CANTONESE PLAN MOVE NORTHWARD

More Than 300,000
Troops Available to
Withstand The On-
slaught From Han-
kow.

Shanghai, April 20.—(AP)—Renewal of Cantoneses campaign against the North is planned by General Chiang Kai-Shek as soon as a cabinet has been formed for the newly established government by the Cantoneses moderates at Nanking, official reports from Nanking stated today.

General Chiang, these reports said, does not expect any forceful action from the civil government at Hankow which the Nanking Cantoneses have defied by establishing a government of their own.

It was stated that more than 300,000 troops are immediately available to General Chiang Kai-Shek to withstand any onslaught from Hankow, whereas only the most meager force is available to the Han-

ty faction.

The newly established government at Nanking does not intend to break with Russia and asks the friendship of all countries, but insists upon the abrogation of the "unequal treaties."

The campaign against the North, which has been centered along the Yangtze valley for some time with the Northerners regaining some of the ground that they had lost in the past month, has been at a standstill for the past few days, reports from Yangtze indicating that rains had interrupted the fighting.

Because the Nanking faction of the Cantoneses is now in control of the means of communication with the Eastern Yangtze valley, it has become difficult to obtain authentic information from Hankow, as to what plans the government there has made to cope with the Nanking faction.

It was learned today that two cabinet ministers have definitely been selected by the Nanking government but their names are being withheld.

Wilmington Family Have Close Call When Home Burns

Wilmington, April 20.—(AP)—A cracking timber in the kitchen of the home warned the sleeping family of Preston L. Sellers, local realty broker, that their home was in flames and permitted their escape from the residence a few minutes before it was completely enveloped in flames this morning at 2:30 o'clock.

The home, located at Winter Park, was completely destroyed. The origin of the fire has not been determined.

Sellers, his wife and their eight children rushed from the burning structure without anything but the clothing which they removed upon retiring last night.

They were forced to leave their home in their night garments and neighbors who had gathered despite heroic efforts of themselves to again enter the house and save some of their furniture and fixtures the flames had made too much speed and helpless, they watched the home burn to the ground. It was partially covered by insurance.

Winter Park is situated about four miles east of Wilmington on the Wrightsville turnpike and has no fire protection.

State Bankers To Meet At Pinehurst

Pinehurst, April 20.—(AP)—Final arrangements were completed here today for the annual North Carolina Bankers' Association meeting, which opens tomorrow morning.

Dr. Douglas S. Freeman, editor of the Richmond News-Leader, of Richmond, will deliver the opening address, announcing his subject as "Social Revolution in the South and Its Relation to Banking."

He will be introduced by Josephus Daniels, editor of the Raleigh News and Observer.

President Frank P. Pagan, of Rocky Mount and Paul P. Brown, Raleigh, secretary, will make their reports the opening day.

SEARCH YADKIN RIVER FOR BODIES OF NEGROES
Salisbury, April 20.—(AP)—The Yadkin river at High Rock, Southern Power Company development, is being searched for the bodies of three negro women who were drowned late yesterday afternoon when their boat capsized. The negroes were Bill McCray, Clinton James and Dan Bohler.

The boat containing six workers struck a rock at a cove and capsized. There were six in the boat, three of them reaching shore and the others drowning.

MISSING ARCTIC FLIER, RETURNS

New York, April 20.—(AP)—The North American News-paper Alliance was informed today that Lieut. George H. Wilkins, Arctic flier, who had been missing since March 29, when he hopped off from Point Barrow, Alaska, for the unexplored regions to the north, has made a safe return to Beechy Point.

BAPTIST WILL MAKE CHANGE IN POLICIES

Coming Session of
Convention Will Re-
ceive Many Recom-
mendations.

Louisville, April 20.—(AP)—Recommendations affecting changes in organization, policies and work are promised to be presented at the annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention beginning here on May 4. At no previous session in all its more than eighty years of existence it was said to have so many recommendations to be considered.

The majority of the proposed changes, it was believed, will come in the report of the committee on business efficiency that has been studying the general subject for the past two years, under the chairmanship of Dr. Austin Crouch, of Murfreesboro, Tenn. This committee will recommend the establishment of the policy of budget control, whereby each agency of the convention will be required to submit to the Convention for approval its proposed operating budget for each year.

Enlargement of the personnel and the functions of the executive committee of the convention as well as make of that committee the chief promotional as well as the fiduciary agency of the convention also is to be proposed. Authority to the convention and the conduct of a general debt raising campaign with the view of liquidating the obligations of all the chief agencies of the convention were to be considered.

