raleigh man, "and was evidently a forgery. It was on paper different from that he customarily used."

Robbery was the motive of the killer, Mr. Ramsey believes, noting that evidence showed his nephew had about \$75 on his person at the time and that only 80 cents was found on the body.

THREE REPORTED KILLED IN OKLAHOMA TORNADO

1927 Baseball Season Gets Into Full Swing Today

Officials Predict Record Season After Winter Of Trading And Scandals

(By The Associated Press.)
America's premier outdoor festival, the baseball pennant races in the American and National Leagues opened today with more changes in the line-ups of the sixteen clubs than the hardy perennials of the bleachers had seen in many years.

More new managers, more old idols in new uniforms and more accumulated winter debris to be carried away than ever before were the aftermath of a season of unprecedented trading, wrangling and scandal-mongering.

A new leader, some smart veterans, or enthusiastic youngsters, faced an introduction to fans in each of the eight major league opening cities, and in the words of K. M. Landis, boss of baseball, the outlook was good. The weather men generally over the big time baseball said so too.

Fate and perhaps some shrewd management speeded the annual summer dish this year with more interesting problems than the box score followers had tested for a long time.

Babe Ruth's new contract, Ty Cobb's final year, Rogers Hornsby's transfer to the St. Louis Cardinals, the purchase of seasoned material and eight new ball club pilots were among the row of question marks for random as the suit of winter scandal was blown away by the crisp winds of spring.

The baseball champions of the world, the St. Louis Cardinals, began their defense of their title in the ballparks of the Chicago Cubs, the National League, giving Grover Cleveland Alexander another chance to avenge his trade "down the river" by old teammates.

President Coolidge, despite his lame wrist, planned to toss the first ball to the American League opener at Washington with Boston as the opposition led again by Bill Carrigan.

The gray haired group of Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics include two former managers, Ty Cobb and Eddie Collins, was pitted against Babe Ruth and his fellow champions of the American League in New York.

Rogers Hornsby, a wealthy retired stock broker, and the other New York Giants, premiered against the Philadelphia Nationals.

The other two American League games, Chicago at Cleveland and Detroit at St. Louis, brought four new managers each with an interesting background. Ray Schalk caught for the Chicago White Sox for fourteen years before he last was made the boss. Dick McAlister was promoted to the vacancy when Trix Speaker of the mighty wallop was given his release.

Ty Cobb's hopefuls at Detroit were given over to George Moriarty, and Dan Howley took the burden at St. Louis off the weary shoulders of George Sider.

With some of his aging mainstays questioned off, Uncle Wilbert Robinson of Brooklyn, set out on the same experiment conducted in recent years by Connie Mack—chasing pennants with youngsters—with the opening test set today at Boston.

The renovation at Pittsburgh brought in Donie Bush to lead the team which stumbled and faltered in the heat of battle last year. The Pirates were guests at Cincinnati, where front row fans in the bleachers will look in vain for the familiar sight of Ed Roush.

The club owners, who, did a racket today, with the spotlight shifted to the players, gave proof of their belief that since league smoke dissolves in the spring, by building additions to their grandstands at several parks.

Ran Johnson, president of the American League, "on leave" because of his heckling of Commissioner Landis, has returned quietly to his desk, and all the other impediments to the march on the bleachers have been swept aside as batting line-ups replace testimony

the baseball columns.
The baseball writers and those who lack their guesses with money ran strongly to a duel between Pittsburgh and New York for the first place honors of the National League, with St. Louis Cardinals, world's champions and Cincinnati completing the first division.

Connie Mack's old-young mixture and the New York Yankees are the pronounced favorites in the American League, with the Detroit and Cleveland clubs running next.
The weather will be fair Tuesday and Wednesday in States East of the Mississippi River, with some possible exceptions, the Washington Weather Bureau promised with the temperatures moderately cool when the umpires sound the long awaited call of "play ball."

SIDELINES PROFITABLE
Two more car loads of poultry will be shipped from this county to northern markets the latter part of this week. Many of our farmers are finding poultry a very profitable sideline and other farmers of the community would do well to follow their example. The farmer who has something to turn into cash during the time of planting and working his other crops will find that his financial burdens will be much easier.

THE BIG DAY
Today is the big day in the eyes of America, young and old, for it marks the tossing of the first ball in the 1927 season of our national sport. From the smallest boy to the oldest fan each has his idols among the hundreds that make up the baseball teams of the country and each as eagerly will scan the sporting pages from now on for deeds of accomplishment by his favored team or player. Baseball is indeed our national sport.

