More Than 300,000 Troops Available to Withstand The Onslaught From Hankow.

Shanghai, April 20.-(AP)-Renewal of Cantonese campaign against the North is planned by General Chiang Kai-Shek as soon as a cabinet has been formed for the newly established government by the Cantonese moderates at Nanking, official reports from Nanking stated today.

General Chiang, these reports said, does not expect any forceful action from the civil government at Hankow which the Nanking Cantonese have defled by establishing a government of their own.

It was stated that more than 300. 000 troops are immediately available to General Chiang Kal-Sek to withstand any onslaught from Hanknow, whereas only the most mea-L'v faction.

The uestioning went on and talesmen continued to drop by the wayside. Of the fifty men examined on Monday, the first day of the trial, none were accepted. Yesterday the total rose to 87 and a foreman was secured. This morning juror number two was obtained.