EXPERTS TO SPEAK HERE

D. A. House, president and W. L. Thornton, secretary and treasurer of the North Carolina Shippers' association, will be the principal speakers at the regular session of the Kiwanis club here Friday night.

Both men are well known in North Carolina shipping circles, and the issues which they have for discussion will prove of interest to this community. They will discuss cheap freight rates and advantages to be derived from shipping by water.

The object of the North Carolina Shippers' association is to do away with discrimination in freight rates and give the state rates similar to those enjoyed by the other states. A number of members of the organization live in Greenville and Pitt county and the coming of the president and secretary will be received with interest.

White Man and Negro Killed By Explosion of Dynamite In Stokes Section Early Today

Jimmie Stokes, white, and Earl Thomas, negro, members of the Pitt County convict force, were killed instantly early this morning by the premature explosion of dynamite which they were using to blow up stumps. The accident occurred in the vicinity of Tom Stokes' store, Stokestown, several miles from this city.

Stokes and the negro are said to have been working quite a distance from other members of the force when the explosion occurred.

Young Stokes is the son of J. J. Stokes, of Ayden. He was convicted on charges of assault with deadly weapon and resisting an officer in Pitt County court about two months ago. He was serving a four month's sentence.

Thomas, according to only records available at the courthouse this

morning was serving a sentence for violation of the prohibition laws. The two men are said to have been adjusting dynamite caps. They were such a distance from the main part of the force that no one was able to see exactly how the accident occurred.

An investigation of the explosion conducted this morning by Coroner E. S. Williams resulted in a decision that the men accidentally met their death while preparing dynamite for blowing up stumps.

The bodies of both men were found thirty or forty feet from the scene of the explosion. They were badly mangled from the force of the concussion.

The bodies were brought to Williams funeral parlors and prepared for burial.

SECOND JUROR SELECTED FOR SNYDER TRIAL

Only Two Jurors For
Murder Trial Chosen
From 91 Persons
Examined.

New York, April 20.—(AP)—The first panel of 100 talesmen in the Snyder murder case was exhausted shortly after noon today and only two jurors had been accepted. The questioning went on and talesmen continued to drop by the wayside.

Of the fifty men examined on Monday, the first day of the trial, none were accepted. Yesterday the total rose to 87 and a foreman was secured. This morning juror number two was obtained.

When the first hundred talesmen had been examined, 150 more were on hand and the questioning continued. The majority of the permissible 120 peremptory challenges still remained, the greater part of the talesmen who passed through the jury box having been excused for cause.

New York, April 20.—(AP)—William B. Melner of Springfield was selected as juror number two in the Snyder murder trial today.

He was the ninety-first talesman to be examined.

New York, April 20.—(AP)—There was a feeling of apathy about the courthouse square and the Queens County courthouse as the third day's session of the Snyder murder trial opened.

Outside the "crowd" which on previous days has numbered as high as a thousand, consisted of three newsboys.

Inside in the third floor courtroom, the talesmen assembled with sour looks and pessimistic remarks. They all seemed to believe that they were being kept from their regular duties for no greater purpose than to be sent home as soon as their turn came to enter the box and answer questions as to their fitness.

Justice Scudder, after holding court open until six o'clock last night in a futile effort to secure another juror besides the lone foreman set ten o'clock for the opening hour today instead of 10:15. He also threatened to keep court today until 7 o'clock in the evening unless more speed was made. As the jury box has been tentatively filled just before adjournment last night, for the eighth time since the trial began all was in readiness to resume examination of talesmen as soon as court was called.

Justice Scudder entered the court shortly after 10 o'clock and the defendants were immediately marched in.

Mrs. Ruth Snyder to her usual seat behind her co-defendant and former paramour, Henry Judd Gray New Jersey corset salesman. They exchanged no glances of recognition.

Questioning of the talesmen was immediately begun by the State.

Only one of the 12 expressed a scruple against the death penalty and he was at once excused by the court. Two were excused because of acquaintance with lawyers in the case.

Richmond, Va., April 20.—(AP)—Col. M. Early, assistant prohibition administrator for Virginia and North Carolina, died following an operation for appendicitis last Friday. He was a native of North Carolina.

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HORSEWHIPS MAN, 'ARRESTED

Hundreds Driven From Home By Rising Flood Waters In Districts of Mississippi Valley

Little Rock, Ark., April 20.—(AP)—Six hundred men who had been working to keep the Little Rock water plant in operation were withdrawn at noon today and the plant was abandoned when Arkansas river waters began seeping through the protecting dike.