VACCINATE THE DOG
Reports of more mad dogs continue to come in and as a result of having been bit or scratched by such dogs, many of our citizens are now taking treatment. There is a treatment which will protect dogs against rabies and hydrophobia which means protection of our citizens, and the Reflector has urged all dog owners to see to it that their animals are given this preventative treatment.

From the increasing number of rabid canines it appears that drastic steps must be taken if the lives of our people, especially the children, are to be protected, and we now urge that the treatment of all dogs yearly to prevent rabies and hydrophobia be made compulsory. We have too much at stake to permit the evil of the rabid dog to increase, and the sooner steps to prevent it are taken the better off we will be.

FARM NOTES

(By E. F. Arnold Co. Agt.)
Hemingway Poultry Farm
Hatchery Putting Bethel On The Map
On a recent visit to Hemingway Poultry Farm, operated by Dr. J. D. Hemingway, I found the yards alive with biddies. A check-up showed 300 four weeks old, 400 two weeks old, and 200 one week old, all leghorns, and 200 one week old Rhode Island Reds.
The 2,304 capacity incubator has been running at full capacity since January 10, putting out chicks from 768 eggs each week for the past 12 weeks, making a total of 9,216 eggs put through the machine and there are now 500 biddies and 2,304 eggs in the machine.

Most of these baby chicks have been sold to farmers around Bethel and by the way, Dr. Hemingway also has sent 6,000 eggs to the Ross Hatchery and brought the chicks to Bethel, making a distribution around the Bethel territory of 15,216, with the 2,304 now in the incubator sold. The response of the farmers in buying the baby chicks has encouraged Dr. Hemingway until he sees his way clear to put in an additional machine with a 12,000 capacity, giving him 14,000 capacity for putting out a car of broilers almost at one hatchling. With this machine which is to be installed next December for the purpose of putting broilers on the early spring market, Bethel territory will come to the front rapidly as a poultry center.

In addition to operating a hatchery Dr. Hemingway has a fine flock of 250 white leghorn hens from which he got 4,196 eggs during the month of March.
In order to encourage the growing of poultry, a car paying cash for live poultry was placed at Bethel some time back at which time more than 5,000 pounds were loaded and another car has been arranged for April 15.
Farmers in the past have hesitated because of the fact that they feared the local markets would not be able to consume the increase. Now with a car to pay cash and take all surplus off the local market, there is no danger of being unable to sell any quantity. Dr. Hemingway is keeping a flock record in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Department which will be of value to those who plan to go into the poultry business.

Elbert M. Tyson is planning a Grade A dairy barn in cooperation with the Extension Dept., which is to be constructed according to State College plans. Mr. Tyson has some fine Holsteins and lots of good pasture land which he is improving. On a visit to his place the other day I found him hauling fertilizer, not from town, but from the barn lot. How many Pitt county farmers are able to do this? It costs less. Its a by-product from a profitable industry—DAIRYING.

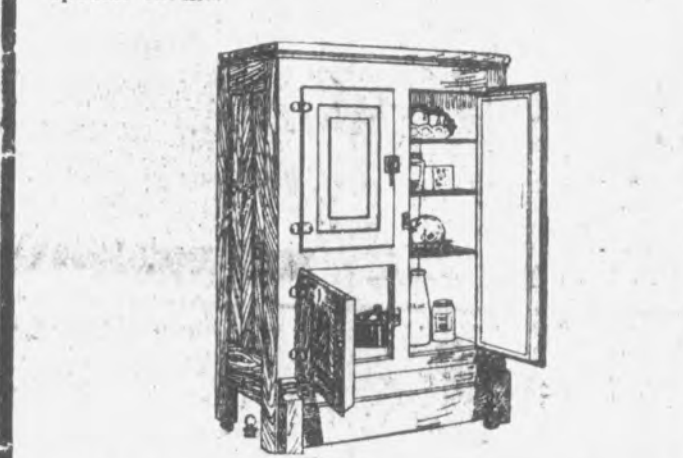

ATTEMPT TO SURPASS FRENCH DURATION RECORD
Mineola, N. Y., April 12.—AP—Berl Jasta and Clarence D. Chamberlin, aviators, hopped off from Roosevelt Field at 9:30 a. m. today to break the French duration flight record by remaining in the air for more than 45 hours continuously. The actual duration record is 45 hours, 11 minutes and 59 seconds, made by Droughin and Landry at Etampes Chartres in August 1925.

The aviators used a Wright-Bellanca plane, which carried an extra weight of 2800 pounds including 395 gallons of gasoline and 20 gallons of oil.

The aviators expressed the opinion that they would be able to remain in the air for at least 50 hours.

Weather conditions were favorable.