Memphis, Tenn., April 20.—(AP)—Widespread destruction in portions of the Mississippi valley was pictured today in reports from areas where the greatest flood of the Mississippi river and its tributaries has inundated millions of acres of fertile soil, leaving in its wake death and suffering.

Driven from homes and possessions many hundreds of persons were in need of food and shelter today. The greatest momentary relief agencies to be among the refugees, thousands of whom were marooned on levees with little food available.

Loss of life presumably has been greater than the 20 deaths reported though it is not likely an accurate check can be made. Transient tenant farmers in some sections are little known to their neighbors.

The entire St. Francis basin in southeastern Missouri and north-eastern Arkansas was in the part of the flood today. Waters which yesterday broke through the St. John levee north of New Madrid, Mo., flooded additional thousands of acres.

Arkansas was faced with one of the greatest catastrophes of its history, with water in the St. Francis basin alarming proportions and other streams in the state rushing toward the Mississippi with their greatest burdens.

There was only one outlet into the parent stream for the mass of water from the Dorena break near Helena and more than a score of towns were threatened with inundation.

An Arkansas National Guard officer flying over the territory between Little Rock and Pine Bluff yesterday dropped warnings to homesteaders to flee the rising water caused by a break in a levee at Pourche Bottoms, in Pulaski county.

The aviator reported seeing refugees in trees and clinging to church steeples.

Relief agencies had established headquarters in Conway, Helena, and towns in southwest Arkansas. Two new breaks reported on the Red river, in the extreme western portion of the state yesterday claimed at least one life, rendering thousands homeless and flooded thousands of acres of land.

Hickman, Ky., was one of the great refugee camps along the river. It is almost directly opposite New Madrid and the rows of army tents there give it the appearance of a cantonment. Water was again rising at Hickman, after having showed a decline when the break occurred at Dorena.

The levee situation in Mississippi and Louisiana was believed by government engineers to be as good as it could be expected.

Overcast skies throughout the valley today caused apprehension

before an encouraging report from St. Louis that the river would reach its crest today.

Kansas City, Mo., April 20.—AP—With casualty lists showing more than 100 dead, the southwest today continued its gamble on rapidly changing weather reports in the hope of avoiding further losses in tornadoes, freak storms and floods.

Hundreds of farmers and townspeople in western Missouri, southern Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas refused to take on estimates of arrival of flood crests and remained away from homes inundated several times during the last two weeks. Others compared flood warnings with river readings and declined to leave for high ground.

Texas maintained its lead with more than 50 dead and scores injured, mostly in tornadoes. Oklahoma was next with an estimate of 45 killed in floods and high winds. Several were listed as flood victims in Kansas and Missouri.

INVESTIGATE BUBBLING GAS IN PACTOLUS

Finding of Gas Pocket
In Marl Deposits of
Canal Produces
Much Activity.

Gas bubbling from a canal in the vicinity of Pactolus, has led to thoughts of the possibility of oil in that section, and today a thorough investigation and analysis of the gas is underway in an effort to define its source.

The drainage canal runs from Bethel through the Pactolus community. Last year it was dredged. In the vicinity of Pactolus considerable marl deposits were cut thru. It was near this location that gas was bubbling up.

Those who have been making preliminary investigations say that the place where most of the gas is in evidence, is about eighty-five feet of solid rock. It is on the estate of the late J. R. Davenport, and has been bubbling since Thanks giving.

Since the discovery numbers of people have visited the place. A quantity of gas has been caught in bottles and submitted for analysis.

Saturday afternoon the Reflector was presented with a bottle of the gas caught by F. W. Satterthwaite. The bottle was opened, a match applied, and a blue flame followed.

Persons interested in the find are preparing to confer with members of the government bureau of mines, and will have government experts visit the scene and conduct an exhaustive investigation.

ADAMS FOUND NOT GUILTY MURDER CASE

Jury Returns Verdict
Of Acquittal Last
Night At Eleven
O'clock.

Major Adams, young white man of the Black Jack community, was acquitted of a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Lee Haddock, Shermidene youth, by a jury in yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt County Superior Court. The verdict was returned last night at 11 o'clock following two hours deliberation. The case was begun early yesterday morning, and argument was not completed until late in the evening.

Lee Haddock, 17 year old son of Jesse Haddock, of Shermidene, was found dead in bed at the home of an uncle shortly before the Christmas holidays in 1925. An investigation conducted by S. G. Wilkerson, county coroner, revealed the fact that Major Adams and Lee Haddock had been in an argument the night before. The autopsy also revealed that young Haddock had been hit on the head with some blunt pointed instrument, and members of the coroner's jury believed the injury resulted in his death.

Members of the party were alleged to have been drinking heavily when the automobile in which they were riding, was ditched in the road in the Shermidene community. It was while trying to extricate the car from its position in the ditch that the fight is said to have occurred. He was found dead in bed next morning.

The Adams boys were brought to Greenville and placed in jail following investigation by the coroner's jury. They remained in jail until details of the tragedy were cleared up by officials.

Jesse Adams was acquitted of a charge of manslaughter by a jury in the January term of Pitt County Superior Court last year.

The case has attracted considerable interest in the Shermidene community, and large crowds were present during the trial of both of the young men.

Court this morning began consideration of the case of Elmer McLawhorn, Ayden young man, charged with the killing of a negro.

The case has been hanging fire from one term of court to another for the past three years. It is probably hearing will be concluded sometime this afternoon or tonight.

MARINES FIRED UPON IN NICARAGUA

Maague, Nicaragua, April 20.—(AP)—American marines in Nicaragua were fired upon three times at various points last night and today. There were no casualties.

TAX COLLECTIONS ON INCOMES EXCEED PAST FISCAL YEAR

Raleigh, April 20.—(AP)—North Carolina income tax collections for 1927 today exceeded the total for the entire previous fiscal year.

The total announced today from the State Revenue Department, was \$6,094,245, as compared with total collection last year of \$6,083,000. The present fiscal year has 2 months and ten days to run.

JOHN EARLY FOUND NEAR BURNSVILLE

Town Agog With Ex-
citement Following
Discovery of Escap-
ed Leper Today.

Burnsville, N. C., April 20.—(AP)—John Early, western North Carolina leper who escaped ten days ago from the federal leprosarium at Carrville, La., and headed for his old home at Tryon to visit his family, is encamped on the south Toe River, about eight miles from here. The town is agog with excitement.

Dr. J. B. Gibbs, County Health Officer, has wired the State Health Department at Raleigh, informing Dr. Laughlinhouse, State health officer of the presence of the uninvited visitor and requesting information as to what should be done.

In the meantime, no guests from here have been entertained by the afflicted man, and the prospects are that he will have none from this place. Sheriff F. H. Banks declared today that he would await word from Raleigh before taking any action.

"I will have him run out of the county, or shoot him away in some manner, if the State wants me," Sheriff Banks said.

Raleigh, N. C., April 20.—(AP)—No instructions have been sent Sheriff Banks as to disposal of John Early, leper, reported located near Burnsville, so far as was known at the State Board of Health today.

Officials were attending the State Board of Health meeting at Durham.

These officials at the time of Early's escape from the federal leprosarium had said they would notify federal authorities at Washington, N. C., immediately upon word of his appearance in this State, that the matter was one for federal authorities, but that pending federal action, they would see to it that the unfortunate man was kept away from the general population as a preventative of possible spread of the disease.

Washington, April 20.—(AP)—The public health service authorities here have not been informed as to the whereabouts of John Early, escaped leper, who is reported to be in North Carolina, it was announced today.

If he was found, the state authorities would be requested to take him into custody. However, the health service officials said on account of the failure of the deficiency bill in the last Congress there would be no funds available for Early's transportation back to Carrville, La., if he were captured.

Sanborn county had three deaths at Buffalo Hart, two men and an infant. One was killed at Loomis, where five persons also were reported suffering from injuries which may prove fatal.

Two school children were killed at Chestnut in Logan county, while a father and a son lost their lives at Mount Pulaski.

Clarence Gallagher, principal of the Chestnut school, received a report from a station agent that the storm was approaching, and methodically marched his eighty pupils from the second floor to the first, where they huddled while the wind crashed through the upper floor tearing it away. Two pupils who were killed, were struck by flying bricks as they dashed from the building.

Thirty school children at Buffalo Hart were saved when their teacher herded them into the basement of a church. Near Cornland, a school was raised, and three pupils hurt.

Cornland and Buffalo Hart virtually were leveled.

Roads in many places were impassable and communication lines wrecked.

A methodical check of the stricken sections was under way today.

To Attempt Flight Paris to New York

Paris, April 20.—(AP)—Captain Charles Nungesser and Captain Francis Coli, are planning to start Sunday morning on a trans-Atlantic flight from Paris to New York.

Tests were made yesterday by Captain Nungesser with his plane carrying a three-ton load. It rose to a height of more than 18,000 feet and developed a speed of 130 miles an hour. He now will make tests with a four ton load, after which the engine will be dismantled and replaced by a new one which has given satisfaction after exhaustive bench tests.