At 11 o'clock the fliers were passing over Garden City, L. I., at a height of about 2500 feet.

CARGO CANADIAN LIQUOR CAPTURED AT CLEVELAND

Cleveland, April 12.—(AP)—The first run running prize of the season was towed into the harbor here today by a coast guard patrol boat after a brush with a liquor craft 15 miles off Toledo. Two men on board the liquor boat were taken into custody, while their cargo of Canadian whiskey and beer was confiscated.

Both boats were running without light. The coast guard crew under the direction of Capt. G. J. Ware, hearing the motor of the rum runners' boat, spotted it with a searchlight. Commands to stop were ignored and the coast guard vessel opened fire with its one pounders and rifles.

A man giving his name as Edward Becker, of Toledo, was slightly injured, either by a rifle bullet or by being metal from the ball as a result of a hit by one of the one pound shells. His companion gave his name as Leo Vermet, also of Toledo.

NORTH CAROLINA WILL SELL \$20,000,000 IN BONDS

Raleigh, April 12.—(AP)—Governor McLean, who in private life figures interest rates on money as a banker, today was in New York to tell shrewd bond buyers that he had State of North Carolina bonds for sale, not to bear four and one-fourth per cent but only four per cent, no more, no less.

Twenty million dollars worth of bonds were offered by the Governor, who, believing that the State's credit is so well established that better interest rates are forthcoming, which, if secured, will save Tar Heels a tremendous sum of money.

Before his departure today Governor McLean had refused to grant any sort of clemency to Thomas E. Cooper, former Wilmington and Raleigh banker, who a month ago began an eight year sentence on the road of New Hanover County following his parole by President Coolidge of the completion of two years of a three year sentence in the federal prison at Atlanta.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris, April 12—(AP)—Americans travel by air more than any other nationality on this side of the water, according to recent statistics given out at the Paris airport of Le Bourget. Americans hold the record for the last three years, with 4,645 and 36 per cent of them making up the air passengers to various European cities. The English follow next, with about ten per cent fewer numbers, and then the Dutch, the French and the Germans making up only four per cent of the total.

Seven thousand Russians in all parts of the world are enrolled with the mail correspondence courses offered by the Russian Young Men's Christian Association, with headquarters in Paris. Four hundred and thirty-eight young men who were driven from their country have already received diplomas for doing work by correspondence and are now established in business. Twelve Russian teachers and a corps of stenographers handle the lessons. Some of the pupils are even in America. A number are in the French Foreign Legion and very often have their lessons interrupted by a little war skirmish.

Two blind pilgrims are on their way from Rouen to Lourdes, a distance of six hundred miles, in the hope of recovering their sight at the famous shrine of the Virgin.

One of them is Edmond Germain, 61, who lost his eyes in an accident; the other is only 34 and has been blind from birth. They were traveling at the home for the blind at Gremy, near Rouen, when they happened to decide to go on foot to Lourdes.

They walk about twenty miles a day, tapping the road as they go along arm in arm. They say they have not met with any difficulties so far, and they are now more than half way along.

French scientists are trying to find out what happens to wireless waves when they reach a point ten miles above the surface of the earth. Two aeronautical experts of the French army have arranged to send up a small balloon which will carry with it a very light radio set. This will send out signals automatically and constantly. Similar signals from a set just like it will be sent from the ground. The signals from both sets will be studied and recorded. It is hoped to obtain information regarding the effect of atmospheric conditions on wireless waves that will aid both aviation and wireless.

Scarcely a week goes by that the French police do not discover a millionaire ragspicker among the garbage cans of Paris. This week it was the curious case of an old woman who went to a wedding in order to get a free meal. She wasn't hungry, she explained to the policeman, but she wanted to economize a bit.

But this was hardly necessary. The authorities found her to be the owner of property worth several millions of francs and some handsome 16th century furniture, besides three farms in Normandy. Nevertheless, she rises early each morning and goes out to search amid the garbage can for food which she cooks over a gas jet in

her sumptuous bedroom.

Two globe-trotters, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bartlett, of Los Angeles, California, rested for a few days in Paris after covering 317,692 miles of the 500,000 they must walk in order to win a wager of \$25,000 offered by the Southern California Hiking Association.

The couple started from Los Angeles in 1922 and have visited every State in South, Central and North America, together with Canada. They landed at Southampton last November and have walked through Great Britain and Ireland. Their present route lies along the western coast of France to Spain and Portugal, up to the French Riviera and Italy, through Switzerland, Germany, Belgium and Holland and the Scandinavian countries.

After that they will attempt Africa going down the western and up the eastern coasts through the Far East to Japan. If they get back to California before 1930, they will win the wager.