A long cross-country flight of several hours over the Paris-Lyon circuit will complete the trial.

23 PERSONS DEAD RESULT OF TORNADO

Nine Others Believed
Fatally Injured
While Hundred
More Injured.

Springfield, Ills., April 20.—(AP)—Line squalls that extended like invisible tentacles from Greene county yesterday, one striking southeastward, the other northeastward, left known death list of 23, nine others listed as probably fatally injured, and about 100 less seriously hurt.

Property damage in the five counties where the storms took human life and in half a dozen other counties which felt the force in diminished violence was roughly estimated at \$1,000,000. Many buildings, most of them in farming communities, were destroyed and considerable damage was done to crops.

Greene county, almost directly north of St. Louis, suffered most heavily in casualties. Nine were killed there. Another death resulted a few miles west, in Calhoun county.

One arm of the tornado reached from Greene county sixty miles to the southeast into Bond county where one life was lost.

At Wrights, near here, four died, while three others met death at Woodsville and another death was at Athensville.

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Turner Trial Cost Considerable Sum

Sanford, April 20.—(AP)—Lee County Superior Court attaches were busy today figuring how much the trial of the four convicted slayers of Sheriff James L. Turner cost the county and state.

The amount was expected to run into thousands of dollars. In addition to per diem and mileage for more than 60 State witnesses, two venire of 350 men were summoned from Hazlett county, the jury was kept together under deputy guard for 11 days, and the prisoners were kept in jail more than two months. Hospital and doctor bills also came in for care of wounded officers.

Commissioners To Discuss Budgeting

Raleigh, April 20.—(AP)—County Commissioners from various sections of North Carolina today met here to discuss budgeting and related subjects.

The meeting was called to order by J. E. Woodland, of Morehead City, president of the State Association of County Commissioners.

J. L. Skinner, of Littleton, secretary; Dr. E. O. Brooks and Charles M. Johnson, of the newly created county board of advisers were expected to attend and lead discussions.

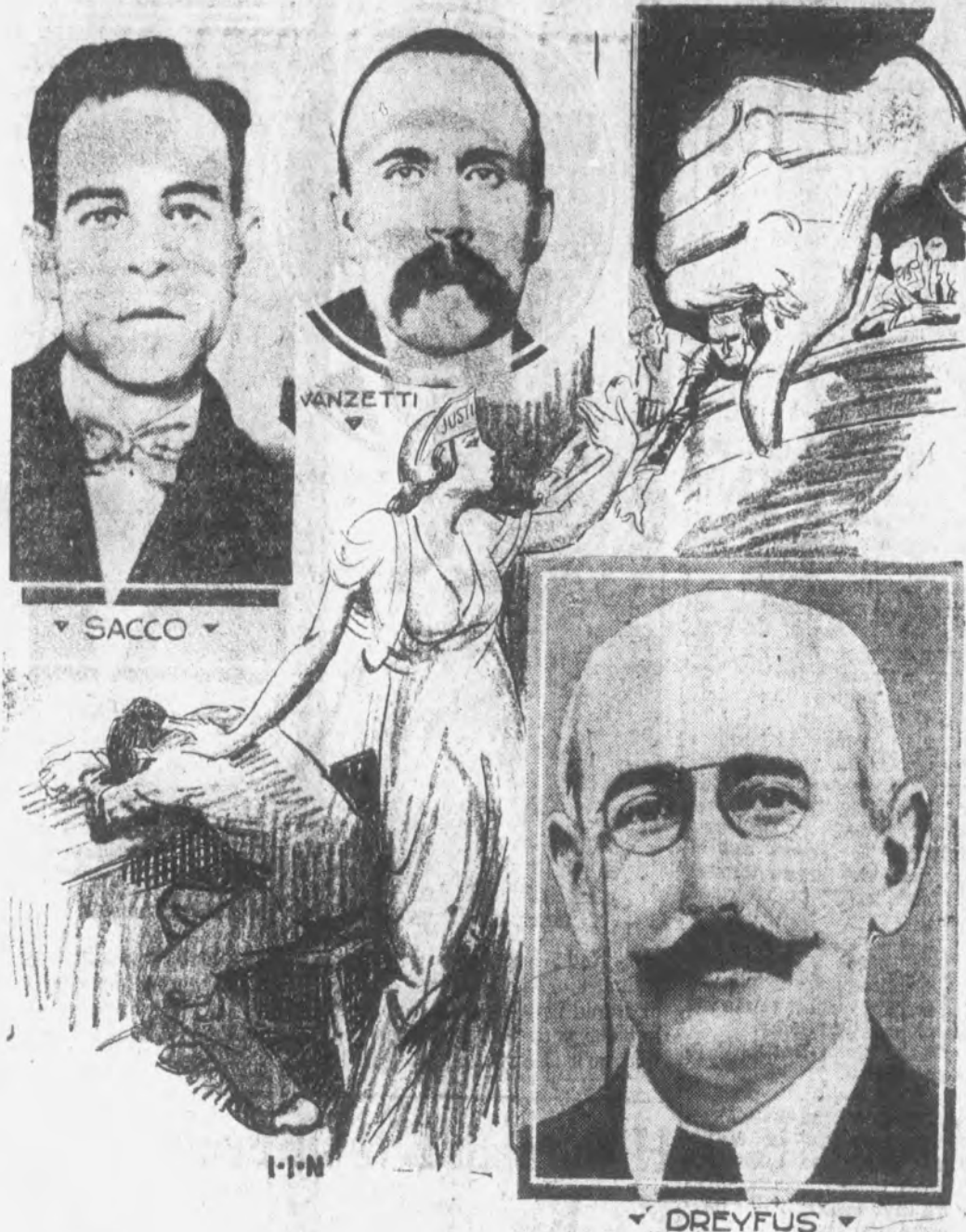

Sacco-Vanzetti and Alfred Dreyfuss— Is There Deadly Parallel in Cases?



Friends of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, facing execution in Massachusetts for the South Braintree payroll killings, see a great similarity in their plight and that of Alfred Dreyfuss, of France. In both cases hatred and post-war hysteria played a part and not all of the evidence was made public at the trial.

BOSTON, Mass. (I-I-N Special).—Is the Sacco-Vanzetti case the Dreyfuss case of America? Friends of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti profess to see a startling similarity between the case of the French army officer and the case of the men facing execution here.

Alfred Dreyfuss was a captain attached to the general staff. He was unpopular among his brother officers, partly because his social interests differed from theirs, and partly, it is charged, because he was a Jew. French military documents were found to have been in the hands of the German military attaché in Paris.

No one but Dreyfuss was suspected. He was tried behind closed doors, and when it seemed that the evidence against him would fall by its own weight, the famous "dossier," a forged set of documents purporting to have been written by an Italian military attaché and mentioning Dreyfuss as an agent, were presented to the judges. Dreyfuss was convicted and sentenced to Devil's Island, off French Guiana.

Friends continued his fight for vindication. They held that race prejudice and class prejudice had convicted him. Subsequently two other French officers admitted both the crime and the framing of evidence. Public feeling over the world was aroused. After five years of servitude, Dreyfuss, in 1909, was tried

again. To the astonishment of the public he was convicted a second time. The President of France stepped in and pardoned the man. Six years later he won a new hearing and the conviction was wiped out. Dreyfuss was restored to honor. He became a major, and served with honor in the World War.

Sacco and Vanzetti are Italian radicals. Sacco was a shoemaker by trade, his companion a fish peddler. On May 8, 1920, they were arrested and charged with participating in the killing of a paymaster and his guard in a robbery at South Braintree, Mass. Witnesses who had previously identified others as the killers, identified them. The jury found them guilty.

Appeals were taken. The confession of Celestino F. Maderios, a Portuguese convicted of a similar murder, was ignored despite the fact that he took the blame for the killings. Efforts of Sacco's and Vanzetti's attorneys to produce Government records to show that the Department of Justice had conspired to "frame" the men were blocked. After seven years of futile pleas, Judge Webster Thayer sentenced them to be electrocuted.

International agitation has waged upon behalf of the men just as it waged for Dreyfuss. The two workers have found supporters in every walk of life. These friends declare that the two cases are parallel, charging:

In both cases did racial prej-

dice prevent a fair trial.

All were victims of a post-war hysteria of hate and suspicion.

All were framed by the highest secret police in the land.

In both cases part of the evidence was withheld from the public.

In both cases another confessed the crime charged.

In both cases the principle of fair trial is the issue, rather than the crime.

The similarity goes even further. The notables in America who have come to the aid of Sacco and Vanzetti rank with Zola, the author, who became leading champion of Dreyfuss. And in both cases international interest has been aroused.

Just as some liberals said of Dreyfuss: "We care not whether he committed the crime or not; we do care if he was given a fair trial." So have liberals said of Sacco and Vanzetti: "We care not whether they have committed the crime or not; we do care if they have been given a fair trial."

And just as the sole hope for the condemned rested with the Executive clemency of the President of France, so does the hope for the condemned in the case rest with the Governor of Massachusetts.

But those who have accused Sacco and Vanzetti foresee a different ending.

"The sole issue was the guilt or innocence of the men. And they have been convicted in open court by a jury of their peers," they say.

No Bills; Legislators Get Gold Medals from Admirers



Time was when representatives went to the Legislature with the idea of winning fame for themselves by pushing through as large a mass of legislation bearing their names as possible. But Frank Hallgren, of Holdrege, and George M. Storey, of Plainview, had a different idea. And the Lincoln Cosmopolitan Club presented them with gold medals because they didn't introduce a single bill into the Nebraska Legislature.

LINCOLN, Neb. (I-I-N Special).—Bills limiting movie houses, bills prescribing how sundries may be mixed, bills making it a crime to curse a traffic cop, bills providing a new State anthem—all of these and many more pop up in every Legislature in the country.

It seems that as soon as the election returns are in, and sometimes even before, every representative starts thinking of things to legislate about. One expert recently calculated that if a policeman started to study all the laws he is expected to enforce he could never undertake the span of his life.

A ray of sunshine is breaking through the cloud of "do's," "don'ts,"

"verboten" and "keep off the grass's" that obscure the horizon of the average citizen.

Representative Frank Hallgren, of Holdrege, and George M. Storey, of Plainview, have emerged from a session of the Nebraska Legislature without having introduced a single bill.

To commemorate the event, the Lincoln Cosmopolitan Club struck gold medals. Vernon D. Andrews, state president, with public ceremony, presented them to the legislators.

Andrews has long agitated for fewer laws and greater observance of the few.

"And if fewer bills were introduced," he said, "legislators could give more careful consideration to the business before them."

100,000TH PONTIAC SIX TURNED OUT

Pontiac, Mich., April 20.—The Oakland Motor Car Company's production set a new mark for the automotive industry to shoot at on March 28th, when the 100,000th Pontiac Six rolled off the assembly line in the new plant at Pontiac, Mich., less than 15 months from the time car No. 1 was built.

In recognition of the company's achievement, not even remotely approached by any new car in the history of the industry, a brief ceremony was arranged at the factory. A. R. Glancy, president and general manager of the Oakland Motor Car Company, handed the key of the 100,000th Pontiac Six to Mayor Charles L. Rockwell of Pontiac, who had christened the first Pontiac Six on January 4, 1926, less than 15 months ago. Several officials, including W. R. Tracy, vice-president in charge of sales, and A. J. Brandt, vice-president in charge of operations, were present.

"Completion of the 100,000th Pontiac Six was hastened by the heavy influx of orders for spring delivery," explained Mr. Tracy. "March production was increased from 14,000 to 16,000 Oakland and Pontiac cars in response to this increased buying, thus almost equalling last August's record production of 17,000. April's total will far outstrip all records in the company's history being set at 22,000. This figure exceeds even the record production of August by 5,000 cars."

The compilation of records from each city gives Greenville a rating of 94.3 per cent. The figures are based on a survey made during the summer of 1926, and are taken from the rating of a group of thirty cities.

The milk supply of this city is produced under regulations of the Standard Milk Ordinance which has been in operation slightly over a year.

The dairies, it was stated today, are due much credit for producing grade A raw milk.

Elizabeth City, N. C., April 20.—(AP)—With stoutest cords binding the hands, the body of Frederick Whitehurst was found in Knob Creek, near here, today, ending a twelve-hour search.

Whitehurst, a mail carrier here for 23 years, had been missing since yesterday, when he left his home, ostensibly for a walk. When he failed to show up for supper, alarm was broadcast and bloodhounds were brought from Norfolk, but they failed to locate the body.

Dr. C. B. Williams, county health officer, viewing the body in the absence of coroner Fearing, said that there was every indication of suicide. The body was taken to an undertaking establishment to await the return of the coroner.

Whitehurst had retired from active service about six months ago, after being in ill health for three years. Relatives said he had shown signs of depression during the last several weeks. He was unmarried.

East Spencer Man Dies Of Injuries Received In Wreck
Salisbury, April 20.—(AP)—John C. Rusher, 77, of East Spencer, died at a local hospital late yesterday from injuries sustained when hit by a truck while he was attempting to pick up a walking cane he had dropped.

The mishap occurred in Spencer at the intersection of Depot street and the national highway while Mr. Rusher was attempting to cross the street.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon from the East Spencer Lutheran Church.

The driver of the truck, W. H. Smith, of Linwood, was put under a \$500 bond pending a hearing April 28.

EARTHQUAKE SHAKES WEST COAST OF MANILA
Manila, April 20.—(AP)—An earthquake shook the entire west coast of the Island of Luzon at 1:30 o'clock this morning, doing no damage but causing great alarm here.

Many householders, fearing collapse of their homes, rushed to the streets. Father Selga of the wealthier bureau, said the quake was of the fifth intensity and that it was not felt on the eastern coast of the island.

KELLY FACES MURDER ISSUE

Film Juvenile Held in Connection With Death of Raymond; Musical Star.

Hollywood, Cal., April 20.—(AP)—Paul Kelly, film juvenile, faced a manslaughter charge today in connection with the death of Ray Raymond, musical comedy star, on his own admission that he had engaged in a fist fight with the actor in a quarrel over Raymond's wife, Dorothy McKaye, stage actress.

Raymond died at a hospital early yesterday after a bare knuckle fight with Kelly in the former's home Saturday night.

Details of the affair were not revealed until yesterday because Dr. Arthur Sullivan, who attended Raymond, signed a death certificate giving nephritic coma following brights disease as the cause of the actor's death. Raymond's body showed several cuts and bruises.

The arrest of Kelly, who is 27 years old, followed an investigation by Captain of Detectives Herman Kline, when he learned an attempt

had been made to withhold the facts regarding Raymond's death. Deputy District Attorney Ellis Egan, after questioning Kelly, Miss MacKaye and other witnesses, announced he would request the issuance of a manslaughter complaint against the screen player today.

The prosecutor said Kelly would be held on the manslaughter charge pending the outcome of the coroner's inquest tomorrow.

Kelly, in a statement to police, told of the fight with Raymond and frankly confessed to be in love with the actor's wife.

"I love Dorothy, I always have, and always will," he said.

Quizzed by the investigating officers, Kelly said he had "merely punched Raymond several times,"

and was very much surprised when he died." Miss MacKaye disclosed that she had visited Kelly in his apartments while her husband was fighting a losing game for life in a hospital. "I went there to bawl him out," she said.

ROCKY MOUNT

EXTENDS LIMITS

Rocky Mount, April 20.—(AP)—North Carolina has one less incorporated town today as the village of Rocky Mount Mills, site of the first cotton mill established in the State, yielded up its charter of incorporation and became a part of the greater community of Rocky Mount which has grown up around it.

The inclusion of the village in the

city of Rocky Mount occurred when the provisions of contract previously entered into between the mills and the municipality and ratified by the recent session of the General Assembly went into effect today. By more than 1,000 citizens to its population.

Another extension of the city limits, authorized by the Legislature, went into effect several weeks ago. As a result of the extension several thousand persons were brought into the city and Rocky Mount given an estimated population of 20,000.

Moscow, April 20.—(INS)—Booze addicts who beat up their families when under the influence of vodka will henceforth be forced to undergo a treatment to cure them of their thirst. The Council of People's Commissars has put its seal upon this decision to render it doubly strong.

There are many thousands of "wild and chronic" drinkers in this country according to Commissioner of Health Semashko. All of those who can be caught will be isolated and shut away from all society until their cure is affected and they become sober citizens.

A new method combining auto-suggestion and hypnosis will be used to break them of the drink habit.

In order to limit the consumption of alcohol and thus remove temptation from the wild, as well as the more or less tame, drinkers a resolution forbidding the sale of intoxicating drinks to persons under the influence of liquor has been adopted by the Council of Commissars.

Minors also will not be permitted to buy alcoholic drinks. Their sale in theaters, buffets, moving picture theaters, clubs and other public establishments is forbidden. The violation of this law will be punished by a fine for the first offense one.

One of the annual musical events in Moscow is the appearance of the "Homeless Children's Orchestra" for a vagabond concert.

This queer organization is composed of 100 young wandering minstrels picked up from the wild bands of orphans that roam Russian streets. Their ages range from five to fifteen and the instruments on which they play are of their own manufacture.

Tin buckets have been known to be conscripted for transportation into drums. Not only the instruments used by the orchestra, but the folding chairs and music stands have been constructed by these ingenious "Homeless" orchestra.

The "Homeless" orchestra was period of the civil war and the famine. Its membership is composed of vast numbers of the youngsters ready to tune in and join the orchestra. Their programs consist of tramp songs of the Russian plains, as well as composers.

Mrs. Snyder says Gray is a miserable coward and she is done with him. She might have known that before the killing, when Gray planned, as they both confessed, to murder a sleeping man.
